23 Accidents Investigated During Month

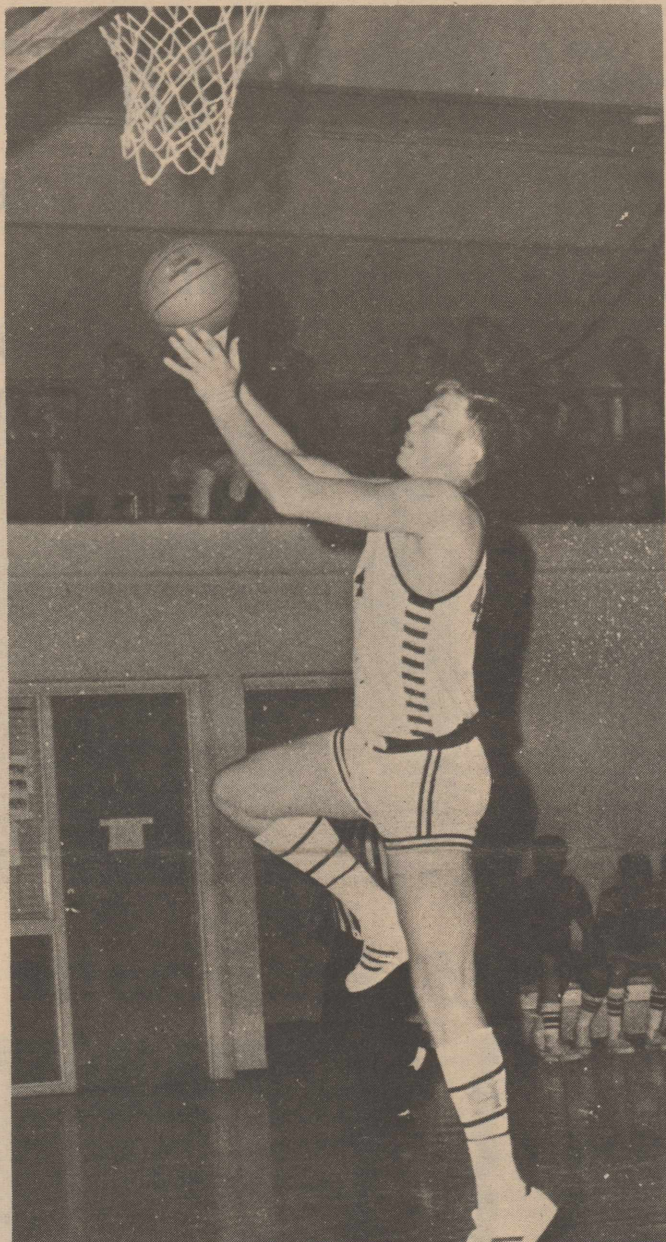
The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 23 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of December, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, ten persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$19,835.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1969 shows a total of 136 crashes resulting in three persons killed, 60 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$137,130.00.

What will the decade of the 1970's be traffic fatality wise in Texas? Here are some facts that could give you an idea. There were 25,000 persons killed in Texas traffic during the 1950's and 30,000 killed during the 1960's. If the past and present trend continues the 1970's will be another record decade.

The Sergeant reminded all motor vehicle owners that still have their inspection stickers on the lower right-hand side of their windshields that April 15 is the deadline for having the new stickers placed on the lower left-hand side of their windshields. Only about 16 percent of the registered vehicles in this county have been inspected.

Many Motorists Awaiting Last Minute Inspections

With the State's April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline approximately 90 days away, large numbers of Texas motorists have yet to take their vehicles in for the mandatory annual safety inspection.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged all motorists whose vehicles have not been inspected to visit an inspection station as soon as possible. "Those getting the inspection now will avoid long lines which are certain to develop at many stations as the April 15 deadline draws near," he said.

The DPS Director noted that Texas adopted an annual inspection program on September 1, 1969. All vehicles inspected since that date have had the sticker placed on the left side of the windshield with a large number tab inserted to show the month of expiration.

For example, vehicles inspected in September have the number nine displayed and will

require inspection before September 30, 1970. Those inspected in October have the number 10 and must be reinspected before October 31, 1970. Vehicles which are inspected in January will bear the number one and reinspection will be required before January 31, 1971.

All vehicles which currently have a sticker on the right side of the windshield have not been reinspected in compliance with the new law, and their owners have only until April 15 to visit an approved inspection station.

