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GOVERNOR NAMES BOARD TO DRAFT ELECTION LAW

Gov. A. T. Hannett this afternoon named the board to draw up an airtight election law, with the idea of cutting out the many possibilities for fraud found to exist in the present law, and set November 7 for its first meeting.

The make-up of the board: Republican attorneys—C. M. Botts, Albuquerque, former justice of the supreme court; James M. Hervey, Roswell, president of the State Bar association and former attorney general.

Democratic attorneys, Summers Burkhardt, Albuquerque, United States attorney for New Mexico for eight years; J. L. Lawson, Alamogordo.

Legislators, Sen. E. L. Holt, Dona Ana county; Rep. Don R. Casados, Mora county.

Holt is a republican and the son of a former state senator, and a man active in republican politics, E. L. Holt, while Casados is the Democratic whip of the lower house. Both are world war veterans and members of the American Legion.

In making the names public Governor Hannett said he had conferred with Hugh H. Williams, Republican state chairman, relative to the Republican members of the board and Mr. Williams had expressed hearty approval of his selections.—New Mexican.

After breakfast the visitors were taken by auto to the Mule-shoe and Littlefield properties, after which they visited Portales arriving late in the evening.

The first car to arrive in Portales contained J. T. Woodward of the firm of Trask & Co., investment bankers of New York

and L. F. Payne, electrical engineer of St. Louis. While waiting for the arrival of the other members of the party, these gentlemen were piloted over a small part of the Portales Valley, visiting the irrigation well of Mr. Marsh, south of Portales. This well was running for the benefit of the visitors, and as they stood there watching the flow of water of from 1000 to 1200 gallons per minute, they were impressed with the value of the Portales Valley as an irrigation district. They asked many questions as to the land, the products of the flow of water and other points that would be of interest to one making an investment in this territory.

From the irrigation wells they were carried to the curing plants of the Portales Valley Sweet Potato Association, where they were conducted through one of the large curing plants and the method of curing explained to them. They were very much interested in this industry.

From the curing plants they visited the local power plant of the New Mexico Utilities Company, after which they returned to Clovis, where they spent the night.

On the arrival of the other members of the party, they were given a brief view of the Portales Valley, and all were very much interested in the resources of the same.

There is no doubt but that the visit of these gentlemen will result in a better development of this section, and that the great shallow water belt of Roosevelt county will in the next year or so become thicker populated, and on every forty acres a modern pumping plant will be in operation.

Portales was very glad to welcome these distinguished gentlemen, and hopes that they will pay us another visit in the near future.

GOOD CROPS IN THE PERRY AND ROCK LAKE DISTRICT

THE PEANUT INDUSTRY

A drive over the Portales Valley would surprise every citizen in Portales. The peanut is known to many only by the small package which is bought at the peanut stand. There were acres and acres of peanuts grown in the valley this year, and they have made a splendid yield. These peanuts are of the Tennessee Red variety, and often contain five or six nuts to one pod.

This is a crop which could be profitably manufactured into peanut butter, peanut cake for cattle and peanut cooking oil. It is one line of manufacturing which the valley can supply the raw material in unlimited quantity.

JUDGE MORGAN CRASHES INTO SANTA FE FREIGHT

Becoming confused in the operation of a big sedan, which he recently purchased, Judge Morgan, Portales attorney, sent the big machine crashing into a Santa Fe freight train which was making the railroad crossing on South Prince Street Monday night. Judge Morgan sustained no injuries from the accident.

The accident occurred just as Judge Morgan was driving into the city from his home in Portales. He passed another car near the railroad crossing and as he swung in front of the car he had passed, he observed the freight train making the crossing. Having operated a different make of car prior to buying his new one, he is believed to have become confused in the operation of the machine, and instead of putting on the brake as he intended, pushed the pedal which does not put braking power to the car, and the big sedan crashed into the moving freight cars. The car was considerably damaged in the accident. It was at first reported here that Judge Morgan was severely injured, but later reports said he was only slightly shaken up.—Clovis Journal, Oct. 22.

LIBERTY STREET PAVING Began on Monday

Monday of this week the work of paving Liberty street was begun by the grading crew.

Roy Frick, contractor was in town and said to a News reporter that work on this piece of paving would be carried on as fast as weather conditions would permit.

The sewer extension will go forward and all lines laid across this street ahead of the paving. The water mains have been laid and the ditches are being filled.

