

Title Of Proposed Federal Building Site Cleared Radio Operator Held In Los Angeles Closet Murder

Battered Body Of Mrs. Patty Found Hanging On Hook

Murder Complaint Is Filed Against William Tallman In Connection With Apartment House Murder

Denies Charges

Suspicion Is Reflected On Radio Operator By Husband Of Victim Who Knew Of Wife's Friends

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 4.—(AP)—The battered body of Mrs. Virginia Patty, 28, formerly a wife of a wealthy Portland, Ore. broker, was found hanging from a hook in a clothes closet of a Union street apartment house today.

The discovery was made by Mrs. M. W. Wilson, owner of the house, who went to the room rented by "C. Johnson" of San Francisco, late today aboard the steamship Admiral Benson.

Police tonight issued a formal murder complaint against William Tallman, radio operator, who was said by acquaintances of Mrs. Patty to have been her friend.

Tallman, who was seen boarding the vessel at San Pedro, Cal., told newspapermen he knew nothing about the case.

Suspicion was cast on Tallman by Frank E. Peitz, the victim's husband, who with his attorney, Clarence M. Booth, had been talking by long distance telephone with Vivian Brennan, secretary to the manager of the Mark Hopkins hotel in San Francisco when he described an "intimate friend" of his wife.

When informed Mrs. Patty was missing, Peitz said, Mrs. Brennan told him to "look for Bill Tallman."

In Mrs. Patty's suite at an exclusive apartment hotel in the Wilshire district, her \$4,000 diamonds were found.

Coleman Said to Be Improved Tuesday

Former Local Barber Recovering In Big Spring Hospital From Attack Of Two Assaults, Sunday

(Special To The Avalanche)

BIG SPRING, June 4.—(AP)—While George S. Coleman, 37, of Lubbock is recovering at a local hospital from serious injuries sustained early Sunday morning when beaten and robbed by two men on a highway 18 miles east of this city, officers continued an investigation to retrieve \$100 which the victim claims was stolen from his person.

Sheriff Jess Slaughter and Deputy Andrew Merrick, of this city, took S. J. Covington, who with his brother, J. J. Covington, is charged with robbery with deadly weapon and with assault with intent to murder, to Coahoma Tuesday and searched for the money, on a road near that town, where the attack occurred.

Covington said it was buried near the car in which the three were riding was stopped. There was nothing to indicate that the money had been buried, officers said.

Following an X-ray examination, attendants at the hospital announced Tuesday that Coleman's skull was fractured in two places. He received other minor injuries about the body and face.

His wife and 8-year-old daughter and a sister, Mrs. John Pugh and Mr. Pugh, all of Lubbock, are at his bedside.

Slight Hope Held For J. Fred Anton

CLOVIS, N. M., June 4.—(AP)—J. Fred Anton, superintendent of the New Mexico division of the Santa Fe railroad with headquarters at Las Vegas and a former railroad official in Texas, today was fighting for his life in a hospital here after an automobile accident yesterday in which his secretary, C. F. Brady, also was injured.

Only slight hope was held for Anton's recovery.

The men were found unconscious beside their wrecked automobile last night at the foot of a steep hill.

But Poor Papa Goes To Trial

TIRANA, Albania, June 4.—(AP)—Six men were arrested today because their wives were alleged to have poured scalding oil on the heads of a choir at Del Vine, Southern Albania, while singing solemn high mass for the first time in the Albanian language instead of the Greek. An independent national church of Albania was recently created.

Since wives are immune from prosecution the six husbands will be tried by a special court from political offenses.

Eye Witnesses On Stand Tuesday In Stallworth Trial

Story of Fatal Shooting Of Mrs. Grace Morrison Is Related In Amarillo Murder Trial Hearing

AMARILLO, June 4.—Four eye witnesses to the shooting to death of Mrs. Grace Morrison here May 13 testified to the affair this afternoon as testimony got under way in the trial of Mrs. L. P. Stallworth on charges of firing the fatal shot.

Testimony started this afternoon after a jury was completed from 200 veniremen.

Mrs. Ethel Roper, operator of a rooming house where Mrs. Morrison lived, temporarily testified that Stallworth had come to her home to visit Mrs. Morrison. Mrs. Roper said Mrs. Morrison received a telephone call from Stallworth immediately before she left the house, a few minutes before the shooting.

