Large Crowd Present at Community Banquet As Senator Snelson Speaks

There was a large turnout for the Community Banquet held Friday night, April 23, as approximately 140 persons enjoyed a delicious meal in the Bicentennial decorated school cafeteria which was followed by presentation of awards and a speech by Senator W. E. "Pete" Snelson of Midland.

The event was co-sponsored by Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club, the '64 Study Club and the Bicentennial Committee. Horace Scott, Lions president, was master of ceremonies.

The invocation was given by John Gross, Gene Hinnard led the audience in the pledge of allegiance to the flag and Fern Havins led the

group in singing "America." W. T. Scott was named "Lion of the Year" and was presented a plaque by President Horace Scott. The award denoted distinguished service to the community as a Lion.

Recipients of 10 year pins were Lions Gene Hinnard, Virgle Hendley and Freddie White.

Recognized as Charter members of the Lions Club and receiving their 20 year pins were Ernest Clendennen, Zeddie Beal and Vaughan Davis.

Waldon Millican was presented a folder and pin for being the newest member of the organization.

Valerie Baker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Baker, is the Lions Sweetheart.

Following the awards presentation, President Scott introduced Senator Snelson who began his address by commending the members of the sponsoring organizations for making the banquet possible and congratulated the recipients of awards, stating that he felt such gatherings demonstrates the spirit of the community and the nation.

He spoke briefly of the Bicentennial and its significance, of our heritage and the American way of life, saying that our country and our government, despite their faults, are still the greatest in the world.

Republicans Hold First Coke Primary

Republicans of Coke County held their first primary election ever last Saturday in the Courthouse at Robert Lee. Mrs. Louise Clendennen of Silver served as election judge.

Coke County went along with the rest of Texas and gave delegates for former Gov. Ronald Reagan of California an overwhelming majority of their votes. They almost locked out the delegates for President Gerald Ford, as did the rest of the state. A total of 148 votes were polled in the Republican Primary.

The Republicans also went strong for Alan Steelman as their candidate for U. S. Senator, to oppose Sen. Lloyd Bentsen in November.

Bobby A. Locke received 80 votes while C. J. Calnan received 26 for U. S. Congressman from the 21st Texas District. Locke will oppose Democratic nominee, Bob Krueger in November.

Walter Wendlandt received 105 votes for railroad commissioner.

H. Dell Foster got 101 votes for membership on the State Board of Education from the 21st District.

The Republicans also held a referendum on five proposed constitutional amendments and they all carried heavily with No. 1 receiving 119 votes; No. 2, 121; No. 3, 108; No. 4, 115; No. 5, 132.

Presidential Delegates

The Reagan forces were so dominant in Coke that it was hardly worth the effort for the Ford delegates to get their names on the ballot.

In the Reagan camp, Phillip R. "Phil" Pyndus received 132 votes; Dorothy Doehe 132; Arthurson 131; Helen Randolph Moore 131.

Ford delegates who fared so poorly were James R. Nowlin 14; Mrs. Paul M. (Shirley) Green 14; Robert V. West Jr. 15; Julius Neunhoffer 14.

Demos Have Fair Vote at Primary

Jimmy Carter stacked up another bunch of delegates last Saturday when Texas Democrats held their first presidential delegate election. The former Georgia Governor managed to round up 900 votes, compared to 358 for Sen. Lloyd Bentsen; 185 for an uncommitted group of delegates; and 274 for Gov. George Wallace of Alabama.

Coke County went along with the rest of Texas in giving Carter an overwhelming lead in the race for delegates to the National Convention.

Senator Bentsen was not without a job, however, as he handily defeated four opponents for reelection to the U. S. Senate. Phil Gramm, was his only serious contender. He received 185 votes in Coke County to Bentsen's 463.

Bob Krueger got about 90 percent of the votes in the 21st Congressional District for a second term. In Coke County Krueger got 577 votes and over the whole big

district he received 64,160, while his opponent Joe Sullivan polled 66 in this county and 10,491 over the district.

The race for railroad commissioner went into a runoff between Jerry Sadler and Jon Newton. Sadler, longtime land commissioner led the ticket, but did not have a majority over the eight candidates seeking the office. In Coke County, Sadler received 266 votes while Newton had 182. The other six candidates didn't fare very well.

In the races for the high judges' seat Jack Pope, unopposed, received 518 votes; for place 1; Don Yarbrough got 440 and Charles W. Barrow 183 for place 2; James G. Denton, 531 for place 3. For presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals John F. Onion Jr. got 523 votes.

For unexpired term on the Court of Criminal Appeals, Jim Vollers received 115; Carl Dally 138; W. T. Phillips 282.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Truman Roberts polled 417 to 124 for Jerome Chamberlain.

Funeral services for J. O. (Hoggy) Rudd, 68, of Robert Lee were held at 2 p.m. Friday in the First United Methodist Church. The Rev. Grady Peters, pastor, and the Rev. Arthur Kendall, a former pastor officiated.

Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Rudd, a prominent Coke County rancher, died at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday of last week in M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston after a lengthy illness.

Born March 18, 1908, in Comanche County, he married Thelma Griffin Nov. 30, 1937, in Brady. She died March 29, 1970. Mr. Rudd married Jo Gardner March 2, 1972, in San Angelo.

