Senator Heflin Pained At Son's Drinking-Affair

Alabama Solon Comes To
Defense Of Son Who Is
Held On Charge Of Driv-
ing Under Drug Influence

WASHINGTON, June 21. (AP)—Senator Heflin of Alabama issued a statement today in which he said he was deeply pained and grieved to learn that his son had been drinking again but reiterated that he would help him in every way he could.

Young Heflin was arrested Wednesday on a charge of driving an automobile while under the influence of drugs after his automobile hit a truck.

"I am deeply pained and grieved," Senator Heflin said, "to learn my son has been drinking again. I shall do my best to help him to see the

folly and danger of such indulgence. I have a firm faith in him and in his future. I am confident that God is going to help him become master of himself and make what he is capable of making—a good and useful man. His mother died when he was fourteen years old, and he is all that I have. God helping me, I shall continue as a father who loves his son to help him in every way that I can.

"My enemies who are willing to exploit my son in the newspapers and injure him in every way possible for the purpose of worrying and grieving me will yet see him resist the temptation and conquer the harmful forces that beset him and be what his mother prayed he would be, and what I expect him to be—a fine and useful man to his day and generation."

Search Of Liquor Boats Advocated

Attempt To Confiscate All
Fire Arms Is Given As
Means Of Combating Li-
quor Smuggling

WINDSOR, Ont., June 21. (AP)—Search of liquor boats by Canadian officials for firearms is advocated by Crown Attorney James S. Allan, as a means of combating liquor smuggling.

Allan advanced his suggestion in opposing release on bail of Alfred J. Woods, wealthy Amherstburg dock owner, arrested on a charge of receiving a camera stolen by rum runners from a newspaper photographer which they kidnaped last Tuesday.

The crown attorney pointed out liquor runners are permitted to land unmolested and unquestioned while other persons entering the country by ferry are closely scrutinized.

enforcement by the United States river patrols has weeded out the weakened rum runners," he said. "No longer do you find the old timer of the river front engaged in this remunerative pastime, instead, the gangs now at work are undoubtedly the toughest of rum runners, fellows who'll not be frightened by talk, and think it was men of this character who were responsible for Tuesday's affair at Amherstburg."

Although Woods at first was refused bail by Magistrate Smith, he later was freed under \$2,000 bail to report next Tuesday for trial.

A complete report on the gun battle Tuesday between a rum running craft and a United States patrol boat will be forwarded to Washington, announced Walter S. Petty, acting collector of customs at Detroit. Petty said his investigation showed the rum runners on being chased back toward the Windsor docks fired four shots at his men after reaching Canadian waters.

ADVENTURER SUICIDES Otto Debeney Jumps From Third Floor To Death

BRUSSELS, Belgium, June 21. (AP)—Otto Debeney, known throughout Europe as an adventurer and impersonator, ended his career today by jumping from the third floor of a small lodging house. He was dead when picked up.

Debeney passed himself at various times as a son of the late King Leopold, a son of Maurice Maeterlinck and nephew of a cardinal.

One of his most notorious stunts was to decorate an American general with the Rhine forces after the war in the name of the King of the Belgians. American troops were paraded in his honor. The fraud was not discovered for a long time.

Soil Vandalism Of Nation Told At Farm Confab

Representatives Of Eight
States Meet At College
Station In Effort To Halt
Soil Dissipation

COLLEGE STATION, June 21.—(AP)—In an effort to halt what one speaker termed "national vandalism," the dissipation of millions of acres of fertile soil through erosion, 100 representatives of Missouri, Kansas, Colorado, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Texas conferred here today on a program of national scope.

H. H. Bennett of the United States department of agriculture estimated yesterday that 17,500,000 acres of fertile land had been permanently ruined for agriculture by the dissipation of the rich top soil through floods and other natural phenomena. He said conditions made the farm lands of the United States waste from this cause faster than those of any other civilized country and said that erosion amounts to national vandalism.

The meeting said to be the first regional conference on the subject ever held, was called by T. O. Walton, president of Texas Agricultural and Mechanical college.

Little Opposition To Poincare Plan

PARIS, June 21.—(AP)—Except for the communist and socialist press, little opposition has appeared to Premier Poincare's pronouncements in favor of early ratification of the Mellon-Berenger debt agreements providing for eventual payment of the French war debts to the United States.

