

Schools announce top scholars

The 2007-2008 top scholars at the three area schools have been announced.

Valedictorians and salutatorians for Colorado City, Westbrook and Loraine have been selected from their respective student bodies.

Graduation is Friday for all county schools.

Colorado City and Westbrook will graduate at 8 p.m. and Loraine's graduation starts at 7:30 p.m.

Colorado City

Working hard from the very beginning paid off in the long run as Sarah Smith took top honors as Colorado City's valedictorian for 2008 with a GPA of 99.774 out of 100 points. Catherine Dolan was named as the CHS salutatorian with a GPA of 99.460.

Smith said being valedictorian was something she knew she wanted to do since her freshman year.

"Start at the beginning," Smith advises freshmen. "Don't slack off your freshman year."

Graduating senior Tate Burleson was named Westbrook's Valedictorian with a grade point average of 3.936.

Senior Colton Nobles earned his place as salutatorian with a 3.754 grade point average.

Burleson is the son of Todd and Terri Burleson and plans to attend Texas A & M to pursue a bio-medical or physical therapy degree. "I'm not 100 percent sure," Burleson said about the degree programs. "But it seems like something I'd enjoy."

City council to discuss zoning policy at Thursday meeting

The City Council will meet in a called meeting Thursday evening at 6 p.m. at the Civic Center to discuss a variety of items, including recommendations from the Zoning Commission.

The public will have an opportunity to voice their opinions concerning multicolored electronic changeable message light emitting diode billboards within the city before the council hears the Zoning Commission's recommendations.

The Council will also meet in

executive session to discuss the City Manager's contract and meet with the city attorney regarding the Third Planet Wind Energy surface lease agreement.

New city council members will be sworn in and discussion of a workshop to review the Texas Development Community Planning Grant Project.

Council members will also discuss action on an addendum to the lease purchase agreement between Public Capital Corporation and the City of Colorado City.

Hospital board approves sell of home health service

The Mitchell County Hospital Board of Trustees approved the sale of Heart of West Texas Home Health to NursCare Home Health, a private entity during the regular meeting Tuesday evening. After hearing a presentation by Chris Gerard, president of Texas Health Management Group, the parent company of NursCare, the board unanimously approved the take over by the private business.

Gerard stressed that NursCare, a 9-year-old company currently operating in Bowie, Muleshoe, Tahoka, Slaton and Snyder, wants a smooth transition.

"We strive for three things: Maintaining the quality of patient care, a commitment to employees and a commitment to the

community," Gerard said. According to Gerard, the hospital will retain ownership during the interim period of five to eight months. The offered price of \$20,000 will be paid at closing.

After approving home health's change of hands, board vice president Jerry Reynolds asked, "If we couldn't make money at it (home health), why can they?"

Linda Mize, hospital administrator, replied, "They have money to pour into it that we don't have."

Dr. Dee Roach added, "It makes sense for both parties. We can't do it as well as they can do it; taking nothing away from our staff. They just do this and nothing else."

Commissioners approve development package

The Board of Economic Development asked the county commissioners to approve an economic development stimulus package at a called meeting Tuesday.

The commissioners approved an economic development grant not to exceed \$35,000 for the relocation of a family dental clinic.

The grant program allows the

board to offer a promissory note to recruit new companies to Mitchell County.

The amount of the note is dependent upon the number of employees/jobs the new company will provide. "We're all about jobs," said Sue Young, executive director of the Board of Economic Development.

The loan to the dental clinic will cover six years and the number of employees hired will act as credits toward that amount.

The board also asked the commissioners to award a commendation to Mike Burt for his years of service to Mitchell County. Burt, who resigned from the Economic Development Board, will be moving to San Angelo to be near his daughter.

"He's been a great asset to our board," said Woody Anderson.

Burt has served for over 15 years on the board and has served Colorado City as a tax assessor, appraiser, teacher, high school principal and mayor.

The commissioners approved a transfer of \$100,000 from Road and Bridge special fund to Precinct 2 to bring the fund up to balance and also approved a budget amendment to transfer \$1,000 from the concession

Colorado City welcomes new fireman on board

The Colorado City fire department welcomes its newest member, Chris Cloutier.

