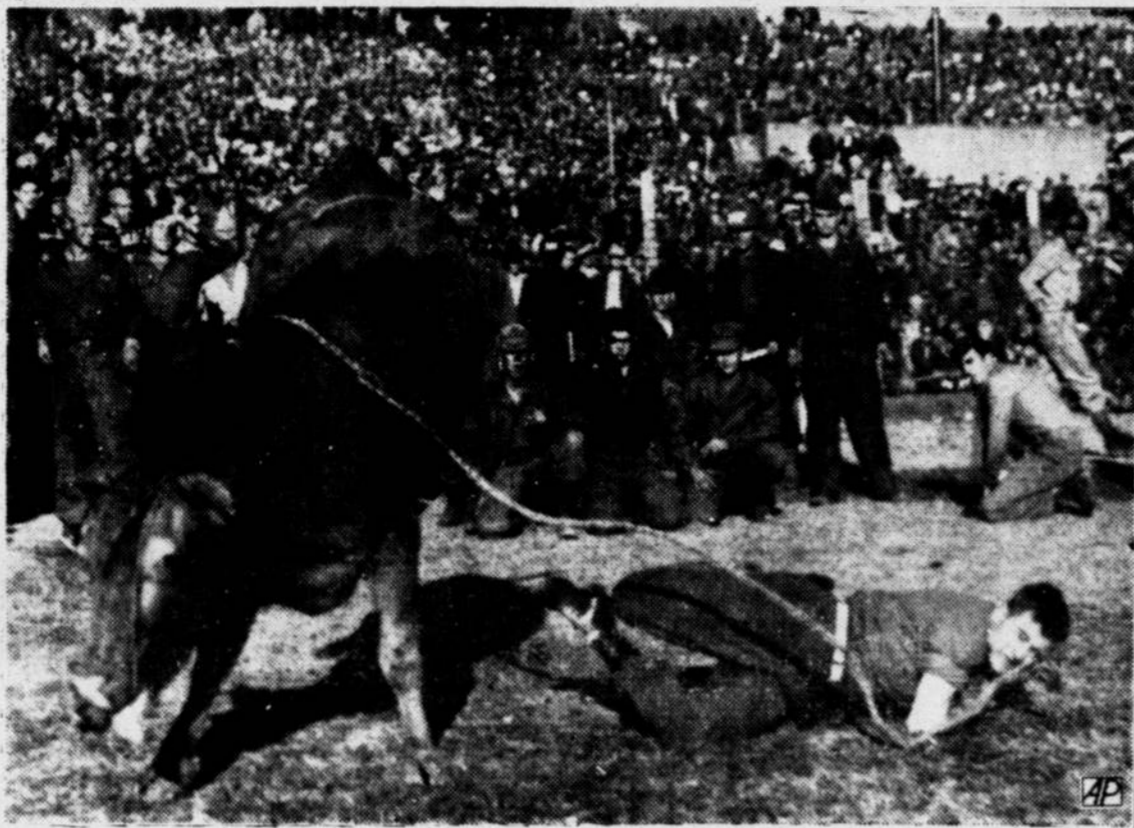
The trees may be seen at the Pratt-Yudky Store, 225 North Austin, or at the Pratt home, 706 North Seventh.

## Local Sailor on USS Makin Island

Earl Roger Carter of Lamesa, seaman first class in the U. S. navy, took part in the occupation of Japan with the crew of the escort carrier USS Makin Island.

While taking part in several major Pacific operations, including Okinawa, Iwa Jima and the Philippines liberation, the USS Makin Island remained undamaged in battle. Her planes and guns were credited with shooting down 22 enemy aircraft and destroying 16 on the ground.

The escort carrier also assisted in sinking two destroyers, an oiler and numerous small craft, while otherwise performing her major assignment of knocking out pillboxes, troop concentrations and installations in the Jap islands she attacked in the Western Pacific.

## New Paper Drive Begins December 7, Have Paper On Curb By Two O'clock

Paper will be collected by the Home Demonstration Council beginning Friday, December 7, at 2:00 p. m. Please tie your paper and have it on the curb before that time.

There will be two collections in Lamesa each month, on the first and third Friday afternoons. Mrs. C. F. Gowen, Chairman of the Marketing Committee, requests that people who donate paper observe these instructions:

The old paper securely or pack it in boxes small enough that women can handle it. Do not mix paper. Tie or box newspapers separately. Books, magazines and catalogs may be tied or boxed together. Mrs. Gowen states that there will be no collections on days when there is rain, sleet or snow falling, so please do not put your paper out when there is "falling" weather. The first building inside the fair grounds will open each Saturday afternoon from 2:00 until 6:00. People who bring paper may take it there.

