Postmaster Signals Start of 1963 Yule Mail Rush

The advent of December
marked the start of one of the
biggest races in town—the
annual race against time at the
Burkburnett post office as its
Christmas mail rush went into
high gear.

New reports from Postmaster
General John A. Gronowski in
Washington indicate an anti-
cipated nationwide record mail
volume for this Christmas sea-
son of nearly 12 billion pieces
during December.

Locally, Postmaster, Lohoe-
fener expects December mail
volume to approximate last De-
cember's.

"Shopping and mailing early
benefits everyone," the post-
master observed. "Customers
who buy early get the pick of
the Christmas stocks; the local
economy is aided by the busi-
ness activity thus created, and
everyone—including the postal
service—is happy about the
additional time that early
mailing allows."

"Early mailing also gives us
time to get gifts and cards in
the hands of addressees in good
condition with less chance of
damage or delay due to human
error."

"Our fifteen employees need
public help to run this race
against time and patrons of
the Burkburnett post office can
assist us by shopping and mail-
ing right now and by using ZIP
Code in both return and desti-
nation addresses."

LA PORTE, IND., HERALD-ARGUS: "At times in
the recent race upheavels in this nation the church (all
faiths) has taken quite a beating. Charges have been level-
ed at churchmen that they had not assumed their Chris-
tian role and lived up to what they teach. Therefore, it
should not go unnoticed that in Chicago's recent race
disturbances the most used line of communication between
the races have been traced through the churches. . . One
Chicago church federation, composed of both Protestants
and Catholics, actually has served as the peace-maker
in urban renewal and public school misunderstandings
between the races."

ployed by the petroleum industry have made possible the

Recent weeks there have been developments which indicate that actions by a few members of Congress and staff are both political parties. Back in the fall of this year, I introduced a bill which would provide for a Code of Ethics for members of Congress. The bill is now in the House of Representatives. I do not feel that the activities of members of Congress should be held accountable for their actions, whether in private, than any other citizen. I will never attempt to complain when irreparable or unlawful acts on the part of elected officials are committed, whether by individual or the press. For I feel that those of us who are fortunate enough to be entrusted with carrying on the public business should be held ac-

countable for our actions." My views have not changed. I still feel that the large majority of our elected officials in Washington are honest and dedicated citizens. They are among the most hard working people in our Nation. I think it is a shame to have the public confidence in the whole Congress shaken by the actions of a very few. I think this would be corrected, for the most part, by passage of my bill or a similar legislation.

Just the passage of the bill would do much to restore the public confidence. The public could see that Congress has nothing to hide. Then, in the future, the public records requir-

ed by this bill would be available to all when questions of impropriety arose.

The bill would require that each member of Congress file a sworn statement each year with the House or Senate his financial transactions for the year including source and amount of all income, stocks and bonds, real estate, gifts, etc.

It would require that all staff members be employed in either the home district of the member or in his Washington office.

Another provision would tighten spending and reporting regulations on Congressional travel funds, including the controversial counterpart funds.

The bill provides further that employees or members of Congress who were convicted of assisting in the prosecution of any claim against the U. S. Government while in office, or within two years of leaving office, for personal gain would be subject to fine and imprisonment.

The penalties for violation of the provisions of the bill range up to a fine of \$10,000, or one year in prison, or both.

As I told the House last week, and as I told you in my newsletter in May, I did not introduce this bill because I thought there was any widespread unethical or illegal action going on. I feel that the business of Congress is public business, and that the public has a right to know about the money spent by its representatives for travel or other reasons. Further, I feel that the Congress should do all it can to prevent any wrongdoing by its own members. Congress must be its own watchdog. I feel this bill would set up the machinery necessary for this.

Allow me to repeat once more part of what I said in May. "Perhaps more important, I feel that the Congress should do all within its power to retain the respect for the legislative branch which the American public has always expressed. This is most vital to the continuation of the United States as the Nation with the best form of Government ever devised by man, and the Nation which is the leader of the free world in its fight for morality and freedom against the atheistic forces of communism."

VETERANS Questions & Answers

Q—Who is entitled to receive an invalid lift from the VA?

A—Veterans receiving regular aid and attendance support from the VA. In addition, the lift must be medically indicated for the veteran.

Q—Will the boys who are in the service now be entitled to government loans when they return to civilian life?

A—Not unless part of their service was before January 31, 1955, when such rights came to an end.

Q—I hear that dependent parents compensation was recently raised but I am still receiving \$75 because of my son's death in World War II. When does this raise become effective?