Cloutier is from North Brookfield, Massachusetts, and graduated from the San Angelo Fire Academy this month.

Previously, he was a fire fighter for ten months up north. "I originally joined because my wife and I have a lot of kids and we received lots of help from the community. We felt this was a way to give back to the community," Cloutier said.

He moved to Colorado City in October 07 to accept a position with the Colorado City department and began his training in San Angelo in January 08.

His wife, Erika and their five children, are still in Massachu-

settes. Cloutier said it has been rough being apart from his family. "The three year old is pining for daddy," he said.

The Cloutiers made the decision to split the family temporarily because, "we knew I wouldn't have a lot of time to devote to the family due to the academy," he said. "We decided as a unit."

Another factor in the decision was that the oldest daughter had just started competitive dance and the Cloutiers didn't want to take her out of her competition.

But the family will be reuniting in early summer. "It's 2200 miles," Cloutier said. "I'm waiting for the first 'are we there yet?'"

Cloutier said he heard about the opening in Colorado City

through his brother, Rick Goodney, second assistant fire chief. "He knew I had an interest and passion for it; so when the opportunity came up, he thought of me and offered me the position," Cloutier said.

Besides the obvious difference between Massachusetts and Texas - "they have snow" - Cloutier finds the folks in Colorado City more approachable and laid back.

"Up north people don't seem to put a lot of stock into morals and family values," he said. "When I came down here, I was very pleasantly surprised."

Cloutier said folks here put "more stock into being friendly with your neighbor, going to church and having the 'hey, you

need a hand, I'm there' attitude. Those are things you don't find up north."

A recent phone call with the wife revealed that the Cloutiers' neighbor put up a seven foot stockade fence "because she didn't want to look at us."

Cloutier said the pace here in Colorado City is nicer and that after two days here he felt like he was meant to be born in Texas instead of Massachusetts.

He is still amazed, however, at how a little bit of ice can cause wreck after wreck after wreck in

Runners carry torch for Special Olympics

The official looking police jeep following the runner along I-20 outside of Colorado City wasn't part of the police conditioning program for Odessa policemen. Instead Art Fuentes and his fellow officers were running for Texas Special Olympics. Fuentes, along with Larry Torres and Tommy Jones, would be running a mile each to "carry the Torch" as part of the Torch Run for the summer games.

The law enforcement officers, along with several other colleagues in support vehicles, were

making the trip to Arlington, where they will reunite with other officers from across the state to kick off the summer games. The Torch Run is Special Olympics' largest grass-roots fundraiser and public awareness vehicle, raising more than \$20.5 million for Special Olympics Programs around the world in 2004. More than 85,000 law enforcement officers carried the Flame of Hope across 35 nations, and thousands more supported the runners' efforts through "Adopt-A-Cop" runner sponsorships, corporate

sponsorships and Torch Run T-shirts (more than 400,000 sold) and other merchandise sales. At its most basic level, the Torch Run is an actual running event, begun in 1981 by Wichita, Kansas Police Chief Richard Lamunyon, in which officers and athletes run the "Flame of Hope" to the Opening Ceremonies of

local Special Olympics competitions, state/provincial Games, and National Summer or Winter Games. In Texas, the Law Enforcement Torch Run began in 1985 and has grown to become one of the largest in the nation. The mission of Special Olympics Texas is to provide year-

round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with intellectual disabilities (mental retardation), giving them continuing opportunities to

develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in the sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community.

Economic stimulus checks target of new scam

Spring brings tax refunds and rebates, as well as a new wave of scam artists intent on bilking unsuspecting people out of their money.

The newest scam centers on the upcoming rebates and economic stimulus packages and comes in the form of phone calls, emails and even letters.

According to the IRS website, a scheme in which a tax refund form is e-mailed, supposedly by the Taxpayer Advocate Service (a genuine and independent organization within the IRS which assists taxpayers with unresolved problems), is particularly blatant in the amount and type of information it requests.

The top of the form tells the re-

ipient that they are eligible for a tax refund for a specified amount. The form asks for name, address and phone number and a substantial amount of financial information, such as bank account number, credit card number and expiration date, ATM PIN number and more.

