AIRPLANE SERVICE BEGINS HERE

Hoover Proclaims Kellogg Treaty and Congratulates the World

PACT BECOMES REALITY WHEN JAPAN AGREES

Many Statesmen at Signing Today by President

INSTRUMENT IS ALREADY HELD

Briand, Minister of France, Given Praise

WASHINGTON, July 24. (AP)—President Hoover today proclaimed effective the Kellogg treaty for the renunciation of war and congratulated "the entire world" upon "this additional instrument of humane endeavor" for the sake of peace.

Ceremonies of imposing simplicity attended the promulgation of the pact. Gathered in the historic east room of the White House were former President Coolidge, former Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg, and the diplomatic representatives of all but two of the nations that have become parties to the treaty.

Delivering a short address, Mr. Hoover asked the diplomats to convey to their governments the appreciation of the United States that "through their cordial collaboration an act so auspicious for the future happiness of mankind" had been brought to its consummation.

"I dare predict," he said, "that the influence of the treaty for the renunciation of war will be felt in a large proportion of all future international acts. The magnificent opportunity and the compelling duty now open to us should spur us on to the fulfillment of every opportunity that is calculated to strengthen this treaty and to extend the policy which it so nobly sets forth."

Mr. Hoover declared he was glad of an opportunity to pay "merited tribute to the two statesmen whose names the world has properly adopted in its designation of this treaty." To Aristide Briand, French foreign minister, the president said, was due the inception of the pact and much of the success of the negotiations which followed, while to former Secretary Kellogg was due the credit for expanding the treaty into a pact of world-wide significance.

WASHINGTON, July 24. (AP)—Already hailed as of proved effectiveness by virtue of its influence on the Russo-Chinese controversy, the Kellogg treaty renouncing war today reached the last stage of its stormy course from an idealistic suggestion to a binding international agreement.

For the final step—its formal promulgation by President Hoover—the historic east room of the White House was chosen as the scene of impressively simple ceremonies in which the diplomatic representatives of the nations that have joined the United States in renouncing warfare as an instrument of their national policy had been invited to participate.

In addition, there were two specially invited and honored guests. At President Hoover's right a place was set aside for Calvin Coolidge, who brought all the influence of his presidential office to bear in obtaining the approval of the senate for the treaty and regards it as one of the most important accomplishments of his administration. On the chief executive's left a place was reserved for the man whose efforts on behalf of the treaty were of such import that the pact was given his name, Frank B. Kellogg, the Coolidge secretary of state.

Under the terms of the treaty itself, the ceremony of promulgation could not take place until all of the 15 original signatory nations had deposited their instruments of ratification with the Washington government. All but one, that of Japan, have been in the archives of the state department for some time, and Secretary Stimson made special arrangements to complete this momentous file by receiving the Japanese ratification early in the day from the hands of Ambassador De-buchi. Ratifications of three adhering nations also had not been received, although in transit.

ST. LOUIS PLANE SHOWS NO SIGN OF HALTING

ST. LOUIS, July 24. (AP)—Completing 269 hours of continuous flying at 12:17 p. m. (C. S. T.) today, Dale "Red" Jackson and Forest O'Brine, new endurance flight champions, were still circling in their "St. Louis Robin" above Lambert-St. Louis field with no sign of weakening. They had bettered the former endurance record by more than 22 hours.

County Now Has 3,606 Scholastics —23 Are Negroes

Gray county has 3,606 scholastics, according to a statement received here yesterday by John B. Hesse, county superintendent of schools. The figures were compiled from a scholastic census taken last May.

Of the total, 23 are negroes. Pampa has 15 negroes and McLean 8 negroes registered. It is probable that a separate school for negroes will be formed here this fall, Superintendent Hesse says.

He said this morning that a bill had passed the senate and house whereby each registered scholastic will mean \$17.50 to the district.

Parents have only seven days to transfer children from one district to another, July 31 being the last day for legal transfers. Up to this time 17 transfers have been made in Gray county.

The county superintendent says he has had many inquiries regarding the age a child may enter school. He says that until next year the 7-year minimum will be observed. A bill has been passed whereby children 6 years old may be admitted free to schools after September 1, 1930.