A—The increase, effective last July, applied to Dependency and Indemnity Compensation only. The older "death compensation" is paid for service-connected deaths occurring before 1957. You may change to the new Dependency and Indemnity Compensation if you wish but this will be advantageous only if your income from all other sources is not over \$750 a year. The graduated rates of the newer law may pay less than your present compensation.

Q—Which state has the most living veterans and which has the least?

A—As of July 1, 1963, California with 2,303,000 living veterans had the largest veteran population of the 50 states. Alaska with 24,000 had the smallest.

Dear Mr. Dodson:
The greatest mistake of Congress was ratification of the United Nations Charter. This organization, like the League of Nations, was founded for the purpose of transformation into a World Government later. all of our armed might, bases, and personnel to the United Nations to police their contemplated World Government. Since we are now outvoted by Communists and the Afro-Asian bloc of Nations — think what this would mean to the United States, once the greatest free Republic ever known.
Both Congressmen James B. Utt and Bruce Alger have introduced bills in the House of Representatives to Withdraw our Membership in the U. N. This would annul the ratification of the U. N. Charter which is being used now to supersede our Constitution. It would deter the transfer of our Armed Services to an alien flag and foreign control—and eventual kill the Disarmament Agency. This, and this only, can save us from National Suicide.

any other season of the year, says Thelma Wirges, county HD agent.

When buying your Christmas turkeys through retail stores consider a number of things when making their purchase. First of these is the size of the bird and will depend on the number of people to be served and how well the family will eat the leftovers. Generally, 3-4 pound of ready to cook turkey per person should be allowed for generous portions.

The next factor to consider is the quality of the turkey according to Miss Wirges. The best quality birds are Grade A and will have an even covering of fat over the entire body. Grade A turkeys are broad breasted and have bulging thighs and large drumsticks and give the best meat to bone ration for your turkey dinner. The homemaker should select a bird without blemishes, such as torn skin or bruises, the agent says.

The grade and inspection identification is important and should be noted when buying. These are metal or cardboard tags and are on the bird for the buyers' benefit. A tag says:

"Inspected for wholesomeness by U. S. Department of Agriculture" shows that is was processed in a plant under the supervision of the USDA inspection program. The tag reading "U. S. Department of Agriculture Grade A" means that the turkey has been given an official grade of A by the USDA grader in the plant.

Miss Wirges also recommends that the homemaker cook the turkey according to its weight. Allow 15 to 20 minutes per pound of ready to cook turkey and cook in a 325 to 350 degree F. oven.

How does your sauce or gravy compare with that of the culinary experts?

You will certainly want it at its best when holiday fare is the order of the day. Thelma Wirges, county HD agent, stresses.

The secret of a perfect sauce or gravy lies in the smoothness of its texture—its proper consistency, and its seasoning in relation to the food it is to accompany.

A really successful gravy is possible, even for the beginner

if after removing the meat from the roasting pan, the fat and drippings are poured into a bowl and allowed to stand a while. Then accurately measured the desired number of tablespoons of fat for the amount of gravy to be made.

"Two tablespoons of fat for each cup of gravy is a good proportion to keep in mind," the agent says.

Now, return the desired amount of fat to the roasting pan and the cleared meat juices that have settled in the bottom of the bowl. Place the pan over low heat on top of the stove. Measure out an equal amount of flour for the amount of fat used.

Stir the flour into the heated fat. Cook and stir to the desired browning. Measure 1 cup of water or stock for each 2 tablespoons of fat, and stir in to the fat-flour mixture. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly.

Questions & Answers

Q—As a veteran, I plan to be buried in a National Cemetery. Can my wife be buried there, too?

A—Yes. Should your wife die before you, she may also be buried in a national cemetery, provided you give written intention that you plan to be buried there at the time of your death.

Q—I asked the VA to hold my annual GI insurance dividend to meet the premium payment. Do I have to repeat this request annually?

A—No. Once the credit arrangement has been authorized by you, it will remain in effect until cancelled.

Q—As a dependent parent receiving DIC payments from the VA I have been mailed a questionnaire card asking my income for 1963 and my expected income for 1964. The VA knows I am a poor widow. Why do they send me this card?

A—Every three years the

VA must determine if dependent parents are eligible for DIC payments. Your other income or lack of has an important bearing on this. You should complete the card and mail it to avoid any chance of a hold-up of your monthly checks.

