Commissioners Discuss Wild Animal Regulations

Callahan County Game Warden Vance Wallace met Monday, August 26 with County Commissioners to discuss wild animal regulations being considered in the county.

Currently restricted wild animals including all individual species and subspecies of the following animals: tigers, cougars, leopards, jaguars, bears, wolves, apes, hyenas, lesser pandas, cheetahs, ocelots, binturongs, elephants and rhinoceroses, are regulated by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. It is unlawful for any person to possess a restricted wild animal in the state, for the purpose of breeding, exhibition or for personal use unless the person has first obtained a Restricted Wild Animal Permit from the Parks & Wildlife Department.

However, beginning in September 1997, authority to regulate wild animals will be granted to each county in the state. All counties in the state will also have the option of outlawing all caged wild animals in that county.

County Judge Bill Johnson said after September 1997, Callahan County could be regulating wild animals in the county which are kept by county residents. He said if approved by commissioners, Callahan County would issue permits for those who wish to keep wild animals in their backyard enclosed facility.

The judge went on to say another option for commissioners to consider would be banning all caged wild animals in the county. "I'm not sure what we're (county commissioners) going to do. Outlawing wild animals totally in the county is just one option we have," Judge Johnson said.

The county judge stated he's not sure how many county residents currently have wild animals caged, but he said it is probably just a few. Johnson said if wild animal regulations are approved, county commissioners would have someone from the sheriff's office or hire someone to issue the permits and inspect the enclosed facilities.

Judge Johnson said commissioners voted to table approving any wild animal regulations until Game Warden Wallace can provide more information to commissioners about the regulations.

Other items brought before county commissioners included:

—Commissioners voted to sign a five year contract with the Department of Human Services which allows the formation of a child welfare board in the county. Judge Johnson said commissioners voted to renew the contract which gives the Callahan County Child Welfare Board the authority to operate. The child welfare board is not funded with county funds, Judge Johnson said.

—Commissioners voted to provide Comanche Electric Cooperative with a right-of-way easement on county roads. Kent Parker, representing Comanche Electric Cooperative, met with commissioners requesting the right-of-way agreement. Parker said the right-of-way sought is one existing utility poles in the Cross Plains and Putnam area served by the electric co-op.

—Commissioners voted to sign the minutes of the previous meeting and voted to pay all approved bills.

County Pager System On-Line

BAIRD—The Callahan County Pager broadcast system went "on line" Thursday morning, August 29th, at 11:30 a.m. according to Callahan County dispatcher Arlinda Williams.

Callahan County Commissioners, during their May 13th meeting this year, voted unanimously to fund the purchase and installation of the broadcast equipment which carried a price tag of \$10,789.03. The county has applied for a Texas Forest Service grant in the amount of \$5,000, to aid in the funding of the project. Judge Johnson is on vacation and could not be contacted for comment.

The system has been tested "some" by dispatchers, but only Cottonwood Fire Department and Cross Plains E.M.S. have pagers at this time and Cross Plains had not distributed their equipment as of Monday. Each emergency response department will be responsible for furnishing pagers for their personnel. A Baird Fire Department spokesman said their supplier has promised to supply them with pagers by the end of next week. Other county departments were said to be in the process of purchasing equipment also. The system has been implemented to replace or enhance systems already in place for emergency dispatching.

Linda Dennis, Callahan County Dispatcher Supervisor, said "It (the pager system) was going to benefit the Callahan dispatch greatly as responders can be paged with one call now instead of the multiple calls that were required with the old system." Previously it could take as many as ten, or more, radio or phone calls to dispatch the needed personnel to an emergency. That, plus handling all the incoming calls from people reporting the emergency or calling to ask what the emergency is, according to Dennis.

Callahan County Dispatch handles all 911 calls in the county. This includes calls for Law Enforcement, Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services. Everyone will still need to call 911, just as they have been doing, to report an emergency. The pager system should mean quicker response times by emergency responders and less chaos for the dispatchers.

