RELIEF LABOR FOR FARM PONDS

TEXAS RELIEF COMMISSION HAS PLAN FOR BUILDING OF LOW WATER DAMS RELIEF LABOR

Shindler, county administrator, has received a bulletin from the Texas Relief Commission stressing the fact that water conservation and control projects will be looked upon favorably by the commission in coming work programs.

This communication set forth that number of low water dams may be constructed provided certain conditions are met. Applicants must agree to furnish 75 per cent of all budgetary items. Sufficient engineering data must also be included in the application to determine the feasibility of each dam site, also complete information as to type of construction.

Basements from surrounding property owners must also be secured regarding the state and all political divisions from liability from overflows, etc., and the public must allow the use of the water intended for domestic use for the stock.

Return for these requirements to the Texas Relief commission will be to furnish the remaining 25 per cent of non-budgetary items. A budgetary labor as is necessary to complete the dam. Parties wanting information on such dam or projects are requested to get in touch with Mr. Shindler at once, and he will furnish them with full information concerning the project.

TERRACING PROGRAM PLANNED

PLANS BEING WORKED OUT BY RELIEF ADMINISTRATION FOR ASSISTANCE IN TERRACING FARMS

COLLEGE STATION — Terracing takes its place early as an important rural activity of 1935 and is so recognized by an agreement between the Texas Extension Service and Texas Rural Communities Inc. to cooperate in increasing the amount of land in the State under the protection of terraces.

Under the plan, which is definitely a part of the rural rehabilitation program of the Emergency Relief Administration and of the soil and water conservation program of the Extension Service, M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer, will have charge for the Extension Service and will give supervision to the work which will be carried on in the counties through the farm demonstration work supplemented by terracing assistants employed by relief agencies.

CHAMBER MEETS TUESDAY NIGHT

MEMBERS HEAR REPORTS FOR YEAR AND DISCUSSIONS ON PROPOSED ACTIVITIES

Approximately fifty members of the Chamber of Commerce attended the annual meeting of the organization held in the home economics department rooms at the high school building on Tuesday evening of this week, hearing 1934 reports and discussion of proposed activities for the new year.

The meeting which was a joint session of the Lions club and Chamber was opened by C. W. Claybaugh, Lions president. Musical numbers were presented by Mrs. L. C. Boston, Mrs. Clarence Zirkle and Miss McCall and by the male quartet from Goodwell college.

Talks and discussions were presented by R. H. Prewitt, speaking on Boy Scout work, W. C. Brown on trades days, R. T. Shindler on highway work, and Fred Hood on Chamber membership.

The new officers of the Chamber are J. H. Neufeld, president; Jack Allen, vice-president; Vance Apple secretary; and the other directors are Virgil Castle, R. C. Johnson, R. T. Shindler and Addison Cutler.

BEAVER BRIDGE CONTRACT LET

FREDERICK CONTRACT'G FIRM AWARDED CONTRACT FOR BRIDGE ON FEDERAL 83 OVER BEAVER

Word has been received from Oklahoma City announcing the confirmation of the contract for the construction of a bridge over the Beaver River, on Federal highway No. 83, approximately 25 miles north of Perryton. The contract for the grading of 1.81 miles of highway through the river bottom was let to the same firm, the Kadane Construction Co., Frederick, Okla.

Bids for the construction of this work were opened on December 29, 1934, but according to W. A. Smiley, federal engineer in charge of Oklahoma federal roads, the final awarding was delayed until charges made to the federal re-employment service that the Kadane company had worked men overtime in violation of regulations of the federal bureau of roads and highways had been investigated and found groundless.

With the completion and improvement of No. 83, across Oklahoma the dream of that little group of road boosters that formed the Great Plains Highway Association many years ago, will become an actuality. The gap across the Oklahoma strip is practically the only point on the entire route from Canada to the Mexico border that is not either a hard surface road or arrangements all complete for construction in the near future and it is understood that the route across Oklahoma will be graveled as soon as possible.

