Baseball Season Opens Thursday

DAIRY DAY EXPECTED TO DRAW LARGE CROWDS HERE FRIDAY, APRIL 26TH

Interest Mounts As Entries Are Being Received

Much interest is being manifested in the third Annual Dairy Day Program to be held in Lamesa at 10:30 a. m. Friday, April 26. Dawson County dairymen have entered approximately 40 head of cattle. Mitchell County dairymen have entered 3 head and Borden County dairymen have entered 7 head up to April 13.

This Dairy Day Program, strictly an educational event, is based upon (1) the classification of dairy products, (2) the classification of dairy animals and (3) discussions of good management in processing and breeding that will assist producers of dairy products to increase their production and income.

There will be judging events in both dairy products and dairy animals. These events are open to every man, woman, boy and girl attending the Dairy Day Program. Suitable awards are given to adults and minors in the Dairy Products judging and in the Dairy Cattle judging. Also one prize will be given away at the opening of the Program at 10:00 a. m. and another prize will be given away at the close of the Program at 3:00 p. m. Every farmer and farm woman is urged to attend.

Dairy Products, such as butter, whole milk and home-processed cheese, may be entered by any farm woman. The dairy products entered will be scored on quality, cleanliness, etc. and a ribbon will be awarded. Each ribbon will be given according to the merits of the exhibit.

Dairy cattle, cows, heifers and bulls, may be entered. All animals entered will be housed in one of the fair buildings. On animal will be outside. Each animal will be scored and suitable ribbons will be awarded each animal. An animal does not have to be registered to be entered in this Dairy Day Program.

School Census Shows Gain Of 104 From 1939

The census of the Lamesa Independent School district was completed April 1st, and the figures reveal a substantial increase over the 1939 total.

According to Mrs. Leslie Pratt, enumerator, there are 1,687 scholars in the district this year as compared with 1,583 last year, or an increase of 104.

Nearly two thousand students are enrolled in the city schools and the larger number is accounted for in transfers from other school districts.

Information On Castor Beans Given By Agent

Due to the request of several interested farmers, County Agent B. J. Baskins, released the following information in regard to the Planting of Castor Beans in this area as a commercial crop.

Farmers are referred by the agent to the results obtained by various experiment stations located in Texas, based on experiment during the past two years.

One: Yield per acre are dependent entirely upon (a) availability of plenty of good water, as plants need large amounts of moisture, (b) length of growing season, as plants require long growing season, and (c) proper soil type and fertility to production.

Two: results of the several state experiments show yields from 3 bushels to 62 bushels per acre, weighing 46 pounds to the bushel.

Three: Availability of marketing facilities. In his opinion castor beans are hardly adapted to this territory as a commercial crop.

It was also pointed out by the agent, that they could not be planted on government acres as they are regarded as soil depleting crops.

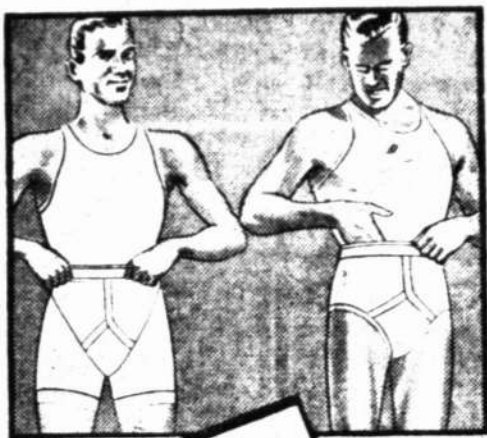

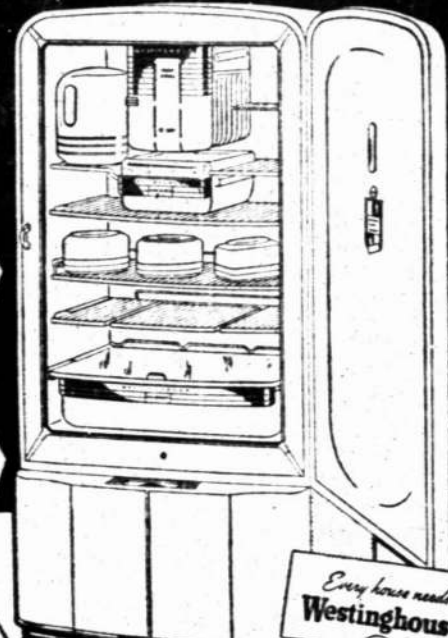

South Plains Scouts And Cubs Start Ticket Sale For Third Annual Circus

Dairy Day Will Be Observed In Lamesa April 26

The Third Annual Dairy Day program will be held at Lamesa beginning at 10 A. M., Friday, April 26, 1940. This event is an educational program to encourage the breeding, management and production of better dairy animals as well as the production of better dairy products. It is sponsored by the leading dairy farmers of Dawson County, the Extension Service of A. and M. College, and the county and home demonstration agents.

