Weather Tightens Noose On Cotton-Feed Prospects

The month of June, weather-wise, has tightened the noose on cotton prospects in the Hart area.

Rain, hail, wind-whipped sand, root-rot and thrip have combined forces, leaving behind poverty-looking crops.

The heavy rains which have fallen this month have slowed business on every corner.

Only cotton delinting men and

other seed sellers are doing much business.

Tuesday's rain brought the Hart rainfall to 7.52 inches inside the city for this month. The area got 1.65 inches Friday and .83 Sunday. Tuesday, 1.40 inches fell.

A check around Hart found conditions much the same.

Harvey Davis, eight-miles west of Hart, is bemoaning the

fact he has received 15 inches of rain this month.

He reports his cotton looks bad and is plagued with root rot. He also has received hail and blowing sand damage.

Edgar Varner, 10-miles north of Hart, has had approximately nine inches of rain in June.

He said this week that thrip are eating his cotton, root rot and all. Varner stated he has 115 acres of wheat he hasn't been able to cut.

The farmer had 2 1/2 inches of rain Friday, .90 inch Sunday and 1/2 inch Tuesday. He reported very little hail.

D. D. Myrick, northeast of Hart is in the same boat.

He reports his crops damaged especially shattered and falling wheat.

His rain gauge showed four inches of rain Friday, an inch Sunday and .90 Tuesday.

Theron Morrison, five-miles east of Hart, reports 40 per cent of his cotton received severe hail damage two weeks ago.

He told that most of it has root rot.

Morrison had 1 1/2 inches of rain Friday, one inch Sunday and 1 1/4 inches Tuesday.

On the Buster Aven farm, four miles south and one-half mile east of Hart, weather is still the boss.

Despite little hail, Aven reports his cotton is about half the size it was before the rains began.

He has had 4.30 inches of rain this June.

These farmers crop situations are typical of almost the entire area.

Five Hart FFA Boys Win State Farm Degree

Laurels are being heaped once more upon the Hart FFA Chapter.

Word was received this week that five boys from the chapter have been selected for the State Farmer Degree.

They are Dennis McLain, James Mitchell, Billy Farris, David Gardner and Jerry McKay.

The degrees will be awarded July 17, 18, and 19 in Lubbock at the State FFA Convention.

The State Farmer Degree is the highest a state can bestow on its future farmers.

It is awarded to only two per cent each year.

Hart's FFA Chapter also received a "superior" and Gold Emblem rating again this year.

The superior rating is given only to a few select chapters each year. This is the third consecutive year the Hart chapter has received such recognition.

Chug Hole Hurts Banker

Norlan Dudley, Hart banker, received a severe cut on his forehead this week when his car hit a chug-hole and his head banged into a sun visor brace.

He was carried to Plainview hospital for treatment and kept

overnight for observation.

The injury was sustained on Ave. E, south of the bank.

The front wheels of Dudley's car dropped off into the hole, hurling him forward.

His neck also was jammed.

Mrs. Sanders and the boys have lived in Hart for about a year. Her husband died four years ago from a heart attack.

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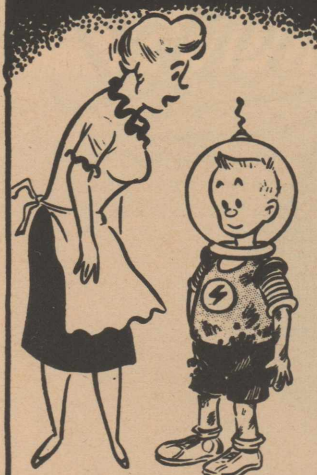