The tires on the trailer that was formerly stationed on the courthouse lawn, are worn out and so far, another has not been found. Mrs. Gowen states that housewives are requested to collect only these kinds of paper: newspapers, books, magazines and catalogs. She says that the building down at the fair ground is going to be very cold to work in and that it will be a big help if all paper is securely tied or boxed.

It was necessary for the club women to retrieve much of the paper that was collected before. Unless it is raining, please have your paper securely tied or boxed on the curb, Friday, December 7, at 2:00 p. m.

## Liquor Fines Total \$3,425

Fines assessed two Dawson County men on liquor charges the past few days totaled \$3,425. County Judge Kilmer Corbin said Saturday.

Both men—G. H. Hulseley and Jack Meadors—were charged with sale of liquor in dry area.

Hulseley was tried before a jury in county court. His fine was set at \$2,000 plus costs, and he was given a year's jail sentence in the county jail. Motion for new trial had been posted by Hulseley in process of appeal.

On a plea of guilty, Meadors was fined \$1,425 by the county judge.

## General Housekeeping of Lamesa Businessmen Could Stand Improvement, City Manager Cites

Help Keep Lamesa clean was the Saturday appeal made by City Manager G. T. Hill.

The first thing a person usually notices when driving into or through a strange town is the general housekeeping condition, the city manager reminded, especially the streets and alleys.

"Should a stranger passing through our city express his opinion as to the cleanliness of the business district, it might make us all realize just how much a daily and thorough clean-up job would help the looks of the town. In many different ways, Lamesa could be made a cleaner, neater and nicer place in which to work and live," he asserted.

City officials want to keep the streets and alleys clean and attractive, but due to the lack of manpower and facilities, the city cannot do the job well alone, he pointed out. If each businessman would see that his place is free from trash, loose papers and other refuse, he would be doing a good turn, not only for the city but for his own business in the city manager's opinion.

Much of the trash is thrown on the streets by the general public, Hill said. Early placement of trash cans in the business district will help to eliminate that.

"In the meantime, let's all take pride in our town, our businesses by keeping trash from the premises," was Hill's suggestion. "Don't leave your place of business, at the close

of a day's work, all cluttered with trash swept from the store, loose and flying bits of paper. Keep the back of your store and the alleys as clean as possible.

A city ordinance prohibits sweeping or placing loose trash in streets, alleys and vacant lots. However, Hill reminded, city officials had much rather individuals would keep the streets and alleys clean on a cooperative basis—as a matter of civic pride rather than be called on for enforcement of the law.

Until the city can obtain the facilities and men to do the work, the help of each businessman along this line will be greatly appreciated, he said. "It is obvious then that all citizens will enjoy living in a cleaner and neater looking town," he concluded.

## VFW Steps Up Victory Loan Local Efforts

Veterans' Organization Makes Appeal to Citizens in Bond Selling Campaign

Joining hands in the Victory Loan drive, Lamesa's newly organized Keathley Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, will have a bond booth at its Pearl Harbor Anniversary Dance in the old Ford Motor Company building Friday night. Buddy Arnett and his orchestra will play.

The VFW-sponsored dance will begin the accumulation of funds for a VFW Memorial Hall, which will be dedicated to the Dawson County men killed in World War II. Dedication of the hall will include at least 60 local heroes who died in action.

Clayton Barkhurst, post commander, has issued a statement concerning the Victory Loan drive. It follows:

"Fellow Texans, what has happened to our state? The largest state in the union, yet we are the smallest in number eight. We vets wish to know what has happened. The only time we fell down on the job was when we were not able to rise again. In 1942 when I entered the marine corps, the fighting corps was made up of 23 and a half per cent Texans. We were proud of it. Our army and navy chiefs of staff are Texans. The largest number of heroes and fighting men were from Texas.

"Now, I ask you fellow Texans, what is wrong? If these bonds are no good, then the country we fought, suffered and died for is no good. I'm not asking you, I'm telling you to buy bonds at the December 7 VFW dance. Help put Texas on top in the victory Loan drive!"

## Seaman Burkett On USS Barnstable

Billy Ben Burkett of Welch, seaman second class in the navy reserves, served during the war on the attack transport USS Barnstable, which saw action from Guadalcanal to Japan. The transport is now with the "Magic Carpet" fleet, helping to return high-point veterans from the Pacific battle stations.

