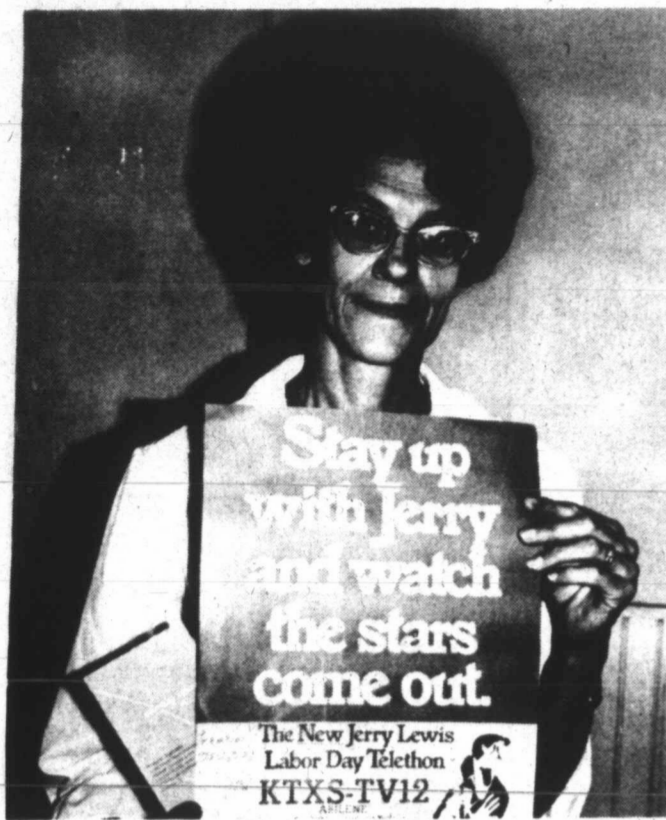

Dove Season To Open Sept. 1

If you've noticed some medium-sized, medium gray colored, sort of fat birds along the roadways, fence lines and highlines lately, then you've been seeing the bird that will be the object of much shotgun blasting soon.

Dove season opens in the northern zone next Sunday, Sept. 1, continuing until the final day, Oct. 30.

Noon Sept. 1 is the official time for mourning dove season to begin. Shooting hours are daily until sunset on the final day in October.

Daily bag limits are 10 birds per licensed hunter with possession limited to 20.

The same hours and bag limits apply to white-wing dove hunting, but nearest white-wing country is along the Rio Grande south of here.

Don't forget to get your hunting license before going out into the field for those mourning doves. Licenses are sold here at Sparks Hardware St-

ore and Western Auto Store. A hunting license costs \$5.25 or a combination hunting and fishing license costs \$8.75. Persons under 17 or over 65 may purchase an exempt permit for 25%. Non residents can buy a five-day migratory bird permit for \$10.25.

Driving Course In Westbrook

A defensive driving course will be held in the Westbrook School cafeteria each Tuesday of September from 7 until 9 p.m.

Any interested adult in the community who is willing to start and complete the course is eligible to enroll.

Enrollment can be done by calling or visiting the school office. The class is limited to 30 students so registrants will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis. Anyone contacting the office after the class has been filled will be put on an alternate list. If any of the enrolled students drops out before the start of the class, alternates will be contacted in the order they registered.

Cost of the class will be \$10 and will cover all materials and the transportation of the teacher, Kyle Etheredge of the Region XIV Service Center in Abilene.

Auto insurance companies will give a 10% discount for three years on premium rates to anyone completing the course.

Drilling Increase

Oil and gas drilling operations within the continental United States are at their highest level since late 1965.

According to a weekly report released by the Hughes Tool Co., an average of 1,518 rotary drilling rigs were in operation during the past week, compared with 1,516 a week earlier and 1,219 a year ago.

The new average is the highest since a 1,527 average was reported for the week ending Dec. 27, 1965.

FmHA To Guarantee Livestock Loans

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the recently enacted Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available beginning Monday through a new loan guarantee authority of Farmers Home Administration.

David Marlon, FmHA county supervisor, said that the rural credit service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture will guarantee up to 80 per cent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for six months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Marlon said livestock producers are urged to make applications to and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions.