The purposes of the Dairy Day program in Dawson County are to: (1) Classify each animal exhibited on its own merits, (2) Classify the dairy products exhibited on their merits, (3) Lead out on discussions of breeding, feeding, production and milk production of dairy animals, and (4) Home production and uses of Dairy products.

Farmers and farm women, 4-H Club boys and girls, and FFA boys and home-makers of Terry, Lynn, Borden, Scurry, Mitchell, Howard, Martin, Midland, Gaines and Dawson Counties are invited to attend this Dairy Day program. Entries of dairy cattle and dairy products are also expected from these counties.

Judging contests of three or four classes of dairy cattle will be held. There will also be judging contests of milk, butter and cheese. These contests are open to every person visiting the program, and suitable awards will be given to the winners.

In this type of program every animal shown is awarded according to the number of points scored by the animal. Every animal worthy of a blue ribbon receives a blue ribbon. Every animal worthy of a red ribbon receives a red ribbon. There might be five and six animals receiving a blue ribbon in each class.

Animals exhibited will be classified by ages as follows:

Females: Three years and over; Two years and under three (also yearlings in milk); One year and under two years.

Males: Two years and over; one year and under two; bull and three daughters, any age.

Ribbons will be awarded to every animal that scores as follows:

(1) Class A: Excellent and good plus 85 points and more.

(2) Class B: Very good, 80 to 85 points.

(3) Class C: Good, 75 to 80 points.

(4) Class D: Fair, 70 to 75 points.

All Class A animals will receive a blue ribbon. Class B animals will receive a red ribbon. Class C animals will receive a white ribbon and Class D animals will receive a pink ribbon. Animals scoring less than 70 points will not receive a ribbon.

Dairy products will be classified as follows:

(1) Class A: Blue Ribbon, score of 90 or more points.

(2) Class B: Red Ribbon, score of 89 to 90 points.

(3) Class C: White Ribbon, score of 88 to 89 points.

(4) Class D: No ribbon, score of less than 88 points.

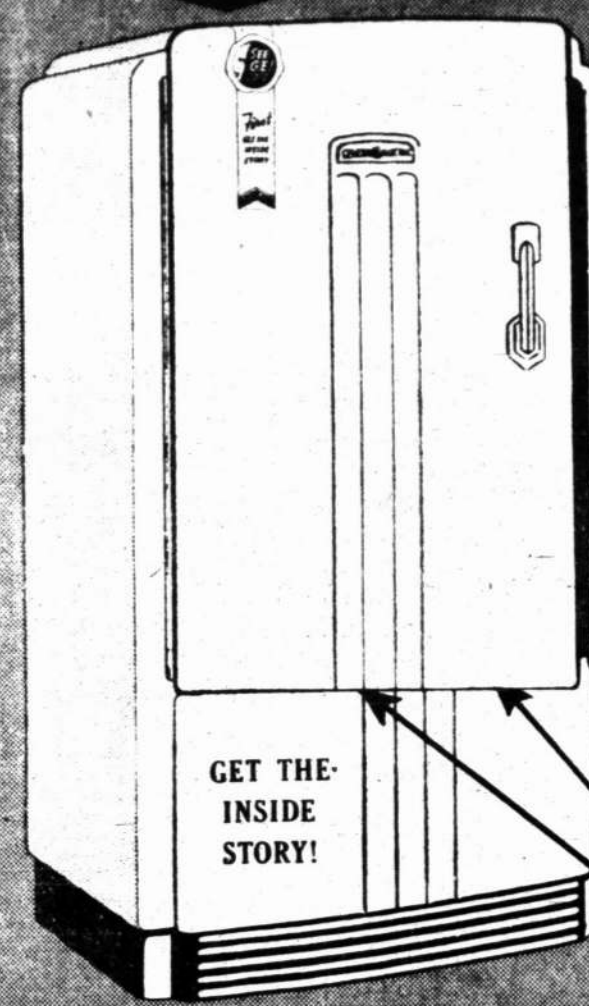

Most members of the Chamber of Commerce consider their membership as a necessary investment toward an organized effort in community development. The person who joins the organization should do so with the sole intention of thus investing in the welfare of Lamesa. You may not seemingly benefit directly, but you can not help but benefit indirectly through the many services offered the entire community by this organization."

