On German-Russian Front—Reports from Russia drive at Minsk and another drive eastward in the Luck area, where the Red army said, a tank battle had turned to Russian advantage. Russians claimed a firm hold on the Prut river front and reported successful air attacks on German tank columns in the general area of the Minsk drive and in the Luck sector. Black arrows indicate reported German pushes; white arrows, Russian resistance. Germans announced a two-day air attack on Leningrad, and Russians reported heavy raids on Rumania.

Russians Say Nazi's Main Drive Stopped

A mighty battle between 4,000 German and Russian tanks raged early today in the southern Polish sector, Moscow reported in claiming that Hitler's main drives had been halted along the Nazi-soviet front.

The Germans themselves said little. Specifically, this was the picture as Red communiques outlined it:

The heaviest fighting of all at Luck and in the district of Lwow, Poland, to the southwest; many nazis taken prisoners in the northern Lithuanian sector; German columns still held up along the central Minsk front, the historic Napoleonic way to invasion of Moscow.

Appropriation Needed If Aid Goes To Reds

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Several senators differing on general foreign policy agreed today that any substantial American aid for Russia would necessitate a multi-billion-dollar increase in the present \$7,000,000,000 lend-lease program and appropriation of large new sums for armament plants.

At the same time, there was speculation in congressional quarters that the administration might soon ask additional money for the lend-lease program. President Roosevelt has promised all possible aid for Russia in fighting Germany.

Senator Byrd (D-Va.) told reporters he had heard rumors that more lend-lease money would be asked, but that he did not see how much aid could be given Russia. This country, he declared, "is not producing enough military equipment for its own needs and those of Great Britain."

US Planes Shoot Down US Planes

JERUSALEM, June 28 (AP)—Australian airmen flying new American-made Tomahawk fighter planes today shot down six American-made Glenn Martin bombers piloted by Vichy French fliers in one of the hottest air engagements of the Syrian campaign. The Australians were escorting RAF bombers in an attack on the French military depot at Palmyra when they sighted two Martin bombers raiding British and Free-French troops.

County Gives Strong Margin To Johnson

Governor O'Daniel Runs Third Here As Mann Takes Second

Lyndon B. Johnson, 32-year-old congressman from Johnson City, Saturday carried Howard county in senatorial balloting, complete unofficial returns from the 14 voting boxes showed Saturday night.

He polled a total of 933 votes. In second place was Gerald C. Mann, attorney general, with 641. Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, who twice has held a death grip on Howard county voting, was relegated to a poor third place with 454 votes, and Martin Dies, congressman from Orange, ranked fourth in the county with 261 votes.

Johnson piled up a substantial lead in the four Big Spring boxes and was never headed in the rural sections, although balloting in those quarters was generally more evenly distributed. He carried eight of the county's 14 boxes and tied in two others. Mann carried two boxes and tied one, while the governor carried one and tied two.

Out of more than 1,500 votes in four city boxes, Johnson led by 261 votes over Mann, but in the rural boxes where Mann and O'Daniel both increased strength in some boxes, Johnson was able to add but 31 to his total.

By boxes, leaders stacked up like this: Johnson in No. 2, No. 3, and No. 4 in Big Spring, Vincent, R-Bar, Coahoma, Moore, and Knott; Mann in Forsan and Soash; O'Daniel in Center Point. Johnson and O'Daniel tied in box No. 1 in Big Spring, Mann and O'Daniel tied in Gay Hill, and Johnson and Mann tied at Morris.

Sam Morris, prohibition candidate, got nine votes in the county and A. E. Harding polled one. Confusion in balloting, due to required listing of more than the democratic column which carried the four major candidates, cost more than 300 electors their votes here Saturday.

Out of 12 boxes which actually had been brought to the office of County Clerk Lee Porter late Saturday night, there were a total of 265 valid ballots. Most of these, said election judges, was due to failure to scratch names on the republican and communist listings.

More than half of the number were in box No. 3 where 156 were cast out as incorrectly marked. Box No. 2 had 47 voided ballots, Coahoma 14, No. 1 had 12, Forsan 10, Center Point nine, Knott six, Soash five, No. 4 and Moore two each. Morris and R-Bar had none. Gay Hill and Vincent figures were not immediately available.

Total vote in the county, as nearly as could be ascertained, was 2,564, barely more than half of the county's potential.

Mitchell County Favors Johnson

COLORADO CITY, June 28 (AP)—Complete unofficial returns here Saturday night from Mitchell county's 12 boxes showed Lyndon Johnson lead the lead with 504 votes.

Gerald C. Mann ranked second with 351 and Governor W. Lee O'Daniel was close behind with 375. Martin Dies was fourth with 152 votes.

O'Daniel Leads In Dawson County

LAMESA, June 28 (AP)—Governor W. Lee O'Daniel ran true to form here Saturday in sweeping through Dawson county's senatorial vote.

He polled 511 votes to 398 for Gerald C. Mann, 303 for Martin Dies and 248 for Lyndon Johnson. It marked a poor showing for Johnson who was contesting O'Daniel for the senatorship on basis of state returns.

Catholic Groups Disagree On War

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—Opposite views on American aid to Russia in her war against Nazi Germany were announced today by two Catholic groups.

The Catholic War Veterans, Inc., said it had asked President Roosevelt to reconsider his intention to aid Russia, while 15 prominent Catholic clergymen and laymen said "Hitler's attack upon Russia must not be allowed to confuse us."

REDS ASK HELP

NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—William Z. Foster, national chairman of the communist party, called upon "the Roosevelt government to make good its promises of aid to the soviet union" in a statement issued today after a secret meeting of the national committee.

Russia Says Dardenelles Not Coveted

MOSCOW, June 28 (AP)—Soviet Russia today disclaimed ambitions on the Dardanelles and Bosphorus, Turkish-controlled gateways between the Black sea and the Mediterranean, and described the German attack upon her as unprovoked.

S. A. Losovsky, assistant director of the soviet information bureau and vice-commissioner of foreign affairs, was the spokesman in presenting the Russian view of the background of the week-old war at a conference with American, British, French, Japanese and Russian news men.

German fliers had violated the soviet frontier 324 times this year, he said, often as deep as 95 miles into Russian territory, which cannot be explained otherwise than as a desire to make reconnaissance. Protests April 18 and June 21, the day before the war broke out, were cited.

Adolf Hitler's declaration of war, he charged, "contains one huge lie and 99 various sized lies prepared in the kitchen of a notorious master in this field (Propaganda Minister Paul Joseph Goebbels)."

