Over 400 Hear Republican in Address Here

Speaker Declares Texas Being "Milked" of Richest Cream of Wealth by North, East; Awakening Is Urged

Flays Bond Issue

Political Issues Are Touched Only Briefly by G.O.P. Candidate; Ridicules Efforts to Enforce Pro Law

HOTLY declaring that Texas is being "milked" of the richest cream of her wealth by the north and east, and urging an awakening to the fact that "What Texas Makes, Makes Texas," Col. W. E. (Bill) Talbot, of Dallas, republican gubernatorial candidate last night spoke before a gathering of between 400 and 500 persons in the district courtroom at Lubbock.

Col. Talbot touched briefly on political issues, stating that "this will be different from any political speech you ever heard," and that he came to Lubbock to "talk common sense" and not issues of a political nature. Toward the close of his address, however, he ridiculed the Sterling bond issue, efforts at prohibition enforcement and offered ideas for a reorganization of the election system in Texas, advocating a return to the convention plan.

"Time To Think"

"It's high time for Texas to start thinking about its own welfare," the speaker declared, "and stop acting as a warehouse for the rest of the nation."

Texas' main trouble, as explained by the speaker, is that it produces more raw material than any other state but sends it out to be manufactured and then has it shipped back in for high prices.

"This money should be kept in Texas," he said, "Texas should manufacture its own raw products, and keep some of the cream at home. We will have a job better business, prosperity, if the people of this state will start patronizing Texas industries and start utilizing the resources and raw materials at hand."

Highways Are Being Graded

Maintenance Department of District Force Busy After Recent Heavy Rains; Extra Men Are at Work

Every available man on the maintenance department of the district highway force is at work grading roads following the heavy rains of Saturday, Sunday and Monday, Joe Caldwell, division engineer, said last night.

Has Naval Treaty

Japan's Ratification of Pact Being Carried by Plane

CHRYSTEN, Wyo., Oct. 15 (AP)— Lieutenant Irvin A. Woodring arrived here at 5:30 p. m. (M. S. 7:30) from Laramie in an airplane bearing Japan's ratification document of the London naval treaty. Lieutenant Woodring made the 90-mile trip in 15 minutes.

Jake Fleagle, Wolf of West, Dies of Wound

Federal Officers Continue Search for Other Members of Gang After Modern Bad Man Succumbs Wednesday

(By Associated Press)

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., October 15.—The Wolf of the West, Jake Fleagle, is dead.

This modern bad man, the leader of a pack of ruthless robbers and killers who shot their way through banks and postoffice buildings in the west and middle west, died at 8:35 a. m. today in a hospital here. The abdominal wound inflicted Tuesday when Fleagle was shot as he was surprised by federal and other authorities as he boarded a train at Branson, Mo., little Ozark mountain town, caused his death.

Associates Arrested

With his passing, federal officers continued the hunt for other members of the gang and two alleged Fleagle associates were arrested—Joe Miller at Las Vegas, New Mexico, and Dr. George O. Delmon at Streator, Ill. The latter was an alleged participant with Fleagle in the Tracy, Calif. post office robbery.

It also was revealed today that Fleagle had been hiding in the Ozarks about a year. He leased a cabin near Branson, and fitted it as an arsenal and hideaway. Residents in the section were convinced that many visitors he had probably were members of his gang.

Any doubt the man was Fleagle was dispelled late today when instructions were received from the Fleagle family at Garden City, Kan., to send the body there and finger prints taken by federal officers checked unquestionably.

Killer Named

Another disclosure today was that Detective Harry N. Wilde and Chester A. Lloyd of the Los Angeles police department were the officers who actually caught Fleagle and that Wilde was the man who shot him. Five other officers from

Brazil Takes An Upper Hand In Revolution

Federal Government Turns to Finances as Forces Appear to Gain Over Insurgents in Eleven Days Struggle

(By Associated Press)

After eleven days of struggle the Brazilian federal government appears from the late dispatches to have begun to get the upper hand in the military campaign against the insurgent movement of Getulio Vargas, liberal leader.

Counter-claims of victory have been issued by both sides, but the federal announcements of success in the rebel state of Minas Gerais seem to be substantiated by subsequent reports, and on the Sao Paulo-Parana front the rebel attack has yet to produce a decisive encounter.

Finances Considered

The federal government asserts the rebels are being driven back north of Rio de Janeiro and into the state of Minas Gerais, and to the west and south of Sao Paulo, having mobilized its soldiers, it is occupied now in mobilizing its finances.

The rebels, whose troops had a long journey from their southern stronghold to the Sao Paulo front, which they hope to make a drive back the blanket assertion they have been victorious in every encounter with the federalists thus far.