It also asks for mother's maiden name (frequently used by many people as an account security password). At the bottom is a phony name and signature, claiming to be that of the Taxpayer Advocate. The implication is that the taxpayer must fill in and submit the form to receive a tax refund. In reality, taxpayers claim their tax refunds through the filing of an annual tax return,

not a separate application form. Another scam involving the stimulus rebate package tells consumers they can receive their rebate faster by using direct deposit.

In a 2007 press release IRS Deputy Commissioner for Operations Support Linda Stiff said, "We have seen many e-mail scams using the IRS name. The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers through e-mail."

Taxpayers should be aware that the IRS does not send unsolicited e-mail. Additionally, the IRS never asks taxpayers for PIN numbers, passwords or similar secret access information for credit card, bank or other financial accounts.

Other fraudulent e-mail scams try to entice taxpayers to click their way to a fake IRS Web site and ask for bank account numbers. Another widespread e-mail scam tells taxpayers the IRS is holding a refund for them — frequently \$63.80 — and seeking financial account information. Still another email claims the

IRS's "anti-fraud commission" is investigating their tax returns.

Consumers should never give out personal information through a phone call or email that they themselves did not initiate. When in doubt, always call the financial agency first. The IRS may be reached at 1-800-829-1040 Monday through Friday, from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Recipients of questionable e-

mail that appears to come from the IRS should not open any attachments or click on any links contained in the e-mail. Instead, the e-mail should be forwarded to phishing@irs.gov.

Martin said teaching ag combines everything she likes from wildlife management to food science, mechanics and animal science.

"I want to come back to a small school and teach ag," Martin said. "Sometimes in a smaller school, they don't offer as much or can't offer as much. I want to come back and show students good education on topics, which they might decide to do."

Martin said she wants to show students that "you don't always have to go to college. If you work at it and get your skills, you can do just as good."

Martin said she enjoys both the frenetic pace of bigger city life, as well as the slower pace of a small town. "Here it's laid back. In Lampasas it's run, run, run for no purpose. I like 'doing both,' although Martin added, she'd rather come back and live in the country.

Calling varmints with Burnham Brothers

Years ago I did a report on Burnham Brothers, the people who made wildlife calls for hunters. The company was in Marble Falls then. Gary Roberson bought Burnham Brothers in 1991 and moved it to Menard. Gary was a banker in Menard and was looking for a career change when Burnham Brothers went on the market. His love of hunting and all things connected with it makes him the perfect person to have the company. He decided not to change the name of the business, since it is the leader in the animal calling industry.

Gary demonstrated some of his calls for me. He got out his little electronic box with a speaker on top of it and played the sound of a bird that sounded like a rabbit in distress.

"That particular sound is a yellow-hammer woodpecker," says Gary. "That's one of the universal calling sounds that has been very successful for us. I've called coyote, fox and bobcat with that sound."

Burnham Brothers has hand calls and mouth calls, but since Gary bought the business, he has concentrated on electronic calls. "We build calls primarily for calling predators like fox, coyote and bobcat. We use actual animal recordings of distress sounds they might make. In other words, we're ringing the dinner bell for that coyote."

When he hears that sound, he knows that animal is in distress and might be an easy meal. Hopefully, he'll come running. Some people use those same recordings to lure animals in for photography purposes. It's an effective way to bring that animal to you."

Hunters are able to control the call with a remote. They can be several hundred yards from the spot where the call is located.

"You can turn it on, lower the volume, turn it off when you want. That call comes in a camouflaged bag that you can carry into the woods, set it out and walk away. You don't have to worry about hiding it because it's already hidden."

Gary does his own recording, using digital equipment. Sometimes when he's recording in the field he takes his Border collie with him.

"We'll go out on a foggy night and if you shine your light on a cottontail rabbit, it'll temporarily blind him and the Border collie will catch it. She doesn't hurt it. She has a pretty soft mouth. But once that rabbit goes to screaming, I record it. But for every ten she catches, one, maybe two, will give you the distress sound."

The raw recordings have a lot of extraneous sounds, but those are cleaned up on the computer. Gary has been called the country's most popular game caller and has assembled the largest collection of recorded animal calls. They are sold to hunters all over the world. Coyotes are Gary's favorite game to hunt. He's been hunting all his life. He shot his first whitetail deer when he was seven.

