ROGERS SAYS WE SHOULD DIVERSIFY

Have been requested to express opinion in regard to what would be the best crops to plant in this locality and to outline a general plan of what would be in my opinion the most certain of success and which would be the least liable to disappointment to our Farmers and Stock Raisers, in whose welfare we are all very interested since they are the foundation, and the producers of practically all wealth in this locality.

From my experience and observation for a number of years in this locality, I have come to the conclusion that the man who will prepare his land thoroughly before planting in the fall or late summer season if possible and continue working the land until in May, then planting a liberal acreage of standard corn and kaffir corn not too thick, and reasonably good cultivation he will be reasonably certain of a crop. My idea of harvesting this crop would be to cut it with a row planter and instead of threshing at a large expense I would stack in shocks when well stacked these crops will keep over two or three years if needed for immediate use. By stacking this way these crops will not heat as it will in the granary and the heavy threshing expense would be avoided. There would be another advantage in handling these crops in this way in that when this grain is threshed and put in granary it is nearly always sold on account of the poor keeping quality when threshed, while if left in the stack it will keep and would be fed to stock on the farm which would be much more profitable than if the grain was marketed. There is another advantage in handling these crops in this way by keeping these crops over we can have a liberal amount in reserve so that in case we should have a failure it would not be necessary for us to sell our stock on account of feed shortage. I believe we should stock our farms if possible with what good milk cows could be well cared for and with as many hogs as we can grow feed for. I believe we should use horse power and not mules since the horse will produce its own feed and feed for our other stock and if some good mares are kept on the farm our power will make money instead of losing. As we all know it takes cash to buy mules, and fuel and repairs to run them, and that they depreciate in value from the day they are put in the field to the day they are junked. I believe we have a good broom corn country since our dry falls are especially adapted to the curing and marketing of a good grade of broom corn. I believe a liberal acreage of broom corn planted every year would soon put our people in better position. Another feature about broom corn is that it produces a larger amount of feed which if properly handled would be of great value to the growers.

From experience and observation I believe it would be much more profitable if we would summer fallow all land sown to wheat. That is if we are to sow 200 acres of wheat on a farm, if we will sow 100 acres and leave the remaining 100 acres over until the next fall I believe we would be reasonably certain of a good crop. We have some farmers who followed this plan the last season and who harvested between 30 and 40 bushels of wheat per acre while others did not make expenses on their crop over in the usual way. We have some farmers who have had very good wheat pasture this fall while many who have a very poor prospect for wheat farmed in the old way.

By sowing only half as much and having reasonably sure of a crop we would only have one crop to harvest and one crop to drill and would, I believe, be much more certain of success than to sow all of the land covered for wheat each year.

I believe we have a good sheep country and I would like to see a bunch of good sheep on every farm in Ochiltree County. From what I have learned of sheep they like dry weather, cold does not hurt them as much as they are dry. They will do well on rough feed and do not necessarily have to use very little grain. I believe they are ahead of the hog

DEATH OF MRS. STEFFIN

Word has been received here of the death of Mrs. "Pete" Steffin of Laverne, who passed away at her home Monday evening, after a brief illness.

Mrs. Steffin had been in poor health for some time, but Saturday evening was taken seriously ill with pneumonia, and passed away two days later. Mr. and Mrs. Steffin had made their home at LaKemp for many years, and is well known in Beaver County. Her many friends here are shocked to hear of her sudden death. She leaves four children, the eldest 18 and the youngest 11 years of age. —Beaver Democrat.

Talley and Donley shipped a car of pigs to Warwick, Kansas on Monday of this week, these pigs were to be used for serum experiments.

In this respect. Sheep are no experiment in this locality since we have some farmers who have handled them for several years and who are enthusiastic in regard to the profit and satisfaction in handling them. Wool is one of our most staple products and there is always a market for lambs. I understand that there are large numbers of sheep produced in Ohio on high priced lands. It occurs to me that if we can produce a commodity which will go on the market in competition with the product of \$100.00 to \$300.00 per acre land, then we should do so and that we are not making the best of our opportunities if we fail to do so.

