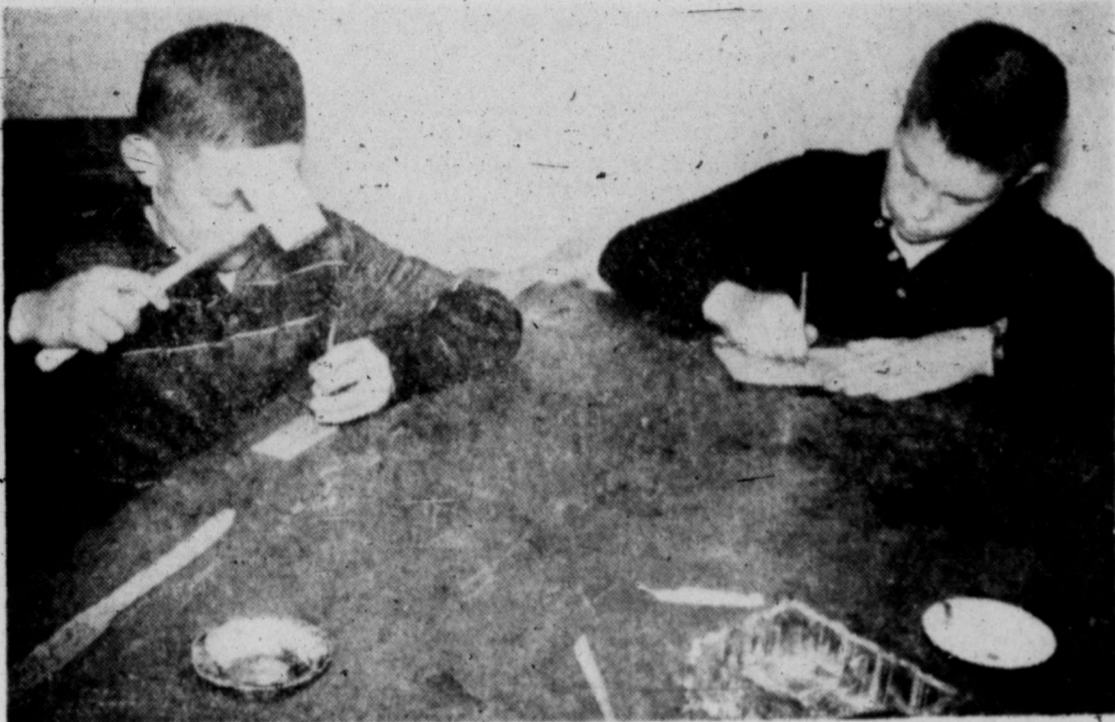

GRAND JURY PROBE HINTED

Fire Guts Old Landmark

Pre-dawn flames here early Saturday morning swept through a long-time Mitchell County landmark on the city's south side.

The frame structure, which once housed Root Hospital in the 1920's, was totally destroyed.

With the remains of the building still smoldering Saturday morning, District Attorney Eldon Mahon launched a full-scale investigation into the possibility that the fire was caused by arson.

Mahon said Saturday afternoon that the case may be turned over to the Mitchell County grand jury for further investigation.

The house, which had been vacant for approximately three years, was owned by Grover Lee of Cedar Bend community near here.

The house was acquired in about 1927 by the late J. H. Lee, who died in 1950.

Mrs. Lee has not lived in the house for the last several years and, according to Mahon, the building has been the subject of numerous acts of vandalism during its vacancy.

According to City Fire Marshal Barney Wren, the building was used as a hospital about 35 years ago by the late Dr. Charles L. Royt Sr. before the construction of the present Root Memorial Hospital in Colorado City.

The house is located on a hill about two and one-half miles from downtown Colorado City on the Sterling City highway. It is inside the city limits, however, Wren said.

Educator Slated in Program

One of the nation's outstanding educators will be in Colorado City Monday and Tuesday for a two-day program with high school, junior high and grade school students, according to Frank W. Wilson, school superintendent.

Dr. Willis A. Sutton, speaker-writer, educational leader, will begin his program here at 9 a. m. Monday at Colorado High School with a general assembly for all high school students.

Following the assembly at about 10:15 a. m., Dr. Sutton will hold a session with junior and senior students, which will last until noon.