One of their latest claims is the capture of Itaperuna, 400 miles north of Rio de Janeiro, from which they hope to make a drive upon the capital. The federalists, however, report the capture of a number of towns between the two points, which will hamper if not check the rebel thrust.

SURVEY IS PLANNED

Study of Cotton Seed Products Industry Contemplated

DALLAS, Oct. 15 (AP)—Detailed plans for a complete economic survey of the entire cotton seed products industry were worked out by directors of the National Cotton Seed Products association at a meeting here today.

Earl S. Haines, executive secretary of the association, with headquarters at Memphis, Tenn., was directed to take charge of the survey, to be conducted by a committee including one experienced accountant, two representatives of terminal cottonseed oil mills, two representatives of smaller oil mills and Louis N. Geldert, editor of the Cotton Oil Press.

Special Meet Is Asked for Drouth Relief

Governor Moody Asked to Call Legislature Into Session to Help Drouth-Stricken Areas

Plans Are Adopted

Fifty Representative Bankers, Legislators, Business Men Meet at Eastland to Pass Resolutions Asking Aid

(By Associated Press)

EASTLAND, Oct. 15.—Governor Dan Moody was asked to call a special session of the legislature to pass measures of relief for drouth-stricken areas as Texas in resolutions adopted at a mass meeting of more than 50 representative bankers, legislators and business men here this afternoon.

The meeting also adopted plans of relief for submission to the legislature. These call for county commissioners of such counties of as desire aid to issue general warrants bearing a low rate of interest, such warrants to be purchased by funds to be appropriated for the purpose by the legislature. The money derived from sale of the warrants would be loaned to farmers to be used in making crops through a committee appointed by the county commissioners. The borrowers, it was proposed, would issue first liens against their crops for the protection of the money lenders. Bankers, merchants or others having liens on the borrower's chattels would retain them, except in instances where they were on crops, when they would become second liens.

Guy Delmer, Glens, president of the Eastland County Bankers association, presided and was elected president of the organization. Garland Eubanks of Throckmorton was named secretary.

Park Board to Improve Sites

Plans to Be Drawn Immediately for Landscaping McCrummen Park to Harmonize with the New High School Building

Decision to draw plans immediately for landscaping of McCrummen park to harmonize with the new high school building was reached Wednesday afternoon at the first meeting of the city park board since a contest to select names for city parks was conducted in late summer.

McCrummen park is on Nineteenth street between the new high school building and Dupre school. Considering plans for landscaping and other beautification of the park, the board also authorized an expenditure for cutting off the northeast corner of the park to eliminate traffic hazard at Nineteenth street and Avenue T.

To Award Prizes

Report of a special committee to name city parks through a contest was presented and it was announced following the meeting that checks of \$5 each would be sent the four persons submitting the winning names.

Names selected for the parks and respective locations follow:

Rolling Prairie, between W and X avenues and Twenty-Sixth and Twenty-seventh streets in McCrummen's second addition in the south.

Laundryman Is Stabbed When Found in Room

Dallas Carpenter Seriously Wounds Andrew T. Tillery When He Finds Him in Hotel Room with Wife

(By Associated Press)

DALLAS, Oct. 15.—Andrew T. Tillery, 47, a laundry wagon driver, was stabbed and seriously wounded today by M. E. Wilson, 37, a carpenter, when Wilson found him in a hotel room with Mrs. Wilson.

Surrendering to officers, Wilson said he and his wife had married recently. He admitted he had served a two-year penitentiary sentence in Oklahoma.

Mrs. Wilson said she lived at the hotel and Tillery had merely called in accordance with his custom for her laundry. She had asked Tillery to return the laundry Thursday, she said, when her husband entered the room.

Tillery was stabbed near the heart with a long knife. Physicians said his condition was very critical.

Additional Men are Sought Before Closing In

(By Associated Press)

GREENFIELD, Mo., Oct. 15.—A man believed to be the abductor of Mrs. Alma Wilson McKinley, daughter of a wealthy oil man, was surrounded late today in a thicket near Filley, Mo., by a posse which sent out a call for additional men before closing in.

The trail of the man was picked up near Eldorado, Mo., by bloodhounds at the place where the girl was held prisoner for nearly a day. She was released late yesterday after promising to bring the man \$10,000 and not reveal where she had been held.

Small Grip Found

The posse this afternoon found a small grip near the place, containing a suit of clothes which would fit the man described by Mrs. McKinley as her abductor.

The ashes of the paper on which a demand for \$30,000 ransom money had been written and laid, burned, also were found. The posse, divided into several sections, stopped and searched every car they saw today. This morning they caught two bands of bootleggers with liquor in cars.

Victim Exhausted

Mrs. McKinley, who is an expectant mother, was exhausted after the ordeal in which she had gone without food or sleep.