While the town has been hampered with open ditches for the past week or so, this sort of hindrance to traffic shows progress in the town and is not taken as an inconvenience.

With the completion of the paving of Liberty street, Portales will be one of the best paved towns in this part of the state.

TO WIDEN PAVING ON STATE STREET

A move is now on foot to widen the paving on State street six feet on each side of the present concrete slab.

The intention is to have this done while the contractors are here with paving equipment.

NEW BRICK BUSINESS HOUSE ON MAIN STREET

Workmen are at work in the construction of a new brick business house 24x60 feet, on Main street on lot next to the J. N. Price Dry Goods Store. This building is being erected by W. F. Hill. Mr. Hill has had built a number of houses in Portales in the past two years, and is showing the spirit of a real town builder.

SIDEWALKS BEING BUILT

Work will begin on the sidewalk along the Methodist church property on Monday. This block of sidewalk will be quite an improvement, but there are still several blocks on this street which should be connected up with sidewalks.

NEW BRICK COTTAGE

Work on the new brick cottage of J. B. Sledge on Liberty street is progressing rapidly. The walls are now up above the windows. When this is completed this will be one of the most attractive residences in Portales, and it will contain every modern convenience.

THE CAPITAN WELL

In conversation with Fred Dennis of Clovis Monday morning, the News learned that work on the Capitan well had been held up on account of the caving of the red bed which had been encountered almost the entire depth, making it necessary to underream to set casing. The caving of this formation has caused considerable inconvenience in the drilling operations, but this is now eased off and Mr. Steinberg has made a trip to Tulsa, Oklahoma for 8 inch casing to continue the deep drilling.

Mr. Dennis says that should this prove an oil field, that the drillers have learned how to handle this formation in the future, and that it would be ideal drilling with a rotary drill.

There is no doubt that this well is going on down, and the present delay is only a part of the game in developing a new field.

Judge Compton was formerly of Portales and served as County Judge of Roosevelt County.

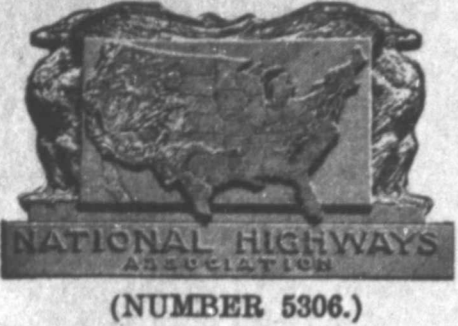

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

(By National Editorial Asso.)

Washington, Oct. 28.—It is a curious trait of human nature to enjoy the embarrassment of others. Official Washington with all its traditions of dignity is not without a sense of humor. Watching the political by-play behind the scenes frequently brings out amusing situations in our national life. The latest incident was disclosed this week during the tax hearings.

There is a tradition in newspaper offices that a story without a name is not worth the telling. It is currently reported that Congressman Green of Iowa and Congressman Garner of Texas, chairman and minority leader, respectively, of the House Committee on Ways and Means, were placed in embarrassing position by their constituents. Partisanship is not directly involved because Green is a Republican and Garner a Democrat. Both have been taking their committee jobs seriously. They have attempted it is said, to write their individual opinions into the revenue laws, even against the advice of the leaders of their political parties.

Those who have watched these two men are unkind enough to say that Green and Garner wanted to emulate Senator Borah and other insurgent characters in Congress. Whether this contention has any foundation in fact is immaterial. They have never approached the Borah standard.

The team of Green and Garner representing different political views were united in opposition to tax plans of the administration, in particular anything formulated by Secretary Mellon. What tickled the fancy of Washington this week was the spectacle of these two men being whipped into line by imposing delegations from their home districts demanding the adoption of the Mellon proposals on inheritance taxes, etc. The two insurgents were forced to introduce these representatives taxpayers from their own states and listen to their endorsement of the Mellon proposal, a procedure which meant that Green and Garner must take the back track or invite political extermination. This incident is typical of the growing tendency of the day—for local communities to express their will on legislative matters and have their representatives in Congress carry it out, rather than adhere to personal convictions.

