## Changes In Game Laws Proposed At Meeting In Courthouse June 26

The annual meeting to regulate Game and Fish laws is set for 9:00 a. m. June 26 at the Crockett County courthouse. All sportsmen and landowners are invited to attend.

There are some major changes proposed for the hunting season this year, Walter G. (Bun) Carpenter, local game warden, said. The most important is concerned with the killing of doe deer in a certain area of Crockett. This area is proposed to be from Howard Draw road east to the county line and Highway 290 south to the county line.

Even though it will be legal to take doe in this area, the landowner will decide if any is to be taken off his place. The Game Commission will issue permits to the landowner and he will issue them to the hunter. After the hunter makes his kill then he must return to the rancher and have him sign the permit. Without this permit properly filled out a doe is as illegal as ever, the warden declared.

"I would like to urge all who are interested to attend this meeting," Game Warden Carpenter said.

## Welcome Rains Spatter Parts Of Crockett Co.

### Half Inch To Four Inches Reported In Area Falls

Light to heavy rains hit a large portion of the county last Friday night as rough looking black thunderheads crossed the northern half of the county dumping from a half to over four inches of rain on dry ranchlands.

The welcome rain came during a severe thunderstorm alert which included part of Crockett County from 4 to 10 p. m. Even though the clouds did appear menacing, no report of bad weather in the county was received.

Heaviest rainfall reports came from the divide country north where reports from two to over four inches were common. Elsewhere over the central and eastern part of the county from an inch down to about .54 of an inch were the average.

Ozona received about .54 of an inch according to local weather gauges which, with the recent two rains, continued to give the grass around town a boost after the long dry period in March and April.

Unfortunately, much of the areas west and south of Ozona were left out of the rain area. The rain Ozona received covered an area almost twenty miles south of Ozona but did not go very far west.

## Ozona Man Named To Executive Board Of Baptist Organization

Dallas — Ira Carson, Ozona layman, has been named to the 191-member executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

The action came here this week during the regular quarter-annual meeting of the board, highest policy making body for more than 1 1/2 million Texas Baptists short of the denomination's state convention.

In other action the board adopted a record \$14,383,194 world missions budget to be submitted to the state Baptist Convention in November and told Baptists schools and hospitals to stop borrowing money from the federal government.

The policy change was incorporated in a 10-point statement of interpretation of church-state separation that opposed government grants and loans for building construction at religious institutions.

Final action on the statement of interpretation must come from messengers to the annual Baptist General Convention of Texas meeting in Austin, Texas Nov. 7-9.

The 10-point statement opposed as a violation of spiritual and moral foundation as well as the constitutional interpretation of church-state separation: (1) outright government grants or direct aid to religious institutions (2) loans for building construction and (3) government surplus property offered to religious groups at a reduced rate.

## TS&GRA Directors To Study Grower Problems At Del Rio Meeting

San Angelo — Directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association will return June 16-17 for their Summer Quarterly meeting to Del Rio where the Association was organized over 45 years ago in the old Princess Theater.

Headquarters for the two-day meeting will be the Roswell Hotel where registration will be taken and activities coordinated. The Committees convene Friday afternoon in the High School Library Annex near the hotel and the General Session gets under way the next morning at 9 a. m. in the court house. A well planned program of entertainment for the benefit of those attending will include a reception Friday evening, eye opener breakfast Saturday morning and a barbecue at noon at the City Park. The breakfast, emphasizing a Mexican atmosphere, will be held in the scenic patio of the Roswell Hotel.

One of the main reasons for organizing in 1915 was to combat sheep thefts which had plagued the growers over a period of several years. By placing State Rangers into the field with special commissions under the direction and pay of the Association, indictments were returned in several counties and by the early 1920's theft had been largely stamped out.

Since that time the problems of the growers have become more numerous and in addition to theft problems, they are now concerned with promotion, marketing, labor, animal health, tax, predatory animals and other matters. Through Committee work and discussions of the general business meeting, the Directors consider solutions to industry problems. Policies are adopted to promote the wool and mohair industry at state and national levels.