Eye Witnesses Takes Stand

Kyle Brumley, an eye witness to the shooting, said Stallworth introduced him to Mrs. Morrison a short time before she was killed.

Another witness testified Mrs. E. M. Stallworth, mother-in-law of the woman on trial, was holding Mrs. Morrison until within an instant before the shooting started. He said he saw the first shot fired while standing in the door of the hotel, and that Mrs. Morrison never did leave her balance from the time she allegedly was shown away from the older woman until the younger Mrs. Stallworth opened fire.

Other witnesses testified Mrs. E. M. Stallworth and Mrs. Morrison sufficed immediately before the shots were fired.

Sheriff Testifies In Goerner Murder Trial

CALDWELL, June 4.—(AP)—Ed Goerner on a night in April, 1927, several hours after his wife had been shot to death at her husband's county home, told Sheriff Woody Townsend that she "had high blood pressure and whoever killed her didn't beat her out of much time anyway."

Payment of War Debt Settled By New Compromise

Original Demand of Allies For \$125,000,000,000 Is Scaled Down To Nine Billion Dollar Mark

Controversy Ends

Reduction of German Debt Is Direct Consequence Of Celebrated Locarno Pact Signed In 1925

(By Associated Press)

PARIS, June 4.—Ten years of controversy over the payment by Germany of reparations for damages caused during the World War to the allies ended today in a compromise.

From a formidable total of \$125,000,000,000 claimed in the original allied demands filled with the peace conference at Versailles in 1919, the new settlement agreed upon today scales down what Germany must pay to approximately \$9,000,000,000.

Is Drastic Reduction

This sum is between a third and a fourth of the \$33,000,000,000 fixed by the reparations commission in 1923.

The reduction is almost a direct consequence of the celebrated Locarno pact, signed in 1925, which set going the idea of conciliation between the former enemies of the World War.

Out of the final settlement, the European associates of the United States in the war will get enough from Germany to pay their war debts to the United States with a portion of their outlay for reconstruction.

France, who is the biggest reparations creditor and the biggest war debtor, will receive enough to pay

Mail Order Bride Given Life Term On Murder Count

Mrs. Eva Rablen Sentenced, Admits Slaying Of Husband; Has Mentality Of 10-Year-Old Child

(By Associated Press)

SONORA, Cal., June 4.—Mrs. Eva Rablen who today pleaded guilty to the murder of her husband, Carroll Rablen, at Tuttle town, April 27, was this afternoon sentenced to life imprisonment in San Quentin prison with no recommendation for parole.

The court asserted the only reason the death penalty was not imposed was because of the testimony of an alienist that the woman had the mentality of a ten-year-old child.

When Judge Warren pronounced the life sentence to San Quentin prison, the only indication given by the defendant that she heard was the clenching of her hands.

Senate Argues All Day On Public Utilities

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, June 4.—While the senate argued all day on whether the public utilities bill should be referred to the committee on state affairs, or to the committee on civil jurisdiction, the house hustled the Snelgrove-Graves \$5,000,000 rural school aid bill through to final passage today.

A sample of the bitterness that proposed regulation of public utilities under provisions of the bill by Senator Walter C. Woodward of Coleman will provoke, was evidenced in the heated debate.

Sensors Woodward, T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, Walter Woodul of Houston and other proponents of the governor's proposal, battled with Senators A. J. Wirtz of Seguin, J. W. Stevenson of Victoria, Tom Deberry of Bogota and others who insisted that it would be a reflection to send the bill to a committee other than the one on state affairs which had handled it heretofore.

Parrish Presides

Senator Pink L. Parrish of Lubbock, presiding in the absence of Lieut. Gov. Barlow, finally decided to refer to the civil jurisdiction committee.

A vote had not been taken on a motion by Senator Stevenson to withdraw it from the civil jurisdiction committee and send it to the state affairs committee when a quorum was broken. The senate had refused to table the Stevenson motion, 9 to 10 with four pairs.

In asking that the bill go to the civil jurisdiction committee of which he is chairman, Senator Woodward said he proposed to use every means at his command to see that the bill is not choked to death; this time. He charged that

Leaders Of Congress Promise Support Of Plan To Give Half Billion To Stabilize Farming

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—Assurance was given by responsible leaders in congress today that they would support a recommendation to make a half billion dollars available for the stabilization of agriculture as soon as the farm relief bill becomes a law.

