Floyd 4-H'ers Vie For Horsemanship Honors

4-H'ers from Floyd County will be among 180 youngsters competing for a berth on the top 20 list of winners at the District 24-H Horse Show in Tulia June 24, according to County Extension Agent Doyle Warren. The winners of the district event will compete in the State 4-H Horse Show at Dallas in August.

The 4-H'ers are Ginger Henderson, Mona Henderson, Ronee Thornton, Karen Latimer, Gregg Taylor, Jim Waller, Deneen Johnson, Rhonda Bennett, Darla Assiter, Denise Johnson.

Alternates are Jay Waller, Marcia Fortenberry, Tonya Daniels.

Already winners of county competition, the youth will be competing in halter, showmanship and performance classes.

Site of this year's horse show is the Tulia Rodeo Arena in Tulia.

Last year, of 15 first place awards, 10 were won by girls, Warren added. Floyd County topped the 20 counties in District 2 to win highest point total honors.

Tom Gibbs of Wichita Falls and Douglas Wilson, Hardeman County Extension Agent from Quanah will serve as official judges for the 1974 contest. Superintendent will be Ken Cook, Swisher County Extension agent from Tulia.

Floyd Teenagers Spend \$1,530,000

NEW YORK, June 8 - Financially, Floyd County's teenagers have come into their own. They have wealth such as their parents never dreamed of at their age.

As a result, they have blossomed into a consumer group to be reckoned with.

With the unprecedented amount of money at their command, estimated at more than \$1,530,000 a year, they are being courted as never before by manufacturers and retail merchants through frequent changes of fashions and styles.

For the most part, it is found, what they have they spend - fast. The money doesn't get a chance to bore holes in their pockets.

It goes for the whole gamut of personal items and leisure activities that are important to them - beauty aids, jewelry, pop records, radios, cars, clothes, snacks, entertainment and the like.

In addition to what the young people in the local area spend on themselves, they exert a strong influence on family purchases.

The findings are based upon surveys and studies made by the Youth Research Institute and others.

The figures show that the 29 million teenagers in the United States are currently spending at the rate of \$24.7 billion a year, which averages out to about \$850 each.

In Floyd County, where the number of boys and girls in the 13 to 19 age group is now 1,800, according to the Census Bureau, this amounts to nearly \$1,530,000.

The poll taken by the Youth Research Institute shows that girls usually outspend the boys. Among the 13 to 15-year-olds it is at the rate of \$6.10 a week for the girls as against \$5.55 for the boys. At ages 16 to 19 the gap widens to \$18.90 a week versus \$17.85.

One reason for the freer spending on the part of girls is that they have bigger incomes. They are able to get jobs more easily than boys, especially

in the highly profitable baby sitting area.

Nationally, it is estimated, teenagers have a direct influence over nearly \$50 billion of family purchasing.

A graduate of the University of Oklahoma, Miss Carroll has studied at the Sherwood Music Conservatory in Chicago and at the Metropolitan Opera Studio in New York. In addition to her operatic roles, her appearances in the East have included performances in Lincoln Center, Carnegie Hall, and the Newport Festival.

