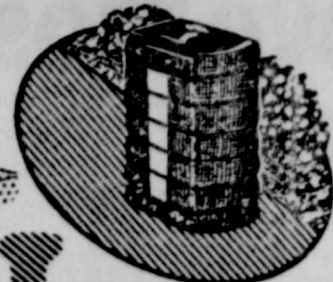

Briscoe County Junior Fat Stock Show Sat., Jan. 24

Premium List; Rules, For Junior Fat Stock Show Saturday

Plans have been perfected for opening the Briscoe County Junior Fat Stock Show in Silvertown Saturday morning, January 24. Board of Directors for this year's show are as follows: D. T. Northcutt, Bill Edwards, Seymour Brannon, Joe Mercer, John Lee Francis, Bill Helms, Homer Stephens, Robert Hill, Glenn Morrison, True Burson, W. E. Schott, Jr., and Oliver Ware. Show Officials and Sifting Committee are: General Superintendent W. E. Schott, Jr.; Assistant Supt., Jack Mayfield; Assistant Supt., R. M. Ledbetter; Assistant Supt., Elmer Berryhill; Official Judge, Charles Smallwood, head Agriculture Department West Texas State College.

A planned program will be carried out as follows:

- 9:30 a. m. all livestock on the show grounds.
- 10:00 a. m. judging of fat barrows.
- 11:00 a. m. judging breeding gilts.
- 11:30 a. m. judging of fat lambs.
- 1:00 p. m. judging of fat steers.
- 3:00 p. m. show dismissed.

Rules and Regulations

The following rules and regulations have been approved for the show and will be followed in carrying out the show:

1. All exhibits will be under the control direction of the management, but the show will in no case be responsible for any damage that may occur.
2. Entries in all classes shall be made on or before 12:00 noon January 17, 1959.
3. All animals must be on the show grounds not later than 9:30 a. m., January 24, 1959.
4. The shifting committee will visit all questionable animals two weeks or less before the show and advise the owner if the animals are objectionable.
5. All exhibitors of Fat Stock must be bona fide members of active FFA Chapters or 4-H Clubs in Briscoe County. The exhibitors will be required to have a record book which may or may not be called for.
6. All animals must have been the property of the owner and exhibitor throughout the feeding period. Such feeding period shall begin a reasonable length of time before the show date in order to give the animal being fed sufficient time to be finished for market.
7. All calves in dry lot classes must have been weaned by November 1, 1958. Calves which nursed cow since that time must be entered in the Milk Fed Class.
8. No calf will be accepted in the show ring that is not halter broken and fitted for show. Any animal may be ordered out of show by the superintendent for failure of exhibitor to comply with this rule.
9. Each exhibitor shall exhibit his own animals and be responsible for their care while on the show grounds. In cases where an exhibitor has two animals in the same class, he may select another member of his organization to exhibit his extra animal. No animal will be allowed to hold any animal or assist the exhibitor while the animals are being judged. Sickness or disability approved by the Superintendent will justify allowing another person to

10. Each exhibitor may enter in single classes not more than three animals in each division.

11. All feed and bedding for the animals will be furnished by the management.

12. The classification weight of the animal upon entering the show and such weight will take preference over any other weight of the animal.

13. In all classes where less than five entries are exhibited, the premium will be divided in half. Class number one—Light Barrows, 170-224 lbs. first, \$10.00; second \$7.50; third \$5.00; fourth, \$3.00; fifth, to 10th, \$2.00.

Class Number 2—Heavy Barrows, 225-270 lbs. Premiums same as class Number 1.

Class Number 3—First and second place animals from classes 1 and 2. Grand Champion Barrow, \$10.00; Reserve Champion Barrow, \$7.50.

Class Number 4—Breeding Gilts over 150 pounds.

Class Number 5, Market Lambs; First, \$10.00; second, \$7.50; third, \$5.00; fourth, \$3.00; all others, \$2.00.

Class Number 6—Light Dry Lot Steers, 650-849 lbs. First \$25.00; second, \$20.00; third, \$17.50; fourth, \$15.00; fifth, \$10.00; sixth, \$7.50; all others in the class, \$5.00.

Class Number 7. Heavy Dry Lot Steers over 849 lbs. Premiums same as class Number 6.

Class Number 8. Group of two steers fed and owned by one exhibitor. First, \$10.00; second \$7.50; third, \$5.00; fourth, \$2.50.