"As our city grows so must its Chambers of Commerce grow, if you hope for it to continue to do its duty toward substantial development in the future. Its success in this matter depends upon your support. Your Chamber of Commerce can be no 'bigger' than its city, and your city can be no 'bigger' than its Chamber of Commerce. "If we all work together cooperatively, much can be accomplished, but if we wait for Tom, Dick and Harry to do the job, nothing can ever be realized."

Boys And Girls Week Will Be Nationally Observed

John L. Griffith of Chicago, Ill., "Big Ten" Athletic Commissioner and chairman of the National Boys and Girls Week Committee for the United States, in a statement to the press today, commented on the unusually large number of organizations and agencies which are making plans for extensive participation in Boys and Girls Week for 1940. Mr. Griffith stated that from all indications the problems confronting American youth and the welfare of youth of today are matters of foremost interest to scores of large national organizations. Just a few of the organizations whose local units are making plans for participation in National Boys and Girls Week, April 27 to May 4, are the American Legion, the Boy Scouts, Civilian International, 4-H Clubs, Girl Scouts, Kiwanis International, Knights of Columbus, Lions International, National Exchange Club, Optimists International, the Salvation Army, the W. P. A. recreation departments, the Y. M. C. A., and scores of churches and schools.

"It is apparent," said Mr. Griffith, "that the great majority of adults are keenly aware of the fact that if the youth of today can be given the proper counseling and assistance, they will undoubtedly grow up to be good citizens of correspondingly good communities. It is perhaps in this very thought that is expressed the major purpose of Boys and Girls Week. During recent months and years the fact has been driven home to us that the majority of crimes committed in our country are only slightly beyond the 'juvenile delinquency' type. Instead of overcrowding our penal institutions with youngsters who are not inherently bad, considerable attention has been centered on the influences which lead young people into lives of crime. In almost innumerable instances, it has been discovered that bad home conditions, poverty, unwise use of leisure time, lack of education and recreational facilities, and the like are foremost among the contributing factors.

"Boys and Girls Week," said Mr. Griffith, "will represent a period during which the attention of the entire community will be focused upon the various phases of the life of youth. It goes beyond that, however, for Boys and Girls Week is meant to serve as a week during which special attention will be focused upon youth. It is our hope that ultimately we shall be able to view every week during the year as a sort of Boys and Girls Week. It is certain that only through constant attention and activities can we hope to be able to be of real assistance to youth."

Old Letters Of
Sam Houston Are
Given To School

Smashing of the Texas Slavery racket of a century ago was urged by Sam Houston—twice president and once governor of Texas—in a letter obtained recently by University of Texas historians.

Written to Isaac Van Zandt, charge d'affaires of Texas at Washington, in 1843, the letter asked for appointment of a consul at the Port, Dr. Eugene C. Barker and Amelia Williams said today.

"Houston's main argument for the appointment is that a great deal of smuggling was carried on through the Port, the smugglers bringing goods both into Texas and the United States," Dr. Barker said. "Among other smuggled commodities he mentioned African negroes smuggled into both countries, which violated both the laws of Texas and the United States."

To fill the post, Houston asked for the appointment of Rev. Stewart Newell of New Orleans, who had written a History of Texas bringing it down through 1836.

This letter and a second introducing Van Zandt to Andrew Jackson, who are now compiling and editing all the available writings of Houston, by Albert Williams, Jr., of Houston.

Dr. Barker, who said the third volume of the writings will be released soon by the University of Texas Press, asserted that Houston's writings are widely scattered over the nation and are found in collector's hands throughout the United States. Dr. Barker and Miss Williams are trying to bring together all these items.

\$200 Will Be Given To Some School Co-ed

Check for \$200 to help pay her school expenses next year will soon be awarded to some junior or senior co-ed at the University of Texas by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

She must send her application and qualifications for the 27-year old scholarship to Mrs. Boyd Wells of Austin, award committee chairman before May 1.

Other members of the committee in charge of the \$4,000 fund are Miss Marion Mullins, D. A. R. State Regent, Miss Lilia M. Casis of the University faculty, and University President Homer P. Rainey.

Selected for her taste, intelligence, beauty, personality, and "Charming Girl" on a committee of 2850 young women, she was chosen by a faculty vote.

Bas-Relief Of Governor Hogg Given To School

A large bas-relief of former governor James Stephen Hogg has been presented to the University of Texas by his daughter, Miss Ina Hogg, of Houston, and is now displayed in the Archives Collection there.