Federal 83 is now completed and graveled from Liberal to the Oklahoma state line. The new route runs directly southeast from Liberal, hitting the Oklahoma line at a point straight north of the section line on the east border of Turpin, Oklahoma. Through Oklahoma south to the southeast corner of Turpin, the grading is completed, but there are several culverts to be completed.

From the southeast corner of Turpin the new highway will run south for a short distance, then angling southeast and crossing the Beaver about two miles east of the old bridge at Boyd, thence on southeast joining the present highway at the corner straight north on the section line west of Gray, running over the present route the remainder of the way into Perryton.

When the new route is completed, it is estimated that the distance from Perryton to Liberal will be shortened at least five miles.

Hood Makes Stirring Appeal For Support Of Local Chamber

Fred W. Hood, manager of the Panhandle Lumber Co., and an active civic and community worker in Perryton ever since the town was founded, made the key note speech in the 1935 drive for members and financial support at the annual meeting of the organization held in the Home Economics department of the Perryton school Tuesday evening. Mr. Hood will serve as chairman of the membership committee in the campaign which will be launched in a few days. Mr. Hood gave the following stirring appeal for Chamber support at the Tuesday night banquet.

"The only way I know to interest all or any part of the people present and a great many that are not here tonight, to the importance of being a member of the Chamber of Commerce and helping, not only with your time, but also with your money, is to try and sell the idea to you.

"In looking back over the past fifteen years, I remember the little group of men that met in the old court house in the spring of 1920 to organize the first Chamber of Commerce in Perryton.

"If you were one of that group that gathered at that first meeting, you can see here tonight a number of faces that were present, and if you will review in your mind the history of Perryton, you will remember that most of these men have given hours, even days, of their time and a great amount of money in making the Chamber of Commerce a success, and in making the Chamber of Commerce a success, they have built Perryton.

"It did not just happen that Perryton was built. The first time that I saw what is Perryton today, it was nothing but a broad expanse of prairie. In the fall of 1919, the Buffalo grass was still growing on

what are now paved streets of our city.

"Perryton was built by the very men that have made the Chamber of Commerce a success. No one man or two or three men built the town, it took the combined efforts of a group of people working together.

"If you will think back, and if you have come to this country since 1919, you can inquire and learn that all of the towns along this Santa Fe railroad started on an even basis. If there was any advantage, it was to the towns to the east where the railroad was first constructed. As many of you can recall, Perryton was not picked by 'big business' to be the best town on this Santa Fe branch. Big business concerns with plenty of capital established businesses in another town on this line, confident that it was to be 'the town' but such was not the case as the years rolled by, these 'big business' concerns, saw that they had erred in their judgment, pulled out, charged off their losses, while the Perryton builders went on and Perryton took its place as the metropolis of the Northwest Panhandle.

"Through the bad years that came just after the town was founded and before we had 'our feet on the ground', the members of our Chamber of Commerce stood together. We fought among ourselves at times, but always joined hands to put over any proposition for the good of the community.

"We sometimes think that the name, Chamber of Commerce, is a misnomer. So many people, that should take an interest in building up the town and country think that it is just a little group of business men trying to get something for themselves.

"Every man that owns a home in the Perryton community or has a job of any kind should help in some way to take care of the expenses and work of our Chamber of Commerce.

"Why did you invest in the town or how did you get the job that you hold? I believe that it was because some one made you think that Perryton was going to make a good town and that it had a citizenship that was striving earnestly to make Perryton a good place in which to live and for people to come to trade.

"When some of the 'old gang' get together, they get to talking about the many improvements that they have seen made, and they recount with pardonable pride the fact that citizens of this community take a delight in showing visitors and strangers within our gates, our wonderful school buildings, the fine modern hotel, the excellent business buildings, our wide paved streets, the 'white way', and fine paved highways.

"Did you ever stop to think just how all of these improvements came about? Without taking one single lot of credit from our school boards, who have striven for many years to put and keep our schools at the head of the procession, or from Superintendent W. B. Irvin, who has had such an important post in leading our school institutions to the front rank, I say that the Perryton Chamber of Commerce had a prominent part in school affairs from the voting of the first bonds to the erection of the last building. I believe that Mr. Irvin will tell you that he has never asked the Chamber of Commerce for any assistance that was not given.