The premier began his speech Wednesday before the interested committees of the chamber of deputies, continued it yesterday and probably will not complete it until next week.

The chamber is anxious to ratify the agreement immediately rather than risk having to pay separately the \$400,000,000 due on the surplus war stocks purchased from America, due unless the agreement is ratified in one lump sum in August.

Lower Rate Asked From Commission

AUSTIN, June 21.—(AP)—A lower premium rate for insurance carried by municipalities on their property was asked today by a delegation that appeared before the state board of insurance commissioners.

It was contended that losses on municipally owned property are less than on privately owned holdings, and that insurance companies in some cases have exhibited a 40 per cent operating profit on premiums collected for protection of municipally owned property.

Among those appearing were: Harvey W. Draper, secretary of the League of Texas Municipalities; Mayor Ed S. McCreary, Orange; George D. Fairbairn, City Manager of Wichita Falls; Mayor O. W. Watson, Bowie; C. M. Tobin, San Antonio; and Thomas H. Ball, Houston, representing the Harris county ship channel navigation district.

Waters Searched For Pilot's Body

MONTREAL, June 21.—(AP)—The waters of the St. Lawrence river were searched today for the body of E. S. Caldwell, chief pilot for Canadian Vickers, Ltd.

Caldwell, Captain J. C. Jervis, former aide de camp to the governor general of Canada, and Dr. William D. Morris, were killed yesterday when a seaplane piloted by Caldwell struck high tension wires and plunged into the river.

The bodies of Captain Jervis and Dr. Morris were recovered.

DALLAS, June 21.—(AP)—Carroll Ledbetter, 61, was found, dead, hanging by a rope tied to a rafter at his home near here today. He had been in ill health.

23 Bills Passed By Senate Friday

AUSTIN, June 21.—(AP)—Meeting in its first after-noon session, the senate last night passed 23 bills, the majority of which were local in application, and corrected flaws in two major measures passed during the last legislative session.

Administration of the state barber bill was changed so that sanitary conditions of barber shops would come under supervision of a special board of commissioners in line with recommendations of Governor Moody. A change also was made in the caption of the nine-member board of education measure in order that it might withstand constitutional attacks.

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Ontario Police To Investigate Crime

Deputy Commissioner Under
Orders To Probe Episodes
Of Rum Runners Along
Canadian Borders

TORONTO, Ont., June 21.—(AP)—Alfred Cuddy, deputy commissioner of the Ontario provincial police, today was under orders to proceed to Windsor and make a report to A. H. Price, attorney-general, on the crime situation there as revealed by episodes in which rum-runners have been the principals.

The provincial authorities maintain that the liquor export business brings these men to the Canadian side of the river and that the Dominion government is indirectly responsible for the conditions there. They claim they have been conducting campaigns to keep the district as free as possible from the undesirable element.

Investigate Abduction
The deputy commissioner went to Windsor to investigate the abduction of the border cities star camera manland the carrying of firearms by the rum-runners while on Canadian territory. The attorney-general also wants to know more about the recent shooting episodes around Belle Isle and Amherstburg.

The attorney-general, answering criticism by a Toronto newspaper of alleged inefficiency of provincial police in dealing with the liquor situation, said:

"If the Royal Canadian mounted police are so good, why doesn't the Dominion government send some of them down to clean up this situation at Windsor? The whole rum-running question is a Dominion matter. The present situation is the responsibility of the Dominion officials."

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Details Of Rum Deaths Reported

DETROIT, June 21.—(AP)—Complete details of the shooting incident in the Detroit river Wednesday in which rum runners disabled a customs border patrol speedboat were forwarded to Washington last night by customs officials. The treasury department, which will receive the report, will turn it over to the state department in compliance with a request yesterday by Secretary of State Henry L. Stimson.

Detroit police inspectors at a meeting yesterday were enjoined to give full cooperation to federal forces in enforcement matters arising on the American side of the river.