Considerable interest was manifested at the capitol in the immediate reaction to this information on the Chicago grain market, where wheat closed buoyant at the day's top point, 3 7/8 to 6 1/8 cents per bushel higher than yesterday's finish.

Farm Bill In Process

The farm bill now in the process of final adjustment by the conference committee composed of senate and house members, "authorizes" an appropriation of \$500,000,000, but does not appropriate the sum. It is customary for legislation to be so worded and upon its enactment the White House sends up an estimate of how much ought to be made available.

LOS ANGELES, June 4.—(AP)—Six thousand Shriners, garbed in all the colors of the rainbow, surged through sunlit streets today in a majestic parade to the coliseum to open their fifty-fifth annual convention.

In columns extended thirty blocks the funmakers of Free Masonry, with banners flying, thrilled the throngs of spectators who banked the avenue of march, ten rows deep.

A modern Arabia in all its glory had been transplanted into the heart of this southern California metropolis, and the

thousands who came to watch roared the visitors a stirring welcome.

Leading it as grand marshal was General Robert Wankowski of Al Malakhi Temple, Los Angeles, followed by his escorts of Nobles in decorated automobiles.

A score of bands played weird oriental tunes and modern marches.

In the midst of the parade members of the Imperial Council, governing body of the Shrine, rode behind Imperial Potentate Frank C. Jones of Houston, Texas, Master of the 75,000 Shriners here.

CHICAGO, June 4.—(AP)—Eddie Johnson, a Chicago newspaper photographer, recalls when Col. Charles A. Lindbergh was interested in the efforts of a camera man to make his picture.

Lindbergh, then a "mister," had jumped overboard from an air mail plane when fog blinded him. He landed near Ottawa, Ill. When a picture was taken of the proceedings, Johnson said Lindbergh remarked:

Mount Vesuvius Bursts Into New Violent Eruption

Gigantic Wave of Lava Is Sent Into "Valley of Hell"; Natives Fleeing, Panic-Stricken

(By Associated Press)

NAPLES, June 4.—Mount Vesuvius burst into a new and more violent eruption tonight after a brief period when the disturbance seemed to have come to an end. For an hour the eruption came sent a gigantic wave of lava into "the Valley of Hell" and shot a barrage of red hot stones high into the air over the crater.

A number of tourists who had ventured dangerously close were sent scurrying for safety, but no injuries were reported.

Previous to the unexpected eruption the volcano poured out columns of smoke three miles high and belched great stone masses weighing more than 100 pounds. The grand crater filled with lava.

Two Walls Fought Out

Two walls of molten lava six feet high streamed from Vesuvius toward its ancient prey Pompeii early tonight.

The inhabitants had evacuated Barre and Port of Terzigno and fled panic-stricken, burdened by their household and personal effects. The glowing liquid rock tonight was only a few yards from the abandoned homes in Barre and destruction of the village seemed inevitable.

The eruption began yesterday. Predictions of experts that it would gradually wear itself out without causing serious damage were contradicted this morning by a sudden bursting forth of the molten mass at the tremendous velocity of ten feet a second. The eruption cone was broken and the smoking stream poured through the "Valley of Hell." It then divided into two branches, one making directly for the gulf in the direction of Boscorease and the other bearing down on the towns along the railroad skirting the eastern base of the volcano.

Bid Is Received

Postmaster John Vaughan Bids \$1 for Corner Of Courthouse Square For Postoffice Building

What is thought to be a conclusive gesture toward removing revisionary claims from the title of the designated federal building site, south-east portion of the Lubbock county courthouse square, took form here Tuesday when F. E. Wheelock, one of the original owners of the property, executed a quit claim deed to the property, contingent upon fulfillment of contract on part of several business men of the city who have negotiated for clarifying the title.

Meanwhile, John L. Vaughan placed a bid of \$1 for the property before County Judge Robert H. Bean, who acted as special commissioner for the Commissioners Court, complying with the ruling of Judge Clark M. Mullican, of the 99th district court. Mr. Vaughan's was the only bid made for the property.

