POLITICS HERE WARMING UP AS MEETINGS SET

DEMOCRATS AND GOP CONVENTIONS TO BE HELD ON MAY 8

With the entire nation on the verge of its greatest political fight, Lubbock county party leaders are now turning their attention toward the precinct and county conventions and the part that the county will play in the coming state conventions.

Both the Democratic and Republican county chairmen announced the dates of their conventions today and began preparations for the holding of the various precinct meetings.

The delegate question, whether they shall go instructed or uninstructed will be the major discussion of the meetings, officials indicated today.

Republicans Meet May 8
The Republican county convention of Lubbock county will be held in the county court room in the court house at 3 o'clock on Tuesday, May 8. Dr. I. E. Barr, Republican county chairman, announced today. Prior to this date on Saturday, May 5, the precinct conventions of the county will be held which are to send delegates to the county meeting.

Two delegates and two alternates to the Republican state convention which meets in Dallas May 22, will be elected in the county convention. Republican precinct chairmen, as announced by Dr. Barr today are: Election number 1, J. E. Kelly; Election number 2, G. A. Guthrie; Election number 3, W. Tucker; Election number 4, J. W. Javis; Election number 5, L. D. Rankin; Election number 6, B. Brothers.

The precinct meeting for Lubbock number 4 will be held Saturday, May 5, in the office of the Lubbock National bank.

The Republican county executive committee of Lubbock will meet at 10 a. m. May 8 in the court house, John L. Vaughan, secretary announced.

Demos' Plans Given
In a like manner, Frank E. Wheeler, Democratic county chairman, announced the meeting of the county convention for his party which will also be held Tuesday, May 8, in the district court room.

The precinct meetings will be held at assigned points on Saturday, May 5.

CALLES DRAWS CRITICISM IN FUNERAL TALK

CONDITIONS RAPID IN ORATION OVER BODY OF ARCHBISHOP

SAN ANTONIO, April 24.—Picturing conditions in Mexico as comparable to those in Judea at the time of Pontius Pilate or in Rome at the time of Nero, Archbishop Arthur J. Drossaerts of San Antonio denounced the Mexican government today in his funeral oration over the body of Archbishop Jose Maria Y. Delrio, exiled head of the Mexican Catholic church who died here Sunday.

Archbishop Drossaerts compared the scene in San Fernando cathedral, where requiem mass for the dead leader was sung, to the scene at Calvary and the Calles government to Pontius Pilate and Nero.

Mexico Resurrection
"The day will come," he predicted, "his voice trembling," when stricken Mexico will enjoy its resurrection from this day. The martyrdom of its highest religious leader, his grace of Mexico City, will hasten that day. Let us pray that it will not be long. Let us hope that soon his countrymen will come to remove his earthly remains that he may rest in his native land and not in alien soil."

The orator referred to conditions in Rome at the time of the persecution of Christians as examples of conditions in Mexico.

It was the same when Nero burned Rome and attributed his crime to the Christians," his grace said. "Calles has said that there is

NEAR MILLION IS RECEIVED IN DEALS, HE SAYS

STANDARD OIL MAN IS GLAD TO TELL OF TRANSACTIONS

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, agreed today to answer any question the senate oil committee could ask him. Replying to a direct question by Senator Walsh of Montana, Stewart said he accepted \$759,500 of the Continental Trading company bonds.

Instead, he said, a trust fund was created for the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing company and the Standard Oil company of Indiana, each to receive one half of the securities.

Last Saturday, however, he told the committee, the directors of his company were consulted and it was decided the fund should be turned over to Sinclair Purchasing company, in which the Standard has a large interest.

Pressed By Committee
Stewart was pressed hard by the committee after his initial statements. Senator Walsh, offering treasury witnesses to show that some of the Continental bond coupons were in his account in a Chicago bank. The oil man would not agree that this had been proved.

The witness agreed that the bond transaction between himself and Oiler was not of the "usual" kind. On several occasions, he said, Oiler had given him securities, which finally totaled the amount he mentioned to the committee. This was done, he declared, despite the fact that he told Oiler he did not want to share in the profits of the Continental.

