Beautification proposal rejected

The Beautification Association of Colorado City, envisioned as an on-going beautification and clean-up committee, failed to become a part of the Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce Monday after chamber directors failed to change by-laws which would enable the association to become a committee of the chamber.

A set of objectives, presented to the chamber board Monday, was drawn up following a meeting of the chamber's executive committee and the association's steering committee led by Lee Woods.

Chamber president Bob Rely described the set of objectives as "more permanent than a committee, yet still go along with our by-laws."

However, board member Cecil Oursbourn, disagreed, saying

the chamber by-laws do not provide for a separate organization structure for committees.

"Don't get me wrong, I'm not against beautification," said Oursbourn. He suggested that the association become an independent organization, but with chamber support.

A motion by Oursbourn to that effect failed when three board members voted in favor of a separate organization, three members abstained and one

voted against the motion.

Robert Alford who originally chaired the committee to form the association, cast the negative vote, saying he will take the matter back to the beautification committee.

"We've had dissension from members of this board from the start," said Alford.

Earlier a motion to change the by-laws of the chamber in order to provide a sponsoring organization for the committee

failed to get a three-fourths majority of the board as required in order to change the by-laws.

Another motion, rejecting the association's objectives, died for a lack of a second.

In other business Monday, Chamber Manager Penny Solomon said that ads totaling \$3,500 for the AJRA rodeo programs have been sold. The board agreed

37 to be named to Career Ladder

Thirty-seven teachers in the Colorado Independent School District will be named to the Career Ladder for the 1986-87 school year, CISD trustees were told Monday night.

Supt. Charlie Ueslton explained that the district has received money from the state to pay 37 instructional personnel \$1,500 each to be paid before July 1.

Teachers must make application for the state-mandated program, said Ueslton, and those who were named to the Career Ladder last year will not necessarily be named to it this year.

A committee of administrators will review each application and use a point system to obtain a score based upon evaluations. The top 37 teachers will be recommended to the Career Ladder, but it will be the final decision of the board which teachers are named.

Last year, the first year of the program, money was received for 28 teachers to be appointed to the Career Ladder, said Ueslton.

In other business, the board accepted the resignations of five teachers. Gene Tuttle, physical education teacher and coach at middle school, resigned to take the head coaching job at Bronte. His wife, Dietra, a third grade teacher, also resigned. Other resignations included Susan Farrar, sixth grade reading teacher at the middle school, who will be working on her doctor's degree in Belgium next year; Donna Pemberton, music teacher for grades 4, 5 and 6 who is getting married and moving to Lubbock; and Annalee Smith, third grade teacher whose husband, Steve, band director, has already resigned.

The board also approved an agreement to participate in the National School-Child Nutrition Program for 1986-87.

Approved school board policies concerning class gifts to schools, laws of the board, and

Council says no to airstrip

Colorado City Council Tuesday voted to deny permission for construction of a private airstrip within the city limits.

The action came following a public hearing in which several residents voiced disapproval and a petition protesting the airstrip was presented.

J. O. Dockrey had requested permission to build a landing strip for his personal use near the Dairy Queen.

Jimmy Redwine, a resident of the area, said he was opposed to the construction because of having to "put up with low flying planes and the noise."

Mrs. Virgil Stone presented a petition with "40 or 50" names opposed to the construction because of "the noise and the nuisance". She said property values will also drop.

Lloyd Ledbetter, who owns the Dairy Queen, also voiced opposition to the proposal. A letter from Landmark Cable, which has a tower in the area, was also submitted to the council.

Dockrey was not present at the meeting and no other persons spoke in favor of the proposal.

Dockrey had appeared before the council several months ago

asking permission to build the 1600 foot runway for his airplane.

Don Webb made the motion to deny any type of airstrip in the area. Tom Lovell seconded and the motion was approved unanimously.

No action was taken on a proposed animal control ordinance until council members can further study the ordinance. Council member Dee Hearn said her committee studied several ordinances and met with the city attorney before drafting the pro-

Sales tax checks sent

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$16,521.78 in local tax payments to Mitchell County cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Colorado City received \$15,811.38, bringing 1986 payments to date to \$132,868.77, up 2.18 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$130,035.