Framed in ebony and gold, the bas-relief is the work of William M. McVey, of the University's department of art. Widely known as the "sculptor of Texas heroes," McVey did the bas-relief work on the San Jacinto Museum near Houston; the Texas Memorial Museum in Austin; and the statues of James Bowie, Texarkana, and David Crockett, at Ozona.

S. C. S. Notes

The Committee of the Dawson County A. C. A. received additional instructions this week regarding the planting of atlas sorgo or african white cane on soil-conserving acres for 1940 according to Mr. W. T. Weeks, chairman.

Since it requires technical knowledge and actual experience to classify the various varieties of these so called sweet sorghums, this committee is passing on to the farmers of the county the information received from the State Office and will leave the responsibility with the person who plants these questionable varieties on their reduction acres.

"Although Atlas Sorgo and White African sorgo are true sweet sorghum varieties and are listed as such in Experiment Station Bulletin No. 496, they were not listed with the sweet sorghums in Item 1 of A.C.M.-422 because of the fact that in some sections of the country in 1939 a considerable quantity of kafir seed was sold as atlas or White African and farmers planting this seed actually raised a grain sorghum crop. If a farmer is sure that he is planting true Atlas or White African sorgo, he may be sure his crop will be classified as a sweet sorghum. However, since it is hard to distinguish the seed of these two varieties from grain sorghum seed, a farmer is running a risk unless he is planting certified seed.

We suggest that the county committee attempt to persuade the farmers to plant a variety such as red-top, the seed of which can be readily determined to be a sweet sorghum usually produce more forage than Atlas or White African."

Other varieties listed which may be planted without question are: honey (seeded ribbon cane) sumac (red-top) swart ashburn, orange, coleman, gosseneck, sourless (african millet) amber.

PEDDLED DUCKS TO WRONG PERSON

An Arkansas resident who is now awaiting trial under a half dozen charges got into trouble because he tried to peddle canned duck to a game warden.

It is alleged the Arkansas man killed fifteen Mallard ducks out of season, picked them, put them in fruit jars and traveled to Atlanta, Texas. The first person he attempted to sell the ducks to was a free service game warden. He, of course bought some of the ducks and placed the man under arrest. The federal authorities stepped in and the Arkansas resident is now charged with, among other things, transporting game across a state line, selling game, exceeding the bag limit, and killing game out of season.

Albaugh John Robinson No. 2 Spuds Saturday

The Ray Albaugh No. 2 John Robinson, approximately one and one-quarter miles northwest of the John Robinson well northwest of Lamesa, was spudded Saturday.

Thursday afternoon they had reached a depth of 250 feet, where the setting of 10-inch surface casing will be done.

Richmond Drilling Company, of Midland have the contract, which is a turn key job and calls for drilling to 5,050 feet unless oil or gas in paying quantities is encountered at a lesser depth.

Rotary tools will be used until a depth of approximately 4,900 feet is reached, when the well will be finished with standard tools.

In addition to the 2 per cent organic mercury dust (Ceresan) used in the above-mentioned earlier work, a 5 per cent dust (New Improved Ceresan) has been used in experiments during the past few years and has been found preferable from the standpoints of effectiveness and cost of treatment.

Another organic mercury compound (Sanosed) has been used for one year and has shown a slight advantage in late plantings. During the past 2 or 3 years, seed delinted with sulphuric acid has been used more widely in experimental work and the effects of this treatment have been particularly good in Texas.