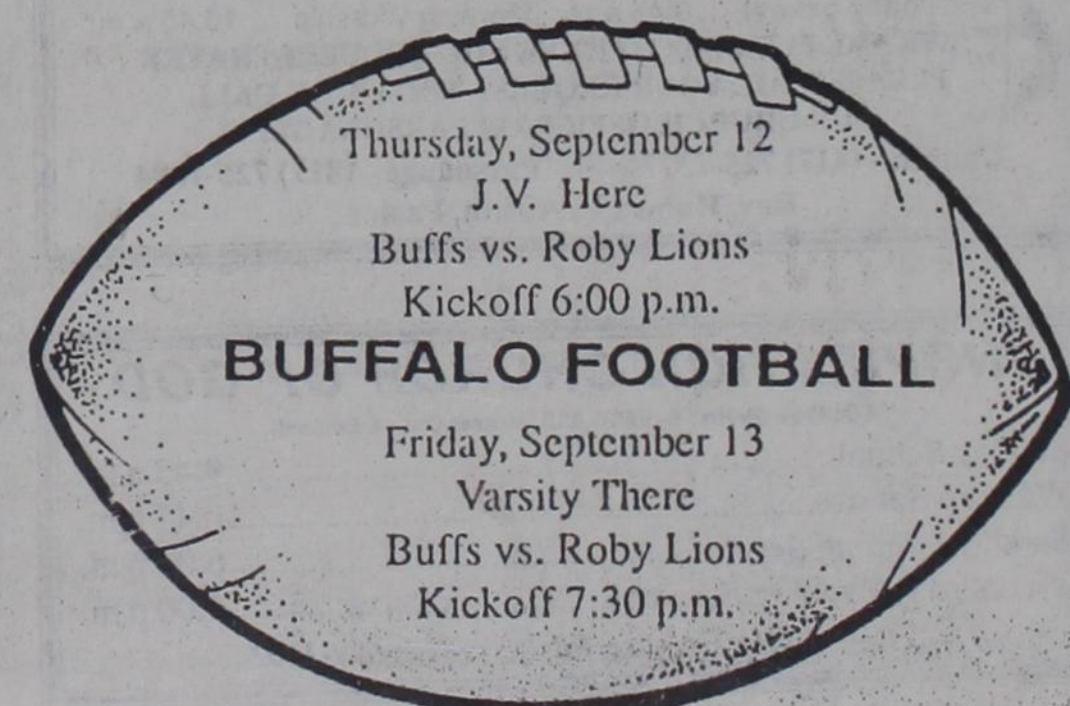

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Dallas, Houston Adding Area Codes

IRVING—Texas continues to grow as shown by two upcoming area code changes.

Suburban areas surrounding Dallas will change September 14 to area code 972. The central Dallas area will retain the 214 area code.

Suburban areas surrounding Houston will change November 2 to area code 281. The central Houston area will retain the 713 area code.

To ensure calls are completed to the party called, GTE urges callers to use the proper area code when calling numbers in the Dallas area beginning September 14, and in the Houston area beginning November 2.

GTE officials remind telephone users to change equipment that uses the new area code, such as telephone equipment that stores or analyzes telephone numbers, business telephone systems, modems, speed call lists and automatic dialers.

Most calls will be completed for a six month period when either the new or old area code is dialed. However, to complete a call in the Dallas area after March 15, 1997, the correct area code must be dialed. The correct area code must be dialed beginning May 3, 1997 in the Houston area.

There are some short and terse sayings that are sort of moment sermons within themselves. One of them is: "If you don't want your life stained with the fruits of sin then stay out of the devil's garden."

Nike Losing Their Footing

Say to a group of people "Who is the greatest name in sports?" and surely you will get different answers. You'll hear Michael Jordan or Charles Barkley in basketball, Michael Johnson or Carl Lewis in track, Ken Griffey, Jr. or Cal Ripken, Jr. in baseball, Deion Sanders or Steve Young in football or perhaps Florence Griffith Joyner or Leslie Lewis in women's sports. But ask that same group the greatest name in sports apparel and you will hear a unanimous cheer.