WICHITA FALLS BACKS PAMPA ROAD PROJECT

Chamber Active for Denver's Rail Proposal

FORT WORTH IS FOR R. I. LINE

Favors Both Plans if Tonnage Is Held Sufficient

That the Rock Island railroad, should it be given a permit to build its proposed Quanah-Shamrock road, would consider it "to the best interest of the company" also to construct from Pringle, north of Stinnett, to Shamrock was learned authoritatively here today.

An attorney for the Rock Island road in speaking before the Fort Worth Association of Commerce yesterday, made this statement in connection with his bid for Fort Worth support. It had been said in Amarillo that the Rock Island had no intention to connect Pringle with Shamrock by way of Pampa. The Rock Island also wishes to build a line from Pringle to Dallas.

Line-ups for the railroad "fight" to open in Fort Worth Monday today showed two additional affiliations, with the odds somewhat in favor of the Fort Worth & Denver Northern project.

The Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce has endorsed the Childress-Pampa line and filed an intervention in its behalf with the interstate commerce commission. The chamber voted to provide legal talent in preparation of briefs and evidence, and immediately sent Hubert M. Harrison, general manager, over the proposed line by way of Wellington, Shamrock, and LeFors. Mr. Harrison this week conferred with officials of the Pampa Board of City Development and assured them of full support of Wichita Falls.

Despite claims of Amarilloans that Fort Worth was backing the Denver project, the Fort Worth Association of Commerce yesterday went on record expressing a preference for the Rock Island-Frisco proposal. An additional endorsement, conditional upon whether the I. C. C. saw sufficient tonnage possibilities, was granted the Denver proposition. The latter plan contemplates a joint trackage arrangement between Wellington and Shamrock.

The Fort Worth resolutions follow: "Whereas additional railroads connecting Fort Worth with southwestern Oklahoma and the Panhandle of Texas would extend Fort Worth's trade territory and are, therefore, necessary to Fort Worth's advancement commercially, and

"Whereas the several proposed new lines of railroad now before the interstate Commerce Commission would afford us the opportunity to extend our trade territory, we renew our endorsement of the proposal of the Frisco railway to purchase the G. T. & W. railway, to construct a new line of railroad from Seymour to Vernon, and to operate under trackage rights over the Rock Island from Jacksboro to Fort Worth.

"We endorse the proposal of the C. R. I. & G. railway to construct a new line of railroad from Shamrock through Wellington and Quanah to a point of connection with the proposed new line of the Frisco railway at Beaver Creek, Texas, a point approximately 14 miles south of Vernon, and to operate under trackage rights over the Frisco railway into Quanah and through Quanah and Beaver Creek to Jacksboro over the Frisco and G. T. & W. railways."

The resolution conditionally endorsing the Fort Worth & Denver City project read:

"We endorse the application of the Fort Worth & Denver City railway to construct a line from Childress to Pampa through Wellington and Shamrock, if in the opinion of the interstate commerce commission the traffic will be sufficient to justify the construction of both lines."

COLORFUL CEREMONY MARKS PROMULGATION OF TREATY

Grays to Meet Wellington Nine at 1:30 Tomorrow

Pampa's American Legion Grays will play their second game of baseball in the Amarillo tournament tomorrow afternoon. The Grays will meet the Wellington T. & O. champions in the opening game called for 1:30 o'clock.

The Pampa nine won their opening game of the tourney by defeating Quitaque, 8 to 6, while Wellington won its opener from Lubbock, 9 to 3. The game between Wellington and Pampa should be one of the best of the tournament. Both teams are strong. Both were picked to go to the finals, but the premature meeting has changed the prospect.

Many Pampa baseball fans will attend the game tomorrow afternoon. Manager Ed Gober plans to start Pat Malone in the box with Slim French as second choice. Malone is an old-timer at the game and should give the Grays another win.

Yesterday afternoon Lamesa sent Silverton home. Silverton was the first team to leave the tournament. In the second game Borger and the Amarillo City league All-Stars battled 15 innings before the Borgerites put over the winning tally.

