City to change one-way streets

Dr. W. J. Hill, Seth Ralston, Gerald Hanners and Gerald Summers. Forty-one seniors plus hosts and guests took part in the celebration party, which lasted from 1:30 to 5 a.m.

Dimmitt's City Council agreed Monday night to remove the one-way signs and a 20 mph speed sign on Front Street through the summer. The signs will be put back up a week or two before school starts.

During the council meeting, City Manager, Reeford Burrous, said that the one-way streets on Stinson and Jones needed to be changed to two-way streets through the summer.

During the school year, the one-way streets help expedite traffic around Richardson Elementary and Dimmitt Middle School. But once school is out, those residents living on those streets have to go out of their way to get anywhere, said Burrous.

Burrous said that there have been two serious accidents near Dairy Queen because trucks park along the highway and block the view of oncoming traffic. He said that the

city police requested that a "No Parking" sign be put up in this area to prevent trucks from parking there. Burrous asked the council members to think about it and he would get more information for the next meeting.

Councilman Don Sheffy suggested that the city see about putting in a stop light at South Broadway and Jones Street. Burrous agreed to look into it and include this in the next meeting's agenda.

Rick Hunter, ambulance service director, spoke to the city council about purchasing a new ambulance.

The City of Dimmitt, Castro County and the Hospital district put \$500 a month into an ambulance account. Hunter said there is \$45,000 in the account right now and estimates that a new ambulance would cost over \$50,000 and it would require 90 to 120 days de-

livery time. This means that the ambulance could be purchased now and by the time it is received, there would be enough in the account to pay for it, said Hunter.

Mayor Wayne Collins pointed out that it is required by law for the city to go through a formal bidding process if the purchase is over \$5,000.

The bids for a new ambulance might be lowered if the 1971 Suburban is traded in said Hunter, and added that the suburban was too small and cannot hold all the equipment.

Council members wondered if they might get more by selling the Suburban to a smaller community in need of an ambulance, or a private party.

The motion was made to authorize Hunter to solicit bids, in the formal process, asking for options with or without the trade-in of the Suburban.

City-wide garage sale is Saturday

Bargain hunters are expected to invade the city Saturday in the hopes of finding something they just can't live without at one of the many garage sales planned during Dimmitt's annual city-wide garage sale day.

The sales are scheduled to begin at 8 p.m., and maps will be available listing the name and location of each sale listed with the Chamber of Commerce for the city-wide event. Maps will be available to the public at participating businesses displaying a red ribbon on the front.

The Chamber of Commerce has 85 sale locations featuring 118 family sales listed on the map, up from last year's 90-family event.

The sale was publicized in 18 surrounding communities and Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Delores Heller said she is hoping to draw a large out-of-town crowd, as well as local people, to the sales.

A new event to this year's garage sale day is an auction, scheduled to begin at 3 p.m. on the east side of the courthouse. Johnny Davis of Williams and Webb, Inc. will be

the auctioneer.

Any item over \$10 in value may be put on the auction and the seller sets a minimum acceptable price for the item. Items to be auctioned should be checked in on the courthouse square between 12 noon and 2 p.m. Saturday. The seller pays a \$2 auction fee and 10% of the sale price goes to the chamber if the item sells.

Persons who anticipate selling an item at the auction should call the chamber office at 647-2524.

"We have no idea how big the auction will be, but we hope to have a good turnout," said Heller. "Anyone who wishes to just donate an item to be auctioned off with benefits going to the Chamber will be appreciated, but the donation will not be accepted."

Heller said she would appreciate any volunteers who would like to help with the auction and added that individuals may want to bring a lawn chair so they will have a place to sit if the auction is a long one.

The public may register for a chance to win Dimmitt Dollars at

'Caravan' to perform here Friday

Country Caravan, an annual musical production, will return to Dimmitt on Friday.

Sponsored by Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce, the show begins at 8:30 p.m. on the courthouse square. Admission is free and everyone is invited.