A note left at the home of her father, where she was living with her husband, indicated the abductor originally intended to capture and hold for ransom her wealthy father, Benton Wilson. The note was typewritten and the "he" and "him" had been scratched out and "she" and "her" written in pencil.

Finding Wilson away from home, the abductor changed his mind, authorities believed, and took Mrs. McKinley instead.

Disappearance Of Girl Solved By Confession

Ex-Convict Admits That He Strangled Young Missouri Girl to Death; Body Buried in Kansas City Park

(By Associated Press)

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 15.—Mystery surrounding the disappearance of Alvita Woolery, 17, here last August 17, dissolved today with the confession of Paul Kauffman, 31-year-old ex-convict, that he strangled the girl to death and buried her body in a shallow grave in Swope park.

The body of the comely Webb City, Mo., girl, who came here in response to Kauffman's false promise of employment as a nurse-maid, was found Sunday with a pair of women's hose bound around the neck.

Kauffman admitted in a written confession that he met the girl at the Union station here last August 17, and that they had gone to the park together. He told police, orally, he assaulted her.

In writing, he said he strangled her by placing his elbow against her neck, after she resisted his advances and then knotted the stockings.

TWO DIE IN CRASH

Pilot and Passenger Killed When Plane Falls

OLATHE, Kan., Oct. 15 (AP)—Call Dawson, Napoleon, Ohio, pilot, and Ralph H. Yeager, Defiance, Ohio, his passenger, were killed today when an airplane crashed in a field eight miles north of here.

Yeager was killed outright and Dawson died in a hospital at Kansas City.

The bodies were in the plane wreckage nearly a half hour before they were recovered by persons attracted to the scene.

Giant Planes Begin Service On New Route

Tri-Motored Transport Ships Take Off at Dallas, Los Angeles and Atlanta with Mail Passengers

Dallas to Be Stop

Postmaster General Walter F. Brown and Other Prominent Men Accompany Airplanes on Initial Trips Wednesday

(By Associated Press)

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 15.—Giant tri-motored transport ships took the air at Los Angeles, Dallas and Atlanta today in an inauguration of the first regularly scheduled coast-to-coast airmail and passenger service over the southern route.

Four ships flew westward from Atlanta, eastern terminus of the Southern Air Fast Express company, carrying airmail, passengers and mail. Jackson, Miss., Postmaster General, Walter F. Brown, from Los Angeles, west coast terminus of the route, another plane took off with Atlanta as its destination.

At Dallas, Tex., two other planes took off, one for Los Angeles and the other for Atlanta. Each carried mail and passengers.

Dallas To Be Stop

Dallas, lying approximately midway between Atlanta and Los Angeles, will serve as an overnight stop for both east and west bound planes until a portion of the route between Dallas and Los Angeles can be lighted for night flying.

The schedule from coast-to-coast is 19 hours actual flying time. The Atlanta-Dallas-Fort Worth hop has intermediate stops at Tusculum, Ala.; Jackson, Miss.; and Shreveport, La., requires seven hours, while the leg from Dallas to Los Angeles will be flown on a schedule of 12 hours. Stops between Dallas and the west coast terminus, Atlanta, in addition to Postmaster General Brown, included: Assistant Postmaster General W. Irving Glover; Clarence M. Young, assistant secretary of commerce in charge of aviation; Hainer Hinchshaw, vice-president of the Southern Air Fast Express; Postmaster E. K. Large, Atlanta; Graham S. Groves, chairman of the board of the aviation corporation; Elmer Smith and Ruth Nichols, noted women fliers; Captain Thomas De, president of Eastern Air Transport, and newspapermen.

The Woman's Angle

ONE week from tomorrow is the regular meeting date for the city Federation of Women's clubs. Representatives of the various women's organizations in Lubbock should be planning to attend this session. The writer of this column is not running the Federation, in fact she has no official connection with the society at all, but she does want to see it function and is writing this as a reminder to the city women that the union should not be allowed to die.

Whether or not leaders in the organization are planning a program for October 24, she does not know. She has made some effort to get in touch with officers but has found no one who knows definitely that a meeting is to be conducted or that a program is being prepared. In September she asked the president, Mrs. M. J. Stephens, about the meeting and Mrs. M. J. Stephens suggested at that time that probably the first meeting should come in October after other clubs had had their initial meetings. It is October now.

The program should be prepared for the opening date and Lubbock club women should prepare to attend.

After having talked to a number of club women, I believe that they want the Federation to continue, and it will die unless regular meetings are conducted and attractive programs are prepared monthly.

Where there are numbers of women's organizations, as there are in Lubbock, some sort of union is necessary if the members are to work together. And Lubbock women find occasions to function in co-ordination frequently.

