THIRD WAR LOAN BOND DRIVE SHOWED PROGRESS IN SATURDAY'S REPORT BY COUNTY CHAIRMAN J. M. WILLSON; \$95,050.00 ACCOUNTED FOR

\$95,050.00 of the Floyd County \$383,400.00 Third War Loan was accounted for in Saturday's report by County Chairman J. M. Willson, who stated that this amount had been subscribed up to that time.

Community leaders and workers are holding meetings and working their districts this week in efforts to swell the total figure to the full county quota in time for Chairman Willson's next report, which will be Saturday evening, September 18.

Wednesday afternoon a two-hour holiday was declared in the Floydada business district from 4 to 6 o'clock, during which time the community held a patriotic rally and many bonds were sold. Several short patriotic speeches were made.

Enrollment at Canyon Expected to be Large this Fall

Canyon, September 16.—Despite war restrictions, indications point to a large enrollment at West Texas State College at Canyon this fall. Registration for the fall semester starts September 21.

Dr. J. A. Hill, president of the college, said living quarters had filled rapidly, indicating an unusually heavy enrollment. He said, however, that there would be adequate living quarters for all men and women desiring to attend the school.

Protein Should be Used Efficiently by All Feeders

Since the most effective conservation of limited protein supplies ultimately must be left with the producer, it is important that protein concentrate feeds in their unmixed form be available at all times to ranchers and farmers.

Guides to efficient use of protein feeds issued by the A. and M. College Extension Service point out that any individual stockman's need for protein concentrates will depend on the kind of livestock being produced, the amount and condition of available pasture and roughage, and the amount and type of home or locally grown grain available.

And, in any event, the produced should use protein feeds only as they are necessary to meet the basic requirements of digestible protein according to feed standards in common use, livestock specialists say. Present and probable future shortages of protein concentrates will not permit their use freely as a source of energy.

To aid farmers and ranchmen in the best possible use of protein feeds, the Extension Service has issued four free printed leaflets related to the feeding of beef cattle, sheep and goats, dairy cattle, hogs, and poultry. These are available from county agricultural agents throughout the state.

Adult Education Progresses in Donated Home

Allen Early, one of the first wheat elevator operators in the Texas Panhandle, built a home in Amarillo. It cost more than \$100,000. Last year Mr. and Mrs. Early donated the big house to West Texas State College for an Amarillo Center for adult education.

Mr. Early was one of the first students to register. He had never attended college. He is returning daily to his former home school. He plans to win his college degree.

More than 500 persons attended the Center the first year. Housewives, clerks, editors, ministers, teachers, railroad men, government employees, men in the service and scores of others attended. Many of the adults had never before gone to any college.

One man figured out his course. He backed off and said, "I won't start it. I'd be 40 years old by the time I finished." Next day he returned and said, "I've decided to take the courses. Just realizing I'd be 40 years old anyhow."

The Center is the only school in the state in which the students work out the schedule of courses and select the teachers. It is a part of West Texas State, and members of the faculty at Canyon conduct the classes. The Center is part of the college's plan to give full educational facility to the Panhandle.

ETSTC Man Offers State Court Outline

Austin, Texas, September 9.—To plans for state court reorganization that have been offered and others in prospect, Claude V. Hall, professor of government in the East Texas State Teachers College at Commerce, has made a contribution which has excited a good deal of interest among the few lawyers in Austin to whom it has been submitted.

It is the further development of a scheme he presented to the Southwestern Social Science Association at Dallas in 1942. While it carries as many original ideas as most such proposals do, like them it is distinctive chiefly for its modifications of ideas which, without having achieved orthodoxy, have become staples of subject.

Professor Hall proposes a system of two divisions: Supreme and District Courts. Of District Judges there would be as many as might be thought needed in each of eleven districts under administrative direction of a presiding Judge. They would have both civil and criminal jurisdiction, as would the Supreme Court by means of separate actions. How many judges would compose the Supreme Court is an omitted detail.

STIPENDARY MAGISTRATE.

Something of a novelty in the plan of Professor Hall, if not an originality, would be the institution of at least one Stipendary Magistrate in every county, as a kind of adjunct to the District Court. Before the Stipendary Magistrate all proceedings would be informal. His functions would be almost protean: He would conduct examining trials and inquisitorial hearings; direct pretrial examination of civil cases; do probate business, construe instruments in writing; and conduct summary trials of petty cases, civil and criminal, with power to determine the facts and law without a jury.

He would displace the County Judge, the justice of the peace and the municipal recorder; for cases involving municipal ordinances would be brought before him. Appeals from his opinions and judgments would be to the District Court, which would consider the case de novo.

APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT.

From judgments of the District Court appeal would lie to the Supreme Court of right, as respects cases involving the construction of ordinances, statutes and Constitutions. As respects other cases, appeals would be subject to the determination of the Supreme Court, using the writ of certiorari, or by answering certified questions.

The Chief Justice would be elected by the people for a six-year term. But by him all other judges would be appointed, including the Stipendary Magistrates. At prescribed intervals all these would have to undergo the judgment of the people in non-competitive elections.

Such is a thumb-nail outline of Professor Hall's plan of court organization and functioning.

Professor Hall is a former resident of Floydada. He was engaged as teacher, attorney and newspaper man while here.

England Produces More Food Since Outbreak of War

An increase of from 38 per cent to 68 per cent of their food since war broke out and more production for next year is Great Britain's wartime agricultural record, according to E. Watson Jones, farmer-committeeman from Shropshire, England.

Speaking before state AAA committeemen and district fieldmen in session at College Station last week, Jones pointed to increases in potatoes, sugar beets, bread grains and dairy products since 1940 when their national farm program got underway.

Based on national production goals set by the Minister of Agriculture and the Minister of Food, county War Agricultural Executive Committees work out with individual farmers their pro rata share of total production, according to the type farms they operate. On cultivated farms wheat and potatoes receive top priority, with vegetables and sugar beets second in importance, while on stock farms milk production receives top rating.

He said their county Executive Committees operate similar to county and community AAA committeemen in the United States. Appointed by the Minister of Agriculture, personnel of the committees consist of five farmers,

one landowner, one county councillor, one representative of a farm organization and one woman who plan country production.

"You American farmers operate under a voluntary plan of production while in England we operate under compulsory orders," he said and added that failure to meet

production goals resulted in heavy fines for offenders. In case farmers do not get specified crops planted on time Jones said, they are assigned acreage goals for other crops.

He and three British agricultural executives have been in the United States since mid-June to study agricultural production. They