## 12-Month Wools Sell, Bids Lag On 8-Months Clips

### John Fowler, Formerly Of Midland, Owner Of New Business

Some 12-months wool moved but interest was lagging in 8-months length and a little more than 200,000 pounds of 12-months wool sold at prices ranging from 40 cents to 52 1/2 cents per pound, the average being about 47 cents a pound. A total of 272,000 pounds of 12-months length was offered.

Beal Barbee owner, turned down bids on 8-months when buyers indicated by the bids that the market was off from a week earlier. The offering of 305,000 pounds of 8-months wool was withdrawn.

Prouvost-LeFebvre, Co., Inc., of Boston was the major buyer in the sale with tonnage totaling 118,192 pounds. The Colonial Wool Co., of Boston purchased 28,559 pounds; Forte, Dupee, Sawyer Co., of Boston, purchased 55,670 pounds; Burlington Mills of Boston got 4,401 pounds, and Stevens & Co., of Boston, 5,005 pounds.

Some buyers were reported busy elsewhere looking at wools and some other buyers were said not to be in the market at this time.

**THIS IS THE MORNING-AFTER**

Despite President Kennedy's TV and radio report to the Nation on his visits in Paris, Vienna and London — and subsequent word from "responsible sources" on the White House briefing of Democratic and Republican leaders — we can do little more than guess at the impact of these latest summit conversations on the destiny of nations, most especially our own.

It seems clear, however, that the arrogant Mr. Krushchev is as determined as ever to enfold all of Berlin into the East German slave state that surrounds it. He is reported to have declared a vendetta on the UN because of actions in the Congo that he considered interference with Soviet policies. He is said to have disclaimed efforts to establish a Communist government in Laos, declared he would be happy to have it neutral and promised his help in getting the Geneva conference on Laos moving. On nuclear testing, he stuck to his insistence on a veto over inspection procedures.

In summary, and highlighted by the breakdown of both the Leontian cease-fire and the Geneva conference on Laos immediately following President Kennedy's re-

turn, there is no basis for optimism over the effect of Vienna on Soviet relations or the cold war.

Accordingly, the sharply increased military and defense expenditures urged by the President in his recent and second "state of the Union" address to Congress appear more urgent than before. And certainly we should prepare ourselves for still further increases. By the same token we should just as sharply cut back the \$4.8 billion foreign aid program for which Administration spokesmen are now beating the drums. Foreign aid, on which we have already squandered some \$90 billion of our substance, should be immediately reduced from the aspiration to the humanitarian level and dedicated to meeting disasters, not buying nations which are not for sale.

The preservation of freedom — here or elsewhere — is a grimmer business than pampering backward nations and buttering forward politicians.

**CLASSROOM SHELL-GAME**

Demands of the educationists for passage of the Federal aid to education bill are growing more shrill vs accumulating evidence shows the falseness of their cries of need, and population studies prove that the increase in enrollments that once gave color to their arguments is already declining! By 1970, say the experts, the increase (one million in the present school year) will have dropped 50 percent. And if state and locally-financed classrooms are added at the present rate, there will be a surplus by that time.

When pleaders for Federal control of the schools declare that we must provide new classrooms at the rate of 60,000 a year through the next decade, they are hoping people haven't heard about the tapering off of the "baby boom" enrollments of the past, and have forgotten that an average of 65,000 classrooms a year have been added during the past administration.

According to figures recently released by Tax Foundation, Inc., more than a quarter of the \$31 billion spent by the states in 1959 went for education — the equivalent of \$147 per family, compared with \$35 in 1946. Ralph de Toledano, writing in National Review on "The Federal Aid-to-Education Fraud", notes that while

the "education lobby" continues to talk of "worsening" school conditions, public school students per classroom have dropped from 30.6 to 27.8 since 1954 and that there were 30 students per teacher in 1900, 29 in 1930 and 27.8 in 1960.