The Barnstable, assigned to occupation tasks, made two runs to Japan between September and November 1. First of the two was from Lingayen Gulf in the Philippines to Wakayama, Honshu, and the second was from Mindanao Philippines, to Hiro Wan in the Kure area of Honshu.

## Utah Instructor Added to A&M Staff

The growing demand in Texas for range management specialists will be met by the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, it was announced today by Dean Charles N. Shephardson of the School of Agriculture.

Dean Shephardson announced that Dr. L. A. Stoddard, head of the department of range management at the Utah State Agricultural College, has accepted headship of a Department of Range Management at Texas A. & M. College.

Dr. Stoddard will arrive January 1, and will organize and direct the teaching work in this field, and get research projects lined up immediately. The course in range management will be available to A & M students in September, 1946. Dean Shephardson announced.

### USDA Council Organized at Friday Meet

County Council of the United States Department of Agriculture was formed Friday to replace the USDA War Board. County Agent T. A. Barfield was named council chairman, and Miss Georgia Bourland was elected secretary.

Functions of the new organization will highlight cooperation between the agricultural agencies, assistance to returned veterans, giving of information on loans and machinery to rehabilitate veterans and others.

Regular meetings of the USDA council have been set for the first Monday in each month at 9 a. m. in the AAA office. Frank Harris, tail-twister for the organization, will collect 25-cent fines for absence or tardiness at the meetings.

## Season's Initial Snow Falls Sunday

The season's first snow began falling in Lamesa at 1 p. m. Sunday. The flurries of huge snowflakes continued at intervals all afternoon and until 9:30 p. m. last night, leaving a total of 50 of an inch moisture.

Only a light covering of white was left on plots of grass in downtown areas last night, and cars parked in business districts were covered with snow.

Temperature low for the night was 31 degrees. Maximum temperature yesterday was read at 39 degrees.

## WATCH CAN DUMPING

The county commissioners' court has asked cooperation of citizens in not dumping tin cans and other garbage in barrow pits on various county roads. This, said County Attorney Bob Huff, is not only a violation of the law, but it is injurious to automobile tires, the graders and motor vehicles.

## Commission Hires Firm For Evaluation of Oil Corporation Holdings

Dawson County oil properties are slated to add a sizeable sum to county taxes in 1946. A substantial increase in the county's \$7,000,000 evaluations total is expected to result from commissioners' court action in a Friday meeting.

Contract for setting up tax values in the Welch oil field was awarded to Prichard & Abbott of Fort Worth, tax evaluation engineers and experts. Representatives of the firm were at the Friday session.

All members of the commissioners' court were present. County Judge Kilmer Corbin reported. The commissioners include J. A. Hogg, precinct one; G. C. Aten, precinct 2; J. P. O'Brien, precinct three; and J. E. Debnam, precinct four.

Also attending were County Attorney Bob Huff, County Clerk Howard Humphrey and R. W. Herndon, county tax assessor-collector.

History of Welch and other county oil development dates back over three years. Three years ago the oil field had only one producing well, and in February others came in. Total of seven producing wells are now in the field, and drilling is in progress for that many others.

Cities Service, Magnolia and other major companies are represented in the field with considerable oil property now taxable for county purposes, Corbin said.

The Fort Worth firm will set up the values, including the evaluation of all lease holding interests and drilling rigs in operation over the county. Some drilling rigs of \$100,000 value have not been touched by county taxation up to the present, Attorney Huff added.

The tax experts will be paid the nominal sum of five cents for each \$100 increase in Dawson County evaluations on oil property.

This increase of evaluation will also apply to other public corporations in the county—railroad, light, gas, telephone and telegraph companies.

Heretofore, Corbin pointed out, oil properties in the county have not been rendered for taxes at all. The same has been true of the pipeline that crosses the county.

Also at the Friday meeting, the commissioners discussed highways, the proposed Patricia road in particular. The county has agreed to secure the right-of-way for the Patricia road, contract for which will be let by the State Highway Department in February.

The county will pay affected property owners at the flat rate of \$60 per acre, the commissioners decided. The road will be an 11 and a half mile contract southwest of Lamesa.

Highlight of the TSTA program was an address by Dr. L. K. Bishop of the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Keynote of his message was contained in his statement, "To serve democracy, education must teach understanding and appreciation among racial groups."

