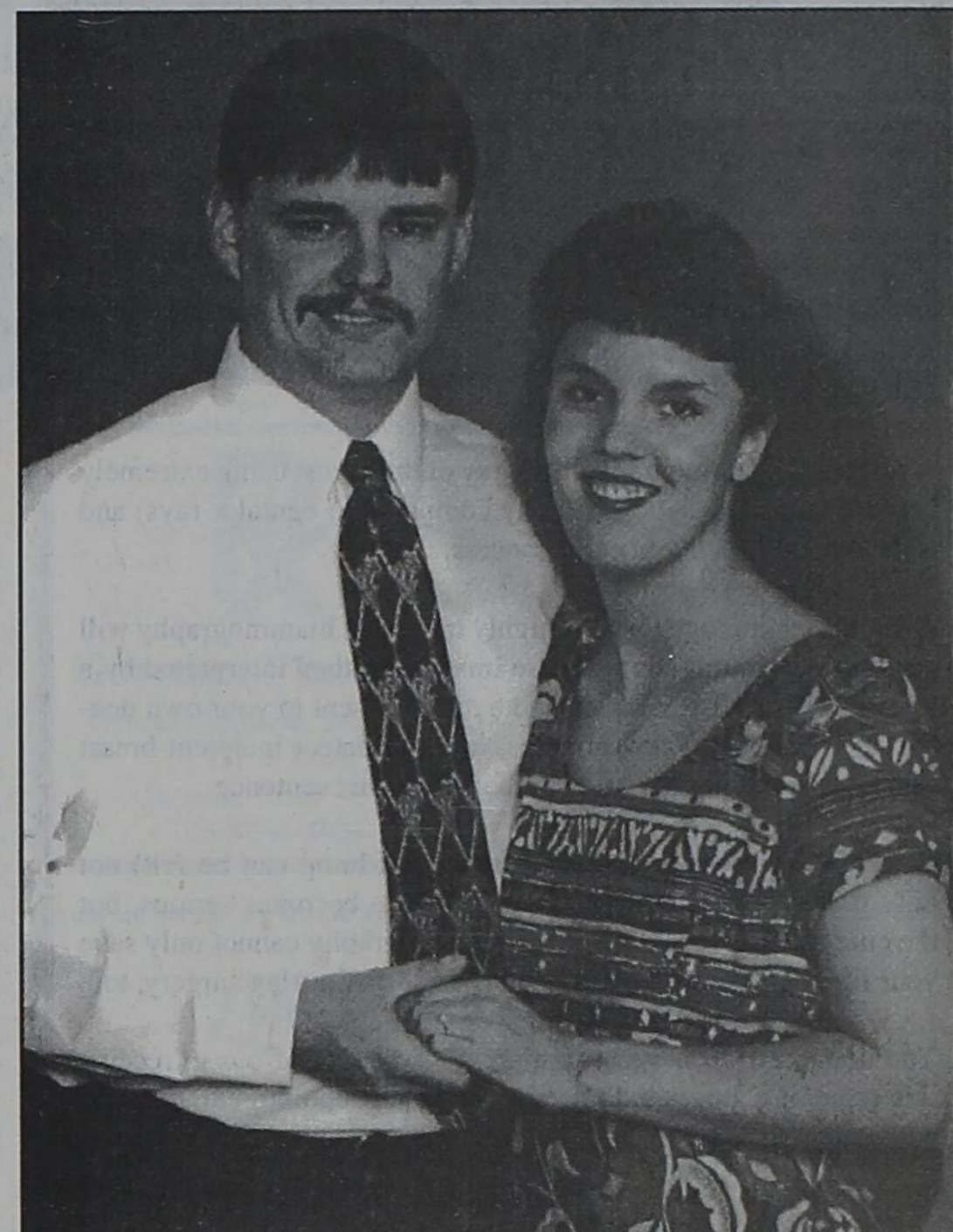

Ranch Estate Planning Seminar
Set For August

"A properly drawn estate plan may
save many ranch families over
\$200,000 in estate taxes." This state-
ment made by Wayne A. Hayenga,
Texas Extension Economist and Attor-
ney, assumes a lot of information: a
married couple who "like each other"
and want to care for each other, who
have a ranch worth \$1 million or more,
and want to pass it on to their children.