"The fine hotel that you see and point to with pride is a direct result of Chamber of Commerce work. The directors and members worked for years until at last their efforts were rewarded with the building of this modern hotel which would be a credit to a city many times the size of Perryton.

"The fine highways that we have already constructed and those that are now being built have been secured through the efforts of the highway committee, a number of the members of this committee having served faithfully for years. These roads have been made possible with very little cost to property tax paying owners of the county.

"Now the point that I have been working up to is, that it takes a certain amount of money to keep this Chamber of Commerce operating and taking care of the demands and expenses that come up from month to month.

"There was a small group of men left here last spring on an errand that few had any knowledge of. The result of that trip is that a bridge has just been contracted by the State Highway Commission of Oklahoma to be built across the Beaver River twenty-five miles north of Perryton over which Highway No. 83 will run. This bridge will cost over \$120,000 and will be finished during 1935 providing work for many people living within the confines of the Perryton trade territory.

"This trip cost money but I am sure that everyone of you will agree that it was worth many times the amount expended by the Chamber of Commerce for the trip.

"You are going to be asked in the next few days to sign a pledge to help support our Chamber of Commerce. When some man or woman calls on you for your pledge, please treat them with all the courtesy possible. They do not like the job, but they are just doing their part to keep the ball rolling to build a bigger and better Perryton. I want you to pardon me at this

"Come in with us and help us build a larger and better Perryton this year by making your pledge and paying the same".

International Sunday School Lesson

Lesson III Jan. 20, 1935
PETER LEARNS A LESSON IN HUMBLE SERVICE

Lesson Text: John 13: 6-13
Memory Verse: "All of you gird yourselves with humility, to serve one another"—I Pet. 5:5

I. The Passover

An ancient practice was this Passover! It was founded on the night of Israel's deliverance from Egypt as a memorial of the passing of the death angel over the homes of God's people but visiting of death upon the first born child of each Egyptian family. Through the years God's people observed this feast, except such times as they were careless and prodigal. This feast was temporary in time and limited as to people. It was given to the Jews, not to the Gentiles. It was to last through out their generations till Christ should come and nail all the law to the cross (Col. 2: 14).

Just before Jesus was betrayed, he assembled the disciples together in an upper room and there ate with them the last supper. There were some very solemn things took place there. Judas was prompted to betray his Master. So he arose and went out to accomplish the wicked deed.

Following the supper our Lord gave the disciples an object lesson in service. They needed to be taught humility, for already they were jealous of each other as to who would be greatest in the kingdom of Heaven. Such rivalry is not good in the kingdom of our Savior. Supremacy must be secured by the virtue of service, not power. So Jesus rose from the supper and girded himself with a towel. This was 't' garb only for a servant. Christ therefore put himself in the place of a servant and began to wash the disciples' feet. For a man to wash the feet of someone was for him to occupy the lowest realm of humility and subjection. What a sight this must have been! Jesus who had lived in heaven with the homage of angels and archangels shown him—now robbed like a slave washing the feet of the jealous disciples to show them what it means to be great! What a peculiar road to dominion was that pointed out by the Messiah that night. If his followers would aspire to the heights, let them climb the ladder of genuine service.

What a practical lesson this. How different it is to the methods of business and religion to-day. How it calls with words and actions of love and warning to us all, beseeching us to imitate the worthy example there set before us on the night of our Lord's betrayal.

Jesus did not establish the practice of feet washing as a religious act of worship. But it was given as an act of service that wonderfully and eloquently speaks and in terms easily understood. There are

thousands of little ways we may show humility and may serve our fellowmen. Let our hands always be ready to lift the head bowed down with care. Let our feet always be willing to be dedicated to errands of mercy and kindness. If we will only look about us we can see always a broken heart that needs sympathy, a weary pilgrim who needs a helping hand to steady his faltering feet. We ought all to be great, but let it be through service.

