

Lack Of Local Runoff Impairs Turnout

The voter turnout in the Red River County run-off elections was extremely light, according to Red River County Clerk Mary Hausler, probably because there were no local races in Saturday's runoff, the county judge's position and commissioner's positions having been decided in May.

Only 297 people voted in the

Democratic primary and only 11 in the Republican primary Saturday.

In the statewide races on the Democratic ticket, Red River Countians favored John Sharp by a big margin, 246-36 over P.S. Ervin for Railroad Commissioner.

Three seats on the Texas Supreme Court are up for election this year.

Red River County Democrats picked Oscar Mauzy over Shirley Butts, 214-77, for the Place 1 seat; Robert M. Campbell received 190 votes to Jim Brady's 96 votes for the Place 2 seat; and Jay Gibson received 195 votes for the Place 4 seat while his opponent Raul Gonzalez, garnered 92 votes.

The only other statewide race on

the ballot was for Place 1 on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals. Rusty Duncan got 217 votes from Red River County while Goerge Martinez received 63.

On the Republican side, David Davidson received eight of the nine votes cast in the runoff for the Lieutenant Governor's race. His opponent in

the race was Aaron L. Bullock. Ed Walsh edged Roy R. Barrera Jr. in the runoff for Attorney General. Walsh collected six votes while Barrera got five.

In the Commissioner of the General Land Office race, Grady T. Yarbrough received all nine votes cast in

the county. His opponent was M.D. Anderson, Jr.

For the Railroad Commissioner's runoff on the Republican side, Red River Countians gave five votes to John Thomas Henderson and five to Milton E. Fox.

Armed Man Robs Johntown Grocery

At approximately 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, June 5, the Johntown Grocery Store was robbed. According to Freda Jean, employee of the store, who was working alone at the time, a tall, heavy set man wearing a ski mask entered the store, pointed a shotgun in her face, held out a paper sack, and demanded in a deep voice, "Put it in the bag."

"I was so stunned, that I hesitated

for a moment," stated Mrs. Jean. The man again told her to "put it in the bag" at which time Mrs. Jean grabbed the money from the cash register and put it in the sack. "I then turned my gaze away from the robber, and toward the back of the store. I didn't want to see it coming, but I really thought he was going to kill me. Another reason I looked away, was to avoid provoking him," explained

Mrs. Jean.

The man fled the scene in a late model charcoal gray car and headed toward Talco. The robber escaped with about \$500.00. Law officials were called out of Clarksville to the scene of the crime and a special detective came later to get fingerprints. According to Randy Andeson, owner of the store, as of Saturday, June 7, there were still no real clues to the identity or whereabouts of the thief.

For instance, as I look at the Post Office, I recall when it was Turner's Dry Goods Store and my mother took me there as a child to purchase a new pair of shoes. Now, I'm not all that old, and I'll not mention just how old, but I can remember when we only had one pair of shoes at a time and sometimes those were hard to come by. This particular time, as Mr. Turner brought out his display of little girls shoes for us to see, he included a darling pair of red slippers. Of course, I knew immediately that my life would never be worth living any

longer without them. My mother tried ever so hard to explain that red just doesn't go with everything, but it was all to no avail, so with a little help from good ol' Mr. Turner, I got the red shoes.

Then as I look at the buildings further up on North Main Street, my mouth can almost taste those good cold orange drinks I used to get on grocery buying day when Juarez Jordan had his grocery business in that vicinity. I've heard my sisters talk about going up on Saturday nights and sitting on the feed sacks in the rear of that store while our parents shopped for the best bargains to feed five hungry kids plus a few strays for the next two weeks.

Watching the new alternator and starter shop go in at the old Joe Ford Grocery Store, reminds me of when I was a first and second grader and my friend and I would walk down to his store during the lunch break from school and buy our penny candy and talk to Joe. He delighted in teasing us and we thought he was grand.

Mrs. Kinsey's Variety Store was fascinating to me. I thought it held more pretty things than any place in the world.

I remember climbing up those stairs in Allen's Drug Store to see Dr. Grayson, or as we always called him, Dr. Roy. Instead of collecting money from my dad for his services, many times he would take sawdust from daddy's sawmill for his spit cans. We usually got an ice cream cone from Mr. Allen before leaving the store. I always thought it was so amazing that he had watermelon ice cream. I'm still not sure if it really was, or if he was just teasing us to see the surprise on our face.

Buckman's Drug Store holds many dear memories for me of my pre-teen and teenage years. That was the official kids stop each day at lunch and after school. We'd get us a booth with some boy, always making sure he was on the inside so he couldn't slip out and go behind the domino hall to sneak a chew of tobacco. Lucille Alsbrook would take our orders and somehow manage to put up with all our giggling and ice chunking.

Brown's Vegetable Place used to be our Tip Top and the memories from there are too many to write.