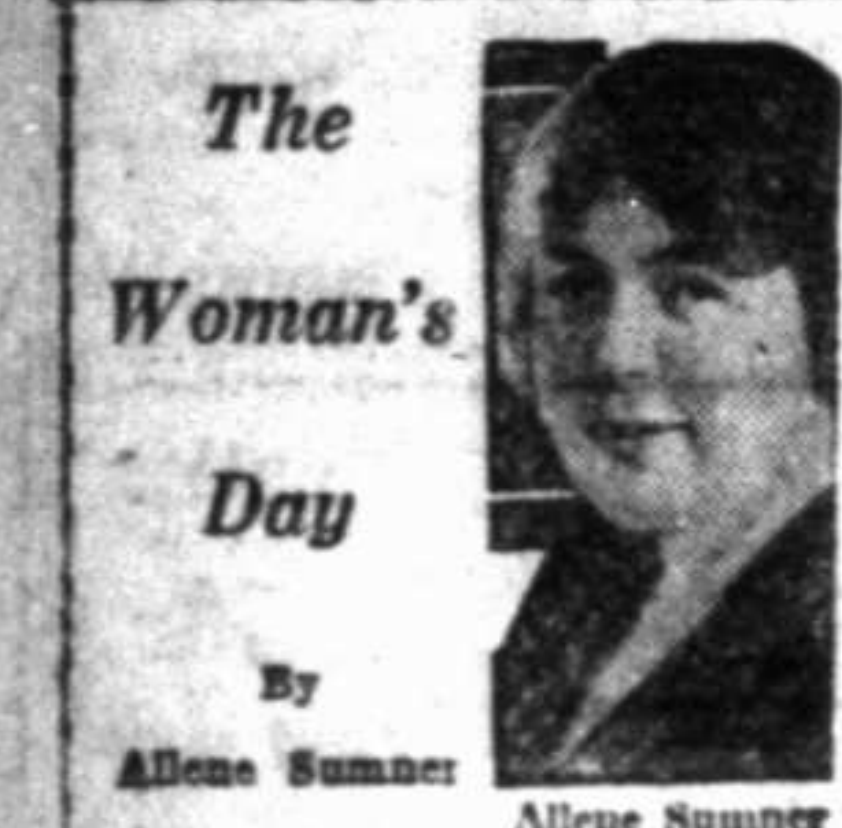
Mesdames M. C. Butler and Alvin R. Hendrick Entertain Twice With Bridge Parties During This Week

Says White House Tea Was Courtesy

Dr. I. E. Barr, Chairman Of Republican Party In County, Says Mrs. Hoover Criticized Unfairly

Dr. I. E. Barr, chairman of the Republican party of Lubbock county, Friday stated that Mrs. Hoover's position in the DePriest incident was "merely a gesture of official courtesy."

"Certainly I am opposed to any effort to establish social equality between the white and negro races," said Dr. Barr. "There is a distinct difference between the two, and no southerner could feel comfortable by accepting negroes at all social functions."

"However, I believe critics have been unfair to Mrs. Hoover. She had no intention of defying the traditions of the South. As Mr. Cragger has pointed out, invitations to these affairs are extended to the wives of all members and are based upon lists furnished by officers of the White House and senate. Names of none on the official list were omitted."

Others Entertained

"I believe records will reveal that on several similar occasions in previous years negroes have been extended courtesies in the White House. There is little reason for such a rude discussion of Mrs. Hoover's party."

"I want it understood that I would not entertain a negro in my home, and I do not believe that the DePriest incident was anything more than an official courtesy."

Leonard "Catface" Means, diminutive in size but enormous in the workings of the Lubbock darktown settlement, is firm in his disapproval of Mrs. Hoover's act in entertaining the DePriest woman, wife of a negro congressman. Catface has his own ideas about the place of the negro in the world and is not too proud to admit that the white should rank in the first division.

"Pus'nly I'se opposed to it," said Catface, directing a deposit of amber into a cuspidor and wrinkling his brow as if in deep thought. "Ah knows mah place and I'se goin' to stay wha ah is."

How to Achieve Beauty

Nothing looks more uncomfortable and unattractive than a warm summer's skin stained upon a woman's gown. It is unpleasant to mention even, yet mention it I must in order to remind you of how unnecessary it is and how easily you can avoid it.

