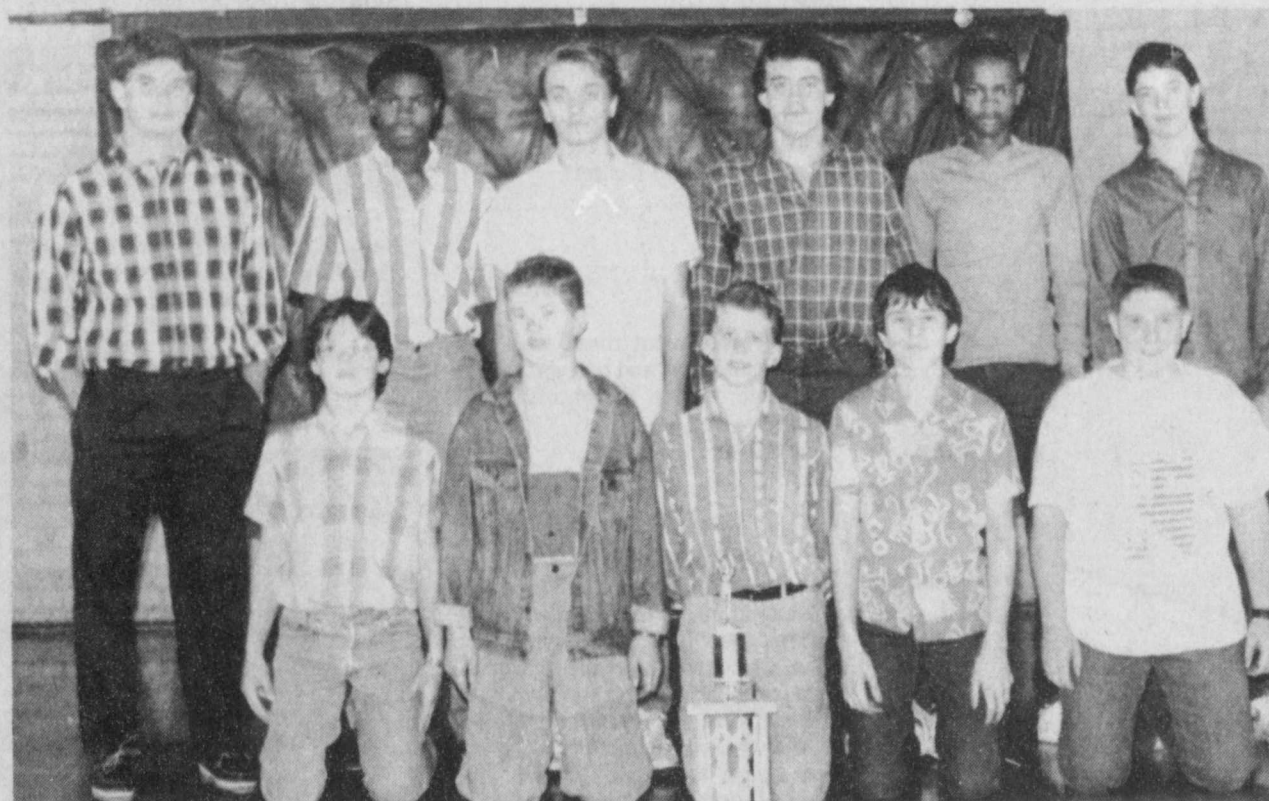

Talco PTO Meets With Large Crowd

On Tuesday, January 26, the Talco PTO met for a lengthy meeting. There was a large membership present with one new member paying her dues. Mrs. Rita McKinney has just moved to the community and is welcomed to Talco.

Secretary, Ms. Rhonda Taylor was not present due to illness in her family therefore the preceding meeting minutes were not read. The first business taken care of was that the PTO will furnish both the junior high and elementary Christmas queens with \$25.00 for expenses to be used on the decoration for their car. This is to be repeated each year and will be given before the parade.

Discussion about purchasing new Texas and United States flags was tabled when it was discovered that the school does have a new flag. They just haven't been displayed.

A vote was taken and passed setting aside \$750.00 to be used for an eighth

grade banquet. It has become a tradition for the PTO to sponsor a banquet each year for their eighth grade students and their parents. As long as the PTO has the funds each year, this will be done.

