HASKELL INDIANS TAKE THE FIELD ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Tigers put a scratch in the loss column for Indians

Haskell suffered their first loss of the season to the Anson Tigers last Friday night 38-10. This game was closer than the score makes it look. The Tribe only trailed 13-0 at the half. I believe you saw the Indians play much more spirited on the defensive side of the ball in the first half of this game than in week 1 against Roscoe. Penalties were key in this game. Haskell was called for seven, being penalized

for 45 yards. Anson was only penalized three times for 23 yards. Explosive plays were also important in this game and that is something the Tribe failed to have on the offensive side of the ball this week. Anson had several explosive plays generally on the ground, with multiple runs by #27 Mason Davis. Haskell also had most of their offense on the ground, led by junior Rocky Haggard who carried the ball 11 times for 93 yards averaging 8.5 yards per carry and for the only touchdown of the game for the Tribe. I would also like to point out the play of #12 Ezell Woods, senior, who had

four receptions for 62 yards, averaging 15.5 yards per catch. Woods has shown the ability to be a real weapon through the air for the Indians. If he can get his hands on the ball he seems to always make the catch. He is very good at adjusting while the ball is in the air to make the catch, and has enough speed the defenses seem to give him a cushion worrying about the deep ball. After only giving up 13 points in the first half the Tribe's defense seemed to wear down, while the Tigers continued to attack them with their physical power run offense. Anson has a very fast paced offense that can definitely wear a team down,

trying to get a snap off about every 20 seconds. Haskell Coach Grady Benton said, "I thought our football team made some strides in a positive direction Friday night. We saw our defense get off the field in the first half, which we struggled with a week ago. Our special teams made some big strides in a positive direction, with the exception of our punt protection which will be addressed. Offensively we moved the football again, unfortunately not able to punch it in enough to beat a very talent bunch from Anson. Give credit to Anson, they magnified our mistakes. I look forward to a week with my team in preparation for

the Baird Bears." The Anson Tigers are in the past, and the Indians now turn their attention to the 1-1 Baird Bears. Haskell will make the trip to Baird for the game, who are coming off a 40-13 win against Menard. According to MaxPreps.com Haskell is ranked #14 and Baird #23. The Bears have scored 40 points this season, and given up 55, while the Indians have scored 52 and given up 79. So come support the Tribe as they begin their two game road trip in Baird before they play their rival Stamford the following week.

Weston Rutkowski, a 2008 graduate of Haskell High School, has made quite a name for himself in the world of competitive rodeo bullfighting. The twenty-seven year old son of John and Glenda Gayle Rutkowski of Haskell, Weston maintains a very busy schedule competing in the Bullfighters Only tour. The freestyle competitions are held all over the United States, and it pits man against beast. Scores are based on a 100 point scale, men can earn up to 50 points per fight based on their ability to exhibit control and style while maneuvering around or over an animal. The bull can also earn up to 50 points based on its willingness, aggression and willingness to stay with the bullfighter. A multi-sport athlete in high school, Rutkowski has always had a competitive spirit, along with the physical talents to be successful. He also comes from a family of winning rodeo competitors.

Rutkowski says, "I'm huge on physical fitness. I work out every single day. I don't have to question if I'm going to have the legs to get through it. I know I can go out there and do what I need to do from 40 to 60 seconds." That is vital in a sport where the opponent is much bigger, stronger and faster. You must have the right attitude and right talent. A relatively old sport with a new twist, the tour features the top fifteen freestyle bullfighters in the sport. He has been at the top of the Bullfighters Only tour standings, including leading the list at one point. He has finished first or second at many of the competitions, and recently posted the highest-marked freestyle bullfight in Salinas, an 88.5, to win the second go-round. Rutkowski says, "My goal is to win the first year tour and be crowned the first true world champion in freestyle bullfighting in sixteen years." In his "spare" time,

Rutkowski also works as a traditional rodeo clown, now known as a bullfighter, whose job is to protect bull riders from the large, agitated animals. This year he will be working the West Texas Fair and Rodeo in Abilene, coming up Sept. 13-17. He invites friends and all rodeo lovers, to come to the rodeo and see him in action.

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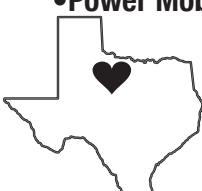

A tax rate of \$0.562375 per \$100 valuation has been proposed for adoption by the governing body of The City of Haskell. This rate exceeds the lower of the effective or rollback tax rate, and state law requires that two public hearings be held by the governing body before adopting the proposed tax rate. The governing body of The City of Haskell proposes to use revenue attributable to the tax rate increase for the purpose of performing the duties required by the Texas Constitution, Statues and the citizens of Haskell.

The rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate that The City of Haskell may adopt before voters are entitled to petition for an election to limit the rate that may be approved to the rollback rate.

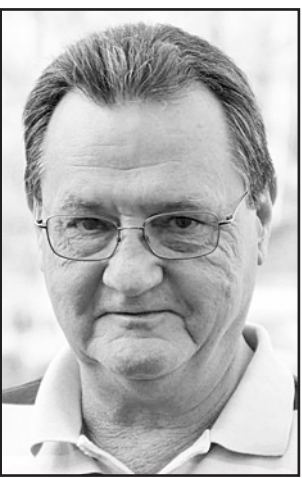
She was preceded in death by her parents, Luther Lee Rainey and Minnie Lee (Baldock) Rainey; son,

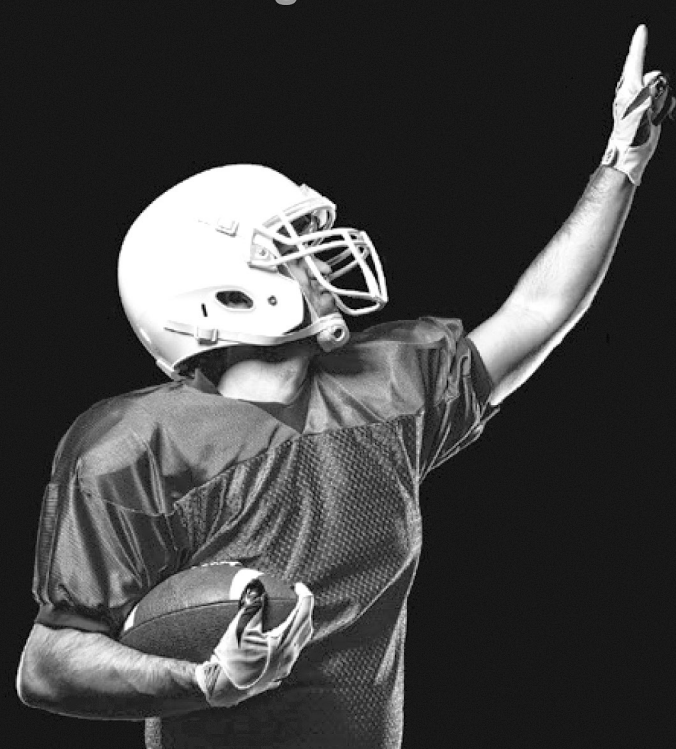

Food Handlers class set in Haskell

The "Texas Food Establishment Rules (TFER)" was revised and updated and became effective Oct. 11, 2015. A major change in the revision now requires all food employees to complete an accredited food handlers training program within 60 days of employment, effective Sept. 16, 2016.

A food handlers course accredited by the Texas Department of State Health Services is being offered by Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Haskell County. Food Safety: It's In Your Hands is scheduled for Sept. 22 and 29 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. at the Extension office at 101 S. Ave D, Haskell. This 1-2-hour course

will now be required for all food service employees to help promote the service of safe food. The certificate is good for two years and is valid anywhere in the State of Texas. The course is a basic overview of food safety practices that are necessary to ensure that safe food is served at your establishment. Practices discussed include good personal hygiene, cross contamination, and time and temperature abuse.

To pre-register for the course, call the Extension office at 940-864-2658 by Sept. 16. Pay the day of the course with check or money order only. The cost is \$20.00 per person and must be paid in full before the course begins.

Individual with disabilities who require auxiliary aide service or

accommodation in order to participate in the event are encouraged to contact our office within five working days prior to the program. Educational programs of Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service are open to all people without regard to race, color, sex, disability, religion, age, national origin or genetic information or