Anticipating open attacks in Congress in regard to their policies in the Western states, the Administration has shown that it believes in preparedness. The annual reports of the Secretary of the Interior will not be available until late in December. With the conservation and reclamation controversies brewing, Secretary Work very cleverly put out an interesting propaganda in the form of a brochure relating to the Department of the Interior's activities for 1925. Western senators and congressmen obeying the requests of small groups of interested parties in their own bailiwicks are planning a scalping party for those responsible for curtailed expenditures for public works in the west.

By issuing a forty-page "preview" of the Department's activities, the Department of the Interior has the advantage of the time element in its propaganda. The brochure which came from press this week starts off with the keynote of the present administration: "Efficiency and economy are inseparable". The economy is stressed throughout to explain the wholesale decapitation of office holders, a situation which provoked the western senators more than the curtailment of expenditures on reclamation projects. Patronage is a sacred thing in politics. There is no doubt that the president passed upon the text of the Department's report, for it is, in reality, a defense of the entire administration rather than the policies of one department.

As a general reminder of President Coolidge's wisdom in selecting members of his official family, attention is called to the fact that from members of the Cabinet are from the west. This feature is stressed to show that the President has capable advisors on conservation policies within his own official household. The document is written so that it could be easily utilized for campaign purposes and was sent out under free mail privilege. It gives the "whys and wherefores" of the

administration's deeds of commission and omission. It is bound to provide subject for debate in the Congress this winter. Whether this activity, made with the proper insight into political problems, will serve its purpose is something no group of men can foretell.

The President is turning down requests for public addresses until he delivers his annual address to Congress December 8th. He is already formulating certain definite policies which he will recommend to Congress at that time. It is his intention to guard against any premature interpretations which might arise from his state appears between now and the convening of Congress.

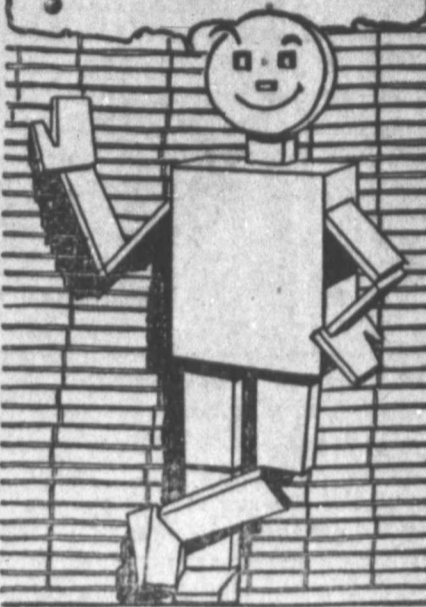

The association voted to offer a reward for the conviction of those violation the game laws and especially for such violations as shooting quail out of season, as in the past hunters have gone out a few days before the season and practically exterminated the quail in several sections of the county, and on last Sunday is was reported that the reports of guns were heard all day in the sand hills north and west of Portales.

This reward will be \$25.00 for conviction.

Every farmer in the county is urged to join the association and help preserve the quail which now have a foothold in the county.

Annual member ship dues were placed at \$1.00.

PROTECT THE GAME

Santa Fe, Oct. 26.—As a step in the state game department's program of protection of animal and bird life of New Mexico, the state game commission at its meeting

here on October 16 passed two resolutions designed to prevent the killing of animals and birds on the game refuges of the state. One resolution, which amends a regulation already in effect, makes it unlawful to carry fire-

arms on a game refuge without a permit from the state game warden. This rule does not apply to officers in the performance of their duty. Forest rangers, Biological survey men and other officers whose duties make it necessary for them to ride on the refuges armed will not be required to have a permit.

Another resolution, which is expected to meet with the hearty cooperation of farmers and stockmen of the state is that prohibiting the discharge of any firearm from or across any public highway in the state. Public highway, for the purpose of this act, is construed as any road constructed or maintained in whole or in part by public funds.

Included in this latter resolution is a clause prohibiting shooting at any bird or animal from a motor vehicle.

The intent of these regulations is to stop the practice carried on by a few hunters of driving along the highways and firing at game in fields along the side of the road also to stop the practice of driving a car along the side of a lake or stream and shooting ducks from the car.

In order to conserve the diminishing supply of quail in the state, the commission resolved to shorten the open season in 1926 from two months to one month, which will be during the month of December.

Judge Geo. L. Reese, Sr., of Roswell, and son, who is one of the young lawyers of Artesia, were in Carlsbad, Monday attending to matters before the district court. Mr. Reese, Sr., was until recently a resident of Portales, and says that country is coming to the front in great shape with its shallow wells for irrigation and scientific dry farming operations.—Carlsbad Argus.