PLANS FOR PAMPA'S PART IN RAIL HEARING COMPLETED; CITY TO TAKE TEN WITNESSES

Pampa is ready for the railroad hearing in Fort Worth next Monday. Manager George W. Briggs of the Pampa Board of City Development said this morning. A meeting of witnesses was held last night in the office of Charles C. Cook, attorney representing the B. C. D. and Chamber of Commerce.

Pampa will send 10 witnesses to the hearing. Their names are not available at present.

Data of great value has been gathered and compiled by Mr. Briggs and his assistants. It has been divided into classes and each class of information will be in charge of a different witness. Mr. Cook will question the witnesses for the Pampa intervention.

Like information has been gathered at all points on the proposed line between Childress and Pampa.

AMARILLO MAN BUYS A LEASE NEAR M'LEAN

E. K. Watkins of Amarillo has just completed the purchase of an 80-acre lease on semi-wildcat oil land from Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Carpenter. The land involved is the east half of the north-west quarter of section 25, block 25, H. & G. N. survey. The lease is seven miles north of McLean.

Nearest production is a mile north-east, where the Empire Gas & Fuel company has a small producer in section 36, block 25. Production in the Chapman pool is five miles northeast.

ELKS TO MEET THIS EVENING IN NEW SCHNEIDER

Local Elks will hold another organization meeting in the dining room of the Schneider hotel tonight at 8:30 o'clock. Further plans for the organization of an Elks lodge in Pampa will be discussed and reports from various committees received.

Last week several committees were appointed by the temporary chairman, Judge Clifford Braly. They were instructed to report at the meeting tonight. There were more than 40 "Bills" at the last meeting and others are expected tonight.

Three Producers Are Brought in by McMann Oil Co.

The McMann Oil company got three good producers in Gray county this week. Two of the new wells are in the Finley-Brown pool and the other is in the LeFors pool.

The company's No. 2 Palmer, in section 31, block B-2, came in for an initial production of 60 barrels an hour and the first 24 hours flowed more than 1,500 barrels. The same company's No. 2 Saunders, in the J. G. Eustice survey, in the LeFors pool came in for the best producer in that area when it flowed 1,500 barrels the first 24 hours.

Today both producers were flowing at the rate of 60 barrels an hour. A heavy gas flow was encountered with each oil flow.

McMann's No. 1 Palmer, in section 31, block B-2, is swabbing 20 barrels an hour. The pay was encountered earlier in the week and swabbing started. Today the pay had increased and a producer is expected.

In the Bowers-McGee pool, Texas company's No. 9 Bowers, in section 80, block B-2, had 900 feet of oil in the hole today.

KEEP MONEY IN PAMPA URGES WELFARE BODY

The Pampa Welfare association, at a meeting held Tuesday afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, went on record recommending that Pampa citizens do not give donations to organizations using the money in other cities. Collections have been taken up here and the money taken out of the city.

The local Welfare association is having trouble operating on the amount available and donations that anyone desires to give will be appreciated by the local body.

Reports were received and plans for further operations were discussed at the meeting Tuesday afternoon. President T. D. Hobart has charge.

BRANIFF LINE SHIP ARRIVES HERE AT NOON

Official Lands at Airport on First Regular Trip

CHAMBER WILL SELL TICKETS

Citizens on Hand to Greet Opening Personnel

Pampa's first airplane passenger service was inaugurated this morning at 11:35 o'clock when the Braniff air line ship landed at the Pampa airport. The big ship carried, besides Paul R. Braniff, president of the company, J. B. Foster of Tulsa, and T. M. Jenkins of Oklahoma City as passengers who were on their way to Los Angeles.

Ted Lewis, war ace, was piloting the ship. He is operations manager of the line. In the cockpit with him was Eddie Streeter of Dallas, flying from Tulsa to Amarillo to become affiliated with the T. A. T. The plane was an all-metal Hamilton monoplane equipped with a 525-horsepower Pratt-Whitney Hornet motor.

Despite unfavorable weather conditions, a light rain falling over the entire distance from Oklahoma City, good time was made. The plane was only 15 minutes late in landing.

A large crowd of Pampa citizens was on hand to welcome Mr. Braniff and the first passenger ship to make Pampa a landing center. The owner and passengers were welcomed by George W. Briggs, manager of the Pampa Board of City Development; F. M. Cwin, city manager; T. VanNatta, manager of the West Texas Air service; Bill Morris, pilot for the W. T. A. S.; Ray Shifflett, pilot from Mangum, Okla., and local citizens.