The speaker pointed out that the security of democracy depends on a new type of education which will create cordial group relations between peoples of fundamental differences to offset the flood of propaganda fed into America by foreign agents.

Dawson County people have been asked to cooperate in the "Gifts for the Yanks Who Gave" program being sponsored locally by the American Legion and Legion Auxiliary. Gifts will be received through December 10.

Lamesa stores will gift wrap the purchases, and the gifts will be picked up from the stores by members of the two organizations, said Legion Commander G. K. (Bub) McDonald and Mrs. J. F. Smith, auxiliary president.

Department headquarters will furnish lists of servicemen and women and ex-servicemen and women now being hospitalized, so as to insure a package for each this Christmas.

Suggested gift items made by headquarters include items that are not perishable. No foodstuffs will be accepted.

Gift suggestions for men include mystery, classic, Bibles, comics, dictionaries, western and humor books; maps of the United States, maps of the world or pocket-size books; games, playing cards, check-boards, chess sets, cribbage sets, folding writing sets, air mail stationery, air mail stamps, fountain pens, pencils, pencil sharpeners, address books, picture folders, stands. Sleeveless sweaters, tee shirts, nice handkerchiefs, handkerchiefs, good quality socks, bedroom slippers, pipes, tobacco, lighters, cigarettes, cigars, pipe cleaners and tobacco pouches, good quality razor blades, toilet kits, hair conditioners, pocket combs, foot powders, lotions, shaving soaps, tooth paste and powder, cleaning tissues, bath towels, pocket knives, identification bracelets, good sun glasses, wash cloths.

Suggested as gifts for GI Jane are the same as for GI Joe plus fancy letter paper.

Others include hair combs and brushes, nice soaps, dusting and face powders, cologne, lipsticks, rouge, deodorants, nail polish and remover, manicure sets, compact and permanent wave sets, pancake makeup, mirrors, bobby pins, hair pins, hairnets, clothes pins, skirt hangers, khaki zippers, elastic by the yard, safety pins, cellophane bags, yarn and sewing equipment, scarfs, chamois gloves, bandannas, bed socks.

Each package should be carefully marked for GI Joe or GI Jane to avoid confusion of exchange of gifts, the sponsor said. Names of givers may or may not be included in the package, according to each wish.

### Authorities For Red Cross Cite Insurance Case

The American Red Cross is prepared to give helpful counsel and assistance to veterans and their dependents concerning available benefits. The local chapter office is located on North First Street, just back of the First National Bank.

In the second of a series of news stories, the local Red Cross has issued a discussion of National Service Life Insurance.

The example case concerned a World War II navy veteran, who enlisted on his 18th birthday. During the time of his active service in the Pacific, he was seriously injured when a Japanese flying bomb struck his ship. He married about a year ago and his first child is now quite young.

"Seaman First Class Bernard, hospitalized for four months, expects to be discharged soon. At the time of induction, he made application for \$10,000 National Service Life Insurance, naming his mother as beneficiary. Recently his wife received a letter from him in which he said he might not be able to carry so much insurance after discharge.

"Counsel in the matter was given Mrs. Bernard by her local Red Cross home service chairman.

"This insurance problem is characteristic of those facing young veterans who have had little employment experience prior to their entry into service. These men are concerned with their employment future and their ability to carry what seems to them a large amount of insurance. A veteran should not attempt to convert his insurance until he can decide what amount monthly he can pay from his income.

"In the present case, the home service chairman of the local Red Cross chapter advised the wife to write her husband asking him to continue his insurance for the time being; make the necessary change in beneficiary, if he so desires, and not to worry about his employment future or his ability to carry the insurance until he came home.

"The American Red Cross is prepared to assist the disabled veteran financially to carry his government insurance pending the settlement of his claims. Other benefits obtainable through the Veterans Administration, including vocational rehabilitation, pensions and employment service also are available to this veteran to help him solve problems that are of deep concern to him."

### Peach Experiment List Varieties That Withstand Spring Freezes

Prompted by the need for late blooming peaches to escape the hazards of spring freezes in the South Plains area, studies have been made by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station.

A number of peach varieties may be planted by the West Texas home orchardist to insure an overlapping supply of fresh fruit in years favorable to peach production, the experiments showed.

U. A. Randolph, horticulturist for the Fruit Investigations Laboratory at Montague, has just issued a report titled "Promising Peach Varieties for North Texas," which is the result of tests on 45 peach varieties.

