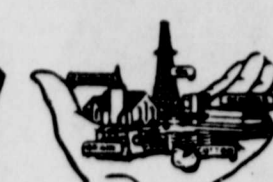

Antelopes Meet Buffs Friday Night

Charles Johnson, the 170 pound running back of the Abernathy Antelopes, gave the "Lope fans a preview of what they hope they will see many times during the coming season, as he ran through and around the Denver City Mustangs in a controlled scrimmage last Friday night. Johnson carried the ball 16 times for 137 yards--(an.5 average) with 60 of these coming on a beautifully executed trap play. Head coach Luke Nickerson said, "This play was perfect example of everyone doing their job on offense. Charles broke through the line and picked up a couple of down field blockers and out raced three Mustang defenders to the goal line."

This play was the highlight of the final preseason scrimmage that saw the Antelopes beat the Mustangs two touchdowns to one. The other Lope score came on a 19 yard pass from Q.B. Dave Davenport to end Kirk Lane.

In comparing this scrimmage with the one the week before against Ralls, Nickerson stated: "We were again pleased with our offense and our defense showed improvement over the previous performance. There are some things we are going to have to work on a lot more before we can do the things we want to do on offense and defense things like pass blocking, pass defense and open field tackling. Our receivers did a good job of running their patterns and catching the ball, but our pass protection broke down several times. We'll just have to spend more time on this phase of the game. Also our secondary coverage will improve as our boys gain more game experience."

Defensive coach Max Kennedy expressed his pleasure with the improvement shown by the defensive unit of the Antelopes. "Considering that we had not worked against the unique type of offense that Denver City, us-

es, we felt our defense did a good job-- their only touchdown came on a pass play that caught us out of position. Actually, our secondary was involved in a stunt and we just weren't ready for the pass they threw," Kennedy praised the defensive work of Keith Lambert and Mike Hedges. "Keith has shown a lot of desire and determination to become a good football player. Right now he is possibly our best defensive lineman. He did a real good job in the scrimmage," Kennedy stated. "About Hedges he said, 'Mike had a very difficult job as middle line-backer against the offense of Denver City and came through with a top performance. He was in on a lot of tackles and read the offense very well in calling stunts.'"

The coaches were all high in their praise of the spirit and attitude shown by the entire team. Senior halfback and co-captain Mike Kerr said it "was a feeling of unity" that kept the team going. Nickerson said, "We have a lot of improving to do in certain areas, but the best thing we have going for us right now is our spirit, desire, hustle, and

Adult Education Classes Begin At Local School September 14

NEED MORE EDUCATION? Adult education is available to adults 16 years of age to 116 years of age!

The Abernathy Public School System is pleased to announce the beginning of the 4th year of basic and secondary education program for the adults of this community and surrounding areas.

There is no cost to the student-classes are free. Instruction will be given in reading, writing, English as a second language, English speaking, and other courses. This program is designed to improve a person's ability to secure employment, qualify for a job promotion, achieve a Certificate of High School Equivalence (G.E.D.), and to become a more efficient consumer and citizen.

Classes will meet two nights per week--Monday and Thursday--two hours per night from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. in room #1, Junior High School Building. Adults may enroll at any time during the year. Classes begin on September 14, 1970.

Teachers employed for this year are: Mr. Bill Caffey--Mathematics and Social Studies; Mrs. Georgia Bartlett, English, Science, and other courses leading to the G.E.D. tests; and Mrs. Carolyn Wade, teaching beginning reading and English as a second language. Mrs. Wade is bilingual in English-Spanish. Typing will again be offered to those interested.

The newest innovation for adult education is the establishment of an Adult Learning Center. This Center is also located in Room #1 of the Junior High School Building. This center was made possible by a Federal Grant of \$10,000.00 from the Adult Education Act of 1966 as amended. Free instruction for adults age 16 and up is available Monday thru Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Monday and Thursday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Adults may attend at any time convenient to them and as often as desired. Instruction will be given in the basic educational areas of reading, writing, English arithmetic, English speaking and other subjects. There are many excellent materials for those studying for the G.E.D. tests. Typing instruction and other special courses will be provided on request. Teaching machines, programmed instruction courses, workbooks, and textbooks will be available for adults courses free of charge. The newest and most modern educational equipment is available. Adults may enroll at any time during the school year. Visitors are always welcome. Mrs. Clorlene Henderson, who was an adult education student and received her G.E.D. certificate from this Adult Education Program, will be in charge of the Learning Center. Drivers License Law To Be Strictly Enforced In City

Under instructions from the Chief of Police a crackdown campaign against unlicensed drivers is in progress in the City of Abernathy.