In the afternoon, he will meet with student council and honor roll students at 1 p. m. and at 2 p. m. will hold a session with sophomores.

The Tuesday program will include talks to ninth grade boys at Colorado Junior High School at 9 a. m., eighth and ninth grade girls at 10 a. m., seventh grade students at 10:45 a. m.

At 1 p. m., Tuesday, Dr. Sutton will talk to sixth grade students in the junior high auditorium and at 2:30 p. m. he will speak to students at Wallace School.

Sometime during the two days a conference will be held by Dr. Sutton with the local school administrative staff.

Wilson said Saturday that the general public is invited to attend all sessions at which Dr. Sutton will speak.

Wilson explained that Dr. Sutton, who has appeared here several times before, will not have an opportunity to devote a session to interested parents as he has done in the past because of lack of time.

Many persons in this area are familiar with the work of Dr. Sutton, of whom Reader's Digest said:

"He has spoken to more than 100,000 teachers and students than any other living person."

He formerly served as superintendent of schools at Atlanta, Ga., for 23 years and is a past president of the National Education Association.

Board Lists Full Slate Of Officers

Chamber of Commerce directors Saturday morning re-elected Jeff Taylor as president of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce.

The action—taken at a 7 a. m. breakfast meeting in Civic House—was the first in recent years in which a chamber president had been re-elected.

Also named by the board of directors was a complete slate of new officers for 1958. They include:

James M. Boyd, a newly elected member of the board of directors, elected first vice-president of the chamber, (also is a local wholesale distributor for Humble Oil Co.)

Max Caddell, also a new director, named as the chamber's second vice-president. Caddell, a former president of the Colorado City Junior Chamber of Commerce, is traffic manager for Caddell Transit Corporation.

Luke Thomas present Chamber of Commerce secretary, re-elected by the board. Thomas is co-owner of Thomas Brothers Service Station.

R. B. Baker, former Colorado City mayor, member of city council, current member of the chamber board of directors, and manager of Sweetwater Production Credit Association, named CC treasurer.

Chamber of Commerce Manager Bill Quimby, renamed by the board for 1958.

The nominating committee said in nominating Taylor for re-election, that this was the first time in years that a president had been elected for a second term.

But, they added, certain projects of major importance now facing the Chamber of Commerce could be more easily accomplished with a continuation of Taylor's leadership.

High on the list of important CC projects is an airport for Colorado City.

The board expressed the belief that Taylor was the best man for the job of bringing about a closer relationship between the community and its existing industries.

As president of the chamber, Taylor serves as a member of the board of directors of Col-Tex Refinery, one of the city's largest industries.

The 44-year-old Taylor has been active in every phase of community life in Colorado City for more than a decade.

In 1956, he was honored by local Jaycees for outstanding service to his community.

He is a member of the city park board, Lions Club, Colorado Country Club and First Baptist Church, and has previously served as president of the Quarterback Club in 1951 and 1955 and has been a leader in Mitchell County United Fund work.

He is manager of Rockwell Brothers Lumber Co. here.

The Saturday morning meeting was the first at which annual directors have met. The new directors, who were elected last week.

Retiring Chamber of Commerce officers include Gus Hinesey, vice president of City National Bank, retiring as treasurer; Raymond Perdue, manager of Lone Wolf Electric Co-op, retiring as first vice-president; and Baker, who retires as second vice-president to assume duties as treasurer.

All new officers will be officially installed at the Chamber of Commerce banquet, which will be held at Civic House Jan. 31.