But the battle is not over, and voters should take to heart what could lie ahead:

"If federal aid-to-education becomes a fact," writes de Toledano, "the U. S. Office of Education will become the nation's biggest and most powerful school board. It has, in anticipation of the great day, quadrupled its staff over the past six years. It has already announced its plans to 'develop a national policy in education' by standardizing the curricula and the organization of the public schools. For the educationists, the day of the Big Red Schoolhouse is at hand. That the U. S. has the best educational plant in the world is not enough for them. Until it is as fully regimented as the Soviet Union's, they will still consider it deficient."

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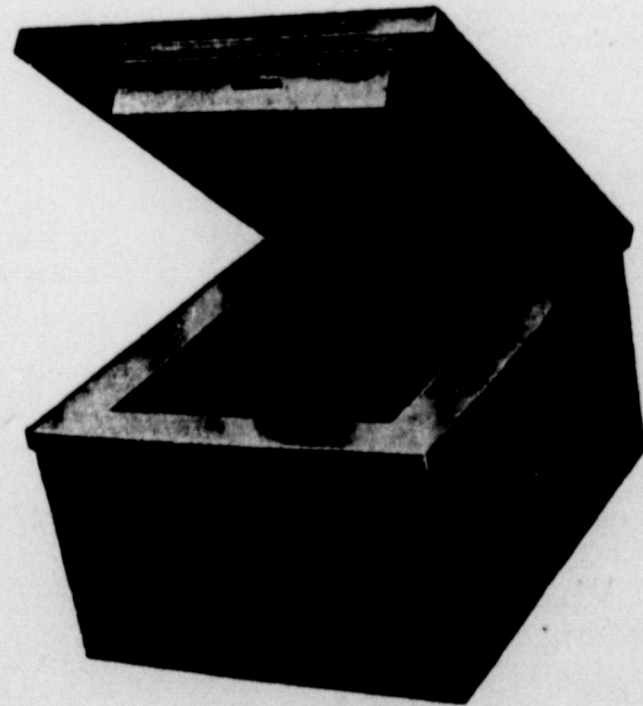

Continuation of "The Ozona Story" gleaned from the files of The Ozona Stockman

The Stockman, June 16, 1932

An old fashion barbecue countywide get-together will be held in Ozona July Fourth. It is definitely assured this week that the committees working on the barbecue had secured pledges of \$100 each and were winding up other arrangements for the celebration.

Ozona Giants took the Comanche to another cleaning on the diamond Sunday afternoon. The score was 9 to 4 in favor of the locals. Red Greer was "pink" for the day, slugging 4 hits to lead his team. Conley Cox and Weaver had three each.

Immunization against sore mouth in lambs and kids has been extended to the extent that it will be available for general use next Spring, according to A. J. H. Meredith, director of the Texas Experiment Station. The method of immunization has been developed by veterinarians at Substation Ranch Experiment Station, and already has passed

through the laboratory and field experiment stages of development with gratifying results, Mr. Meredith said.

Another bunch of Crockett county lambs topped the Fort Worth market last week. They were a shipment of 316 head from the Vic Pierce ranch. The lambs weighed 62 pounds and brought 4.50, the top price of the day.

Contract for grading and drainage structures on 9.13 miles of Highway 27 from Ozona west was awarded by the State Highway Commission in session last Friday. Contract went to J. S. Wade & Son of Coleman for \$134,841.40.

### Wild Animals Should Not Be Captured For Pets Says Game Dept.

Warnings that individuals who catch young wildlife for pets or harm protected birds will be prosecuted, have been issued by the law enforcement division of the Game and Fish Commission, Game Warden Bun Carpenter reported here this week.

"We get complaints every day that persons have been picking up some of them when the mother deer is close by. He pointed out that the wild animal usually takes care of itself much better if left alone. Permits are required for raising wildlife in captivity and the permit must be held before the animal is captured.