The vice-commissioner minimized Hitler's assertion that soviet planes had violated the border, saying that Russian fliers had crossed German territory 11 times, compared to 324 German violations from January 1 to June 21.

BRITISH-REDS CONFER

MOSCOW, June 28 (AP)—The British economic military mission made direct contact with soviet departments today.

Margin Cut To 5,000 Votes

DALLAS, June 28 (Spl)—Result of the Texas senatorial election hung in the balance at midnight Saturday, incomplete returns from nearly all of the state's counties showed. Tabulations of the copyright figures of the Texas Election Bureau revealed Lyndon Johnson clinging to a narrow lead but with Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel pressing closely and steadily reducing the margin.

Gerald Mann, attorney general, remained in third place and Martin Dies was trailing in fourth. Mann issued a formal concession of defeat.

Johnson amassed his strength largely in Central and Southwest Texas, while O'Daniel received an especially heavy vote in North Texas and the High Plains.

Early returns placed Johnson in the lead, and in succeeding reports he added to his margin until at 9:30 p. m. he had a 13,000 lead over Gov. O'Daniel. At that point he had 95,652 to 82,174 for the governor. Mann, holding his position in third place, had 77,816 at that report.

But on the 10 p. m. report, O'Daniel surged forward to cut heavily into Johnson's lead. Johnson then had 117,885 while O'Daniel had pulled up to 109,861. The governor pulled up steadily in the 10:30 p. m. report to 120,068 while Johnson was going to 126,630. Again O'Daniel reduced the gap at 11:30 p. m. when he ran to 147,761 while Johnson was faltering to reach 150,871.

In the matter of the big city votes, Johnson carried Fort Worth, Houston, San Antonio, El Paso, Corpus Christi, Abilene, San Angelo, Austin, Waco and Wichita Falls. Gerald Mann made a sensational stand in Dallas, his residence, where he got almost as much as others combined. O'Daniel took leads in the Panhandle region and showed to be plugging systematically away with rural strength, especially in the region northward from the caprock of the high plains. In North Texas and down into parts of East Texas he was cutting a serious swath.

Whether Johnson could muster enough strength in unreported areas or on tardy returns to slay off the relentless advance of the governor was uncertain. Although trailing, the governor's position was conceded to be very favorable.

Mann Leads In Midland County

MIDLAND, June 28 (Spl)—Attorney General Gerald C. Mann carried Midland county in balloting for U. S. senator here Saturday.

He polled 322 votes to 284 for Lyndon Johnson. Governor W. Lee O'Daniel had 267 and Martin Dies 232. Balloting in Midland county was most evenly distributed of any reported in this area.

Roosevelt Slates July 4 Broadcast

HYDE PARK, N. Y., June 28 (AP)—President Roosevelt is expected to speak to his fellow Americans at 3 p. m. (CST) on July 4, leading them in what he has termed a "grand rededication to liberty."

Mr. Roosevelt is expected to ask every American participating in a nation-wide Independence Day celebration to join him in the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Aviation Thriller, 'I Wanted Wings,' At Ritz Theatre Today

Picture Made With Sanction Of Air Corps

Ray Milland, William Holden, Wayne Morris Head Large Cast

Widely hailed as the best aviation thriller yet to come from Hollywood, "I Wanted Wings" currently is the roaring drama on the Ritz screen. It is the Paramount flying epic, starring Ray Milland, William Holden, Wayne Morris and Brian Donlevy, and featuring in the cast a sensational newcomer, Veronica Lake, and lovely Constance Moore.

Produced by Arthur Hornblow, Jr., and directed by Mitchell Leisen, the new film was made with the complete cooperation of the Army Air Corps, with the result that the flying scenes are the most thrilling depicted on the screen. Milland, Holden and Morris are three young cadets who come to Randolph Field, ready to be put through the Army Air Corps preliminary to becoming fliers. Milland is a society boy, Holden a garage mechanic from the Corn Belt, Morris a football hero. The drama, the fun they have, the anxiety, the thrills, are all part of the story, as the film takes us through the various stages of their wings-winning progress. Brian Donlevy plays the part of a flying instructor who encourages them when they falter during their training period. All turn in remarkably authentic performances.

Veronica Lake is the gold-digging, ruthless night club singer, who almost ruins the hard-built careers of Milland and Holden. Beautiful and unprincipled, the honey-haired charmer goes "on the make" for Milland, after tossing aside Holden. When she gets into trouble with the police, she hides herself aboard a giant "Flying Fortress" before it takes off for maneuvers in a mock night bombing raid. She causes the bomber to crash, and dies in the wreckage.

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Aviation Thrills—The season's most spectacular aviation drama, "I Wanted Wings," is at the Ritz theatre today and Monday, with a cast including Constance Moore, Ray Milland, Veronica Lake and William Holden. Filmed with the cooperation of the Army Air Corps—many scenes were made at Randolph Field—"I Wanted Wings" packs flying thrills as well as romantic excitement.

Although it is an unsympathetic role, Miss Lake succeeds in doing such a marvelous job of acting, one can't help admiring her. There's no question this girl is headed for Hollywood fame.

Of uniform excellence is the performance of beautiful Constance Moore, in the role of a part straight-from-the-shoulder girl photographer for a national magazine, who falls in love with Ray Milland, the envy of the other birdmen.

A simulated attack on blacked-out Los Angeles, shown in the picture, is one of the most gripping scenes ever shown on the screen. The flying is magnificent and photographed with complete and breath-taking artistry, and is an integral part of the drama.

The audience shares the emotions of Ray Milland, William Holden and Wayne Morris, as they go through the flying course, the first time up, the thrill of soloing, dive bombing, and the terror of the crashes. Of course, they have their fun, too, and there are moments of hilarious comedy in the picture.

Right Of Way For Pipelines Sought
WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—A bill authorizing the government to acquire by right of eminent domain rights-of-way for petroleum pipe lines deemed essential to the national defense was recommended to the senate interstate commerce committee today by a sub-committee.

Petroleum—Coordinator Harold Ickes yesterday sent to Senator Stewart (D-Tenn.), acting chairman of the subcommittee, a request that the measure not be amended to include natural gas pipe lines and aides said no amendments were recommended by the sub-committee.

Koala Bear Never Drinks
BRISBANE, Australia.—Australia's oldest known koala bear has not taken a drink for the past 18 years, according to keepers of the Lone Pine zoo. The animal was captured during the 1920 open season and placed in the koala bear sanctuary at the zoo.