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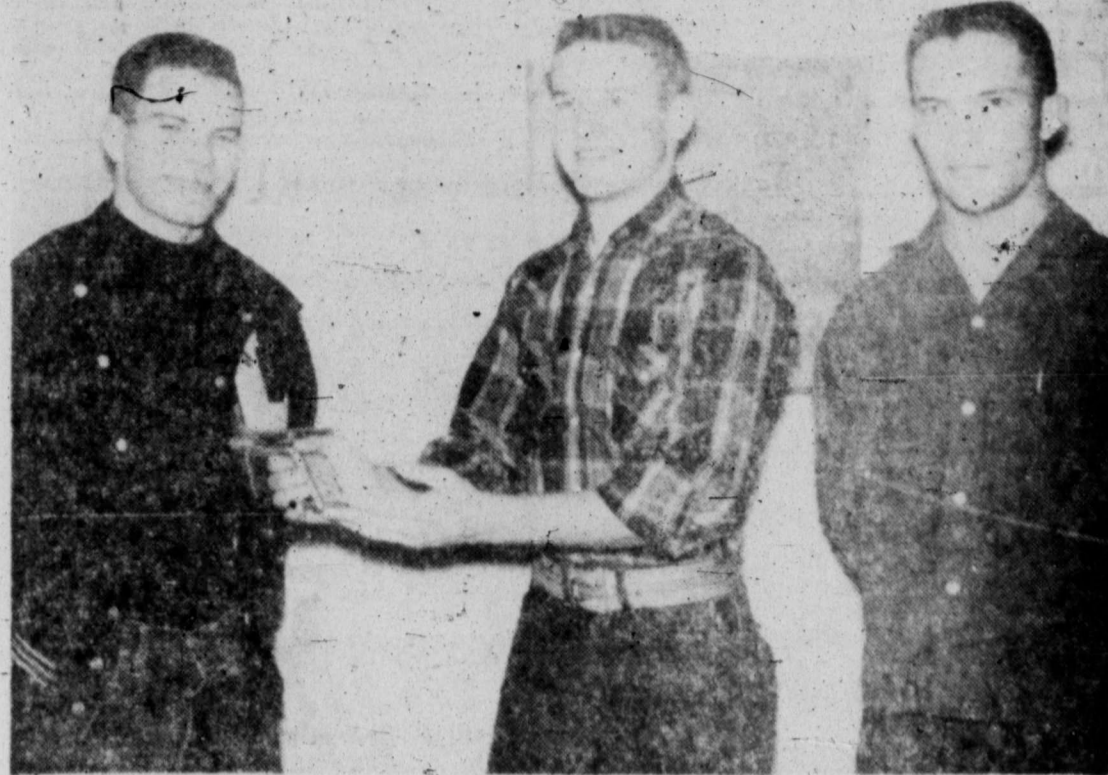

But they hit 71 per cent from the free throw line.

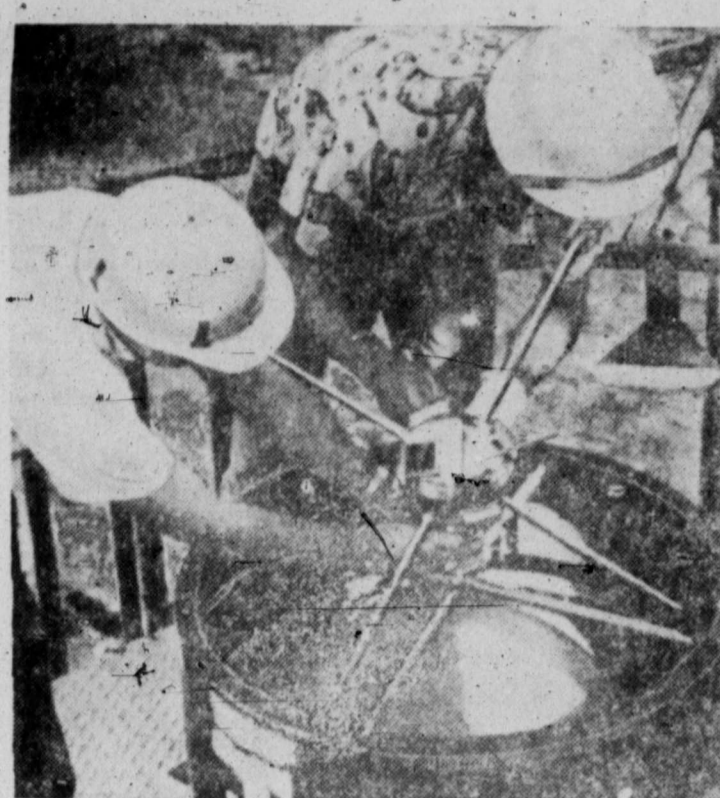
Flippin led the Wolves in the rebound department, grabbing nine off the boards.