There are several harmless kinds of astringent lotions which effectively check perspiration. While I certainly could not counsel the use of any of these over a large portion of the body's surface, I consider it permissible and wise to use them on the armpits, on the feet and even occasionally, upon the palms of the hands. In these areas the pores of the skin are particularly numerous and the sweat-secreting glands excessively active.

Sponge the lotion you choose to use over these areas several times a week. If you perspire freely it may be necessary to use them often, but for most people, men included, three nightly applications in a week will prove enough.

In addition to using a liquid to prevent perspiration, you should have a deodorant powder to use all over your body after bathing. There are several good bath talcums which effectively deodorize. They are faintly scented, yet their real effectiveness lies in their chemical capacity for neutralizing perspiration odors.

Another pleasant aid to summer daintiness is the use of delicate, fragrant bath salts. A handful of these salts thrown into your bath softens the water and leaves your skin freshened and softly scented. Do not use one of the heavily perfumed types of bath salts that you may have used during the winter season. In the summer such odors are quite unsuitable. Instead choose a light, flower scent or better, one of the faintly pungent, pine or balsam fragrance. Lavender flowers in bath salt or crystal form also have a fresh, clean odor that appeals to one's sense of summer daintiness without ever intruding itself blatantly as the heavier perfumes do.

A little of these bath salts dissolved in the final rinsing water of your shampoo will give your hair the same faintly appealing, dainty fragrance that your freshly washed body has. And if you use pine or lavender salts you will find that their scent will not conflict with your favorite summer perfume, whatever it is.