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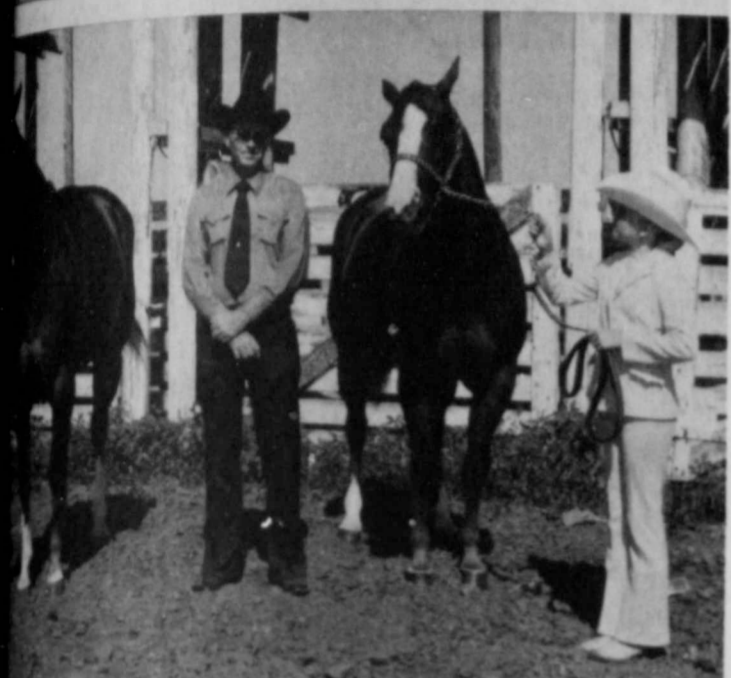
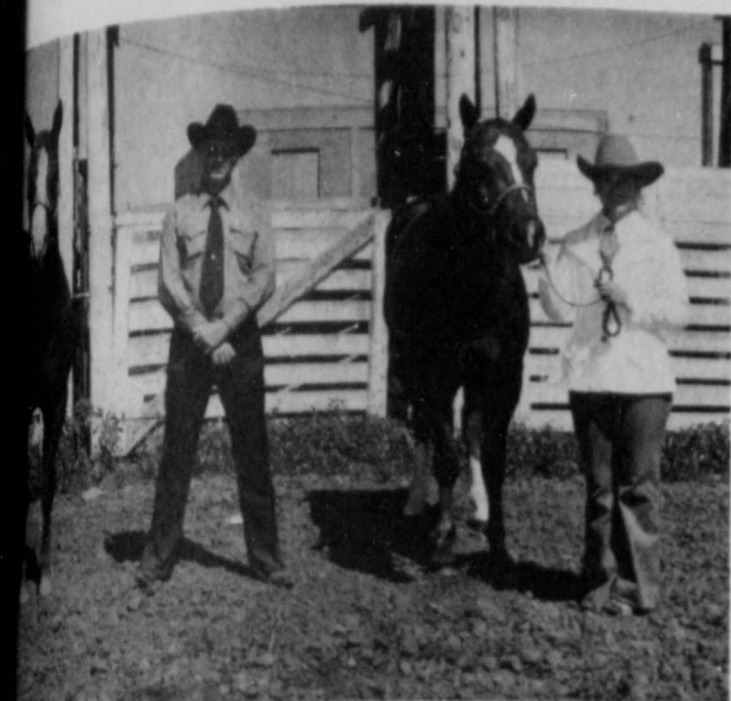
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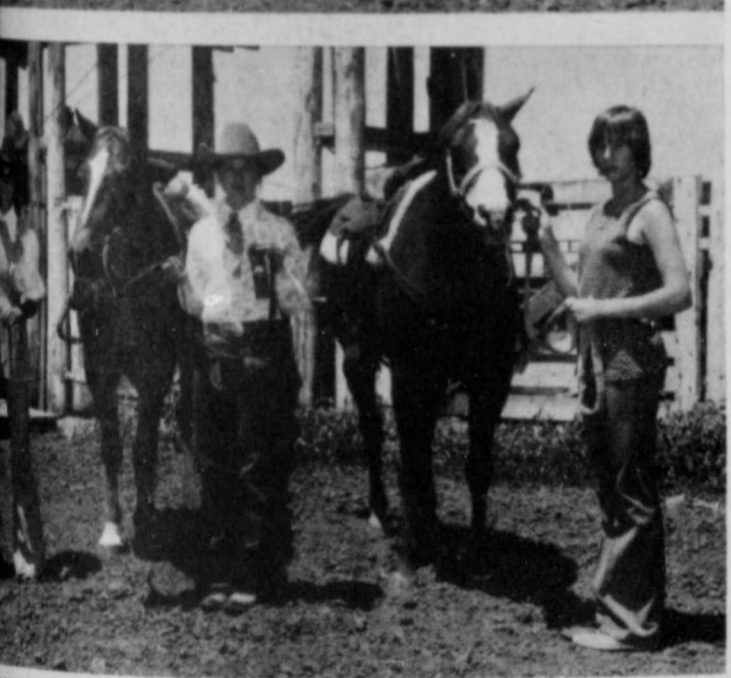