Class Number 9. First and Second place animals from classes 6, 7, and 8. Grand Champion Steer, \$25.00; Reserve Champion Steer, \$20.00.

Silvertown Junior High School Basketball Tournament

The Silvertown Junior High School girls and boys won second and consolation honors in the Junior High Basketball Tournament which was held January 16 and 17 in the Silvertown High School gym.

The Happy boys won first place in the boys division by defeating Kress 33 to 25, and the Claude girls took home first place honors after defeating Silvertown 43 to 26. In the Consolation bracket, the Lockney Junior High girls won a close game from Kress 26 to 20 to win the Consolation trophy. The boys consolation award went to Silvertown boys for defeating Lockney in a close game. The final score was 18 to 15 with the Silvertown boys taking the win.

There were sixteen teams, eight boys teams and eight girls teams, participating in the weekend tournament. In all, some 240 junior high school boys and girls took part in the tournament. All of the schools represented were from this area and each school and player gave a fine account of their school's sportsmanship. The teams represented were Turkey, Quitaque, Silvertown, Kress, Claude, Lakeview, Happy and Lockney.

In the first round of play Turkey girls defeated Quitaque; Silvertown girls won over Kress; Claude beat Lakeview; and Happy defeated Lockney. In the boys' division of first round play Quitaque won from Turkey; Kress beat Silvertown; Claude defeated Lakeview; and Happy defeated Lockney. The winners of the first round play advanced to the winners of semi-finals, and the losers went into the consolation semi-finals. In the semi-finals Silvertown girls defeated Turkey; Claude beat Happy and in the boys division semi-finals Kress beat Claude; and Happy won from Quitaque.

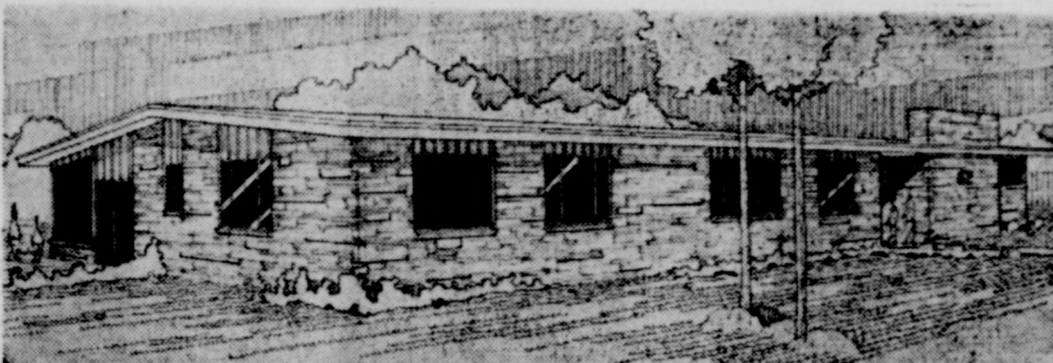

County Farmers Vote On Cotton Classing Office For District

Ballots were mailed out this week from the County Agents' office to one third of the cotton growers in Briscoe County. This ballot was a preliminary one to determine if there was enough interest in Briscoe County to establish a Cotton sub-classing office at Memphis, Texas.

This ballot was requested by the Agricultural Marketing Service at Dallas to get the wishes of a sampling of Briscoe County cotton farmers. This all stems from some meetings that have been held at Memphis and Childress requesting the AMS to establish a cotton classing office in this general area. Memphis was agreed on.

County Agent Ledbetter said in making the decision as to which way to vote, two things that the Agricultural Marketing Service advised farmers to keep in mind were: 1. That the establishment of an office in Memphis will not necessarily mean quicker returns for green cards. The situation at Lubbock and Altus was one of not having enough classers and not one of space. The same situation could arise at any new office if like harvest conditions happened.

2. A new office would have to be paid for by the producers, either the purchase or renting of one. The classing staff is furnished by the Agricultural Marketing Service.

This was all the information that is available at this time. Everyone that received ballots should return them by the 31st of January.

Construction of a cottage-type dormitory at Cal Farley's famous Boys Ranch near Amarillo, Texas is the 1959 project for the United Peace Officers of America, according to Sheriff Day Thompson, of Vega, president of the national association.

The project was approved this week at a meeting of the board of directors of the organization. The new dormitory will be designed especially for boys in the four to eight year age bracket, Thompson said.