II Simon Peter's Feet

All went well till Jesus came to Peter with the basin of water. Then the old fisherman could stand it no longer. He asked the Lord if He intended to wash his (Peter's) feet. Upon learning that such was the case, Simon revolted at the idea. It was preposterous to him to even think of the Son or God stooping to wash an old fisherman's feet. Such humility could not be fathomed by the stalwart old disciple. But the Savior was not to be defeated in his program. He told Peter that unless he permitted his Lord wash his feet, he had no part in the great program that was to be the exalted lot of the apostles. Simon would be left behind. Finally it dawned upon the impulsive Peter that he must submit to this act of service or be excluded from the fellowship of Christ. Then, as if to make amends for his former stupidity, he hastened to say, "Not my feet only, but also my hands and my head".

III Jesus' Question About The Foot Washing

"Know ye what I have done to you?" (John 13:12) Did they know what had really happened? Was this simply a ceremony which was devoid of significance? Was there not a fountain motive which had gushed forth in this peculiar performance? The disciples had called Jesus. Teacher, and were correct in the term. Then if Jesus, their Master, had washed their feet, they ought to render this service to one another. This lesson from the hands and lips of our Lord ought to take all the conceit out of the children of men. And this fault is so common with many of us. We are not entirely immune from its tempting influence. But a careful study of the actions of our Savior as given in the present lesson text will enable us to get just that grip upon ourselves that we ought to have to make us fight against any tendency toward vanity.

This lesson does not teach us to grovel in the dirt. We are not whimpering brutes awaiting the cudgel. No man may live in a more exalted sphere than a son or daughter of the most high God. But though we may sit in heavenly places and be joint-heirs with Christ, we must be great in humility and service. If Christ could stoop from the dome of heaven to suffer for us, may we not reach down to those about us with a hand of compassion.

IV. Simon Peter Passes The Great Lesson On

The memory verse is taken from Peter's writings. Years have rolled on since the event in the upper room. Peter has been converted, and has strengthened his brethren. Since the day of Pentecost (Acts 2) he has been an ambassador with Christ in his heart and the gospel upon his lips. Thousands have been converted through his fearless declaration of truth. Idols have crumbled, Jerusalem has been smitten with the sword of the Spirit, Judea and Samaria have bowed in allegiance to the crucified Lord. Peter is getting old. Soon he will put off this tabernacle as the Lord had showed him. But he would remind his brethren of the great lesson of humility. He calls it a clothing. 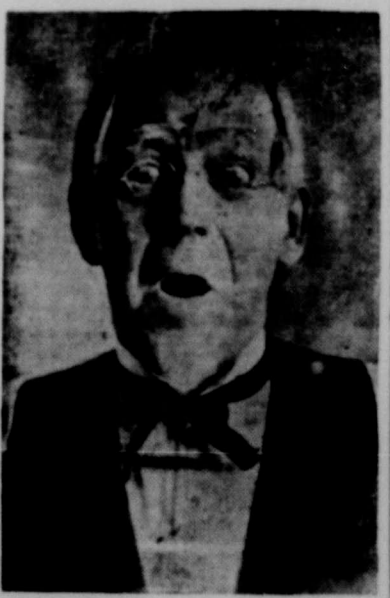