She also spent a "huge part of my high school career" involved with FCCLA, participated in FFA livestock judging and showing animals and participated in One Act play for two years. Smith was a member of National Honor Society and student council and worked part-time at the hospital.

What she'll miss most is the "opportunity to be so involved in everything. Everybody in the community is so great at supporting the kids at everything they do. In college I'll have to do so much on my own, that I don't think I'll be able to be in as many things."

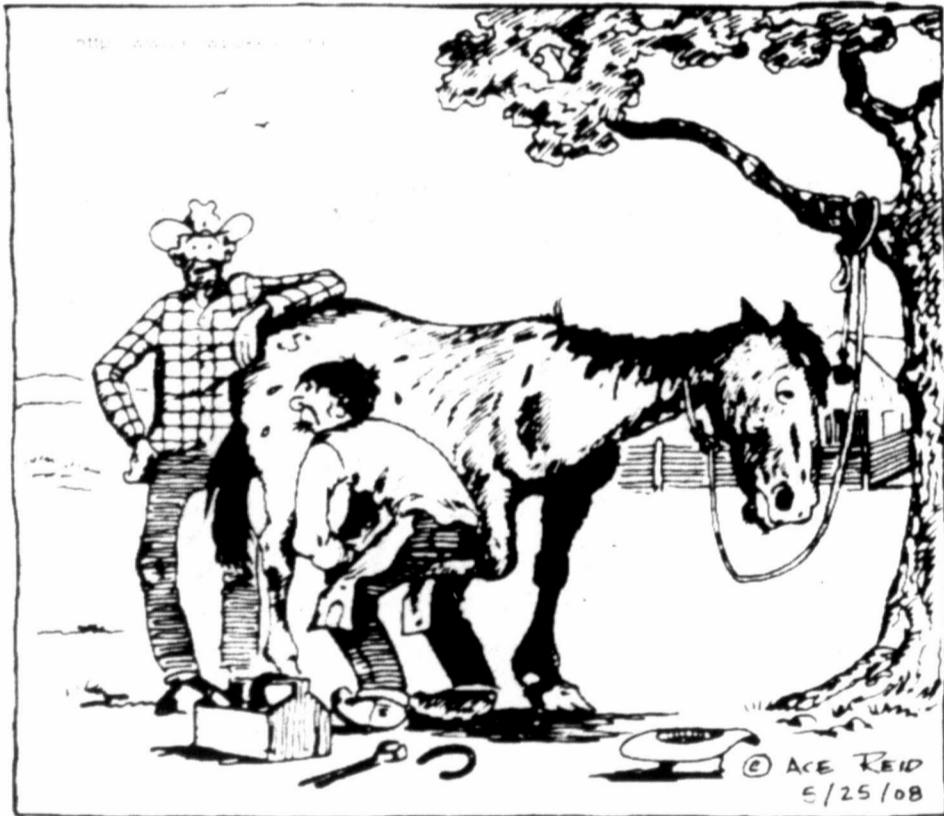
"It was a little house, pretty much a burn through and we did what we could to put it out," he said, adding the fire was exciting.

Hutchinson students learn science is fun

Hutchinson Elementary students learned just how much fun science can be as they watched a group of ASU students demonstrate scientific principles.

Nine physics students from Angelo State University traveled to Colorado City to talk with the youngsters about angular momentum, pressure, sound, and the ever popular electricity.

The students, under the direction of Dr. Toni Sauncy associate professor of physics at ASU, rank from second year about to be third year students to those who have already graduated and are studying in all fields of applied physics.

Each year for the last three years, Sauncy's students have taken a five day road trip to rural schools within a three hour driving radius of San Angelo.

"We aim at enhancing attitudes about science," Sauncy said. "We focus on rural school districts because so many of our students come from rural areas."

Sauncy said the community service learning experience, in which the students give back to the community, is part of being a good scientist. All the physics students who participated in the demonstration are members of the Sigma Phi Sigma physics honor society which encourages its members to be "citizen scientists."

While most of the schools were selected randomly from looking

at a map, Hutchinson Elementary had an advantage. Principal Kirten Arthur is a graduate of ASU.

"It's a great beginning point for the upcoming science fair," said teacher Nova Dea. Hutchinson's 5th grade science fair was held last Thursday and Friday.

