Pirates Buck Heavier Team In First Game

Game Scheduled to Start On Pirate Field at 8:15 Friday Night

The claws of the Wildcats from Calallen High School should be clipped by the Rockport high school Pirates Friday night when these two teams come against the other at Pirate Field at 8:15 o'clock.

While the Wildcats have had only a few days practice, they are boasting a heavier team than the Pirates. This is the first year of competition for the Wildcats, and, although the weight is against them, the Pirates hope to make up that deficiency by experience and speed. Last year was the Pirates first year for football since they won the district title in 1941.

Bobby Morrison will fill in for Bert Haney at center. Bobby has had an injured back since last spring, but is coming along nicely now. He should see lots of action this fall. Jack Davis will relieve Jackie Dietrich at left tackle, while Denny Smith will be a relief man for the halfbacks. Joe Salch, 190 pound tackle, will relieve Dexter Wright at right tackle. Joe was late in getting started for fall practice, but he shows fine form, and should rip great strings of hide from the backs of the Wildcats. Kenneth Phagan will probably see a great deal of action on our defensive play, and the Wildcats are in for some surprises from that score.

Ripley Puts "Big Tree" In National Limelight

"Believe It Or Not" Says Local Tree Is Largest In World

WIDE PUBLICITY GIVEN GREAT OAK TREE NEAR LAMAR

The Big Tree—a giant live oak that sprawls over more than 6,000 square feet and which is located in Goose Island State Park 10 miles to the north of Rockport near Lamar—zoomed into the national limelight last week through the famous Believe It Or Not Column of Robert Ripley.

Under a drawing that was a very good likeness of the great old oak, Ripley captioned it "The largest Live Oak Tree In the World, at Rockport, Texas. 50 feet in Circumference, 118 foot spread and 2,000 years old."

The Ripley cartoon was carried in newspapers from coast to coast and from Canada to Mexico on Sept. 9—and this week a flood of fan mail began arriving in Rockport for the Mayor and Chamber of Commerce.

Everywhere there is interest in the Big Tree—which scientists have estimated was here before Christ. Tree lovers want more details, mayors of other cities who are proud of their oaks want verification (or denial) of Ripley's

Local residents, who for many years have claimed their tree was the largest live oak in Texas, are

standing by their guns and backing the famous cartoonist, who has been challenged many times, but who has seldom been found in

error. Several old timers here remember when the Big Tree was even bigger. Several years ago—before the tree

doctors got hold of the old oak—its branches shot outward so far they touched the ground, then grew up and on out many feet further. Some of these longer branches were amputated, others trimmed back, to save the life of the tree. But, it is still big enough to back Ripley's assertion.

Install New Clocks For Greenwich Time

LONDON.—Time and the Royal Observatory at Greenwich, arbiter of the world's clocks, march on.

Abandoning the use of the ancient pendulum clocks which have kept the Greenwich time accurate to 1-100th of a second, Royal Astronomer Sir Harold S. Jones announces that quartz crystal clocks accurate to 1-1000th of a second per day are being installed.

This means that if you follow Greenwich time you need make a correction of only one second in your clock every two and a half years hereafter.

Texas Cotton Crop This Year is Late

AUSTIN. — The Texas cotton crop, forecast at 2,450,000 bales based on Sept 1 conditions, will be somewhat later this year than usual, the U. S. Agriculture Department here said recently.

Weather will cause greatest part of the lateness, the department said. The estimated production compares with 2,823,000 bales in 1943 and 3,273,000 in the 1933-42 average period. Indicated yield per acre based on the crop remaining for harvest in 165 pounds, nine pounds less than last year.

Scouts Sponsor Paper Drive to Help War Effort

County Trucks to Gather Paper, Citizens Urged Place Paper at Curb

Every available pound of waste paper will be gathered up in Aransas county over this week-end, with pick-ups in Rockport beginning early Saturday morning.

The paper salvage drive is being sponsored by the Boy Scouts here in co-operation with Judge B. S. Fox, who is furnishing county trucks for the pick-ups. Paper is one of the most vitally needed items at this time in the war effort and every citizen is urged to scour his or her premises and salvage every piece of paper. Newspapers and magazines should be tied in separate bundles and placed at the curb or street edge in front of home and places of business. The bundles should not be too heavy, so that they may be easily handled by the boys in loading the trucks.

County trucks make pick-ups in Estes, Oak Grove and Sparks Colony Thursday and Friday will pick up paper in Fulton and Lamar. Friday morning the trucks will begin making the rounds in Rockport.

The paper will be moved immediately into salvage channels and will soon be converted into war-needed products.

The need for waste paper has become greater than ever, and paper mills over the United States have been forced to close because of shortages of the war-vital material. Leaders of the waste paper campaign in Texas have pointed out that every time a mill is forced to close for a few days, production of paper board used in making over 700,000 different items for the armed forces suffers just that much.

Information from the War Production Board reveals that the need for waste paper is growing greater as the lines of battle stretch into enemy territory, and that the demand for waste paper will continue after the capitulation of Germany.

Leaders of the campaign in Texas stress the fact that brown wrapping paper and flattened corrugated boxes, are very much in demand, and that every scrap of paper should be saved and turned into collection centers in order that the mills may produce at full capacity to supply the needs of the armed forces and essential civilian needs.