The News' photographer was present and took pictures of the ship, its owner, pilot, and passengers.

Until further notice, the return trip will be made the following morning, leaving Amarillo at 8 o'clock. The stop eastward will be made here about 6:30 a. m. Later, Mr. Braniff says, he hopes to have enough passenger service to make the round trip daily.

The big ship, with a seating capacity of six, will arrive in Amarillo in time to connect with the T. A. T. plane for the coast. The two passengers on today's trip will be in Los Angeles tonight by making connections at Amarillo.

Schedules and tickets will be handled by the Chamber of Commerce here until an office is put in here. George Briggs, manager, says he will have schedules and tickets in a few days.

Anyone desiring to make a trip by plane is asked to notify the Chamber of Commerce on the previous afternoon.

"It's Like This"

STATEMENTS BY LON A. SMITH, member of the Texas Railroad Commission, as recorded by Byron C. Utecht in the Star-Telegram, are encouraging in their relation to the important rail hearings to begin in Fort Worth.

The statement was made in connection with the commissioner's prediction that these projects will raise property valuation and at least partially solve the tax problem.

"The great railroad construction program in Texas the last few years and projects soon to be undertaken, not only will put the state forward another step to prosperity, but will enhance to a large extent the general revenues of the state government.

"We have enjoyed a big rail building program in West Texas, but it was only the beginning. Extensions will come rapidly for the next 10 years and longer, perhaps.

That is fine optimism. It should have its effect upon the Interstate Commerce Commission. Chairman Clarence E. Gilmore and likely C. V. Torrell, third member of the Texas commission, will attend the Fort Worth hearings.

It may be that the joint trackage proposal between Wellington and Shamrock will be adopted. Such a plan would deprive no community of the line it is seeking, and the only serious objection—should the Rock Island acquiesce—would be the Santa Fe which cannot serve the area properly with only an east-west road.

It is known that communities which voted to support the Rock Island several weeks ago have since regretted their stand, and would welcome a compromise plan which would put them in the position of welcoming both lines.

As Mr. Smith pointed out,

the value of a railroad from a tax standpoint is by no means limited to its own physical values. Should the Denver cross Gray county, its own valuations would be joined by enhanced property values, new community centers, and other development which would mean more taxes to build better highways, schools, and other public improvements.

The attitude of the Interstate Commerce Commission is that a railroad should be a public necessity and that there should be assurances of its ability to pay a reasonable dividend over a period of years.

But the Interstate Commerce Commission is known to be looking with favor upon proposed rail projects which would carry the service into counties and sections whose facilities are inadequate.

WASHINGTON — A western congressman fired his secretary the other day, after she had been with him seven years, with the explanation that he "needed the money for his family."

So the secretary left and the congressman now has her salary for awhile to add to his own for current expenses. It's an old graft and seems to be worked in many instances both by members of the House and the Senate.

Members of the House are allowed a flat \$5,000 a year for clerk hire. Often a congressman hires a girl for \$50 a week and pockets the other \$2,500 for himself.

Each senator is allowed a personnel of four office helpers, with salaries graded at \$3,900, \$2,400, \$2,200 and \$1,800. Some senators take the lowest salary and divide it among three employes.

Sometimes a senator puts members of his family on the payroll, who need not show up except on payday. One senator is reported to have three members of his family ostensibly in his office. Quite a few offices appear to have persons drawing government "clerk hire" money who never appear at the office. It's simple enough to have the

salary turned over to a person who can then turn it over to the senator on receipt.

Of course examples of niggardliness are sometimes matched by examples of generosity. Sometimes a senator who considers his secretary worth more than \$3,900 has the \$1,800 salary paid to the secretary's wife or other relative. Few senatorial offices employ four persons. Several instances of senators who work this type of graft occur to one—and conspicuous instances, too. But it would not be fair to mention a few without mentioning them all.

If anything should happen to President Hoover, it will be comforting to know that the health of Vice President Curtis is not only good but getting better. So that if Curtis ever lands in the White House it won't be of pressing necessity to recall who would succeed him in case of accident.