Although there were a number of reasons for the formation of the Federation, it was organized with the specific aim of combining the club women of the city preparatory to the erection of a City Club house.

Plans were made by the city of Lubbock, however, for the erection of a municipal hall here and the club women were offered rooms there, so the project of erecting a separate house was dropped and the Federation continued to function.

That the Federation is a medium through which the city women can work together and I believe that practically every one wants the club to continue to meet.

Trees and shrubs were planted in the Northwest portion of the city several seasons ago by the Federation and there is a park committee now to look after further improvement. At one time the Federation sponsored a civic society among the negro women of Lubbock and other such work has been undertaken that should be continued.

Friday, October 24, is the regular meeting date for the Federation and the writer of this column wants to see Lubbock club women at an enthusiastic meeting on that date.

TODAY'S RECIPES
THE last of three green tomato recipes is being run today. These formulas were sent out from the extension department at the Agricultural and Mechanical college to Miss Ruth Stockton, county home demonstration agent.

Green Tomato Pickles are made as follows: One peck green tomatoes, sliced thin; four onions, sliced thin; 1 cup salt; 1-2 ounce cloves; 1 ounce allspice berries; 1-2 ounce peppercorns; 1-2 cup brown mustard seed; 1 pound brown sugar; green peppers, finely chopped; cider vinegar.

Sprinkle alternate layers of tomatoes and onions with salt and let stand over night. In the morning drain and put in enameled lined preserving kettle, adding remaining ingredients and enough vinegar to cover all. Heat gradually to boiling point and boil one-half hour. Pour into hot sterilized jars, using small containers, as the pint or half pint glasses.

Robber Kills Deputy and Is Shot to Death

Convicted Bandit Slays One Officer and Wounds Another on Route to Penitentiary in Kansas Wednesday

PORT SCOTT, Kas., October 15. (AP)—George Magness, convicted bank robber, shot and instantly killed Under Sheriff Melvin C. Hamilton of Labette county, injured Sheriff Alfred C. Coad and was shot to death himself by Sheriff Coad, five miles south of here today.

Coad, Hamilton and Roy McClain, a special deputy sheriff, were taking Magness and Alvin Karpis in a motor car to the state penitentiary at Lansing, Ok., en route where the two yesterday were sentenced to 20 to 100 years imprisonment for the robbery of the First National bank of Edna, Kas., last July 27.

Magness drew a gun and fired point blank at Hamilton, the driver. He then shot Sheriff Coad through the head.

Sheriff Coad turned in the front seat and fired three shots through the robber's body. McClain riding in the rear seat with the prisoners was not injured.

NEW DETROIT PORT
DETROIT—Wayne County's new airport, near here, which was recently dedicated, is one of the most modern fields in the United States. The drainage system consists of about 220 miles of collecting pipe, 14 miles of trunk sewer and three pump houses for raising the water from the discharge ends of the sewers.

Diamond Mining, an Ancient Industry

According to historians, diamond mining existed long before the birth of Christ.

When the average reader runs across some reference to "diamond fields," something entirely erroneous may be imagined. Diamond fields actually consist of deposits of blue rock which have been excavated to such depths that the term "diamond mines" is the more correct term to apply to them.

They used to be fields when the first few stones were picked up on the surface, but all the picking up was done many years ago. It is now necessary to dig deep into the earth for diamonds and the Kaffir workers do not exactly stub their toes on Kohnhoors at every step.

When the blue clay containing the diamonds is removed from the mine it is strewn on great fields, known as compounds, where it is exposed to the action of the elements for from twelve to eighteen months.

Under this treatment much of it disintegrates, but some is so hard that it must be put through crushing machines similar to those used to crush stone for concrete.

The next process is to subject the diamonds to the soluble clay. The clay and water are passed through troughs on the bottom of which is a thick layer of grease for which the diamond has a peculiar affinity.

As the mass goes through trough after trough all the soluble clay and "worth," pebbles are washed out, leaving the diamonds caught in the grease. Sorting and grading of the rough gems thus obtained would of itself cause astonishment to the uninitiated.

Approximately one-quarter carat of diamond is found in each wagon load of blue clay containing twenty cubic feet. Not every diamond is of gem quality. Most diamonds are fit only for such industrial uses as drill points, where their hardness is the essential quality. The few that are suitable for jewelry also vary in grade of purity and color.

Pink white diamonds, free from flaws, are very rare at all times and always will be rare. The diamond, when ideally pure, is colorless. However, only a small proportion is of this character.

A large percentage of the so-called white stones have a tint of yellow, green or brown; a few are of a bluish tint and these are highly esteemed.