Discussion on taking bids for a covered walkway was postponed when the PTO was informed this should be paid for with school funds. Several years ago the PTO had a covered walkway installed and a delivery truck ripped part of the structure down. Since that time the school has not had one and the children are getting on and off buses in the rain. Something needs to be done about this problem. If school funds are not available, the PTO may still vote to have something built. This will be discussed further at the next meeting.

Discussion of possibly remodeling the school auditorium was dropped when a school employee said this problem should be taken care of this

summer when the school is scheduled to have work done on the building.

Fourteen teachers are to receive \$150.00 to use for needed supplies such as listening devices, dictionaries, globes, storage carts and other miscellaneous supplies needed. The VHS tapes the school has been using were stolen in a break-in. The PTO voted to use \$50.00 purchasing blank tapes to replace those stolen.

Apparently a few teachers do not have enough state approved text books for each student to have one. It was voted that Tammie Case would find out how many books were short and the cost and the money would be furnished to purchase the additional books.

Estimates are to be presented at the next meeting for a vacuum cleaner and wooden playground equipment.

Discussion of the PTO helping to finance field trips in the future became lengthy and was stopped

Dimple Reservoir Suit Ends

The lawsuit challenging the legality of last September's Dimple Reservoir bond election, has been dropped, and an Austin judge is likely to sign an order later this month preventing any future court tests, according to attorneys involved in the case.

Attorney Jim Dick Lovett of Clarksville stated "Basically, this means that litigation is final. Because of time limitations, no one can ever file against the validity of the board or district again."

Red River County voters last fall approved, by only 300 votes, \$7.2 million in bonds for construction of the 1,800-acre lake. The suit, filed in October of last year, had charged that the election was illegal and asked that it be voided.

The end of litigation came after the suit was moved to an Austin court and consolidated with a suit for declaratory judgement filed by Lovett, the attorney representing the Red River County Water District.

The Red River County Water District board wasted little time approving a bid of \$48,850 from Horizon Environmental Service, Inc. as the district's environmental consultants. Horizon will assist the district in environmental studies required under the permitting phase of the lake planning.

The board was also informed that representatives of the Fish and Wildlife Department, the Army Corps of Engineers, State Water Board and other licensing agencies would meet with the board on February 2 and would tour the site of the proposed lake.

"We are trying to combine two of the permitting phases, the dam permit and the Corps of Engineers' 404 form, to avoid duplication of testimony and bypass some of the problems associated with the lengthy process," said board President, James Vaughan.

The district must obtain a state water permit before final design and construction can begin. The process should take between six months and a year, according to Vaughan.

The Dimple Reservoir bond election capped a summer of water woes for many Red River County residents, as well as serving the city of Clarksville failed. Water for the city's residents was a scarce commodity for much of the summer.

The new lake, according to officials, should insure ample supplies in the future and a new water treatment plant scheduled to go on-line in Clarksville by spring should mean ample supplies for next summer. Water for the plant will be taken from Langford Lake north of the city.