He moved to Coke County from Juno in Sutton County in 1957 and had operated the Harris Ranch since that time. He also operated some farmland.

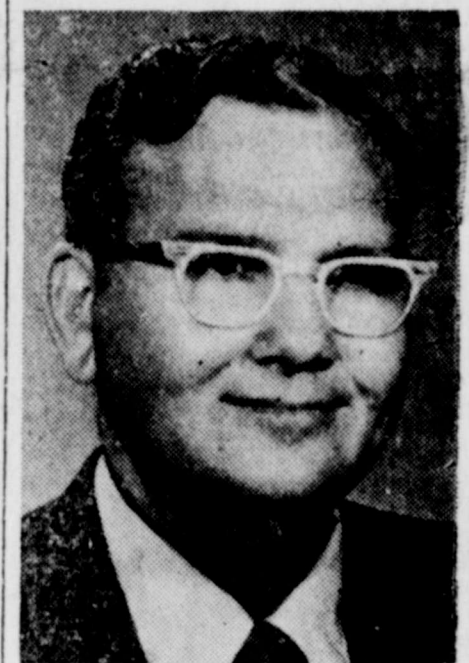
He served on the board of directors and as Coke County Wagon Boss for West Texas Boys Ranch for many years. He was a member of the National Cattlemen's Assn. and the Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club.

Mr. Rudd was a member of the First United Methodist Church. He received special recognition in 1975 from West Texas Boys Ranch. He was also named Robert Lee's Outstanding Citizen in 1975.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Jo Rudd; a sister, Juanita Davis of San Antonio; four nieces, Linda Davis of San Antonio, Diane Roth of San Francisco, Calif., Darlene Gistwick of Buffalo, N. Y., and Wynell Deknel of Fort Hood; three nephews, David Clements of Evanston, Ill., Barry Banner of Garland; and Homer Don Williams of Austin.

Pallbearers were cousins of Mr. Rudd and included C. H. Rudd, Luther Ray Rudd, Fritz Rudd, Garland Rudd Dick Long, Herman Grissom, Gilbert Davis and Hollis Blackwell.

nated for a second term as state representative from the 63rd District. He polled 395 votes in Coke County and 7,571 over the district, while his opponent, Bill Adwood, got 257 in Coke and 2,594 over the entire district.

Jimmy L. Elrod polled 564 votes for member of the state board of education; Bob Shannon got 562 for the Court of Civil Appeals and Judge Earl W. Smith received 587. All were unopposed.

A hot race developed in the district attorney election for the 51st District, but the incumbent, Gerald A. Fohn received 431 votes in Coke and 6,470 over the district to overcome his challenger F. W. Ferrell who had 241 and 3,778.

Closer to home Commissioner Jett Hood of Precinct 3 retained his job by defeating J. M. (Mike) Ross 132 to 75.

Other local contests developed in constable races. Longtime Precinct 1 Constable Ollie Roe defeated his challenger, Johnnie L. Jones, 151 to 37. In Precinct 2 Wayne Arrott took a win with 127 votes over Dolan Mackey, who received 87.

In Unopposed races, Robert Owen was reelected county attorney with 624 votes; J. Lee Ensor got 662 for sheriff; O. B. Jacobs 670 for tax assessor-collector; Albert N. (Bob) Fields 164 for commissioner of precinct 1; Opal I. Jacoby 176 for justice of the peace, precinct 1.

Mrs. Cumble Ivey Jr. was reelected County Democratic Chairman with 644 votes. Precinct chairman named were: Golda Smith with 167 votes for Precinct 1; Royce Fancher, Precinct 2, 198; Elizabeth Reed, Precinct 3, 112; Willie B. Millikin, Precinct 4, 106; Dave King, Precinct 9, 64.

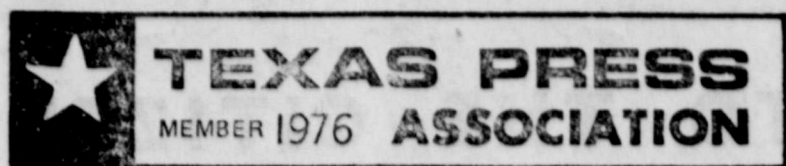

ILLEGAL TROT LINES WILL BE CONFISCATED

Trotliners be forewarned—Texas
Park and Wildlife Departments will
confiscate all untagged, improperly
tagged and illegal trotlines in pub-
lic fishing waters, according to
Tim Leifeste, regional information
officer, and released here by R.
L. Flanagan, game warden of Rob-
ert Lee.

"Abandoned trotlines have been
a problem in our lakes," said Lei-
feste. "The tagging requirement
was initiated to alleviate this and
our game wardens will be check-
ing to see that the requirements
of the law are being followed. Any
trotline not meeting these require-
ments will be removed."

The law requires that all trot-
lines placed in freshwater must be
identified by a legible tag, con-
structed of a material as durable
as the trotline, bearing name and
address of the fisherman and the
date the line was set out. All trot-
lines remaining in public waters
must be redated every 90 days.

The law also says trotlines may
not contain more than 50 hooks
each, no angler may fish in public
waters with more than two trot-
lines, and trotline hooks must be
spaced no less than three feet
apart.