Commercial possibilities were found in five late blooming varieties which have given consistent production for several years. These are Vedette, ripening about July 15, the most highly productive and of good quality; Viceroy, Eclipse and Rochester, which ripen about July 13, and Rio Oso Gem, which produces about mid-August.

The latter is recommended for extending the marketing season where proper moisture conservation is practiced. All five varieties are classed as freestone, though the flesh of Eclipse sometimes clings.

The season could open, Randolph said, with Early Wheeler and Unceada, the former being the leading commercial producer in the Montague section, but not consistent. These may be followed in general order by Marigold, Early Rose, Oriole, Golden Jubilee, Fair Beauty, Golden Beauty, Vedette, Carman, Viceroy, Eclipse, Rochester, Halhaven, the popular Elberta, Frank Rio Oso Gem, Frankie and Wintertech.

The Elberta, Randolph pointed

out, is not a consistent producer. Wintertech extends the peach season to mid-October, he added.

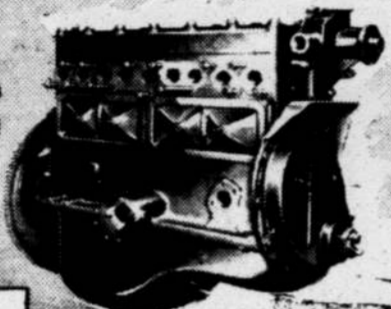

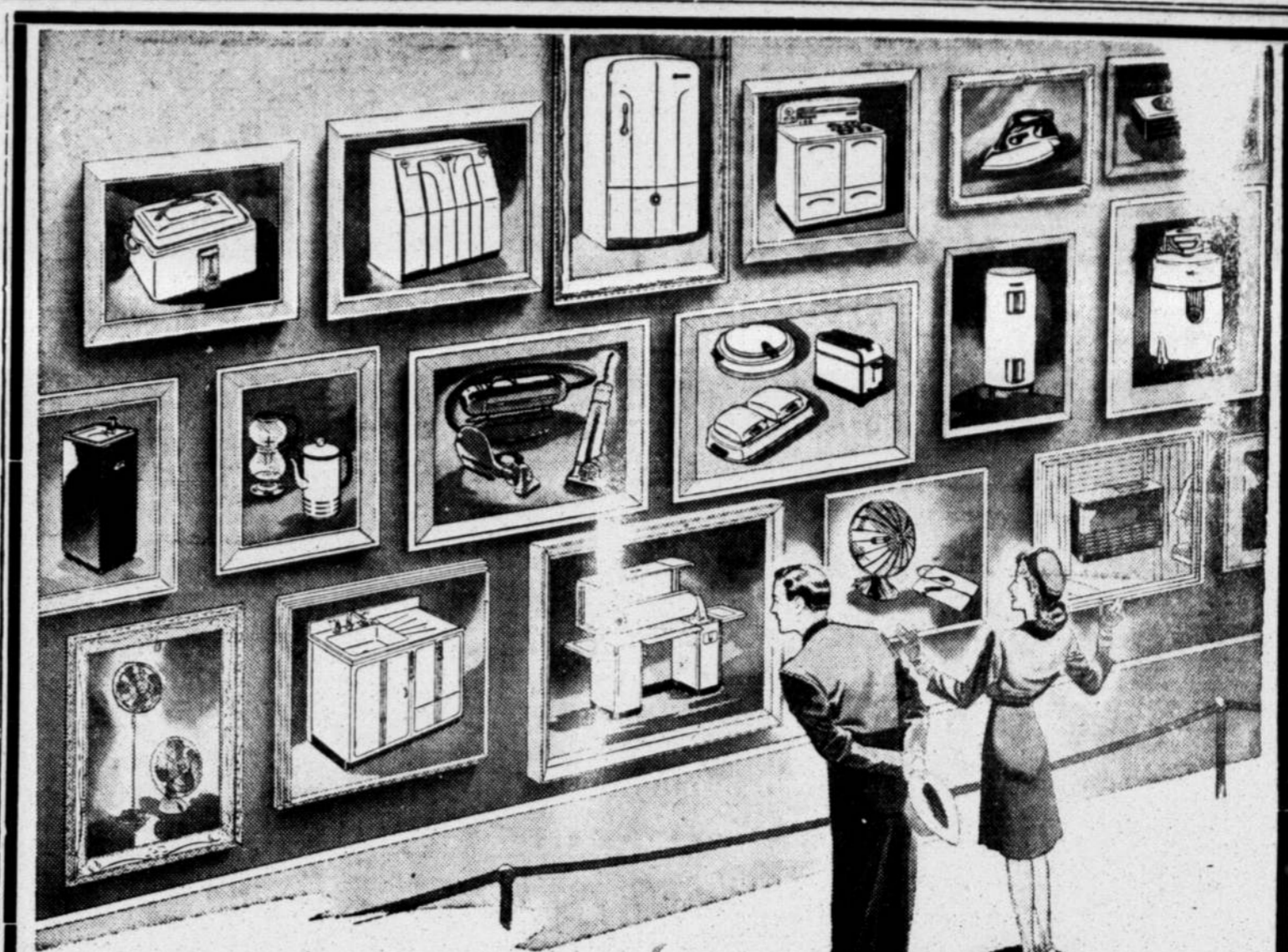

## Connally Approves Presidential Power in World Security Council

Tom Connally, senior United States senator from Texas, approved giving Pres. Harry S. Truman the power to make available to the Security Council the United States' quota of armed forces with outstaying of Congress.

Senator Connally, a stellar figure in the spring United Nations Conference in San Francisco, declared that the president should be subject to congressional approval in the Security Council matter. The veteran Texan is a leader in the senate committee on foreign relations.

The entire statement made to people of Texas by Senator Connally is as follows:

"Last July we approved ratification of the United Nations Charter by the overwhelming vote of 89 to 2. By that act we gave our solemn pledge to cooperate wholeheartedly with the United Nations in the difficult job of maintaining world peace. The legislation now before the senate and house constitutes the first important step in making possible the close collaboration of our government with the new organization.

"It is my hope that the Senate will act speedily and decisively in this turbulent and war-torn world. It is imperative that we in the United States demonstrate beyond any shadow of doubt our willingness to cooperate in every possible way to keep the peace.

"The most important section of the new bill would give to the president the power to make available to the Security Council our quota of armed forces—a quota to be agreed upon later by the Congress—for enforcement action against aggressor nations.

"It will not be necessary for the president to refer each such case to the Congress for approval.