Nike, only in the past few years, has finally surpassed Adidas as the dominant maker of athletic gear on the globe. What began as some inanimate rubber in Phil Knight's waffle iron has evolved into a living, breathing multi-national corporation that has its name tattooed on the minds of children and adults alike. From humble, decent beginnings has emerged a sharp-toothed, dictator exacting its will with no regrets.

Besides making cool shoes, Nike also make not-so cool policies in its overseas plants and contracted factories. Children who should be starting the fourth grade are instead buried in their work at a Nike factory in Indonesia for less than 80 cents an hour for half a day at a time sewing together red, white and blue T-shirts that read USA in bold letters. Michael Jordan wakes in the morning and dresses in his \$125 basketball shoes and other Nike garb to make a guest appearance at the NikeTown store in downtown Chicago for a half hour so he can earn some of his \$20 million paycheck from Nike. Meanwhile, Andre Agassi has to contemplate cancelling his endorsement with Cannon cameras so he can devote more time to training because his minimal obligation to Nike (for \$10 million) has been eating into his court time. Okay, so I'm exaggerating. Oh, wait I'm not!

Yes folks, the Swoosh on your Air Max is the same Swoosh above the door of the sweatshops in IndoChina and Taiwan and the same Swoosh seen on the breast of an ever-increasing number of college football and basketball jerseys. As you hold them in your hand, think of how old the child who held them under a

stitching machine was.

It's not our faults, America is just where the money is at. Yes, that's true. And there would be no problem if America was where the production was at too. A semi-skilled American worker would stand to make upwards of \$10 per hour if production was in the US and even more if the workers were unionized. Making products overseas is for many industries a necessary evil, but the blatant arrest of a peoples economic system based on shaky minimum wage legislation by corrupt governments is not necessary, though it is on the verge of evil. If that weren't enough Nike is habitually in the process of scouting new, cheaper production sites if the minium wage in the present facility is raised beyond a "reasonable" level.

These partially-industrialized Asian countries need tax money from US corporations to stay afloat in the Pacific and they are going to do whatever it takes to keep those businesses happy, even if it involves the oppression of their own people.

Nike has recently signed a deal with the beloved Dallas Cowboys, "America's Team," and has the sole authority to make Cowboy jerseys. . . in Asia. Nike has dozens of drooling collegiate athletic programs in their hip pocket that will do just about anything to renew that contract. Are individual scholarships from Nike to prize athletes next? Will Nike even bother to wait until they get to college? If Nike has a surplus of maroon T-shirts and shorts, can they tell all their colleges to lose to Texas A&M so they can make up in lost revenues?

Very few of our purchases are safe. Safe i the fact that we know they weren't manufactured by underprivileged, underpaid persons who have never known another way of life. But as Americans, we are supposedly the world leaders; and Nike, being the world leader in athletic apparel, should both be world leaders in fighting against the exploitation of child, underpaid labor, and hazardous working conditions.

The number of people who agree with these thoughts are numerous enough to post over thirty worldwide internet listings under "Nike-Criticism" on the Yahoo Web Browser. But if you feel safe in the comfort of your Duralon rubber and Skylon mesh and Tensile Air cushioning, go right ahead wearing them. Just ask Nike to change their ways. Ask them to just do it.