The Continental was formed to buy oil from the Humphreys interests of Denver for \$1.50 a barrel. It sold the oil to Sinclair and Stewart companies for \$1.75. Stewart, Harry F. Sinclair, H. M. Blackmer and James E. O'Neil were mentioned as guarantors of the Continental's contract. Blackmer and O'Neil are in Europe and have refused to return here to testify in the oil cases.

Now Under Indictment
Stewart is now under indictment Stewart's questions on a former occasion. Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, said the oil man had purged himself of contempt so far as the senate was concerned, but that the indictment still stood.

At the end of his testimony, Stewart insisted on replying to the queries which he had turned a deaf ear to on the former occasion. He could not recall ever having discussed the transactions with Sinclair and knew nothing about the bonds except those about which he had testified.

Should Stewart lose his appeal from the decision of the District of Columbia supreme court here holding him for the senate he will be immediately liberated by the senate sergeant-at-arms.

15 Escape Death In Cisco Fire Today
EASTLAND, April 24.—Fifteen persons in a farmhouse southwest of Cisco, escaped severe injuries at daybreak today when a fire destroyed the home of Jim Marchman, farmer.

The fire was only a quarter of a mile from the R. N. Jackson home where 15 days ago an entire family of eight was slain and the house burned. The fire today was believed to be of incendiary origin, and Ranger Captain Tom Hickman is investigating.

Charles Jackson, brother of R. N. Marchman's family was visiting the Marchman's at the time of the fire.

Revision To 210 Million In House Tax Reduction Plan Is Approved

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Revision downward of the house \$290,000,000 tax reduction bill to \$210,000,000 was decided upon today by the Republican majority of the senate finance committee.

The \$210,000,000 program was laid before the committee by Chairman Smoot on behalf of the Republicans who have a majority of 11 to 9 on the committee. The Democrats, who are urging a \$300,000,000 reduction, took it under consideration and another meeting will be held Thursday, when the majority group expects to revise the bill as proposed today.

The Republican program follows: Reduction of the corporation tax from 13 1/2 to 12 1/2 per cent, loss in revenue \$82,000,000.

Repeal of the estate tax, loss, \$7,000,000.

Revision of the surtax rates on incomes between \$18,000 and \$70,000 loss, \$25,000,000.

Increase in the exemption allowed corporations from \$2,000 to \$3,000 loss, \$12,000,000.

Increase in the exemption under the admission tax from 75 cents to \$3 loss, \$17,000,000.

Repeal of the taxes on wine and cereal beverages, loss, \$1,120,000.

BREMEN REPAIRED FOR CONTINUED FLIGHT IN NEW YORK HOP
LAKE STE AGNES, Que. April 24 (By The Canadian Press).—A report received by the Canadian Transcontinental Airways here, this morning said the Bremen and the Ford plane were storm bound at Gravelly Island.

The message received by Robert Cannon of the company said that snow was falling and a strong north east wind blowing at the tiny island where the trans-Atlantic plane made a forced landing ten days ago.

The Bremen was said to have been put in readiness for continuing its flight to New York with the parts carried to Gravelly Island yesterday by the Ford plane.

May Hop Wednesday
Indications today were that the Bremen might reach Mitchell Field N. Y. late tomorrow night or early Thursday.

Advices from Gravelly Island shortly after midnight said satisfactory repairs had been made and that Captain Koehl, Baron von Huenefeld and Major Fitzmaurice would take off at dawn for the 700 mile flight here. The flight to Lake Ste. Agnes would take about eight hours.

The latest plans call for a stay overnight here with a takeoff early tomorrow for New York.

DIVORCE SUIT OF WAGGONERS CALLED TODAY

\$5,000,000 IN PROPERTY INVOLVED IN TRIAL AT FORT WORTH

FORT WORTH, Apr. 24.—Divorce suit of Mrs. Ann Valiant Waggoner against Guy L. Waggoner, involving a contest over property reputed worth more than \$5,000,000 began Tuesday before Judge Bruce Young in forty eighth district court.

The litigants are members of the two wealthiest families in the southwest.

Selection of a jury was to begin Tuesday afternoon. To enable attorneys to make minor amendments to their pleadings, Judge Young recessed court shortly before noon until 2 p. m. Both sides announced ready.

Mrs. Waggoner charges cruel treatment in her petition which makes specific allegations against her husband. Waggoner's answer denies the charges. The purport of his answer is that he is not contesting the divorce on cross-action, nor does he make any charges against his wife.