"I liked the explosions," said fifth grader Kaysi Sims. "It was pretty cool."

Fifth grader Jonathan Jackson thought the liquid nitrogen frozen marshmallows were good.

Mikaela Madrid said the spinning wheel demonstration of con-

servation of angular momentum was really nice. "When you held it down (the wheel), you couldn't do anything," she said. "But when you turned it, the wheel spins. That's really cool."

The ASU students who participated in the road trip were Kunal Bhatnagar, India; Daniel Taylor, who hails from Everywhere; Douglas Parsons, Champion; Jennifer Hendryx, Alpine; Lacy Estes, Lamesa; James Matthews, San Angelo; Meagan Saldua, Houston; Daniel Bullock, San Antonio; and Logan Hancock, Brownfield.

Scott earns national award

His extraordinary accomplishments in the field, so to speak, have earned ASU's Dr. Cody Scott, formerly of Colorado City, the 2008 Outstanding Young Range Professional Award from the Society for Range Management (SRM).

The national award was announced in February, following Scott's November designation as the 2007 Outstanding Young Range Professional by the Texas Section, Society for Range Management.

In announcing the national award in Louisville, SRM Presi-

dent Dennis Phillippi said, "Scott has demonstrated extraordinary promise as a range management professional in his 12-year career at Angelo State. He has gained a reputation as a great research scientist and range management instructor."

An ASU professor of animal science and research scientist, Scott maintains a wide variety of research interests, including using goats as a biological control of juniper; understanding the role of livestock and wildlife in the spread of mesquite seeds; reducing poisonous plant prob-

lems; and studying other plant-animal interaction and animal behavior.

A West Texas native, Scott has been on the ASU faculty since 1995. Outside the classroom, he conducts his own research, advises graduate research projects, consults area landowners and directs the public draw hunts at the ASU Ranch. He is also responsible for all range management decisions at the ranch.

"I really like research and I wanted to leave my mark as a research scientist," Scott said. "Since I've been here, that has changed. When I first came here, if you asked me what I enjoyed most, it was the research part and then teaching. Now, no matter what else is going on, when I walk in the classroom everything is fine. The teaching part is what I enjoy more now."

Scott received his bachelor's and master's degrees in animal science from ASU in 1990 and 1992. He earned his Ph.D. in range science from Utah State University in 1995. He is married to Bridget Scott, manager of Palmer Feed in San Angelo, and they have a son, Brian.

Scott graduated from Colorado High in 1986. He is the son of Susan and Larry Farr of Colorado City and David Scott.

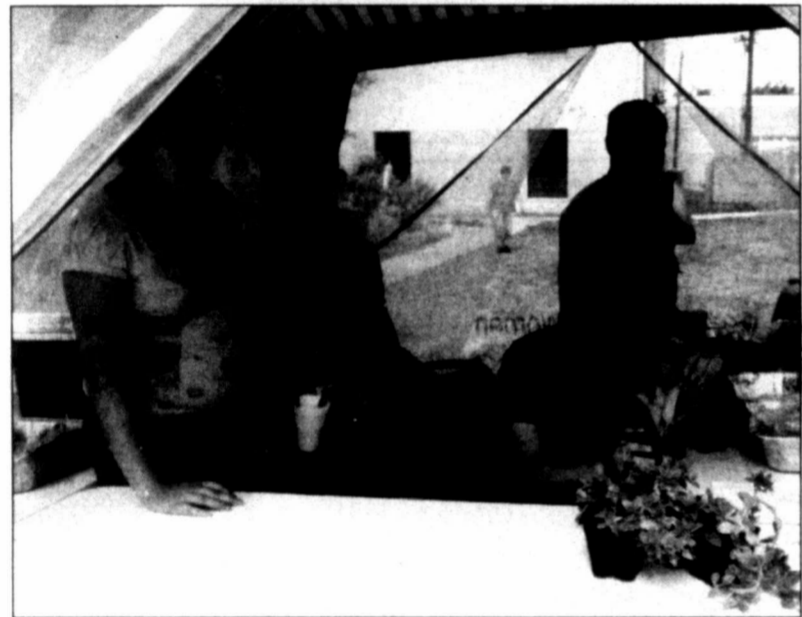
Students of the Week at Hutchinson Elementary have been chosen. They are Jonathan Casares, Madison Ducasse and Hailey Dunn.