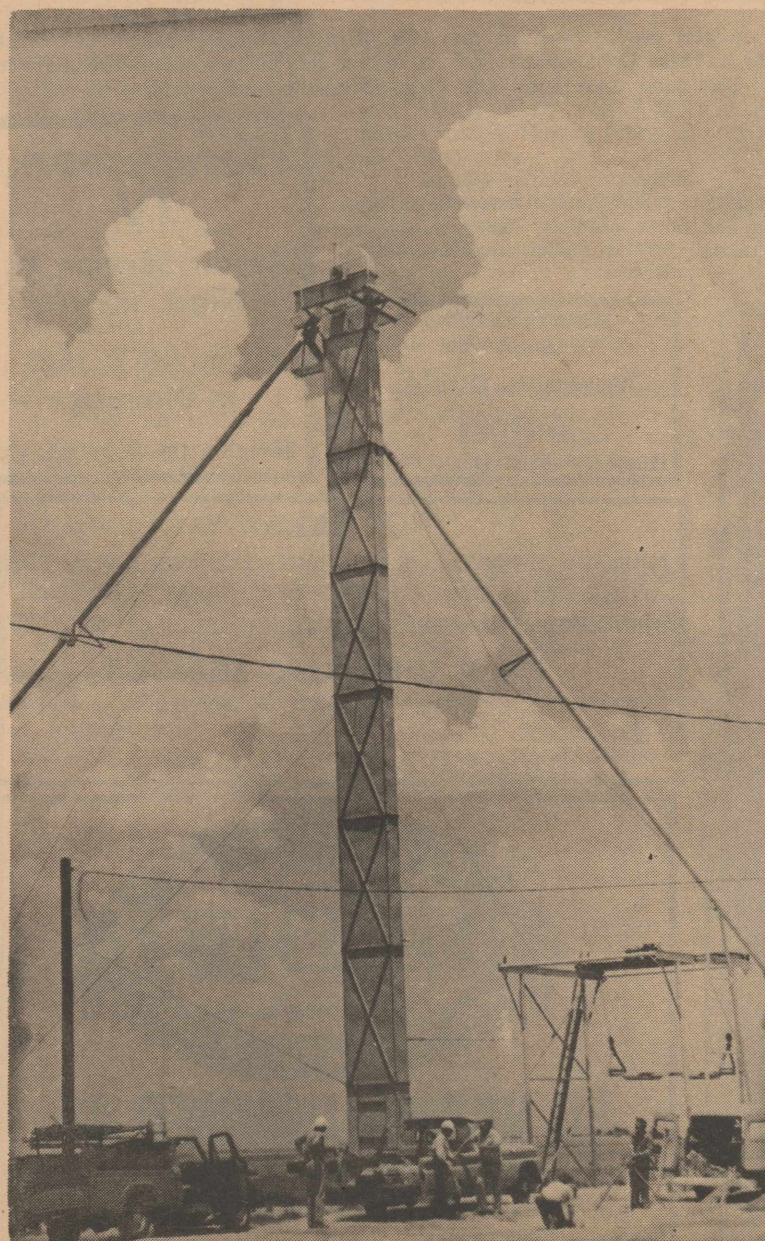

Antique Furniture Reflects Past Era

Antique furniture, to a person of imagination, possesses a charm and mysticism all its own.

One might question: How old is it? Where did it come from? I wonder who made it? How much is it worth?

A walk through the C. O. Burt home southeast of Hart can send countless other questions stampeding through the mind.

She and her husband have been collecting antique furniture for 15 years.

Their home is beautifully decorated with pieces made well in advance of the Civil War, more than 100 years ago.

What is more unusual about the collection is the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Burt have put in hundreds of hours working on it.

Work includes sanding off old paints and varnishes, filling in nicks and cracks with wood dough and restoring furniture to its natural wood color.

Mrs. Burt said, "Antiques also must be oiled with lemon oil or they will crumble away."

She told that old wood has a tendency to dry out in this high, dry area.

Mrs. Burt has a number of items from Columbia, South America, where she and her husband lived two years.

"Several of the pieces came from the South," said Mrs. Burt, "you can tell by the method of carving."

She explained that most of the Southern chests and desks had large locks and that a good locksmith could determine age by design of the lock.