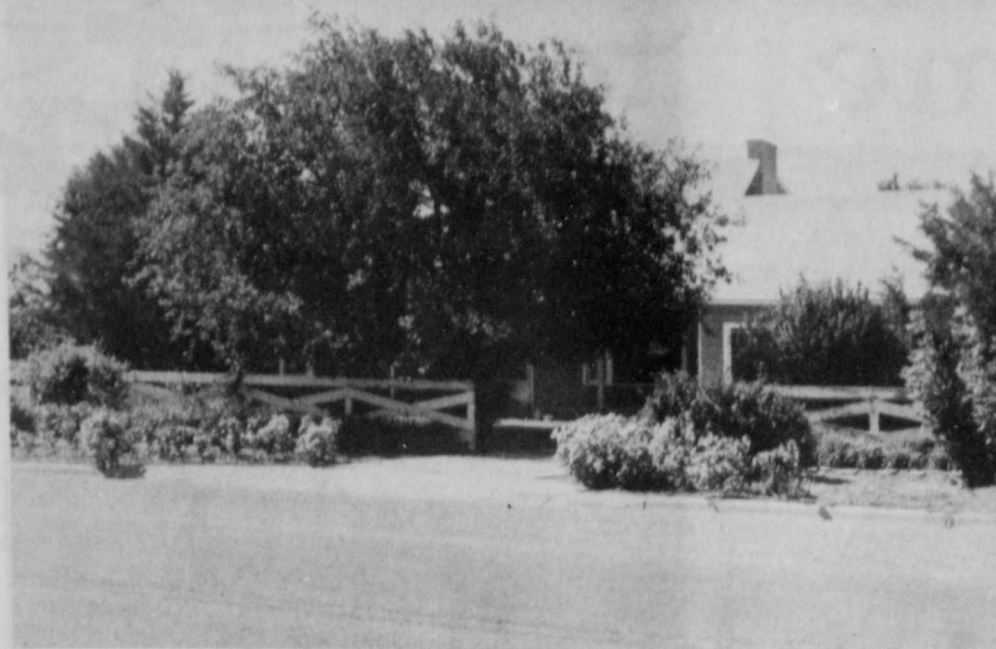

GI Student Check Speed Up Begins

The Veterans Administration has embarked on all-out program to insure prompt delivery of GI Bill education and training checks.

The 58 VA Regional Offices have been directed by Donald E. Johnson, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, to start recruiting and training programs for 1,300 VA "Men on Campus." Vet-Reps will be assigned

full-time to schools with large veteran enrollments and will assist in distributing GI student checks and serve as agency liaison in contacts with colleges and veteran-students.

The program, announced by the President, will involve expenditures of about \$2 million in the current fiscal year ending June 30, and more than \$24

million in the next fiscal year. The program was developed by a crack management team of VA and Office of Management and Budget officials in response to a Presidential directive of last March 31.

The new Vet-Reps will be available to college campuses, having large veteran enrollments in advance of the heavy Fall enrollment. Most Vet-Reps are expected

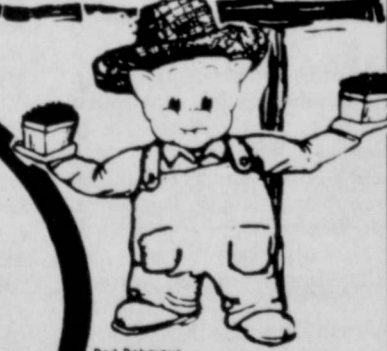

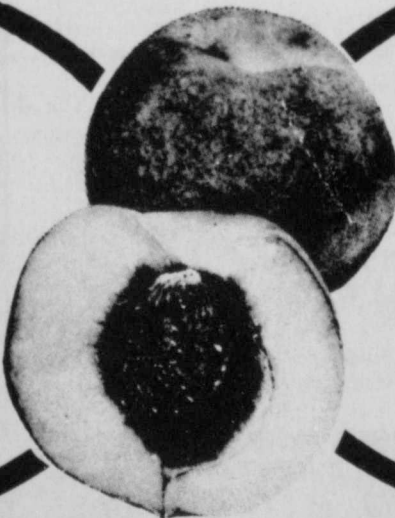

Diabled Vet Payment

Timetable Announced

The timetable for payment of increases to some 2.5 million service disabled veterans and dependents of veterans who died of service-connected disabilities was reported today by the Veterans Administration.

A new law (Public Law 93-295) signed by the President May 31, increased disability compensation payments to veterans by 15 to 18-percent, and dependency and indemnity compensation for widows and children by about 17 percent. The statute made the increases retroactive to last May 1.

A separate retroactive check covering the increases for the months of May and June will be sent by VA to the veterans and dependents by mid-July.

The regular monthly checks due next on July 1 will be paid at the old rate, but the new increases will be reflected in checks received August 1 and thereafter. VA officials emphasized

that no application or inquiry will be necessary to receive the increased amounts. The increases, they said, will be made by the agency automatically for veterans and dependents.

The new law boosts payments to veterans rated 10 to 50 percent disabled by VA by 15 percent, and those rated 60 to 100 percent disabled by 18 percent.

The monthly payment to single veterans with 10 percent disabilities goes up from \$28 to \$32. For veterans rated 100 percent disable under VA's general schedule the monthly sum is increased from \$495 to \$584. And for the most severely disabled veterans the maximum monthly amount is jumped from \$1,232 to \$1,454.

Veterans whose service-connected disabilities are rated 50 percent or more receive additional allowances if they have dependents. These added allowances are also increased under the new law by 15 percent.

Six May Rural Accidents In Floyd County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Floyd County during the month of May, 1974, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in five persons killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1974 shows a total of 20 accidents resulting in five persons killed and eight persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for May, 1974, shows a total of 406 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 218 persons injured as compared to May, 1973, with 550 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 318 persons injured. This was 144 less accidents, four more killed, and 100 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The traffic deaths for the month of May, 1974,

occurred in the following counties: five in Floyd; four each in Gray and Lubbock; two each in Cottle, Donley and Parker; and one each in Palo Pinto, Hardeman, Potter, Bailey and Randall counties.