Humphrey Bogart Is Starred In 'The Wagons Roll At Night'

Playing today and Monday at the Lyric theatre is "The Wagons Roll At Night," starring Humphrey Bogart, Joan Leslie, Eddie Albert and Sylvia Sydney. The picture, produced by Warner Bros., the same studio which made the thrilling film "They Drive By Night," was directed by Ray Enright.

"The Wagons Roll At Night" is the exciting drama of reckless men and women who live in a city on wheels, with new adventures turning up at every bend of the road. Bogart plays the role of the tough and impregnable owner of a carnival. In his troupe are the worldly-wise fortune-teller, Florida, played by Sylvia Sydney, and Matt, small town boy who joins the troupe and becomes the lion-tamer, played by Eddie Albert. Like most "hard guys," Bogart has a soft spot, which he guards carefully from the members of his troupe. It is his young convent-bred sister, played by Joan Leslie, for whom he maintains a comfortable country home, where she is looked after by an old couple. His careful plans for keeping her away from all contact with the carnival folks go awry when Sylvia drives Eddie up there to recuperate from a battle with the "cats." Before Bogart learns of his whereabouts, Eddie and Joan have fallen deeply in love. He endeavors to break up the romance, but when he sees how impossible that is, he tries another method for getting Eddie out of the way. The results are fatal—but for Bogart, not for Eddie.

Besides the cast's four headliners there is a featured cast which includes Sig Ruman, Cliff Clark, Charley Foy, Clara Blandick and Aldrich Bowker, as well as a host of extra players for the many big scenes. Fred Niblo, Jr. and Barry Trivers wrote the screen play, from a story by Francis Wallace.

Lid's Off—A drama purporting to expose political racketeering and chain-gang slavery is the Queen's offering for today and Monday, "Big Boss." Gloria Dickson and Otto Kruger have the principal roles.

Biggest Money Bill In History Passes
WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Congress gave final approval today to the biggest cash appropriation bill in the nation's history, a gigantic \$10,384,821,624 item for the army. The total exceeded the largest previous appropriation, a 1919 army bill by about a billion dollars.

The senate sent the measure to the White House as one of many actions taken in the course of a day devoted to clearing the calendar of legislation which had to be disposed of before the fiscal year closes at midnight on Monday.

New Air School At Cuero Gets Contract
CUERO, June 28 (AP)—Clyde E. Brayton, president of the Brayton Flying Service, said today a contract totaling \$800,000 had been signed tripling the U. S. army air cadet classes receiving elementary training at the Brayton flying service school at Cuero municipal airport.

The new program will be in full swing by December, Brayton said. The program calls for a maximum class of 145 cadets every five weeks, with a total of 290 students to be in training at all times under the maximum operation. The students will receive a 10 weeks course at the school.

Women Asked To Brand Thieves
KANSAS CITY, June 28 (AP)—Police Chief L. B. Reed, called on women's long, tinted fingernails today to help stop a wave of purse snatching. Dig them into the faces of purse thieves and molesters," he urged, "so police will have something to work on."

Russian Planes Raid Bucharest
NEW YORK, June 28 (AP)—The Budapest radio reported at 7:15 p. m. (CST) tonight that Bucharest, capital of Rumania, was "just now" bombed, with considerable damage and many civilian deaths. No casualties were caused by Russian attacks on Constanta, said this report heard by NBC, because the city had been evacuated. The Budapest radio also said Russians were blowing up bridges and tunnels leading into the Carpatho-Ukraine and were retreating swiftly in the Baltic states with violent fighting on all fronts.

Broadcast By Pope Pius Scheduled
VATICAN CITY, June 28 (AP)—Pope Pius XII prayed at the tomb of St. Peter tonight on the eve of a radio address to the world in which he was expected to make known his views on the war the axis is waging against Soviet Russia.

The Osservatore Romano, a Vatican City newspaper, said the pontiff would "expose his views on the subject of Divine Providence in human events."

Soldier Fined \$300
DENVER, Colo.—Verlin La May, soldier at Lowry Field here, drew a \$300 fine for speeding 70 miles an hour on one of Denver's busiest thoroughfares.

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German Move To East Resembles That To West Just A Year Ago

While the Germans add up their preliminary returns from the Russian campaign, it is possible to envisage, from those reports which are substantiated by the Russians, something of the nature of this tremendous military movement. Along the whole Baltic-Black sea front, the principal danger to the red army appears to be the wedge which the German army is pounding toward the Minsk area of white Russia—a wedge preceded by the groping arms of panzer divisions, and protected on the south flank by the dark Morass of the Pripyet marshes of East Poland.

This movement, and the pincers which are biting into the Baltic states to the north, are designed to encircle and destroy the whole red army of northwest Russia, perhaps a million men. There are indications that the panzers which are feeling the way for the main mass of German soldiers have broken the defenses of the Niemen and are crawling within striking distance to Minsk. This means an advance of well over 100 miles from the East Prussian border, through the undulating plain of East Poland.

Minsk, strongly defended, is an important rail center just inside pre-war Russia, 465 miles by rail from Moscow. For purposes of comparison it might be called the Sedan of the Russian campaign, since it may mark the lower corner of the pocket which the Germans have designed for the reds in the soviet movement.

Having thus outflanked the Maginot line, three whole German armies, moving at a rate of more than 25 miles a day, proceeded to sew up the pocket to the sea which trapped the French and British in Flanders and brought about the epic of Dunkerque.

Featuring Otto Kruger, Gloria Dickson and John Lital in the leading roles, the story opens in one of the small southern states where Jim Maloney is head of the state's political machine. Maloney, portrayed by Kruger, is a vicious racketeer and practically runs the state prison's chain-gang to suit himself. His best-paying scheme is one in which his associates buy up large parcels of poorly developed land at low prices. The property is then improved by chain-gang labor at the states expense, and Maloney reaps the profits.

However, a cloud crosses Maloney's horizon when Bob Dugan, played by Lital, is elected governor on a reform ticket. Encouraged by Sus Peters, wise-cracking young newspaper woman, Dugan vows to destroy the chain-gang and its corrupt backers. How he succeeds in smashing the racket in spite of strong opposition furnished by Maloney and his cohorts, furnishes the basis for one of the most exciting screen events seen in a long time.

Kruger and Lital are excellent in their roles, while Gloria Dickson, portraying the girl reporter, comes through with a splendid performance. Don Beddos heads the talented cast of supporting players, which also includes such familiar names as Robert Fluke, George Lessey and Joe Conti.