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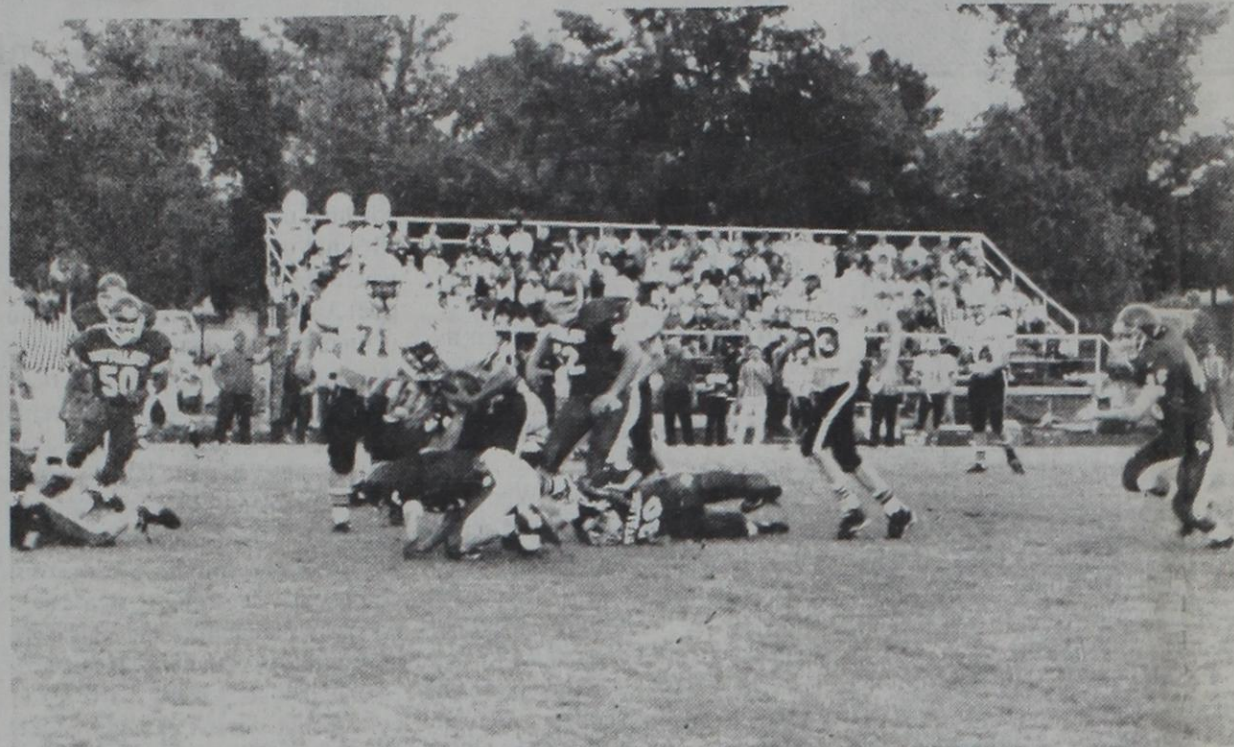

The Cross Plains Buffaloes and the Robert Lee Steers battled to a 0-0 tie here last Friday night. Cross Plains came into the game as a 15 point underdog, according to the Harris Poll predictions, but fought hard against the Steers.

Robert Lee had 11 seniors on the field while Cross Plains suits up 5 seniors, Jeremy Barnett, Sean Jones, Hugo Mauricio, Cory Switzer and Porcius Potter.

The game opened up with a flip flop of offense and defense, Cross Plains running 4 plays on offense and then 4 plays on defense. The Buffaloes had to play some tough defense early in the game giving the ball over to Robert Lee once on 4th and short but failed, and then on a fumble on the Cross Plains 35 yard line. The defense led on the night by linebacker Justin Hopkins, Hugo Mauricio and Porcius Potter stopped the Steers before reaching the endzone. Before the end of the 1st half quarterback Jarad Richards completed 5 of 7 passes for 53 yards. Richards had a good night in the passing department completing 9 of 17 with only 1 interception for a total of 111 yards. A big play in the first half came for Robert Lee's Gilbert Torres when he broke through the line and ran 45 yards before a hustling Joseph Turner drug him down from behind

saving a Robert Lee touchdown. The half ended with Cross Plains moving the ball but time expired ending the Buffalo drive.

The 2nd half opened with Robert Lee kicking to Cross Plains. The Buffs ran some 19 plays getting the ball to Robert Lee's 25 yard line before having a pass intercepted ending the drive. The Steers of Robert Lee also had some offense stored up moving the pigskin to the Cross Plains 13 yard line and on 4th down attempted a 23 yard field goal but was unsuccessful. Again the game became a cat and mouse routine, neither team getting into the end zone. Cross Plains in the 2nd half managed to run some 42 offensive plays and only played 17 on the defensive side of the ball. This was achieved by good blocking behind the offensive line - Carlton Thomas, Porcius Potter, Jeremy Pancake, Cory Switzer and Michael McClure.