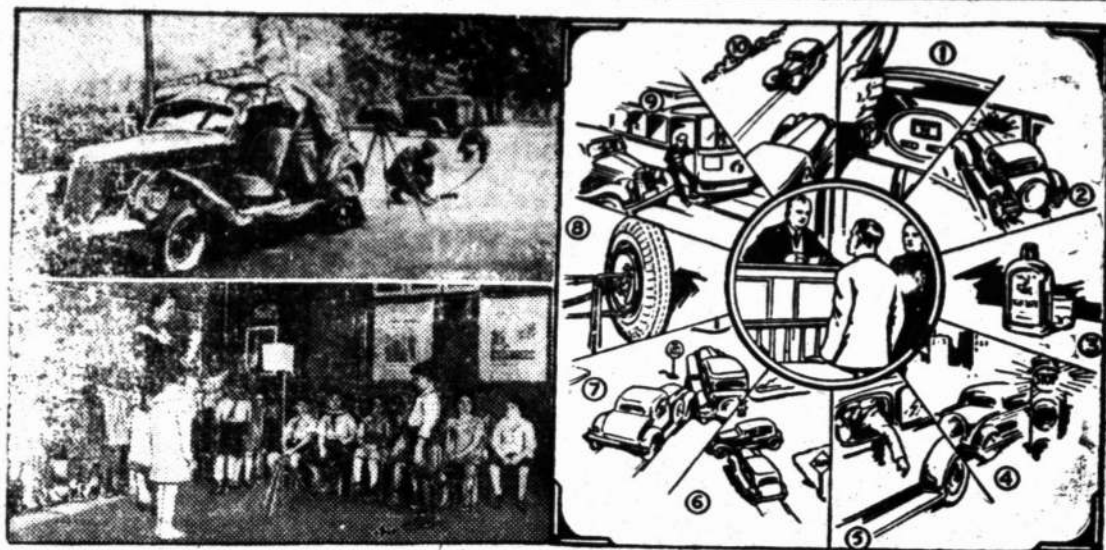
In 1938 at College Station, a regional seed treatment test carried out in cooperation with the U.S. D.A. gave marked increases in emergence of seedling and stand of plants and a decrease in the amount of damping-off or soreskin. Only slight differences in yield, however, were obtained following thinning of the plants. In 1939, Dr. C. H. Rogers of the Blackland Experiment Station at Temple conducted a 3-acre seed-treatment experiment in which certain plantings on April 3 were using only 2 seeds to the hill, in hills 18 inches apart and in 3-foot rows. No plants were removed and the entire stand from a given quantity of seed was allowed to grow to mature plants, from which the yield data were taken. The untreated seed, in these experiments, produced 473 lbs. of seed cotton per acre. The various treatments gave yields of seed cotton per acre as follows: Sanosed, 739 lbs.; Ceresan, 935 lbs.; New Improved Ceresan, 946 lbs.; delinted with sulphuric acid, 946 lbs. A combination treatment of acid delinting plus New Improved Ceresan gave the highest yield of 1067 lbs. of seed cotton per acre. These results point the way toward a distinct saving in cost of seed, since through the planting of treated seed, much less seed per acre would be required to obtain a satisfactory stand of plants and maximum yield. In addition, there are certain increases in yields which come from the general beneficial effects of seed treatment, even though the untreated seed are

Treating Cotton Seed Is Urged By A. & M.

Experiments on the treatment of cotton seed over a period of several years throughout the cotton-growing states have shown in general that such treatment results in better germination of the seed and emergence of the young plants, in fewer diseased seedlings, and in increases in yield of cotton. The results of early work on cotton seed treatments at this station were published as Bulletin No. 531 by the Division of Agricultural Engineering in 1936. At that time, average increases of from 11 to 65 per cent in the stand of plants and increases of from 4 to 25 per cent in yield, with variations among the different locations of the tests, were obtained with an organic mercury seed-treatment dust, a recent work in the Division of Plant Pathology has shown the same general trend of results as cited above. Furthermore, since 1936, additional types and brands of materials have become available for experimental and commercial use. Also modification of the method for measuring the benefits which may be derived from seed treatment have shown even more striking results than were obtained previously.

Putting Dust Bowl Back To Grass Big Problem

Putting the Dust Bowl back to grass presents a problem of gigantic proportions.

While there are several million acres of land damaged severely by wind erosion and which should be under protection of permanent sod, such submarginal areas represent only a small part of the Southern Great Plains as a whole. Soil Conservation Service officials point out:

Lack of sufficient data on revegetation in this semi-arid area, the difficulty of establishing a stand of vegetation under drought conditions and the shortage of native grass to be used in reseeding the blowing land all combine to make the problem difficult of solution, it is explained.

The amount of grass seed available for revegetation work has been increased materially within recent years through the use of the combine and the fact that the farmers are becoming interested in harvesting seed for the market, according to B. F. Kiltz, head of the regional nursery of the Soil Conservation Service.

During the last year collection of important species of grass totaling 125,000 pounds, exceeding all previous years, according to Kiltz. In addition, another 50,000 pounds have been purchased from individuals who collected seed for the market and from established seed houses. More than half of the seed harvested and purchased are blue grama grass.

These seed are being used in attempts to re-establish vegetation

on severely damaged, cultivated fields and on pastures that have been destroyed by blowing soil the nurseryman said.

For several seasons strippers were used with medium success in collecting native grass seed on the plains. These machines did not harvest all the seed of retain them in were not effective, they provided the best method until combines were tried in the fall of 1938. Kiltz explained.

