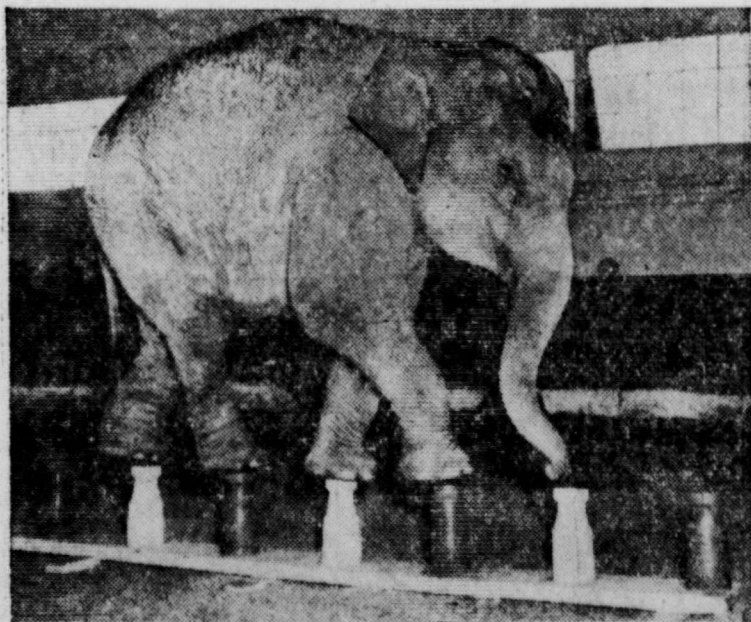
Cisco advanced to the finals by ousting Lampasas 47-40 while the Yellow Jackets advanced by downing Comanche 54-47.

Desdemona Boy Wins National 4-H Club Event

James Ryon, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Ryon, Desdemona, Eastland County, has been named as county winner in the National 4-H Club field crops contest, according to a recent announcement from the County Agent's office.

James, member of the Desdemona 4-H Club, has been active for the past five years. He will receive the gold filled crops medal at the annual Eastland County 4-H Club Rally Day to be held early in April. It will mark the second time he has received this honor for being the county crops winner. Donor of the medal is the International Harvester Co. of Chicago.

James has been active in the different other 4-H Club contests. He has received in the past a dairy production medal as well as two medals for his work in farm and home safety.

In spite of a dry crop season, his 15 acre cotton crop project, sprayed three times for insects, produced three bales of cotton that was sold for \$513.00, a total of \$108.00 worth of cotton that was sold in the seed without being ginned and a total of \$11.00 of cotton seed for a total gross income of \$731.00. His expenses for the cotton project amounted to \$304.12.

James has also had during the year four head of cattle, eight head of sheep and lambs, four of which are being fed out for the spring livestock show and five hogs.

James has exhibited and won several blue ribbons on his sheep and hogs at past shows. The Ryon farm is about four miles north of Desdemona in southeast Eastland County.

Sonny McCrea, son of Postmaster L. H. McCrea, was in an Abilene hospital Friday recovering from an operation to remove a cartilage from his knee.

McCrea, a member of the 1952 Lobo football team, was injured late in the past season, and the operation was decided upon to correct the injury.