This is an eye opening fact for many
ranchers. In fact, many people only
worry about estate planning if they
hear of a friend's "problem" in selling
a ranch to pay estate taxes. "But,"
Hayenga continued, "for many fami-
lies the estate tax savings are not as
large as income tax savings if they
have a properly prepared estate plan."

A two-day seminar talking about
these complicated tax topics will be

held at College Station on August 10
and 11 at Texas A&M University in
conjunction with the Annual Beef
Cattle Short course.

The seminar is structured to help
ranchers learn how to lower their tax
burden and ease administrative bur-
dens that affect passing their estates
to their loved ones. In addition to dis-
cussing estate planning systems, tax
savings possibilities will be discussed
using corporations, partnerships and
trusts when family members are in-
volved in the business.

Making gifts to avoid estate taxes
will be discussed also. "There are three
problems with making gifts—the first
is dying poor; the second is the adverse
income tax consequences the gift can
cause the recipient; the third is when
somebody other than your intended
beneficiary ultimately gets the gifted
property.

Two problems that affect family op-
erations—planning for inflation and
growth needs of the business will be
discussed. Another topic, how to be
fair among all children when one child
is interested in the ranch and others are
not, will be addressed.

The speaker, Wayne A Hayenga, is
a Professor and Extension Specialist
with the Texas Agricultural Extension
Service. An agricultural economist
and attorney, Dr. Hayenga works ex-
tensively with farmers, ranchers and
family-owned firms in financial, busi-
ness and estate tax planning. He is a
member of the Texas and American
Bar Associations and the American
Agricultural Law Association. He is
active in the Agricultural Law Com-
mittee of the State Bar of Texas.

Dr. Hayenga is an excellent com-
municator. He delivers a top-notch
educational program, emphasizing key
points with an entertaining style, illus-
trating estate and income tax law pro-
visions with practical examples that
make learning a pleasure. His teach-
ing makes full use of his broad back-
ground and practical experience as a
farmer, lender and lawyer.

Post Office Compost
May Improve
Vegetable Crops

FORT WORTH--Extension Service
horticulturist Nancy Roe takes deliv-
ery this month on the first load of
composted mail from a Postal Service
project and begins tests on tomato
crops in the field. She also plans green-
house studies looking for any possible
toxicity to plants. The composting
project between the U.S. Postal Ser-
vice (USPS) and Silver Creek Mate-
rials Recycling & Compost in Fort
Worth is the first in the nation.

A half-ton sample from the more
than 150 tons of undeliverable busi-
ness bulk mail, turned into compost by
Silver Creek, will be shipped to the
Texas A&M Research and Extension
Center in Stephenville. Roe will test
the compost on more than 300 tomato
plants of a single variety in 30 plots.

"A short-term benefit here is that
materials we consider trash become a
valuable resource to be recycled, rather
than adding 150 tons of paper to the
landfill," said Roe. "We hope to ex-
amine the effect on growth and yield
on tomatoes in the field. We want to
examine nutrient value, how it affects
microorganisms in the soil, both good
and bad, and whether it improves the
soil's ability to hold water and nutri-
ents."

Roe received a USPS grant to
evaluate the value of composting as a
means of disposing of waste paper. At
present, the Postal Service recycles
more than a million tons of materials
a year and wants to test this program
as a way to keep undeliverable mail
from going to America's landfills.
Some compost now goes back to post
offices in the Dallas-Fort Worth area
for use in landscaping.

Silver Creek Materials received the
1997 Governor's Award for Environ-
mental Excellence in the Small Busi-
ness Category. Field trials of their
compost product will compare three
different application rates of the com-
post with and without added fertilizer.
The composting process reduces the
volume by about half so that the origi-
nal 150 tons of discarded paper shrinks
to about 75 tons.

"We may not see significant results
in immediate use," Roe said. "Com-
post is not a fast-acting fertilizer treat-
ment, but rebuilds the soil over time.
It's similar to the difference between
eating sugar directly and eating a piece
of bread. Both are carbohydrates, but
the bread acts more slowly. The long-
term potential for commercial grow-
ers to use a recycled product like this
in field crops and green houses could
be significant. That's why we're do-
ing these tests."

Roe expects to have growth data
in late September at the end of the
growing season. The grant extends
only for one crop year. The USPS and
Silver Creek hope the pilot effort will
be a model for other composting part-
nerships across the country.