Anyone found operating a motor vehicle without a valid drivers license will be cited for a violation unless that person is specifically exempted by law. One example of exemption by law is the operation of farm tractors temporarily. There are a few other exceptions but most people are not exempted by law.

Another violation that is common is by persons holding a restricted drivers license (learners permit). State law requires that anyone operating a motor vehicle on a learners permit be accompanied by a duly licensed driver (over 21) and with at least one years experience. This person must occupy the seat next to the driver.

Anyone found operating a vehicle under a learners permit and not complying with the state law will be cited.

The police department is asking citizens to cooperate in this matter. They ask that you not permit any unlicensed drivers to operate any of your motor vehicles nor that you permit any learner to operate without proper accompaniment.

Another matter to be enforced is the operation of motor-cycles without proper licenses and without the prescribed headgear.

City patrolmen have been instructed to enforce drivers license laws strictly with no exceptions.

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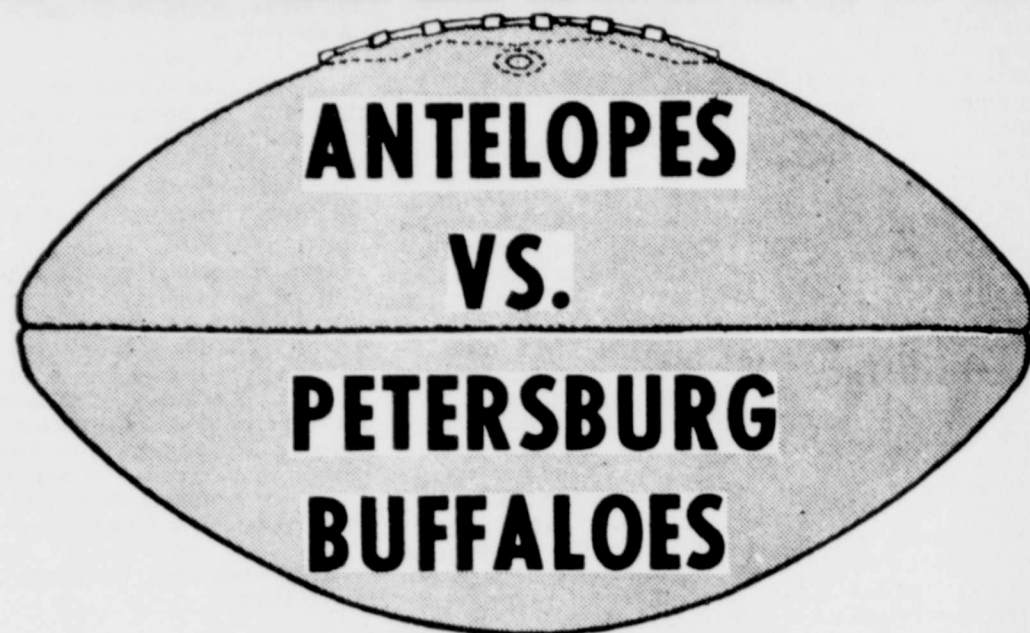