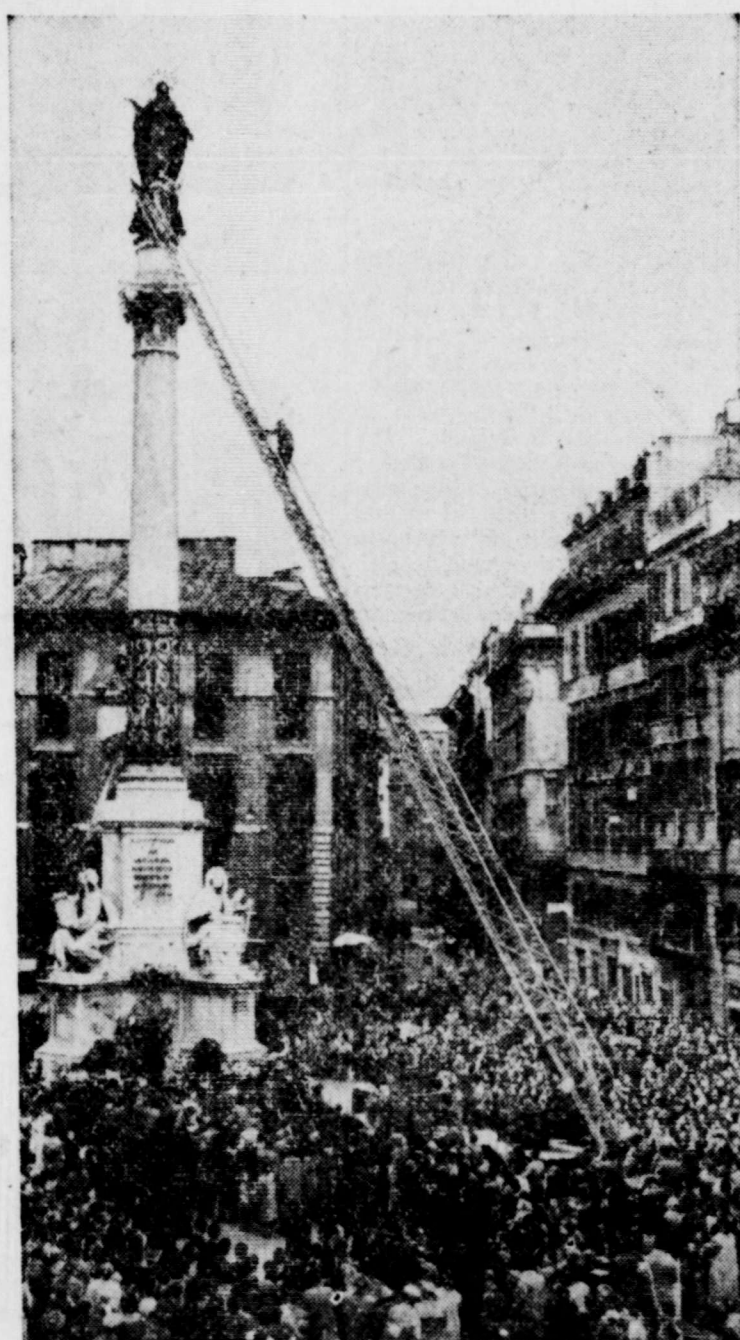
Eastland Boy Loses Eye In Rifle Mishap

Panhandle Wheat Outlook Improves With Xmas Snow

The reality of a white Christmas over much of the Panhandle country brought added cheerfulness to the holiday season as fading wheat prospects were again revived a Texas crop survey showed this week. The snow drifted very little and the added surface moisture, along with snow cover, should stimulate emergence of wheat.

Moisture penetration, however, is still quite limited and additional timely precipitation will be needed to establish and maintain plants. Farm and ranch work, except caring for livestock and other necessary jobs, remained at a virtual standstill.

Activity of all types — field work, harvesting and marketing — in south Texas commercial vegetable areas was limited, owing to the usual holiday lull and to cool weather and light precipitation during the week. Conditions were favorable, however, for growth of hardy type crops such as cabbage, carrots, beets, broccoli, lettuce, etc.

Daytime temperatures were low in all areas, particularly after Christmas. Precipitation was light, but practically all vegetable areas, including the lower valley, Laredo-Eagle Pass, winter garden and coastal bend, received some moisture the last three days of the period.

Dr. Cox Suggests Health Audit By Doctor Annually

AUSTIN, Jan. 2. — If you have not had an audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done, is the advice of Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

cer, to grown-ups in Texas. It is quite as important to check up on your physical resources as it is to look into the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's directions, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid an accumulation of destructive liabilities.

Everyone starts with a certain amount of physical capital and as a personal business proposition it is worthwhile to preserve. In infancy or childhood our physical resources, as a rule, are safeguards for us. As we grow older, the responsibility for doing so rests upon the individual. The critical period for many comes in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being. The records of health departments and of insurance companies show that from 10 to 15 years have been added to the average length of life. But the same records show that a majority of the deaths are due to the degenerative diseases of middle age.