I believe we can take Sheep, Hogs, Milk Cows, Poultry, Maize and Broom Corn, Oats some Wheat and Barley all of which is well adapted to this locality and climatic conditions existing here and that if we will devote our earnest endeavor along these lines that they will put this locality in good financial condition and at the same time materially increase the saleable value of our lands. I would open our Schools one month later in the fall and continue them one month later in the spring. By doing this our boys and young men could assist in the pulling of the broom corn and the harvesting of our feed crop. By doing this it would enable our farmers to have the assistance of those of their children who have reached an age where they could be of much help in taking care of the broom corn and other crops without keeping them out of school which would result in a large saving, and I fail to see where it would work any hardship or deprive our children of any schooling. In fact this plan would give the farmers children more schooling in some cases than they now receive.

I would also like to see a County Agent located here who is familiar with our conditions who could and would assist us in developing this body of good fertile land. I am confident that with proper handling and with our efforts directed along the proper lines that this will develop into a rich and prosperous district. It is my earnest desire to assist and co-operate in every possible way with the people of Perryton and surrounding territory in bringing this much to be desired condition about.

WHY WILL WE UNDERTAKE AN IMPOSSIBILITY

I have been reading quite a write-up on the planting of cotton and constructing a cotton gin, thereby making this a nigger country.

You may class me as a new comer or the other as you wish, but I will say a few things that will save this country several dollars.

Have you studied very much over grain, live stock and cotton countries? I have and what do we find in a grain and live stock country, or a diversified country? We find good roads, well improved farms, good churches, good schools, better educated people, and 90 per cent of the farmers owning their own farm. As a rule you will find them out of debt, especially more so than in a cotton country.

What do we find in the cotton country? Poor roads, neglected churches, schools, almost all negroes, uneducated people, negroes, sorry improved farms owned by some land lord living in the city, people in debt and to be plain, 75 per cent just working as slaves for the other 25 per cent.

I will make this assertion and I do not believe anyone will undertake to deny it. This is beyond a doubt the best feed and stock country in the world. Feed properly planted and cultivated is as sure a crop here as any crop in any country. By the term feed I mean Barley, Oats, Kaffir, Milo, and Cane.

Just look around you and you will not have to look far to see a man with good hogs, a few dairy cattle, a lot of nice chickens, and every time he goes to town he returns with more cash or a better bank account that he had before. Go and eat at his table and you will find more left after all have fared well than we town folks start with.

Now back to the cotton. You plant cotton and build a gin and in less than five years it will be standing, rotting down and the farmers be worse off by \$25,000.00 than they are to-day.

It is true we have a good price for cotton today but by the time you get a crop here it is liable to be 4c per pound.

The south has always produced more cotton than enough to supply the demand, so with a normal crop in the south we would be in a darned bad fix out here shivering over 1-4 bale per acre crop at 5c per pound.

Had not you better take a darn fool's advice and get busy with feed, hogs, dairy cattle, and chickens, and make a good living.

I'll bet you a ginger cake you can't find a man in Ochiltree county that will say people are doing any better in the cotton country than we are here, and why will we try to do worse than we are doing by trying to make this a cotton country when it is anything else.

SANTA FE DEMONSTRATION TRAIN WILL BENEFIT

The agricultural department of the Santa Fe railway expects good results from the livestock demonstration train which will be in Perryton, Monday, April 2 at 7:30 p. m. for a meeting with farmers and town folks who are interested in dairying, hog raising and poultry raising, according to the Santa Fe, the company's agricultural and industrial paper.

"In the enterprise described," says "The Earth," "the Santa Fe is co-operating with the Texas A. & M. College which has several important messages for everybody who gives thought to the development of the important farming business of this great commonwealth. The college is sending its best men to present three big subjects, Professor Evans, dairying; Professor Edson poultry raising; and others of the extension service, who will discuss the three subjects generally. These men will be disappointed if farmers fail to ask questions. They urge farmers to bring their problems to the meeting. Women are specially invited.