At the same time, complaints also are being filed against persons catching protected birds or destroying nests. Among them were several filed in Austin against persons who invaded a swallow rookery on the Highland Lakes with air rifles and sling shots. Baby birds are used to bait traps. If the bird is a protected species complaints are filed and the guilty person usually is given a stiff fine. Numerous arrests have resulted from pictures appearing in newspapers of persons displaying a baby animal. This is strong evidence which stands up in court when cases are filed.

**Notes From The County Agent's Office**

By Pete W. Jacoby

The period from July 23-29 has been designated as National Farm Safety Week by a proclamation released by President Kennedy.

The President called attention to the fact that more than a million farm residents are injured and thousands are killed each year in accidents and that these accidents bring suffering and sorrow to our farm families and inflict heavy economic losses up both the farm community and nation. The safety of these people, he continued, who produce our food is of vital concern to all our citizens.

President Kennedy is urging all persons and organizations interested in the safety of farm people to support and participate in this special endeavor to help reduce the number of farm accidents. He asked farm residents to remember that "Safety is a Family Affair."

In Texas, plans are going forward for the observance of the Week, reports the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. In many counties extensive programs will be carried out, emphasizing that safety is a family affair. County extension agents, 4-H Club members and their leaders, farm and community organization leaders and others with a deep interest in the promotion will contribute to the overall plans.

The Councilmen said that in

many counties a different phase of farm and home safety would be emphasized each day during the week; Sunday, reverence for life; Monday, safety begins at home; Tuesday, agricultural chemicals; Wednesday, prevent falls; Thursday, highway safety; Friday, farm machinery and Saturday, recreation safety.

The failure of rural people to observe safety in their daily living is a chief contributor to their safety record. The Council said this record includes a disabling injury accident every 32 seconds and a death every 5 minutes to farm residents of the nation. The Council concludes it is time to stop this needless waste from accidents since most could be prevented.

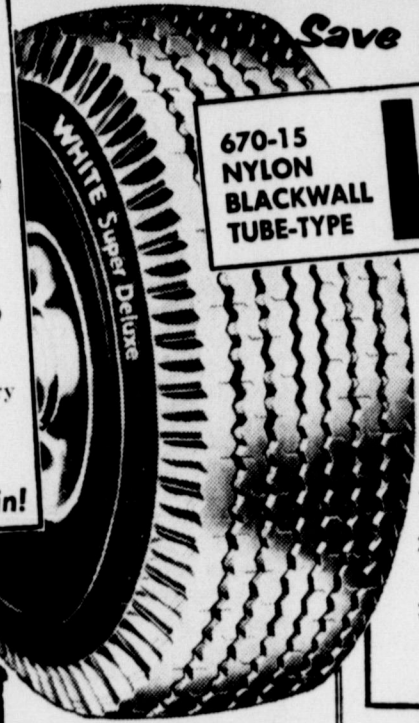

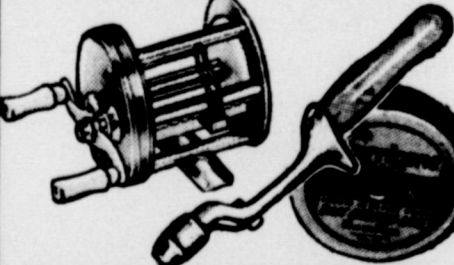

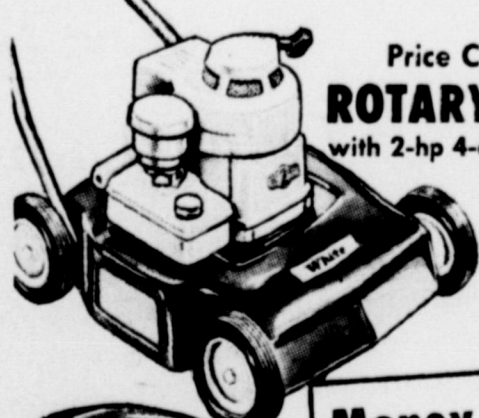

**Troubles All Over** — To make matters worse, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert reported that some of Texas' prime sources of tax revenue seems to be dwindling.