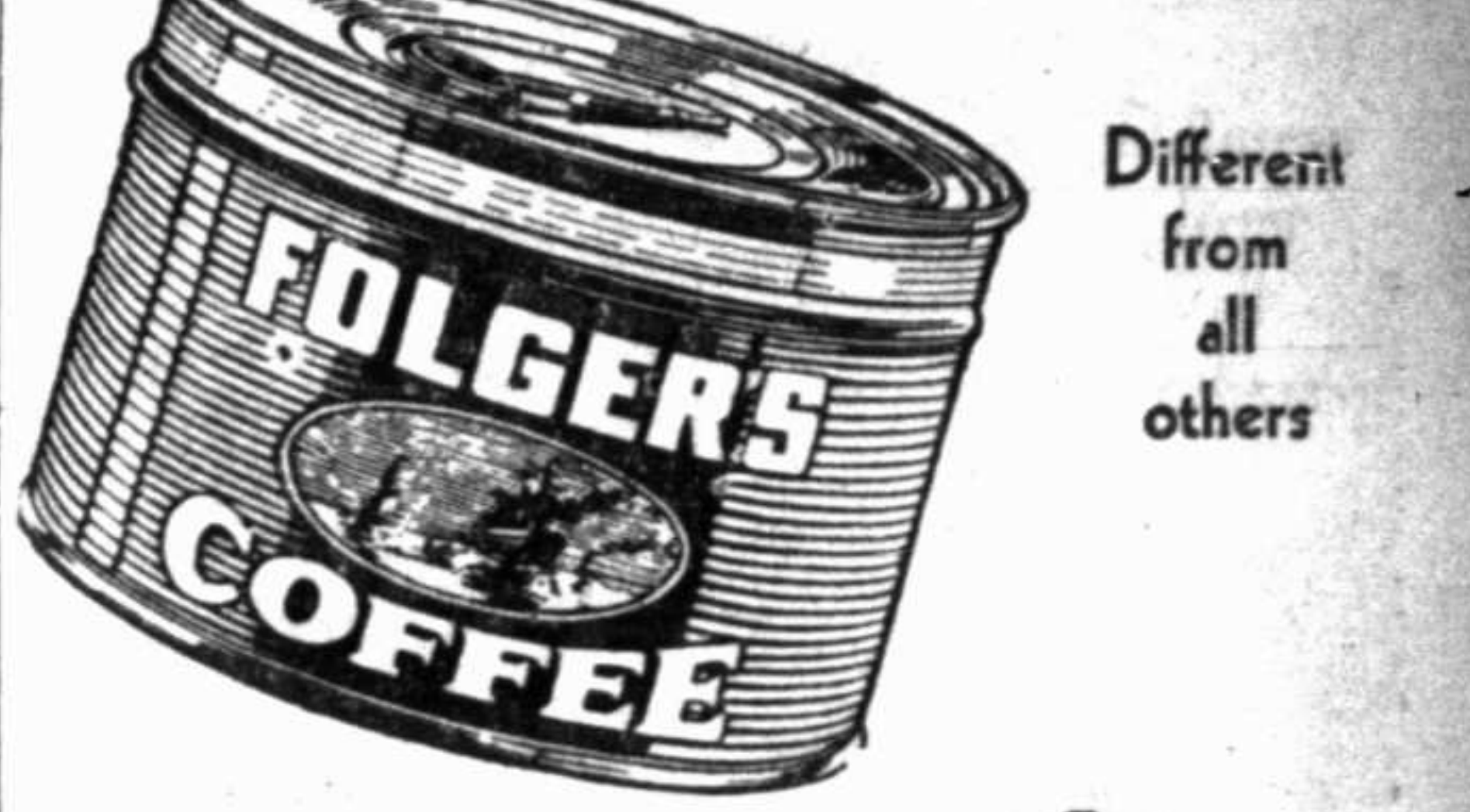

Penitentiary Bill Change In Senate

AUSTIN, June 21. (AP)—The house today substituted its penitentiary centralization bill for the senate draft passed yesterday by unanimous vote. There is little difference in the measures, except Representative Dewey Young of Wellington, one of the authors, believes the house bill is more specific in language restricting the concentration commission from entering into contracts. Both bills provide for the present prison board, supplemented by five members of the house and four senators, to make a survey of probable relocation and report its findings and recommendations to the legislature for ratification. The senate bill stipulates that the report shall be given to the legislature within 90 days after the survey is begun and the house lengthens the period until January 1.

The vote on substituting the house bill for the senate measure was 88 to 16.

A 1929 Edition Of Robinson Crusoe Vanishes From Desert Isle

SAN DIEGO, Calif., June 21.—The Robinson Crusoe of Socorro Island has vanished without leaving a trace, and the inscrutable Pacific has tossed up another mystery to puzzle the brains of mainland folk.

This modern Robinson Crusoe was Archie T. Smith of San Diego, and his disappearance, which has just come to light, is as weird a tale as Robert Louis Stevenson or any other South Sea Island novelist could imagine.

Down off the coast of Mexico, nearly 2,000 miles from here, several hundred miles from the mainland, lies uninhabited Socorro Island.

On this rocky and volcanic island Smith lived alone for four months, a luckless castaway who could do nothing but wait for rescue.

Yet when the rescuers finally got there, Smith was gone. And the fact that it seems to have been physically impossible for him to have left the island only makes the whole case more perplexing.

Half a year ago a group of San Diego men decided that there was money to be made on Socorro Island. The island is uninhabited by human beings, but is populated by great numbers of wild sheep. The bright idea that occurred to these San Diego men was to land an expedition on the island, shear all the sheep, and come back to the United States with a huge cargo of fine wool.

A small ship was chartered and a gang of some 40 men was hired. Smith was one of the number. The expedition set sail and in due time landed on Socorro Island and set up a camp there. Rough houses were erected, wire fences were built to provide corrals for the wild sheep they planned to capture and shear. A spring provided plenty of fresh water.

But then they found that the wool on the sheep was too short to shear at that season, so they decided to return in the fall. Smith, leader of the expedition, agreed to remain as caretaker.

So the 40 men boarded their ship and departed. Leaving Smith in charge of the equipment, they sailed back for San Diego, planning to return later. His pay checks, they said, would be turned over to his wife and two children here.

Then began Smith's run of hard luck. The expedition failed financially. The promoters were unable to go back to Socorro and rescue Smith. His wife and two small children here having no other means of support, were reduced to the edge of starvation.

So Smith's lonely life as a Robinson Crusoe on the little island far out in the Pacific began. No one could go and rescue him and he could not get away.

Someone in Washington finally heard of his plight. A squadron of U. S. navy scout cruisers was just then returning from maneuvers at Honolulu to the Atlantic coast. On orders from the secretary of the navy a division headed by the cruiser Memphis swung south to visit Socorro en route, to pick up Smith and bring him back to civilization.

