

## School To Start Here Tuesday; New Building Contract Awarded

Public schools will begin the 1980-81 year in Cross Plains Tuesday.

Superintendent Dr. Scot H. Edington advised that a full day's schedule is planned with buses running and meals being served in the school cafeteria.

Due to readying for construction of a new high school building, students in the top four grades will be meeting classes in places not usually used for that purpose. Included are two classrooms in the agricultural building and homemaking facilities every period each day, also auditorium, cafeteria, coach's office and a newly constructed frame building. That frame structure is located behind the elementary building and will house typing classes, high school principal's office and school tax office. It was built primarily from materials taken from the old high school building.

Classes will begin daily at 8:25 a.m. and dismiss at 2:40 p.m. for kindergarten through third grade and at 3:38 p.m. for all other students.

"We look forward to a good school year, although inconven-

iences will be experienced from time to time due to construction of the new high school building," Supt. Edington stated.

### Contract Let

In regular session Wednesday of last week the board of trustees approved the contract of \$613,825 for construction of a new high school building. Successful bidder was Rose & Sons, Inc. of Abilene.

Demolition of the old building is first step. That was expected to begin soon, possibly as soon as Wednesday (today).

An additional \$9,300 was put back in the contract after once being discarded by trustees. That amount will provide off-street parking for tax office visitors and make entering the office much more convenient as well as enhancing the appearance of the entire project.

Trustees also approved the budget for the coming school year. That is for \$817,972. Of that amount, \$403,124 is state funds and local effort is \$324,848.

Tax rate was set at 71 cents per \$100 of assessed value based on 100 per cent of fair market value. That is an increase of about 26 per cent over last year. It was pointed out by trustees however, that for a variety of reasons all tax bills will not increase the 26 per cent. Some will be more, some less and some may even go down from last year's level.

Of the 71-cent tax rate, 50 cents will go toward local maintenance and 21 cents will go to debt service, retirement of bonded indebtedness.

## County's Pioneers To Reune Saturday

Callahan County old settlers will gather in reunion at Cross Plains City Park Saturday in the 38th gathering of the Callahan County Pioneers Association.

Actually festivities for the reunion will start Friday night with a junior rodeo, to be staged in the arena adjacent to the city park starting at 8 p.m. That will be repeated on Saturday at the same time. It was explained that many events will be held for contestants in various age brackets 21 and under. Admission will be \$2 for adults, \$1 for students with those under 6 admitted free.

It was pointed out by Joe E. Hanke Jr. that no mail will be received here, therefore none can be boxed. It is a full holiday, he added.

The firms remaining open downtown will be JRB Supermarket and Cross Plains Review.

## Emergency Loans Available From County FmHA Office

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers, or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Jack Phillips, FmHA county supervisor, said today.

Phillips asked that those who need farm credit as a result of the drought should make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at Callahan County Courthouse in Baird or Eastland National Bank Building, Room 312, in Eastland.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until May 21, 1981, for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, including homes, lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts. Other loans, beyond actual losses, can be made for annual operating expenses or to

make major adjustments in a farming (or ranching or aquaculture) operation.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Phillips said.

Loans covering actual losses are made at an interest rate of 5 per cent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay. Loans beyond actual losses have various maturities, depending upon the purpose of the loan.

The interest rate for actual loss loans is 5 per cent. Other loans are being made at an interest rate of 13 1/2 per cent.

To be eligible for an emergency loan an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster and be unable to get credit from other sources.

Emergency loans can be used to help the farmer restore damaged farm operations and additional loans based upon the emergency designation can be used to reorganize the farm for greater efficiency and better production.

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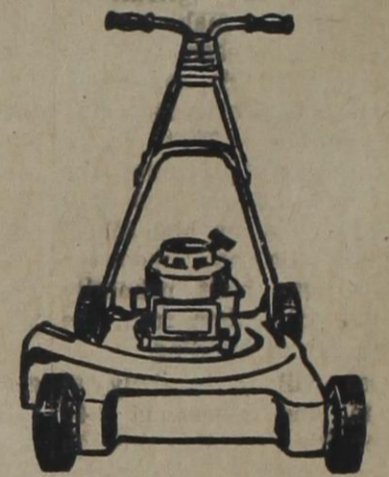