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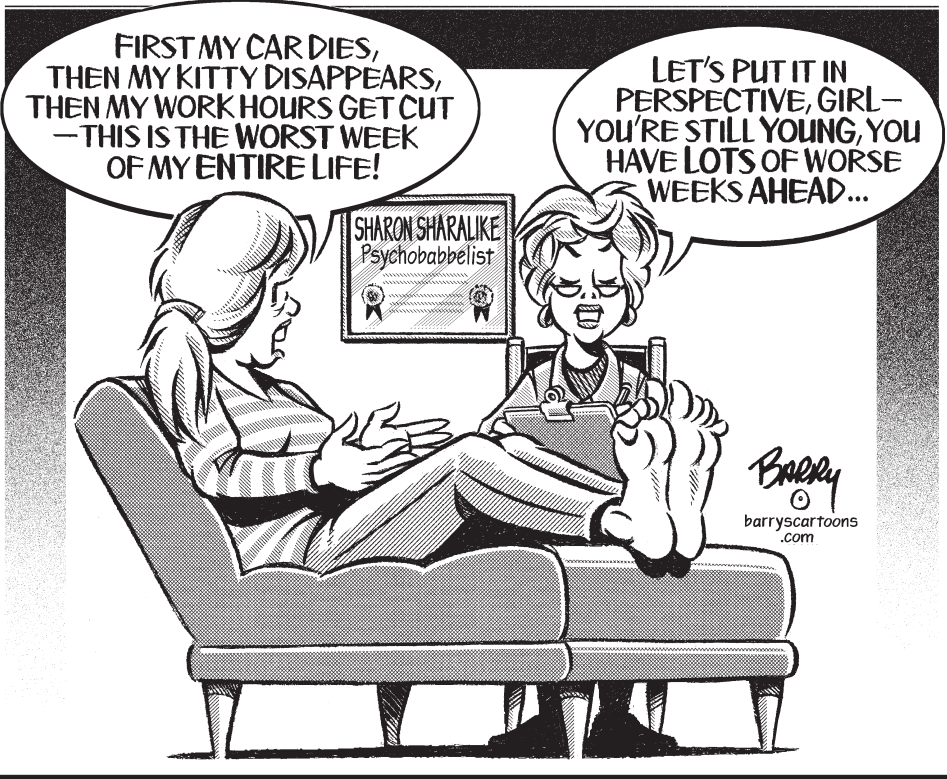

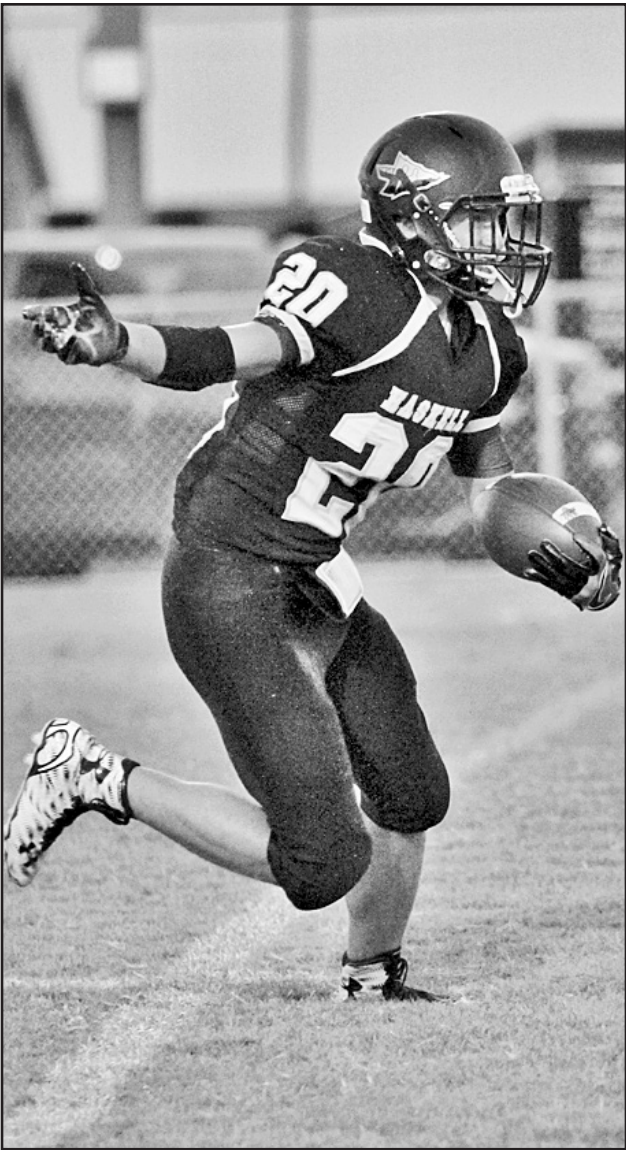

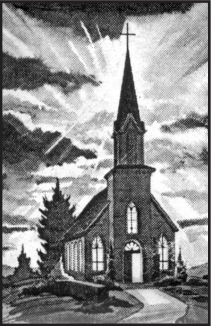

The Federal Communications Commission and the Public Utility Commission of Texas have established programs to make basic telephone service more affordable to eligible customers. **Lifeline Service** is a program designed to make basic telephone service available at reduced rates to eligible residential customers. Customer's eligibility to receive the discount must be renewed periodically. The program is limited to one benefit per household, consisting of either wireline or wireless service.

