Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

1st Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

HOW TO PULL IN HARNESS.

One advantage that comes from having worked long hours with a team of horses (as a youngster in East Texas) is that you learn how important it is for them to pull together under proper control. If one horse pulls against the other, the whole rig can turn over, and it is also possible for both horses to bolt down the road and put the wagon in the ditch. These thoughts occurred to me as I listened to the President's speech a week ago today. Congress must cooperate with the Administration; we must not oppose the President for the sake of partisan opposition, but, on the other hand, cooperation must be thoughtful and deliberate, certainly not an outburst of rash enthusiasm. The main thing to keep in mind is the interest of the people of the United States — where we should be headed and how to get all of us there in one piece, with fair treatment for each segment of the economy, without discrimination or favoritism, and without irreparable damage to the free enterprise system.

SOME CORRECTIONS ARE NEEDED.

The Administration made a serious mistake in failing to bring all elements of the economy under the freeze orders announced on August 15. If working people and small businessmen are expected to give their full-fledged patriotic backing to this program, it is only right that such items as excessive and exorbitant interest rates and exorbitant corporate profits be subjected to the same scrutiny and controls as are all other prices and wages in the economy. I hope the Administration will correct its mistakes in this area and bring the banks and other lenders under Phase Two of the plan which is now being worked out.

AIRPORT DEVELOPMENT is very necessary to economic progress, and the Congress has provided \$250 million for the 1972 Fiscal Year to help cities and counties establish or improve airport facilities. Texas ranks third among the states in funds allocated with a total of \$11.7 million. While \$5.2 million of this sum has already been awarded to 28 Texas cities and counties, the remaining \$6.5 million is still available for eligible projects. MEDICAL SCHOOLS FORCED TO TURN AWAY QUALIFIED APPLICANTS. Recent statistics from the American Medical Association show that about 12,000 first-year students will start medical school this fall — less than 50% of the 26,000 who applied for admission. Officials of the Association of American Medical Colleges estimate, how-

Austin. — A major court decision last week left up in the air the question of how Texas is to achieve a valid reapportionment act for both houses of its legislature before next year.

State Supreme Court agreed with an August 2 Austin district court finding that a House redistricting bill passed this year is unconstitutional because it unnecessarily split up 23 counties.

The decision left unanswered how the bill should be corrected or if it should be redone before 1973. Basic questions are there:

● Should House reapportionment and state Senate redistricting (left untouched by the Legislature) be the subject of an emergency special session?

● Should the five-member constitutional Legislative Redistricting Board take on the job, since no valid reapportionment was done by the Legislature in the first regular session after the 1970 census?

● Should the Legislature forget about reapportionment before 1971 elections and wait until the 1973 census statistics are all complete and published?

Gov. Preston Smith and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin once more are on opposite sides of a controversy.

Smith says the Redistricting Board has the "duly constituted responsibility" under the constitution to redistrict, and a special legislative session on reapportionment would be unnecessarily costly.

Martin stated in a brief before the Supreme Court a special session "would seem the only correct possibility, but this, too, could become the subject of litigation."

A High Court ruling in another case challenging the Redistricting Board's authority may hold the key as to whether it can proceed, whether the Legislature must take over now or check the task until 1973.

A note of urgency is injected into the issue by the fact the Board is directed by the constitution to do whatever it is going to do by late October. Furthermore, legislative candidates appear to face a November 7 deadline for establishing residence in the district they choose to represent.

ANTI-POLLUTION PERMIT USED — Texas Air Control Board has put into operation a far-reaching construction permit system to help control and prevent air pollution.

Since August 30, any industry that will emit air contaminants into the atmosphere must get a permit before starting any construction. Similar permits are necessary to modify or change existing contaminant-causing facilities.

Permits apply to specific, individual manufacturing processes, not entire industrial plants or complexes. Exceptions for minor contaminant-causing plans will be listed later. Applicants have 60 days after construction is completed to apply for operating permits.