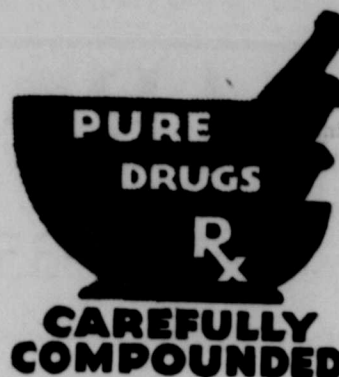

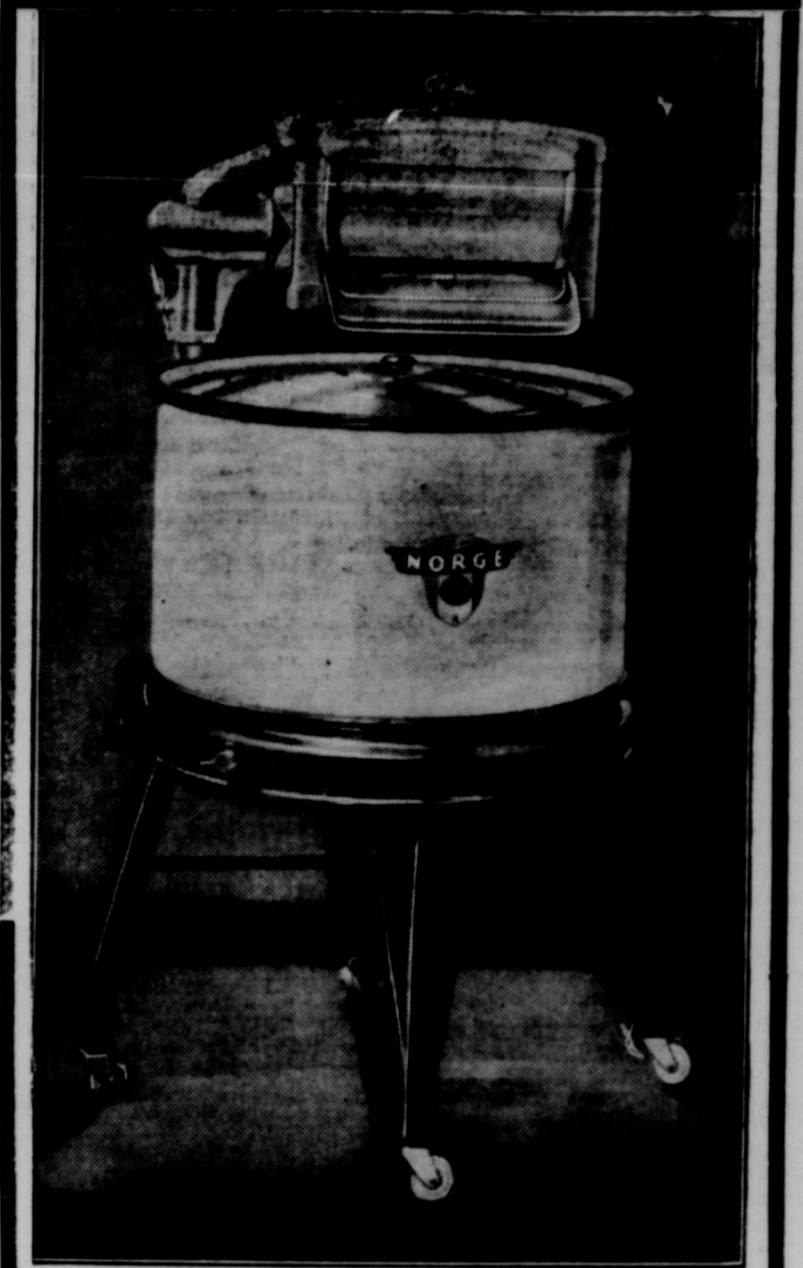

She then squeezes the peel between the fingers or puts the peel on dry cloth and pats out excess juice. The proportions of 2 cups and 1-2 cup water to 1 pound of peel are used. The peel and the syrup are boiled until dry then the peel is rolled in granulated sugar.

Mrs. LaMaster uses the candied peel in gift packages and for her children who are away in school. During December, Mrs. LaMaster made 10 pounds of candied grape fruit peel.