The diamond is also found at times in red, sapphire-blue, and emerald-green. These are very rare and are highly valued. Orange color, however, is a rich brown. Also bring a good price and are growing in favor.

Diamonds from the river diggings, Jagersfontein and Du Toit Pan are said to be harder than those from Kimberley, De Beers and Bultfontein.

Diamond Terms Defined
While it is most difficult to set a definite standard in describing them, the term "blue diamond" is much abused. It is common practice now-a-days to describe stones that show no trace of color as "blue white," but such stones rarely show any blue tint. A better and

truer term would be "fine color" and "colorless." The term "perfection" should apply only to the material of the stone and nothing else. If a stone closely examined by a normal eye, under a diamond loupe, disclosed no flaws, cracks, carbon spots, clouds, cloudy texture, or blemishes of any sort, it may properly be described as perfect.

Perfect should never be applied to the cutting of a stone. "Modern cut" and "well cut" are more suitable descriptions and should be permitted.—Adv.

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Cold Weather Safe Robbers Unsuccessful

Thugs Dynamite Safe in Packing Company Plant to Get Only \$7 in Loot; Work in Freezing Temperature

HOUSTON, Oct. 15. (AP)—Working in a temperature that remained precisely at the freezing point, thugs last night dynamited one safe while striking twice in the "produce row" neighborhood. They "worked on" three safes altogether and got \$7. They failed to get some \$5,000.

Police characterized the "cold weather" dynamiting as most unusual. Meat was used to muffle the sound of the blast.

Boat Used

The other "job" was across the street from the Texas Packing company and involved two safes of the wholesale grocery establishment of R. M. Gordon and company, Inc.

The intruders got into one safe and found nothing. They failed to get into the other, which contained about \$500.

Mamal Life at Time of Dinosaur Is Revealed by Discovery of Tiny Tooth

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 15. (AP)—

In convictions, fines and jail sentences was reported, due to the federal courts resuming activities after the summer recess.

Conviction by juries totaled 288 for September as compared with 41 in August and pleas of guilty totaled 3,885 for September as compared with 1,211 in August.

There was a corresponding increase in fines assessed from \$134,451 in August to \$411,214 in September. Total jail sentences reached 389,551 days in September as compared with 35,455 in August.

During the month of September, 6,282 new cases were placed on the dockets of the federal courts. Unfinished cases on the docket totaled 23,007 on August 31, and 24,553 on September 30, an increase of 1,526.

A tell-tale little tooth discovered near some dinosaur egg shells in Montana gives an insight into the possible fate of the earth's largest race of animals, the extinct dinosaurs.

Discovery of the eggs, the first found on this continent, and of the tooth nearby was announced Monday by Dr. Glenn L. Jepsen, head of the Scott Fund Expedition of Princeton University. They were found near Red Lodge in Southern Montana last summer.

The tooth was in the same geo-

logic formation with the nearby egg shells, an indication, said Dr. Jepsen, that its owner may have been more or less contemporaneous with dinosaurs.

The unusual and important aspect of this, he said, is that the tooth owners was a mamal, an animal type usually supposed to have developed after the dinosaurs because extinct.

This Montana mamal was comparatively small, a new mamal type, probably belonging to the marsupials. This is one of the lowest orders of present day mamals, to which belong kangaroos, opossums, wombats and bandicoots.

ONE MINUTE PULPIT

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WESTERN UNION'S FRANCHISE TAX

ROSS TILLEY, assistant attorney general, has been commissioned to collect a tidy little sum of money from the Western Union Telegraph company in order to use the State of Texas.

More than half a million dollars is involved and it covers payment of back taxes, penalties and interest which the state contends is owed it by the telegraph concern.

According to the figures of the State of Texas, the Western Union has paid no franchise tax since the year 1907. The Associated Press announces that other telephone and telegraph companies have paid their franchise tax so the fur will likely fly in an effort to make Western Union toe the mark with all the rest of the firms of like nature.

The Morning Avalanche has made no investigation of the records in the case involved. Its information comes solely through the statements made through Associated Press and credited to the secretary of state and Assistant Attorney-General Ross Tilley.

However, we suspect that the state will have a sweet struggle in making the collection—knowing the "nothing-going-out-and-all-coming-in" policy of the Western Union.

Regardless of whether the Western Union owes the state, you, as a taxpayer, may expect the telegraph company to march to the state capitol and its command to side-step the matter. Western Union is never philanthropic, no stretch of the imagination could so characterize it.

The telegraphic service company does business in many cities in Texas and throughout the world. No appreciable part of its money goes to help build the communities in which it operates. Western Union leases its quarters, pays its salaries and overhead expenses and, in the venacular of the West Texan, "that's the drop." It accepts and delivers telegrams, money orders and so forth, hires its messengers for messenger service—and that's all. You never find it in the forefront of civic endeavor. You never find it sponsoring progress locally. It is one of the last of the big corporations frankly admitting that it is interested in nothing, aside from its own business.