"This is exactly as it should be. The Security Council must have both the power and the authority to act promptly or it will fail in its all-important task. Bitter experience has shown that here is one place that we dare not temporize. The Security Council is one agency which we cannot afford to hamper.

"The bill would also bestow upon the president the power to join with the other United Nations in applying enforcement measures short of armed force. Here again the Security Council must be in a position to act quickly and decisively. By taking prompt action in the application of diplomatic and economic sanctions we may be able to frighten law-breakers into the paths of peace and thus avoid more drastic enforcement measures.

"There are still a few people who fear that we may be granting our representatives on the Security Council too much authority. The bill is perfectly clear on that point. All our representatives to the United Nations must have to act at all times in accordance with instructions from the president.

"No doubt the atomic bomb and the other new weapons being developed by science will change considerably the role of the United Nations. It would be foolhardy to suggest, however, that the atomic bomb has rendered the Security Council a necessary instrument of world peace. Far from it. If ever there was a time to think and act as United Nations, that time is now.

"The United Nations Charter is the only realistic hope for world peace in our generation. We have

## Estimated Yields Of Texas Grain Crops Are Given

one alternative. Either we tackle our responsibilities with a vigor and a determination characteristic of the American people or else we let the world tumble in about us.

Texas' 1945 grain crop took a beating from drought and harvest-time rains, and cotton production fell to a half-century low. The Bureau of Agricultural Economics, Austin, quotes the latest survey by the Crop Reporting Board of the U. S. Department of Agriculture that early fall estimates of cotton, corn and peanut yields declined materially during October. At the same time, rice showed an increase, and the earlier estimate of grain sorghum yields remained unchanged.

Giving production totals, the BAE said that the present estimate of 1,880,000 bales for the 1945 cotton harvest represented a decline of 120,000 bales during October. This estimate compared with 2,646,000 bales in 1944 and 3,112,000 the average for the 1934-1943 period. Early October rains reduced the rate of harvest and lowered both the quality and quantity of production.

The corn crop was estimated at 66,048,000 bushels, a drop of about 2,000,000 bushels from the October 1 estimate. There was some damage from heavy rains during October. The 1944 crop was 69,622,000 bushels and the 10-year average 77,427,000 bushels.