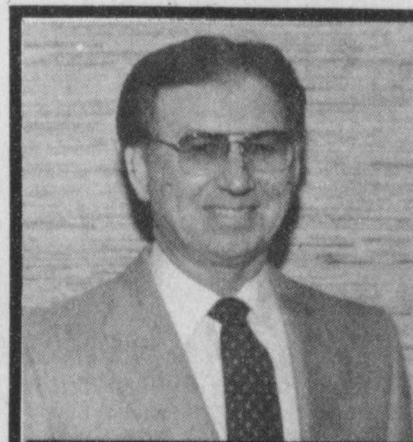

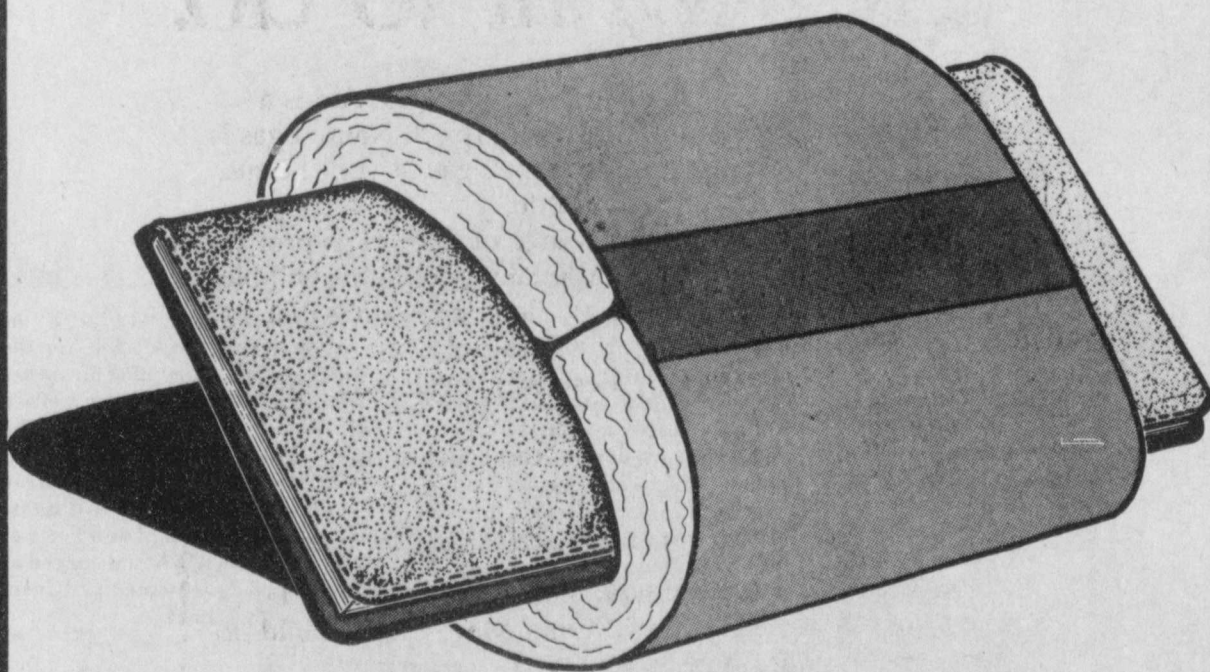

Embarrassed Parents Get Last Laugh

A couple of years ago, a friend of mine became quite disturbed at her son because he was embarrassed to be seen anywhere with her and her husband. I told her this was a phase that all teenagers went through and it would soon pass. Later, as I reflected on our conversation, I came to the conclusion that this period of time in a child's life was good for them. After all, we parents go through the first ten years of our children's lives being embarrassed by some of their actions and the things they say.

The saying "From the mouths of babes comes the truth", may be true, but the saying "The truth never hurts" is not always true. I've heard many mothers tell of their moments of embarrassment when their child received a gift from someone and, upon opening the gift in the donor's presence, proclaimed their dislike of it. Nothing's any more embarrassing than to have your child tell an afternoon visitor that as soon as they go home the family is going to eat.

Speaking to a group of parents, a school teacher once said that if the parents wouldn't believe all that their child came home telling them about the teacher, he wouldn't believe all the child came to school telling about the parents. I remember the summer that a kindergarten class was held in the Johnstown school building. Mable Hale picked the Bogata children up in the morning and took them to the class. She was reported as saying that by the time she arrived at the school, she knew which parents had fought the night before, whose dad had drunk beer, and much more family information.

Of course, adults must keep in mind that these little minds are innocent and simply do not think in adult terms. In fact, it's amazing sometimes to see the results of a child's thoughts.

My parents tell the story of how my three older sisters figured out a way to get lots of presents for Christmas one year when they were young girls. Our grandfather Roach had several rent houses near our home. There was no one living in one of these houses at this particular time. The girls were playing near the house just a few days before Christmas.

One of the girls, (none of them would admit which one) had the bright idea that if they could fix the house up as though someone lived there, Santa Claus would leave toys and they could go pick them up on Christmas day and have them for themselves. The walls were papered with the kind of wallpaper that was used in those days and for some reason, the girls thought the rooms would look better without it.

So, they began the task of ripping the paper from the wooden plank walls. Being the little tykes that they were, they were unable to reach the paper next to the ceiling, but they managed to rip it off about halfway up the wall. They swept the rooms and placed some old pieces of fur-

niture that had been left by previous renters. They left the house quite confident that it looked occupied and fully expecting gifts to be left there on Christmas Eve night. However, my grandfather happened to drop in before Santa and discovered the costly paper torn in shreds on the walls. Instinctively, he went straight to our Dad in a rage. Needless to say, our Dad was horrified that his children would do such a thing.

