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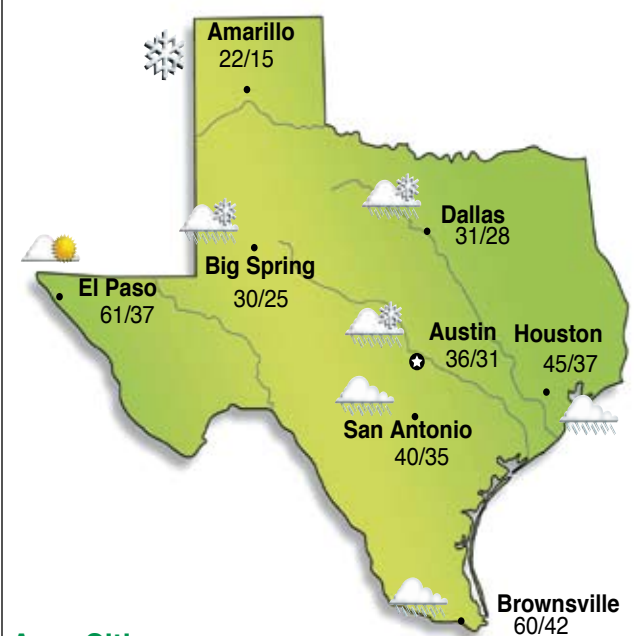

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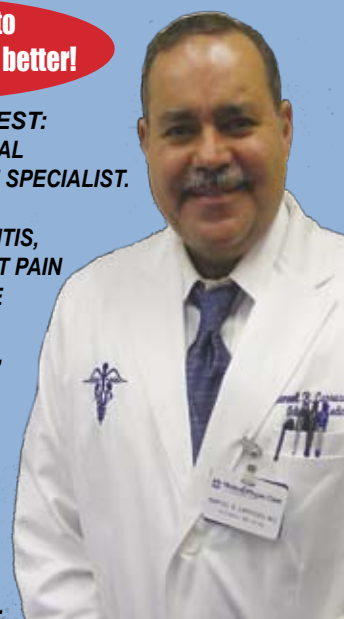

## ‘Birdman’ tops Oscars defined by advocacy, originality, and first-timers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Hollywood is smarter than you thought. Whether by design or chance, the 87th Academy Awards elegantly and subtly shifted the tone of the season from a reductive fixation on snubs and fact-checking to a positive celebration of original filmmaking and purposeful advocacy for causes as diverse as immigration, suicide and equal rights.

The self-obsessed industry might have given its best picture and director prizes to Alejandro Gonzalez Inarritu’s “Birdman,” a trenchant examination of actorly narcissism, but the vanity seemed to stop with the opening of the envelopes. Even in their moments of singular glory, most of the winners chose to talk about something other than themselves.

The Mexican-born Inarritu, who’s “Birdman” also won for cinematography and original screenplay, said he prays his native country finds “a government we deserve” and that immigrants to the U.S. “can be treated with the same dignity and the respect of the ones who came before and (built) this incredible immigrant nation.”

Host Neil Patrick Harris set the tenor of the evening, toeing the line between reverent merriment and self-referential parody, with a biting joke about one of the season’s most criticized truths. “Tonight we honor Hollywood’s best and whitest — I mean brightest,” he said in his opening, referencing the lack of diversity in the slate of nominees.

## Obama open to negotiations on most elements of request for military authority against IS

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Barack Obama is open to negotiating with Congress on his request for new authorization for military force against Islamic State militants, including his proposed three-year time limit on U.S. military action and the use

of American troops, according to the White House. After a weeklong holiday break, lawmakers return to Washington on Monday and start work on Obama’s request. Some Republicans say Obama’s proposal is too restrictive for the mission to succeed. On the other side, some Democrats want more limitations on Obama’s authority so the United States doesn’t sign on for another open-ended war.

