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C-City Schools Praised

'Workin' Teacher From Michigan Visits Classes

Douglas Halstead, young teacher in a consolidated school at Messick, Michigan, left Colorado City early Friday with high praise for Colorado Independent Schools as he observed them during a "workin' here."

"The reading program in the Colorado system is really something," he said with enthusiasm.

"Work being done at Primary School by Mrs. (Austin) McCloud is, for instance, an outstanding achievement," he added.

In his first year as teacher of science for seventh grade and for twelfth grade students in Messick Schools, Halstead admits that his major concern is the lack of a program designed for the "slow learner" in his system at Messick (pronounced Mee-zick).

graduate of Grand Rapids School of Bible and Music and holds his bachelor of art degree from Michigan State University at East Lansing.

He speaks very seriously of his interest in the slow-to-learn child. He thinks that special interest stems from his own early school experience.

"I did not learn to read until I was in the fourth grade," he said, "and I'm not dumb. I just didn't learn to read under the old method until my fourth year in school and it was humiliating, young as I was," he explained.

Asked why he chose to spend his "workin'" observing Colorado City public schools he cited the fact that the social-economic background here is similar to that in the six-county Michigan area seeking progress under Impact 7, and he sought a non-metropolitan area.

Halstead chose Colorado City, he said, because he wanted to see reading teacher aids in action; because the grouping program struck him as practical and a help to the slow, average, and the accelerated learner; and because he wanted to learn more about special education as it is offered here.

"Both our high school and junior high school buildings are new, just two years old," Halstead said. "The consolidated district has all the most marvelous equipment for shop and for science laboratories. Yet absolutely no program for the slow learner - sometimes referred to as the under-achiever. No reading program at all for junior high or high school students, some of whom still need such a program."

"We need a program to help solve problem learning," the science teacher said as he praised work in classes he

observed here. Mostly, he just dropped in to see what he came to see, he added, and consulted teachers and school administrators.

He was admittedly "fascinated" with the science packs in use at Colorado City schools. "They're great for individualized teaching and learning," he said noting that he will include the science packs in his report to the Messick School Board, along with reading aids and special education.

During his "workin'" Halstead decided, "Your students seem to have more respect for authority here. It both startled and pleased him to hear "the kids answer with Sir," he said.

In addition to his school visits and observations, Halstead apparently found "More than usual friendliness all over your town and county. People here, your

people, are all so friendly," he said as he talked of a visit at Rendenbrook - Spade Ranch and visits in several homes.

Asked about the differences in his part of Michigan and in this part of Texas he answered "Well, for one thing we've had 40 inches of snow since Thanksgiving and here I am in a short-sleeved sports shirt!"

Messick is in the heart of the "Christmas tree country," Halstead said, and one of its major industries is the shipping of holiday trees all over the nation. Many are trucked into Texas where there is a market for firs, and the various pine varieties. Other trees are grown for pulp wood but there is no agriculture in the sandy soil around Messick.

It is, rather, a sportsman's ideal spot with hunting, fishing, water skiing, and beautiful trails for horseback riding.

Penney's Plans To Close Store

Penney's store in Colorado City is to close its doors July 26 after 40 years.

Persistent rumors that the company planned to close its store here were verified Thursday in a formal statement issued to the Colorado City Record and to Radio Station KVMC.

That statement, issued under a Colorado City dateline, follows:

"R. G. Randall, district manager for J. C. Penney Company, Inc., announced today (Thursday) that the firm's store at 127 East Second Street (Colorado City) will be closed at the end of business July 26.

"We regret leaving Colorado City where we have spent many pleasant years serving our customers," Randall said, "but the economics of the situation just don't permit us to continue.

People want - and should expect to find - complete stocks of merchandise in every Penney store. This is not possible in the case of our store here because it is not large enough to offer the selection of merchandise needed to properly serve the market.

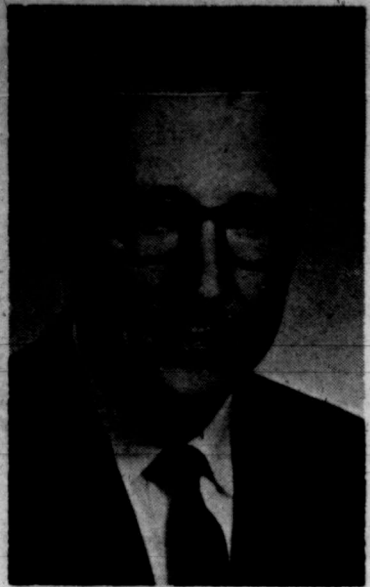
"So, after a careful survey which weighed all the factors involved, the Penney Company reluctantly decided to close the store rather than risk disappointing our customers or lowering our standards of service. Naturally, this decision was taken with the deepest regret because we appreciate the way our customers have responded through the years to our efforts to serve them well with Penney values in good merchandise."