Westbrook received \$720.40, bringing its 1986 payments to date to \$7,139.46, down 8.68 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$7,817.86.

Loraine did not receive a check this time. Its 1986 payments to date \$3,809, up 42.18 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$2,679.31.

June checks represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the comptroller by May 20.

Bullock said the downward slide in sales tax collections last month confirmed that the energy collapse has spread to other sectors of Texas economy.

Bullock said there was a 4.4 percent fall off in sales tax

collections in May compared to the same month a year ago.

"The downturn in oil has finally set in motion a wave that's soaking the rest of the Texas economy," said Bullock.

He said collections in May this year amounted to \$438.4 million compared to \$458.7 million for the same month last year.

Bullock said the \$30.3 million drop was due to declines in retail sales, services, construction and oil and gas.

Salvation Army opens store here

The Salvation Army has opened a family thrift store at 183 East Third.

According to Capt. Carroll Braun, the store will be open each week, Tuesday through Saturdays, from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. It will be closed on Mondays so the store can be re-stocked with new merchandise.

"We will be offering clothing, shoes and various household items at reasonable prices," said Braun. "The Army operates its thrift stores with the idea that low income families and individuals may purchase needed items without creating a burden to their income, and at the same time, keep the feeling of self sufficiency."

"We will be working with the Ministerial Alliance and other helping agencies in this endeavor," she said.

"We will, on a referral basis from local churches or helping agencies, make free clothing available to qualified families and individuals during our normal store hours," she said.

During the grand opening this week, clothing and shoes will be offered at 25 cents per article. Proceeds from sales will go to the on-going work of the Salvation Army.

"In order for this store to meet the needs of the community, the Army will be dependent upon donated, re-salable items," she said. "If you have any clothing or household items, including furniture, please bring them by our store."

Those who need items picked up are asked to stop by the store and make arrangements with the clerk to have the items picked up.

Items donated are tax deductible and the Salvation Army will provide a receipt for income tax purposes.

Low voter turnout reported here

Less than 7 percent of Texas voters cast ballots in Saturday's Democratic and Republican primary runoff elections, and Mitchell County voters were no exception.

There were 97 votes cast in the Democratic runoff and 17 in the Republican.

There were no local races in

either runoff.

In the Democratic runoff, for Railroad Commissioner, P. S. Ervin received 16 votes and John Sharp 74. For Justice, Supreme Court, Place 1, Shirley Butts received 49 votes and Oscar H. Maury 45. For Justice, Supreme Court, Place 2, Jim Brady had 32 votes and Robert

M. Campbell 62. For Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4, Unexpired Term, Raul A. Gonzalez had 30 votes and Jay Gibson 67. For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, George "Jorge" Martinez received 13 votes and Rusty Duncan 78.

In the Republican runoff, for Lieutenant Governor, David De-

vidson had 12 votes and Aaron L. Bullock 1. For Attorney General, Roy R. Barrera Jr. had 12 votes and Ed Walsh 4. For Commissioner of Land Office, Grady T. Yarbrough received 9 votes and M. D. Anderson Jr. 8. For Railroad Commissioner, Milton E. Fox had 8 votes and John Thomas Henderson 6.

posed ordinance.

City Attorney Pete McKinney said "I think it's a good ordinance. I think it'll work better than what we have now."

Colorado City Area Chamber of Commerce President Bob Reilly appeared before the council to request that the council consider raising the hotel-motel tax with the additional tax monies going to the chamber in order to promote tourism.

The present tax is set at 3 percent and can go as high as 7 percent, said Reilly. The tax now brings in about \$12,000 annually and is divided among several organizations.

Reilly gave council members a survey which shows what other cities charge and where the money goes. No action was taken on the matter until the council can study the matter further.

In other business, the council gave permission to advertise for bids for seal coating the runway

at the Municipal Airport. The project is expected to cost \$75,000 with 75 percent of the funds coming from a grant from the Texas Aeronautics Commission.