Contract Not Named

Mr. Wheelock, in an interview with the Morning Avalanche last night, declined to reveal the contract between himself and business men interested in the proposal. The ground of men seeking to clear the title are property owners and men who operate businesses near the site proposed. It is understood that an unnamed consideration has been agreed upon in obtaining Mr. Wheelock's execution of a quit claim deed, which is now in the vault at the First National bank.

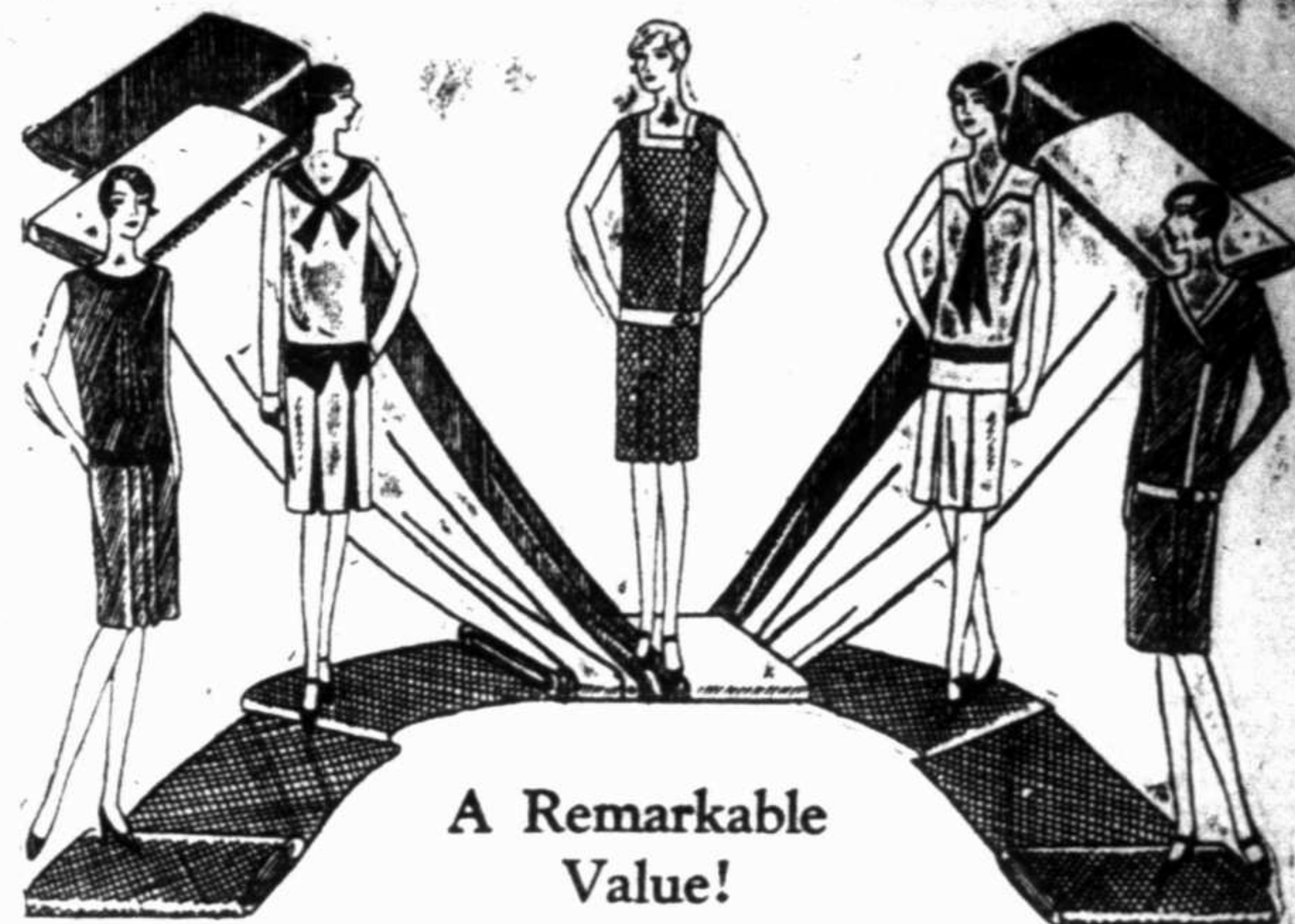

