Father of His Country George Washington

All over this broad land the 22nd of February—Washington's birthday—is celebrated.

How shall any man add aught to the praise or eulogy of George Washington? History and biography, eloquence and poetry have exhausted their combined riches upon the successful leader of the American revolution and the founder of the American republic—our first great national hero.

Every great crisis in the history of the world has found its man to control and guide it. Call this Providence or accident, the American revolution was no exception to it. Before the first murmurs of discontent were heard in that struggle the man was being prepared for the crisis. On the banks of the Potomac and the Rappahannock, thirty years before Lexington and Bunker Hill, a truthful and manly boy was growing up, ripening into stalwart young manhood. With only the common school education of that early day, the young man was soon being educated into the broader school of nature and experience, in the great forest under the open heavens, with his surveyor's chain and his sword, in Indian wars, defending the frontier settlements from savage incursions.

Growing still apace, the manly young Virginian is soon the leading spirit and military commander of all that Potomac region, and his skill, endurance and courage in those campaigns swell the measure of his fame. Then, with his peace, the young commander lays aside the sword, marries and settles upon his inherited country seat at Mt. Vernon and like his ancestors is now a rich landed proprietor, a Virginia farmer and planter and country gentleman. So he might have remained to the end, had not the voice of patriotism called him to take part with his neighbors and the oppressed people of the colonies against the tyranny of the mother country. Washington sat with

Jefferson and Richard Henry Lee and Mason and Pendleton, colleagues to that first Continental Congress at Philadelphia.

The guns of Lexington crack, and their far echoes reach the patriot congress at Philadelphia. They awakened the colonies to action. It had been debate and petition and remonstrance before—it was war, war for liberty now. Twenty thousand patriot colonists had closed in upon the retreating British in Boston. Who should their leader be? The hour found the man, and out there stepped from the Virginia delegation and advanced to the bar of the house to accept his trust, this modest frontier colonel, legislator and planter—tall, imposing and commanding in appearance, his fine form made athletic and sinewy by long, manly exercises; his judgement ripened by experience in war and peace—the very ideal picture of the hero which the crisis demanded, George Washington, the MAN.

Aside from all questions of success or failure as we look at the man, what was it that made Washington great? It is clear that it was not the possession of great or brilliant intellectual faculties. Not in congress or convention, nor as speaker, writer, or even soldier were these displayed. Other men have excelled him in all these ways, but in a word, it was manhood; it was character; it was moral greatness. It was that nice adjustment of the moral and intellectual faculties, that perfect blending of parts, that lofty sense of duty in the performance of every trust, that faultless courage and unshaken endurance—all these and more that made up that consummate piece of manhood which flowered out in that eighteenth century of time and which is now evermore the priceless possession and glory of history. This is the supreme greatness of Washington.

COUNTY AGENT HERE BY MARCH FIRST

Commissioner G. C. Brillhart received word this week from the A. & M. College that our County Agent would be here by March 1st to assume his duties. C. J. Hutchinson of Houston, Texas, a son-in-law of K. K. Thomas of this city, is the man that has been procured by the college authorities for this county. Mr. Hutchinson has been offered a number of posts as county agent in different counties in Texas but he would consider none of them until tendered this county. He is a graduate of the State University of Louisiana, later being engaged for several years as an instructor at his alma mater. He was employed by the United Fruit Co. in Central America for several years before he entered the service during the World War. After the war he was a member of the faculty of the Texas A. & M. resigning from that institution to accept a position with the government vocational training department. He is resigning from this work to come to Ochiltree County as County Agent. We are firm believers in the County Agent work and believe that many benefits will be derived but it will take the full co-operation of every citizen. We welcome Mr. Hutchinson to his post here and assure him that the Herald is square behind him and his work.

PLACE YOUR COTTON SEED ORDERS NOW

Farmers and others who are contemplating planting cotton this spring should place their orders for seed at once. There is going to be a serious shortage of seed this spring and it is better to buy your seed early for then you will be assured of plenty when planting time comes. It would be advisable to buy enough seed to plant twice for the fellow who waits will very likely be out of luck for seed if he has to replant.

