

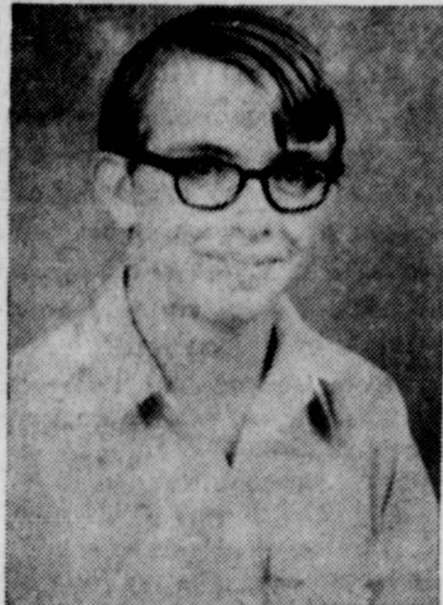

Amendment Vote Set for Tuesday

Coke County citizens will join with fellow Texans next Tuesday when they will go to the polls and vote on nine amendments to the Texas Constitution.

County Clerk Mrs. Winnie Waldrop said Wednesday morning that no absentee ballots had been cast. Friday is the last day for absentee voting and anyone who is going to be away next Tuesday should cast his ballot before the deadline Friday at 5 p.m.

No. 1 on the ballot provides for annual sessions of the legislature and raises pay to \$15,000 a year.

No. 2 provides homestead protection for single adults and provides that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

No. 3 would extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.

No. 4 would establish certain requirements relative to the creation of conservation and reclamation districts.

No. 5 would authorize counties and cities bordering the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters.

No. 6 would change the jurisdiction of probate courts to include district courts.

No. 7 would provide an additional \$100 million in bonds for the Veterans Land Fund.

No. 8 would authorize cities to levy taxes sufficient to pay the principal and interest on general obligations.

No. 9 would allow the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property of nonprofit water suppliers.

Funeral services for Allen Jameson, 73, were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in Southside Church of Christ at Robert Lee with burial in McKenzieville Cemetery near Silver, directed by Newby Funeral Home. Services were conducted by R. L. Roberts, minister of the church, and Horace Bloodworth, retired Baptist minister of Silver.

Mr. Jameson died at 3:30 p.m. Monday in St. John's Hospital in San Angelo.

He was born Feb. 12, 1900, at Silver, the son of W. G. and Elizabeth Hicks Jameson, a pioneer Silver area family. He lived in Coke County all his life and was a rancher in the Silver community. He was married to Vera Eva Brown July 26, 1926, at Colorado City.

Survivors are his wife; a son, G. A. Jameson of Big Lake; a daughter, Mrs. Maurice (Elma) Duncan of Robert Lee; a brother, Fred Jameson of San Angelo; a sister, Mrs. Alice Humble of Midland; five grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

WTU Open House To Be Held Friday

An all day open house at the newly remodeled offices of West Texas Utilities Company in downtown Robert Lee is scheduled for Friday, Nov. 2. The announcement was made by WTU Manager W. D. McAdams. The public is invited, McAdams said, and open house hours are from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. Refreshments, favors for everyone and a drawing for door prizes will be highlights of the event, McAdams said.

Lee Construction of Bronte began the remodeling work in June of 1973. Improvements include complete renovation of the building inside and out, new ceilings, floors, walls, lighting, heating and

air conditioning. Offices are paneled in mahogany throughout, baseboard heating units were added under the windows across the front to eliminate condensation, and three tons of refrigerated air conditioning installed to cool the front offices. To cool the shop and storage area, evaporative cooling was selected.

For correct lighting, fluorescent fixtures producing 100 footcandles were recessed into the ceilings.

West Texas Utilities has served the community of Robert Lee since 1928 when the population stood at 582. George Chisholm

Black bass fishing has picked up to a large degree at Lake Spence, with most of the good catches being picked up with top water baits.

Catfishing has been slow during the past week, but trotliners are still taking some nice sized striped bass from their lines.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

(Editor's note: The following letter was received this week from Mrs. Frank Coalson, who is teaching this year in Alaska. We think our readers will be interested in Mrs. Coalson's letter, so we are reprinting it. Her address is: Foreign Studies Program Box 519, Kenai, Alaska 99611.)

Dear Jewel,

Thank you so much for your letter and your extra copies of The Observer. Your letter arrived the 15th and I think you have the right answer: It just takes second class mail a long time to come up here. I had thought in paying more for the "out of state" subscription that I might get it earlier.

