Briscoe County Takes Cash Prize At Amarillo Tri-State Exposition

Briscoe County took ninth place at the Tri-State Exposition in the agricultural exhibits winning a cash prize of \$75.00.

This is considered very good since this is only the second year that an exhibit has been sent and competition was very keen against the more experienced counties. There was a decided improvement over the exhibit of last year.

The first prize went to Hartley County, the second to Randall and we understand Hale county got fourth place. Several counties failed to reach the exposition with their exhibits on account of the rains.

The Briscoe county exhibit attracted much attention and was one of the few to show both cotton and corn together with the smaller grains. The exhibit was complete in every detail and the arrangement especially attractive. Attractive folders boosting Briscoe County were given out to interested visitors, at the booth.

The booth was arranged by Prof. W. M. Gourley assisted by C. J. Witherspoon, Chester Skeen and Mr. Todd. June Simpson and Claude Turner left Thursday afternoon for Amarillo with the exhibit. It was there until early on account of the muddy roads.

Mr. Gourley stated that he was marked down on the cotton on account of it being short staple and that he did not have as good canned fruit as it is possible for him to obtain—also the lack of uniformity in the corn. He expects to rectify this feature before taking the exhibit to the Dallas Fair.

Silverton Gin Makes First Bale

Plains Cotton Ginned Here

The first bale of Plains cotton to be ginned in Silverton this season came very near being a tie. Which gin was to gin the first bale of plains cotton this season also came very near being a tie. One day last week a load of cotton was delivered to the Farmers Gin Company for ginning and night came on and the bale was partly ginned so they took out until morning, and when morning had come the Silverton Gin Company, had ginned a bale which came from the P. L. Hancock farm. So the first ginned bale of Plains cotton on the streets was from the P. L. Hancock farm.

The bale of cotton weighed 318 pounds and was ginned from 980 pounds of seed cotton.

T.P.&G. STATES ITS CASE IN BRIEF FILED AT CAPITAL

Washington, Sept. 29.—The brief and argument of the Texas, Panhandle and Gulf railroad, which seeks to build a line from Seymour, Texas, to Tucumcari, New Mexico, and to acquire the Gulf, Texas and Western railroad thus giving it an entrance to Ft. Worth, was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission today.

The line would traverse Baylor, Knox, King, Foard, Cottle, Motley, Hall, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro and Parmer counties in Texas and Curry and Quay counties in New Mexico.

The estimated construction cost of the new line would be \$7,177,500. The cost of equipment is estimated at \$2,000,000. It would also pay \$2,000,000 for the Gulf, Texas and Western.

The brief asserted that the new line would furnish transportation facilities for products from large areas now far removed from existing railroads, and would be a direct route for traffic originating on other railroads destined to Ft. Worth, or Fort Worth connecting line and points in the Fort Worth territory. It also would be an important route for freight destined to Southern California, the brief asserted.

What now routed north would be carried through Fort Worth, it is said. The Texas, Panhandle and Gulf and its finance corporation today also filed with the commission its objection to the construction of both the Pecos and North Texas and the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains extensions on the ground that it was not demanded or required.

The extensions of the two major systems, the brief asserted, would pass through a territory which the new line is to serve if given permission to build and that their application is prior to those of the old lines.

The Denver was accused of deliberately designing to destroy the Texas, Panhandle and Gulf's proposal.

THE Warners were very poor indeed—so poor in fact that sometimes I am afraid they had scarcely enough to eat. Worse than that, perhaps, they were refined, educated folks who would have appreciated and enjoyed comforts and beautiful things more than most of their neighbors.

George Warner had worked his way through college, had started out on a small salary and with a handicap of debt, and had never got fur. His wife had proved an invalid, but she had held on until one of the girls was through college and the second one was in high school, and then she had given up the struggle and died.

Then one calamity followed another. George had a breakdown and was confined on a small pension by the firm for which he had been working, the oldest daughter took to her bed with an incurable disease, and the burden of looking after the family fell on Mary just out of high school.

They had their house, George's pension, and the small sum that Mary could earn by going out a few hours a week to help at social functions. They were proud, and they never discussed their situation with the neighbors who, as is common in such cases, were sympathetic when they gave a moment's thought to the affairs of the Warners, but who did nothing tangible to help out matters.

Mary struggled on. She made her father as comfortable as she could, she looked after her invalid sister, and some way she got enough to keep soul and body together.

Cotton picking, has begun in earnest now on the Plains in this county. The rains being the only hinderance as all cotton of the early planting and the short staple kind has enough open to make it so that the raiser can afford to pick.

Now the next question in the farmers mind is getting his ginning done where his cotton will be put up in first class shape to bring the highest possible price and the next question is knowing that he is getting all it is worth after a gin has properly put it in the bale.

The business people of Silverton are interested as well as the gins in wanting to know that the cotton brings all the market will afford, for if it did not not, the farmer will go where it does. It is an assured fact that cotton will be sold by the farmer on the streets here this year at a price in keeping with the best buying points in Texas.