"In addition to the lectures mentioned, there will be a meeting for boys and girls, conducted by T. B. Wood and J. R. Edmonds, district agents of the college extension service. A number of Santa Fe officials will accompany the party.

"The train will stand at the Santa Fe station, and the meeting will start immediately on arrival.

"The Santa Fe has run a number of trains similar to the one now organizing for Texas, and satisfactory results have followed in every instance. Everything points to success for the project under way. Farmers are invited to help make it a success by attending the meeting."

STATE "INCOME TAX" BILL SHOULD BE DEFEATED

House Bill No. 303, by Dinkle, known as the "Income Tax" bill, has been favorably reported from the House Committee on Revenue and Taxation, and will very shortly come before the House of Representatives in Austin, with recommendations that it do pass.

This bill, if enacted into law, will levy a tax on all kinds and classes of citizens of Texas. Every man, woman and child whose "income" is \$500 per annum or more will pay to the State under this law a percent ranging from one percent to six percent. Under the term "income" as used in this act is included: All rents; all dividends; all wages, salaries or fees; all profits; all royalties; and all other gains, profits or income of any kind. No class will escape; the farmer should be more interested than is the banker.

A meeting should be called in this community immediately to voice a protest against this bill. This meeting should be one of farmers, merchants, businessmen, cattle-men, bankers—every class of citizen in this community. Those who attend this mass meeting should be impressed with the importance of each voter writing and wiring in a protest to his Senator and Representative at Austin—and doing it immediately.

There is danger in delay. We believe this bill, if enacted, would result in much injustice and many hardships to our citizenship at large. Let House Bill No. 303 be killed by the great voice of our people! Strike immediately.

J. C. HAMPTON DIES AT WELLINGTON, TEXAS

The following article is taken from the Wellington, Texas "Leader," Mr. Hampton had land interests here and had made many friends during his frequent visits to this county.

As a result of a stroke of paralysis Tuesday morning early Mr. J. C. Hampton of this city passed away Wednesday morning about 3 o'clock. The funeral was held at the Wellington Cemetery Wednesday 4 p. m., conducted by Minister I. L. Sanders of the Church of Christ. Burial was made in Wellington Cemetery.

Mr. Hampton was born April 14, 1859, in Clay Co., Tenn., and for years was engaged in the mercantile business in that state, coming to Poard County, Texas, several years ago. He was married to Mrs. Coe of that county in 1908. They moved to his city in the latter part of 1917, and own quite a lot of property in and around Wellington. He was a member of the Church of Christ, was a good neighbor and friend, and a true citizen. Since coming to this city he made a host of friends who will indeed miss the optimistic and friendly company. He leaves a wife and one son, and other relatives to mourn his death. Mr. Hampton had strokes of paralysis before this fatal stroke, but none very serious. His death came as a surprise to the entire community.

MARY A. STEWART

Mary A. Stewart was born in Knox County, Illinois, June 19, 1850. She united with the Baptist church early in life and remained a consistent member till the last.

She was married to Hubbard W. Stewart May 10, 1874. To this union were born four children of which three survive, all of them were with her when the end came. C. H. Stewart Gray, Oklahoma. Mr. and Mrs. Stewart moved from Illinois to Nebraska in 1878 and from Nebraska to Ponca City, Oklahoma in 1900. In 1916 they moved to Beaver County, and located near Gray, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Stewart has made many friends since she moved here, all of whom will mourn her death.

She was known as "Aunt Mary" and "Grandma Stewart." She was a very patient woman in all her undertakings and was kind and loving to all.

She is survived by her husband, who lies seriously ill at their home, one daughter, two sons, fourteen grand children, one great-grandson and a host of relatives and friends. "Grandma" died Friday, February 16th, 1923 at her home at the age of 72 years, 7 months and 20 days with the flu.