Both in Court Room
Both Mrs. Waggoner and Waggoner were in court. She sat with her father, Tom L. Burnett of Electric, who is a son of the late R. L. Burnett, millionaire cowman and oil man. Waggoner is the son of W. T. Waggoner, multi-millionaire oil man and cattleman.

The couple married September 4, 1922, and separated on December 30, 1927, according to the pleadings.

He is survived by his father, two sisters, Mrs. Mildred Blankenship of Wink and Miss Nanymae Cook of Peacock, Meyer Cook of Slaton and Carl Lawrence and Fred of this city.

CHICAGO, April 24.—Geraldine McLaughlin, age four, had a tooth pulled yesterday and the entire police department heard about it.

With the tooth out, Geraldine was bundled into the home of her father's touring car. She was crying lustily, and her father, Joseph McLaughlin, attempted to ease the pain by holding a handkerchief over her mouth.

Inquisitive bystanders, putting two and two together and getting five, came to the prompt conclusion that the girl was being kidnapped by a man who was holding her tightly with one arm and attempting with his free hand to stifle her cries for help.

Police were notified and a message to watch for the kidnaper was sent to every police station. One witness had taken the license number. When it was traced the police learned the truth.

MARINES FACE HARD TASK IN RESCUE JAUNT

TWO MINES ROBBED IN SANDINO RAID AND AMERICANS TAKEN

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, April 24.—American marines faced a hazardous and difficult task today in wresting from rebel general Augustino Sandino two American soldiers he was believed to have seized with their staffs. Fear was expressed for the safety of the captured men.

W. J. Crampton, collector of customs at Puerto Cabezas on the northeast coast, reported two mines near the headquarters of the Pis river had been robbed by rebels.

No More Information
While neither marine headquarters nor the American legation received further information from Nicaraguan sources it was believed that the La Luz, Los Angeles and Bonanza mines were seized. This belief was strengthened on receipt of a report from the Pis river that the three Americans, an Englishman and a Norwegian made prisoner.

Recent advices received here after Sandino captured the town of Sanguay on the Coco river said he was working toward the Pis river region in order to obtain food, supplies, ammunition and dynamite with which to make bombs.

Rainy Season Opens
With the rainy season beginning and making troop movements difficult, it is almost impossible to reach the Pis river mining section from the interior. There are no roads and the trails in the rainy season become almost impassable. It will be necessary to send marines up the Primapoka river in small Indian canoes known as pit-paps. These small craft are the only ones that can ascend the stream, which is full of dangerous rapids.

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Mrs. Isham Tubbs Is Critically Ill

Mrs. Isham Tubbs, pioneer citizen of Lubbock county, is seriously ill at the Tubbs farm home in the Cardale community, six miles west of Lubbock according to members of the family today.

Mrs. Tubbs has been ill for several days and her condition grew serious yesterday. A number of the children are at her bedside.

THREE KNOWN DEAD AND MUCH CROP LAND INUNDATED WHILE RIVERS CONTINUE RAPID RISE

(By the Associated Press)

DOTHAN, Ala., Apr. 24.—Loss estimated at more than \$2,000,000 in Houston county alone from heavy rains and the loss of three lives near Whatley, as well as extensive damage through this part of the state and western Florida was reported today.

Near Whatley a tornado destroyed several houses including that of Rass David, a negro, killing three members of his family and leaving him pinned beneath the wreckage. Dothan and Madrid were isolated by rail and highway as a result of swollen waters washing out highways and damaging tracks.

Reports from Columbia on the Chattahoochee river said that the property damage there was heavy from a cloud burst and that in addition to loss to railroad, tracks and bridges that the Southeastern Power company's dams had been destroyed. Cotton and other crops were said to have been literally washed out in the lowlands throughout the flooded areas and at places the wind accompanying the rain had blown the proportions of a tornado.

Man-Found Dead

BRECKENRIDGE.—The body of an unidentified man about 35 years of age was found by a camper today near the Bankhead highway two miles east of Breckenridge. Several buckshot were in the body. Another camper was arrested. The dead man was red-headed and wore a coat and had purchased at Chickasha, Okla. The word "Beets" was written inside a coat sleeve.