Country Caravan features a cast of 14 vocalists and musicians, and is produced by South Plains College's Creative Arts Department.

"Our goal for Caravan goes be-

yond just 90 minutes of entertainment," says John Hartin, the general director for the show and chairman of SPC's Creative Arts Department. "We look for those magical ingredients in country music that enable us to capture a person's full attention for that moment and touch their soul."

The show's portfolio includes hits from artists like George Strait, The Judds, Rodney Crowell, Hank Williams, Jr., Clint Black, Bill Monroe, Merle Haggard, Patsy Cline, Willie

Nelson and many others.

In addition, there will be Appalachian-style clogging and country fiddling, even some country comedy. A medley of country gospels rounds out the more than thirty songs and instrumentals packed into Country Caravan.

used to brag about not having one, and complain about having to pay a 2% tax in New Mexico. But our state, county and city governments have really caught up fast. The sales tax over in Clovis right now is 5.75%.

It's one biggest-tallest-most that we Texans can't brag about.

And if the City of Dimmitt or Castro County did trim their local sales taxes back because of the state sales-tax hike, and increase their property taxes or service fees to make up the difference, then who would end up paying for the new school finance reform bill? You got it.

The Legislature already has done it to the school districts. Remember the mandatory teacher pay raise which the Legislature adopted in its last regular session, but did not fund? Most school districts had to hike their property taxes to pay for it.

The state has done it to the counties, too. One of the things Castro County's sales tax pays for is to house and feed county jail inmates who have been sentenced to state prison but can't be transported there because the prisons are full. The state has left the counties holding the bills on in-limbo state prisoners for years.

Too often, the Legislature's action (or inaction) creates debts and the local taxing entities eventually