The Buffaloes had one last opportunity to get the win with a beautifully executed drive taking the football to the 9 yard line. With only 11 seconds left in the game Head Coach Cord Woerner made the decision to attempt a field goal, but the attempt went wide some 6 to 10 inches. An exciting game was witnessed by all. Robert Lee and Cross Plains cheered as the game ended in support of the athletes and their effort to win the game.

This week the Buffaloes travel to Roby to take on the Lions. Again the Buffaloes will face a tough competitor. The junior high and JV will be playing tonight at Buffalo Stadium. The junior high game will begin at 6:00 p.m. and JV following afterwards.

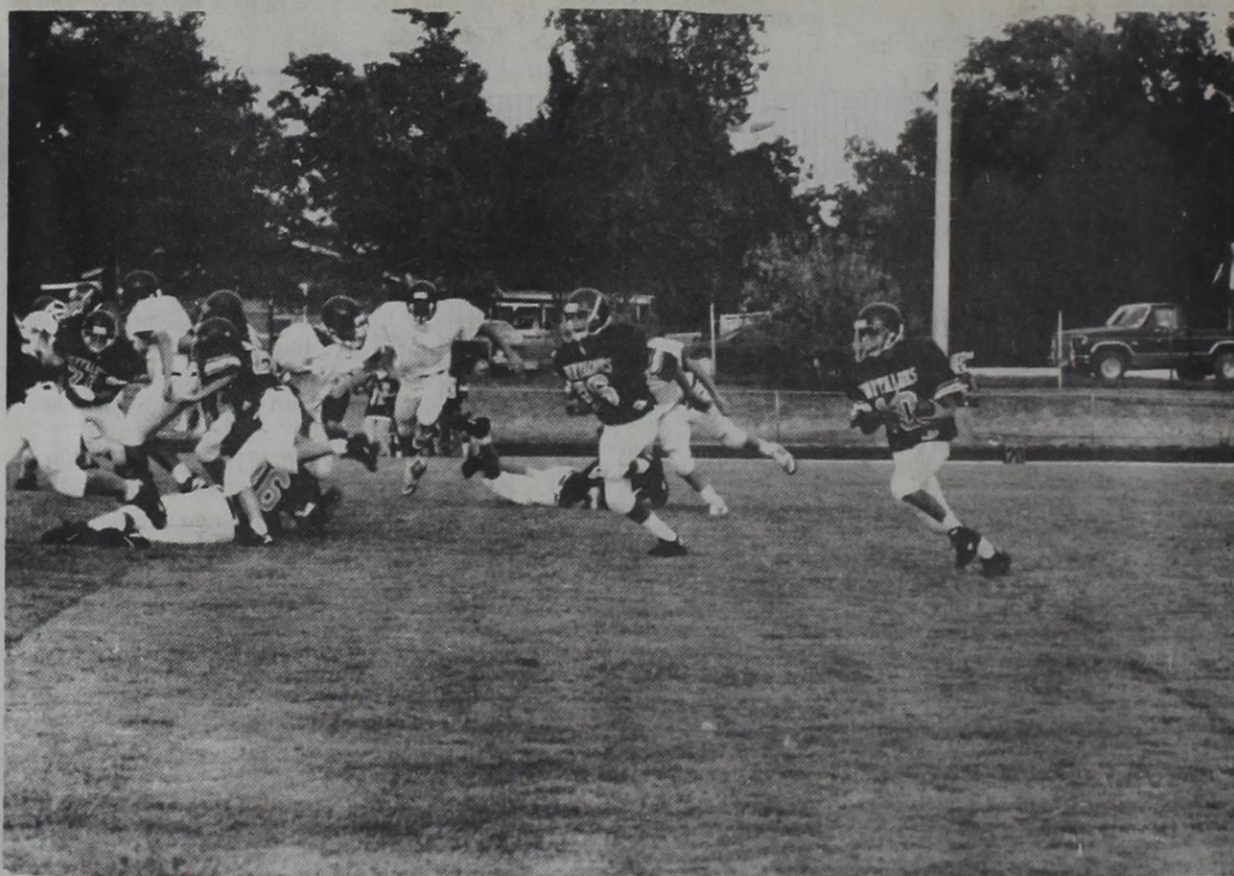

Spreading the word of composting to elementary children

Spreading the word of composting to elementary children across the state is Earthworks' mission. And that is exactly what will be happening area wide this school year.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments in Abilene is offering the Junior Master Composter Program developed by Earthworks to ten schools in its 19 counties through a solid waste grant focusing on the advantages of organic recycling.

The Junior Master Composter program is a condensed version of the Master Composter course originally developed in 1994 by Larry Wilhelm

of Earthworks, for the TNRCC statewide.

"The adult course has become the standard for the state," said Larry Wilhelm, program director. "We have followed up on its success with the creation of a junior course targeted at 4th-6th grade students in area schools. It is proving to be even more popular than the original adult program."

The Junior Master Composter course is being developed specifically in response to requests from schools needing new and stimulating environmental classes. Working in

conjunction with the principals of leading blue-ribbon schools, Earthworks began this pilot program spring of 1994 in the Grapevine area. The five hour course taught by a compost instructor involves solid waste issues, organic recycling, and all the essential elements and systems for making compost, including worm composting.

"Our goal is to encourage the recycling of organic wastes at home since the Texas 2000 goal is to reduce waste going to the landfill by 50 percent by the year 2000," said Alison Benton, Solid Waste Coordinator at the WCTCOG in Abilene. "Kids see composting as a way they can clearly make a difference."