When Mrs. Smith heard of it she wept for joy. Her church and the Associated Charities had helped her through trying days. Now, it seemed, her husband could return to her, and everything would be all right.

The Memphis and the other cruisers steamed straight for the island of Socorro. They made their landfall at night, the powerful searchlights of the warships sweeping back and forth over the rocky crags of the lonely islet. Yet, no campfire was seen—no castaway appeared waving a tattered garment. Anchor chains roared and clanked as the big ships dropped anchor to wait for daylight.

The stage was all set for a regular moving picture rescue—a whole division of cruisers going miles out of its path to take a marooned castaway off an uninhabited island!

As soon as the sun came up a scouting plane was catapulted into the air from the Memphis' deck. It circled low over the island, completely circumnavigating it, its occupants keeping a sharp lookout. Still no sign of human life was seen. Then a cutter full of bluejackets

He had vanished completely. From an examination of his hut the sailors concluded that Smith had been there only 48 hours previously—but where he had gone, or how, they could not learn. Smith had had no boat, and the island was many leagues from the mainland. But he was gone.

There was nothing for it but for the cruisers to sail away, leaving Socorro Island to its thousands of sheep, lonely, unbroken quiet, and sending to San Diego by wireless the cheerless news that Smith had not been found.

Mrs. Smith and her two babies face a discouraging future. There seems little chance that they will be able to collect any of the money that the promoters of the expedition owe Smith as wages. And meanwhile—

How on earth did this modern Robinson Crusoe get off that lonely isolated island?

There is a possibility that he was taken off by some passing fishing vessel which may be at sea for a long time and may finally land him at some remote foreign port, leaving him to work his way back to San Diego.

THE BISHOP TAKES A CHANCE

THE MORNING AVA LANCHE is of the opinion that a lot of good people—even a lot of good Methodists—couldn't forego a grin when the collapse of a Wall Street brokerage house disclosed that Bishop James Cannon, jr., had been playing the stock exchange.

Now it's not against the law to play the stock market. If it were our jails and penitentiaries would be full and running over. Yet a public cannot expect to be less than startled to discover that one of its noted—yes, and most active—divines has been taking a little fling with the bulls and the bears, in the most worldly and commercialized business that we know.

The stock market, you know, is basically nothing more or less than a gamble, particularly to the desultory investor who has not specialized in a highly concentrated game. Taking a fling in stocks is just like buying a ticket on a snail race at the county fair or playing the old army game at a carnival midway. Whether it is Bishop Cannon or an ordinary layman, the situation regarding the stock player remains the same.

The morning Avalanche criticizes no one for playing the stock market. Our laws say it is legitimate even though most of us deep in our hearts have reasons to believe that it is merely a bigger and more dignified method of wagering. But to find Bishop Cannon, that stalwart guardian of this public's morals, surreptitiously taking a chance with the tickers is amusing, to say the least.

THE YEARS OF MAN

On his seventy-eighth birthday, Sir Oliver Lodge is still hale and hearty and his optimism is, in particular, unimpaired. In the course of a birthday interview, he expressed the opinion that every one will soon live at least a century as a consequence of the rapidly improving conditions of living.

But the distinguished scientist has overlooked the findings of students in other departments of knowledge. There is so far no evidence that the span of life has been at all extended, even though the average has risen steadily for a century or so. The improvement lies altogether at the other end of the scale. The statistics based on records of the age of death indicate that the years of man's life have always been three score and ten and maybe a little over, and that the present generation is, in fact, a little below the standard set by other times and peoples. The new-born child of today has a far better chance of living to middle age than his predecessors, but he has no greater expectation of living to see his hundredth birthday than the ancient Greek or medieval Englishman.

George Bernard Shaw once wrote a play whose thesis was that men will never amount to much until they can live at least 300 years. He argued that we die like peach trees of infantile diseases and growing pains before we have had a chance to live intelligently. It may be so, and it may also be that we should not know what to do with another quarter century of life if science could set it for us. But in either case, our years are still three score and ten, and we may as well accept the fact and make the best of them.

AVIATION'S HOODOO

The Swedish transoceanic fliers seem to have furnished one more proof of the hoodoo that presently attends efforts to make the westward flight across the Atlantic. Captain Ahrenberg and his two companions were apparently forced down on the coast of Iceland by a broken gasoline pipe, but the terrific head winds also seem to have been a factor in the mishap.