In fact, it is known that there will be buyers here on the ground that are buying to ship direct to the biggest Mills as well as direct to the exporter, thus making our market the same as that of points such as Memphis, Plainview, Childress, Clarendon or other points where there are good buyers. There will also be lively competition as there will be more than one buyer.

Another feature in our market for this year will be that it will be hauled to the railroad cheaper than has been the case in past years.

The town has ginning facilities that will put the cotton up in the bale in such a way that no buyer can complain about the ginning. Both of our gins have not stopped short of equipping their gins up to the best possible efficiency.

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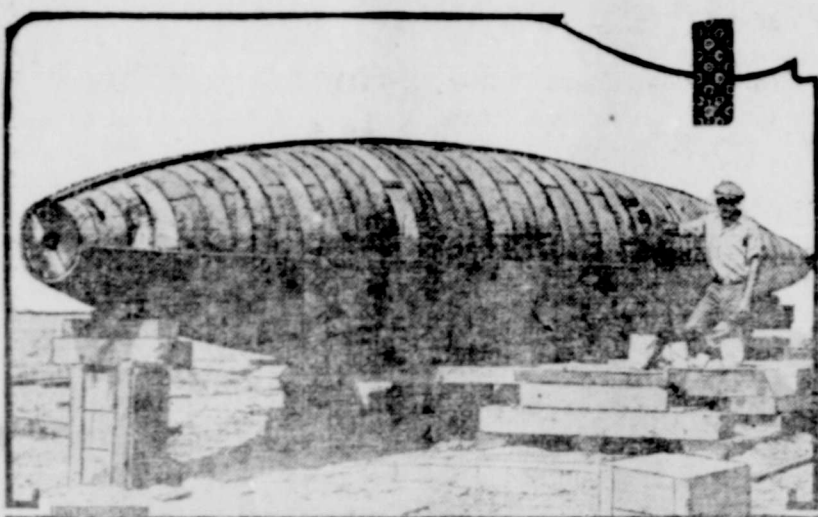

George Warner gave up and died, and the neighbors waked up. They were eager to do what they could; they were overflowing with sympathy for the young girl who had carried the burdens of the family for so long.

There were flowers at the funeral—roses and chrysanthemums and carnations, and Mrs. Burton sent a huge wreath of violets and orchids. The plain little house was full of them, and George had had few flowers during his lifetime.

"Wouldn't it have been a lot better," Jordan said to me as we were walking back home after the service, "if George could have had a little more attention before he died and a little less after? The money spent on those flowers would have brought him a lot of comfort while he was alive."

"We don't think, I suppose," I answered, "we send our flowers pretty generally after a man is dead."

We can't do much for our friends and neighbors any of us, after they are dead. If we have any kind words to utter, any help to give, any flowers to send, it is a good deal better to get the thing done while the people concerned are alive. After they are dead it doesn't matter much to any one.

SWEATERS Cont. from last week Childs Crochet Sweater

You will need 2 balls of tan and 1 ball of red Shetland floss and a No. 8 steel crochet-hook.

You should work 7 double crochets to an inch, and each double crochet should be $\frac{3}{4}$ inch high, working with shetland floss and a No. 8 hook, to insure the correct size.

Band—With red, chain 87 sts. for 4-year size.(Ch. 8 sts. more

for each size larger and 8 sts. less for each size smaller.) Skip 3 sts. next the hook, 1 d.c. into each remaining st., of chain (3 ch., turn 1 d.c. into each st. of previous row) Repeat between parentheses until work measures two inches. The entire sweater is worked in double crochet.

Body—Change to tan and continue to work until work measures 11 inches, measuring from first long chain.

Sleeves—Ch. 75. (Ch. 7 sts. more for each size larger and 7 sts. less for each size smaller.) Break yarn, join yarn at opposite end, ch. 77. (ch. 7 sts. more for each size larger and 7 sts. less for each size smaller.)

Turn. Continue to work until edge of sleeve measures 3 inches. (Work 1 row more for each size larger and 1 row less for each size smaller.)

Neck—Work over 105 sts. (Work over 11 more sts. for each size larger and 11 sts. less for each size smaller.) Do not work over remaining sts., turn, continue to work on these sts. for 2 rows. Chain 20 sts. at the neck edge of the next row.

Continue to work until edge of sleeve measures 6 inches.(Work 2 rows more for each size larger and 2 rows less for each size smaller.) Do not work over sleeve sts. Continue to work until straight edge at center front measures 5 inches. Break yarn.

Work other side in same manner, leaving 25 sts. for the neck.

When second side is complete work across all stitches.

Continue to work until underarm measures 8 inches.(Make it 1 inch more for each size larger and 1 inch less for each size smaller) In the next row work an opening for pocket as follows: Work over 17 sts., chain 18., skip 18 sts. of previous row, work over remaining sts.

Continue to work across front until underarm measures same as underarm of back, working band at lower edge in same manner.