She was loved by everyone who knew her and will not soon be forgotten.

Burial was at the Gray Cemetery, the services being in charge of Rev. J. W. Duff.

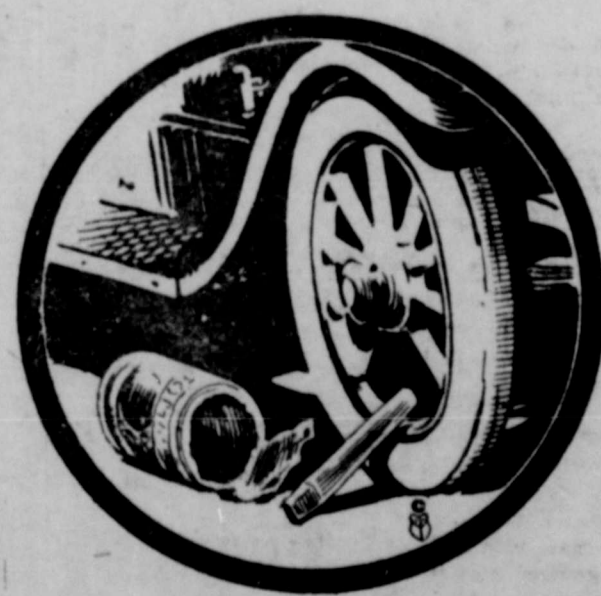

IN MEMORIA

It is now some time since our friend passed over the Great Divide. We have had time to subdue any transient emotions that always come the living for the passing dead. He was no God. He was just a common one hundred per cent American youth. But I would not be misunderstood when I say "common". By this I do not mean that he was not uncommon in the sense that he was exceptional, for he was.

A boy who does not these days seek fame and popularity by gambling, smoking, drinking, telling smut-jokes, being a "ladies man" trying to cuss the loudest while yet in his

teens, is certainly an exceptional boy.

I would not at this late day try to make Heaven sweeter or Hell more severe by writing a posthumous word of praise, or conversely. Had I failed to say to the living in the lifetime of the dead what I say here I would lay my pencil down and keep silent. But what I now write I said then, I repeat it here, not to elevate my dead friend, he does not need it from me, but to call back his exemplary conduct and life to the mind of the living that his influence may survive the short span of his life.

This was a boy that we never saw smoke a cigarette; we never

heard cuss; we never heard tell a smutty joke; we never saw drunk or intoxicated; we never heard of him gambling; we never heard of him refusing to do an honest day's work at real manual labor for an honest wage. We know he would work, do honest work, for he worked for us and came early, stayed late, worked hard and well. We believe we wrote for him the last check he ever received for work. We believe we know this boy. We had an exceptional opportunity for observing him and his conduct, and with it all, we wish to go on record as saying "He was an excellent boy." He was beyond all peradventure of doubt in my mind of a type almost extinct. Why? To begin with shortly before his death, about a year, he came to us of Ochiltree County fresh from ranks of the United States Army "A. E. F." where he served for more than two years in France, gayly bedecked in the uniform of his Country's Legions. We had been told the "Army" ruined our boys. We have never believed it, we don't believe it now. This boy came to us a special charge for scrutiny because we were the friend of his father, because we knew he enlisted before his years entitled him to join the service. We knew that he had in his veins and make up blood that might tempt him to become reckless. So we thought then, we believe now, he was a fine example to prove or disprove the aspersion so laid to the charge of our Army. What was the result, and what do we find? We believe that this boy's return and short sojourn with us, proves the boys, such as he, saved the reputation of the army and our national pride, and that those boys whom some are want to say the army ruined, came near to wrecking the army. He brought home to us that the army was saved by such as he, and that it ruined no man's boy, but there were a lot of boys in the army that came near to ruining it. It proves to us further that "a man's a Man" wheresoever and whatsoever the situation or the circumstances.