In August, 1938, a rancher who owns considerable land around Hereford, Texas, tried a 12-foot combine on a section of blue grama grass that had produced an abundance of seed. His success was remarkable in that the seed collected with the combine was much higher in purity than any harvested with strippers.

The Soil Conservation Service, in September, 1938, tried a five-foot standard combine in harvesting side-out and blue grama grass seed near Hereford. The trial showed that large collections of seed could be made with regular commercial types of combines at an economical cost.

"When properly-adjusted combines are used, a large quantity of the light unfilled seed is separated from that which is capable of germination, which accounts for the better quality of seed collected with combines," the nurseryman stated.

Last August, about 10,000 pounds of side-out grama seed was collected in the vicinity of Perryton, Texas, while approximately 7,000 pounds was harvested south of Borger. In both localities results showed that five feet combines were more economical and gathered more good seed than did a battery of three strippers operating in the same area.

Side-out grama is found in almost pure stands on calcareous soils of native pastures in the Texas Panhandle, Kiltz said. The rolling breaks along the Canadian river, where the soil is calcareous, thin and sloping, produce the best stands of side-out grama. Some hairy grama and blue grama usually are found in the good stands of side-out grama, the nurseryman said.

Southwest of Dumas, Texas, are several sections of flat land well covered with native sod of blue grama and which produced an excellent crop of seed last year. Three combines owned by the Soil Conservation Service and two rented from individuals were used in harvesting this seed last September. While the harvest was under way, a strong wind thrashed most of the seed out of the heads.

"It is this uncertainty of harvesting that makes a difficult problem of obtaining adequate quantities of good native seed to be used in revegetation work," Kiltz explained. "This is the reason efforts are being made to interest more farmers in collecting seed for the market. Last year individuals collected about 30,000 pounds of blue grama seed which have been purchased for use in efforts to re-establish grass on severely eroded areas."

Buffalo grass seed, usually produced within two inches of the ground in small tufts of grass, are harder to collect than any other species, it is pointed out. Last fall, a machine was constructed which cuts and removes the vegetation close to the ground. Behind the sickle is a series of suction tubes designed to suck up all seed lying in the sod or on the ground.

While it is possible to collect buffalo grass seed with this machine, the process is slow and expensive because all native stands are at least one-half mile plants and many of the female colonies are of low seed producing strains.

The Soil Conservation Service is endeavoring to interest ranchers in developing field of buffalo grass which would be suitable for economical harvesting of the seed. Kiltz said. Trial plantings are being by the Service to obtain additional data on production. Such information will be made available for those interested in supplying native grass seed for re-vegetation work, he said.

SESBANIA, AN EXCELLENT FOOD FOR QUAIL

Sesbania, a plant which as a nitrogen fixing growth builds up soil, but which is not eaten by cattle or horses, is being widely advocated by the Texas Game, Fish, and Oyster Commission as an excellent food producer for quail and several other species of wildlife. It also furnishes good cover. Sesbania is being sown on most of the nearly fifty quail demonstration projects set up recently in many parts of the state by the Game Department. Numerous landowners interested in having a larger supply of Bobwhites and other species of wildlife are also planting sesbania seed. Sesbania, Game Department biologists have found, does well whether broadcast or planted in strips. It is especially valuable as a late winter and early spring food, when

there is little other vegetation upon which wildlife can feed.

Plantings of sesbania need not be fenced due to the fact that it is not eaten by cattle, horses or deer. In many areas it is not necessary to disc the soil before planting the seed. It can be planted in out-of-way corners, in strips along the edge of cultivated fields, and along ditch banks. May and June are the best months in which to sow this valuable wildlife food-producing plant. Strips fifteen yards wide are considered exceedingly valuable. Not only is the plant beneficial to quail but it has been found that when planted on the banks of ponds that it provides excellent food for ducks, improves the appearance of pond banks and provides some shade for fish. Prairie chickens also make use of the plants seeds as food.

Sesbania seed is not expensive. It can be purchased from the larger seed houses at prices ranging from 9 to 12 cents per pound.

POULTRY HINTS

Coccidiosis in baby chicks may be prevented and, or controlled by the use of "Flour of Sulphur" in the ration. Starting at the age of 4 weeks the poultry raiser may add 5 pounds of flour of sulphur to the 100 pounds of rations. This should be continued until they are 12 to 15 weeks of age. Do not use this treatment before the chicks are 4 weeks of age.

Cannibalism in baby chicks may be controlled by: (1) increasing floor space per chick, (2) increasing feed hopper space, (3) darkening windows with red paint or red paper, and (4) feeding clipped oats but in feeding clipped oats plenty of grit must be provided to assist the chicks in consuming the oats.

