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Traffic Target: 3 Lane Parking

New traffic plan effective Thursday at Kelley Elementary School will seek to alleviate these three lanes of parking that cause congestion and danger for children, Mrs. Don Fite, Principal Esten Blackmon and Police Chief Jesse Browning with a group of children point out the daily afternoon traffic tangle.

School's Traffic Pattern Changes

Afternoon traffic pattern at Frank Kelley Elementary School changes Thursday and officials are hopeful it will aid safety and reduce congestion.

The change will follow a 10-point traffic plan worked out in a cooperative effort by city school officials and Kelley Elementary Parent-Teacher Association.

It is all aimed at the school's 2:30 p.m. dismissal time.

Parents arriving to pickup children leaving school are confronted with more and more congestion.

Some cars turn into marked parking area at the curb, but others stop behind the curb parked cars and these lines double and triple park.

This congestion and stalls traffic, prevents cars parked at the curb from moving out and created a danger to pupils who must weave in and out the lanes of cars to reach their parents vehicle or to cross the street while walking home.

Here is the joint school-city-

PTA traffic plan which will begin Thursday:

1. First grade and kindergarten classes only will exit at the school's East door (regular first grade entrance at the south and facing East).

2. Second grade students only will exit at the west door (main entrance facing Walnut).

3. Third grade students will exit as usual at 3:15 p.m.

4. Parents of first grade and kindergarten pupils will park on the school's east side (on Elm) head-in to curb. No double parking allowed.

5. Parents of second grade pupils will park on west side (on Walnut) head-in to curb. No double parking allowed.

6. Both streets (Elm and Walnut) at Kelley Elementary at this dismissal time will be one-way, cars moving north to south only.

7. Parents with a child in first grade and another in second grade, or one in kindergarten and another in second, will park on the school's west

side (Walnut), where the older child will exit.

8. There will be no parent parking on the school's south side (14th St.). This area will be reserved for school buses and teacher parking only.

9. Police patrolmen will be on duty the first week when children are arriving and children are departing school. After the initial period, the patrolman will be on duty only in bad weather.

10. Morning unloading of children at Kelley Elementary will continue as usual on the east side (Elm).

"This is cooperative effort for the protection of our children," City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr. said, "and we urge the cooperation of all parents so this plan can be carried out smoothly with safety and convenience for all."

Officials have emphasized that the key to the new traffic plan is that parents cooperate by using the entrance designated for them and by parking head-on into the curb.

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County Tax Values Increase \$3 Million

Mitchell County plans to spend a total of \$686,643 to operate its government and services for 1971.

That is an increase of \$51,340 more than is tabbed for the current 12 months ending Dec. 31.

You can thank oil field water flooding the Westbrook area for its helping hand in the new budget.

Commissioners Court plans to meet money requirements for 1971 without a tax increase and with no change in the valuation base for property taxes.

Service Company Morgan Creek plant, gas and oil pipe lines, plus other oil and utilities properties are listed as \$25,195,860 for assessed valuation.

All other properties -- through the county -- push valuations to a total of \$37,843,098.

And that's an all-time high for Mitchell County.

With the increase in valuation, the county expects a 98

per cent collection of taxes during the year to accomplish budget's financing at this year's and last year's tax rate.

Largest estimated expenditure for the upcoming '71 county budget is \$252,338 for road and bridge maintenance and building in the four precincts.

Next highest is \$153,775 for the general fund, which covers a wide range of the Courthouse day-to-day operation and Mitchell County Library.

Third in line is the officers salary fund with a planned expenditure of \$126,970.

Budgeted also next year are \$9,615 for the jury fund; \$15,300 for permanent improvement fund; \$12,785 for interest and sinking funds; \$115,860 for farm to market and lateral roads.

Major expenditure hikes are in the road-bridge funds, up from current \$229,130 by more than \$22,000, and in general fund up from current \$119,618 by more than \$30,000.

Sales Cash Up

City Sales Tax Set Record

Retail sales here in April, May and June have provided Colorado City with its most sales tax dollars for the yearly second quarter.

Check to the municipal budget arriving from Austin amounts to \$13,408.43 for this

second quarter--highest since the state and city sales tax began more than two years ago.

The \$13,408.43 also is above the January-February-March sales tax allocation for Colorado City this year and last year.

Total gross sales tax for the three-month quarter ending June 30 allocated for Colorado City is \$13,692.37, according to notification to City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr.

In 1968, the same quarter produced a gross of only \$11,990.20 for Colorado City and last year 1969, gross allocation for the city was still below this new 1970 figure at \$12,466.71.

The net figure of \$13,408.43 is allocated after a 2 per cent state fee of \$273.85 is deducted prior balances in a reserve plan are adjusted.

The April-May-June quarter of 1970 indicates that retail sales for taxable items in Colorado City those three months were near the one and a half million dollars mark.