The council agreed to readvertise for bids for a new police car after no bids were submitted for a 1986 model. The council will readvertise for a 1987 model.

Following a discussion of a possible lease purchase of a new motor grader, the council agreed to recess until 5:30 p.m. Wednesday.

City Manager Brenda Tarter explained that the city's only motor grader is beyond repair and that an emergency situation exists because of the condition of the landfill road.

John McMackin of Treanor Equipment Co. of Abilene said his company will lease a new \$118,000 Caterpillar motor grader to the city for \$707 a month for a three-year period with an option to buy after the lease period. In addition, Treanor will purchase the city's motor grader for \$2,000.

Pay close attention to appraisal notices

AUSTIN—"If you are among the millions of Texas property owners who receive a notice of appraised value this year from county appraisal districts, pay close attention to it," advised Ron Patterson, executive director of the State Property Tax Board. "This notice contains important information concern-

ing your 1986 property taxes."

Patterson explained that the notice of appraised value is designed to inform taxpayers of proposed increases in the appraised value of their properties and the possible effect on their property taxes. "The notice also tells you how to protest the appraisal to an appraisal review board if you disagree with it," he added.

In most cases, a notice of appraised value means that the appraisal district proposes to increase the property's value by more than \$1,000 over its value the previous year. It may also indicate that the proposed value is higher than the value the owner reported on a rendition form, or that the property is on the tax records for the first time in 1986.

Patterson counseled taxpayers to carefully inspect their notices of appraised value. "If the notice shows an incorrect description of your property, or if you simply disagree with the value, it's best to contact the appraisal district as soon as possible. By acting promptly, you can often clear up errors or disagreements over value without a formal hearing," he said.

If the taxpayer can't settle his disagreements informally, he can file a written protest and get a hearing before the appraisal review board. The notice of appraised value shows the deadline for filing a protest.

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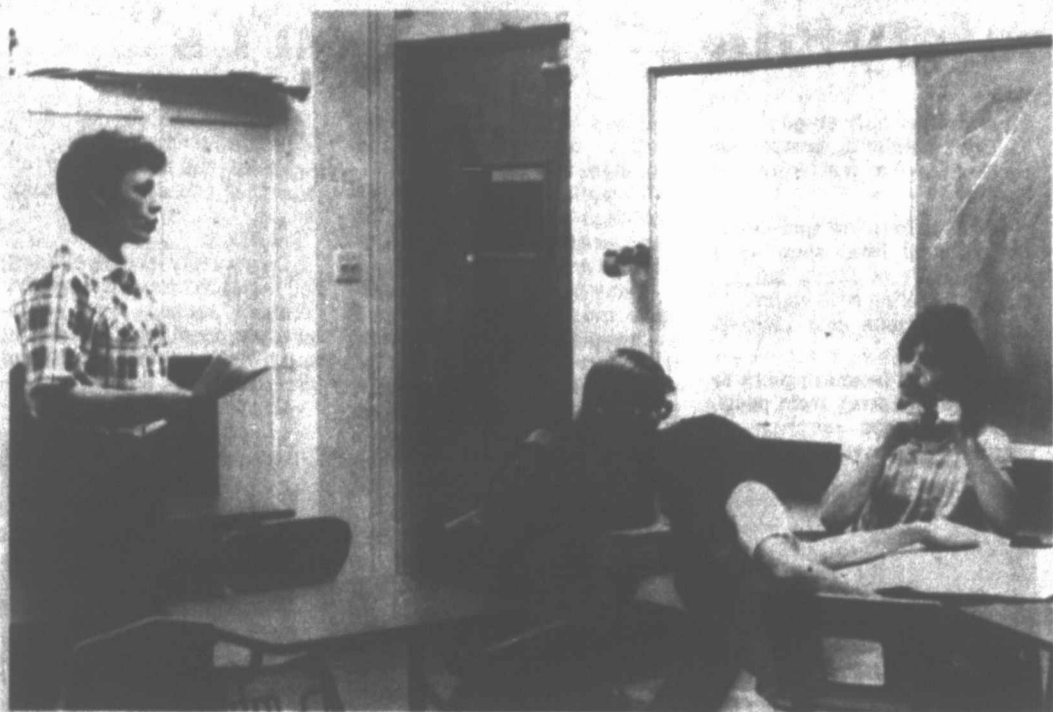

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Lightning safety "do's" and "don't's"

COLLEGE STATION—Lightning is deadly and annually kills more Americans than tornadoes and more than hurricanes and floods combined.