HEALTH STUDY ON — New studies to find ways of meeting

health service, staff and facility needs of Texas' rural population will be undertaken by the Research Institute for Systems Development at Texas A&M University.

The study will be conducted in the West Central Texas area, centered around Abilene which has both rural and urban characteristics typical of many regions.

Fewer than half of Texas' 592 hospitals meet federal medicare requirements for health and safety, so the project will focus on health facilities and services considered below medicare standards. Texas has more than twice as many qualified hospitals as any other state.

150 MILLION BOND ISSUE POSTPONED — University of Texas regents postponed until October 22 consideration of an overall plan for marketing the first block of \$150 million in bonds authorized for new college construction.

About \$30 million in bonds apparently will be sold by December. They are backed by tuition revenues. Money will go to build new institutions of UT at San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Odessa and El Paso. The bonds were authorized by the 62nd Legislature this year to build newly authorized institutions.

DAM AUTHORIZED — In spite of opposition by landowners, Texas Water Rights Commission voted to permit construction of a dam on Martin's Creek in Rusk County by three electric power companies.

Dallas Power and Light Company, Texas Electric Service Company and Texas Power and Light Company plan to build the dam 17 miles northeast of Henderson for a major power plant.

Landowners expressed fear the lake created by the dam would flood their pastures, destroy timber and prevent Martin's Creek from continuing to provide water for livestock. The companies pledged to try and prevent or mitigate damage.

D. A. STUDY PENAL CODE — District and county attorneys have launched their own committee study of needed changes in the penal code. They fought a sweeping, controversial revision of the code during the legislative session this year.

District Attorney Tom Hanna of Beaumont was selected as chairman of the committee in the first meeting last week. Prosecutors indicated they prefer a simplified, "more responsive" new code to the version introduced in the 1971 Legislature which had been five years in the making.

This event is identified with National Highway Week and the honored guest will be Assistant State Highway Engineer B. L. DeBerry and Mrs. DeBerry. Banquet tickets are available to the public through members of the Bogata Chamber of Commerce.

B. L. DeBerry, assistant State highway engineer of Texas, was born in Bogata, in 1914. He attended public schools there and received a B. S. degree in civil engineering from the University of Texas.

Immediately after graduation in 1937, he joined the Texas Highway Department as an instrumentman in Sherman. Later, he worked in Paris, Clarksville and Greenville.

DeBerry was on leave of absence during World War II, serving with both the U. S. Corps of Engineers and with the U. S. Navy.

In 1946, he became the department's resident engineer at Lufkin, and was promoted to senior resident engineer at Greenville in 1950.

Three years later, he was named assistant district engineer at San Antonio and became district engineer at Lufkin in 1958.

In April, 1960, Mr. DeBerry was named district engineer in Dallas. For more than seven years he directed one of the five largest highway construction programs in the history of the department.

He was named assistant State highway engineer on January 1, 1968, serving as the first assistant to State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall in the administration of the 68-thousand-mile State maintained Texas highway system.

Mr. DeBerry and his wife, Pauline, have a daughter, Mrs. Thomas H. Moore of Lufkin. He is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers and of the Christian Church.

Cotton Harvest Gains Momentum

Cotton harvest gained momentum rapidly last week. Most of the samples received so far this season at the USDA, Cotton Division Classing Office in Dallas were ginned in Ellis and Hill counties. Roy W. Gilreath, Officer in Charge, said 1,773 samples were classed last week. Added to the 78 previously classed, the season total came to 1,851.

For the week ending Sept. 10, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted was the predominant grade, accounting for 62 per cent of the cotton classed by the Consumer and Marketing Service at Dallas. Low Middling Light Spotted was next at 24 per cent. The only other grade accounting for more than five per cent was Middling Light Spotted. Most of the cotton classed was in two staple lengths: 15/16, 48 per cent and 29/32, 38 per cent.

Micronaire readings were comparatively high. The 3.5-4.9 range accounted for 42 per cent, 5.0-5.2, 38 per cent and 5.3 and above, 20 per cent.