And now to those who like to harp "the army ruined our boys" we would like to ask if their boy had been made of the same class of American Clay as this boy, would not the army been an excellent school of experience where many men would have been made of many boys? Certainly when we look to the life and conduct of this boy after his army experience, considering his age, and the further fact that he was away from home when he joined and all in all, if he came back a boy such as he was, the army is not so bad after all. This boy had the making of a man in him and it remained with him, and the same will prove out in every case without exception in the case of every boy who entered the ranks.

We find this boy in his travels and experiences on the other side making advantage of his opportunities, (such as come to but few men) he gathered together a most wonderful collection of photographs and memoranda in connection with them. We have seen these and wish to testify they are wonderful and come from all parts of the old world. We find notes and notations in connection with each of them which explain and add to their interest. Much of these notes are so true to the character and speech of the boy that we could almost believe we were conversing with the dead.

Now, you may say this was a small thing to do. In a way it was. But the trait of character it portrays to my mind, is not so small. A disposition to make use of valuable time to some advantage. It shows that this particular boy did not use his spare time in the army, "having it ruin him."

This boy died one might say in the morning of life while the shadows were still dim along the pathway of life and lay long to the west. His death was tragic, sudden and shocking. What life may have held in store for him, we are unable to say. But if we may essay his manhood by comparison with his youth, then we must say the world lost materially when he went west. But could I call up from the shadows of the grave and eternity before the living the vision of the life of this departed friend, and cause one to stop and think for a moment and appreciate the value of emulating his example, and thereby cause such one to do more honest day's labor, and apologize to his flag and his country for the slander he has heaped upon its army legions by trying to excuse a worthless life upon the pretext the "army did it." Could I cause him to play one less game at dice and cards; tell one less smutty

yarn in public; to perceive he might be man without being attached to one end of a cigarette; think for a day of his girl friends in terms of respect, and speak of them in kindness. Make him stop and resolve to be a man, and then do it. It will be then that I am well repaid for writing this, and Raymond Coffee did not live in vain.

I have faith to believe that God in his tender mercy and omnipotent wisdom has gathered this manly and exemplary boy to a rich reward in Heaven. To Raymond we say with a feeling of regret and great loss, good bye, but we believe life will mean more to us by having known him.

