SINCLAIR, DAY FACE NEW CHARGES

100 DOCTORS EXPECTED TO ATTEND MEET HERE

Members of the Runnels County Medical Association and their wives, local druggists and their wives have just about completed arrangements for the annual convention of the Fourth District Medical Association, to be held in Ballinger on Monday and Tuesday, November 7-8.

The plans call for plenty of entertainment for the visiting physicians, who are expected to total between 75 and 100, with some of the most prominent doctors of the state on the program for the two-day session.

The meetings will be held in the American Legion auditorium, and it is expected that full attendance will be recorded at each of the sessions.

Dr. J. W. Tottenham, of Brownwood, is president of the association; Dr. T. Richard Sealy, of Santa Anna, councillor; and Dr. J. G. Douglass, of this city, secretary. Dr. Douglass has been arranging the program for this convention and it is declared to be one of the best ever offered the district medical organization.

About 15 or 16 counties of this section of Texas will be represented at the gathering.

Milliken Gets a Twenty-four Hour Respite

HUNTSVILLE, Nov. 4.—A. V. Milliken, condemned slayer of Mrs. Virginia Petty, San Antonio real estate dealer, scheduled to die in the electric chair this morning, was granted a 24-hour respite at 5 o'clock this morning, after his head had been shaved and preparations were completed for the execution.

Gov. Dan Moody granted the stay in order to permit Judge W. E. Hawkins, defense attorney, to go to Texarkana to present motions to Federal Judge Lee Estes there.

Three other federal judges have refused to intervene.

Nalls, Baptist preacher, charged by indictments in Alabama with kidnapping, has fled from that state and is now thought to be in either Longview, Plainview or Abilene, Texas, where he is reported to have made application for pastorates, according to telegram today to Gov. Dan Moody from Charles C. McCall, attorney general of Alabama.

The governor has asked peace officers to be on the lookout for Nalls.

WILL WAGE WAR ON ROAD HOUSES

AUSTIN, Nov. 4.—War upon road-houses in Texas will be declared in the near future.

This was disclosed here by Attorney General Claude Pollard, who had a conference with Gov. Dan Moody on padlocking these resorts by injunctions.

Several road houses, within the past few days, have been raided by state rangers and closed because of alleged violation of the state's anti-gambling laws.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The government formally accused Harry F. Sinclair, multi-millionaire oil magnate, and A. Mason Day, vice-president of one of Sinclair's companies, today with conspiring to influence the jury in the Fall-Sinclair oil conspiracy case which resulted in a mistrial a few days ago.

Warrants followed Day's refusal to answer questions concerning the activities of the Burns detectives, in justice McCoy's court.

On the ground "it might incriminate me," Day was arrested and taken before the United States commissioner and released on \$25,000 bond.

A motion calling upon H. M. Blackmer, missing witness in the Fall-Sinclair conspiracy trial to the strenuous efforts on the part show cause why he should not be of the federal authorities to locate missing witnesses.

Subpoenas have been issued for Sheldon W. Clark, vice-president of the Sinclair Refining Company, and a former Burns Detective Agency official who is reported to have hurriedly left the capital taking important office files from the Burns agency here.

Inquiries have been made at the state department to learn if this agent applied for a passport.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, and Albert B. Fall, former secretary of interior, must stand trial a second time on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government in the leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve.

On a petition of the government's counsel, Justice Frederick Siddons this morning set the date for the new trial on January 16.

NEW RADIO APPARATUS
GUARANTEES PRIVACY

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—A radio
sending and receiving apparatus
that guarantees privacy in con-
versations has been perfected by
the Bell Telephone Laboratories,
it was announced here at the
convention of the Independent Tele-
phone Association.

Listening in on the new device
results merely in the outsider's
hearing an unintelligible jumble
of sound although the person at
the right receiver receives the
conversation clearly and distin-
guishably.