BAND CONCERT WAS WELL ATTENDED

The concert given by the Perryton Municipal Band at the school auditorium on Tuesday evening of this week was attended by a very appreciative and large audience, the boys taking in over \$50.00. We understand that they are planning to give another concert in the near future and have also been requested to give an entertainment at Spearman. The Perryton Band shows a marked improvement in their work at every concert and we are very proud of them. We now have as good a band as is to be found in the entire Panhandle and we feel that the members deserve much credit for the results they have accomplished.

We are informed that the cotton gin people have purchased an 85 horse power steam engine with which they will operate the new gin.

PANHANDLE AND SUMMERS-HOOD YARDS MERGED

A deal has been closed whereby the Panhandle Lumber Co. has taken over the yards of the Summers-Hood Lumber Co. at this place and Farnsworth. The Panhandle Lumber Co., with general offices at Amarillo have yards covering the entire Panhandle and had a yard at Old Ochiltree before the founding of this town, they moving here where Perryton was put on the map.

The Summers-Hood yard under the management of Fred W. Hood was started here immediately after the founding of Perryton and has built up and enjoyed a very lucrative business. Mr. Hood, who has been in charge of the local yard, has been one of the real live wires of the town and it is with much regret that we write of his departure from the business life of our city. We have been unable to learn his plans for the future. Let us hope that we do not lose him and his fine family.

W. D. Tenney, who has been here as manager of the local Panhandle yard for the past year will remain as manager of the combined yards. For the present both yards will be operated in order that the stocks can

be reduced before moving them together. Mr. Tenney informs us that they have not decided which one of the locations will be used for their permanent home. Mr. Tenney will be located for the present at the old Summers-Hood yard and he will be assisted by Pete Krause. At the Panhandle will be found C. Newton Conley assisted by Dwight Holland. Mr. Hood will also be here for the next few months winding up the affairs of his company. L. R. Connor will have charge of the yard at Farnsworth.

The Perryton yard will now be the distributing point for the following yards on this road owned by the Panhandle: Spearman, Wawaka, Farnsworth, Booker, Darrouzett and Follett. Warehouses will be maintained here for the storing of surplus stock to take care of these yards. In addition to handling the management of the local yard, Mr. Tenney will also be District manager of the above yards. A truck will be kept here to make quick deliveries to the other points.

Mr. Tenney says that they will now be in better shape than ever to take care of the wants of their customers, that they appreciate their support and patronage in the past and only ask for the opportunity to serve them

Construction Work on Gin under way

The \$19,000.00, 4-80 saw stand gin which is being erected by Messrs. Davis & Flow at this place is going right up. The gin office building has been completed. The foundations for the main building are in and all the framing timbers for the big structure have been cut. Erection work will start as soon as weather permits. The order for the ginning machinery has been placed with the Continental Co. of Dallas, Texas and will be shipped on March 1st. The machinery will be installed as soon as it arrives and Mr. M. A. Flow informs us that by April 1st, they will be ready to operate. It is the intention of the gin men to gin the remnants of cotton still unginned in this country as soon as the gin is completed.

This gin will probably be the best one in the entire Panhandle. It will have a capacity of 80 bales every 24 hours. Each gin stand will be equipped with separate Hart cleaners, feeders and hull extractors. This machine was designed and patented by J. L. Hart of Chickasha, Oklahoma. Mr. Hart has the distinct honor of ginning the first bale of bollie cotton ever ginned any place. Mr. Hart's son was here closing up the contract for the sale of these wonderful machines to the local gin. While here he contracted for the planting of 500 acres of cotton for himself. He says that this will be the greatest cotton country in the United States in a few years. These words of praise coming from a man who has spent his life in the cotton country and business makes the future of the cotton industry in this section sound very promising.