The November 1 estimated production of 68,130,000 bushels of grain sorghums represented an acreage yield of 15 bushels. This, the BAE said, was "only average." Continuing, the BAE said that the season was unfavorable on the high plains but "favorable enough elsewhere." Harvesting on November 1 was about complete except on the high plains.

The rice crop was indicated at 17,600,000 bushels, an increase of 400,000 bushels over the October 1 estimate. Heavy rains caused widespread losses in the peanut crop. The current estimate of 358,200,000 pounds, although about 10 per cent below the October 1 estimate, tops the 1944 yield of 325,800,000 pounds in 1944.

No changes were indicated in other fields. The white potato crop at 5,020,000 bushels compares with the average of 3,840,000 bushels, and sweet potatoes at 4,350,000 bushels is about average, the BAE said. All hay at 1,772,000 tons is about the same as the 1944 crop but about one-third above average.

## Budget Busters Now Coming into Prominence

With reconversion job shifts getting underway and long-awaited consumer goods coming back into the markets, it may be a good time for families to reconvert their spending and saving plans. What happens to the budget that looks so good on paper—then ends up in a deficit, or with nothing saved toward that new car, coat, refrigerator, or radio?

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, specialist in home improvement for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, suggests three types of expenses that frequently pop up and play havoc with budgets that have not provided for them.

The first type, she says, is the small expense of a nickel here and a dime there, which mounts up surprisingly. The wise family counts in these expenses which

many people consider "too small to matter." Some like to handle such items through personal allowances, for which no further accounting is necessary.

Some things such as taxes, winter fuel bills, insurance premiums, interest payments, and Christmas shopping turn up only once or twice a year or a few times a year. For this second type of expense, Mrs. Claytor suggests finding a monthly average from the yearly total of these expenses, and setting that amount aside each month. Some families find it helpful to mark up on a calendar the probable amounts of bills and the dates they must be paid.

### Veterans and the Surplus Property

A pamphlet designed to give veterans full information on their rights to buy surplus property has been prepared by the Surplus Property Administration.

The booklet sets forth the basic facts about the preferences given veterans in buying surplus property. The purchasing procedure is outlined step by step. A list of disposal agencies and the kinds of property they sell is included.

To cover all angles of the subject, a series of questions and answers received from veterans has been added.

The booklet is being distributed to operation centers and other key points in the armed services, to Civil Service Boards, to Veteran Administration offices, and through veterans organizations.

### Workers' List Exceeds Jobs in USES Register

For the fourth consecutive week, local manpower exceeded current local employment opportunities. Manager C. Raymond Jones of the local United States Employment Service office said Thursday. Jones makes weekly reports of the Lamesa area labor market, including Dawson and Borden Counties.

Twelve persons were referred by the USES office to jobs last week, and eight of them were hired. Registering for jobs were 21 persons; 65 contacted the USES office in regard to employment; and only 48 employment opportunities were listed.

Principal demand for labor in the two-county area is for common laborers, tinner and radiator man, waitresses, sheet metal worker, salespersons, plumber, male secretary, male office clerk, automobile mechanic, meat scrubbers, male bookkeepers, dishwasher, tractor mechanic and helper, tractor parts man.

Vitamin K is recommended as a routine adjunct to quinine and other anti-malarials.

### Let's Be Different With Our Dressing For Christmas

Let's try a new type of dressing this Christmas to go with that turkey, goose or chicken that we have been saving for this special occasion.

Dressing is an important part of the menu, especially on holidays. Vary them according to your imagination and means. Always stuff a bird lightly because dressing swells as it cooks. Remember that an abundance of liquid makes a dressing soggy. It is much better to have too much than too little so bake the remainder in a greased dish in the oven with the bird for the last hour of cooking. Allow one generous cup full of dressing for every pound of bird.

Bread Dressing with Mushrooms, Oysters, Nuts, Giblets, etc.

This is sufficient for a four pound hen. A small turkey or goose will require 1 1/2 times this amount and the recipe will have to be doubled for large birds.

There is no set rule for the proportions of ingredients for bread dressing. It should be palatable, light and slightly moist, well flavored but bland.

Chopped green peppers, nut meats, sauteed mushrooms and drained or lightly sauteed oysters may be added to it. Stock or oyster liquor may be substituted for milk.

Chop the giblets. Melt: 1-4 cup butter.

Add and saute for 2 minutes: 2 tablespoons or more chopped onion and chopped giblets (optional).