It is firms like the Western Union that The Morning Avalanche delights in seeing "stuck" for everything the law allows. If the telegraph company owes the state, the State of Texas, it is hoped that some collection, along with interest, attorney's fees and court costs, Western Union gives no quarter. In our opinion, it should receive none from the public, nor from the public's business organization, the State of Texas.

Local managers, district superintendents and employees are not to be blamed for the policies of the company, which are set by the handful of men who control the concern. The Morning Avalanche has heard many Western Union managers and lesser officials bemoan the policies which have made the company a mere bystander at the parade of progress. But sooner or later the chaps of Western Union are going to learn that if they want the public to "play ball" with Western Union, Western Union is first going to have to "play ball" with the public. The only way to deal with concerns with policies like Western Union's is to deal through the pocketbook. That's the only kind of sentiment the concern will recognize.

SUPPLY AND DEMAND

Cuba's experiment with governmental regulation of the production of sugar convinced that country that the restrictions benefited every sugar-growing country but Cuba. When Cuba reduced her acreage to force up prices other countries increased their proportionately, leaving the Cubans with a smaller crop to dispose of at the same old low prices.

There is always a danger of this nature in attempts to restrict production. Brazil discovered that restricting the coffee crop worked to the advantage of other coffee-growing countries. The United States may discover that limitation of agricultural output will result in stimulating production elsewhere.

It is because crop restriction on the part of a single government tends to stimulate production elsewhere that the discussion of schemes for cooperative regulation among the American republics during the Inter-American Conference on Agriculture assumes great importance.

With the aid of a high protective tariff and if it produces nothing for export a country might successfully maintain prices for farm products by crop restrictions. But before it can do that it might have an industrial structure capable of absorbing workers displaced on the farms. The United States finds itself in the position of having both surplus labor and surplus farm products.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

DISASTER TO ENGLISH DIRIGIBLE FINDS U. S. EXPERTS IN DISPUTE OVER MERITS OF HUGE AIR LINERS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Aviation is a difficult subject for inexperienced to approach with any prospect of obtaining much information that it can rely on.

Fliers are such fans that it is hard not to suspect them of over-enthusiasm—a suspicion in which inexperience finds some expert encouragement; capable army and navy men, of the old school, but well versed in aeronautics possibilities, while recognizing aviation as highly important to both their services, nevertheless insist that many of the claims made for it are vastly exaggerated. Replying, however, the flying enthusiasts refer to these old timers as hat-beans.

How is experience to judge between them?

There also is the dispute between flying men themselves—as to the relative merits of heavier-than-air craft.

This controversy has been in full operation lately, due to England's recent loss of the R-101, but it is no nearer a settlement than ever, because of the British dirigible's use of hydrogen, admittedly dangerous; whereas non-combustible helium (obtainable only in the United States) is chiefly employed here—and likely to be exclusively employed henceforward, as a sequel to the R-101's destruction.

True, the army and navy consensus is that the R-101 explosion was simply incidental to some other accident and not primarily responsible for the catastrophe. Hydrogen likewise has the advantage of 18 to 20 per cent greater lifting capacity than helium.

For all that, the military preference for the inert gas is unmistakable.

Heavier-than-air craft exponents naturally point to the R-101's fate in support of their long-standing criticism of lighter-than-air vessels as necessarily fragile.

Advocates of the latter type, though careful to avoid comment suggestive of a poor opinion of British construction or navigation, evidently entertain doubts of the British dirigible's airworthiness and perhaps of the competency of its handling.

At any rate, Rear Admiral Moffett's prompt denial of any intention on the United States navy's part to modify the plans of America's dirigible construction at Akron, O., generally was interpreted as implying skepticism of the belief that the R-101's weakness, if any, already had been guarded against in Uncle Sam's newest designs before the overseas catastrophe.

The commerce department's view of aviation problems, as might be expected, is somewhat different from army and navy experts.

The military contingent, of course, are prepared to take risks.

Yet even among army (more particularly than navy) men, lighter-than-air craft obviously are looked on more as a means to an end, rather than as an end in itself.

"Too vulnerable for front line work," is the verdict—outside the circle of the actual dirigible designers.

"They have one advantage—their hover," it is agreed, "but, in our main sphere of usefulness is toward the rear, for the hurry-up transport of supplies and officers over roadless or automobile congested areas."

Without any special hostility to dirigible travel, commerce department aviation's interest always has been centered principally upon airplane development.

