NEW WILDCAT DISCOVERY GIVES TALCO ANOTHER OIL FIELD

Production of 176 barrels in 24 hours was registered by the R. E. Moore and W. M. Coats Hoffman et al No. 2 oil well, B. P. Sims, Railroad Commission deputy supervisor, reported Tuesday morning.

The well went on a Commission potential Monday morning at 10 o'clock, with completion Tuesday at the same hour.

The well showed five per cent water, with a gas-oil ratio of 100 to 1 and gravity of 22.4. Sims said, Top of pay was 3,664 feet, where 18 feet of oil production is being stored in tanks pending a market.

Price of the crude in the new field will be determined after a complete laboratory analysis, it was indicated Tuesday. It can be worth from \$2.21 to \$2.46 per barrel, less transportation cost, one source in the industry said.

The producer, which is in a 640-acre lease in the BBB-CRR Survey some seven miles north-east of Talco, was drilled in on Dec. 18. It is on the Hoffman Beall and Channess lease.

Production is from the Woodbine sand, the first in the East Texas basin along the Talco Fault structure from this level. Talco field production is from the Paluxy.

Production was reported from the 3,664-3,696 foot level. Operators reportedly found a slight show in the Paluxy, after which they set casing and tested the Woodbine.

Experienced oil men have called the discovery a new field.

Meanwhile a second application to drill in this vicinity was filed by Moore and Coats in the Railroad Commission office Tuesday. It calls for a proposed depth of 6,000 feet, same as that proposed in the discovery well in an application last Nov. 20.

The new site is in the Hoffmann B lease, and is designated as Well No. 1. It is in the J. Prather survey, and is staked 467 feet north of the south line, these being the survey lines. New location is west and south of the discovery.

Area Escapes Sleet Snow As Cold Wave Covers State

The old year was about drizzled out Tuesday with intermittent heavy showers and a fine mist washing most of this area.

Only solace in the foul weather was the area escaped sleet which was forecast for Monday and Tuesday nights.

Temperatures were cold and clammy, dropping to 33 degrees Monday night. It was 45 degrees under a bleak overcast Monday.

Temperatures early Wednesday morning dipped to the freezing mark, and a small amount of sleet and freezing mist fell Tuesday night. The ice coating was not heavy enough to hamper highway travel, but left roads slick from the moisture.

Bogata received .6 inch of rain. Rainfall measured at Deport for the last two days of 1958 showed .82 of inch, according to A. C. Nixon in charge of the official rain gauge. This brought the total rainfall recorded at Deport to 49.24 inches in 1958. Figures at Cox Field showed the yearly total as 51.86 inches as compared to 68.69 inches in 1957, a record year.

Season on deer ends at sundown Dec. 31. It has been the best in a number of years. Duck, goose and quail season will extend for another two weeks, with the waterfowl season closing Jan. 14. Quail season ends Jan. 16.

TIMES SUBSCRIPTION RATES MUST BE INCREASED FEB. 1st

Effective February 1, 1959, subscription rates of The Talco Times must be increased. Present rates established with the first issue of this newspaper on February 14, 1936, are still in effect.

We have deferred increasing these rates just as long as possible—despite the much higher salaries paid, cost of newsprint, ink, typesetting machine supplies, Linotype metal, and newspaper postage.

Effective February 1st the new rates will be \$2.00 a year in Titus, Franklin and Red River Counties; \$3.00 a year anywhere in the USA and \$3.50 overseas. That would make local subscriptions sell for less than 3.85 cents per copy.

Those who desire to subscribe for or renew their subscriptions for one year may do so at the old rate thru any January, 1959 postmark date. After Jan. 31, 1959, the new rates will prevail.

The new rates do not affect the status of subscribers already paid in advance. We are glad the local subscribers will still be paying less than three and eighty-five hundredths cents per copy.

Newspaper postage just concluded a 40% increase two years ago, and another increase went into effect Thursday. Linotype supplies have increased over 400% since The Talco Times was established and newsprint 100%.

The Talco Times is one of the last weekly newspapers in the state to raise subscription rates. Ninety per cent of all other newspapers raised theirs to this level some time ago, many of them considerably higher than our new rates.

We believe our readers understand why these new rates are necessary. No business can successfully operate when it is supplying a news service at a loss.

American Petrofina wildcat deep oil test in Sulphur bottom 2½ miles northeast of Talco, encountered five feet of oil sand in the Woodbine around 3600 feet, it was reported in Talco Tuesday.

This sand showing proves up considerable acreage for Woodbine drilling, since the distance between this well and that of the Moore-Coates-Stephens well, in this week, is about four miles, according to Autry Sikes, who thinks this new field will have considerable drilling. Royalty has been selling from \$100 to \$150 an acre.

This well is scheduled for a 7200 foot test. Location is west and north of the John D. Wright lake, and about the same distance north of the Paluxy wells in Talco field proper as is John B. Stephens' Christmas Day deep test that discovered a new deep sand with a paraffine base, rather than asphalt.

It is known as No. 1 Lillienstern-Hoffman. Location is 480 from the east and 1,320 from the north lines of a 160-acre tract and the J. P. Wilson survey, A-629.

AMERICANS WHO became so
excited about a year ago when
Russia put its little Sputnik into
orbit, should now be satisfied af-
ter the U. S. blasted off a four-
ton Atlas on Dec. 18. The army's
Explorer I, which was launched
last January, weighed 30.8
pounds. The tiny Vanguard I,
which followed in March, weighed
a mere 3 1/4 pounds. The United
States now has 8,870 pounds of
earth satellites whirling
around the globe, including Ex-
plorers I and IV and Vanguard I.
Explorer II never orbited, and
Explorer III burned up after three
months. Russia has only
Sputnik III, which tips the scales
at a little less than 1 1/2 tons, or
2,925 pounds. The Atlas is the
longest as well as the fattest baby
moon of the space age. It is 85
feet long, compared with Sput-
nik III's 11 1/4 feet.

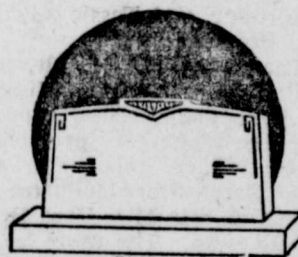