House Military Committee Raps Administration

Many Groups Blamed For Lack Of Arms

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—In a sharply critical report on defense progress, the house military committee asserted today that a series of major "failures" and "delays" had led to a present serious lack of strategic materials.

The deficiencies, the committee added in a voluminous report based on weeks of study, were attributable largely to "absence of a responsible head with authority and power," but also to national preoccupation in recent years with "social reform rather than national security."

The report spoke, too, of a need

for "vision" on the part of government officials and observed: "The administration has been too prone when difficult problems arose to easily dispose of them by creating another board, only to add to the confusion of the assortment of agencies we now have."

As for the lack of strategic materials, the report said:

A shortage of aluminum is "critical" because of inadequate power and fabrication facilities. Rubber is not available in sufficient quantities primarily because of a lack of ships and refusal by some shippers to carry the commodity.

(In informed quarters today, it was reported that airplane production this summer would lag primarily because of shortage of essential materials. May output was 1,334 planes compared with 1,389 in April.)

The house committee's report listed these as short-comings in connection with the defense program:

1. "Failure on the part of congress, the administration and the public to initiate a stock pile program at an earlier date."
2. "Failure to entrust to a responsible head the full authority to carry out the will of congress in the legislation enacted."
3. "Failure of a sense of urgency on the part of officials of purchasing organizations."
4. "The delay in establishing conservation method and the use of substitutes for fear of creating unemployment."
5. "Unwarranted delays in building plants and facilities for the conversion of raw materials into finished products."

In connection with the fourth point, the study said:

"We do not wish to single out the automotive industry as an ex-

ample because we realize fully its vital part in our industrial and civil life, but this industry was too long allowed to consume sorely needed defense materials in this first year of our defense effort."

Texas Capitol Draws All Kinds Of Visitors—Including Nazis

AUSTIN, June 28 (AP)—All kinds of people, from jitterbugs to Nazi organizers, visit the capitol, and they ask Mrs. R. H. Ward all kinds of questions.

Mrs. Ward, hostess in the senate chamber, says jitterbugs are abundant in her register, but the book contains only three Nazi organizers.

They walked into the chamber one summer afternoon a couple of years ago. First to sign was a man who gave his address as Nuremberg, Germany.

With him were a man and a woman from Houston who dined the "Nazi organizer" entry the first man had written.

Mrs. Ward usually greets visitors with the query, "who is your senator?"

Half or more of them don't know. The answer has been "Tom Connally" or "Morris Sheppard" on several occasions.

The high esteem in which some of his supporters hold W. Lee O'Daniel was shown by a large

lady and her small son.

They wandered around the chamber for a few moments, apparently uninterested. Suddenly the lady cried, "Mama! Mama! Come here! Quick!"

The mother came to the boy's side. "What is it, son?"

"There he is!" the boy said, pointing to the governor's picture. "That's him!"

The woman gazed admiringly at the picture. Clapping her hands, eyes lighting up, she breathed, "Oh, bless him!"

When the legislature ends its work, Mrs. Ward's busiest season begins. It has been estimated that 30,000 persons visit the capitol each summer.

One count showed that the vacation sightseers came from 38 states and nine foreign countries.

There are also many visitors during the sessions. These have included school glee clubs, the state poet laureate and a group of Indian ceremonial dancers—all of whom entertained the senators.

Washington Diplomats Think Warlords Have Taken Over Germany From Nazis

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—The German army, administration advisors said today, apparently has wrested control of the reich's war policies from the Nazi party and embarked on a campaign of conquest "strangely reminiscent of Genghis Khan's."

The great Mongol warlord, they recalled, swept with his warriors from the Amur in Asia to the Danube, whereas the objective of the German army seems to be the conquest of the region that lies between the Danube and the Amur, now in Russia's far East.

Authoritative foreign reports gave the advisors the basis for their appraisal of German military aims and the overturn of power in Berlin.

On the eve of the onslaught

against Russia, the reports said, the army and the leaders of the national socialist party split sharply, with the Nazis opposing war on the Soviet in favor of an all-out attempt to conquer England.

Adolf Hitler sided finally with the military—voluntarily or otherwise—and the army won the argument.

Thus the reichswehr, which early in Hitler's regime lost place to the Nazis as the most powerful single force in Germany, would seem to be back in the saddle.

Despite the present barrage of conflicting claims from Berlin and Moscow, the belief persisted here that a complete Nazi triumph by autumn was inevitable, barring the equivalent of an "act of God" to upset expert calculations.

This authoritative estimate of military prospects involved a number of disturbing implications for American defense policies. Mounting official concern has been reported over the possibility that Germany or Japan would win control of Asiatic Russia, whose Siberian coast is within a few miles of Alaska, across the Bering straits.

The immediate German plan is believed to be utter destruction of the Red army as an offensive force, the overthrow of the Soviet regime and the substitution of puppet regional states in the Ukraine, the Baltic and elsewhere.

Marshal Mannerheim Calls For Holy War

HELSINKI, Sunday, June 29 (AP)—Field Marshal Baron Carl Gustaf Mannerheim declared today in his first order of the day that the soldiers of Finland must follow him in a holy war against the Russians.

"Follow me this last time—when Karelians rise again and a new day dawns for Finland," he appealed.

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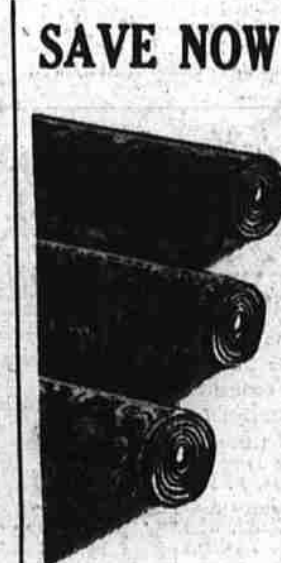

Colorado City Youth Tells Of Conversations With British Sailors In Hawaiian Islands

COLORADO CITY, June 28. (AP)—It's practically fun to be in military service for the U. S. compared to being in the same service for even England. That is the general impression conveyed by a long letter which Mr. and Mrs. H. F. McCorkle of Colorado City have just received from their son, John, who is with the air corps at Hickam Field, Honolulu, Hawaii.

McCorkle has been in the service over a year. After seeing some marines and sailors from a British cruiser, McCorkle wrote: "Those fellows (the British marines and sailors) have to stay in the navy for twelve years per enlistment period. Here I am griping about a mere three years to go. They had been at sea for two and a half years. They only stopped at ports for refueling and supplies."