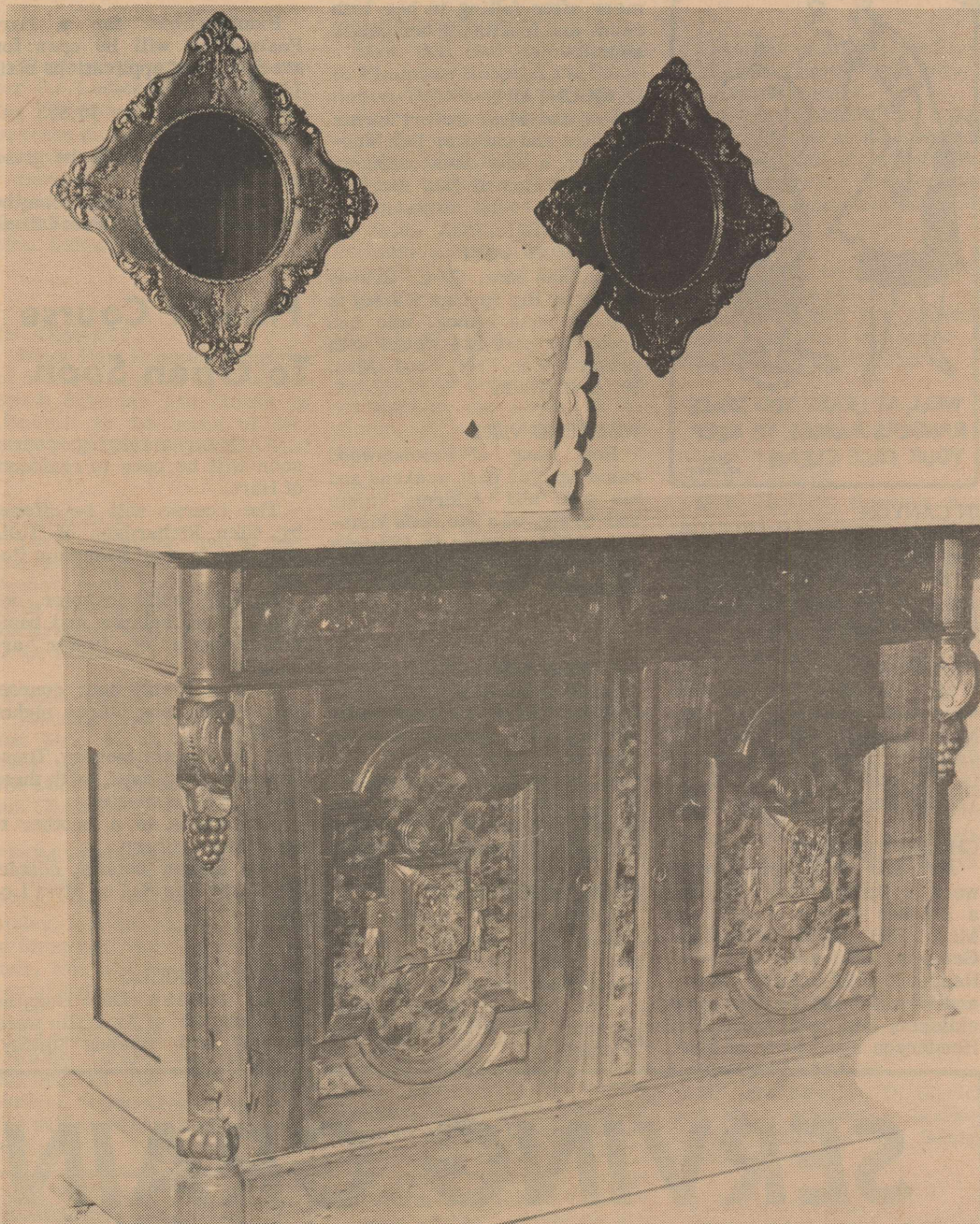
She showed a nut-and-leaf-designed chest over a hundred years old with a large lock on it.

Mrs. Burt explained that furniture must be as much as a 100 years old to be antique.

China ware must be at least 35 years old to be classed antique.

Some of the Burt's antiques are a large, full length mirror, two love seats and four chairs, two chests and sideboards, two desks, and assorted china and a hall tree.

Among the woods are walnut, oak, chestnut inlaid with butter-nut and worm-eaten walnut.

Several of the desks, chests, and mirrors precede the Civil War. The Burt's have been collecting, re-sanding and repairing the antique pieces for 15 years.

Mrs. Burt confessed that 15 years of sanding and oiling and rebuilding furniture has taken away some of the charm.

She spends most of her time now showing the furniture to ever-stopping impressed visitors.