I do not feel that I am very far away from home, since it took only about eight and one-half hours flying time to come up here. Dan Turner, my former student at Hardin-Simmons University and later my principal in Robert Lee High School, met me in Anchorage Sept. 3 and arranged for my lodging in the beautiful and very modern Anchorage Hotel. He and his family were in the process of moving from Dillingham to Eagle River about 10 miles northeast of Anchorage.

My first week was not without unusual happenings. The third night in this 49th state, I was awakened about 2 a.m. with a moderate earthquake. I thought at first that they were moving me out of my room, for my bed began to move slightly. Then I remembered Dan had told me that I should expect "slight" (?) tremors from time to time. The next morning's paper stated that a spokesman at the Palmer Observatory said the quake registered 5.5 on the Richter Scale and that

the quake's epicenter was in Prince William Sound, 35 miles southwest of Valdez and 100 miles from Anchorage. The second unusual happening was that I had to listen to the Dallas Cowboys over radio, for I could not see them on television until about a week later.

My nephew, Richard Reed, who teaches math and coaches wrestling at Palmer, took me out to his home on Friday, Sept. 1, where I enjoyed the beauty of the countryside. Along the Alcan Highway up north of Palmer, I saw beautiful birch trees turning yellow and gold, pretty lakes here and there, and tall spruce standing against snow covered mountains in the distance. I am happy that I came up before the cold weather set in so that I could enjoy all the pretty and varied flowers blooming everywhere. Only recently did the temperature go down to 10 degrees, which lasted only two or three days. It is usually around 40 degrees during the day.

I am teaching English and Spanish in the Alaska International Academy, which is a branch of the University of Alaska. Our school is located at Wildwood a few miles from the city of Kenai, on the Kenai Peninsula, about 150 miles south of Anchorage. Wildwood is the site of the former Air Force Base during the war, and it covers about 25 acres. The campus here is really beautiful, being surrounded by tall spruce.

Three different groups are housed here. First, the Indian Action group, which is designed for adults, many of whom are married, who wish to study vocational courses, such as mechanics and flying. Then we have the Boarding School group, composed of kids who have come from rural schools all over Alaska to attend

Kenai High School. Last, we have our group, with its foreign studies program, which consists of freshman college students, who will study here for three months and after the Christmas holiday, will fly to Europe Jan. 17 and continue studies for three months in our school, which is connected with the University of Spain at Seville. All this training and travel, including board and room, is a federal and state funded program of Alaska and is free to natives. They must be high school graduates who are accepted with good recommendations and have proof that they are at least one-fourth Indian, Eskimo or Aleut—that is one from the Aleutian Islands. In this case this last group is a very unique one.

I am enjoying myself here and find the work very interesting and challenging. Spanish is the third language for these students, and the most of them are very ambitious and well mannered.

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Steers, Eldorado Battle to 0-0 Tie

The Steer defensive gun shot nothing but big shots in the battle of defense Friday night when the Eldorado Eagles and the Robert Lee Steers slugged it out for four quarters to a 0-0 tie.

It seems every year that the thriller is the Steer-Eagle game and this one was no exception. It's too bad that some of the fans did not see this one, for it was a showing, a big showing, of Steer intestinal fortitude.

The front line of Mashburn, Abalos, Cole, Davis, Eubanks, Cooley, Costilla, Bessent, Ends, Herford and Hanna, rotating at positions, kept the Eagles at bay time after time. The Steers are getting short handed, but they are still hanging tough. The loss of Darrel Copeland and probably Mike Davis now, will put more load on the other boys, so here we go again. Defense, Defense.

First Quarter

Eldorado received the opening kickoff at the 10 yard line and returned it to their 34. Then on 1st down the Eagles went to the air and completed a pass to the Steer 29 for a 1st down. Then they powered to the Steer 10. The Steers got loose and at the 1 yard line they held on downs.