The lender in turn will ask FmHA for a loan guarantee if one is required. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it.

Maximum loan to any single borrower that can be assisted by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans will be repayable in not more than three years, although renewal for two years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between bor-

rower and lender at the going rate.

Marlon said a lender with FmHA Emergency Livestock loan guarantee may ask the FmHA to pay to the lender up to 80 per cent of a loss incurred by the lender after li-

quidation of loans made after July 25, 1974. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation and a majority portion of the borrower's time must be devoted to the livestock and poultry production.

"FmHA guarantees will be made only when the bonafide farmer or rancher cannot obtain financing without a guarantee," Marlon emphasized.

He added, "Loans may not be used to expand operations." Marlon said the county FmHA

office serving the area where the borrower's livestock or poultry operations are conducted will handle requests from lenders for guarantees or supply

information on the loan guarantee program.

FmHA office serving Mitchell County is located in the G-Kell Building on the Snyder Highway.

Kindercare Center To Open Sept. 23

"Anyone planning to cut down a large tree about a foot to 15 inches in diameter, please let me know," said Jon Shamburger.

Mrs. Shamburger, who is Community Action Program director for Mitchell County CAP, is currently in the process of completing arrangements for the Kindercare center to open and could use a tree with numerous large branches on the day care center's playground.

Personnel for the newly organized child care center were hired recently and will attend workshop sessions in San Angelo, September 16, 17 and 18. Personnel and their duties are as follows:

Teacher, Connie Orona, who was an aide for two years with the Bilingual Kindergarten program in the public school system here.

Applications are now being taken at the Community Center on 10th Street for 35 children four years of age and under.

The Kindercare Center will open September 23, after plans have been completed for classroom and playground facilities.

There will be separate classrooms for two year olds, three year olds, four year olds and a nursery for children under two years of age.

In addition, there is a large playroom with six interest centers:

Book and puzzle
Art and music
Homemaking

Science
Woodwork
Block and manipulatory toys

Classes open at 6:45 a.m. and close at 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Children will be served breakfast, lunch and mid-morning and mid-afternoon snacks.

Mrs. Shamburger said that donations of money may be made to the child care center which will be used for purchase of additional playground and educational supplies and equipment. She also said that the center can afford to pay for good, sturdy used playpens, walkers, cribs, book shelves and tricycles for use in the nursery and on the playground.

Wolves Show Good Defense

Little Jimmy Dickens once sang a song saying he was little but he was loud.

The 1974 Colorado City Wolves are carrying the same credentials this year.

The Wolves team is the youngest and smallest-weight wise—that has been fielded here in recent years, but Thursday night they proved that their presence is felt and heard when they hit. And they hit constantly. What they lack in size is more than made up in quickness and strength.

A large crowd of spectators was on hand to witness the Wolves first contact with an opponent. Andrews fielded a team which featured a large number of players weighing more than 200 pounds. The largest member of the Wolves team in the scrimmage was about 190 pounds but most members of the team are in the 160-170 pound category and smaller.

The scrimmage was no contest as the Wolves displayed a quickness that caught the Andrews team off guard. The Wolves varsity scored two touchdowns and threatened several other times while Andrews never really threatened to score against the Wolves varsity defense. Against the Wolves junior varsity, Andrews scored once and the Wolves scored once with the junior varsity offense.

Colorado High Athletic Director Mike Farda said he was pleased with the defensive showing of the Wolves. He pointed out that the offense also looked good on occasion but the scrimmage revealed several problems on offense that need some correction.

On offense running from a pro set, the Wolves linemen opened holes with slant blocking which the runners knived through for long gains. On the first play from scrimmage, Steve Bolin galloped for some 40 yards to set up the Wolves first touchdown which was scored on a short plunge by Ed Warren. Warren also scored later on a 70-yard run.

The other Wolves touchdown, came on a pass play from quarterback Ray Torres to Larry Johnson.

Farda said he was impressed by the performances of Andy Chalker, Bolin, Warren, Gene Banks, Bill Everett, Jackie Ellis, Wayne McKee, Blake Bodine, Scottie Knowlton, Ruben Ornelas, Jim Jordan, Robert Rivera, Mike Brooks, Alfred Sierra and Drex Grisham.