Europe, Secretary Lamont's flying experts concede, may offer a field for lighter-than-air transportation—many big cities, close together; a dense population, furnishing passengers in considerable numbers, with a limited amount of freight as a side line.

In the new world, however, it is questioned if an adequate volume of mass patronage is available.

Your Health

MINOR DEFECTS IN SPINE SELDOM HARMFUL
By Dr. Morris Fishbein, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygieia, the Health Magazine

It is now recognized that at least 85 per cent of people have some abnormality or variation in the position of the bones of the spine or of the large bones which form the pelvis.

In the vast majority of cases these minor variations from perfection cause no harm. In an occasional case the spot of abnormality suddenly yields to some unusual strain and becomes responsible for persistent backache.

The possibilities of variations are innumerable and the only way in which one may surely judge their presence or absence is by the making of an X-ray plate which reveals the situation perfectly. It is not impossible to rely on one plate taken from one position; several X-ray plates must be made in various positions.

In many instances the child at birth has an imperfection of the lower portion of the spine which becomes apparent only when stress associated with manual labor in adolescence is applied to the defective area.

It must also be recognized that as men and women become older there is a tendency to put on more weight and that this brings about additional pressure on parts of the bony skeleton not capable of taking care of the added strain.

When a woman goes through childbirth, there are additional strains on various portions of her anatomy. Thus after childbirth it may become necessary to supply especially made corsets or braces to take care of the unusual looseness or the abnormal anatomical conditions.

Sometimes one leg may be slightly shorter than the other or may be crippled through an accident so as to cause a contraction which gives the effect of shortness. When the person walks for a long period of time with this condition, the bones of the spine gradually curve to accommodate the change in strain.

After these compressions or curves take place, the person is likely to suffer with pain in the back so severe as to be incapacitating. The only relief for such pain is in the use of adhesive strapping or the wearing of a brace which helps to take some of the strain off the bones that have been twisted into new positions.

Dr. R. T. Rugh cites a case in which a young man 17 years of age was forced to give up athletics because of a pain in the lower part of the back on any attempt at rowing.

When he was stripped and his spine studied there was a slight deviation to the right side. A careful measurement of the legs showed that the right leg was one-quarter of an inch shorter than the left. The heel was raised one-eighth of an inch on the right and lowered one-eighth of an inch on the left. The young man again took up athletics wearing a quarter-inch wedge in the heel of his right shoe and was successful with his team.

Grimes Given Life Term in Penitentiary

Confessed Companion of Condemned Slayer of Officer Given Extra 99 Years in Speedy Trial Tuesday

HOUSTON, Oct. 15. (P)—E. F. Grimes, confessed companion of J. J. Maple, the condemned slayer of Motorcycle Officer E. D. Fitzgerald, in a number of robberies, was sentenced to life imprisonment plus 99 years, Tuesday in perhaps the speediest trial of that gravity ever held in the county.

Only 18 minutes elapsed from the time a jury filed into the box until the last verdict had been signed. In that 18 minutes two cases were tried and two charges dismissed.

Agreement Reached
An agreement had been reached between counsel and approved by the court, whereby the state asked for the life penalty in two cases and dismissed other charges.

The first case called was a charge of robbery by assault in connection with the holdup of the William Penn cafe on the night of July 31. A verdict already prepared by the clerk was handed to the jury foreman, who after a whispered conference with other members of the jury, signed it and returned it to the court. The jurors did not leave the box. The verdict was life in the penitentiary.

Then the robbery of the Touchy Furniture company on the night of September 20, an hour before the gun battle in which Maple killed Officers Fitzgerald and W. B. Phares was taken up.

The charge in the Touchy robbery case was robbery by firearms. As the jurors were about to take the case under consideration, one of the attorneys pointed out to Judge King that in a robbery by firearms case the penalty is given by the statute at "death or at any term of years in the penitentiary."

As there was no provision for a life sentence under that charge, attorneys agreed to ask for a 99 year sentence. The jurors agreed and the verdict was written accordingly. Grimes pleaded guilty to both.

SPUR, Oct. 15. (Special)—L. B. Withers, an assistant examiner of the national bank examiner's office for the 11th federal reserve district, has been named receiver of the closed City National bank here.

Telegraphic announcement of the appointment was received by Mr. Withers, who was sent here to take over the affairs of the bank when it closed its doors several weeks ago. Formal notice is expected at any time.

The receiver has made an audit of the affairs of the bank and has submitted it to the comptroller of the currency. Collection of the accounts due the bank is expected to start soon.

Orders Received
Though the statues have not yet been made, orders have already been received from New York, Los Angeles, and other distant points as the result of a story recently published in El Paso revealing the plan of White, Leedy, and Duncan. Leedy, designer of the statues, is a scenic artist, oil color painter, and cartoonist of more than local note. For the past two years he has been engaged in the sale of real estate and town lots at Hobbs, but has recently returned to Tahoka.