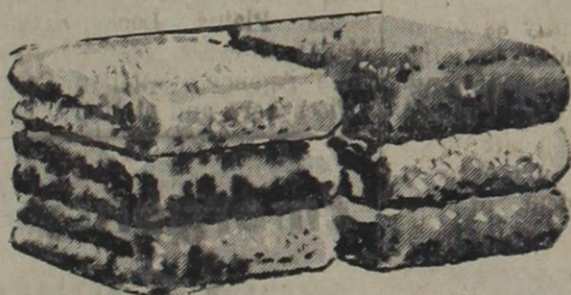

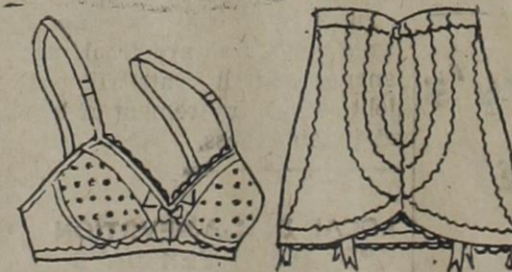

## New 42nd Grand Jury Returns Indictments

A newly empaneled 42nd District Court grand jury for Callahan County returned six felony indictments last Thursday after its initial session at Baird.

Roy A. Jones II, senior staff writer for the Abilene Reporter-News, reported the session as follows:

R. L. Goble, 39, of 934 S. La Salle, in Abilene, was indicted for burglary of a Callahan County building belonging to C. G. Edgar of 2038 Brookhollow in Abilene. The indictment further alleges that Goble has been convicted of felony offenses on two prior occasions, which would mean an automatic life prison term for him as an "habitual criminal" if he is convicted as charged.

The indictment alleges he was convicted of theft in Comanche County in 1977 and of cattle theft in Callahan County in 1970. Goble also faces two similar theft indictments in Taylor County and is free from jail on bonds totaling more than \$250,000.

Everett Mitchell Price, 35, of Abilene, was charged with the June 19 burglary of a "doghouse" on an oil lease operated by Litton Oil Co. of Plainview on June 19. Some oilfield equipment taken in the burglary was later recovered in Abilene and led to the recent indictment of an Abilene salvage yard operator on charges of receiving and concealing stolen property.

Wendell Lee Sallee, 30, of Rte. 2, Olney, was indicted for the Aug. 2 burglary of the Blanton C. Childers home on Rte. 1, Cross Plains.

Everette Wood of Baird was indicted for forgery in connection with a \$25 check written on the account of Frank Windham of Rte. 2, Baird, on July 15.

Indicted for driving while intoxicated (DWI), second offense, were Daniel Santiago Quintana, 28, of Roscoe, and Kenneth Edward Foster, 22, of Cross Plains. Prosecutors decided not to present two cases to the new grand jury Thursday. One involved aggravated assault charges against James Doyle Roberts of Rte. 2, Cisco. Roberts is accused of knifing David Hambrick of 5042 Oaklawn, Abilene, during a Clyde High School senior party at Clyde Lake on May 24.

Judge Don Lane appointed Gene Finley of Baird as foreman of the new grand jury, which will serve a four-month term. Other grand jurors are John D. Coppinger of Rte. 1, Cross Plains; R. D. Maxwell and Jennene Setzler, both of Rte. 1, Clyde; and Mrs. Ross Hass of Baird.

## Free, Reduced Price Meal Guidelines Told By School

Cross Plains School Cafeteria serves nutritious meals every school day.

Students may buy lunch for 65 cents, kindergarten through third grade; 70 cents for fourth and fifth grades, and 80 cents for sixth through twelfth grades. All students may buy breakfast for 25 cents and extra milk for 7 cents. Adults pay \$1.25 for lunch and 45 cents for breakfast.

The following, in part, was released by Dr. Scot H. Edington, school superintendent, concerning free and reduced price meals for those students who qualify.

"Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the scale below are eligible for free meals and they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for lunch is 10 cents and for breakfast 10 cents. If income is greater than those shown, but there are unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, that family's children may still be eligible.

"The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced priced meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that

the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale."

Application on a form available at the school may be filed any time during the year for free or reduced-price meals.

"The information given on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced price meals. Within 10 days of receiving your application the school will let you know whether or not children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing Dr. Scot H. Edington, Box 578, Cross Plains, Texas 76443. (817) 725-6121.

"In certain cases foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

"All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

"If we can be of any further assistance or if your family size or income changes during the year, please contact us.

