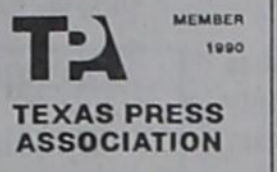

Bill Miears Wins Runoff Election; To Face Rabel

Bill Miears is the winner in the runoff battle with Kathy Trout Hallum in the Eastland County District Clerks Democratic race. Miears polled 1265 votes to Hallum's 1183.
Miears outpolled Hallum 125 to 101 in his home box here.
Miears will now face Republican Marie Rabel, a Cisco bookkeeper, in the November General Election.
Miears worked for three years as deputy in the district clerk's office and has management experience with J. C. Penney Co. and Miears and Associates, Inc.
Hallum had collected 33 more votes than Miears in the March 13th primary, however, unofficial results Tuesday indicated Miears turned the race around to take the Democratic nomination by 82 votes.