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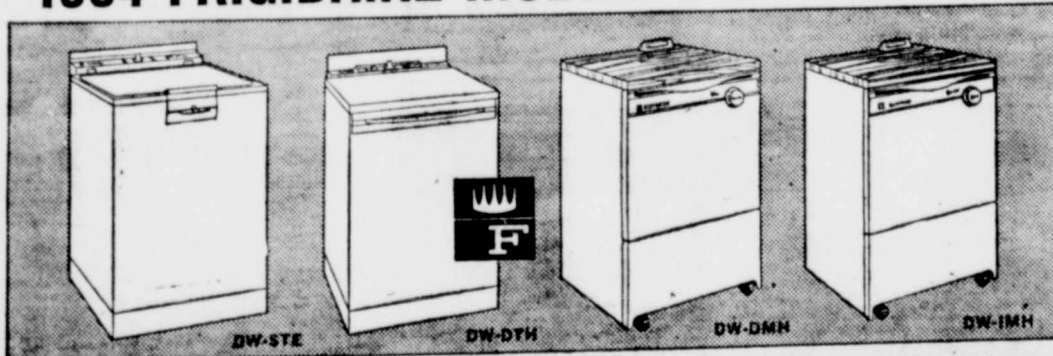
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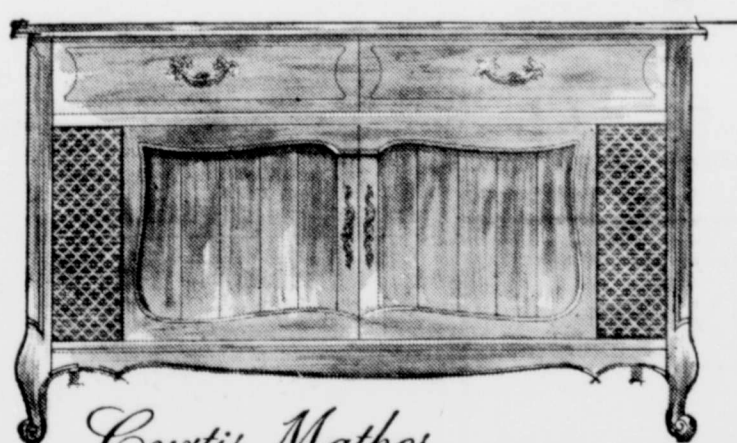

Plans listed in the catalog may be ordered, free of charge through county agents.

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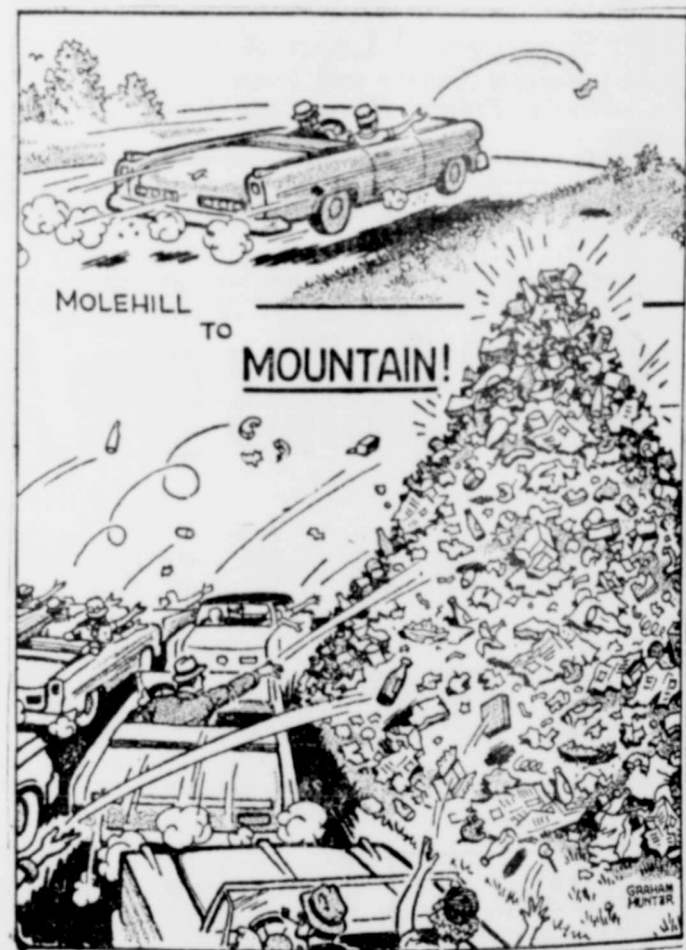
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