M. A. Flow, who is associated with Mr. Davis in the building of the gin, has been engaged in the cotton business for the past twenty years in southwestern Oklahoma and north-west Texas. During this time he has worked at receiving, buying, shipping, classing, stapling and exporting. In addition to ginning the cotton, Mr. Flow expects to be active

as a buyer on the local market next summer. Mr. Flow himself is planting 600 acres of cotton and his partner, Mr. Davis, is putting out 320 acres. Mr. Flow says that all cotton that he has seen that was grown here last year is of a good hard grade, one and one-sixteenth in length, and will bring a premium of \$5.00 to \$7.50 per bale over the general run of cotton grown on the North Plains, for this grade of cotton is always in good demand by the eastern mills. George Davis comes here from Sayre, Oklahoma where he operated the Farmer's Gin Co. last season. He is a practical gin man of many years' experience. He knows the ins and outs of the business and is used to handling bollie cotton. He left the proven cotton country around Sayre because he saw the wonderful possibilities offered here. These gentlemen will no doubt be able to handle all cotton raised in this territory. They inform us that they can increase the capacity of their gin on very short notice and will do so if they see the crop will demand building additional units.

It is very hard to estimate the acreage that will be planted to cotton in the territory tributary to this city, but it will probably run from twenty to thirty thousand acres. Nearly every person we talk to is figuring on putting in number of acres, some only a few but others running into the hundreds. Many new farmers are coming into the country being attracted by the cotton development. Numerous inquiries are being received from the south by farmers who want to get away from the high priced land. Real estate men report considerable activity in land and a number of sales to cotton farmers. There are still many farms that can be rented to people who want to raise cotton. There is lots of land for sale at from \$20.00 to \$30.00 per acre but we predict that these prices will advance in the next few weeks. Now is the time to buy.

This machine will save the farmers of this section many a dollar. It takes only a very small percent of barley in wheat to make several cents per bushel dock from the price of the wheat. With this machine the wheat can be separated from the barley and other grains. Mr. Cox is doing everything in his power to make the Perryton mill one of the best in the country. He has worked up a good business on the flour which he is now manufacturing, in fact he is supplying many towns throughout the Panhandle with practically all of their flour.

HOW ONE MAN RAISED COTTON LAST YEAR

The following information was given us by L. H. Randolph who made a very nice profit on the cotton which he raised in this county last year. Mr. Randolph lives on the Tuerman place located near Twitchell.

Double disc the ground twice thus killing two crops of weeds. Then harrow once followed by blank listing. After the next crop of weeds comes up, bust the middles or ridges. Plant one-half bushel to the acre covering seed as shallow as possible in order that seed will get all the heat possible. After cotton comes up, harrow it one time, then run a monitor over it, throwing the dirt from the plant. Harrow it again in about four or five days. Then pull the dirt to it again with the monitor. Then plow it twice with a one row cultivator. Then hoe it once, but don't chop any. Begin planting about the 1st of June but be sure and wait until the ground is warm through. The above process is the identical method followed by Mr. Randolph in the raising of his cotton crop this last year. He states that this seed rotted because the ground was too cold to germinate. Mr. Randolph put in 24 acres in 1923 from which he sold 12 bales, clearing him 28c per pound. He intends to put in 100 acres this spring. He has been a resident of this county since 1920 coming here from Floyd County where he was living when they first started to raising cotton in that section.

GREAT OPPORTUNITIES FOR NEW PEOPLE

Amarillo, Texas, Feb. 22.—The Panhandle Plains region of Texas, Oklahoma and eastern New Mexico offers greater opportunity to colonists than does the Argentine and other sections of South America, was declaration of Dr. Colin Ross, German traveler and writer, who was here this week. Dr. Ross is making a tour of the world and writing articles for a syndicate of 14 German, Austrian and Swiss newspapers.

He stopped in Amarillo for the purpose of obtaining information on the agricultural possibilities of the section, as unsettled, conditions in Middle Europe have caused great interest in colonization. The fact that 10,000,000 acres of virgin land ready for the plow is available in this section, together with its comparative freedom from insect pests gave it a great advantage over South America, he said. Farming operations on the Plains can be begun at less expense and with less work than in the Argentine, the visitor asserted.

He expressed astonishment when told that practically every county maintained a farm agent whose duty it is to work with farmers and instruct them in cultivation methods of this district.

Dr. Ross, who is accompanied by his wife, went from Amarillo to the Grand canyon. They will sail for the Orient on February 26.