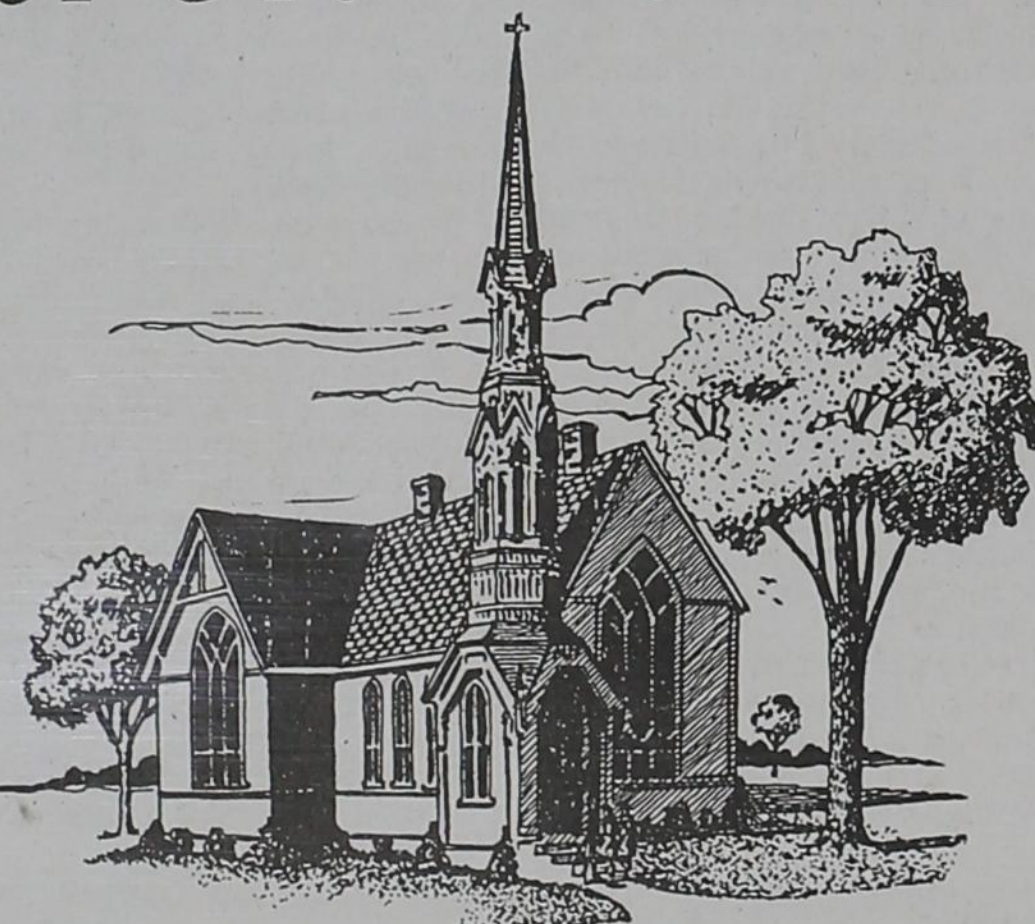

We'll be holding our third annual City-Wide Garage Sale throughout the day, starting at 8 a.m.

There will be more than 80 garage sales throughout the city. And if the past two years' events were any indication, Dimmitt will be jammed with visitors and traffic most of the day.

If you're one of those holding a garage sale Saturday, you already know what to do: Have your tables set up, your items marked, your change-box full, and be ready to do business by 8 o'clock Saturday morning. Keep your sale going as long as you want.

If you're a garage-sale shopper, then go to a cooperating Dimmitt business Saturday morning (and not before) for a Garage Sale Map with a complete listing of all the sales. The participating businesses will be denoted by a red bow on their doors. And while you're there, register for a free drawing for \$200 worth of Dimmitt Dollars. This year, because of a new feature that's been added, everybody in town has the chance to sell something, whether they're holding a registered garage sale or not.

That new feature is the Auction on the Square, to be held at 3 p.m.

If you have a "major" item—something you feel is worth \$10 or more at garage-sale prices—you may take it to the east parking lot of the Courthouse Square from 12 noon to 2 p.m. Saturday and register it for the auction. You must label the item with the lowest price you'll take for it; that's where the bidding will begin.

Johnny Davis of Williams & Webb, Auctioneers, will conduct the auction, with the help of volunteers. There will be an auction fee of 10% on any item sold, and \$2 on any item that goes up for auction but does not sell, so figure the fee in when pricing your item.

The Chamber of Commerce is advertising the City-Wide Garage Sale through newspapers, radio stations and TV cable bulletin boards throughout the area. Since the first two City-Wide Garage Sales were so popular, it wouldn't be surprising if the event attracts bigger crowds than ever this year.

There's strength in numbers. With the whole town working together, the City-Wide Garage Sale will help everybody—the garage-sale holders, the stores, the restaurants. . . .

It's a great event, and we salute all who are helping make it happen!