The English navy men of whom McCorkle wrote were on a British cruiser which put in at Pearl Harbor for fuel and supplies. "They had been in several fights on the Mediterranean," McCorkle wrote. "They participated in battles at Crete and Greece. Also around Cairo and Alexandria, Egypt. Their tour consisted of fights with German submarines and dive bombers. They had come through the Suez canal around

through the Indian ocean, and had been in Bombay and Calcutta, India. Also in Singapore, Hongkong and Manila.

"Their ship was badly in need of repairs, having been in raids by the Germans. They had been torpedoed twice and had had several bombs dropped on them. Most of the damage had been done by a bomb from a German Stuka dive bomber. They were not permitted to say to what extent the ship had been damaged. However, they had 34 killed and 34 wounded on their ship. They declined to say how many were or had been aboard."

Collection Of Indian Relics To Be Displayed

Collections of Indian relics, assembled during years among tribes in Oklahoma, will be shown here starting this week by R. B. Selvidge and under the auspices of the Howard County Museum association.

Selvidge, who made the collection, said that he had lived among Oklahoma Indian tribes for nearly two score years, had served as an interpreter and was sometimes called "Chief White Eagle."

His collection will be on display in the building immediately north of the Big Spring Hardware Co. store in the 100 block on Main street.

A portion of the proceeds will go to the local museum association, and the collections may be shown for a period of 30 days, it was indicated. Those who have seen it considered it an outstanding one, and museum officials said that there was a possibility that they might acquire it from Selvidge since he has decided to make Big Spring his home.

Farmers Prepare To Combat Serious Flea Hopper Menace

Mrs. Hopper Rites Today Coahoma

Funeral for Mrs. Lizzie Ann Hopper, who died at the home of a son in Big Spring Saturday, will be held at the Coahoma Baptist church at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Burial will follow in the Coahoma cemetery under direction of Nalley Funeral home. Officiating for the service will be the Rev. Robert Bowden of the Big Spring Church of God, and the Rev. N. W. Pitts, Coahoma Baptist pastor.

Mrs. Hopper had been ill since February. Her home was in Stanton, but she had been living here while ill. She was born September 16, 1891 in Tennessee.

Survivors include a brother, Tom Meador of Sherman; father, W. Henry Meador of Sherman; seven sons, Taylor and David of Big Spring; Reilas, Chester Allen, Delbert and Joe Lee of Stanton; a

daughter, Estelle Daves of Sterling City; two grandchildren, Mr. Hopper died in 1937 and was buried at Coahoma.

Funeralbearers will be H. B. Stull, R. G. Cook, Mont McKaskle, H. E. Gartin, Wheeler Meeks and James Meeks.

Photography Studied By HD Reporters

The Reporters Association of Howard county home demonstration clubs met Saturday afternoon in the office of County HD Agent Lora Farnsworth to study photography.

Machinery For Dusting Lacking

Howard county farmers are making feverish preparations to combat an infestation of cotton flea hoppers that threaten to seriously reduce the cotton yield.

Shortage of dusting machinery and failure of farmers to heed warnings of the approaching insect menace and obtain this machinery is likely to seriously handicap the effort to curtail the insects, however.

County Agent O. P. Griffin, who has been predicting for several weeks that a large crop of cotton flea hoppers would strike at cotton during the first week of July, said Saturday he thought there were only about 18 dusting machines in the county. More will be obtained, but each machine can cover only about 100 acres every eight hours, and the dust needs to be applied during a fairly short period the last of next week.

In preparation for the dusting campaign, the Big Spring Cotton Oil company has obtained a truck load of sulphur and has a freight car load on the road and due to arrive here early in the week. It will sell for \$3.50 per hundred pounds.

One local implement company promised to have several dusting machines on hand by the first of the week; another had several ordered for the last of the week or the first of next, and a third said none were available.

Cotton flea hoppers must be dusted during the first half of their lives, the county agent points out. Each generation lives a month or slightly less, and all fleas of the generation hatch out within a few days time.

Griffin inspected fields all over Howard county Friday afternoon and Saturday. He found few young fleas, but found an average of one old flea per stalk of cotton. According to Griffin's observations, a new generation of young hoppers will hatch out early in the week at the rate of 100 for every old one now present.

These fleas will go to work in the cotton squares and blast many of them. The tiny green insects, about the size of a pencil point, are hard to find in the field, but blasted squares and stalks of cotton shooting up to unnatural heights will mark their presence after the damage is done.

Sulphur dusts blow the sulphur down into the squares and kill the insects. A dusting of sulphur at the rate of 8 or 10 pounds to the acre will likely keep the pest on the cotton for a week, after which another dusting should be made.

The two dustings will keep sul-

phur on the cotton two weeks, and during that period fleas of a generation will likely pass through the young age in which they can be killed. Fleas as much as half grown are hard to kill with sulphur.

Griffin recommends that dusting start next Wednesday or Thursday. However, those who can start as early as Monday, July 7, are advised to do so.

The county agent believes that the increased production in cottonseed alone will pay for sulphur and labor required in the dusting, not to speak of the added profits from lint.

He believes that half a bale of cotton per acre at least can be reached all over Howard county providing the fleas can be controlled. This production he views as almost certain, barring extremely disastrous conditions.

But he believes the cotton fleas will reduce this production to a quarter of a bale or less where dusting is not done. With cottonseed selling for \$45 per ton and lint pegged at around 12 cents, this represents a large money loss.

Thus far no other insects have shown signs of doing great damage. Boll weevils are showing the greatest emergence in history, but dry weather later in the summer is expected to kill them off. However, with wet weather, they could become a major menace later on. Dusting with calcium arsenate might become necessary in that case.

Also there will be added one room to the frame building which has housed 87 negro students studying in nine grades.

School officials acted quickly on a petition in calling the election so that the improvements might be carried out before the reopening of school in event the bonds were approved. The increase in tax rate, which already is against the \$1 constitutional limit.