Lindbergh flew to Paris with the aid of a 29-mile-an-hour tail wind that followed him all the way across the Atlantic. Encountering no serious meteorological difficulties until he ran into dense fog off the French coast, Chamberlin and Levine experienced no really bad weather while making the oceanic part of their flight to Germany. But the whole history of flights from Europe to the United States has been one of disaster or near-disaster. The Bremen, to date, is the sole airplane that has succeeded in making the westward crossing. And even the Bremen was forced hundreds of miles off her course before she landed on Greenly Island.

The time will undoubtedly come when airplanes will be built so stoutly and equipped with such powerful engines that they will prove superior to virtually all weather conditions. But the important part that meteorological factors play in aviation at present has been amply demonstrated by the repeated failures of westward trans-Atlantic fliers.

CURB FOOLHARDY AVIATORS

When an airplane crashed through the roof of "the little white house" at Sea Girt, Boring its way into Governor Larson's bedroom, the public was reminded forcefully of a new menace which has emerged with the rapid development of air transit. It is the menace which comes from unnecessarily flying over congested areas.

Air mail pilots and other professional aviators engaged in legitimate operations are often forced to fly directly over metropolitan districts, shore resorts and the like. But those who are not required to endanger the lives and property of citizens might be expected to head toward open country where hazards are appreciably minimized.

Least of all should there be any flying over a stadium or park when a large public gathering is witnessing some outstanding event. Such foolhardy aeronautical practices are prohibited by federal and state regulations and pilots who persist in violating the dictates of law and common sense deserve to be severely penalized.

In spite of its rapid perfection, aviation is yet in its formative stage. One of the most urgent needs is an inclusive regulatory system, putting an end to the inconsiderate tactics of half-baked aeronauts who take chances which are warranted by neither scientific nor commercial demands.

They often overlook housework as a most effective means of keeping the slender figure that charms.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

BONE DRY CONGRESSMAN DESCRIBES KILLING BOOTLEGGERS AS MURDER EXCEPT IN CASES OF SELF-DEFENSE

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Except in self-defense—which always is justifiable—killing bootleggers is at best manslaughter—from that up to outright murder—in the opinion of bone dry Representative Charles Hillyer Brand, Georgia superior court judge for a decade, ending with his election to congress a dozen years ago.

If to kill an actual lawbreaker is a crime—suggests the Georgian—how much graver is the responsibility of the officer who shoots down a mere suspect?—perhaps afterward shown to have been guilty of no offense whatever.

"There is a dead man in this case," declared Congressman Brand, on the floor of the house of representatives of a prohibition tragedy just enacted in Washington, "but a live issue is involved."

The Georgia representative stands pat in his interpretation of the law concerning more recent shootings by dry enforcement functionaries.

"The law authorizing an officer to kill a felon in order to capture him found its origin," he says, "in the common law but all felonies at common law were capital felonies"—and the common law, as Georgian points out, has been widely modified, both in state constitutions and by statutory enactments.

Today "therefore," continues the congressman, "while an officer may use such force as is necessary to capture one charged with a felony, unless it is a capital felony, or one that is atrocious in its nature, he has no right to take human life to effect an arrest, except in self-defense."

Does a prohibition violation approach capital proportions?—at any rate, is it atrocious?

"It is not," replies ex-Judge Brand, "in either of these classes."

"It belongs in that category of offenses known as 'prohibited malum-in-manu'—wrongs or offenses made so by statute—not in the category known as 'malum in se'—wrongs in themselves—offenses against conscience—involving moral turpitude—such as murder, burglary, highway robbery."

"A prohibition violation does not involve moral turpitude in the meaning of the law."

"I give it as my mature judgment," repeats the veteran jurist-representative, "that no policeman or other arresting officer has any right to kill a person for violating the prohibition law except in self defense."

"Malice, expressed or implied, is a necessary element in murder."

"Yet, when a homicide is proved, the law assumes malice. Unless the evidence rebuts the slayer, he should be found guilty of murder."