Plane Kills Two

DETROIT.—Gordon A. Taylor, 25, of the Taylor Aircraft corporation, Rochester, N. Y. pilot, and Aaron Rosenblitt, of New York City, a passenger, were killed this afternoon at the Ford airport when a plane Taylor was demonstrating went into a nose dive at an altitude of about 1,000 feet and crashed to the ground.

Aged Man Dies

RICHMOND, Va.—Col. Moses M. Greenwood 94, of New Orleans, St. Louis and Richmond, said to be next to the oldest living graduate of Yale University, died here today at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. R. D. Hancher. He was a fraternity brother and close friend of the late Chauncey M. Depew.

Rotary Session

HARLINGEN.—A resolution endorsing the proposal of the Houston club seeking better care of persons of unsound mind in Texas was among those adopted at the forty-seventh district convention of Rotary here today just before the delegates adjourned for a tour of the valley. Arthur B. Mahew of Uvalde, newly nominated governor, was introduced at the morning session.

Probers Shocked

WASHINGTON.—The senate's cotton slump investigating committee got a shock today when Lloyd S. Tenny, chief of the department of agricultural statistics group which issued the cotton price trend statement of September 15, last, around the effect of which the inquiry largely turned, said that the statement had little or no effect "on the general trend of cotton prices." Tenny said the "sagging line" of cotton price fluctuations, from September 8, 1927, up to the present time "would have been approximately the same if we had never issued our September 15 statement at all."

Money Refused

AUSTIN.—Four hundred dollars of the \$1,000 figuring in the F. A. Dale bribery trial was donated Tuesday by State Ranger Captain Frank Hamer to the Austin First Christian church, after the First Methodist church had taken the portion and returned it on second thought.

Held In Slaying

AUSTIN.—A special dispatch to the Austin Statesman from Fredericksburg Tuesday said that a man is being held there by Sheriff A. Klaerner in connection with the shooting of Deputy Sheriff William Pape at a dance hall early Sunday, and that Pape now has some chance for recovery. No results of the investigation were disclosed.

CONDITION OF FLIER GRAVE

BENNETT IS CRITICALLY ILL IN QUEBEC, OF OBAR PNEUMONIA

QUEBEC.—Noted American aviator who is seriously ill with lobar pneumonia, today was waging a battle for life.

This condition was described as very grave in a bulletin issued at the Jeffrey Hale hospital. Meanwhile, his wife, who hurried to his husband's bedside, also was under medical care, suffering a bad attack of bronchitis.

Stricken Last Friday
Bennett, who gained world wide fame in 1926 when he flew over the North Pole as pilot for Commander Richard E. Byrd, was stricken after an arrival at Murray Bay last Friday as pilot of Ford relief plane for the stranded German fliers at Gravelly Island. He had left a sick bed in Detroit to make the trip.

Commander Byrd, who had solicited Bennett as his second in command for his Antarctic expedition, left his home in Boston for Quebec last night.

Lindy Takes Serum For Use In Case

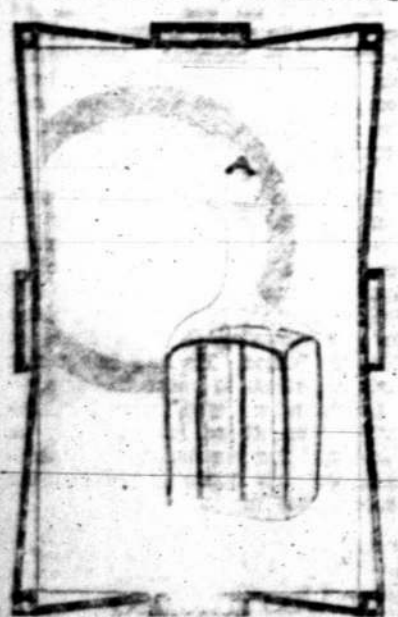

An Old Fashioned Girl Scores In Modern Art

NEW YORK, April 24.—"Lillian is so uninterested in everything," the principal of an exclusive girls' school in New York complained to a mother seven years ago.

"She just sits and dreams or draws pictures all over the books she is supposed to study. She doesn't in the least apply herself to her lessons."

The culprit in the case, a sensitive little 14-year-old girl with expressive big black eyes, stubbornly set her lips and waited until the principal departed. Then she burst out rebelliously:

"When I grow up I shall do nothing all day long but paint and paint with gorgeous color. I wish I were grown up right now—or dead!"

