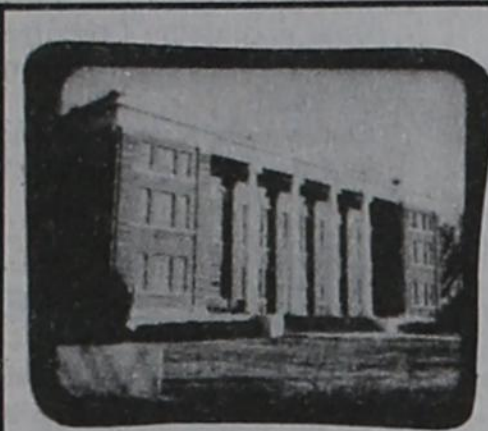

Annual Water Level Will Be Measured

Beginning the first of December and lasting through February, the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District will be conducting its annual winter water level measurement program throughout the District. Winter water level measurements not only help the District with vital data and information, but they also benefit the general public, farmers, and ranchers with maps created from this gathered data.

Winter water level measurements are gathered by using an E-line or a steel tape down the casing of the well. An E-line consists of a long measuring tape with a battery-powered circuit running through it. The end of the E-line that is first placed into the well casing purposely has a short in it. When this short is submerged into the water, a buzzer will sound on the reel displaying to the operator

Forclosure Sales Changes Printed

Under a new law, bidders now must meet new certification requirements to be eligible to place their bids.

"It's an open bidding procedure, just an open sale like an auction. People come and bid on the property. We have a list of property that we have foreclosed on and we offer it for sale to the highest bidder," Wheeler County Tax Assessor-Collector Scott Porter said.

The law, House Bill 335, outlines new requirements that bidders must meet.

Porter said the new law is aimed at delinquent taxpayers.

"Basically the purpose is they didn't want people who are delinquent on their taxes going and buying more property in a county where they already had delinquent taxes," he said.

Interested bidders now must fill out an application about two weeks before the sale.

"They have to owe no school, city or county ad valorem taxes in the county in which the sale is held. ...We will have them apply for a statement here at the tax office stating that there are no delinquent taxes," Porter said.

Bidders also must disclose any properties they own, have owned previously or partly owned. The tax office then will check to see if the person or corporation owes any taxes. If the bidder owes no taxes, the office then issues a statement attesting to that fact. The statement then will be presented to a sheriff's deputy who will conduct the sale.

After 90 days, the bidder will have to reapply. The initial fee for the application is \$10.

"We're just going to have a one-time setup fee of \$10," he said. "We didn't feel like it was fair to charge them \$10 every time they come in."

Bidders cannot purchase sale properties in the name of another person or corporation without written authorization.

Violating the new law is a Class B misdemeanor punishable by up to six months in jail and a \$2,000 fine, Wheeler County Tax Assessor-Collector Scott Porter said.

It was learned by the *Times* at an earlier date that Adams did not intend to announce for re-election. It was not known, however, his plans.

Adams still has one year remaining of his present term. According to the news article, he intends to turn in his resignation at the next meeting of the Wheeler County Commissioners' Court—Monday, November 24, 2003. The commissioners will then have to select a replacement, either for the remaining year or until after the primary election.

Hazel Owen Crowder Services Are Sept. 8

Hazel Owen "Curley" Crowder died on September 4, 2003. The funeral services were held in Littlefield, TX on Monday, September 8, 2003. He was buried in the Dallas-Ft. Worth National Cemetery on September 9, 2003.

He was born on October 9, 1917 in Allen, Texas to John and Dolly Crowder. Shortly thereafter, the family moved to Wheeler, where they remained from then on. He married Juanita Lynch in 1944 in Kansas City, MO. He served in the U. S. Army during World War II, and was a P.O.W. in Poland during the Rhineland campaign. He received the WWII Victory medal, the Good Conduct medal, the European African Middle Eastern Campaign medal, a Bronze Star, and one Overseas service bar. He was a PFC combat infantryman.

He was a retired cotton ginner and was the owner/operator of Curley's Collectables in Anton, Texas.

He was survived by a wife, Juanita Crowder, who died on October 8, 2003, a son, Larry Crowder of Fort Worth, and three daughters, Donna Deatherage of Joshua, TX, Jeanene McIntyre of Mansfield, TX, and Jacky McDaniel of Truth or Consequences, N.M. He also had nine grandchildren, 9 great-grandchildren, and numerous nieces and nephews.

He was the last of his generation of the Crowder family.