Rickets, indicated by ruffled feathers, wobbly gate, sore joints and tendency to sit most of the time, may be prevented by (1) putting the brooder on a green range so that the baby chicks will have access to green feeds, or (2) adding one-half of one per cent of cod liver oil to the ration.

Slipped tendons can be prevented by the use of the wheat gray shorts in the ration. In using the wheat

gray shorts be sure they made up 20 per cent of the ration.

Nutritional paralysis can be prevented (1) by keeping baby chicks on a green range or (2) using milk and dehydrated alfalfa. Indications of this condition are (1) toes curled inwards and (2) tendency to walk on hock joints.

CAT ATE 31 PERCH

How many 3 to 3 1/2 inch fish can a 2 1/2 pound catfish eat in a night? Your guess is probably away off, but W. E. Fairless of Shackelford County just about knows the answer. Mr. Fairless recently placed a catfish in a live box along with thirty-one perch each approximately 3 1/2 inches long. The next morning the beam had all disappeared and when he cut open the pulsing stomach of the cat, he found all 31 of the sunfishes there.

Boys' And Girls' Week To Be Observed In Lamesa Week Of April 27th

Plans have been announced recently by which Lamesa will join hundreds of other cities and organizations throughout the United States in taking and active part in the observance of Boys and Girls Week. The movement is being sponsored largely by the Lamesa Recreation Department under the cooperation of other clubs and organizations of this city. Rev. Rodney Glasscock appeared at the Rotary Club last week and earnestly solicited the cooperation of that club in observance of the week. Other clubs have been asked to join the movement.

Boys and Girls Week dates back to 1920 when the Rotary Club of New York City sponsored an activity then known as Boys Week. The movement kindled popular interest and spread rapidly throughout the country, in 1922, at which time Rotary was only two years old. Organizations of more than 200 cities took part in the observance. In 1933, the number more than tripled and by 1936, the week was observed quite generally throughout the United States and Canada. The following year the week was observed generally throughout Great Britain, Cuba, Mexico, Puerto Rico, New Zealand, South Africa and South America.

The affairs and activities of Boys and Girls Week are today supervised by a national committee, headed by John L. Griffith of Chicago, Ill., and composed of scores of business men, women, industrialists, educators, and others.

Boys and Girls Week, the week of April 27 to May 4, will present a program of activities to focus attention on all phases of the life of the youth of each community. Beginning with Saturday, April 27, which will be known as Recognition Day, the following days of the week will be designated as follows: Sunday, "A Day in Churches"; Monday, "A Day in School"; Tuesday, "Vocational Day"; Wednesday, "Health and Safety Day"; Thursday, "Citizenship Day"; Friday, "A Day of Entertainment and Athletics"; and Saturday, "A Day of Outdoors and Evening at Home". Boys and Girls Week is not intended to represent just one week during the year in which attention will be given to the problems confronting the youth of today. On the contrary, it is intended to be a week during which SPECIAL emphasis will be given to the problems of youth—a week to culminate activities engaged in by various agencies and organizations during the other 51 weeks of the year.

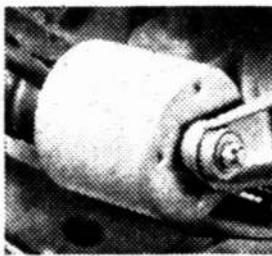

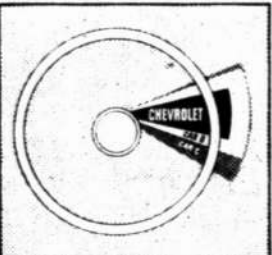

This shows a steady increase throughout the present term, and tops by several hundred the previous high mark.

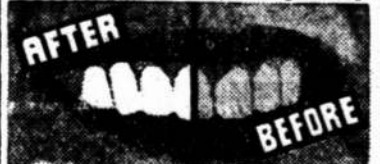

Two Farmers Up In Years Rank High With AAA

Two dirt farmers, with a combined experience of 54 years of farm operations and leadership, are now in the No. 2 and No. 3 posts of the National Department of Agriculture. Grover B. Hill, who was named Assistant Secretary of Agriculture in December, has been a Texas rancher and farmer since 1911. Claude R. Wickard, newly appointed Under Secretary of Agriculture, has farmed a general grain and livestock farm near Camden, Ind., for nearly a quarter of a century. Both men have been associated administrative work of the AAA Farm Program in recent years. Mr. Hill, 51, was named a field representative of the AAA in 1934, after serving on a committee which drafted the AAA Range Program. Since 1936 he has been in charge of the range program for the Southern Region of the AAA. During the drought of 1934, he directed the regional cattle-buying program in New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma. He studied at the University of Texas from 1909 to 1911, after which he went into ranching and farming near Amarillo.