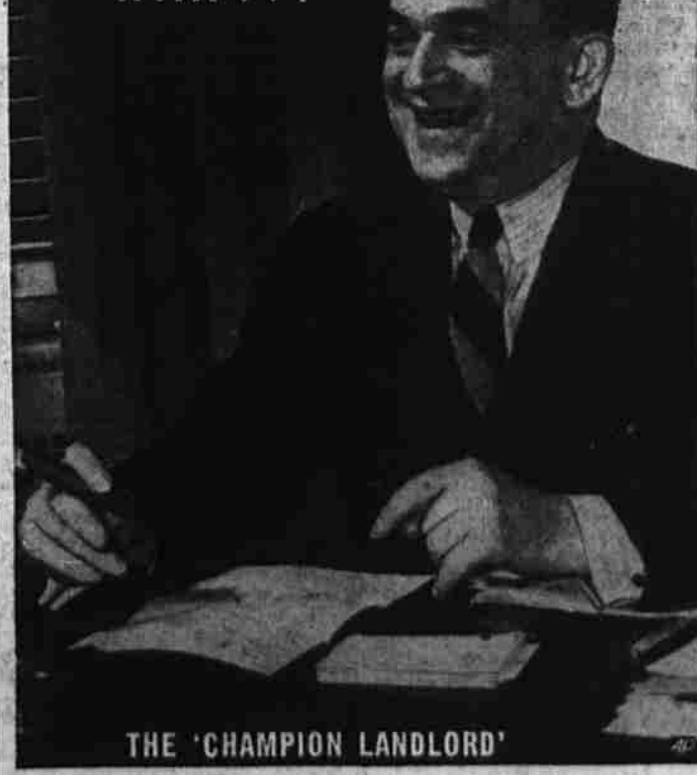

HAVERFORD, Pa., June 28. (AP) Joe Hunt, of the naval academy, took less than an hour—54 minutes to be exact—to defeat Ted Olevins 6-3, 6-0, 6-1 today to win the national intercollegiate tennis championship at Merion Cricket club today.

The Annapolis star gave a perfect demonstration of how the nation's No. 4 ranked men's player hits them in defeating the University of Southern California sophomore. In one streak Hunt won the ten straight games.

Hunt, seeded favorite, lost the championship last year on the same courts to Don McNeill, of Kenyon college. But today it was a different story. The navy player took an early 3-0 lead in the first set and continued to pile up placements and deadly chop shots to carry him to an easy victory.

The University of Southern California player, second seeded in the tourney, came back to team with Charlie Mattman and win the doubles championship from Bill Canning and Bob Hippert, of the University of California, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4.

The 22-year-old midshipman's victory gave the navy its first championship in the 57-year history of the tournament and the East its first champ since Julius Bolligon, of Lehigh, won in 1925.

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Lookin 'em Over

At long last, Big Spring's Bombers' pitching staff includes a lefthander, Howard "Lefty" Parks, 24-year-old, ex-Borger hurler from Meeker, Oklahoma. Parks is a class player and is slated to fill a crying need on the Bomber roster.

Last year, Lefty hurt his side while playing for the Gasers and retired from the sport. Since leaving the Borger club he has been employed in a carbon plant in the same city. Manager Jodie Tate put the new Bomber in the fray Friday night to finish up a game started by Willard Ramsdell. Jodie said the lefthander performed in a bang-up manner and should be capable of top-ranking performances during the remainder of the season. Right now, Lefty is out of condition, the Big Spring skipper said, but he expected to be in smooth running order before too many days, have passed.

Schley Riley, one of the Big Spring Bombers' hotter fans, is of the opinion that Lefty ought to be able to deliver the goods—he patted Big Spring every time he took the mound against the locals last year. Although Parks has a few years on the majority of the Bombers, this is only his third year in West Texas-New Mexico league competition.

Why does Parks fill a crying need of the Big Springers? Well, for some reason—there are several versions—it is especially difficult for a lefthanded batter to hit a southpaw pitcher. In view of the fact that some of the circuit clubs, Lamesa and Wichita Falls for example, have most of their hitting power centered in lefthanders, a southpaw moundsman is a mighty handy thing to have around the place.

The Bombers have another lad on the sick list now. Buck Schulze, steady righthanded hurler, has had a couple of his choppers removed and is currently feeling a little under the weather. Skipper Jodie said Buck should be back in the lineup soon but, in the meantime, the Bombers were rather hard pressed for pitchers.

Those things are after Matt Harrington again. Friday, Matt was making the rounds at the Munny golf course with Banker Ira Thurman. Matt had called attention to the manner in which he had been lining the little white pellet down the center of the fairway and Thurman offered to wager a cup of coffee he would fall on the 17th hole. Matt did—getting a beautiful line drive into the brush that decorates one end of the fairway.

Then, Banker Ira proceeded to show him how it should be done—connecting with a blast that sent the ball 275 yards straight down the line—the best distance he ever got on that particular hole. Now, that could mean one of two things—Matt has been hexed or Thurman has just naturally been living right.

On the Big Spring Bomber line-up, his first year here, there is a lad who is fast building up a name for having just about the most potent arm in the West Texas-New Mexico baseball league. Haney is 20 years old, a right-hander, and carries no fat on his five feet ten and one-half inches, 160-pound frame.

Haney attributes his spectacular throwing arm to the fact that he delivered papers for many a year in his hometown, Dallas.

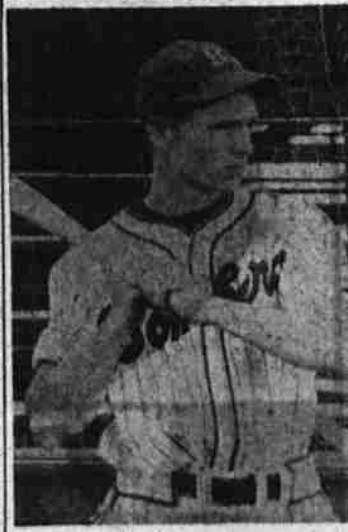
In other words, the arm that brought him his spending money as a kid is now making him his living as a man.

This Bomber was born at Kemp, Texas, June 26, 1921, but his people moved to Big D when he was just a baby. He's one of the married men on the Bomber roster, having married the former Geraldine White of Lamesa on March 28, just a few days before he appeared on the scene for this year's season of the league wars. Mrs. Haney is a cousin of Gus White, well-known Lamesa sportsman.

Although this is the third year Haney has been known to West Texas-New Mexico fans, it is actually only his second year of competition. In 1939 he played under the Lamesa Lobo colors, having signed up with the club immediately after graduating from Forest Avenue high school of Dallas in January. Then, in 1940 he returned to the battles under the guidance of Jodie Tate, at that time skipper of the Lamesa club.

A bout with sinus trouble resulted in Haney taking off before the 1940 season—not because he was through with baseball, but because he needed time to whip a mean sinus infection.

