Texas Women on Pilgrimage

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Thirty-four Texas mothers and widows this summer will visit the final resting places of sons and husbands lost in the world war, according to plans made by the government for a pilgrimage to the battlefields of France.

First of the Atlantic liners, to take American women on a second visit to the little white crosses will sail from New York May 6. All expenses will be borne by the war department. Last summer nearly 5000 Gold Star mothers and widows were given the trip as the government began to repay in a small way contributions of life made during the great war.

The trip costs the government approximately \$850 per person.

A "Contented Man," Wanting Nothing Is Shaw, Once Mogul of All Arabia

A "contented man," seeking nothing, wanting nothing, happy at tinkering with a piece of machinery; a man devoid of all ambition "which is the cause of most of the evils of mankind"—that is the former Col. T. E. Lawrence, now plain air-craftsman Shaw, once dictator of Arabia and today, by his own choice, a humbled mechanic in the British air force.

Following is the second of a series of articles by Henry T. Russell, of the United Press Bureau, obtained by him through frank conversation with this "man of mystery."

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PLYMOUTH, Eng., April 21.—After a long time, Shaw, once that romantic "Lawrence of Arabia" whose word was law from Aleppo to Mecca, who wedded Arabian princes and potentates and tribesmen into a steel force and swept the Turkish armies from the desert, who built an empire and lived as a dictator, has but two small ambitions.

Perhaps air-craftsman Shaw would prefer to call them desires, other than ambitions, for "ambition," to his mind, "is the cause of most of mankind's evils."

His two desires are merely to experience the thrill of leaping from an airplane with a parachute, to write for a living without trading upon the romance of his name.

60-DAY TRUCE DECLARED IN EAST TEXAS

GOVERNMENT TROOPS MOVE UPON REBELS

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras, April 21.—The government of President Vicente Mejia Caudines enforced drastic military measures today in an effort to suppress the revolutionary movement in northern Honduras.

Marshal law was declared throughout the nation and military officials were ordered to lead loyal reinforcements to the affected region centering around the cities of Tegucigalpa, Ceiba, Tela and Truxillo where a serious situation prevailed.

The frontiers were closed to prevent return of political exiles.

HOOPER DENOUNCES SANDINO

WASHINGTON, April 21.—President Hoover today denounced the Nicaraguan insurgent General Augusto Sandino as "having placed himself outside the civilized pale by the cold-blooded murder of eight or nine American citizens."

REBELS EXPECT TO SEIZE CAPITAL

MEXICO CITY, April 21.—Wireless reports from Honduras today said the revolutionary leaders expected to enter Tegucigalpa not later than Tuesday.

"WE MUST HAVE FOREIGN MARKETS"

This was the declaration made in the city of San Antonio by Seymour Lowman of New York, the right-hand man of Andrew W. Mellon.

"We must have foreign markets," or restrict the acreage of wheat and cotton to the demands of home consumption under American skies. Lowman threw down the gauntlet to Soviet Russia when he said "we must have foreign markets" but he did not furnish the information as to how it will be possible to win foreign markets by shutting out foreigners and their goods and staples from the ports of entry of the United States.

This is his viewpoint:

"The United States is going to meet Russian competition. There is no sense in our belittling it any more than the depression which befell this country three years ago. Neither should we meet it like the socialist pup that does nothing but sit on its tail and howl. We should meet it like a man. American engineers and agriculturists, using our own power machinery, are building up Russia. We can't keep it down; we must meet it; that's all. If we can't meet it we will have to face serious days ahead. Nothing can be exported to Russia without the consent of the Antorg and if it becomes necessary for us to set up some such a body, we'll have to do it."

In other words, all American engineers and machinists and all American machinery and electrical appliances will be shut out of Russia and Russian controlled provinces by a republican president and a republican congress. "Uncle Andy's" right-hand man from the empire state of New York is reminded that many of the "big business" minds of America are engaged in the manufacturing business. They may strike back.

"IF THE WHEAT CROP IS AVERAGE"

"If the 1931 wheat crop in the United States is average," the wheat advisory committee of the federal farm board believes wheat prices will sink to levels far below production costs. Indeed, it is admitted by the board that "present indications are that with an average wheat crop this year prices obtainable will be far below the cost of production, causing great loss and hardships to American farmers."

A crop ranking among the five largest in history has been forecast for the year. It is admitted there are heavy surpluses or carryovers. This is the conclusion of the board: "We realize the impracticability of the continued control of a surplus year after year by the Grain Stabilization corporation without an effort on the part of the producers toward production control."

Ultra-drys are forever calling for making prohibition the paramount issue in 1931. Ultra-wets are just as short-sighted. There are problems which concern the farmer and the farm that are a hundred times more important to the vast body of the people than prohibition and its allied interests and organizations. This is the machine age. Is it to spell doom for individual agricultural life or will the wise men and women of America, in a political sense, band together and call upon the lawmakers, national and state, as well as the safe and the sane business men and captains of industry of America, to place economic problems to the fore as paramount issues and stabilize conditions in this new adjustment of values and wage scales and prices and marketing systems the wide world over?