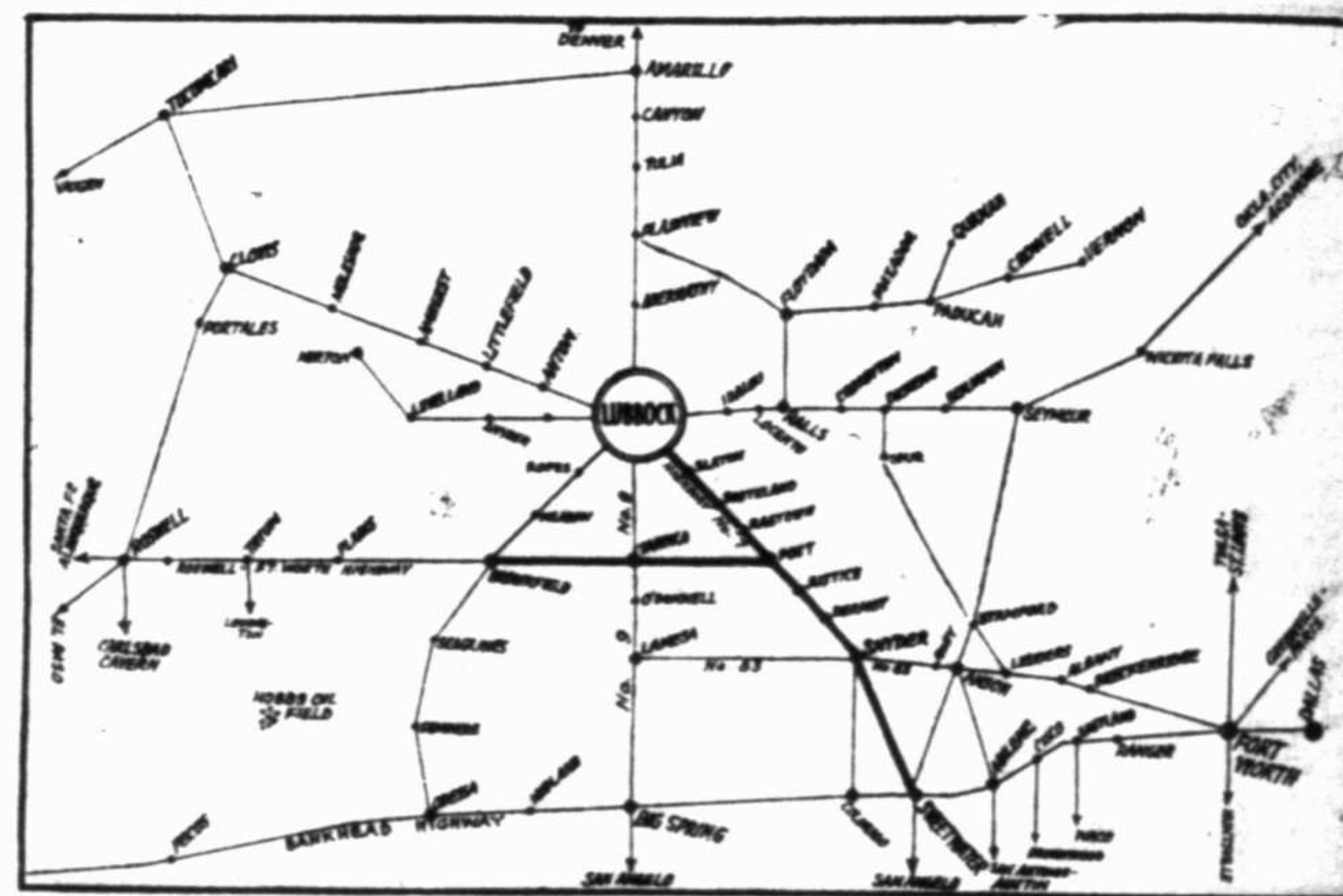

Chicago Cubs Take Battle Of Home Runs From Giants



MAY BE INTERESTING

Claude Bracey, the Dixie flyer from Rice Institute, will find a fast field lined up against him when he defends his 110 and 220-yard dash record performances of 1928 at the national collegiate meet in Chicago Friday and Saturday of this week. Sprinters who have equalled or broken the world records in the dashes this season will be on hand to match their speed with the Rice sensation.