Red, White, Blue Forms Caution 1970 Tax Payers

The new red, white and blue tax forms come in nice patriotic colors. The good tax folks may have felt that the patriotic theme would make a nice addition--however, the colors on the tax forms serve a definite purpose. The red ink printing on the front of the form 1040 signals "Stop". What Internal Revenue hopes that you will do is to see the red "stop sign" and go back and check the instructions or check your figures and eliminate a large part of the errors that came in on last year's tax returns.

May we suggest that you might feel blue about your tax

return if you don't watch out for the red stop sign and correct the errors. The computer doesn't go by colors. The computer simply sends out a notice. It doesn't really matter how red, white and blue your attitude might have been when you prepared your return.

Tax Man Sam Sez:

If you don't know about the new income tax form, you will shortly after January 1. Internal Revenue Service has issued a fact sheet on the new form

consist of the new one-page 1040. Here are some of the facts.

The new 1040 not only replaces the card form 1040A, but also the old 1040 form. The new form is a one page basic form to which schedules can be added to cover any tax situation. IRS says that 77 million returns will be filed for this year--1969. An estimated 31 million will use only one page. Another 22 million returns will

form and one additional attachment. Thus, about 75 percent of all the 1969 income tax returns will require only one or two pages. IRS assures taxpayers who formerly filed the little card form 1040A that the new form will not complicate filing nor require additional information of them. The new form simply provides a different place for the information that should actually be easier to use. The good tax folks feel

that the new form will help 1040A filers take advantage of all the deductions available to them, especially those who overpaid their income taxes because they were not aware of, or could not take advantage of, the various tax benefits available to them. Internal Revenue gave the problem long and thorough study before they changed the tax form. Let's all hope it will make the job easier and save us a few bucks.

Therefore, as a student, I praise, honor, and admire the school and student body that I have learned to respect and appreciate for the kindness and consideration given to me.

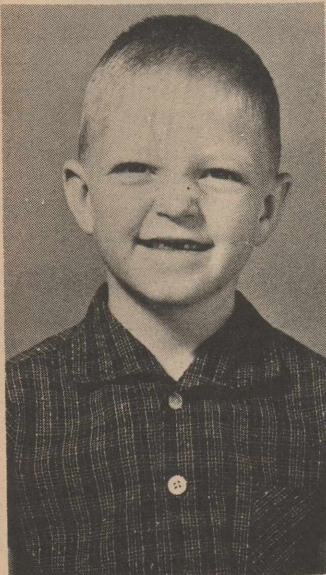
Hart High School is a symbol of education; a school devoted to a worthy cause.

Texas Farmers Subject To Self-Employment Tax

Texas farmers are subject to self-employment tax for 1969 if their farm income is \$400 or more. Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the Internal Revenue Service, advised today.

The self-employment tax rate is 6.9 percent with a maximum of \$538.20, and is in addition to income tax.

A self-employed farmer is one who operates his own business or farm. A farmer is also considered self-employed if he employs others to operate or work his farm even though he does not live on it himself.

A farmer must file a Federal Income Tax return and pay the self-employment tax due if his net earnings from self-employment are \$400 or more, even if his gross income is less than \$600 and he owes no income tax.

The self-employment tax applies to a maximum of \$7800. But this figure is reduced by any wages from which Social Security taxes are withheld.

Financial Facts

Do you know what it takes to make a dollar bill?

As most people know, the paper is the best available

and of exclusive composition. It is made up for half cotton and half linen. While the paper is being made small segments of red and blue fibers are embedded into it.

The Treasury Bureau produces all the inks that are used in plate and surface printing. Dry colors, oil and other ingredients are blended to make inks which exactly match the inks used in previous printings.

The engraving of the bill is a very complex and exalting task. Each engraver is a specialist and carves only one feature of the bill into the steel plate. One slip

or miscalculation by any of the engravers destroys weeks of work.

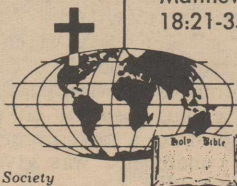

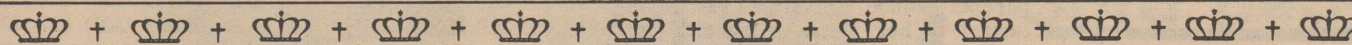