The Wolves will travel to Crane Friday for the final scrimmage before the season opener at Wolf Stadium Sept. 6 against Slaton.

The junior varsity will scrimmage Crane at 6:30 p.m. Friday while the varsity scrimmage against Crane will be at 7:30 p.m.

prices set by the city council for space in the new Civic Center, board members revealed that they held four different ideas on the council's rent decision.

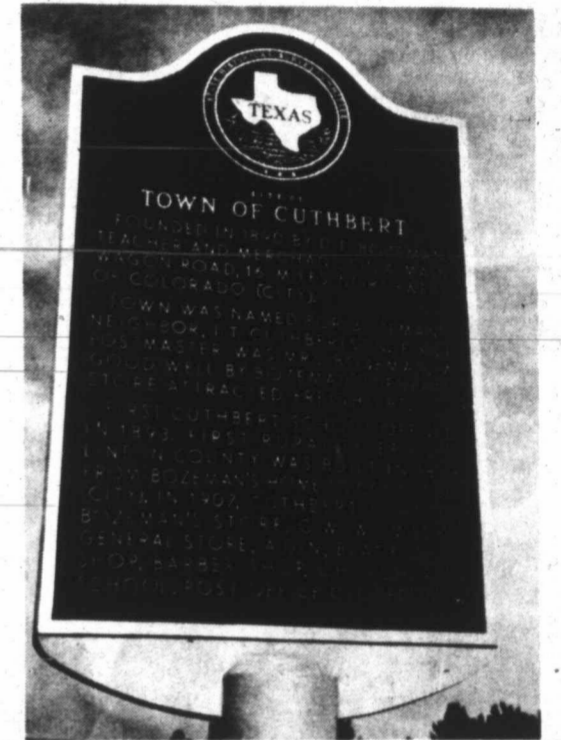

Cuthbert Lonely Markers

Two historical markers in the Cuthbert area testify to the early settlement of that area of the county. Both markers stand in prairie that is almost deserted now, with only the sounds of an occasional passing vehicle or a tractor plowing in the distance to break the silence.

The Cuthbert marker denotes the history of the town site of Cuthbert, once a busy freight stopping point when freighters were hauling materials from the Colorado City freight depot of the Texas & Pacific Railroad to ranches and towns as far away as the Panhandle.

Another marker in the area once known as Teville commemorates the Handley Cemetery. Inscription reads:

Site of Town of Cuthbert
Founded in 1890 by D. T. Bozeman, teacher and merchant, on a main wagon road, 16 miles northwest of Colorado (City).

Town was named for Bozeman's neighbor, T. T. Cuthbertson. First postmaster was Mrs. Bozeman. A good well by Bozeman's General Store attracted freighters. First Cuthbert school opened in 1893. First rural telephone line in county was built in 1898 from Bozeman's home to Colorado (City). In 1907, Cuthbert boasted Bozeman's store, G. W. Womack's General Store, a gin, blacksmith shop, barber shop, church and school. Post office closed, 1959.

The Cuthbert marker is located just west of Highway 1229 at Cuthbert. It was dedicated in 1969.

The Handley Cemetery marker is also on Highway 1229 a few miles south of Cuthbert. It was dedicated in 1970. The inscription reads:

Handley Cemetery
(in area known as Teville)

Site given by John J. Handley (1842-1935), Confederate veteran who settled here in 1892, after living earlier in Georgia and in Smith and Comanche Counties, Texas. A farmer, he lived to see agriculture rival ranching.