Presley strength readings averaged 84,000 pounds per square inch. Six per cent was below 80,000 PSI. Fifty-two per cent 80-84,000 and 42 per cent 85,000 or higher.

Demand for cotton was very strong. The going price was 27.00-27.25 on a hog-round basis at most gin points.

Water Loan OK'd Bids To Be Opened At Detroit Sept. 30

Bids will be opened on Thursday, Sept. 30, 1971 at 2:00 p. m. in the new Agri. Building at Detroit High School for the 410 Water Supply Corporation. Construction on the project will start at a future date after awarding of the contract. A \$259,000 loan and \$70,000 loan to the 410 Water Supply Corp. of Red River County to build a rural community water system has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration. The loan will enable the association to initially supply water to 250 rural homes.

An Ordinance

Regulating the Keeping of Dogs in the City of Talco: Requiring the Vaccination of All Dogs kept in the City. Providing for the Impounding of certain dogs found running at large: Establishing a City Dog Pound. Providing for Fees for the Redemption of Dogs so Impounded: Providing for the Destruction of Dogs not so redeemed by the owner: Prescribing the Duties of a Dog-Catcher: Declaring it a Nuisance and a Misdemeanor to Keep Dogs Under Certain Conditions. Providing for the Enforcement of This Ordinance: Providing for a Severance Clause: Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict with this Ordinance: and Providing a Penalty for the Violation of the Ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Talco:

SECTION 1: DEFINITIONS. The following words and phrases as used in this ordinance shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section unless otherwise indicated:

AT LARGE shall mean off the premises of the owner and not under the control of the owner, or a member of his immediate family either by leash, cord, chain or not constrained securely within an enclosure or fence; and the wearing of a muzzle by a dog shall not be regarded as control under this definition.

CURRENT VACCINATION shall mean a vaccination for rabies given within a period not exceeding the last 12 months.

SECTION 2: VACCINATION AGAINST RABIES. It shall be the duty of the owner or keeper of each and every dog kept in the City of Talco to have such dog vaccinated against rabies by a practicing veterinarian at least once each 12 months; and upon such vaccination, the veterinarian shall deliver to the owner a metal tag which may be affixed to a collar to be worn by the dog, which tag shall contain sufficient information whereby the dog-catcher of the city can determine whether or not such vaccination is a current vaccination. Also, the veterinarian shall keep a written record, which shall show the owner of the dog, the number of the vaccination on the tag, and when vaccinated, and shall, from time to time, deliver copies of this record to the City Dog-Catcher.

SECTION 3. DOG POUND. The City shall provide a suitable place for the impounding of all dogs picked up under the provisions of this ordinance and such pound shall be under his control, or under the control of such person as it may designate. All dogs placed in the pound shall be properly fed and cared for while in the pound.

SECTION 4: POUND FEES. (a). A fee of \$5.00 shall be charged for each dog legally impounded in the Pound; and in addition thereto, a fee of \$1.50 for each day such dog remains in the Pound. No fee shall be charged where owner delivers dog to Dog-Catcher.

(b). The owner of any dog legally impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to destruction by paying the fees above provided for. In the event the dog has not been properly vaccinated prior to redemption, the owner must agree to have the dog vaccinated by a licensed veterinarian within 24 hours after the redemption.

SECTION 5. DISPOSITION OF IMPOUNDED DOGS. Any dog placed in the City Pound in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance shall be kept so impounded for a period of 72 hours; and if not redeemed with-

in said period of time, the City shall thereupon become the owner of the dog and shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs in the Pound after said period of time. Any dog delivered by owner may be killed immediately.

SECTION 6: DOG-CATCHER. The City of Talco shall appoint a Dog-Catcher and such other assistants as may be required. It shall be the duty of the Dog-Catcher to take up and impound all dogs which may be found in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, and to place the same in the Dog Pound, and to do and perform such other duties as may be delegated to him by the City Council.