Outstanding among the challengers to Bracey's supremacy will be Cy Leland, former Lubbock high school star who has come into prominence during the past season as the main cog in the Texas Christian University track team. Leland is the only man that has ever defeated Bracey, having won the Rice flash in the 220 at the Conference meet in Dallas recently. Bracey forged ahead at the finish to take the 190 from Leland.

Bracey will be forced to outfoot such exceptional sprinters as Eddie Tolan, Michigan negro flash; George Simpson, Ohio State; Jack Elder, Notre Dame, conqueror of Percy Williams of Canada; and Foster of Washington. Big Leo Baldwin of Texas University will be the sole Longhorn representative at the national classic. The former Wichita Falls high school star is rated as one of the best weight men in the nation. He is likewise a hurdler of no mean ability.

WHO WILL IT BE?

Since it is no longer a matter of speculation that Uncle Will Robinson is to be replaced as manager of the Brooklyn Nationals, the chief problem in the naming of his successor, The veteran pilot himself favored Max Carey as his successor but Dave Bancroft has been chosen for another personal ambition and wrecked the plans of Robinson. Since a manager cannot be chosen from the players, Robinson has picked Wade Killefer, now leading the Mission (Coast) team. It was also hinted that Dan Howley might be given the job, since Phil Ball had sought to rid the Browns of their present manager.

The miserable showing of the Cincinnati Reds this season has been the cause for another rumor to the effect that Jack Hendricks has been asked to resign from the managerial job. Coming home from a road trip recently after nine straight defeats the Redlegs were called into a meeting at which time the Red pitcher was asked to give his relations. SOME STRUGGLE

Few baseball fans realize that the leadership in the Texas League race has changed six times in the last six days, with Waco, Shreveport and Dallas alternating. Old timers who have watched the progress of the league throughout its history cannot recall such a battle at this stage of the game. As yet, no consistent pitcher has been found here. It may be necessary to send out a S. O. S. over the surrounding section before a hurler can be found to save the Hubber cause.