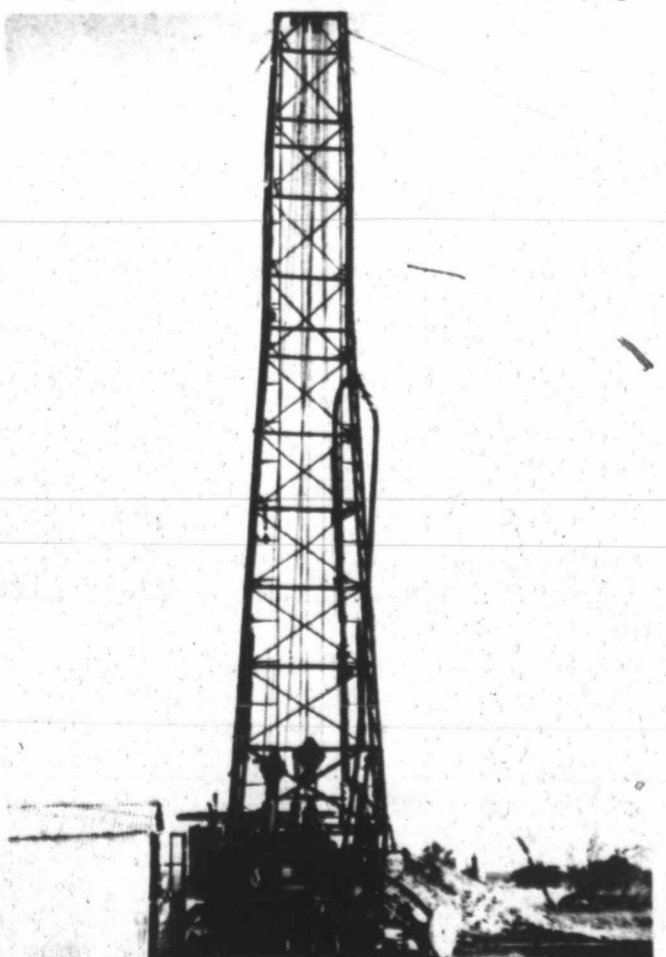
Teville (named for "T" junction in road) post office was opened here in 1906; closed 1910.

W. E. Berry, with W. H. Badgett, surveyed 4-acre cemetery, 1914. Graves were moved from across road into this ground. In 1945, Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Strain gave one acre to enlarge the cemetery.

Four generations of Handley's family and neighbors rest here.

Avoid Hurt Feelings

Did you ever have this happen to you? You started the new day with a song in your heart. There was a smile on your lips and you felt at peace with the world. Then, you learned that someone had made an uncomplimentary remark about you. And since your emotional radar screen was not working well enough to filter out the inconsequential annoyance, you allowed it to completely upset your emotional stability. Suddenly your feelings were hurt deeply and you changed into a melancholy mood. The song quickly vanished from your heart, the smile disappeared from your lips, and you allowed one little careless, discordant remark to discolor your entire outlook.

Under the pressure, strain and swift pace of our busy lives, hurt feelings occur too often.

Supervisors and personnel directors say that countless hours of valuable time are lost annually because employees allow their feelings to be hurt over trivial or inconsequential incidents. They permit themselves to become annoyed, distressed and troubled over the smallest provocations.

Hurt feelings can close many avenues to peace of mind. They can turn tranquility and patience into scorn and vindictiveness.

Wounded pride can completely derail our train of serene thought.

It can distract us from our worthy pursuits, can turn our calm emotions to violence and arrogance. Hurt feelings are capable of impairing normal bodily functions, of lowering efficiency, of sapping strength and of warping judgment. Hurt feelings have a noticeable deteriorating effect upon the normal functioning of mental and physical faculties.

It is only when we show a weakness or lack of self-control and permit outside disturbances to get inside that they can upset our mental stability and give us hurt feelings.

The Canadian philosopher, Robert Burns Stroughten, wrote that most of the miseries and woes of the world do not result deliberately from evil or wickedness or bad governments, but from innocent misunderstandings between human beings.

It would be a wise practice to try to rationally analyze annoyances and peevish irritations as they occur. We might ask ourselves a few questions, do we ever do things that hurt others? Do we sometimes, say things behind another's back that would offend him if he heard them? Do we say only the things that are helpful? Do we carefully consider each statement involving another person before we utter it?

We should profit by our frank answers, realizing the things that hurt and distress us also hurt and distress others. This should alert us to be more careful not to do or say things that hurt others. It is essential that we learn the importance of ignoring inconsequential irritations. We should guard against giving too much thought or attention to things which are of small importance.

It isn't easy to overlook criticism, abuse, arrogance or misrepresentation. In fact it requires a genuine effort, a firm resolve and a strong determination to master our mental faculties. It isn't easy, but oh, it is so important! For when we learn to overcome hurt feelings and petty offenses, we shall be rewarded in happier, healthier and more useful lives.