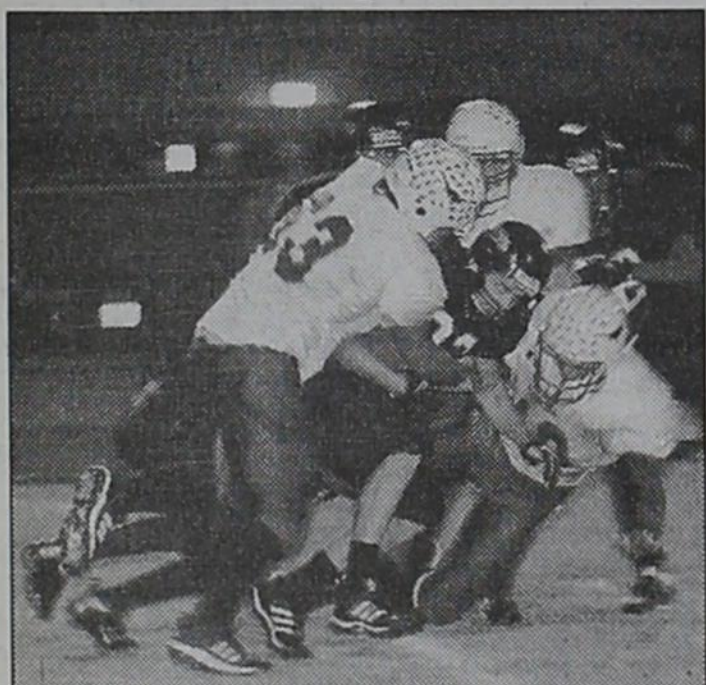

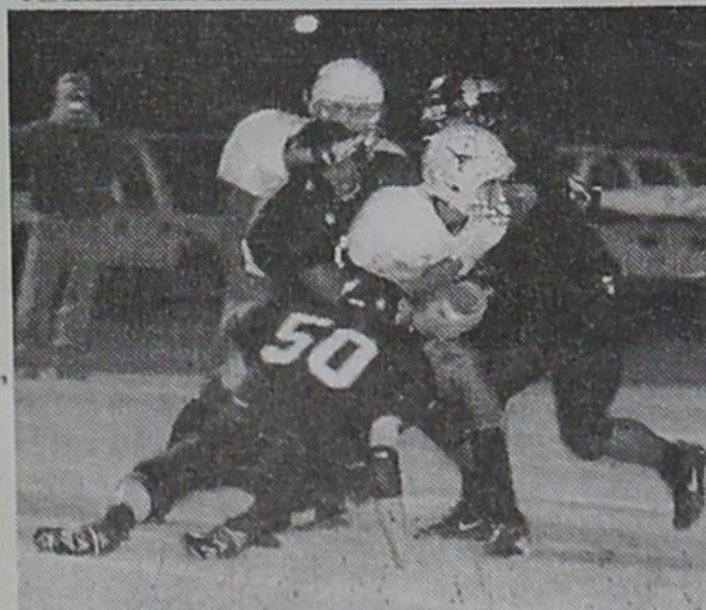
THREE ON ONE: The Farwell ball carrier is brought to a halt by Landon Sams, #50; Dallas Owens, #55, and Josh Miller, #39.



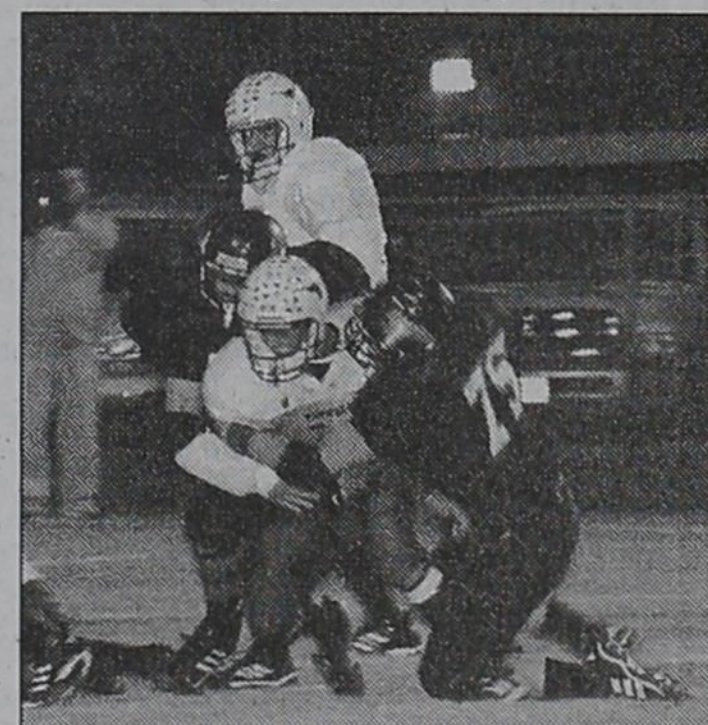
BY THE HEEL: Mustang Blaine Rutherford gets his man in the Farwell game, even if only by the heel.