IN THE WORLD OF LABOR.

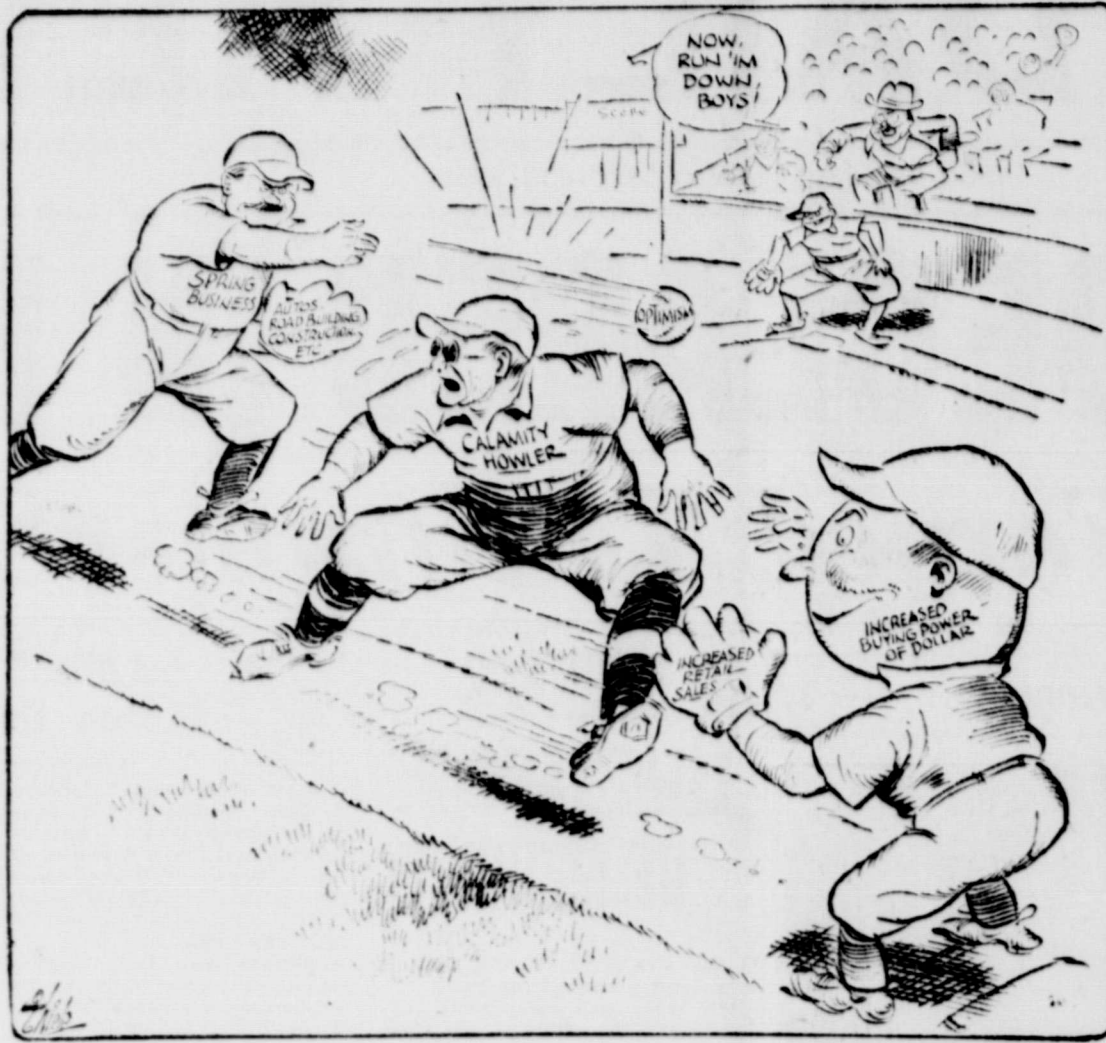
American industry has been given a warning by Senator Couzens of Michigan that it must revise its methods to prevent recurrences of present conditions or be prepared to accept unemployment insurance and old age pension legislation. Sen. Couzens was for years general manager of the Ford Motor company. He sounded his warning to the officers and members of the United States Chamber of Commerce. He was told by President William Butterworth of the chamber that business men of America "are trying honestly to find solution for our major economic problems."

Senator Couzens insisted that questions of unemployment insurance and old age pensions, linked with regulation of industry is never advised unless there is a great need. He predicted that congress will not provide for unemployment and insurance if industry does not create the need but emphatically declared that if industry does not want government interference in business it must provide the need. This Michigan senator and republican leader is said to have been largely responsible for the introduction of the five dollars a day wage at the Ford plants. He retired with a fortune of \$40,000,000. He is very close to the wage workers of Michigan. They have given him a vote of confidence at the polls whenever he offered for office. Having millions at his command he is not compelled to kowtow or truckle to any faction in or out of American politics.

FORTUNE OF SOUP KING.