OLLISON WINS 400 METER DASH

McMurry wins national title

Not since the likes of hurdler Don Maynard, sprinter Hollis Gaine and sprinter Don Randle, has Colorado High School produced the caliber of current McMurry All-American track star Hann Ollison.

The 1995 Colorado High graduate had a hand in 34 of McMurry's 35 points that helped his team edge out SUNY-Cortland. SUNY finished second with 33 points. The win at the national meet, held last weekend in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, gave the McMurry squad their first ever National Championship in any sport.

Ollison finished second in the long jump on Thursday before winning a national championship in the 400-meter dash in a time of 46.40, the fastest time in the nation this year. He also ran on the sprint relay team that success-

fully defended its national championship.

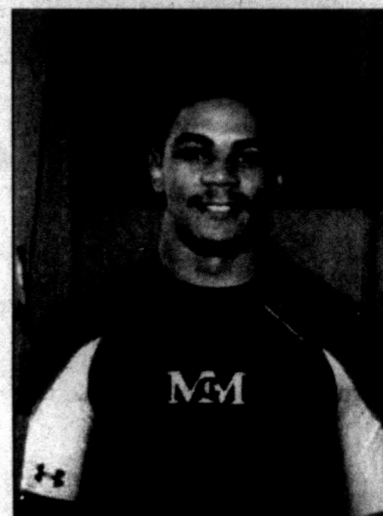
Ollison then joined John Mikalik, Bryce Williamson and Terry Smith on the 1,600-meter relay. Going into this event, the team needed to finish at least fourth in order to have a chance at the title. They finished third despite going into the meet with the eighth best time in the event.

Ollison's 400-meter time set a new track record at J.J. Keller Field and was the 10th best finish in Division III outdoor history.

"You just can't say enough about Hann," said McMurry track coach Barbara Crousen. "But he is very humble, and he would say 'It's the team behind you. You've gotta have some other legs behind you.'"

Ollison is now a 12-time track and field All-American at McMurry. He has 11 All-American awards in outdoor track and one

indoor All-American award after winning the 2008 indoor title in the 400. He is now tied with former women's track star Telitha Belcher for the most All-American honors in the school's history.

ORDINANCE NO. 2008 - 09

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS, AMENDING ORDINANCE 86-09 BY AMENDING THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES CHAPTER 13: SECTION 13.03.026 UTILITY METER CONTROL; EMERGENCY SHUT - OFF VALVE; DEFACING, BREAKING INTO OR TAMPERING WITH WATERWORKS SYSTEM TO ESTABLISH A PENALTY FOR ANY PERSON VIOLATING THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE DEEMED GUILTY OF A CLASS C MISDEMEANOR AND SHALL BE PENALIZED ACCORDING TO PENALTY FOR CLASS C MISDEMEANOR, V.T.C.A., PENAL CODE, SECTION 12.23 REVEALING ALL PRIOR ORDINANCES OR ORDINANCE PROVISIONS IN CONFLICT WITH THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE FOR THE AMENDMENT.

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary to promulgate rules and regulations in addition to the existing Chapter 13 of the Colorado City Code of Ordinances concerning the utility meter control for the citizens of Colorado City, Texas; and WHEREAS, it is necessary to prescribe these additional rules and regulations for the control of the utility meters; now, therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF COLORADO CITY, TEXAS: Chapter 13, Section 13.03.026 Utility meter control; tampering with waterworks system shall read as follows:

- a. Control of meters. All meters, cutoffs, goosenecks, valves and meter boxes connected with the city's water main and service pipe, including those furnished at the expense of consumers or property owners shall remain under the direct control of the city.
- b. Tampering with meters. It shall be unlawful for any person other than those authorized by the city to connect, disconnect, move or tamper with any such meter, or to turn on or off the water at the cutoff, valve or meter; or to open or tamper with any meter box.
- c. Emergency shutoff valve. The consumer shall install and have approved a "stop and waste" valve inside of the property line at a location accessible in case of emergency and shall not use the curb valve at the meter in lieu thereof.
- d. Defacing, breaking into or tampering with waterworks property.
 - (1) Property. It shall be unlawful for any person in any manner to deface the houses, walls, machinery or fixtures connected with or pertaining to the city waterworks and its system.
 - (2) Water system. It shall be unlawful for any person to break, damage or tamper with any part of the water system of the city for any purpose whatsoever, or in any other manner maliciously interfere with or prevent the running and operation of such system and the water supply therein.
- e. Penalty. Unless otherwise stated in this ordinance, any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a Class C Misdemeanor punishable as according to penalty for Class C Misdemeanor, V.T.C.A., Penal Code, Section 12.23. Each transaction in violation of any of the provisions hereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall become effective no less than ten days following passage of the ordinance and after publication of the descriptive caption and the penalty section of this ordinance in a local newspaper twice within a ten-day period in accordance with Section 29 of the City Charter. Please be advised the City of Colorado City is now publishing this notice as required by the Local Government Code 52.013. Ordinance 2008 - 09 was approved at the May 13, 2008 City Council Meeting.