Earthworks' program has been recently featured at Composting Works!, a twelve state composting conference held in Lindsborg, Kansas, and filmed for inclusion in a 30 minute documentary produced by CNN. The Junior Master Composter program was also a feature presentation in July at the Keep Texas Beautiful conference in Irving and the PTA Conference in Austin.

The Junior Master Composter program is designed to become supported by individual schools with a continuing commitment to environmental education. 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Texas High School Teachers To Be Honored By The University Of Texas

AUSTIN -- It's that time of year again! Nominations are now being accepted for the 1997 Texas Excellence Awards for Outstanding High School Teachers. The deadline for nominations is October 4, 1996.

Once a year, The Ex-Students' Association and the College of Education of The University of Texas recognize exceptional Texas high school teachers who are inspiring supporters of their students, who bring credit to the teaching profession, and who are held in the highest regard by their current and former students, fellow teachers, administrators, students' parents, and their community. Moderate Flu Season Predicted For 1996-97

Experts are predicting a moderate 1996-97 influenza season, but people most at risk for life-threatening flu complications should still get vaccinated -- and the sooner the better.

"The elderly and people with chronic underlying health problems should get vaccinated every flu season," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Houston's Baylor College of Medicine.

Influenza B will likely be the dominant strain this season, Glezen said, but there could also be an appearance by A/Wuhan (H3N2), a new variant.

Glezen advises people in the high-risk groups to get inoculated as soon as the vaccine becomes available, usually in early autumn.

In North America, flu season usu-

ally begins in earnest after Thanksgiving, but, as happened in 1991, it can come earlier.

"If it hits early, the elderly and people with chronic underlying health problems need to be protected," Glezen said.

Every year thousands of people, most of them elderly, die from pneumonia resulting from influenza, he said, and many, perhaps most, of the deaths could have been prevented by vaccination.

Among the people at high risk for possibly deadly flu complications: people with heart disease; lung disease, including asthma and chronic bronchitis; diabetes; chronic kidney disease; chronic anemia, including sickle-cell disease; and immunosystem disorders.

Influenza usually strikes suddenly and produces fever, generalized

muscle pain, severe weakness and fatigue, a sore throat and a dry, hacking cough.