Walking down the streets the other day, I could almost see Newt Bryson cutting hair where his barber shop us-

ed to be and as I ambled on down, there seemed to be the faintest smell of hot popcorn coming from the old movie theater.

I suppose you've guessed by now that I'm sentimental and I suppose I really am, but perhaps it's also that I've finally reached the age when I can look back and really appreciate those elders that graced my life.

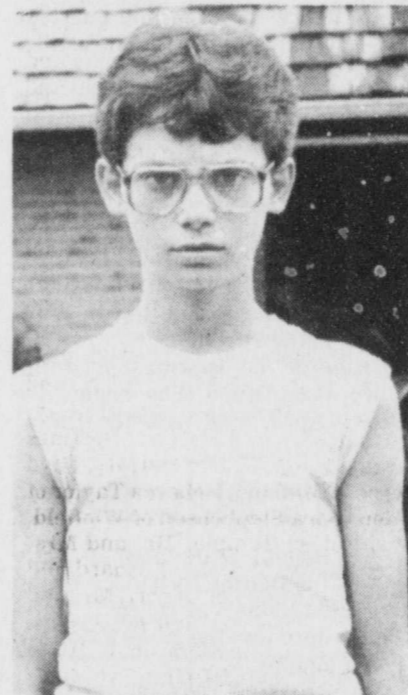

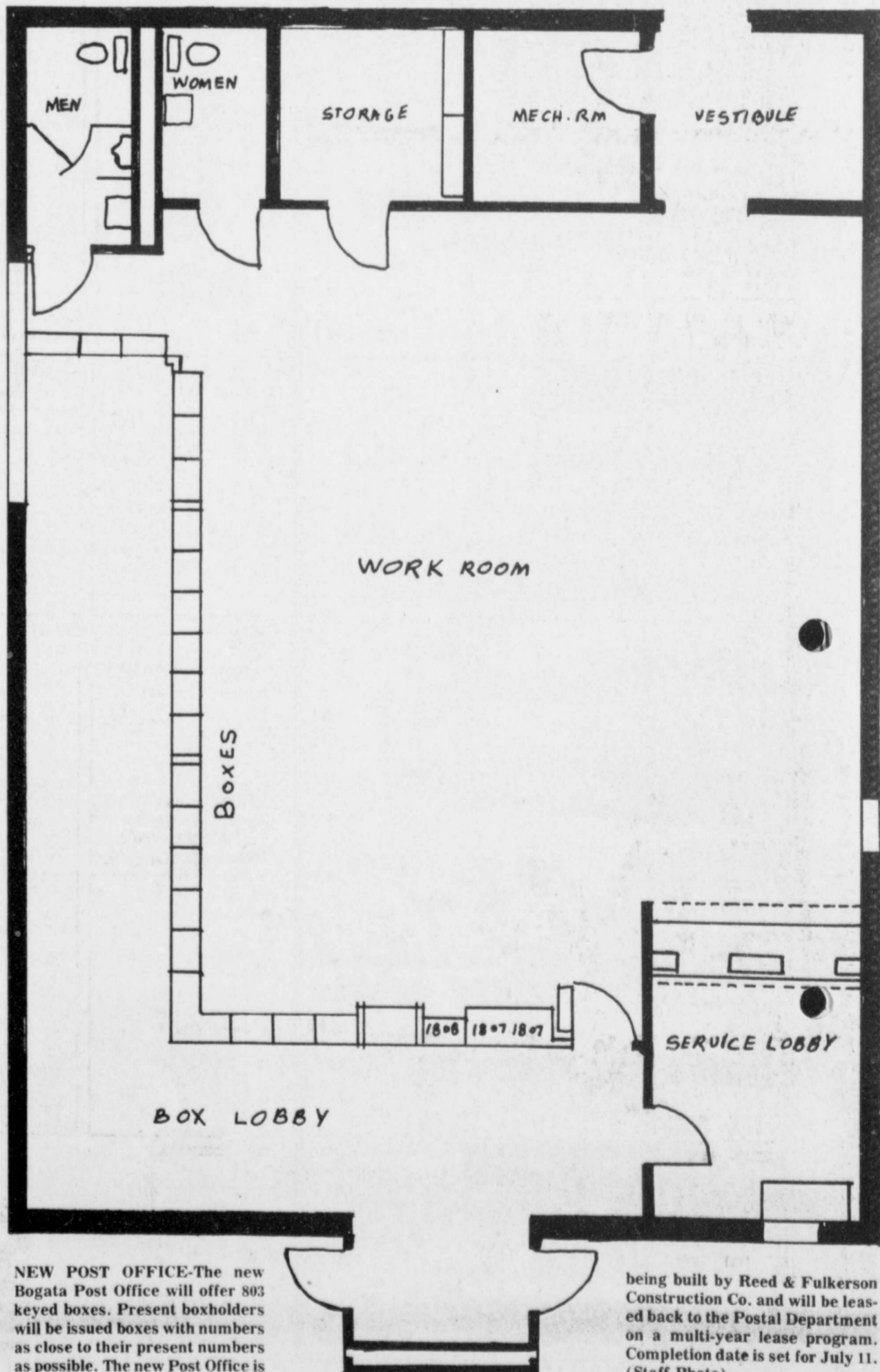

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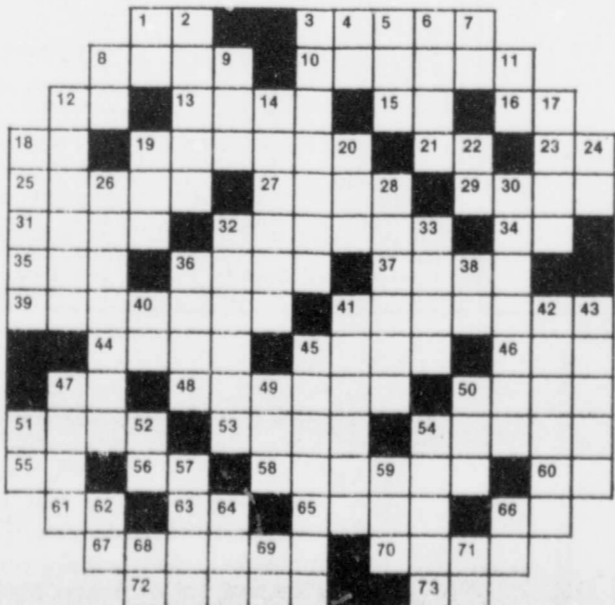

Weed Control Spraying Going On

Many producers are currently spraying for weed control in their pastures. Most weeds are rather large, so it will take more chemical to do a good job of weed control, according to Dr. Sim A. Reeves, Jr., agronomist.

If the weed has already seeded out, Reeves says there is no need to try to kill it, except for looks. The seeds have already been produced for next year's weed crop and the damage is done. The lesson to be learned is to apply control measures earlier to prevent seed development.

When applying herbicides, make sure the sprayer is accurately calibrated for dispensing the proper amount of chemical. Too much chemical costs extra money and does not improve contro. Too little chemical does not give control and the spraying expense is wasted.

Since most producers have gotten the first cutting of hay, they need to examine where and how round bales will be stored. Stored improperly, as much as 20 to 40 percent loss can be experienced. Ideally, store the hay in a barn or shed. The next best place is to store the hay on gravel or pallets

to break contact with the soil. Always store hay on an area with excellent drainage.

Middle Class Hit Hardest

Economic recessions have more likely to cause havoc in the lives of members in the middle class than in those of the rich or poor.

The unemployment rate appears to act as a barometer for the middle third of the population: The higher the rate climbs, the more probability of experiencing such negative life events as mortgage foreclosure, job lay-off, or car repossession.