The Steers made a quick 1st at the 13 on a 12 yarder by Sockwell. The Eagles held and Sockwell punted to the Eagle 35 with a return to the Eagle 46. The Steers held for little gain and the Eagles started to punt but a penalty gave them a 1st at the Steer 34. Eldorado made another 1st at the 21. Then at the 10, the ball carrier was hit with authority by Wibby Millican and Mitch Cooley, causing a fumble which Cole recovered at the 10. The Steers ran two plays and the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Eldorado held at the 17 and Sockwell punted to the Steer 40 with a return to the Steer 34. A penalty moved the ball back to the Steer 47, where the Steers held on downs. The Eagles then intercepted a deflected pass and returned it for a TD, but there was a clip on the play and they got the ball on the Steer 26 —

no touchdown. The Steers held on downs again for little gain. The Steers moved some as they made a 1st at the 34, then Eldorado held and Sockwell punted to the Eagle 21 with no return. The Eagles made a 1st at their 36, but the Steers then held and Eldorado punted to the Steer 5 yard line. The Steers made a quick 1st at the 17 on a burst by Poly Abalos. Three plays later the first half ended.

Third Quarter

The Steers received the second half kickoff at the goal line and Sockwell returned it to his 39 yard line.

The Steers made a 1st at the Eldorado 49 by Wibby Millican in one big chunk. But then the Steers fumbled at the Eagle 48. The Eagles started another big drive with four 1st downs, all the way to the Steer 4. There the tide turned as the Steer defense threw the Eagles back to the 12 yard line. The Eagles attempted a field goal that went wide to the right and the Steers got the ball on the 20 yard line.

The Eagles held at the 25 and Sockwell punted one high and far to the Eagle 36 with no return. The Steers held at the 40 and the Eagles punted to the Steer 20 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

The Steers made a 1st at their 35 and Eldorado got an additional 15 yards against them on a penalty, and the Steers were on the 50. The Steers moved for a 1st at the Eagle 39, Rowoldt threw a pass to Hanna for another 1st at the Eagle 29. Two good runs by Poly Abalos put the ball at the Eagle 12. The Steers moved on down to the 5 yard line where they bogged down. They tried a field goal but it went wide to the right and Eldorado got the ball at the 20.

Eldorado started another move with three 1st downs to the Steer 42. The Steer defense threw them back to the Eagle 49 and the Steers held on downs at that point. The Steers moved to the Eagle 30 and attempted another field goal with two seconds left. It was blocked and that was the ball game. Final score: 0 to 0.

Fire Rules For The Aged

The aftermath of fire too often leaves the elderly as a tragic statistic. However, this can be prevented if they are informed of a few basic rules. To help protect the elderly, Underwriters Laboratories Inc., an independent, not for profit organization testing for public safety, offers the following fire rules for the aged.

* The aged should be familiar with all exits and know two plans of escape. If possible, they should sleep on the first floor or near an easy way out.

* All stairways should be clear of objects to prevent falling.

* The elderly should be instructed to never smoke in bed.

* The aged should wear fire-safe clothing when around an open flame.

* They should have easy access to a telephone, with emergency numbers at hand.

* Appropriate UL Listed fire extinguishers should be available, and the elderly should be shown how to use them.

Also, the elderly can help themselves by planning ahead; they can help by developing new plans for them.

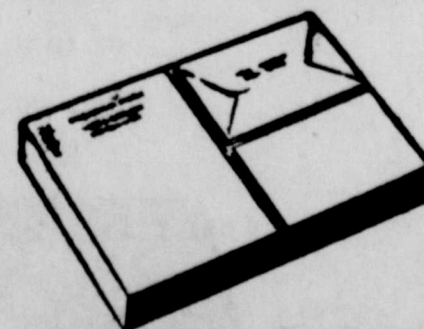
Lela Ray McAdams opened her own business in Robert Lee in 1966—Dawn's Floral and Specialty.

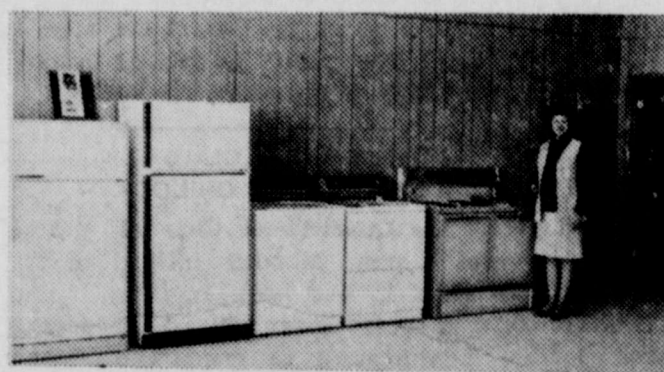

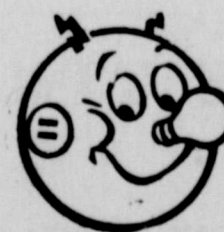