Who Qualifies? You are eligible for Lifeline Service if your annual household income is at or below 150% of the federal poverty guidelines, or in your household resides a person who receives or has a child who receives benefits from at least one of the following programs:

Medical Assistance (Medicaid), Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Supplemental Security Income (SSI), Federal Public Housing Assistance (FPHA), National School Lunch Program (only applicant or customer who satisfy the income standard of the program for free meals), Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), Health benefits coverage under the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), An eligible customer residing in tribal lands, Bureau of Indian Affairs general assistance, Tribally administered Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Head Start (only those households meeting its income qualifying standard), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), Children under 17 years of age with no health insurance, Other eligible programs may apply.

Information about customers who qualify for Lifeline Service may be shared between state agencies and Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative Inc. Lifeline customers can also subscribe to optional services at the same rate offered to other customers.

What Universal Services are available to all customers? Universal services are offered to all customers of Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative. Universal Services available include the following services: Voice grade access to the public switched network or its functional equivalent, Minutes of use for Local service, Access to emergency services to the extent the local government has implemented 911 or enhanced 911 systems, Toll limitation for qualifying low-income consumers, Local Calling for Residential Service is \$14.50–\$19.05 and Business Service is \$20.00–\$26.75, Ability to report service problems seven days a week

In addition to the above services, Santa Rosa Telephone Cooperative offers optional calling features, along with Santa Rosa Communications Long Distance, SRCaccess.net—internet/DSL, and SRTV (where available). Customers who are eligible for the Lifeline Program are also eligible for toll blocking at no charge.

Six ways to save your skin

As summer comes to an end, UT Southwestern cancer specialists remind you to protect your skin in every season.

Skin cancer, caused by damaging ultraviolet radiation from the sun, is the most common of all cancers in the U.S. Fortunately, it's also one of the most preventable forms of the disease.

“Overexposure to ultraviolet radiation is the most preventable risk factor for skin cancer, but skin cancer's incidence rates continue to rise,” says Dr. Rohit Sharma, a surgeon at UT Southwestern Medical Center who specializes in melanoma and soft-tissue sarcoma.

To be safe in the sun, Dr. Sharma recommends:

- **Generously apply sunscreen** to all exposed skin using a broad-spectrum sunscreen that protects against both UVA and UVB rays and has a SPF of at least 30.

- **Be sure to use enough sunscreen** for adequate protection. The skin should be reasonably saturated to assure an adequate amount has been applied—typically a shot glass full for lotions.

- **Pay attention to the water resistant profile** of the individual sunscreen. When exercising or swimming, you will need to observe this time frame for reapplication. At a minimum, reapply every two hours, even on cloudy days. This applies to both lotions and sprays.

- **Avoid tanning outdoors** and tanning beds indoors. Ultraviolet light from tanning beds and the sun causes skin cancer and wrinkling. Use a sunless self-tanning product instead.

- **Wear protective clothing**, including long sleeves, sunglasses, and a hat that shades the face.

- **Seek shade** and remember that the sun's rays are strongest between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

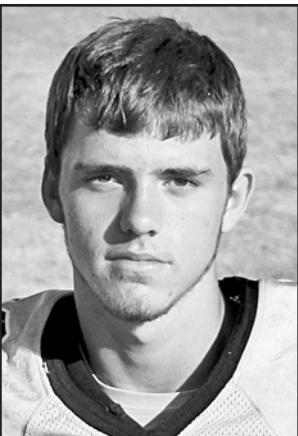

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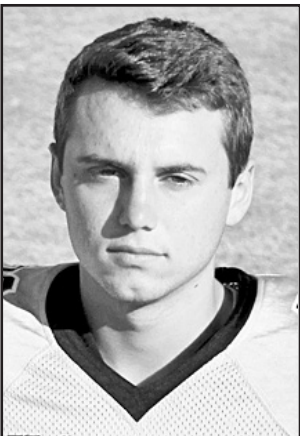