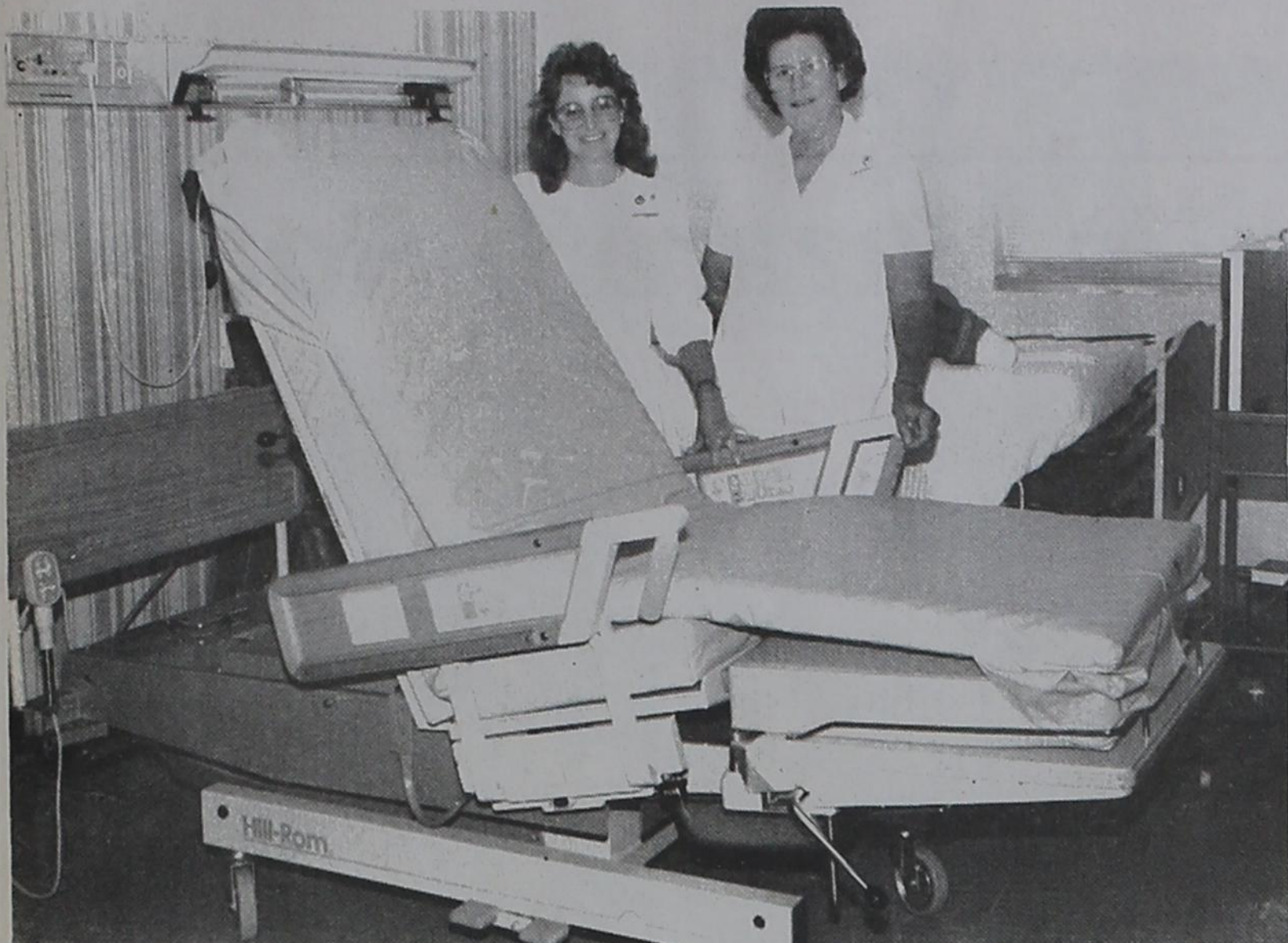

275 cowboys compete in Nazareth Rodeo

275 contestants battled dust, wind, bronses, bulls and more for prize money totaling \$14,450 at the 14th annual Nazareth Country Rodeo and Wild West Show.

Contestants had to endure a "good ole West Texas sandblasting" Friday night, according to Marvin Schulte; but Saturday evening's weater drew a record turnout for the event.

Insects of Interest

Spider mites, thrips emerging

Spider mites have been observed in a few surrounding areas and should be kept in mind when checking fields, especially next to wheat which has been cut and is drying down.

Generally, field margins will be infested first; then mites will move further into fields as populations increase. Strip treatment with Comite and dimethoate (Cygon) will provide good mite control.

The first generation southwestern corn borers are emerging now. The first moths were trapped five miles south of Dimmitt next to corn

stubble that was left undisturbed over the winter. Populations of first generation southwestern corn borers historically do not peak until the third week in June. Pheromone traps for southwestern corn borers have been placed in a dozen locations over northern Lamb and Castro Counties. Information from these traps will be given as the season progresses.

A new herbicide for control of shattercane, johnsongrass and quackgrass has recently received label approval from the Environmental Protection Agency.