Mr. Meador of Portales was visiting his cousin, L. E. Meador of this place.

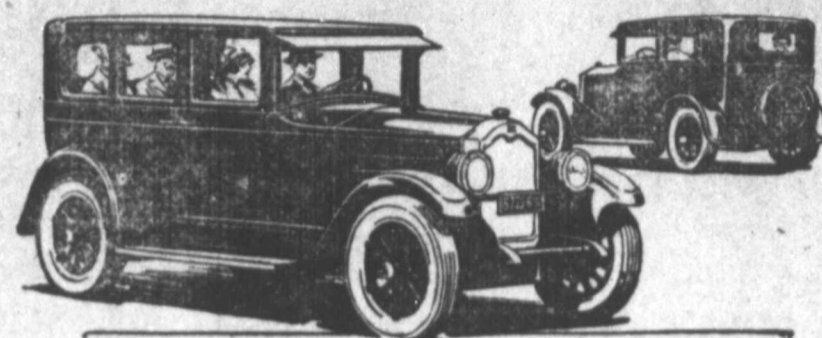

ORDINANCE NO. 78

An Ordinance to Protect the Public Health:

(1) By requiring connection to the sewer system of all privies, flush toilets, sinks and other appliances which receive or carry domestic sewage, located on premises within the sewer district, or upon premises abutting upon a street or alley which has a sewer.

(2) By requiring the construction and maintenance of sanitary, fly-proof privies on all premises within the corporate limits of the city, not located within a sewer district, or upon premises which do not abut upon a street or alley which has a sewer.

Be it Ordained by The Board of Trustees of The Town of Portales, New Mexico.

Section 1 That the maintenance of a privy, vault, or cesspool on premises abutting upon a street or alley which has a sewer or on premises included within a sewer district, shall be unlawful and dangerous to the public health. Such privy, vault or cesspool shall be declared a nuisance and abated as such (Sec. 21 and 22, Chap. 85, Laws of 1919).

That the person, firm or corporation maintaining such privy, vault or cesspool, shall be notified in writing by the county health officer that such nuisance exists and that said person, firm or corporation be given thirty days to abate such nuisance by proper connection to the sewer system.

Thirty days after notification in writing that such nuisance exists, if the said person, firm or corporation has not abated said nuisance by proper connection to the sewer system, the city shall advertise for bids for making the said connection and let the work to the lowest responsible bidder. The cost of making such connection shall be made a lien against the said lots or parcels of land as described in Chapter 133, Laws of 1923.

Section 2 That the existence of an insanitary or non-fly proof privy, vault or cesspool, on any premises within the corporate limits of the city, except all premises including within a sewer district, or upon premises abutting upon a street or alley which has a sewer, shall be declared a nuisance and abated as such.

That the person, firm or corporation committing such nuisance shall be notified in writing by the county health officer that such nuisance exists and given thirty days to repair or reconstruct said privy, vault or cesspool in order that it may be made sanitary and fly-proof.

At the expiration of thirty (30) days after the notification in writing, if the nuisance still exists, the city shall advertise for bids for repairing or reconstructing such privy, vault or cesspool in order to make it sanitary and fly-proof, and let the work to the lowest responsible bidder. The cost of such repairing or reconstruction shall be made a lien against the said lots or parcels of land as described in Chapter 133, Laws of 1923.

Section 3 For the purpose of this Ordinance certain terms are defined as follows:

PRIVY—Any structure, house, shed or room containing any seat, trough, bowl or opening used or intended to be used for human defecation or urination, whether the same be placed over or adjacent to, or in any way connected with, any vault, cesspool or pit, or whether the excreta are deposited on the floor or ground.

VAULT—Any excavation or opening in the ground or beneath the ground surface, used or intended to be used for receiving and containing human excrement, urine or fecal matter, provided, that this term shall not include the term, "cesspool".

CESSPOOL—Any vault used in connection with a water-carriage plumbing system, the solid matters carried therein being retained in the cesspool and the liquids seeping or leaking away through the surrounding soil.

INSANITARY PRIVY, VAULT OR CESSPOOL—One in which human excrement is exposed to the approach of flies or other insects, or of animals; or one in which the contents may be scattered upon the open ground or carried into any well, cistern or stream, either by surface drainage or seepage.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.