An artificial larynx which will
enable persons who have lost
their vocal cords through opera-
tions to talk again was exhibited.
A small "receiver" for teaching
the deaf to "hear" again was dis-
played at the convention. The
device has five miniature indi-
vidual receivers which are placed
upon the finger tips. When a
word is spoken there is a definite
rhythm of vibrations recorded by
the receivers and as soon as the
deaf person learns to understand
these rhythms ordinary conversa-
tion may be "heard."

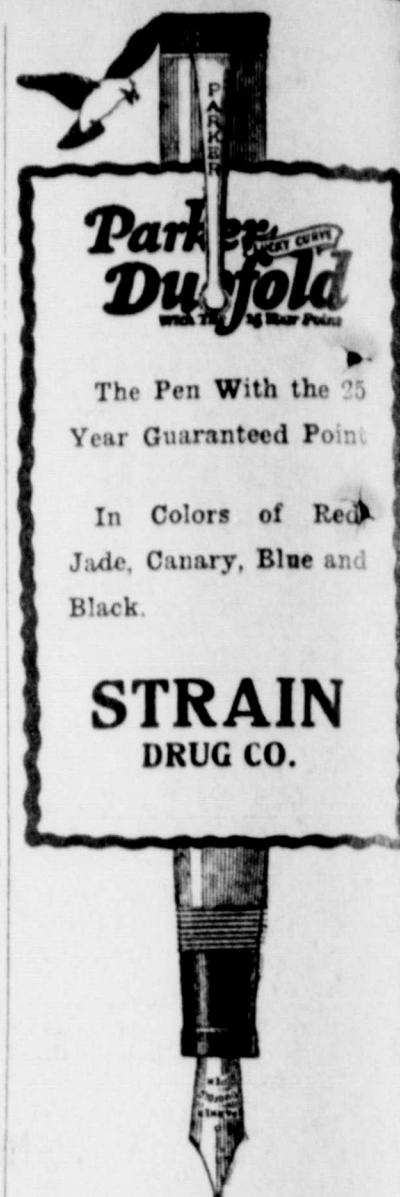

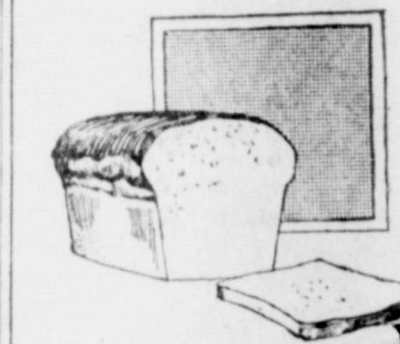

aided in this bear raid by not
giving the grade of the carry-
over and by using figures from
interested sources which are not
justified in official reports, or
justified by good faith towards
the farmers. Not only this, but
the statement was given out
authoritatively that present indi-
cations pointed to lower cotton
prices, while every indication
pointed to higher prices, and
higher prices already had come
by reason of the short crop and
increased consumption.

"The cotton gamblers seized
upon these government state-
ments as an excuse to keep the
price down until the cotton leaves
the farmers' hands—they then
expect to put the price up and
reap the benefits of higher prices
on spots and continue the con-
stant fluctuations so necessary
for the existence of the ex-
changes.

"Every indication points to
higher prices in the future, but it
is impossible to tell how soon bet-
ter prices will be realized, as
gamblers control the cotton mar-
ket. They could put the price up
this year easier than they can
keep it down, and started out to
do this and had put it up to 25
cents for cotton of good quality
when the short crop was re-
ported. Since the prediction of
lower cotton prices by the secre-
tary of agriculture, followed by
his large carry-over estimate,
there seems to have been a con-
spiracy framed up to rob the
farmers, as the price has con-
tinued to decline without any
real cause.

"These conditions would seem
to justify a thorough investiga-
tion of this whole matter, and the
abolishment of the gambling
features of the exchanges, and
all agencies that are used to
depress prices of the farmers'
products."