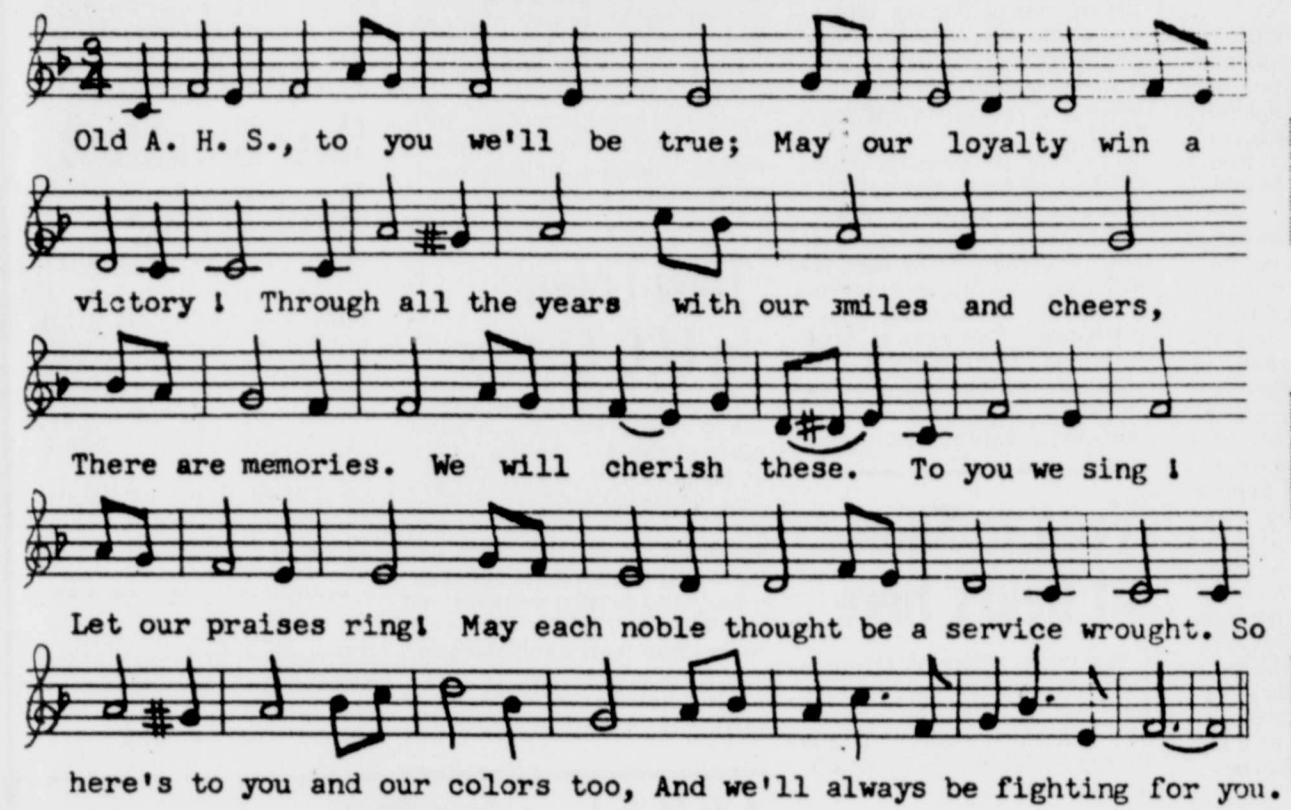

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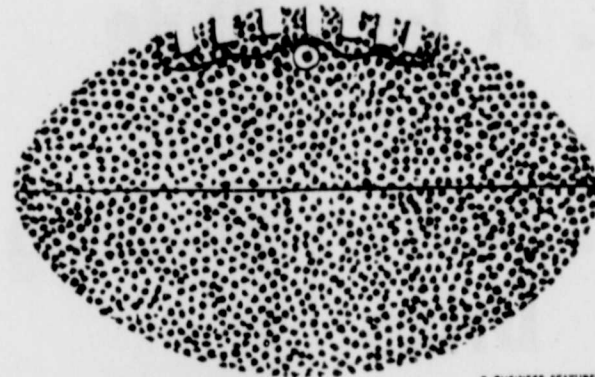

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In our highway tests, Vega has been getting gas mileage in the neighborhood of the little imports, which isn't a bad neighborhood.

Yet unlike your average little car, ours steps right out when you step on the gas.

Fuel economy: about 25 mpg, with the standard engine and transmission, in our highway tests.

Horsepower: 90. You can order 110. (80 and 93 hp, SAE Net.)

Seating capacity: 4 adults. What it all adds up to is a lot of little car.

Three cars and a truck. Vega turned out so well that we couldn't turn out just one.

So we're turning out four: the sporty little hatchback coupe shown open and closed in the foreground below; the sedan, on the right; the Kammback wagon, on the left; and the little panel truck, in the rear.

Oh, and a special GT version of the coupe and wagon which we'll show you later on.

September 10th is Opening Day. All 6,300 Chevrolet dealers are handling Vega, so you shouldn't have to go very far to see and drive one.

Chevy's new little car is open for business. Look into it.