For Good Health, Break Your Fast With Good Breakfast

AUSTIN. — "Breakfast should
supply everyone, young and old
alike, with from one-fourth to one-
third of the day's food needs," says
Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health
Officer. "In order for a growing
child to get as much of his day's
requirements, he needs a hot, sub-
stantial breakfast consisting of
cereals or whole grain bread, fruit
juices, egg or meat, and a milk
drink."

Dr. Cox discussing the dietary
needs of school children says fur-
ther, "In many homes the line
of least resistance is followed. The
children when offered food at
breakfast time may reply that they
are not hungry, they do not have
time, or in some instances will
even say that breakfast makes
them sick. Older children, especially
girls of high school age, some-
times deliberately go without
breakfast in order to keep from
increasing their weight. This is
both foolish and dangerous. They
deprive themselves of body build-
ing material when they fail to eat
nourishing food. Faulty nutrition
with its health hazards often re-
sults. In the young child this means
that resistance to disease is lower-
ed and the process for developing
and maintaining health definitely
are handicapped."

Whether young, middle aged,
or older, a good health practice is
to break your fast with a good
breakfast. The day's first meal is
an important one. Parents cannot
escape the obligation to see that
their children are fed properly at
the day's beginning."

But the war will have to limp along without this help. There's a law against mailing firearms, even to kill Germans and Japanese.

Wood Stove Will Be Off Ration List Oct 15

Removal from rationing of wood heating and cooking stoves on October 15 has been announced by Herman Hildenbrand chairman of the local War Price and Rationing Board, who stated that oil and gas stoves will remain on the ration list due to a shortage of these two types.

Coal stoves also were released from rationing, but are little used in this area. Wood stoves, however, are a favorite means of cooking or heating in most of Texas.

The War Price and Rationing Board will not issue certificates for wood stoves to consumers after October 15, Hildenbrand explained.

"Current inventories of wood stoves are substantially larger than they were when nationwide rationing started," Hildenbrand added, "but supplies of gas and oil stoves are not large enough to permit unrestricted sales."

Wood stoves have been rationed since 24, 1943.

Delicacies May Be Canned For Shipment to Men Overseas

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 14.—Canning in tin cans seems the most practical solution to the shipment of home-made goodies for the men overseas.

This applies to fruit cake which G.I.'s give top priority among delicacies which families are now preparing for shipment prior to the deadline date of October 15, according to Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, specialist in food preservation for the A. and M. College Extension Service. Post offices now are accepting Christmas for men serving abroad in the armed services.

Fortunately, a homemaker can use her own favorite recipe for fruit cake, plum pudding, or Boston Brown bread. After the ingredients have been mixed well, the batter can be packed into greased or waxed paper-line R-enamel or plain tin cans. No. 1 or No. 2 cans are more satisfactory than larger ones. One to one and one-half inch head space should be left. Mrs. Leverenz says the first roll on the can should be sealed before steaming the fruit cake. Then the second roll should be processed in a pressure cooker.

If a pressure cooker is used for steaming time. If a water bath is used, the hot water level should be about two inches below the can. Number 1 cans should be steamed for 60 minutes and No. 2 cans for 75 minutes. After steaming seal is completed, then cans should be placed in a pressure cooker and processed at 10 lbs. pressure for 30 minutes.

Odd as it seems, Mrs. Leverenz also recommends canning cookies for better shipment. Honey cookies, butterscotch, or those made with dried fruit or molasses usually well. Candies may be packed in a can easily with layers of waxed paper between each piece of the layers and the extra space filled with popped corn or nuts.

Canned chicken is especially a favorite with men overseas. Texans usually are delighted with barbecue meat, chili or tamales. Preserves packed in tin is usually very acceptable. Relishes and pickles are fine for a short period of time provided they are canned in R-enamel cans.

American People Give
30 Million Dollars In
11-Year Fight On Polio

In the last eleven years the American people have contributed \$29,562,742.54 to conquer infantile paralysis, announced today at the opening of the annual meeting of the Medical Advisory Committees of the National Foundation at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel. At that meeting applications for grants to carry on medical research will be considered and further plans for carrying on the fight against infantile paralysis will be made.

This money was raised through the Celebration of President Roosevelt's Birthday and the March of Dimes, held in January of each year, starting in 1934.

Sixteen million dollars, or more than half of the total given, was raised in the two years of 1943 and 1944, Mr. O'Connor said.

"The increase in donations in 1943 and 1944, which probably was due in part to the high incidence of the disease, assured the National Foundation that the public wished it to intensify its activities and to widen its entire field of operations," he added.

Rubber Nipples Scarce,
Babies Fed from Spoons

LONDON. — One serious wartime shortage in England was high lighted recently when the city of Scharborough sent an urgent appeal to Britain's Minister of Health for help in procuring rubber nipples for infants' feeding bottles.

The city's drug stores had been out of them for weeks and hundreds of mothers were feeding their babies from teaspoons.

"It's a serious situation," stated the city's medical officer. "It is bad for the babies and a strain on the mothers. In cases where babies are not breast-fed it is almost impossible to use any other methods of feeding."

"You cannot get very young babies to take milk from a spoon, and their nutrition is bound to suffer if this shortage isn't met soon."