Nearly all of these diseases have slow beginnings and their onset discovered through physical examinations before they have gained serious headway. Early detection, adjustment of physical expenditures and better budgeting of activities under a physician's direction will help shift the balance from the unfavorable to the favorable side of the ledger.

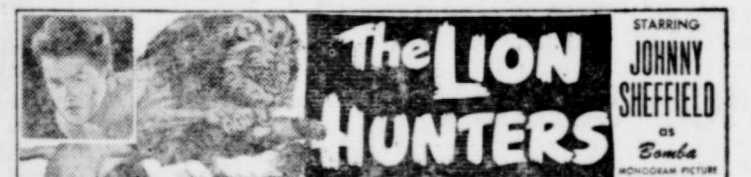

IT'S THE LAW
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A public service feature of the State Bar of Texas

Some Texans who settle back comfortably and wait for March 15th to roll around before doing anything about their Federal income tax may be in for a rude surprise, lawyers say. For, although the instructions and forms recently mailed to each taxpayer do not mention the fact, for practical purposes January 15th, rather than the March deadline, is the last day of grace for many individuals.

This is due to the Federal laws requiring certain persons to file Declarations of Estimated Income Tax — or the pay-as-you-go plan. Under those laws several million people are required each year to estimate their total annual income in advance, making quarterly tax payments based upon such estimates. The final quarterly payment for 1952 is due on or before January 15th, 1953.

A declaration must be filed by every citizen or resident who receives annual wages (subject to withholding) in excess of \$4500, plus \$600 for each exemption claimed.

For example, a single person with no dependents who received wages in excess of \$5100 is required to file a declaration. If he has one additional exemption, he need not file unless his wages exceed \$5700 during 1952. This latter figure would also apply to a married couple without dependents filing a joint return.

In other words, the amount goes

up \$600 for each exemption the taxpayer is entitled to claim, including any exemptions for age or blindness.

A Declaration of Estimated Income Tax must also be filed by any person with annual income from sources other than wages (subject to withholding) in excess of \$100. Of course, individuals whose incomes did not exceed \$600 during 1952 need not file, even though no tax has been withheld.

Those falling into the required category who have failed to file declarations at quarterly intervals during 1952 may make amends by filing either a final declaration or an income tax return by January 15th. At the same time they should pay any balance of tax owed the government on their entire 1952 income.

Now, if paying the entire balance of your tax prior to January 15th is going to be a difficult matter, due to a quirk in the tax laws you may be able to avoid penalties by paying at least 80% of your total tax at that time and the remaining balance by March 15th. This would involve filing both a declaration (by January 15) and a tax return (by March 15).

The first quarterly declaration

on 1953 income is due on or before March 15th.

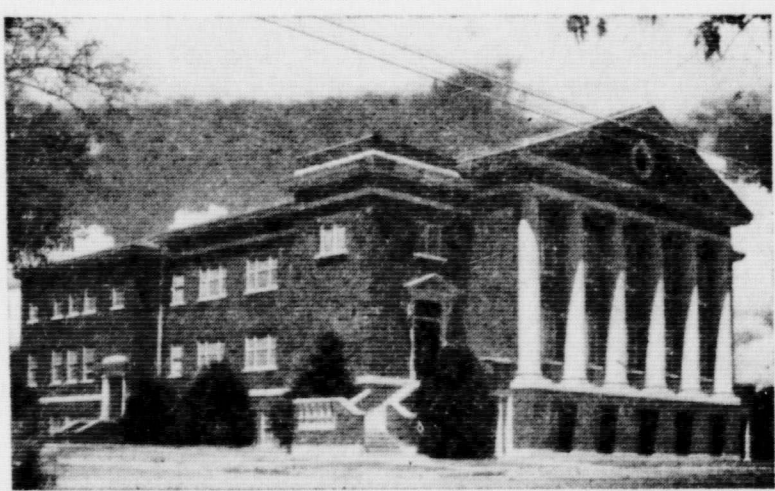