White House officials said Obama is firmly opposed to any geographic restrictions on where the U.S. military can pursue Islamic State militants, who have strongholds in Iraq and Syria but have been operating across international boundaries. But they said he is open to debate on much of the rest of his offer and is willing to discuss the three-year time limit in Obama’s draft and the hotly debated section on ground troops.

“I’m not at all going to be surprised if there are members of Congress who take a look at this legislation and decide, ‘Well, I think there are some things that we should tweak here, and if we do, we might be able to build some more support for,’” said White House press secretary Josh Earnest. “So I think it is fair for you to assume that this reflects a starting point in conversations.”

## Homeland Security chief says agency shutdown would hurt US response to IS, winter storms

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Obama administration is warning states that the possible shutdown of the Department of Homeland Security would harm the nation’s ability to counter the extremist appeal of the Islamic State group within the U.S. and help communities struggling with an onslaught of winter snowstorms.

Homeland Security Secretary Jeh Johnson said if Congress fails to agree to a new budget for his department by the end of Friday, inaction by lawmakers would

“only foul, cramped and depressing, but also overcrowded.”

The report said inmates reported their medical concerns were often ignored by staff and that corners were often cut when it came to inmates’ health care.

Carl Takei, a staff attorney with the ACLU’s National Prison Project, said the courts have determined that the denial of appropriate medical care amounts to cruel and unusual punishment. Government institutions like the Bureau of Prisons can’t evade their responsibility to provide inmates with proper medical care just by handing control of a prison to a private contractor like MTC, he said.

Takei said problems at the Willacy County prison also include instances of overflowing toilets

and sewage that seeps into sleeping areas.

“The unsanitary conditions and overcrowding makes for a tense atmosphere,” he said.

Brian McGiverin, a prisoners’ rights attorney with the Texas Civil Rights Project, said he wasn’t surprised that inadequate medical care could ignite unrest. He said medical care is grossly underfunded in prisons, especially those run by private contractors.

“It’s pretty abysmal

with regard to modern standards how people should be treated, pretty much anywhere you go,” he said.

But Arnita said the health services at the Willacy County prison are accredited by independent organizations, including The Joint Commission, a national not-for-profit that accredits more than 20,500 health care entities in the U.S.

“We believe offenders receive timely, quality health care,” he said.

## Death toll rises to at least 70 after river ferry with 140 passengers capsizes in Bangladesh

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — The death toll from a weekend ferry disaster in central Bangladesh rose to 70 on Monday in the latest shipping mishap in the South Asian nation.

The official search for more bodies by divers at the accident site was called off late Monday morning after the ferry was brought to the surface and towed to the shore.

A local government administrator, Rasheeda Ferdousi, said they would continue to monitor the river around the accident site as there were still “some missing.” But he would not give an exact figure.

## How Will We Stop Iran?

Iran's global jihad seizes new ground, fortified by an obsessive quest for nuclear arms. Negotiations are failing. Do we need tougher sanctions?

Iran's Islamic fundamentalist leaders are sworn by their nation's constitution to pursue world conquest through jihad. Through global terror campaigns, Iran has already achieved dominance in Syria, Lebanon, Iraq and Yemen. It openly threatens to destroy Israel. Despite decades of Western-imposed trade embargos and sanctions, as well as recent U.S.-led negotiations, Iran's drive to amass nuclear arms continues unabated, and its leaders vow not to give up their quest. What more must the U.S. and the world do to stop Iran's apocalyptic nuclear threat?

### What are the facts?

Iran is by far the world's most aggressive perpetrator of terrorist acts. It provides direct funding and leadership to Islamic terror groups Hizbollah, Hamas, Houthi rebels in Yemen, and Shiite militias in Iraq, as well as the ruthless Assad regime in Syria. The Islamic republic also has been tied to bloody attacks on civilians in nations as far flung as India, Thailand, Saudi Arabia and Bulgaria, as well as an attempted assassination of the Saudi Ambassador in Washington, DC. Iran was recently implicated in the 1994 bombing of a Jewish center in Argentina and a murderous cover-up attempt. But Iran's most belligerent threats have been directed at Israel, which Supreme Leader Ayatollah Khamenei vows to “annihilate.”