Members of the lower class are vulnerable to negative events regardless of the unemployment rate. And those in the upper class have fewer undesirable events whether the rate is up or down. In fact, they tend to prosper even more when times are bad.

Ryegrass Should Be Cut Now

By Herb Brevard

To get the best quality hay, producers should cut ryegrass before the seed fully matures, recommends Dr. Sim A. Reeves, agronomist. Once the seed matures, ryegrass makes poor quality hay.

There is more ryegrass in hay meadows this year than normal. If a producer has lots of ryegrass in his meadows, he should cut it early and

get a high quality mixture of ryegrass and coastal hay. Producers should also get the ryegrass infested meadows cut to prevent interference with regrowth for the next cutting.

Reeves says that cutting meadows now will remove weeds and thus the next cutting will be better quality and purer. Many weeds harvested now are relatively high quality and livestock will readily eat them in hay.

Since the spring started, dry, producers should assess their forage needs. If, after recent rains, excess forage is being produced in pastures, it can be harvested as hay to supplement production from hay meadows. This can help assure adequate hay, even if dry weather occurs during the summer. Reeves suggests trying to cut all the hay early, thus insuring enough hay to carry cattle through the winter.

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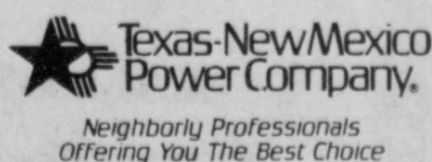



- 1 (3-lb.) fryer chicken, cut up
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch

Drain pineapple well, reserving juice. Combine juice with catsup, brown sugar, lemon juice and peel. Arrange chicken in a shallow casserole dish. Pour sauce over and marinate 3 hours or overnight in refrigerator. Arrange chicken on a grill or broiler 4 inches from heat. Grill 20 minutes on each side, or until done. Combine marinade, pineapple and cornstarch in a saucepan. Cook, stirring, until sauce boils and thickens. Baste chicken with sauce 2 to 3 minutes before done. Pass sauce to serve over chicken. Serves 4.