Off to Europe—alone

"If you feel that way about it, Lillian, you shall quit school right now to paint," said the child's understanding father and mother.

And so Lillian Gaertner sailed for Europe that very summer, alone. The little girl who "wasn't interested in anything" proved so original and facile with her brushes that she was admitted to the Academy of Art in Vienna when she still was 14—the youngest person ever so honored.

Now Lillian Gaertner, just turning 21, has another honor to add to her long list of credits abroad and during her past two years, here she has been chosen to design modernistic rugs and carpets to complete modernistic rooms of contemporary furniture—the first American woman to be selected for this new field of work.

Paints Theater Murals

Miss Gaertner is best known for her theater work. She painted the 24,000 square feet of colorful mural for the Ziegfeld theater, designed the stage settings and costumes for such notable Broadway productions as "Much Ado About Nothing," "The Straw Hat," "The Viennese Review" and others.

Right now she is putting in a 12-hour day doing a series of charming juvenile screens, vivid, fascinating pictures of Joan of Arc, the Crusades, some of the early English invasions and other historic tales that delight children. Indefatigable, this young woman paints with a passion for work that is astounding.

"There are only two excuses for a woman's having a career," she amazed one by saying if she can be induced to quit painting long enough to chat a while in that pleasant studio of hers overlooking the Hudson.

Should Heed Talent

"First, if a woman has any talent, large or small, that drives her, she will be happier if she heeds it. Second, if she must support herself, she often can find real joy in working, and I think she should make a career of it. Otherwise I think all women are happier and better fitted to be decorative social creatures and home makers. Men really are suited to the work; they seem constructed to slave and enjoy it."

"You see, I really am not a modern," she says this strikingly young woman with unruffled lips and unpainted cheeks. "It is curious how primitive and its very simplicity has much in common with the verities of the sophisticated modern. But I have never in all my years of painting, drawn from life. All of my figures are imaginative, from the childish illustrations I drew in Grimm's Fairy Tales, on."

True, she is not one of the flapper about this young woman. Night clubs have no appeal for her. She pronounces New York's hectic rush after amusement "tiring and futile." With her European background, she likes the opera, classical plays, social evenings where interesting folks talk of their interesting work.

Though she has never read a novel clear through and cannot abide modern poetry, Miss Gaertner is a book collector of no mean ability—concentrating on biographies, books of historic moment, travel.

Expert Equestrienne

Almost any morning, if one is up shortly after dawn, might spy Miss Gaertner riding along the balustrade path accompanied by Baldu, her Austrian dog. The little figure in smart equestrian dress is a most military manner, for she learned to ride in a cavalry school in Vienna.

There is even an old fashioned streak of the domestic in this young artist.

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MATADORS WIN DUAL MEET IN EASY FASHION

AMASS BIG COUNT TO BEAT SIMMONS HERE IN MONDAY MEET

The Texas Tech Matadors scored a count of 89 to 42 over the Simmons University Cowboys here yesterday afternoon in a track and field dual meet. The Bullfighters proved too superior in dash events and took an early lead in the meet.

Of the nine places in the three dash events, 100, 220, and 440 yard contests, the Toreadors grabbed off eight of the nine places.

Only four first places of the fifteen events went to the visitors; they were: the discus throw, pole vault, 880 yard run, and 440 yard dash.

Fisher High Point Man Leon Fisher, Matador pacer, was high point man of the meet scoring a total of 16 1-4 points by taking first places in the 220 low hurdles, javelin throw, and broad jump, and was a member of the Tech relay team that defeated the Cowboys by a long lead.

Red Rollins, Seminole lad, was the dark horse of the afternoon. Rollins crossed the finish line of the two mile run in 11 minutes 32 seconds to win the endurance contest. Through constant work and training Rollins achieved the distinction he has desired in the two months of work—that of winning a two mile run.

WILKINS AND EIELSON
MAKING SELVES AT
HOME IN STATION

GREEN HARBOR, Spitzbergen.
April 24.—Three days in the warmth of the wireless station here today had succeeded in thawing out Captain George H. Wilkins after the frigid experiences he and his copilot, Carl B. Eielson, had on their trip here from Point Barrow, Alaska, especially the five days they were marooned on Dead Man's Island.