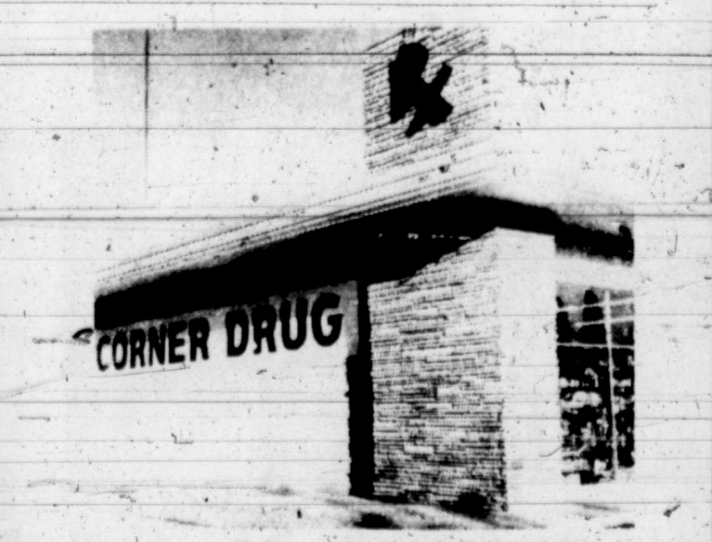

Proper Grazing Hints From SCS

"Ranchers in the Mitchell SWCD have a problem that must be answered in the next few weeks. The problem is the proper use of available grass on our rangeland," said Giles Birchum, Range Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service.

"What is proper grazing? Proper grazing use is the management of our livestock to graze to percent of the current year's growth of our key grass plants. By grazing 50 percent of the grass, we have enough left to protect the soil from erosion and have a good start next spring," Birchum added.

"High winter feed bill or a high vet bill due to lack of adequate roughage can be lowered if cattlemen manage

cattle so as not to overgraze. The more grass left to carry over into the winter, the less hay or cake will be needed. Sufficient grass left to carry over, also lowers the sickness that normally occurs with rangeland that is abused," explained Birchum.

"The easiest proper grazing way is to stock at a rate that is in balance with the amount of grazing available. Another way is to distribute livestock over the ranch in order that none of the pastures are abused. Distribution can be achieved by cross fencing, water develop-ment, or the location of salt areas," he said.

In 1967 ranchers in the Mitchell SWCD achieved proper grazing use on 270,500 acres.

HCJC Designated Named Test Center

Howard County Junior College, Big Spring has been designated as a test center for administering the National Teacher Examinations on April 12, 1969, Wayne Bonner, Guidance Director Howard County Junior College, Big Spring, announced Wednesday.

College seniors preparing to teach and teachers applying for positions in school systems which encourage or require applicants to submit their scores on the National Teacher Examinations along with their other credentials are eligible to take the tests. Last year more than 98,000 candidates took the examinations, which are prepared and administered by Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New Jersey.

Designation of HCJC as a test center for these examinations will give prospective teachers in this area an opportunity to

compare their performance on the examinations with candidates throughout the country who take the tests, Bonner said.

At the one-day session a candidate may take the Comm-n Examinations, which include tests in Professional Education and General Education, and one of the fifteen Teaching Area Examinations, which are designed to evaluate his understanding of the subject matter and methods applicable to the area he may be assigned to teach.

Bulletins of Information describing registration procedures and containing Registration Forms may be obtained from Bonner, HCJC, or directly from the National Teacher ing Service, Box 911, Princeton, New Jersey 08540. Prospective teachers planning to take the tests should obtain their Bulletins of Information promptly, Bonner advised.

A NEW WEDDING RING

Wedding rings have a long and colorful history of romance over the centuries. The first rings to symbolize "togetherness" might have been nothing more than woven grass or leather thongs. Today, they may be as elaborate as you like. It wasn't until the 15th century that two rings - one for the betrothal, the other for the marriage rite - came into vogue. It was also in the next century that rings for both the bride and groom came to be an accepted part of the wedding ritual. This was mainly a custom among German and Scandinavian people.

In Colonial times, wedding rings of gold were rather wide bands, and some, called "keeper rings" were set with small diamonds, usually in a cluster, but sometimes in a round "hoop". In this century, wedding rings in the 1930's and 40's were often of platinum or white gold, and much narrower than those of the Victorian era. Sometimes a delicate chasing of orange blossoms decorated the simple band.

While it used to be traditional that the bride never removed her wedding ring, today, modern wives find that a wardrobe of rings is more appropriate to her way of life. For active sports and daily household activities, the plain band is still in good taste. But for dressier occasions, or to match a lovely diamond engagement ring, a diamond wedding band is preferred. Other bands, sometimes of carved jade, are also popular. If your bride already has one wedding band, or if it is showing signs of wear, do consider giving her another this Christmas, especially if now you are better able financially to give her the diamond band she has always wanted.