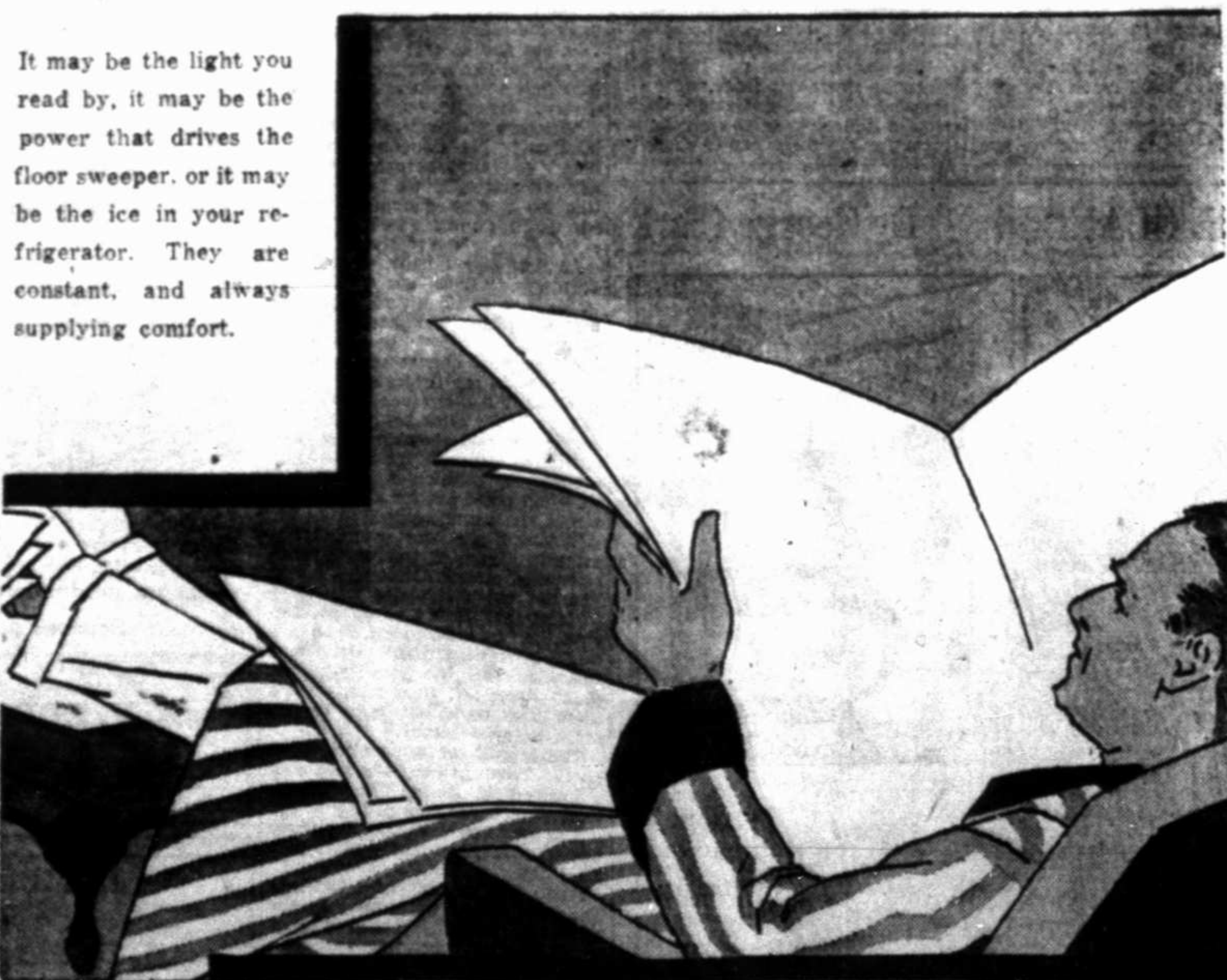

Plan To Resume Boles Drilling

Wild Cat Oil Well Test Near City Will Be Taken To Depth of 5,000 Feet, Drillers Announce

With the hole practically cleared, following about 60 days of clearing drilling is to be resumed on the Boles No. 1 well, 8 miles southwest of Lubbock, it was announced Tuesday night.

The wildcat test is now at a depth of 4,170 feet, and plans are being made to drill to a depth of 5,000 feet, if necessary, operators announce.

Tests Encouraging
Samples of the present formation encountered by the test revealed 90 per cent maroon, as tested in the laboratory of a major oil company, a formation which presents encouraging data for future operations, oil scouts announce.

The continued operations of the test are due largely to the efforts of Mike Sharp, formerly of Tulsa, who has spent two years in Lubbock on the project. Facing the hazardous and expensive task of retrieving two strings of tools, two joints of collapse pipe, and other rig paraphernalia, which went into the hole as result of trouble which might occur at any well, Mr. Sharp worked relentlessly for two months in clearing the test for further drilling.

Finance is available to extend the test to 5,000 feet, it was announced last night.

Moody Veto Seen

Anticipating Governor Moody's veto of the prison concentration bill passed by the special session, Senator Holbrook today introduced a new measure, proposing a survey by the prison board, with it reporting its findings and recommendations to a special session of the legislature to be called within 90 days of enactment of the bill. It would appropriate \$25,000 to pay expenses of the survey. The board would be empowered to pick a site for a centralized plant, subject to ratification by the legislature.

The rural aid bill passed by the house carries an appropriation also of \$1,000,000 to pay for tuition of students from sections where there are no high schools who attended high schools elsewhere.

Moody Advocates Public Utilities Regulation

AUSTIN, June 4.—(AP)—Taking the lead today, Governor Dan Moody today advocated rigid regulation of public utilities, a state income tax and a four cent gasoline tax, in an address before both houses of the 41st legislature.

His declaration for an income tax, to immediately supplement and later eliminate the ad valorem tax, brought a wave of applause from his auditors.

Should Appoint Superintendent Incidentally, he told the legislature that in his opinion the state superintendent of public instruction should be appointed, and reiterated his belief in the short ballot, with the governor, lieutenant governor, and attorney general the only elective state officers.

The bill creating a state board of education, which the governor today returned to the legislature for corrections, after its passage by the first called session, provides for election of the superintendent.

Stressed Utilities Regulation
The governor stressed the necessity of laws regulating public utilities operating within the state for the protection of consumers, asserting that present statutes in no way shielded the public from exorbitant rates, which interests desire to charge.