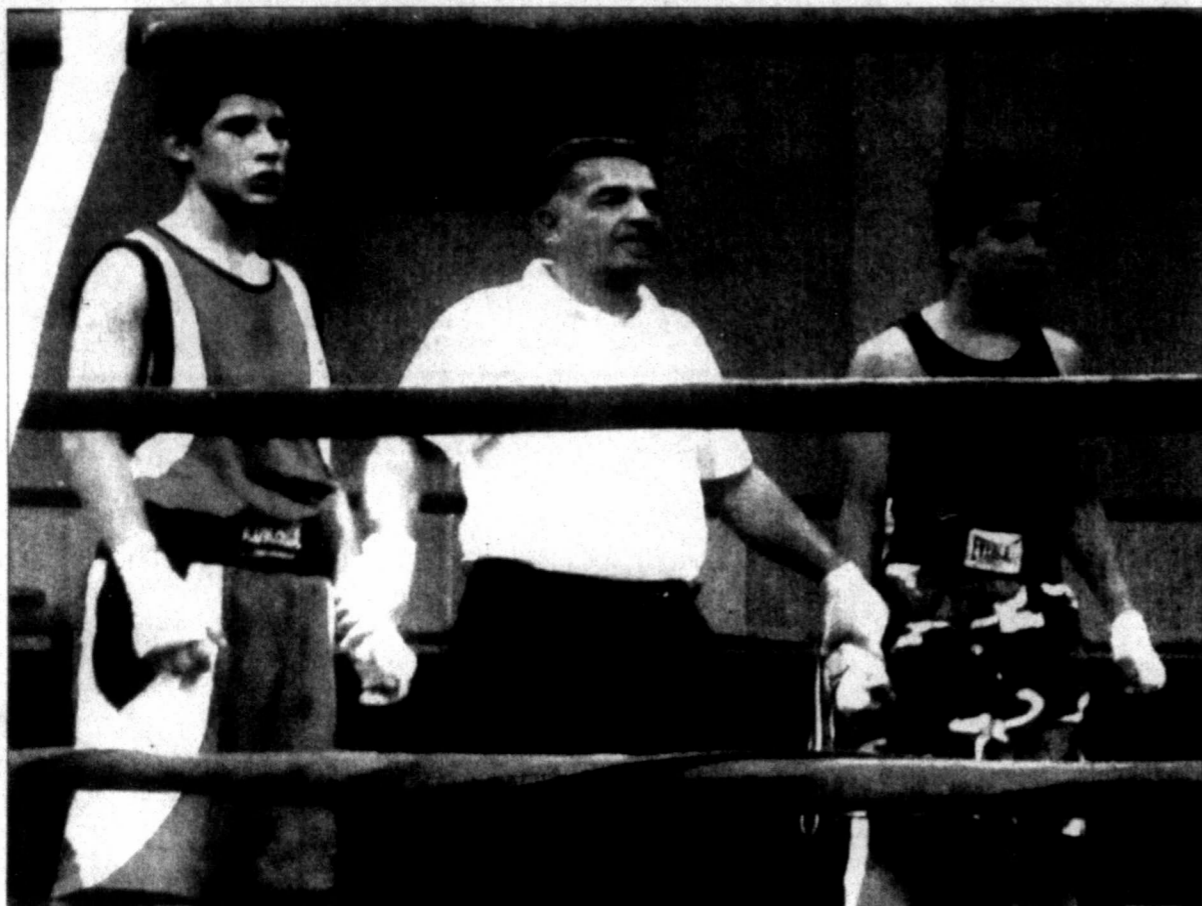

ing else." In other business, Chief Financial Officer Sandra Sullivan gave the financial report "April was a good month," Sullivan said. According to Sullivan, as of Friday, May 23, the hospital's operating fund was at \$548,867. Patient revenue for April totaled \$521,533. Financial consultant Larry Elliott added, "June will give us a clearer picture. Almost everything that has been done will begin to materialize." According to both Sullivan and Elliott, the financial condition of the hospital is improving. "My hopes are that the staff left here will be communicating with each other," board president Bobbie Banks said. "The people who have stepped up have done a good job. We just can't afford to let our attention lapse." Hospital privileges were extended to Alec Ordway, Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist.

Ordway had previously been employed by MCHD but had chosen to leave to take care of some personal matters, according to Mize. Ordway was rehired with an annual salary of \$108,000, which will save the hospital about \$10,000 per month, according to Elliott. In other action, the board approved the suggestion by the safety committee that the entire Mitchell County Hospital District campus will become smoke-free, as of Sept. 1, 2008. Members also approved the sale of property directly behind the Mitchell County Appraisal District building for \$400. In the consultant's report, Elliott said, "The best thing about this month is that no one has to lose sleep over being able to make payroll or not." He also said that he is pleased because the financial statements are beginning to reflect the actual situation.

"Everybody's working hard. Cash flow is looking pretty decent," he said. "There were 19 patients in-house today." Board member DeLynn Hackfeld questioned Elliott. "Are there any other areas, like the nursing home, that are problem areas?" "I don't know on the nursing home yet because I don't think the financial statements reflect the true situation," Elliott answered. He stated that he still had some things to look at. "We're still checking the clinic and will be checking the lodge (Valley Fair)," he said. "We can't let our guard down, but all in all, it's been very positive." Mize added that there is a distorted impression of the hospital within the community. She stated that because the hospital's name is Mitchell "County" Hospital, they think the care is free. And, she added, that impression is hard to change.

Zoning commission amends ordinance

The Zoning Commission met Tuesday evening to discuss action regarding an amendment to the 1950 zoning ordinance concerning multicolored electronic changeable message light emitting diode billboards in the City of Colorado City and its extrajurisdictional jurisdiction. The original 1950 zoning ordinance restricted billboards and advertising signs to industrial zones, not commercial ones. TxDOT rulings, which allowed billboards along the interstate,

opened the doorway for billboards at commercially zoned sites, in opposition to local city ordinances. Colorado City's 1950 ordinance was amended in 2007 to allow billboards and advertising signs in both industrial and commercial zones. A new ruling by TxDOT to permit LED billboards is once again causing concern in Colorado City. The new ruling, which goes into effect June 1, would allow the multicolored electronic

changeable message LEDs not only on billboards along the interstate, but would permit such signs within the city. The zoning commission will discuss amending to make Colorado City's current zoning ordinance "a little more restrictive," according to Donna Madrid, city secretary. To counteract the new ruling by TxDOT, city councils must implement ordinances restricting or prohibiting LED billboards and signs before June 1.

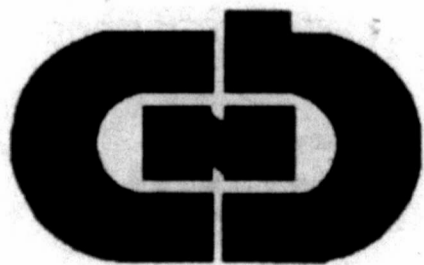

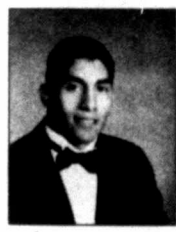

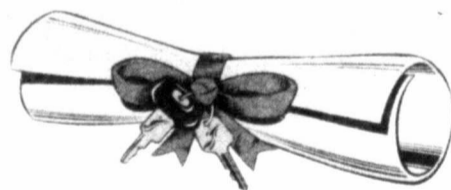