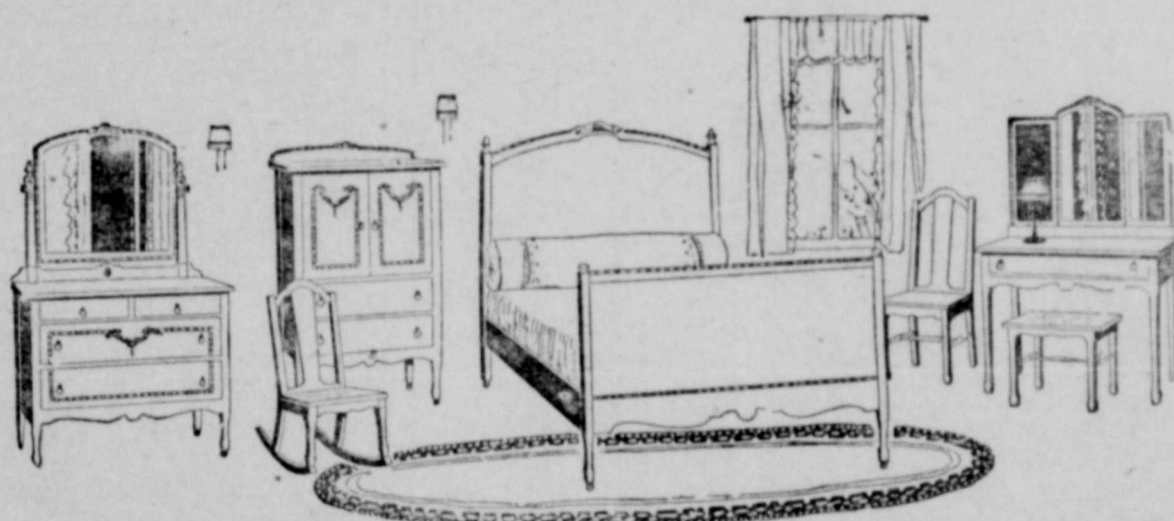

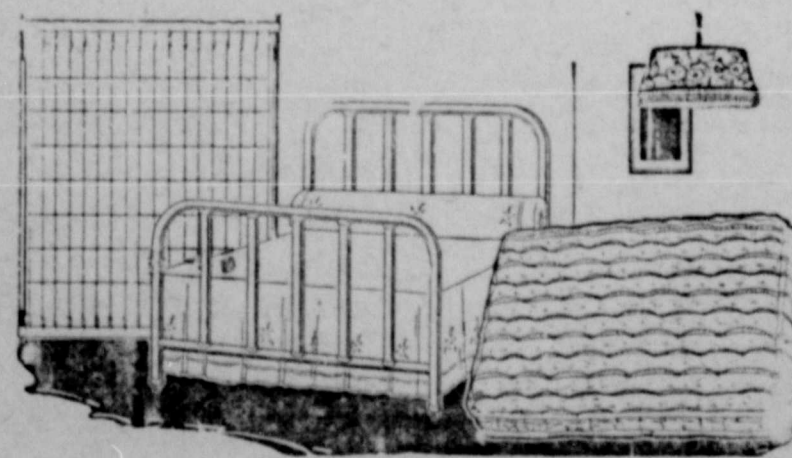

SPLENDID WINTER HOME FOR HOGS

Well-Built House Earns Profits for Swine Raisers.

SAVES LIVES OF LITTLE PIGS

Sunlight Ventilation and Protection From Cold, Essentials in Successful Raising of Pigs, Are Well Provided For.