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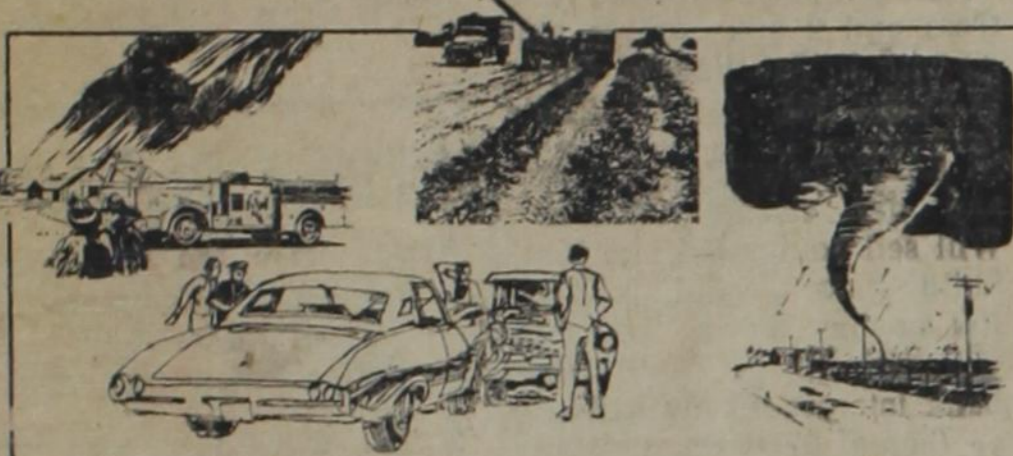

The problem of drought is timely. How thankful we would be if rain would come, bringing cooler weather as well as an end to the drought.

Politics is timely also. There is so much rhetoric along the line, what I might say would only add to the hodgepodge of opinions. To say the least I was chagrined, annoyed and angered by the last convention. The only comfort I get is that it was only a convention. What really happens at the polls in November is the important thing.

Rather, in behalf of the art of reading, I will give a brief book review. Paul Horgan's "The Return of the Weed" impressed me as being semiclassic. By that I mean simple enough to keep a high school pupil reading and classic enough to live. All have observed how the weed soon replaces anything that man may have built or tended, once he ceases to care for it. That with man's freedom of choice with its favorable result or its unfavorable result, is the theme of all six stories in the book, stories of the Southwest, timed in the sixteenth and seventeenth and eighteenth centuries.

The first story, "The Mission," is timed 1650; place, New Spain (Southwest America); Father Puig-y-Castan's 33-year endeavor to bring the Christian religion to Indians, amid the havoc caused by the destructive raid of soldiers among the Indians; the subconscious fear for his own life, these and other negative forces were overcome by his abiding faith and an undaunted determination to build a church, to work in the field and to succeed as a missionary among them.

The church was finished, worship was established. This and his love for the Indian, all came to naught when the Indians shot him full of arrows and burned the two-towered church. As were the walls of Jerusalem when Nehemiah came to rebuild them so did it become with the church. The buttresses remained only to be covered with the weed.

A story of vivid characterization: Time 1878; place, a ranch in New Mexico owned by one of "The Brothers," rich and growing richer from cattle stealing; that is the second story.

With Warren Boyer on a cattle drive to market the brother, Perce, was challenged for their thievery by a newcomer in a gunbattle assault. Perce was killed. Warren never returned perhaps living somewhere or his brother's money. The house

and grounds became grown over with vines and weeds and was looked on with suspicion by people who came near them.

In "The Hacienda," the author's most memorable story, Don Elizoria reveals his weakness in losing the Hacienda, all other things he had owned, as well as becoming addicted to drink, by dropping a tear, as he said to a less lovable humor failure, "Do you know there is just a little hill there where it was, my house. The old trees are still there. . . . The house is just dirt, like the ground. . . . When I was 10 years old, it was on my birthday, I planted a tree in the patio."

The other stories are "The Mansion," "The Tank," "The Star." You read these stories for the interest you will find, I do not see, and I quote:

"But if the battle between man and nature is unequal, if the weed will return sooner or later, when its master has dropped his knife, we must yet admit that to do battle with the luxuriant forces of his destiny gives him the strange authority of daring; some whip of the spirit whose crack is a sound later men can hear and sometimes envy and often obey; taking the past with them, the great stream of man's memory rising in a source as mysterious and common as all life, and flowing forever outward to nourish tie."