However, since lightning usually kills only one person at a time, lightning deaths do not attract as much attention as other weather-related fatalities.

"Lightning is particularly common with spring and summer thunderstorms in Texas, so individuals should take certain precautions during stormy weather," advises Dr. Gary Nelson, a safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Quick thinking combined with common sense can go a long way in preventing lightning fatalities when thunderstorms are on the prowl," Nelson emphasizes.

He lists some "do's" and "don't's" regarding lightning safety:

Outdoors:
—Do seek protection immediately. Safe places include a building that's protected from lightning; a large, steel-framed building; an enclosed automobile; and a large, unprotected building.

—Don't touch any metal fences, wires, clotheslines or pipes. In a car, keep your hands off any metal or the radio.

—Do get off your bicycle, golf cart, horse, tractor or motorcycle.

—Don't take cover under lone trees, taller trees in groves or in unprotected shelters such as those on a golf course or camp ground.

—Do head for a cave or under a cliff if you're hiking in mountains or other hilly areas.

—Don't huddle in groups; spread out a few feet from one another.

—Do head for a low spot—lower than ground level—such as a ravine, gully or ditch, but not one that's filling with water.

—Don't remain near railroad tracks.

—Do get off beaches, piers or docks and get away from pools, oceans and lakes.

—Don't swim, wade or go boating; head for land at the first signs of a thunderstorm.

—Do seek shelter in a clump of head-high trees or a thicket of small ones if you're stuck in a forested area.

—Don't stand in open spaces, since most lightning fatalities are people who are taller than their surroundings—a golfer in the middle of a fairway, a farmer in a field, a rider in open country.

—Do immediately set down golf clubs, tennis rackets, fishing poles and other metal objects that can act as lightning rods.

Indoors:
—Do get away from appliances and metal fixtures such as refrigerators, ranges, sinks, bathtubs, air conditioners, washing machines, clothes dryers and television sets.

—Don't use the telephone except in an emergency.

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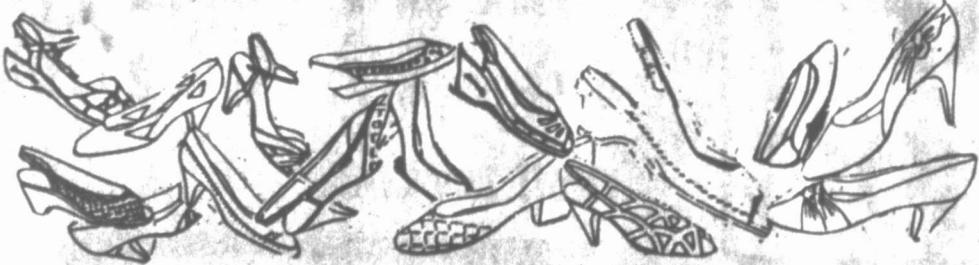
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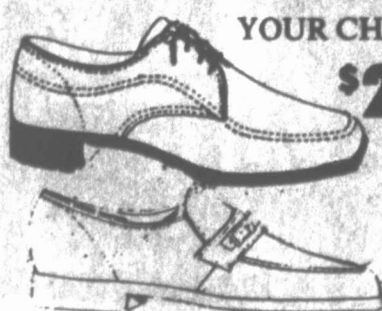
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Job losses demand attention

Cheap foreign oil imports have dramatically reduced oil drilling activity in this country and have increased unemployment in energy-producing states.

In December, there were 1,960 rotary rigs actively drilling for oil in the United States. In May, the well-known Hughes rig count fell below 800 to its lowest point in 43 years.

Texas' rig count fell from 633 to some 260 between December and May—373 rigs shut down in just five months.