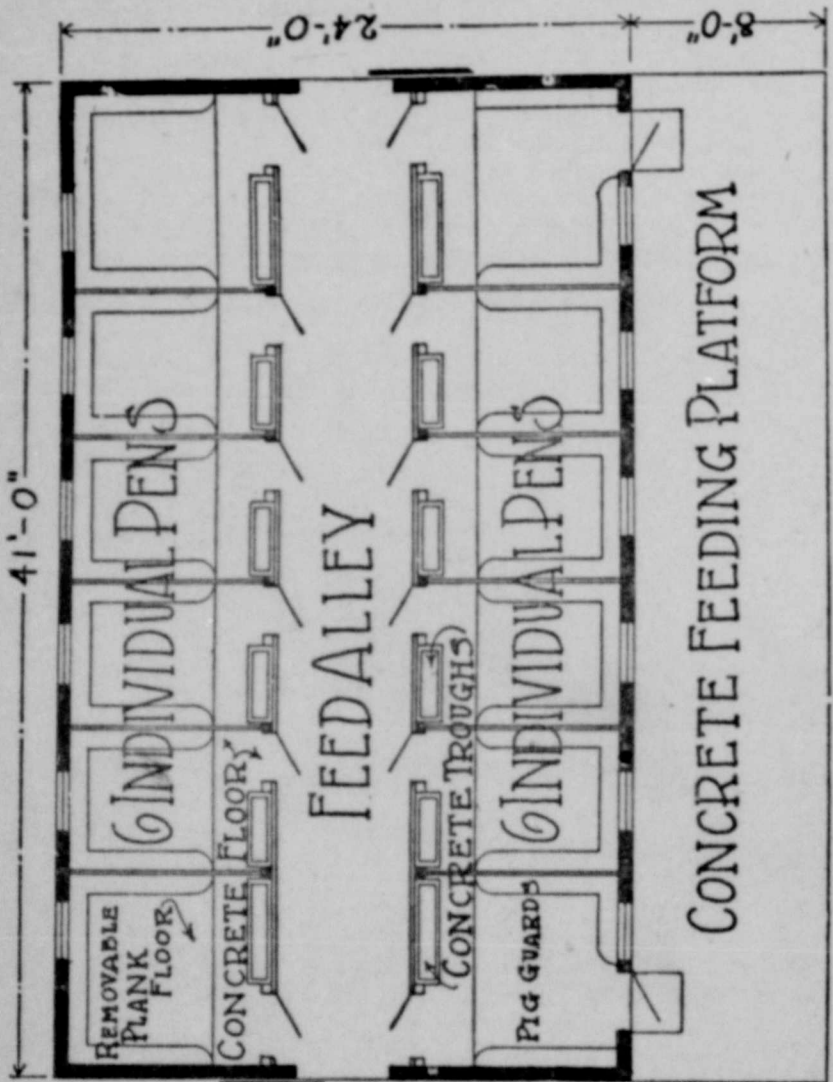
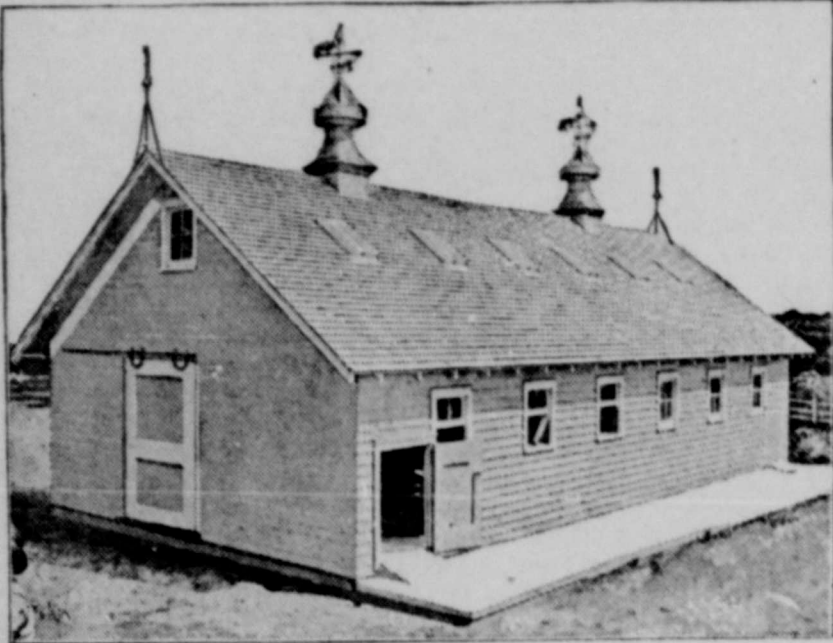
Breeding sows maintained by successful swine raisers will be having their full litters of pigs within a short time. Seven or eight months from the time they are farrowed these pigs

have in common several features that sows and pigs need. Weather-tight buildings to keep out the cold and dampness; good floors that are raised from the ground so that the pigs will not become chilled by contact with the earth; plenty of sunlight to prevent disease and help warm the buildings in winter; a supply of fresh air brought in by ventilation, which also carries away the foul air.

Hog houses are constructed from two general designs. One is known as the saw-tooth roof, which has a half-monitor-shaped roof line, with windows set in the side of the wall. These windows, supplemented by windows in the side wall of the building proper, permit sunlight to strike the pens on both sides of the interior. The other type of hog house is known as the gable house, a good example of which is shown in the accompanying illustration.

This house is of standard frame construction, a good grade of lumber being used to make it weather-tight. The building is set on a concrete foundation, and has a concrete floor. The building is 41 feet long and 24 feet wide, which provides room for twelve pens, six on each side. Through the center of the building runs a feeding alley, wide enough to run a feed truck, thus distributing the feed to the troughs with the least amount of labor.

The long side of the building shows



will weigh around 200 pounds and will get to market at the time when prices are at the top for the year and their size will make them "market toppers." In the meantime the sows will be bred again and will farrow in the late winter or early spring, thus keeping up their production to the top notch and earning big profits for their owners.

There is a paragraph in the secret of success with hogs—two litters of pigs a year—that coupled with having only purebred animals and housing and feeding them so that they will make the greater growth for the least amount of feed and care.