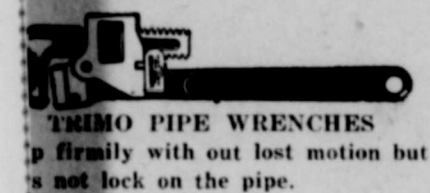

Mr. Business Man and Merchant,
do you think you are giving your
home paper and printing office a
square deal when you send your
printing orders to some outside print-
ing establishment? Do you think that
you are giving your support to a
home institution, when you buy print-
ed envelopes from the Post Office de-
partment? Does the out of town con-
cern, or the government Post Office
printing plant, donate, give time,
space and publicity to movements and
campaigns for the advancement and
building up of Perryton and surround-
ing territory? Do you not owe it to
your home paper to repay it for the
many boosts and good words by giv-
ing it your full support. It takes adver-
tising and printing, and lots of it, to
get a paper by these days. A news-
paper is a public institution and it
is supposed to give freely of its time
and space at all times but it is not
supported by taxation or charity. It
must have business if it functions as
it should. The surest way to kill a
paper and home printing plant is to
continue sending your printing to the
cheap mail order houses, and using
the still cheaper government printed
envelopes. We venture to say that
there is not a printing office in the
Panhhandle of Texas or Oklahoma that
carries in stock an envelope that is
as poor in quality as that sold by the
post office department, yet a few
business houses in every town make
a practice of using same. An insti-

printer sending in a big order for
merchandise to Sears & Sawbuck and

printed envelopes from the United
States post office.

WEEKLY NEWSPAPER
AS FIRST CLASS MAIL

Postmaster General issues Order
that will ensure more prompt delivery
of home town papers to their sub-
scribers.

For the first time in the history of
mail service weekly newspapers will
be given same attention as first class
mail.

An order signed by the Postmaster
General directs local postmasters to
expedite the delivery of weekly and
daily newspapers throughout the
country.

Credit for this innovation, which is
of immense benefit to weekly news-
papers, is due to Postmaster General
New and his assistants, who devised
a system whereby weeklies and small
dailies would be put on par with large
metropolitan papers, which hereto-
fore had the advantage of special ex-
press service to rural communities.
The order became effective January 30.

Postmaster General New has al-
ways been sympathetic towards repre-
sentations made by the Washington
office of the National Editorial Asso-
ciation that country weeklies as a
whole were unnecessarily delayed in
transmission from publisher to sub-
scriber. Complaints impressed the
Postmaster General, and as a result
he conducted an inquiry through the
postoffice inspectors to bring about
a change which would help small pub-
lishers reach their mail subscribers
without delay.

Newspapers as interpreted by this
order are publications which are
commonly and popularly understood
to be newspapers of which the lead-
ing and major feature is the dissemi-
nation of timely news of interest to
the general public, whether published
daily or weekly.—The American Press

OUTLAWING THE POCKET FLASK

Public sentiment put the open sal-

cities and towns and the rural com-
munities at such an alarming rate
that some steps will have to be taken

People were slow to act against
the open saloon, they have been equal-
ly slow in the case of the pocket flask.
But once aroused, a sentiment that
stands for right and public decency
will not be denied, as was so clearly
made manifest by the passage of the
prohibition amendment to the con-
stitution, and the enforcement act.

The pocket flask will have to be
ostracized from decent society. Once
it is an outcast, so many young peo-
ple will not think it necessary to "take
a nip" at the dance or other social
functions.

Making dance hall drinking unpop-
ular will be no easy task. There is
not the restraint on youth that there
once was, and parents do not have
them under control as well as they
might, but the job ahead is small
compared to that which culminated
with the passing of the public drink-
ing place.

The time is coming when the very
men and women who made prohibi-
tion possible will have to take a
stand on this question; and when it
can not be evaded any longer, they
will form a militant front to combat
it.

Perhaps taking such an alarming
view of the situation is too pessimis-
tic; perhaps the apparent looseness
of so many young people of this day
is only another aftermath of the pe-
riod of strain through which the peo-
ple of the world passed during the
war.

It may be true that the alarmists
are overdoing it, but there have been
so many instances where the alarm
has been sounded too late and moth-
er's hearts have been crushed and
fathers have been broken in spirit.

It is not too late to save the boy
or girl who has not been caught in
the whirlpool that carries them to the
abyss.

The temptation can be taken from
the paths they will tread if the people
who realize the dangers ahead do not
postpone definite action.