SECTION 7: DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE: With the exception of female dogs in heat, vicious dogs, or dogs that have been bitten by a rabid animal, the City is not requiring that dogs be kept within an enclosure or otherwise confined if said dog wears a vaccination tag showing that it has been currently vaccinated, as that term is herein defined. However, the Dog-Catcher is hereby given authority to pick up any dog running at large for the purpose of determining if it has been currently vaccinated; and if the dog has a proper tag and it is determined that the dog has been currently vaccinated, the dog shall be released where captured and without any cost. Any dog not wearing a current vaccination tag shall be carried to the Pound; and if the owner shall furnish proof within the 72 hour period following the impounding that the dog has been currently vaccinated, and pay the pound fees, the dog shall be released at the pound to the owner; otherwise, the dog shall be disposed of as herein provided.

SECTION 8: PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE: Any person who violates or fails to comply with any provision or provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$100.00; and any person who shall aid, abet or assist in the violation of any provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$100.00.

SECTION 9: REPEAL. This ordinance repeals all other ordinances, or parts of ordinances, of the City of Talco in conflict herewith.

SECTION 10: SEVERANCE CLAUSE. The Provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be severable, and if any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections, sentences, clauses, or phrases of this ordinance, but they shall remain in force and effect, it being the legislative intent that this ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part.

SECTION 11: The ordinance

shall be effective from and after its passage and publication, and it shall be published BY CAPTION ONLY.

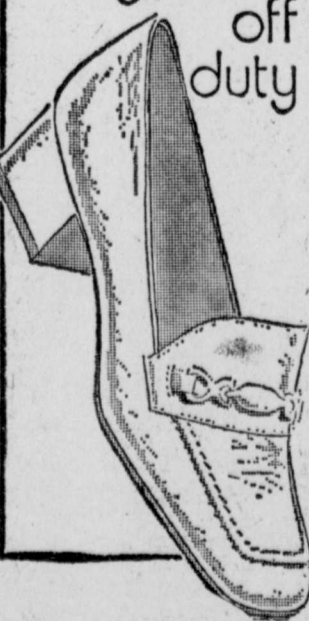

An Ordinance

Defining Vagrancy and Providing for a Curfew Hour for Persons Who Loaf and Loiter After the Hour of 12:00 P. M. in The City of Talco and Providing for Punishment for Violation of Said Ordinance and Making It a Misdemeanor to Violate Said Ordinance, Provision for the Enforcement of This Ordinance, Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict With This Ordinance and Providing a Penalty for the Violation of This Ordinance.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TALCO:

SECTION 1: VAGRANCY - GENERALLY.

(a). The following persons are and shall be punished as vagrants:

(1). Persons known as tramps, wandering or strolling about in idleness, who are able to work and have no property to support them.

(2). Persons leading an idle, immoral or profligate life, who have no property to support them, and who are able to work and do not work.

(3). All persons able to work, who have no property to support them, and who have no visible or known means of a fair, honest and reputable livelihood.

(4). All able-bodied persons who loaf and loiter in the City after the hours of 12:00 P. M.

(5). Persons trading or bartering stolen property.

(6). Every common gambler or person who for the most part maintains himself by gambling.

(7). All companies of Gypsies, who, in whole or in part, maintain themselves by telling fortunes.

(8). Every able-bodied person who shall go begging for a livelihood.

(9). Every common prostitute.

(10). Every able-bodied person who lives without employment or labor, and who has no visible means of support.

(11). All persons who are able to work and do not work, but hire out their minor children, or allow them to be hired out, and live upon their wages, being without other means of support.

(12). All persons over sixteen (16) years of age and under twenty-one (21) years of age, able to work and who do not work and have no property to support them, and have not some known, visible means of a fair, honest and reputable livelihood, and whose parents, or those in loco parentis, are unable to support them, and who are not in attendance upon some educational institution.

(13). All persons who advertise and maintain themselves in whole or in part as clairvoyants or fortunetellers of future events, or as having supernatural knowledge with respect to present or future conditions, transactions, happenings or events.