Beacon, a sulfonylurea herbicide is labeled for ground rig application

to johnsongrass which is 8 to 16 inches tall and when corn is 4 to 20 inches tall.

The Beacon label should be read for rates and possible rotational crop limitations. In addition, precautions should be taken not to use Beacon on any areas treated with Counter insecticide and a few corn hybrids. Your dealer will have a list of those hybrids which are sensitive to Beacon herbicide.

Cotton is making progress during these warm, sunny days and producers should be on the lookout for thrip since wheat has started to dry down.

Fields without a systemic insecticide or seed protectant at planting should be watched carefully since they will be more susceptible. Foliar application may be justified when an average of two to five thrip per plant are found.

If cotton looks ragged but no thrip are found, then damage may be due to the weather conditions and thus should not be treated for thrip.

Sales tax application shortened

The new sales tax application form for a business with a sole owner has been reduced to a single sheet of paper.

Nearly half of the 95,000 sales tax permits issued last year were for sole owners going into business for the first time who could use the short form.

Bullock said the new form will be a boon for both small businesses and for the state. It will reduce time and errors for new taxpayers and cut processing time for the Comptroller's Office.

The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

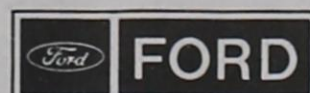

Azteca Corp. is reviving housing project

In the early 1980's, the agricultural housing project east of Dimmitt was in trouble.

The management was forced to relinquish control of the project to the Farmers Home Administration after it could no longer lease blocks of apartments because of maintenance problems, or raise the rent enough to make the repairs needed at the housing units.

Then the vegetable industry fell on hard times and the future looked bleak for the project, which was originally built in 1967 to provide decent housing for migrant farm workers.

That's when Azteca stepped in. Azteca Economic Development Corp., a non-profit organization, purchased the housing complex in 1981 and has "rejuvenated" it since then, according to Tomas Falcon, president of the board of directors.

It still houses farm workers and their families, with 76 of the 138 units occupied by permanent residents.

"We have quite a few problems yet, but we do a little better each year," said Miguel Velasquez, manager of Azteca. "Financially we're in good shape. We have better control of the complex now. People are taking care of their apartments."

The complex was recently inspected by the district FmHA office in Plainview, and the report was a good one. In a letter to Velasquez, Beverly A. McDonald, district loan technician, said she "was very impressed that the project had been cleaned up and all the items repaired. . . . At this time the project is in compliance. I appreciate your efforts in completing these tasks."

Azteca is managed by a board of directors which includes Falcon, president; Desi Pesina, vice president; Mary Ann Rodriguez, treasurer; Jesus Flores, secretary; and Ruben Olvera, member. Velasquez manages the complex, Norma Carasco is the office secretary and Jose Velo is in charge of maintenance.

Falcon, who was one of the original founders of the Azteca Corp. praised the management for their efforts in "rejuvenating" the complex. He said the community and the board of directors are doing their part in keeping things in shape.

"We're proud to be able to serve

the community. That was our goal —get the complex back into tip-top shape," Falcon said. I think things are good all the way around now. We just tried to make a better place for people to live. The management planted grass, roses and flowers to try and make it look a little better."

Velasquez said the complex is approximately 95% full during the summer months today, but most residents stay just a short while.

"We bought the complex in July of 1981 and managed it about 20 months before we started to remodel it in 1983," Falcon said. "Before we started, there was just one size apartment and that was an efficiency unit (one bedroom, kitchen-living area and bathroom). We have remodeled the complex and now we offer the efficiency units and two-bedroom apartments. We can convert to a three-bedroom unit if necessary," Falcon said.

Azteca still opens its doors to summer farm laborers in May and the complex is usually full in the summer.

"People start moving here when their kids are out of school and they leave in mid-August so they are home before school starts again," said Miguel Velasquez, manager of the Azteca Complex.