Our doctors warn us that a person who allows himself to be unduly influenced or upset by anger or gossip is courting illness. Hurt feelings, absurd fancies and trivial grievances have kept countless men and women from achieving their highest attainment. Don't let these deter you. When you are right you can afford to keep your temper; when you are wrong, you can't afford to lose it. Maybe you should avoid some people who annoy, upset and hurt you. Pardon the phraseology, but remember, the less you have to do with some people, the less you are worse off.

We must determine to master situations before they master us. We must adopt a stern course of self-command and keep external forces on the outside. We must protect our minds from annoyances as diligently as we would guard our bodies from foods that may cause illness. We must strive to be too big to let little things upset us! We must ignore incidents that are inconsequential. We must say to ourselves, "...Nothing that happens outside of me today can hurt me from within, for I am master of my life. I'm going to avoid hurt feelings."

Bond Sales Announced

Series E and H United States Savings Bond sales in Mitchell County during the month of July totaled \$5,381, according to County Bond Chairman Wayne Shown. Sales for the seven-month period were \$99,465 for 66% of the 1974 sales goal of \$150,000.

Sales in Texas during the month amounted to \$19,640,596, while sales for the same period last year totaled \$17,185,499--an increase of 14%. Year-

to-date sales amounted to \$136,083,685 with 57% of the yearly sales goal of \$236.8 million achieved.

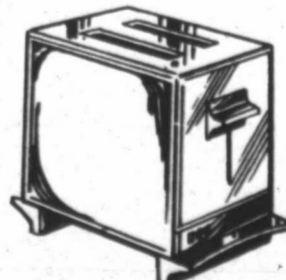

Question: What financial assistance is available to students at Colorado City?

Answer: Financial Aids are available in the form of grants, loans and scholarships as well as veterans' benefits. The specific programs available for grants are the Basic Educational Opportunity Grants (any full-time student who did not attend college before April 1, 1973, may apply) and the Law Enforcement Education Program (for in-service law enforcement personnel). The available loan programs are the National Direct Student Loan program and the Federally Insured Student Loan program. Mrs. Wilma Crawford is the Financial Aids Officer at WTC.

Question: Where will the classes be held and who is paying for these classes?

Answer: The Colorado City Independent School district has made facilities available at Colorado High School for these classes. Tuition and state appropriation will be used to defray the costs of instruction and supplies. Tax money from Scurry County cannot be used to support this activity, so the classes at Colorado City must have sufficient enrollment to meet basic costs.

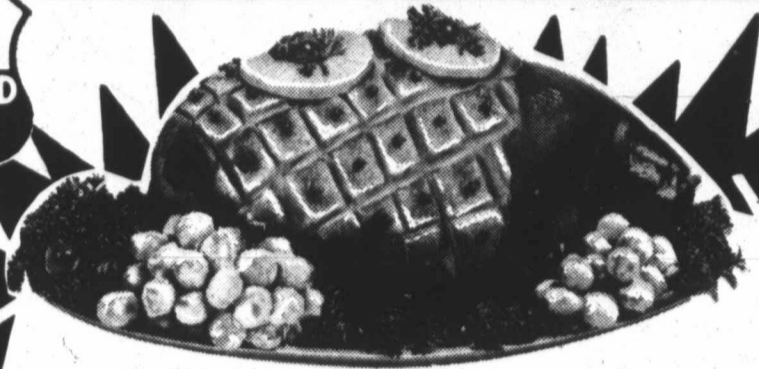

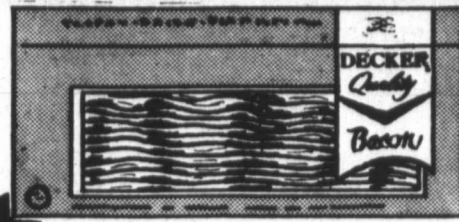

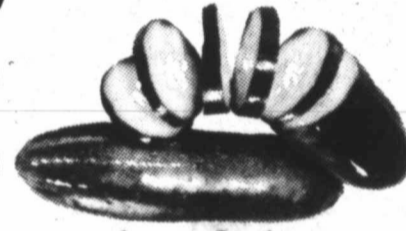