In the new building, eight of these smaller youngsters will live with a man and his wife. The house mother will prepare all meals and the entire surroundings will be as nearly like a real home as possible, and there will always be a houseparent on hand to look after the little fellows.

At the present time, 17 boys below eight years of age are living in the Old Tascosa courthouse, and it has long been the aim of Ranch founder Cal Farley to be able to provide a more homelike atmosphere for them. Most of the small boys came to the Ranch along with older brothers so that the brothers would not have to be separated and also in many cases, to remove the little fellows from unwholesome environments, Sheriff Thompson explained.

In 1955, the United Peace Officers of America was organized to assist Boys Ranch in a building program. The first project was the Boys Ranch Independent School and since that time the group—composed of peace officers, sheriffs, highway patrolmen, rangers and FBI men from all over the United States and Canada—has helped with raising funds for the new dining hall and in many other ways, says Cal Farley. The Boys Ranch school is dedicated to the members of UPOA.

"We are hopeful that we will be able to raise enough money to build the dormitory by May, when we will hold our annual convention at Boys Ranch," said Sheriff Thompson. "Boys Ranch has helped the peace officers by taking youngsters who were in trouble and is making good, useful citizens of them, and we know that when we take a boy to the Ranch, he is one youngster we will not have to be running after any more."

First event on the program will be the judging of fat barrows at 10:00. This will be followed by the judging of heavy barrows, gilts and the grand and reserve champion barrow of the show. Lambs will be judged at 11:00 a. m. This will conclude the morning events.

Starting promptly at 1:00 p. m. the fat steer classes will be judged. Finding up the judging will be the grand and reserve champion steer of the show. This will be followed by the placing of two calves fed and exhibited by one boy.

Mr. Charles Smallwood, head of the agriculture department at West Texas State College, at Canyon will be the official judge. Mr. Smallwood comes here with high recommendations as a judge of livestock.

The board in its official meeting, elected three new directors for the stock show. They were Louie Kitchens, Pascal Garrison, and Denver Anderson. Ben Whitfill was officially elected secretary after months of acting in this position.

General Superintendent Schott said this morning that it would take \$500.00 dollars to put on the show. He said he would like to reach this goal and go above with enough to pay the debt of the stock show building. This fine building was purchased and moved at a cost of \$4,300.00. The amount outstanding on the building is only \$300.00. The rest was paid by the Silvertown FFA Chapter and the Stock Show Board. A large part of this money had been raised over the years with buying this building in mind.

CAP ROCK SOIL DISTRICT NEWS

Dock Wallace has recently completed a plan under the Great Plains Conservation Program. Wallace's place is nine miles south and five miles east of Silverton. His major cost show practices include one and possibly two farm ponds for livestock water. These ponds will be built to give him at least ten feet depth of water. Wallace's plan also calls for other good management practices such as stubble mulching and a good crop rotation. It might be noted that Wallace is already doing a good job of carrying out his management practices. Others interested in the Great Plains Conservation Program should contact their district supervisors or personnel in the S. C. S. office at Silverton for further information. This program is based on a good, sound conservation plan for a farm or ranch and cost share is available to help participants in carrying out their plans.