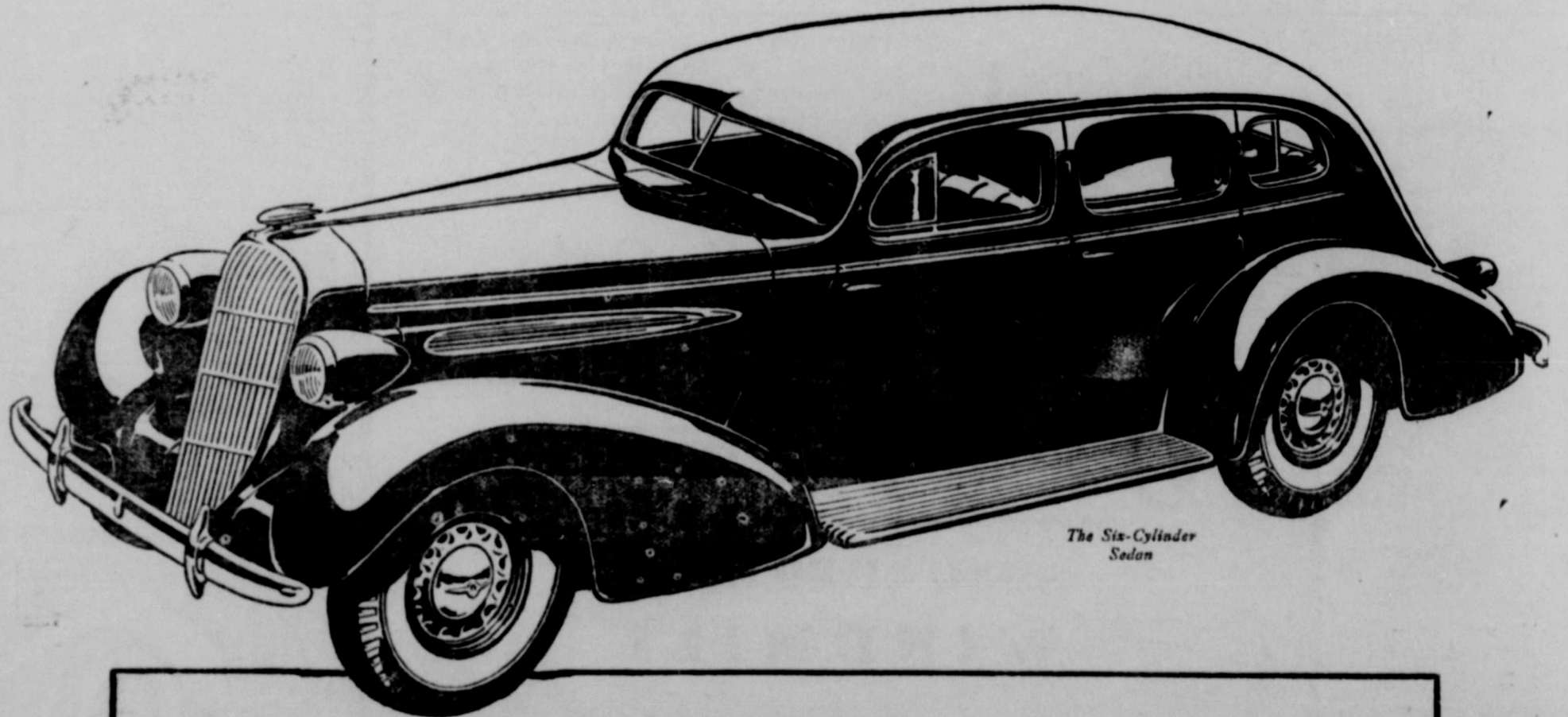

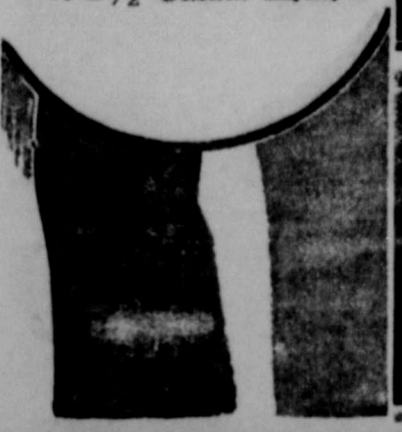

to the agreement, will be responsible for securing the cooperation in counties desiring the program; for furnishing technical supervision of county terracing assistants employed by the Rural Communities Inc.; and for assisting with training workers and giving general supervision of conservation work.

The Rural Communities Inc., which is the governmental agency charged with rural rehabilitation, will employ an assistant to its manager to furnish general supervision of these terracing assistants, will provide funds on a refunding basis to facilitate conservation work that will furnish work for relief labor and will also provide financial aid for individuals who desire to terrace their lands with relief labor but are unable to obtain the money for it from regular financial institutions. These loans will be so arranged as to be payable over a long period of time with small interest charges.