The fliers said that when they landed on Dead Man's island they did not know just where they were as their maps of the Spitzbergen district were very primitive. This island is said to be very well known by Norwegian explorers and is about twelve and a half miles long running east and west.

Snow Storm Rages.
During their stay on Dead Man's island a snow storm raged and it was bitter cold. The airmen were forced to keep inside their plane.

On arriving at Green Harbor the first thing Wilkins and Eielson did was to cover the airplane with a double canvas cover to avert fast refrigeration. This had to be done in extreme cold and without gloves.

Captain Wilkins is making himself perfectly at home and becoming more talkative. He is walking about in trousers of reindeer skin and seal skin boots for such outdoor exercise as he cares to take. Every morning at five he receives bunches of telegrams which he accepts smilingly and peruses, disposing of them later.

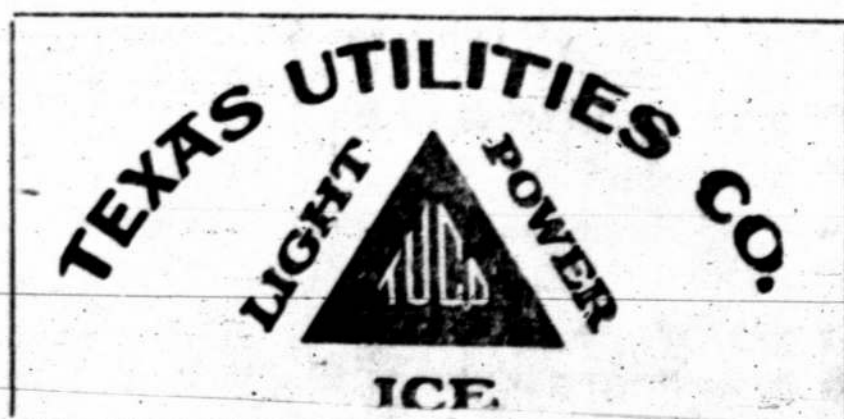

no religious persecution in Mexico. That is true. The bishops have been exiled, the priests shot down like mad dogs in the street. All has been already stamped under the iron heel of tyranny. e was a meek, a lowly man. It is ridiculous to charge that rebellion ever lived in his heart. When he said daily to hundreds "pax domini sic semper vobiscum" i know that no secret thought of rebellion ever belied his holy words.

No Room For Good Man
"Why was he exiled? There is plenty of room in Mexico for the drunkard and the gambler. Why was there no room for this good man?"

Tears streamed across the archbishop's face as he spoke and many of the Mexican exiles in the audience wept with him. Archbishop Leopoldo Ruiz of Michacan delivered an ovation in Spanish in which he gave the dead leader's history an dpraised him for his long struggle for the church during Mexico's turbulent revolutionary days. High requiem mass was sung by the dead archbishop's own cousin the Rt. Rev. Genaro Mendez, bishop of Tehuantepec and a choir of sixty seminarians from Leon, exiled with the bishop, sang during the services.

Many Turned Away
Several hundred persons who sought to attend the cathedral services were unable to crowd into the building and followed the body to San Fernando cemetery where it was taken by the seminarians and a guard of honor of fourth degree Knights of Columbus.

The aged archbishop, died here Sunday after a long illness of a year. He had recently returned from a trip to Cuba which he made in order to look after the welfare of members of his flock who fled to that country. Doctors say that the archbishop, who was 76 years old, died from old age but his friends say that the humiliation and distress caused by his exile had aged him rapidly since his deportation. His last words, repeated twice as he closed his eyes and died were, "My God, please take me soon."

mulgee river was one and a half feet above flood stage at Bacon. Moultrie reported the first rain in 30 years, while Phenix counted tornado damage. At Albany Flint river had risen five and a half feet and was approaching the 35 foot stage. At Americus utilities plants were struggling to repair damages, and the water supply at Milledgeville was menaced.

Many Alabama towns were isolated, including Andalusia and Castleberry, where three passenger trains were marooned. Milledge near Montgomery reported that the Tallapoosa had risen 15.6 feet and was surging higher. A Chattahoochee river bridge under construction at Columbus was washed away. Several hundred persons were reported driven from their homes at Brewton, when two creeks spread over the town.