Colorado City gross share of the sales tax--one per cent while the state received 3.25 per cent--was \$12,996.19, which was higher than the same period of 1969.

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Adult Studies • Registration on Oct. 6 For Expanding Education Program

Registration is scheduled Oct. 6 for Colorado Independent School District's 1970-71 basic education program.

Prospective students can register for four separate levels of study in this year's program, fourth consecutive by the school district.

Registration will be from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. in Colorado High Oct. 6, according to Gary Gardner, administrative assistant to Supt. Lloyd McKee.

Classes will begin the following Tuesday, continuing on a twice weekly schedule (Tuesday and Thursday) for 100 hours of instruction between 7 and 9 p.m.

Four levels for which

adults may register for the basic education program are:

Level 1 -- For those who desire to learn to read, do basic arithmetic and to be familiar with basic communication skills of listening, speaking and writing.

Level 2 -- For those who want to complete the sixth grade level.

Level 3 -- For those who want to complete the courses equivalent to seventh and eighth grade.

Level 4 -- Completion of this course will enable the student to secure an equivalency certificate comparable to the high school diploma.

It is this fourth level--the final study for the certificate--

that is new in the expanded adult program this fall.

There is no cost to students participating in adult basic education studies, Gardner emphasized. Only requirement is that the student is 18 years of age or older.

A Citizens advisory committee consults with school district administrators in the program, which has been praised here for valuable work since its start four years ago.

Members of the current advisory committee are Rev. Robert Bracy, Mrs. Ola Mae Johnson, an adult basic student, Mrs. Henry Heredia, Manuel Rivera, Frank Prewitt, Mrs. J. S. (Jay) Craddock, Dr. Billy B. Bridgford, Jeff Taylor, Eddie Piland, Mrs. J. B. Hilliard,

Ted Burgoon, Bill Carter, City Manager J. A. Sadler Jr., Loraine Supt. Leroy Scott, McKee and Gardner.

The 70-71 ABE program will move forward into new cultural studies as well as expand its program into practical work, citizenship and community skills.

Black and Mexican-American cultures and histories will be in this year's study program to focus pride in the black and Mexican heritages.

There will be new methods in learning to read and interpret newspapers, new math and reading materials, standard English for both Black dialect and Spanish speakers of English.

All, of course, will be geared especially for adults and their specific interests.

Included in the expanded program will be informative discussions on topics of interest by various community members. Mrs. Craddock and Mrs. Caddo Matthews, Colorado High homemaking teachers, will present new versions of homemaking skills in mini form. Other discussions will inform the adult students to citizenship rights under the law, narcotics problems and suggested solutions, mental health and aids to benefit mentally ill, traffic safety and securing of driver's license, city pride and city problems, health needs and where help can be obtained, opportunities through training in area trade schools.

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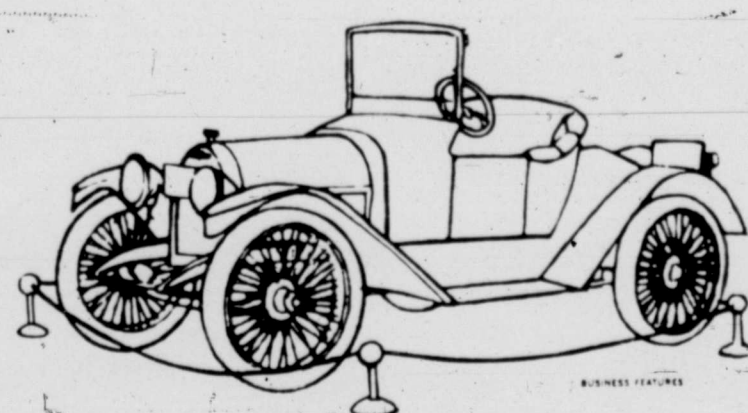

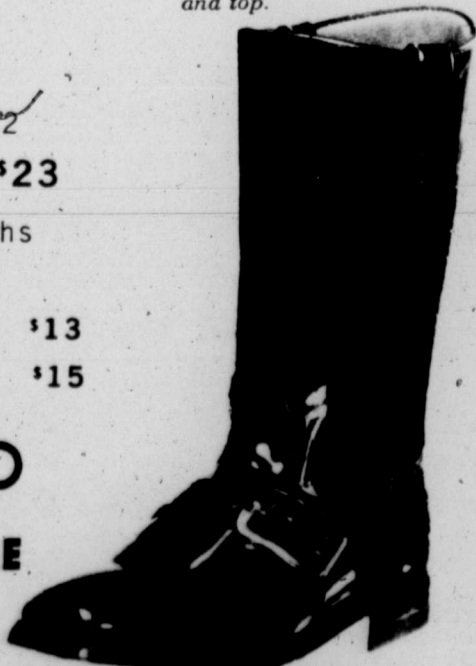