"We saw our occupancy drop when Dimco closed, but people still

come. They don't stay as long now —usually about two months. When Dimco was operating, we were full season-long. We had fewer problems collecting rent then because everyone was working. When people come here from the Valley now, they are looking for work like hoeing beets or cotton. Some still harvest onions, but most of the vegetable work is gone," Velasquez said.

Falcon said a lot of their summer residents work in surrounding towns like Hale Center, Olton and Plainview, but they live in Dimmitt during the summer because there is no housing anywhere else.

The apartment rent is based on the size of the family and their income. A family of four cannot

make more than \$14,500 per year, or they don't qualify for the housing.

Once a month, Azteca reports to the district FmHA office with a list of their tenants, what each family pays and how much assistance they receive for rent. FmHA then sends a check for the amount of the assistance to Azteca.

In 1989, Azteca's expenses were up more than \$4,000 over 1988, but its net income showed an increase of more than \$15,000, so things are looking up for the project.

Falcon credits that to harmony and good relations between the board of directors, management and the tenants and said things have finally settled down in the last four or five years and are now "working fine."

get stuck with them, and have to find a way to pay them. But aren't we already dipping deeper than we should into the sales-tax bucket?

For the sake of both our shoppers and merchants, I'd like to see the sales tax in Dimmitt lowered to

About those umpteen - million brown moths that have invaded our area this week:

Kerry Siders, our new Extension entomologist, says they're mesquite cutworm moths coming up off the Caprock.

Usually they don't get this far north because they're controlled by beneficial insects, but a harsh winter kill of the beneficials along the Caprock resulted in a bigger-than-usual hatch of these little beasts this year, Kerry said.

If you've got them fluttering around in your home, don't worry about it. Kerry says they won't affect clothing. You need to worry about them only if you have a honey locust tree. Their larvae (a black worm with a gray stripe down the back) will eat the leaves.

So if you have a honey locust, spray it with Sevin, he advised. Otherwise, just enjoy their company—they'll be gone in a week or so.

If the election for governor were held tomorrow, Clayton Williams would win it, according to the latest Texas Poll.

A statewide telephone survey by the Public Policy Resources Laboratory at A&M indicated that 46% of the voters favor Williams, the Republican nominee, and 38% favor Democrat Ann Richards. (The poll has a margin of error of four percentage points.)

More than four out of five Texans polled said they have already decided which candidate they'll vote for. Only 17% are still undecided.

So when the general election campaign gets into high gear, Williams and Richards will be spending millions to coax a winning share out of that 17% "undecided" sector.

Among male voters, Williams leads Richards by 44% to 32%. But among women voters, Richards leads Williams by 43% to 39%. Considering Williams' insensitive remarks concerning women, that isn't surprising.

Nor is it surprising that the more conservative Williams leads by large margins in North and West Texas. Richards leads by a small margin in South Texas and by a large margin in East Texas.

Among voters earning less than \$20,000 a year, 50% favored Richards and 36% were for Williams. Among people making more than \$20,000 a year, 50% favored Williams and 34% favored Richards.

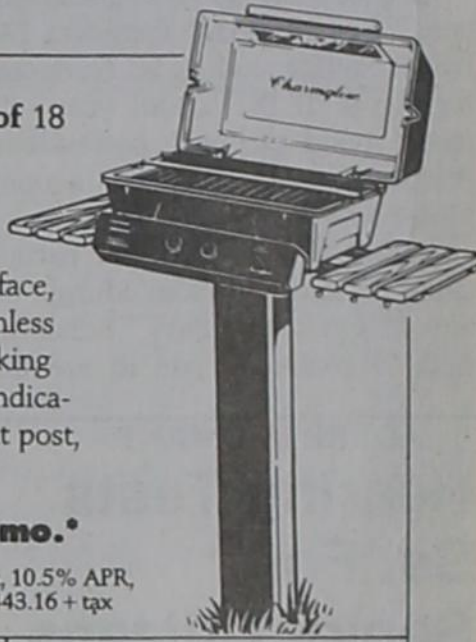