Big Springers are well acquainted with Haney guy. He is the one who started off a triple play

against the late lamented Barons. It seems that he made a shoestring catch of a fly to the outfield, shot it in for a putout at second base, then the ball continued its journey to kill off a Baron at first.

During his '39 showing, he made only seven errors over the season. In that period he picked himself 28 assists. His hitting record for '39 shows .320, while the '40 book displays .240.

Haney has run the gamut of baseball posts. Starting out in sandlot ball at the ripe old age of seven, he held down the catching job all through grade school.

While in high school he played shortstop. In his last year at Forest Avenue the school club won the state championship, bringing to a finale a grand three-year's training for pro ball.

His semi-pro competition has been somewhat limited, although he did perform in Dallas under the Hart Furniture colors.

Haney started his professional career at second base, although he was originally signed up for a job at short. After showing his phenomenal heaving strength, Haney was shifted to the outfield. In '39 he fielded approximately 900 and dished the count during the short time he played in '40.

This Irish lad is of the material from which baseball aces are made. He knows his business, is steady under fire, and knows pretty well how to judge what he's up against when facing an opposing pitcher.

At for this year's work with the Bombers, Haney was leading his club in hitting up to the last time the league statistics were given, and he has yet to make a straight-out miff of a fly ball in '41.

The race was run for both senior and junior titles and Lou Gregory of New York's Millrose A. A. picked up where McCluskey left off to take the senior championship in 33 minutes 11 seconds. Ted Volmer of the San Francisco Olympic club, the runner-up, became junior champion and was caught in 33:27.

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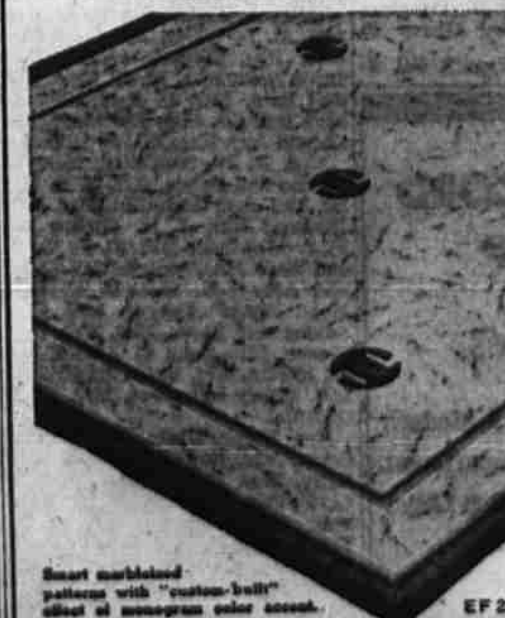

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Editorial —

Officers Should Be Encouraged, Not Criticized, For Doing Duty

We can see no reason why a traffic officer should issue a ticket without reason. He is not working on a commission basis, he is given no particular quota of tickets to fill, he usually doesn't know whose car he is tagging.

Because the officer has no personal ends to accomplish by issuing tickets, we do not believe Big Spring officers are issuing traffic tickets except when they are due.

Officers are hired to issue these tickets. When they do so, they are doing their duty; when they do not, they are violating a trust bestowed them by the city.

Officers should not be criticized for issuing

tickets. To criticize them for the performance of this duty is like criticizing a man for doing his job or for paying his debts, or doing something else he is supposed to do.

Instead, they should be complimented for performance of their duty as they see it, regardless of the person whose car is tagged. If they are not to perform their duty, they should be discharged, the police department eliminated.

But let's not do that. Let's get behind our policemen and tell them to tag every car found in violation of the law. If our own car is tagged, let us be good sportsmen and pay the fines—which are small but sufficient to teach us a lesson. That is the only way to get the traffic problem solved.

Man About Manhattan—
Hot Dog Was Invented In New York's Famed Coney Island

NEW YORK—These are the days that give New York's city-bound millions the urge to get out to the parks and the beaches, and especially to Steeplechase Park on Coney Island, which juts into the sea like a lopsided hotdog.

Hot dog is a good word to associate with Coney, for it was here that the hot dog was invented. Back in 1871 a Coney Island baker by the name of Charles Feltman wanted something to go into his bun that would increase their attractiveness and make them yield better dividends. The hotdog was the result, and it remained for the great Babe Ruth, years later, to set an all-time world's record by eating two dozen at one sitting and washing them down with a gallon of lemonade. As his home run records attest, the Babe never does things by halves.

Another product of Coney Island was frozen custard, now a national industry. The inventor was trying to contrive a new ice-cream freezer, but something went wrong, and the custard resulted.

Steeplechase park has the highest joy ride structure on earth—a parachute jump that towers more than 250 feet. . . . I am told also that the giant ferris wheel was first conceived as an instrument of war. The idea was to place it behind the trenches, fill it with men and guns, and shoot at the enemy in relays. . . . You can

make up your own mind whether you want to believe this or not.

But there is no reason to disbelieve this—that Coney Island is the most imitated pleasure haven on the earth. At this moment you will find more than 2,500 "Coney Islands" scattered through the 48 states and through the countries of the world. The late Flo Ziegfeld, for years made a habit of hiring Coney for his New Year's Eve celebrations, the climax of which were dives into the icy waters for magnitudes of champagne.

It wasn't many years ago that a girl all of you know worked as a locker room girl at Coney. Her name was Joan Crawford. Cary Grant, before he went to the movies, was a Steeplechase still walker. And Jimmy Durante and Irving Berlin banged pianos in the Irish saloons on the island. Eddie Cantor is another ex-Coney employee—he worked in a shooting gallery.

Speaking of shooting galleries, of which Coney has many, a municipal law stipulates that all guns in the galleries must be chained to the counters from the inner side, so to prevent possible murders and would-be suicides. With the guns chained from the inner side, you can only point them at the targets.

Edgar Bergen Spends Money To Help Young Men Learn to Fly, Girls To Learn Nursing

HOLLYWOOD—He was a slender blond chap, quiet and introspective, and he sat at a lunch counter eating doughnuts and coffee and pouring the fateful circumstance that if he had ten bucks—or even a decent suit to wear—he wouldn't have to leave college.

He didn't have the ten bucks, and he didn't have the decent suit. Northwestern university, therefore, doesn't number Edgar Bergen among its alumni. Northwestern, it is true, is making amends. Bergen is named for an honorary Master of Arts degree on a level approaching Charlie McCarthy, who likewise failed to graduate but was consoled with a degree as "Master of Snappy Comeback and Innuendo."