The new Under Secretary first became connected with the AAA in 1933 and in 1936 he was made director of the North Central Division of the AAA. As director of the division, which includes the Corn Belt States, Mr. Wickard stressed farmer-administration of the AAA. Mr. Wickard, now 47, has operated the same Indiana farm which was farmed by his father and his grandfather. He graduated from Purdue University in 1915 and in 1927 was named a Master Farmer of Indiana in recognition of his work as a farm leader and the improved farming practices which he followed.

All food entering lockers must be wrapped and frozen, and approved by attendant before entering the locker-box.

Customers will not be allowed to open any package and return part of same to locker. Locker-renters agree not to violate any of the Federal, State, Game or Prohibition Laws.

Locker-room will be closed at 7:00 o'clock p. m. on week-days, and at 10:00 o'clock A. M. on Sundays.

A deposit of Fifty Cents (50c) will be made on Locker Key.

Beef Charges

Beef brought in on foot will be killed and chilled for hide and offal.

Beef brought in dressed will be chilled for one-half cent (1/2c) per pound.

All beef must be cut up and wrapped and frozen, before going in locker-box, for which a charge will be made of one and one-half cents (1 1/2c) per pound. These charges will include inspection of beef. A period of three to ten days will be required for the processing of beef, before it is ready for the locker-box.

Wrapping and freezing of beef brought in ready-cut — two cents (2c) per pound. All beef will be weighed when killed.

Pork Charges

HOGS UP TO 300 POUNDS \$1.00
HOGS OVER 300 POUNDS \$1.50

Inspection of hogs will be optional with owner. Twenty-five cents (25c) charge per head, if wanted.

A charge of three cents (3c) per pound will be made for the processing of pork, which will include the chilling of the hog; grinding, seasoning and packing of sausage; the cutting and curing of the meat for the time required for curing; the freezing and wrapping of spareribs, sausage, back-bone etc., and the placing of all in the locker-box.

All pork MUST be removed from curing room when curing time is up. If not removed, a charge of ten cents (10c) per day will have to be made. If, after pork is cured, customer wants it put in locker-box, a charge of one and one half cents (1 1/2c) per pound will be made for slicing, wrapping, and freezing, and placing in locker-box.

Fowl Charges

Chickens will be chilled, wrapped, and frozen for five cents (5c) each. Turkeys will be chilled, wrapped and frozen for fifteen cents (15c) each. No charges less than ten cents (10c).

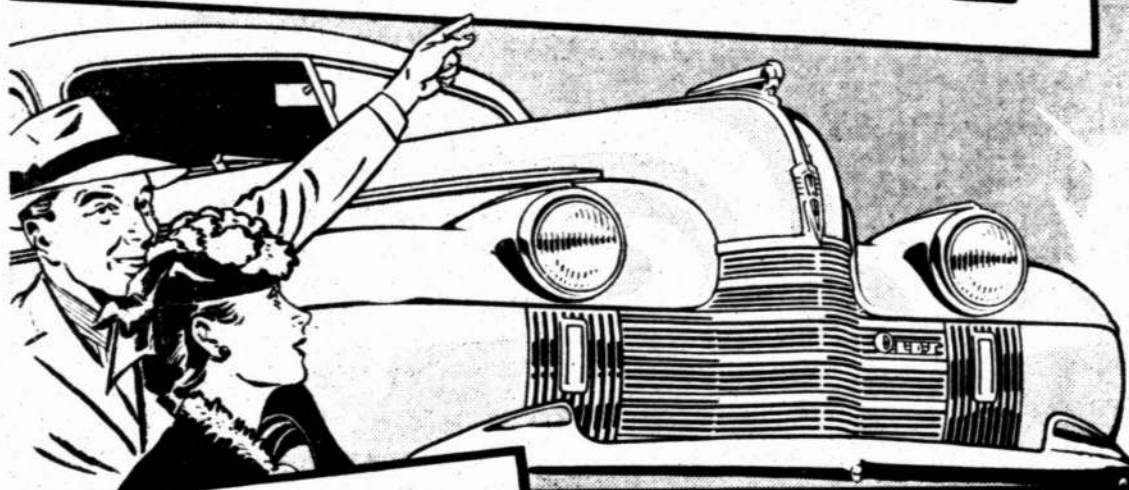