Although he is now 69 years old, the Vice President has added four inches to his chest expansion in the last three years, which is a good record for anyone to shoot at, regardless of age.

Three years ago Mr. Curtis had his tonsils removed. It appears that these things had been in bad condition and had been poisoning his system. After the operation the then Senate Republican floor leader began to improve and he hasn't been tired since.

Ford broke the Michigan law by writing a check for 2 cents—less than the dollar minimum that is legal. And now the fanatics have another example of how rich men who break the law go free.

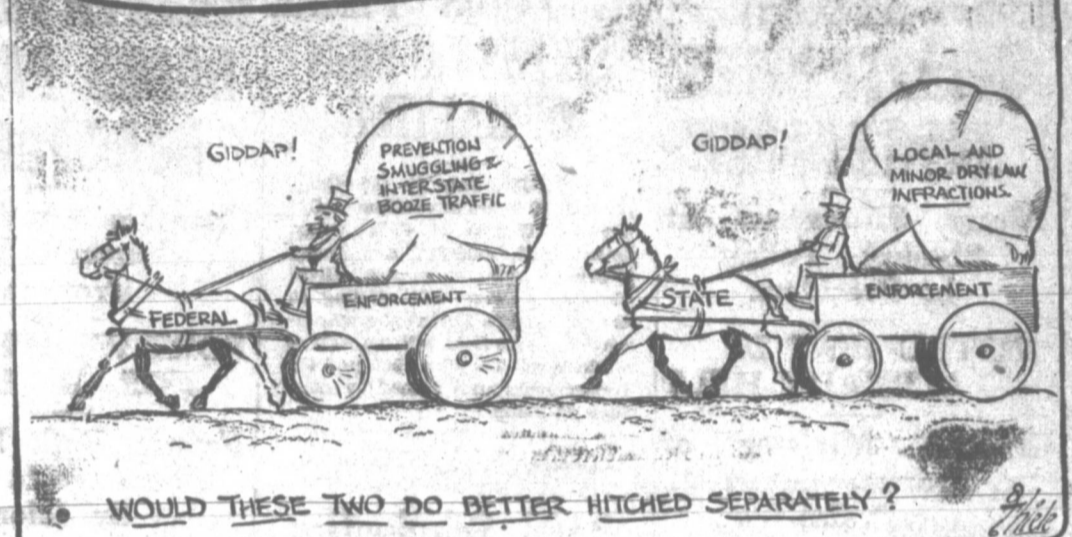
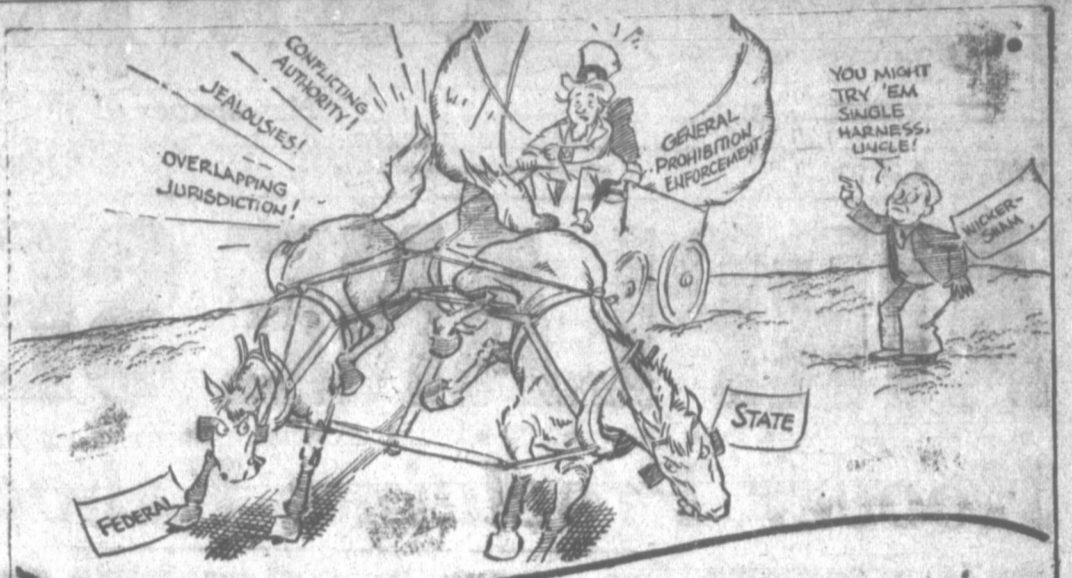

TILDEN MUST WIN BOTH HIS TENNIS TILTS

PARIS, July 24. (P)—Upon Big Bill Tilden's shoulders appears to rest most of the burden in the United States' second attempt to lift the Davis cup from France.