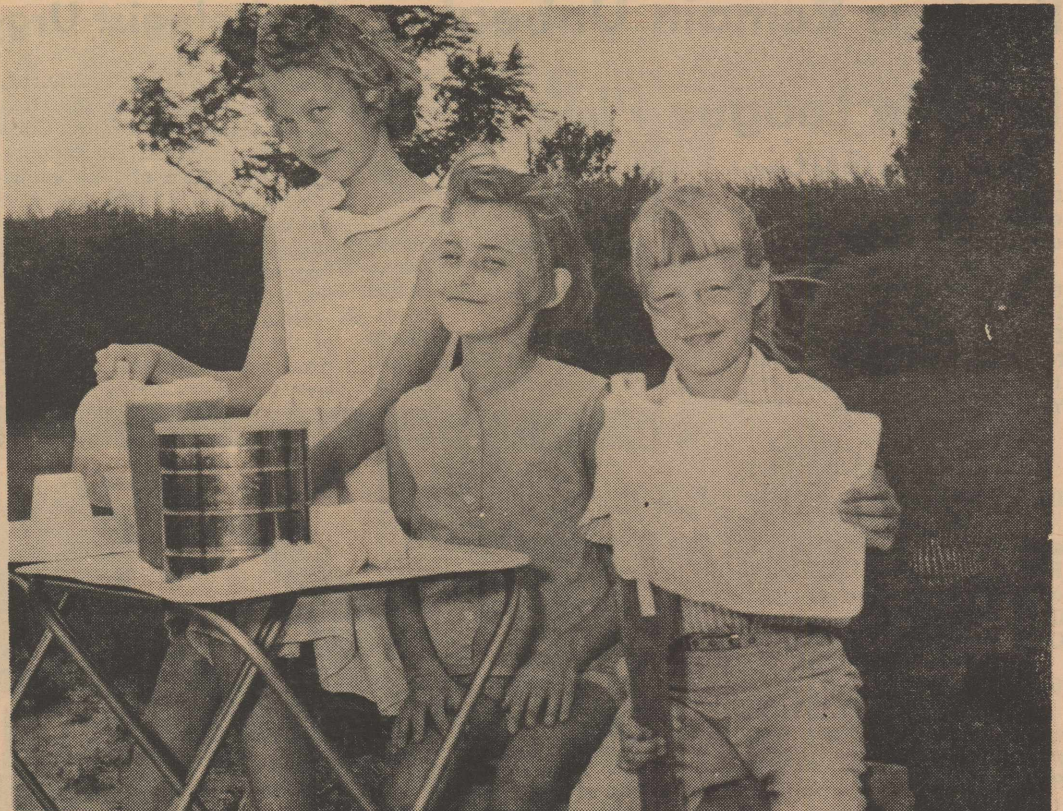

Redlegs Remain Unbeaten Hydrologist Urges Reuse Of Lake Water

In Little League Play

Hart's Redlegs Little League team remains unbeaten in five outings, having won four, lost one and tied one.

Included among Redleg victories are a 10-4 win over Hart Colt 45's, 19-9 over the Dimmitt Gold Sox, 9-8 over Nazareth's Cardinals and a 19-18 triumph over Nazareth's Yankees.

The tie game was 4-4 with the Dimmitt Braves, called because of a 9:30 p.m. curfew.

Winning pitchers for the Redlegs have been Gary Rambo, Mark Porter, M. J. Janek and Billy Sanders.

Games between the Redlegs and the Colts and Redlegs and Gold Sox have been rained out.

W. L. "Bill" Broadhurst, chief hydrologist for the High Plains underground water Conservation District, is encouraging the reuse of lake water.

He said in a statement this week that now would be an excellent time for lake owning farmers to think seriously about installing a pump and pipeline.

He added, "It's true that most of the cropland does not at this time need additional moisture; however, there are areas where

the rain fell so fast that most of the water ran off."

Broadhurst gave these reasons for installing the pipe system:

1. Runoff water that collects in the lakes is generally the least expensive than can be developed.

2. Water that remains in the lakes is largely wasted because probably 90 percent evaporates.

3. A mosquito-breeding haven

is alleviated when lake water is used.

4. If the lake bottom is used as a pasture or some other income-producing endeavor, the lake water needs to be pumped from the lake as quickly as possible to prevent additional damage.

5. Lake water is probably more suitable than ground water for growing crops because of its warmer temperature.