Iran's terrorist tactics are motivated by its drive to become the dominant power in the Middle East. The Shiite ideology of Iran's leaders commands Muslims to wage global jihad, and their constitution commits them to “the establishment of a universal holy government and the downfall of all others.” So far Iran's strategy has been successful, as its controlling influence now spreads over Lebanon, Syria, Iraq and most recently Yemen. More critically, Iran has an effective chokehold over the Gulf of Hormuz, through which much of the world's oil travels.

No wonder most of the world's nations, especially Saudi Arabia, Jordan and Egypt, are horrified at the prospect of Iran acquiring nuclear weapons. In fact, a nuclear Iran threatens the worldwide balance of power, particularly in the inflammable Middle East. For Israel, a nuclear-armed Iran poses an imminent threat to its very existence.

Unfortunately, the West, and particularly the United States, must share the blame for allowing Iran to increase its hegemony and acquire nuclear weapons capability. The U.S. pulled out of Lebanon in 1983 after an Iranian-engineered bomb killed 241 Marines, facilitating the rise of Shiite Hizbollah terrorists. When the U.S. pulled out of Iraq in 2011, Iran stepped in, seizing control of Shiite militias and exerting decisive influence on the Iraqi government. Syria's

President Bashar Assad, roiled in a bloody civil war, has essentially become a proxy for Iran, and the Houthis, who just violently took control of former U.S. ally Yemen, are also on Iran's payroll. While the U.S. has designated Iran a state sponsor of terrorism and instituted a trade embargo in 1995, the Islamic republic's warlike acts against the U.S., Israel and many other nations have only increased. To halt Iran's

nuclear weapons development, the West imposed sanctions in 2006, but Iran's centrifuges continue to spin defiantly.

### Despite intense recent negotiations between the U.S and

Iran to reach a peaceful resolution, several deadlines for settlement have passed, and Iran still refuses to cease nuclear weapons development. Indeed, recent investigations indicate that Iran has already violated existing agreements by establishing secret nuclear supply networks. Iran's President Hassan Rouhani boasts, “Of course we bypass the sanctions, and we take pride in it.” No wonder a majority of the U.S. Congress urgently supports harsh new sanctions on Iran unless it immediately agrees to give up weapons-grade nuclear enrichment and ballistic missile programs. President Obama, however, promises to veto any such measure, arguing that increased sanction threats will frighten the Iranians from further negotiations.

What is the solution? Most Americans share the President's hopes that Iran can be persuaded to set aside its nuclear ambitions—and its vendetta against Israel—through diplomacy. But one thing is certain: Iran is our enemy. Appeasement will not work. It is only crippling Western economic sanctions, backed by the threat of force, that have driven Iran to the negotiating table.

Above all, Iran must decommission its nuclear weapons infrastructure now. To this end, Senators Robert Menendez (D-NJ) and Senator Mark Kirk (R-IL) have introduced the Nuclear Weapons Free Iran Act of 2015, which toughens sanctions if Iran refuses to comply, thus strengthening the U.S. hand in forging an agreement that peacefully eliminates the Iranian nuclear threat.

Since sanctions brought the Iranians to the table, sanctions are the most powerful, peaceful means for convincing them to abandon plans to acquire nuclear weapons. But because the Iranians continue to declare themselves implacably committed to nuclear development, it's time to ratchet up economic pressure. The Nuclear Weapon Free Iran Act should be passed now. The survival of the world is at stake.

According to BSISD Athletic

Director Phillip Ritchey, the game will be played at 4 p.m. on Tuesday at Frenship High School.