All roads in southern Alabama were practically impassable while several houses were leveled by a storm between Monroeville and Peterman.

Rivers Still Rising

In Mississippi Pearl river had risen to 28.8 feet near Jackson, and was flooding low areas of the town. The Tombigbee was 26 feet and still rising at Columbus, with low-land crops ruined. Northwestern Florida and southern Alabama damage was estimated by Pensacola, Fla. authorities at around \$500,000 while from isolated Graceville, Fla. came word that roads and bridges were washed out, and crops in that territory lost to the extent of about \$200,000.

From Memphis, Tenn. 15,000 bags of sand had been shipped into eastern Arkansas for emergency work on levees. The Ouachita was threatening south Arkansas with slight inundation, while the Arkansas had flooded lowlands near Fort Smith.

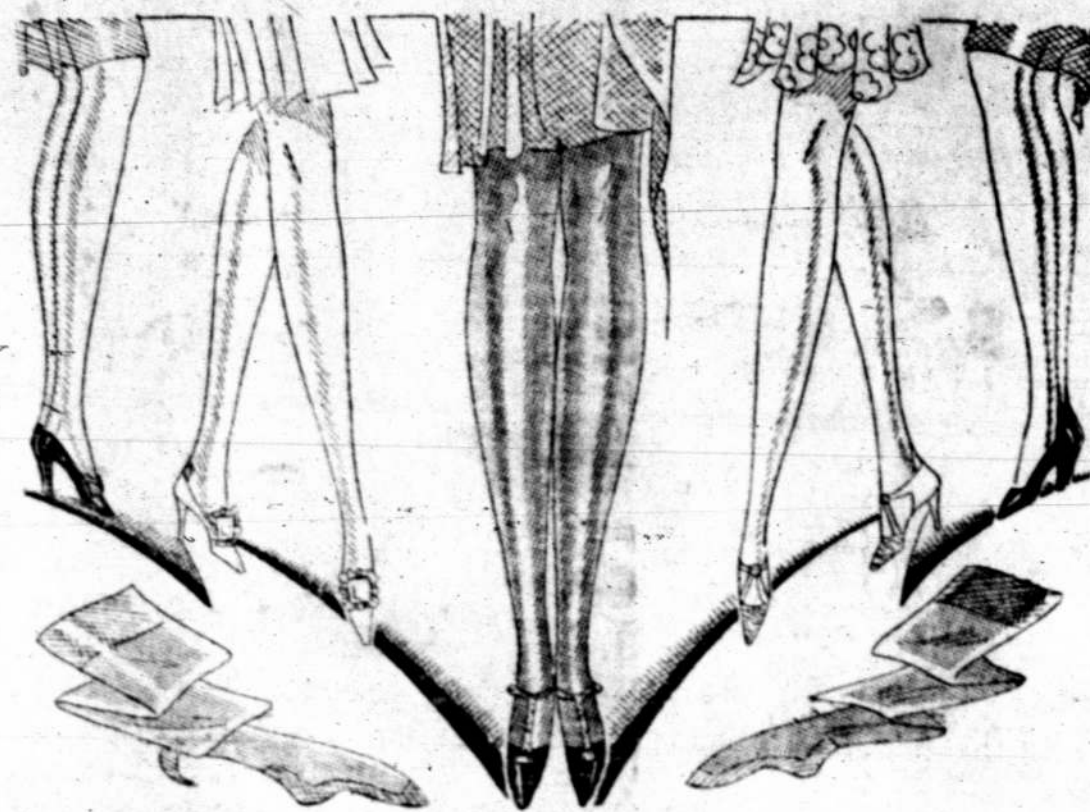

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"PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN PORTRAITS"

CHARLES G. DAWES

PERSHING HELPED PUT DAWES
IN LIMELIGHT

EDITOR'S NOTE: This, the 19th in a series of Presidential Campaign Portraits written for The Journal and NEA Service by Robert Talley, is the second of four articles discussing the career of Vice President Charles G. Dawes. The third article on Dawes will be printed tomorrow.

By ROBERT TALLEY

WASHINGTON, Apr. 24.—The story of Brig. Gen. Charles G. Dawes in the world war—where he first became a national and international figure—runs parallel in many respects to the story of General John J. Pershing, his friend of a life time.