"I am informed that in Fort Worth the city government paid \$80,000 to prosecute a suit against the raising of gas prices, and in San Antonio an amount almost that great was expended in utility litigation," he said. "Large cities may be financially able to carry their grievances into the courts, but the price to smaller communities is prohibitive."

"The governor said that large interests were unceasing in their attempts to buy municipally-owned plants at excessive profits and that the state's anti-trust laws seemingly were out of date or had been neglected."

"A bill regulating utilities has been before the legislature for two sessions and it is now time to say whether the people shall be protected or be left to the mercy of large interests furnishing gas, electricity and other commodities," he declared.

"We of the south must never permit southern glories to be forgotten in the maelstrom of industrial strife," said the senator. "We must not allow those principles for which our fathers sacrificed to be supplanted by yielding to the commercial exigencies of the hour."

"Slavery was not the cause of the war," he said, "a bigger question was involved. The south resisted any invasion of the right of states to control their own domestic affairs as a violation of the federal compact. May I be permitted to say that the south needs a rebaptism in that principle."

Governor Gardner described the re-construction period as "one of the most glorious chapters in the history of the Anglo-Saxon race."

From Cowhand To Federal Judge

Life of Hon. James C. Wilson, Presiding Over Court Here, Is Marked by Interesting Experiences

While sailing for Paris in 1919 to discuss treaties of nations following the World War, President Woodrow Wilson signed the commission of Judge James C. Wilson, who is presiding over federal court session of the Lubbock division in this city, as a United States judge.

The commission was perhaps the last document to which President Wilson affixed his signature while on the George Washington.

Outwitting Poverty
Outwitting poverty by ingenious application to various fields of labor, Judge Wilson earned expenses through Weatherford college, borrowed money and attended Texas University, where he was graduated from the law school in 1896, and since that time he has climbed from the office of assistant county attorney of Parker county to the honorable position he now holds.

His father, Tom Wilson, elected sheriff of Palo Pinto county in 1878 was killed while in service of his office. The widowed mother of three children, left in poverty, moved to Gordon, where she operated a hotel, moving in 1882 to Mineral Wells. While in Mineral Wells, James, then in his early teens worked on a ranch, but he entered Weatherford College when 17 years old, doing chores around a home to earn expenses. After attending the college three years, he borrowed money and enrolled at Texas University.

Following graduation from the law school, he returned to Weatherford, where he was appointed assistant county attorney. In 1902 he was elected county attorney of Parker county, an office he held for three terms, following which he did general practice until 1914, when he went to Fort Worth as assistant county attorney of Tarrant county under John W. Baskin.

He was appointed United States district attorney in 1913 by President Wilson. In 1916 he was elected to congress, opposed by Oscar Calhoun. Opposed by Judge James W. Swain, of Fort Worth, he was re-elected in 1918. His first appointment as United States judge was for a vacation period, but when President Wilson returned from Paris congress, he re-appointed Judge Wilson, and the appointment was later confirmed by the senate. He has held the office ten years.

While living in Weatherford, Judge Wilson was elected three times as chairman of the democratic executive committee of Parker county.

first heard in the 58-year-old farmer's trial for the slaying of his wife. Goerner has denied the charge, maintaining that he was in a corn field at work at the time the shooting occurred.

The purse later was found in the attic of the house by a newspaper reporter.

Townsend testified the house had been pillaged, that effects from dressers and a trunk littered the floor and that "the robbery job looked overdone."

Goerner had said, the sheriff testified, that a tramp wearing tennis shoes had been around the place three weeks before the slaying and that on the day it occurred Goerner said he had found tennis shoe tracks away from the house. The sheriff said he traced these tracks and found they circled back to the Goerner home. A pair of shoes found in the house, he said, fitted the tracks.

Jury Completed

In Ray Trial

CORPUS, June 4.—(AP)—The jury to try R. Ray Adams on charges of slaying Ollie Matthews, Dallas banker, at Dallas last November over an election bet, was completed and sworn in today.

Each juror was quizzed as to his religion and church affiliations. Five said they were not churchgoers. Three were Baptists or attended that church; one was a Methodist, and three did not give church affiliations. Only one of the 12 was unmarried.

One of the jurors was unemployed and four were farmers. Occupations of the other seven were given as follows: Automobile mechanics, laborer, carpenter, contractor, oil well driller, automobile salesman and house mover.