Pocket—With red yarn work 1 d.c. into each st. on lower edge of opening for pocket. With tan work 1 d.c. into each st. on upper edge of opening for pocket (3 ch., turn, 1 d.c. into each st. of previous row). Repeat parentheses until strip measures 4 inches. Overcast last row of tan to red band on pocket. Fold the strip in half and overcast sides.

Cuffs—With red yarn work 6 rows of d.c. along edge of sleeve. Work other cuff in same manner. Overcast underarms.

Collar—Join red at front edge of neck and work 1 d.c. into each st. around neck (3 ch., turn, 1 d.c. into each st. of previous row) Repeat parentheses until collar measures 3 inches.

Border—Ch. 12, skip 3 sts. next hook, 1 d.c. into each remaining st. (3 ch., turn, 1 d.c. into each st. of previous row.) Repeat parentheses until work measures 5 inches. Overcast to right of front opening of sweater. Work three buttonhole loops $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches apart along edge, sew a button opposite each button loop.

Boyles, and 53 other persons praying that an election be ordered to be held at Quitaque, Texas, to determine whether or not a 2-3 majority of the property tax paying voters residing within the hereinafter described territory and voting at said election desire the creation of a road district for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turn pikes or in aid thereof. Said proposed road district to be voted on is to be composed of the following described territory, to-wit: Beginning at point in the S. line of Briscoe County, Texas, where said County line crosses the W. line of Section 102, Blk. G. M.; thence N. about $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles to the N.W. corner of section 119, Cert. No. 3-401; thence N. 5 miles to the N.W. corner of section 136, Cert. No. 4-601; thence E. 2 miles to the S. W. corner of section 59, Cert. 152; thence N. 1 mile to the N. W. corner of said section No. 59; thence E. about 2 miles to the S.E. corner of the Q. E. Brown preemption; thence N. to the N. E. corner of said Q. E. Brown preemption; thence E. $\frac{1}{2}$ to the S. E. corner of the J. W. Boehmes preemption; thence N. to the N. W. corner of section 63, Blk. E-2 Cert. 154, thence E. with section lines to the S.E. corner of section 38, school file 2724; thence N. about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile to the S.W. corner of section 30 of the Leon Blum Blk. W. thence E. about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile to the county line of Briscoe County; thence S. with the E. county line to point where said county line crosses the N. section line of section 67 Cert. No. 2-896; thence W. to the E. line of section 60, Cert. 2-892; Thence N.

to the S.E. corner of section No. 59, Cert. No. 2-892; Thence W. 1 mile to the S. W. corner of said section No. 59; thence S. to the S.E. corner of section No. 53, Cert. No. 2-889; thence W. 1 mile to the S.W. corner of said section thence N. about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile to the S. E. corner of section No. 44, Cert. No. 2-884; thence W. 2 miles to the S.W. corner of section 41, Cert. No. 2-883; thence S. to the S.E. corner of section No. 31, Blk. No. 3 T. & P. Ry, thence W. $\frac{1}{2}$ mile; thence S. passing through the middle of sections No. 32, 33 and 34, to the S. line of Briscoe County; thence W. with the S. line of Briscoe county Texas, to a place of beginning. It appearing to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property tax paying voters of said territory and that said petition is in all respects duly and legally prepared and presented to this court in accordance with the acts of the 39 legislature of the State of Texas, as shown in chapter 133 of said acts, same being Senate bill No. 314. It is therefore considered ordered, adjudged and decreed by the court that an election be held at Quitaque, Texas, within said described territory on Oct. 19th, 1925, which is not less than 3 days from date of this order to determine whether or not a 2-3 majority of the property tax paying voters within the above described territory and voting at said election desire the creation of a road district for the purpose of constructing, maintaining, operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turn-pikes or in aid thereof.

Notices of said election shall be given by publication in a newspaper published within the County of Briscoe, it appearing to the court that there is no newspaper now being operated or published within said and above defined district. Said notices to be published for four weeks prior to

said election and said notices shall be posted in at least three public places within the territory to be affected, such posting to be for three successive weeks prior to such election. Such election shall be held in the town of Quitaque, Texas, and P. O. Woods is hereby appointed presiding judge of said election, and Floyd Tiffin and D. E. Monk are appointed clerks of said election. The manner of holding such an election except as above, and hereinafter otherwise directed shall be governed by the general laws of this State, and returns of said election will be made as provided by laws for the making of returns of elections to determine whether or not County bonds shall be issued and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of said above defined district shall be allowed to vote and those desiring the creation of the proposed new district shall have written or printed on their ballots "For the proposed New Road District", and those opposing shall have written or printed on their ballots "Against the Proposed New District." A copy of this order signed by the County Judge of Briscoe County, Texas, and attested by the County Clerk of said county shall serve as the proper notice of said election, and the County Judge is hereby directed to cause said notice to be published in a newspaper published in Briscoe County there being none published within the above described territory and said County Judge is further directed to cause said notice to be published for four successive weeks preceding said election and is to cause to be posted a notice thereof at three public places in said above described territory said notice to be posted for three weeks prior to said election.