Combine with:

4 cups crustless, diced bread (preferably one day old)

2 or 3 eggs (optional)

4 tablespoons chopped parsley  
1-4 to 1 cup chopped parsley  
3-4 teaspoon salt  
1-2 teaspoon paprika  
1-8 teaspoon nutmeg  
1 1/2 cup nut meats  
Milk stock or melted butter to moisten the dressing very lightly.

In the place of the nut meats, you may use:

6 pork sausages, skinned, sliced and browned.  
1 cup or more sliced mushroom sauteed with onion.

**Oyster Dressing**  
Follow the above rules. Omit the nut meats and giblets and add: 1-2 to 1 pint of oysters, drained. Chop them or leave whole. They may be preheated in butter. Use part oyster liquid and part milk.

**Chestnut Dressing**  
Sufficient for a 3 1-2 pound chicken. Double or treble the recipe for a turkey.

Shell and skin: 3 cups Chestnuts  
Drop into boiling salted water  
Cook them until they are soft. Put them through a potato ricer.

Combine with:

1-4 cup seedless raisins  
1-2 cup melted butter  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon salt  
1-4 cup cream  
1 cup dry bread or cracker crumbs

8 tablespoons chopped parsley  
1-2 cup chopped celery  
1 tablespoon grated onion.

**Apple and Sweet Potato Dressing**  
2 cups apples, peeled and cored  
4 cups sweetpotatoes, peeled and sliced.

Cook the apples and the potatoes separately in a little boiling water until they are nearly tender. Drain them and mash them. Combine and add: 1-2 cup brown sugar.  
1-4 teaspoon salt.

Moisten with: About 1-2 cup apple water.  
Double this recipe for a goose or turkey.

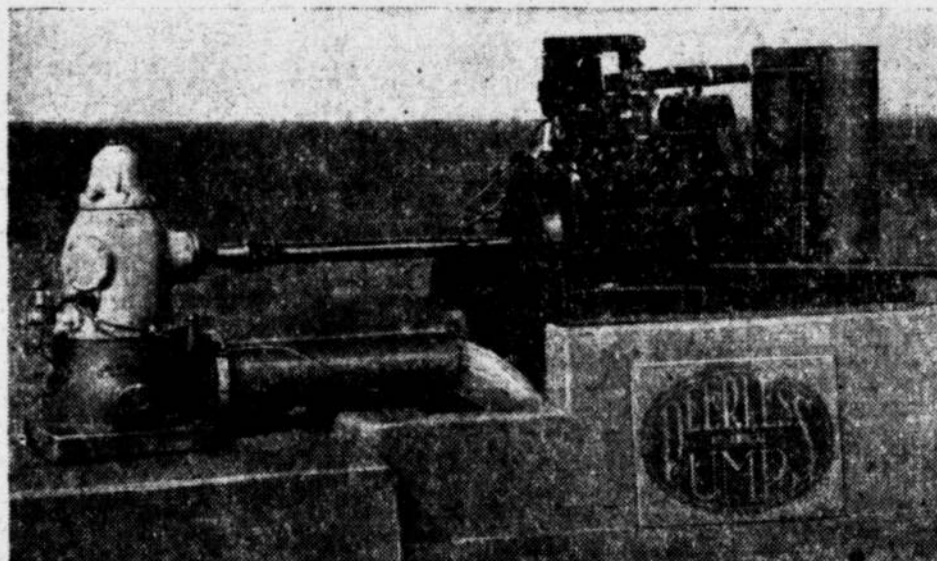

## Farmers Are To Select Their Committeemen

Texas farmers and ranchmen will elect community ACA committeemen and delegates to a county convention during the first week of December, according to an announcement made by B. F. Vance, state director of the Production and Marketing Administration.

Exact dates and places for holding the elections will be announced locally.

Delegates to the county convention will elect the county ACA committeemen who, with the assistance of the county committeemen, will administer the 1946 program in the county.

More responsibility is placed on local county and community committee in 1946 than ever before, he said. This group, assisted by other county agricultural workers, will determine how the county allotment will be spent, select the practices suitable to the county, issue the prior approvals for use of the practices on individual farms and ranches, and will check the practices to see that the specifications set up have been met.

Administrative expenses involved will not be deducted from county allocations of funds, Vance stated.

"Food and fiber for national needs for generations to come is the basis for all farm program planning," the state director pointed out. "Serving the national interest by protection of our land and water resources is the objective of the 1946 and previous programs. Farming practices that control soil erosion, maintain and improve soil productivity, conserve water and restore minerals to cropland and pastures accomplish this purpose."