Charlie was Bergen's first puppet-love and chief support in college, but people didn't appreciate Charlie as they do now. Bergen had to give up plans for medicine—too long a course and too expensive—and concentrate on speech and dramatics. And then, lacking ten bucks, he had to give up everything and settle down to show business.

He's never forgotten it. That's obvious when you consider Bergen's two pet philanthropies today. He doesn't call them that, and he shies from the word "charity."

Whatever you call it, the Bergen airport newly completed near Whittier is carrying on a course in instrument flying. Last six weeks, and costs money—but the boys who can't make the financial grade get their chance to work out the tuition, or borrow it. So far the school has turned out 27 fliers—some of them helping get bombers to England, some in the army, some flying the commercial airlines.

The other project, more than a year under way, is for student nurses. Bergen is putting between \$10,000 and \$15,000 a year into his foundation, expects to build it to \$50,000. That all stems from medical school, and some of the girls Bergen knew around the hospitals—hardworking youngsters who couldn't afford the training, often had to drop out midway to earn money to carry on. The foundation's object is to see that some of those girls don't have to "drop out"—when they've finished the course, and joined the profession they repay the foundation to help other aspirants.

"A rich man's son," in Bergen's philosophy, "has three strikes

against him at the start. Nothing to work for. People feel better when they've earned what they want. They feel they've made good on their own, and it's a great feeling."

The "other woman"—Helen Vinson—speaks: "When you're out of character, you have to be overly nice to convince people you're really not such a beastie as you appear on the screen. Fans accept the fact that the screen's male villains are just home bodies at the heart, but with an actress it's different. She doesn't want sympathetic roles—the heavy in 'Nothing But the Truth' is all right with her. But she does have to be careful, she says, especially when she gets back to her Virginia farm.

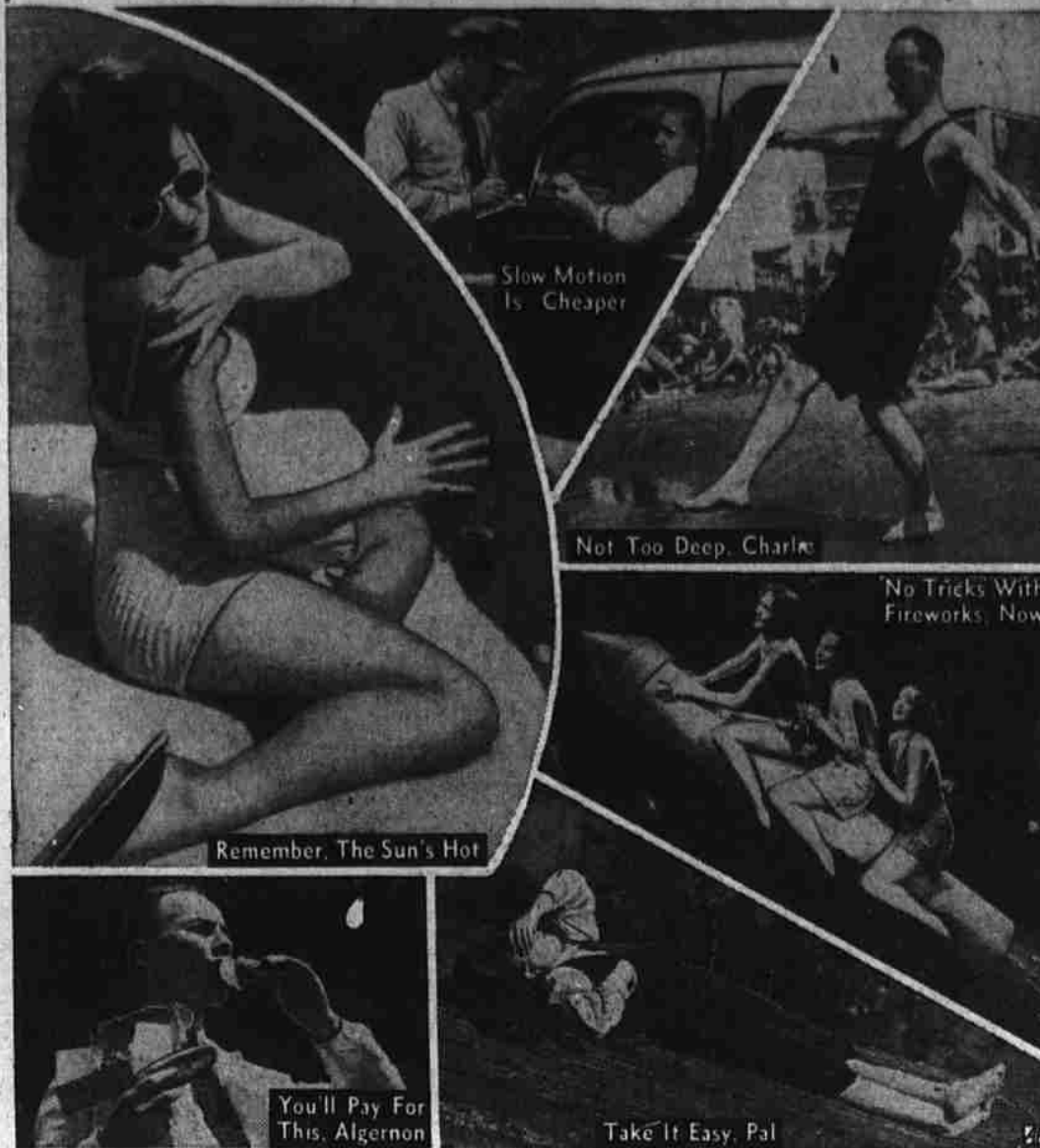

**Congress May
Declare Full
Emergency**

WASHINGTON, June 28 (AP)—Word circulated at the capitol today that the war department wanted a congressional declaration of a national emergency and brought out immediate manifestations of opposition.

Such a declaration would permit national guardsmen and selective service trainees to be kept in active service indefinitely, and would also lift the present restriction on the president's powers to send troops out of the western hemisphere.

Representative Woodrum (D-Va.) expressed his views in the house by declaring that such a proposal would bring a "little storm of protest by one member of congress who has gone 100 per cent with the administration's foreign policy."

And Representative Starnes (D-Ala.) said congress and the people were ready to spend any amount and exert whatever effort was required to safeguard the western hemisphere, but that there was no plan or intention of this country's going to war.

In executive departments, meantime, the defense program itself was pushed ahead and there were new moves to ease its impact on civilians.