Oil production taxes for the nine months ending May 31 were \$91,110,769, down by \$3,000,000 from the same period a year ago and down \$12,000,000 from the year before that.

Gasoline taxes, which have spiraled up at about 5 per cent a year, have hit a slowdown. They are expected to be about \$129,000,000. This is identical to the same nine

months period of a year ago.

Corporation franchise taxes were also down to \$51,542,964 for this year, a drop of about \$7,000,000 from last year.

One bright spot was in "sin taxes." Cigarette taxes brought in \$7,821,931 during May compared with \$6,310,562 for April. Taxes on alcoholic beverages (beer, wine and liquor) were up from \$2,672,947 in April to \$2,835,650 in May.

But poll taxes were down from \$2,818,527 in 1960, the presidential election year, to only \$1,827,574 for 1961.

Despite everything, the deficit

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in the state general revenue fund dropped in May to \$78,848,137 from a high of \$102,000,000 in April. Hopes are that it will go even lower, not to exceed \$63,000,000 by August 31, the end of the fiscal year.

**Small Loan Law Urged** — Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has urged Governor Daniel to add loan company regulation to the list of subjects which may be considered in the upcoming special session.

At present the governor has limited the session to revenue and appropriations bills. Only subjects included in the governor's "call" may be considered in a special session.

#### Short Snorts

**Car-jammed Texas Cities** are getting sympathy and an offer of help from the Texas Highway Department. Commission announced that cities may use the space under elevated expressways for parking lots — to be operated by the cities or under contract by private parties.

Noting that the number of 1961 polio cases in Texas is up 9 per cent above the same period last year, State Health Department is launching a new campaign for inoculations — especially for "babies and breadwinners."

"Moonshining" is no just a part of the colorful past. Texas Liquor Control Board reported that it seized eight illegal stills and confiscated 2,970 gallons of mash and 34 gallons of liquor in April.

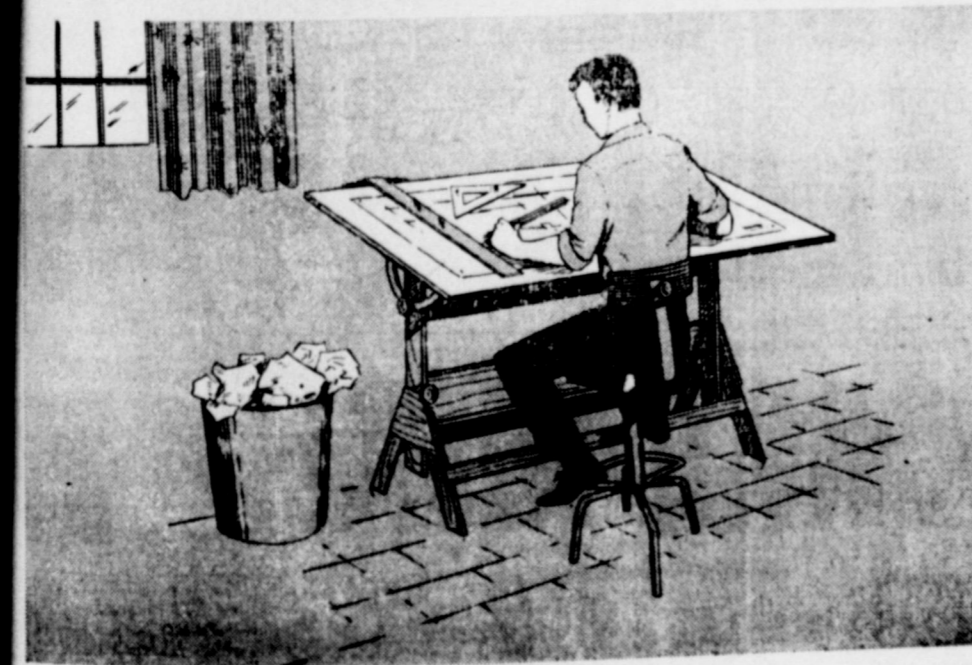