Tower Completed Near Silverton For Memphis TV

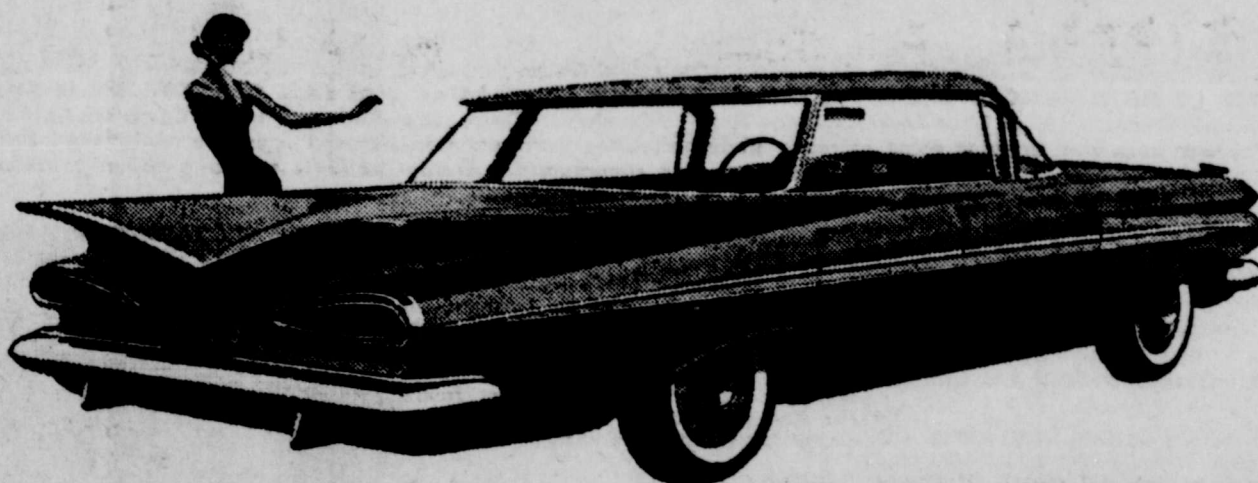

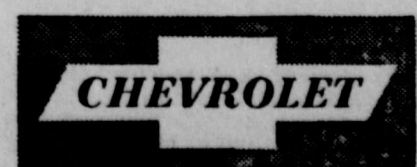

Three Faces of Crippling—and One of Hope

Andrew, Gwen and Richard are three bright youngsters you won't find riding bicycles in front of your house. You won't find them climbing trees or playing ball in the corner lot. More likely you will find them in hospitals.

When you look into their faces, the three faces of crippling, you know why your support for the March of Dimes now is more urgent than ever. Together they symbolize why the National Foundation has undertaken a new, expanded health program. Medical care and rehabilitation can help them. But the great promise is medical scientific research.

POLIO

Andrew Lange is six. He has been a patient in the March of Dimes-supported Rancho Los Amigos Respiratory Center in Downey, Calif. He symbolizes the crippling that polio holds in store for many of its victims.

During the past few years polio incidence has declined sharply, thanks to Salk vaccine. But what about Andrew? Modern rehabilitation can help restore something of his birthright to health. During 1958 about 50,000 polio victims received this kind of aid from the March of Dimes totaling \$18,900,000. Such aid will continue in 1959.

Andrew needed and received the attention that special medical skills can give. These skills are now being applied to aid in the solution of other crippling diseases.

ARTHRTIS

The face of arthritis doesn't always show. The symptoms come and go for some; but when they are present the pain is great. Gwen Burdick, seven, dark-haired, has always been an independent little girl. She doesn't want anyone to do things for her. That spells courage. She's got lots of it.

When Gwen was three years old she

developed stiffness of the neck. She had trouble moving her knees and hips. Diagnosis: rheumatoid arthritis. In a Cleveland hospital she was in traction for weeks, then in a plaster cast. For eight months she had to wear braces 24 hours a day, then at night only for another six months. When her mother first heard she had rheumatoid arthritis, she exclaimed: "What? In a child?"

Statistics show that about 16,000 child victims are likely to seek treatment in any given year for rheumatoid arthritis and Still's disease. The National Foundation plans to offer March of Dimes assistance to patients through 18 and will push research that will be meaningful to sufferers of all ages.

BIRTH DEFECTS

Richard Farmer is only nine, but he has been admitted 12 times for treatment in the Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation in New York City. The Institute receives financial grants from the March of Dimes for various phases of its work.

Richard has birth defects that affect the spine and the head, which go by the medical terms of spina bifida and hydrocephalus. He has had four operations. Now he can walk with the aid of braces and crutches.

Statistics show that each year some 250,000 American infants with some form of birth defect (congenital malformation) come into the world. The National Foundation has pledged patient aid to victims through 18 with birth defects involving the central nervous system, such as spina bifida, hydrocephalus and encephalocele.

Half of these cases are believed to be hereditary; half may be due to injury or infections affecting the embryo in early pregnancy. Research offers the only real hope for a solution, all-out research of the kind that produced the Salk vaccine in less than 20 years. Medical scientific

research is the core of the National Foundation's new and expanded program.

THE HOPE

The research program financed by the March of Dimes covers the problems of polio, arthritis, birth defects, and basic research in various diseases and disorders of the central nervous system. As new leads are discovered, they will be pursued with vigor. The underlying aim of the new program is the improvement of man's health. The speed with which the program develops depends in large part on results of the 1959 March of Dimes.