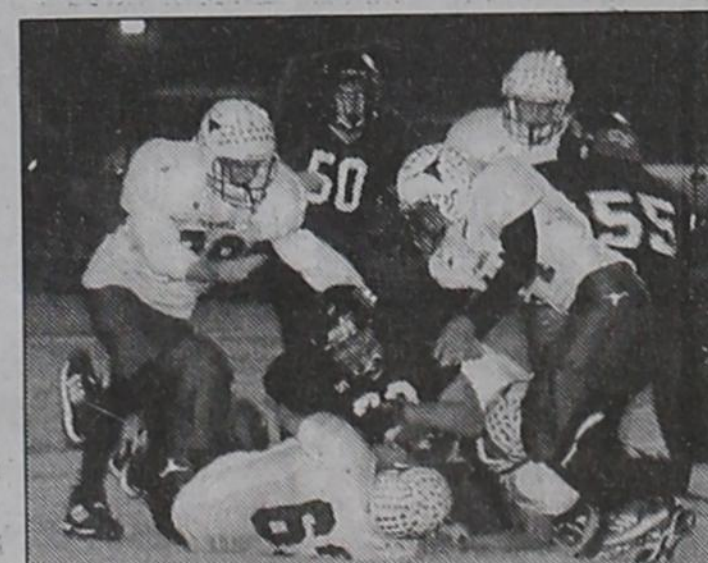
KICK RETURN: Brenton Goerend, #22, returns the ball for the Mustangs in the Farwell bi-district game. —Photo by Rob Schaffer

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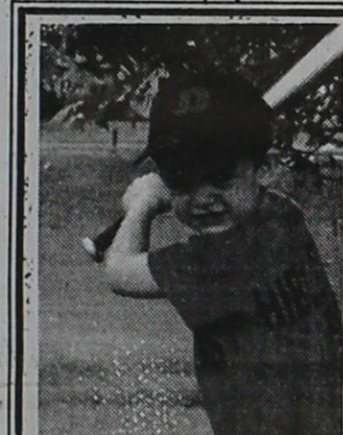

the motion carried unanimously. The Investment Report and Bad Debt Write-Offs reports were presented. After discussion of the investment report Dave Britt made the motion to purchase a CD with the remaining tax money from last year and to accept the bad-debt write-off as presented. Motion seconded by Jim Batton and motion carried.

5. Quality Assessment and Performance Improvement (QAPI) Minutes: Ann Fagan-Cook presented the minutes of the QAPI meeting that was held on November 4, 2003. There was discussion regarding the scorecards. Motion was made by Dave Britt to accept the QAPI report. The motion was seconded by Jim Batton and motion carried.

6. Renewal of Employee Health Insurance: Dave Britt made the motion to accept the quote for the policy. Thomas Helton seconded the motion and the motion carried. Fagan-Cook reported that because of a good claim year, our rate was 1% above last year. This will enable the District to keep the employee contribution to \$35/month again this year. 12. Administrator's Report: A. Ms. Fagan Cook reported that she had received a demand letter from the Coalition of Health Services for invoices not paid for the year 2000-2001. We have ten days to pay these invoices before a lawsuit is filed. Sue Chandler made the motion to pay the invoices as demanded. Dave Britt seconded the motion and the motion carried.

B. Ms. Fagan Cook stated that she frequently gets requests to discount bills. She also stated that she does not have the authority to discount assets of the District and requested guidance from the Board. that it has found the water level. The steel tape is used in much the same way. The end of the tape is first covered with a blue or yellow chalk covering four to five feet. This end is then inserted into the casing. In order to insert the right amount of tape into the well, the operator must know what the previous year's depth measured. Once the tape has reached the appropriate water depth, the tape is pulled out of the well. The operator then finds the area of chalk that has been washed off of the steel tape. From this reading, the operator can then calculate the water level.

Now that you are more familiar with the procedure, here are some benefits that come from the gathering of this data. The new data allows the PGCD to be able to continuously update saturated thickness maps that are useful in locating the amount of water under the ground in a particular place. Many farmers and ranchers use these maps to locate the best place to drill irrigation wells or windmills. Other maps prepared from this data are water level and depletion maps. Water level maps show us where the present water level is located. Depletion maps point out to us how many feet the water table has risen or fallen in the last year. The depletion maps we use to determine the amount of depletion are the same maps used for those landowners who are eligible for depletion allowance on their income tax returns.

As you can see, this is not a new program. The PGCD has been measuring water levels on many different wells throughout the District. Some wells have as much as 40 years worth of collected data. Last year alone, the District measured nearly 900 wells with one goal in mind—to be able to provide useful and accurate information to farmers, ranchers, or anyone who may have a question about the water in our area. So, if you happen to see a red pick-up driving down your road or in your field or pasture with our decals on the door, don't worry! We are just doing our job the best we can, so we will be able to provide the people of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District with the best information we can collect. 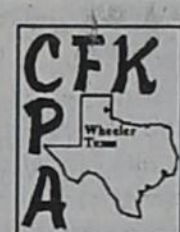


HALT: The movement of the ball by Farwell is brought to a halt by Wheeler's Brad Masters, #88. —Photo by Rob Schaffer