Those cheap oil imports have cost a lot of roughnecks their jobs. Four-man crews work in two or three shifts a day to keep a medium-depth rotary drilling

rig in operation—an average of 10 workers per rig.

Basic mathematics shows that some 3,750 oil rig workers in Texas—some 11,700 nationwide—have lost their jobs since December. That's just the workers at the well.

In the same period of time, another 4,000 Texans who manufactured oil field machinery have lost their jobs. And announcements of employee layoffs by oil-related businesses are all too frequent.

If Saudi Arabia chooses to hold down oil prices for three to five years in order to break its competition, Texas could lose up to 250,000 jobs.

Whatever the eventual job loss, unemployment in the energy industry already has become

a serious problem for Texas and other energy producing states.

In Abilene, for example, only 25 to 30 oil industry workers a month used to file for unemployment compensation. In February, there were 384 applicants who had lost their oil industry jobs.

That kind of increase in demand for help places a huge strain on state employment agencies. At the same time, worsening economic conditions undercut the tax bases of producing states, leaving the agencies with smaller budgets. They have more to do and less money to do it with.

In addition to the regular unemployment insurance program, some special federal funding is available to workers who have lost their jobs due to trade problems. But so far it has been denied to the energy industry. And the reasons given are simply unfair.

In 1982, Congress passed the Trade Adjustment Assistance Act to help workers who had lost their jobs because of import competition. It has been used mostly to assist the automobile, steel, footwear and apparel industries.

But the Department of Labor has denied that trade has "contributed importantly" to the energy industry's problems and has refused to use this program to retrain laid off oil workers.

Trade has everything to do with the problem. Six months ago, Saudi Arabia almost doubled its oil production in a calculated move to regain a larger share of the world market. Oil prices, as a result, have dropped almost by half and, in the first quarter of this year, oil imports have jumped 30 percent. U.S. oil companies have their backs to the wall and must lay off employees and shut down rigs. A lot of them are going out of business.

I co-sponsored a Senate resolution urging the Department of Labor to broaden its interpretation of the Trade Adjustment Assistance Act to include the energy industry. That resolution has been approved. In addition, I joined with Senators from other energy-producing states recently in asking that the President instruct the Department to do this. If he does not, we will propose legislation requiring it.

Unemployment in the energy industry is just as surely related to trade as the unemployment experienced by the automobile, steel, footwear and apparel industries.

All we ask is that our energy workers have the same opportunity to train for a new career as workers in other industries.

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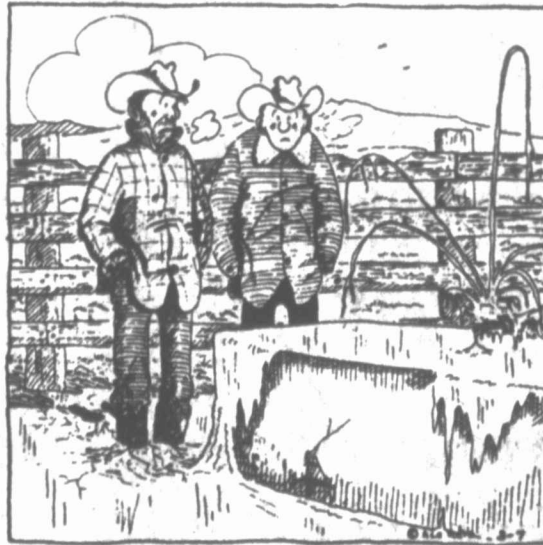

board in a 20-6 loss to St. Ann's. Paul Arellano included a fifth inning homerun in the St. Ann's assault.

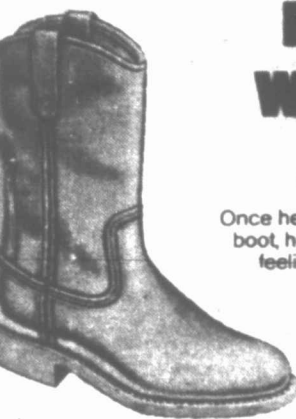