A glance over the probable line-ups in the challenge round which opens in Roland Garros stadium on Friday indicates that unless Tilden can win both his singles matches the United States' hopes of retrieving the cup lost to the French in 1927 will not be realized.

The surprising move that put George Lott on the team for the challenge round in place of Frank Hunter has weakened the Americans' position in the opinion of some experts. Undoubtedly the French will play Henri Cochet and Jean Borotra in the singles, and Hunter has been a consistent jinx to Borotra.

With Hunter on the team there would have been a strong possibility that he would turn in one singles victory. Thus if Tilden should do no better than break even the issue would have been decided in reality in the doubles where John van Ryn and Wilmer Allison, Wimbledon champions, appear to have a better than even chance of beating the best French pair—Cochet and Borotra.

With Lott on the team, the expert "dope" has it that Tilden must win both his singles matches or else France will retain the cup. Lott, on a good day, can beat virtually any player in the world, but he is an erratic performer and most observers expect both Cochet and Borotra to beat him. If that proves to be the case America could regain the cup only if Tilden beat Cochet and Borotra in singles and Van Ryn and Allison won in doubles.

Allison and Van Ryn have impressed the critics with their form in practice sessions.

"Rabbit" Refuses to Manage Team

CINCINNATI, July 24. (P)—The Boston Braves will have to struggle along with the services of some other person than the veteran Rabbit Maranville as manager. Maranville said here today that he is not the manager and will not accept the position unless he is appointed for a two-year term, thus interfering with plans of Judge Fuchs, the club owner.

"Judge Fuchs wanted me to take charge of the team on this trip," Maranville said, "and possibly for the remainder of the season. But I refused to take over the club unless he would give me a two-year contract, which would allow me time to build the team over according to my own ideas. I did not want to be a temporary manager. He did not care to do as I asked. I am just the shortstop of the team doing the best I can in my position. I have nothing to do with handling the club."

Johnny Evers is in charge of the team on its present trip and will act as manager at least until Judge Fuchs rejoins the team.

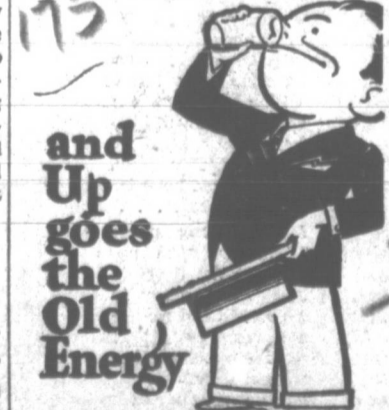

Stoner Expected to Burn Up Texas League Circuit

FORT WORTH, July 24. (AP)—The day that Lil Stoner pitches his first game here since 1923 probably will draw the season's record crowd to La Grave field. Fans have never forgotten the little star, whose blinding fast ball gave the Panthers 27 victories in 1923 and won two games in the Dixie series.

Stoner will be the only man on the club who had a real part in the Cats chain of championships, although Jimmy Walkup got 22 on the last one in 1925.

There is every reason to believe that Stoner, only 28, still can burn up the Texas League. He stayed in the majors a long time and won 50 per cent of his games, which is more than any former big leaguer in the loop can claim, with the possible exception of Wilbur Cooper of the Sports.

DEAD-HEADS

No city is free of the type that is ready to reap all the benefits of an organized community and refuses to return to help shoulder responsibilities by contributing financially or lending personal service. To be a contributor to the community's needs is not a moral duty, but an insurance as well. Business men should pay for their own advertising and not take advantage of their fellowman's money and activity. They should not be numbered with the "Dead-Heads."—Contributed.