An inventory of the estate of Dr. John T. Dorance, inventor of canned soup, has been filed in New Jersey. It has a value of \$115,000,000 and will have to pay inheritance taxes of \$21,500,000. Never sneer at canned soup. It made its inventor the richest citizen of New Jersey.

the Southwestern Rationalist association is militantly seeking to organize the army of liberals. The association assails theology as the historic enemy of progress and as anti-social in its results; it opposes churches as interfering with the rights and liberties of others.

Numerous pastors in New Mexico and western Texas, where the association is being organized characterized the movement as "the blusterings of persons who are trying to disrupt religion." Sermons have been preached from their pulpits and statements issued to the press.

A live, active, liberal freethought society, to unite all liberals and free-thinkers into a common army to defend the truths of science and the more modern and enlightened views of religion against the propagation of ancient traditional theology, the historic enemy of liberty and progress, and to maintain the American principle of separation of church and state," is the object of the association, according to literature issued in a membership campaign.

Those urged to join the association are "all such persons as are opposed to sumptuary and restrictive regulations, such as, Sunday 'blue laws,' and believe in the right of every person to do as he pleases every day in the week, to the limit of non-interference with the rights and liberties of others." Special privileges, such as the exemption of church property from taxation, are opposed by the association.

Ulysses S. Goen, El Paso attorney, is president of the society. Among those claimed as members of the honorary advisory board are: George E. MacDonald, editor, Truth Seeker, New York City; Richard Potts, editor, Common Herd, Dallas, Texas; Bishop William Montgomery Brown, Gallion, Ohio; Maynard Shipley, president Science League of America, San Francisco.

SLACKENING IS REFLECTED IN SELLING WAVE

Seasonal slackening in business activity, following the improvement which characterized January, February and March, found reflection in renewed selling on the Stock Exchange during the past week. United States Steel led the downward movement in the principal industrial stocks reaching its lowest price since 1927. Railroad shares, used in the Dow-Jones averages set a new low for the year market, penetrating the resistance level established at 91.65 last December.

With the principal stocks giving ground sharply, it was evident that the whole list was working toward a lower base. Precedent in previous bear markets had suggested that the loss of last December would be exceeded some time in 1931. Most observers had expected that this development would be postponed until the middle of the year, as it was in 1921. However, discouragement over the depressed earnings conditions currently existing in basic industries started renewed selling in the main body of stocks, which picked up momentum as prices moved lower.

Notwithstanding the fresh wave of pessimism over trade prospects, which engulfed the speculative community, nothing happened to change the belief of important banking and commercial interests that the bottom of the business depression has been seen. Complete statistics are now available for first quarter operations, and they show unmistakably that a definite turn for the better took place.

Doors to the renewed discouragement over the outlook since the start of April has been due chiefly to the downturn in steel production. Output dropped to around 50 per cent of capacity during the past week, making the third consecutive week of decline.

While the pronounced heaviness of representative rails was one of the most disturbing features of the market, it was noticeable that last month's earnings had created a better feeling in transportation circles. Match results for most of the country's carriers will be reported during the next several days. Estimates indicate that among the companies to make substantially better comparisons in March with the corresponding period last year than they did in February will be Chesapeake & Ohio, St. Paul, Erie, International Great Northern, Burlington, Northern Pacific, and New Haven.

One of the bright spots is International Great Northern, which has benefited from oil developments in the East Texas area. Its traffic during March showed larger gains week by week over the corresponding 1930 periods. Increase in the first week was 20.9 per cent, in the second week 37.8 per cent, in the third week 49.9 per cent, and in the fourth week 71.1 per cent. In the week ended April 4 the gain amounted to 81.9 per cent. International Great Northern is controlled by the Gulf Coast Lines, which in turn is owned by Missouri Pacific.

In April some carriers are finding that traffic is showing a greater drop from 1930 than in March. Among the carriers to report a decline in freight loadings in the week are Pennsylvania, New York Central, Missouri Pacific, and Wabash, while Atchafalaya enjoyed an increase.

MARLIN, April 21. — Sen. Tom Connally today urged greater diversification in crops as a means of insuring Texas prosperity. His address was a feature of the morning program of today's session of the fifth annual East Texas Chamber of Commerce convention.

"The new east Texas must live on its resources," said Sen. Connally after welcoming the delegates to Marlin, his home. "We are getting away from the fetish of a single crop."

He cited statistics showing that Texas is selling cotton to Japan and importing pork from Iowa.

"With packing plants within the borders of our own state, with corn and grain and feed and alfalfa suited to our soil, and favored by our climate, east Texas can furnish pork products to supply her own population," said Sen. Connally.

Horizon Widening.

"Our agricultural horizon is widening. Our vision is reaching beyond the turning row between a patch of cotton and a few acres of corn. We must learn to vary the monotony by the churning of hens, by the squeal of pigs, by the mooing of dairy cows, and baby beavers. We must substitute the meowing call of the lutey rooster for the mechanical alarm clock which does not work. The bleating of a few sheep on the hillside and a mule colt or two in another pasture will add needed notes to the agricultural orchestra that will play a crashing tune of prosperity."