To the commonly-offered plea that dry officers kill—when they do—by accident rather than by deliberate intention, the congressman answers:

"When one uses a deadly weapon in a manner likely to produce death, and death ensues, under the law of the ages such killing upon its face is murder."

"To hold otherwise would imperil not only the right of personal liberty but the lives of innocent citizens of all ages, races and sexes. Those who condone such killings have gotten far from the original law of the land."

Lawyerlike, Congressman Brand liberally quotes authorities.

Blackstone wrote about 1769 that a crime might be prevented by death if the same if committed, would be punished by death. But this rule does not now hold good because at that time all felonies were punishable by death, whereas now but few are so punishable. Voohees on Arrest, Section 181.

"It is his duty of the arresting officer to use no unnecessary harshness or violence, and if he use more force than is necessary, he himself becomes liable in trespass, and in case of taking life may be found guilty of manslaughter or even murder." Voohees on Arrest, Section 186.

"There is a broad distinction between resisting arrest and the avoidance of it. Even in the case of one charged with murder, the one sought to be arrested was content peacefully to avoid arrest; the pursuing party had no right to kill him." Voohees on Arrest, Section 189.

"The court (lower court) did not err in charging that an officer has no right to follow up one whom he seeks to arrest, and attempt to shoot or kill him if the person sought to be arrested is making no effort to resist arrest, but is only attempting to avoid it by flight." McAllister v. The State, 711 Georgia Appeals, Page 541; Paragraph 5.

HEALTH SERVICE NOW IN CONTROL OF WEST COAST MENINGITIS

Since November, 1928, there has been a gradually increasing amount of meningitis on the Pacific coast of the United States. Cases have been unusually prevalent this year.

Of course, the situation has been complicated by the fact that many cases appeared among passengers of ships arriving in Seattle and San Francisco from oriental ports. The majority of persons affected were Filipinos.

This rise in the number of cases has been fairly continuous in Oregon, Washington and California since 1925. In that year Washington reported 55 cases and 39 deaths; in 1926, 190 cases and 84 deaths; and in 1927 162 cases and 95 deaths. For 1928 there were 123 cases and 25 deaths.

Therefore, not only do these figures indicate the number of cases increasing at a fairly constant rate but also represent a rather virulent type of the disease. The figures for Oregon and for California are approximately the same type as those cited for Washington.

Since November, 1928, 123 cases of acute cerebrospinal meningitis have occurred among steerage passengers of one transportation company only and on 14 ships. In some instances, cases have appeared in two or three trips of the same boat.

A part of the difficulty was due to the fact that the danger of the disease was not recognized and passengers on the boats were permitted to get off and get on without reference to the presence of meningitis in the cities where they stopped.

The control of meningitis depends on strict enforcement of many of the precautions that are now widely known as precautions against all infectious diseases. They include such factors as isolation of the patient, quarantine of the contacts, careful laboratory examinations for carriers and thorough examination of people who are traveling on vessels from one country to another.

The United States Public Health Service is fully in control of the situation, and it is reasonable to believe that strict measures will bring about an immediate reduction in the number of cases and perhaps aid in lowering the mortality.

It must be remembered that the germs are living organisms of the same as man himself; that they tend to modify their ways as do human beings, changing in virulence and in power, and that the battle against them is an eternal study and an unending warfare.

Anniversary Notes

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

On June 22, 1870 Congress provided for organization of the Department of Justice.

This unit is one of the executive departments of the United States at the head of which is the attorney general, appointed by the president for a term of four years.

Although the office of attorney general was created in 1789 and the incumbent of the office was from the first a member of the cabinet, it was not until 1870 that Congress erected the office into a separate department.

By the act of June 22 of that year the several officers of the federal government, of whom there were some half dozen or more, were placed under the supervision of the attorney general, with the hope of bringing about greater uniformity in the construction and application of the laws.

The attorney general is the legal representative of the United States in cases of law and he is charged with the general supervision of the U. S. district attorneys and marshals. Among the other duties of the Department of Justice are the supervision of the penal and reformatory institutions of the United States and recommendation of judicial appointments.

In 1870 the office of solicitor general was created, the incumbent being ranked as the second officer of the department. The act of 1870 also transferred to the new Department of Justice the solicitors from the Interior, Treasury and Navy Departments and the examiner of claims from the State Department.