(14). All male persons who habitually associate with prostitutes, or habitually loiter in or around houses of prostitution, or who, without having visible means of support, receive financial aid or assistance from prostitutes.

(b). Every vagrant in the city shall, upon conviction, be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 2: PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Any person who violates or fails to comply with any provision or provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor; and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00, nor more than \$100.00; and any person who shall aid, abet, or assist in the violation of any provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1.00, nor more than \$100.00.

SECTION 3: REPEAL

This Ordinance repeals all other ordinances, or parts of ordinances, of the City of Talco in conflict herewith.

SECTION 4: This Ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage and publication, and it shall be published BY CAPTION ONLY.

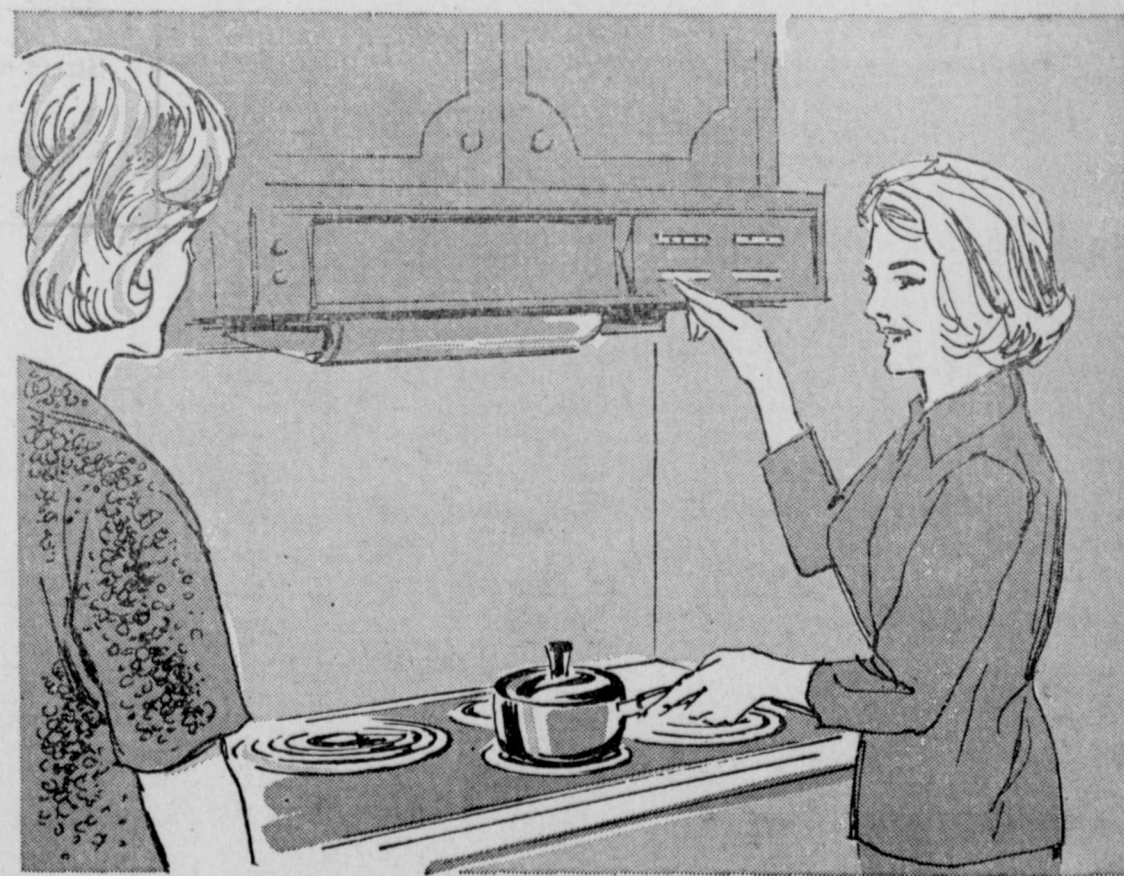