In the corn belt states, where hog raising has been brought up to its present state of efficiency, the winters are long and the weather is cold—in some of the states extremely so. Before it was learned that hogs need more than a loosely constructed shack, having a dirty and filthy floor, two litters of pigs were unknown. Sows were bred so that they would farrow in the late spring and early summer, because little pigs cannot stand cold, especially if the cold is accompanied by dampness. One chill and that was the end of the pigs. When the sows farrowed late in the spring, a second litter was out of the question, as the pigs came along so late in the fall that they had no chance to become strong enough to withstand the winter. Thus production was only half what nature intended it should be, with a resultant halving of income.

Study of the needs of the sows and their pigs in the first few weeks of their lives has developed a standard design for hog houses. These houses may be built of any of the standard building materials, but all of them

in the picture faces the south. With this arrangement the windows in the side wall provide sunlight for the pens on the near side and the roof windows admitting the sunlight to the pens on the far side of the building. The other side wall, which faces the north is solid, thus keeping out the wind from that direction.

The pens may be of steel, which, because of paint and the shape of the round bars, make them more sanitary, or they may be of planks. The former are set into the concrete foundation while the latter are attached to the studding of the walls. Many owners prefer the pens so constructed that they may be removed in summer, thus providing a good shelter for the animals during the hot weather—a covered feeding floor.

Each pen is floored with planks raised slightly from the concrete. These floors cover half the pens, which gives the sows a raised section on which the bedding is placed. With plenty of bedding and a space between the planks and concrete, the small pigs will be warm and free from danger from chills.

Such a building as this is not expensive when its profit-producing ability is considered. It permits the owner to produce double the number of pigs possible without such a building and enables him to have the pigs come so that they may be fitted for market when prices are best. It also saves a greater percentage of the litters, and gives the pigs a good start toward a profitable market.

THIS SUMMER'S CITIZENS MILITARY TRAINING CAMP.

Word has been received from 1st. Lieut. J. A. Gilruth, Infantry, D. O. L. C. M. T. C. Officer of the 8th Corps Area, which includes the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico, that elaborate plans are now under way for the continuance of the Government summer camps for young men which proved so popular last summer and the summer before.

Nearly three thousand young men received an outing at Government expense last year, some at Camp Travis, Texas, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Ft. Logan, Colorado, and Fort Bliss, Texas.

According to present plans, camps are to be held at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Fort Sill, Oklahoma, Fort Logan, Colorado, and Fort Huachuca, Arizona, this year. The branches of instruction offered may be slightly different from those of last year, but in the main will be in the same branches, which include Infantry, Cavalry, Field Artillery, Engineers, Coast Artillery, Signal Corps and Air Service.

The courses offered include a basic Red Course, which gives fundamental training but does not instruct in any particular branch of the service; Advanced Red Course, which gives basic instruction in branches desired; White Course, (for which graduates of last year's Red Course who were certified as eligible for admission to white course are qualified) fits student to be a non-commissioned officer in the Organized Reserves or the National Guard; and the Blue Course, (for which graduates of last year's white course who were certified as eligible for admission to Blue Course are qualified if of proper age and possess necessary education qualifications) which fits candidate for commission in the Organized Reserve Corps.

The age limits are the same as for last year, 17 to 25 for the Red Courses, 18 to 26 for the White Courses, and 19 to 27 for the Blue Course. These age limits do not apply to those who attended a Citizen's Military Training Camp in 1921, Veterans of the World War may be accepted up to 35 years of age.

Although formal application blanks have not been received, young men of proper qualifications will find it to their advantage to mail requests for applications to the C. M. T. C. Officer, Fort Sam Houston, Texas, at as early a date as possible. Although it will be possible to accommodate more than twenty-five per cent more candidates than were accommodated last year, it is expected that more will apply than can be admitted. By having your request for application on file, you will have opportunity to receive application blank early.