To reduce fever and pain, adults may take aspirin or aspirin substitutes; children should take acetaminophen, if needed, said Glezen, a pediatrician. All flu victims should get plenty of bed rest and liquids.

The vaccine is about 85 percent effective in helping people avoid influenza, he said.

Some people worry that they will get the flu from the vaccine, but that is not possible, Glezen said, because the vaccine is made from killed virus.

The vaccine has been shown to significantly lower the risk of hospitalization for influenza and pneumonia in people 65 and older.

County Sales Tax Reported

The City of Clyde reports a 35.42 percent increase in retail sales from last year, according to the city's 1.5 percent sales tax rebates announced by the State Comptroller's Office, Monday, August 19.

John Sharp, State Comptroller, said 1996 sales tax payments in Clyde are 35.42 percent ahead of tax payments made to the city in 1995. He said the sales tax rebates for the City of Clyde have amounted to \$88,542.54 so far in 1996. The 1995 payments to the city during the same payment period were \$65,383.55.

The city's monthly payment for August 1996 was \$12,203.17, up 4.46 percent from the August payment last year amounting to \$11,681.28.

Other Callahan County towns reporting sales tax payments include:

—The City of Baird reported that sales tax payments in 1996 are 4.85 percent ahead of the 1995 payments. The city had received \$46,883.89 so far in 1996, while the 1995 tax payments to the city totaled \$44,713.04.

The town's monthly payment for August of this year was \$6,803.66. That payment is 19.66 percent below the August 1995 payment of \$8,469.03.

—The City of Cross Plains is reporting 1996 one and one-half percent city sales tax payments running 65.52 percent ahead of the 1995 payments of the tax. Cross Plains 1996 sales tax payments have amounted to \$56,221.05, while the 1995 sales tax rebates were \$33,966.04.

The city's monthly sales tax check for August 1996 was \$9,068.14, which is 64.51 percent higher than the August 1995 payment of \$5,512.05.

—The City of Putnam is reporting the 1996 payments to the town totaled \$5,803.68, down 12.62 percent from the 1995 payments to the city in the amount of \$6,642.28.

Putnam's tax payment for the month of August 1996 was \$342.07, a decrease of 64.59 percent from the August 1995 payment of \$966.11.

Countywide, sales tax payments for 1996 in Callahan County are running 31.01 percent ahead of the 1995 payments in the county. Callahan County towns have received sales tax payments in 1996 amounting to \$197,451.16, while the 1995 payments to the county towns totaled \$150,704.91.

The rebates in Callahan County for the month of August 1996 were \$28,417.04. That amount was 6.71 percent higher than the August 1995 rebates which totaled \$26,628.47.

Some area towns reporting sales tax payments for 1996 year-to-date and whether it's an increase or decrease over 1995 sales include: Albany, \$67,365.34 in 1996, 4.50 percent decrease from 1995; Anson, \$91,051.00 in 1996, 26.11 percent increase from 1995; Stamford, \$331,612.85, 1.71 percent increase from 1995; Cisco, \$156,942.81 in 1996, 13.48 percent increase from 1995; Eastland, \$391,724.56 in 1996, 4.02 percent decrease from 1995; Merkel, \$111,224.42 in 1996, 63.62 percent increase from 1995; Ballinger, \$406,610.05 in 1996, 0.17 percent increase from 1995; and Haskell, \$200,308.16 in 1996, 1.43 percent increase from 1995.

Statewide, sales tax payments in 1996 are 8.37 percent ahead of 1995 rebates, according to Sharp's figures. The state has sent out check's totalling \$1,249,729,249.58 in 1996, while the 1995 payments to the state's cities were \$1,153,134,532.27.

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4 percent share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax. Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains all collect 1.50 percent in local sales tax.

The August checks include taxes collected on June sales and reported in July by businesses filing monthly sales tax returns with the state. The checks also represent the quarterly filers for April, May and June sales tax. Businesses file sales tax payments either monthly, quarterly or annually depending on the amount of sales tax they collect.