Many years later, our Dad got to experience how our grandfather felt that day when our daughter and my brother's son decided to redecorate the inside of a trailer house he used as rent property. They found some spray paint and used it to bright up the walls, the refrigerator and everything else in the trailer.

My husband's mother tells of a time when Mike and his brothers nearly scared a salesman to death by bringing their pet possum into the house and telling him it was a rat. Needless to say, the salesman left before he made his sale. (Somehow, I have the feeling that these minds weren't too innocent.)

A couple of weeks ago, our daughter and son-in-law brought us the glad tidings that we were to be grandparents. I couldn't help but smile as I thought about all the embarrassing moments they will go through. All those "truthful" little remarks she made at the most inopportune times are about to come home to roost and as a grandmother, I'm going to love every minute of it.

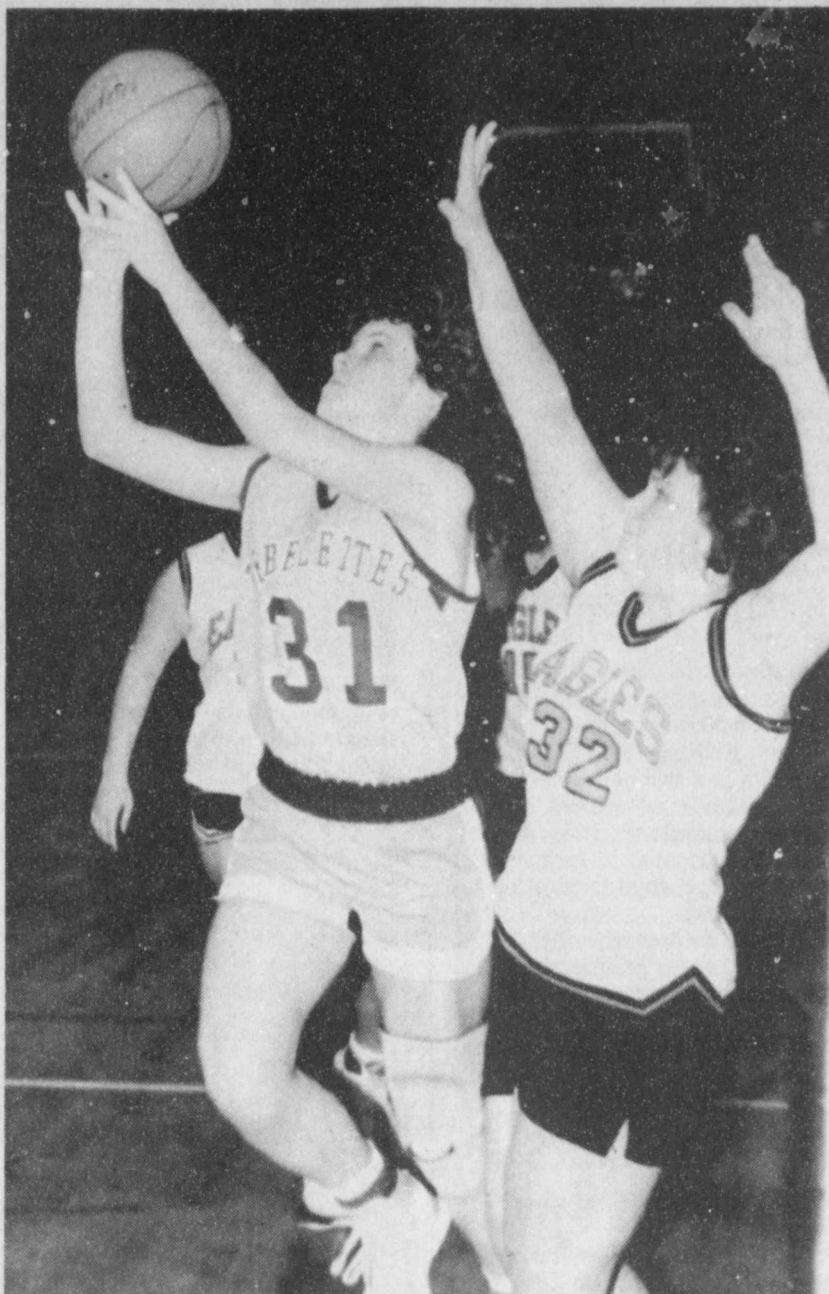