Their friendship began in Dan Cameron's 15 cent lunch room out in Lincoln, Neb., 40 years ago when Dawes was a struggling young lawyer and Lieutenant Pershing, not out of West Point, was a military instructor at the University of

be brushed aside. Once, when in dire need of artillery horses, he finally found a number in Spain. Spanish law, however, prohibited their exportation. A neat little smuggling plot solved the difficulty.

Often Dawes negotiated single handed with whole governments. He went at their commissions hammer and tongs, casting military etiquette to the winds, bellowing his demands and largely over-awing their attempts at the tricks of diplomacy. His language was often unpolished, but usually effective.

Pershing and Dawes were frequently together, and about that time Dawes entered this in his published diary:

"I have been with General Pershing each day, taking lunch on Friday at the house, or rather the palace, where he is staying. Dear fellow and loyal friend. We have both passed through the greatest grief which can come to a man. As we rode up together there occurred an instance of telepathy which was too much for either of us.

Neither of us was saying anything, but I was thinking of my lost boy and of John's loss, and look-

braska. William Jennings Bryan, other famous resident of Lincoln, owns the picture, but soon fades.

Vice President Dawes excludes this end that in his first lawsuit. Bryan was attorney for the other side. Bryan's law firm—Talbot and Bryan—opposed him in a rate case counsel for the Missouri Pacific. Dawes says, but Talbot conducted it. Bryan remained pretty much the background.

The bond between Dawes and Pershing, when the war broke out, was deeper than friendship which ripened throughout the years: was the bond of tragedy.

It came about this way: During Pershing's absence in Mexico, fire destroyed the Pershing home and his wife and three of their four children were burned to death.

Dawes had one son—Rufus Pearing Dawes—who was making a reputation for himself at Princeton. No one was ever prouder of his boy; he ever hoped, planned or dreamed of a greater future for his child.

Then, on the threshold of manhood, Rufus Pearing Dawes was killed while bathing in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin.

The eulogy on his son that General Pershing wrote for the minister read at the funeral is a classic. It recited in a tender, sympathetic manner, the material success that his boy was winning. Dawes continued:

"My boy lived long enough to out. Whatever the years had added would be only a trial. In a man's character is real career.

He died suddenly in the midst of happiness. He died with his ideals unshaken. He died with all the noble illusions of high youth undisturbed and unshaken. He died without having ambition, with his eyes fixed on high mountains of life where, and question, had he lived he would have climbed."

Forty-one days after war was declared in 1917, Dawes left his bank in Chicago to become a lieutenant in an outfit of engineers, training near Atlanta, sent to camp in his private car, with his wife and daughter, and on his car while there.

Robert Hoover, food administrator, tried to induce Dawes to join organization and direct grain shipments in this country. But he refused: he wanted to go to France.

At this time the news got to Pershing, and Pershing promptly directed Dawes to direct the supply behind the lines in France.

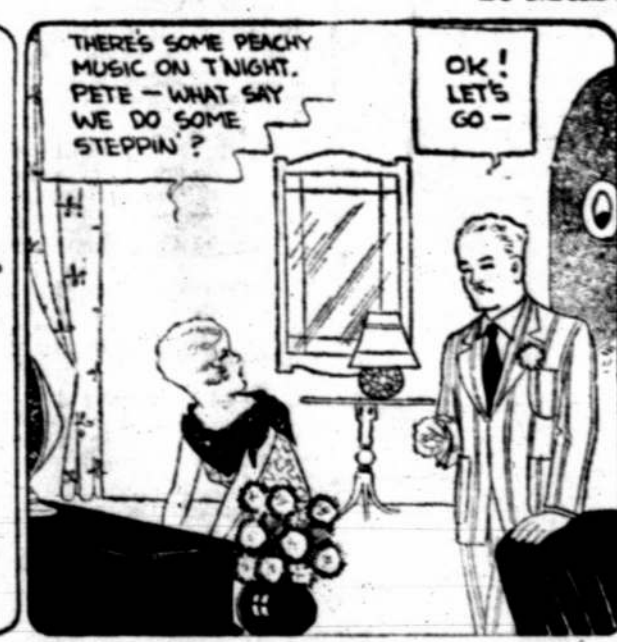