The Howard College Hawks' mega-important showdown with the New Mexico Junior College Thunderbirds also became a victim of the storm. Poor road conditions between Big Spring and Hobbs, N.M. prompted the two colleges to reschedule the games to Tuesday evening.

The HC women and men were scheduled to play beginning at 4:45 p.m. Big Spring time in Hobbs.

Howard College heads into its matchup in a tie with South Plains for the lead in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference. New Mexico Junior College is third, one game behind HC and SPC.

A win over the Roadrunners

would send the Hawks into their regular season finale on Feb. 26 against Western Texas College with a shot at claiming the WJCAC title, and the No. 1 seed in the upcoming NJCAA Region V Basketball Tournament, which will be held in Brownwood on March 4-7.

A loss, however, could drop Howard College into third in the conference standings.

## Dale Jr. laments missed chance

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Dale Earnhardt Jr. saved his first tweet for the night of his 2014 Daytona 500 win.

About 5,100 tweets and one year later, Earnhardt lamented on Twitter his lost shot at back-to-back championships.

"That car should have won the race," he tweeted Sunday.

Earnhardt stalked the leaders late until a mistake on a restart with 19 laps left dumped him from contention. Earnhardt rallied for a third-place finish in his first race with new crew chief Greg Ives.

"I've got a great team," Earnhardt said. "I feel like Greg is going to be awesome."

Earnhardt led 32 laps in the No. 88 Chevrolet and had the checkered flag in sight until that restart misstep knocked him to 20th.

"I thought (Jimmie Johnson) was on the quarter panel and he was going to get a good run down the back and I wanted to get in behind him," he said. "Somebody got on the outside and I was stuck in the middle then. Just a bad decision. I should have stayed on the bottom and been a little more patient."

Earnhardt, who won one of last week's Daytona qualifying races, finished behind winner Joey Logano and Kevin Harvick.

"We had a really fast car, maybe the best car here," Earnhardt said.

Earnhardt lost his chance to become the first repeat Daytona 500 winner since Sterling Marlin in 1994-95.

## Nebraska coach bans his players from locker room

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — Nebraska coach Tim Miles is also steamed about his team's 28-point loss to Iowa that he's locking his players out of their locker room.

The Cornhuskers' 74-46 loss Sunday was their fifth straight and seventh in eight games. They're 13-14 overall and 5-8 and in 10th place in Big Ten after finishing fourth and making it to the NCAA tournament last year.

Miles also said players would not speak to the media until further notice, adding, "If there's anyone who's going to represent us right now, it's me."

Nebraska's \$19 million training facility opened in 2011 and features a deluxe locker room with heated towel racks and I-pod plug-ins in the showers.

Asked where the players will shower after practices, Miles said, "Good luck. They're creative young people."

Today is Monday, Feb. 23, the 54th day of 2015. There are 311 days left in the year. Today's Highlight in History: On Feb. 23rd, 1945, during World War II, U.S. Marines on Iwo Jima captured Mount Suribachi, where they raised the American flag. (There were actually two flag-raising, the second of which was captured in the iconic photograph taken by Joe Rosenthal of The Associated Press.) On this date: In 1836, the siege of

the Alamo began in San Antonio, Texas. In 1848, the sixth president of the United States, John Quincy Adams, died in Washington, D.C., at age 80. In 1863, British explorers John H. Speke and James A. Grant announced they had found the source of the Nile River to be Lake Victoria. In 1870, Mississippi was readmitted to the Union. In 1903, President Theodore Roosevelt signed an agreement with Cuba to lease the area around Guantanamo Bay to the United States. In 1927, President Calvin Coolidge signed a bill creating the Federal

Radio Commission, forerunner of the Federal Communications Commission. In 1934, Leopold III succeeded his late father, Albert I, as King of the Belgians. In 1954, the first mass inoculation of school-children against polio using the Salk vaccine began in Pittsburgh as some 5,000 students were vaccinated.