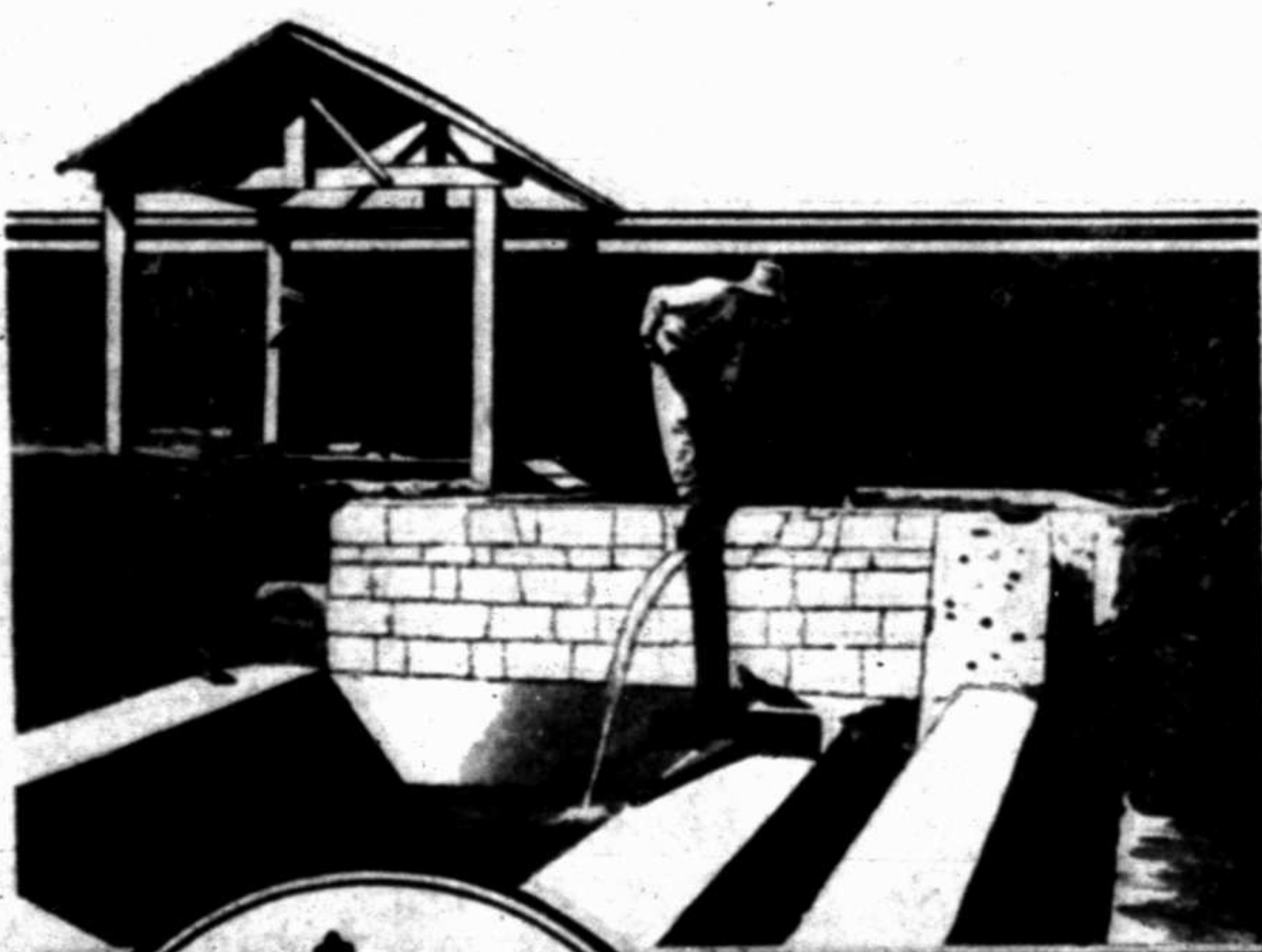

Texas Steers May Surprise Oklahoma Set

Conference Spotlight Turned on Waco Where Mustangs and Baylor Bears Meet; Rice Due to Defeat Arkansas

DALLAS, Oct. 15. (AP)—There is a growing suspicion in Southwest conference football circles that the University of Texas Longhorns are preparing to toss a surprise party at Fair Park stadium here Saturday, with the University of Oklahoma Sooners as honorees.

There could never be a better opportunity. The Sooners, flushed with a last week's triumph over Nebraska, are said to be absolutely saturated with confidence that they will lay the Longhorns.

Texas at Zenith
Brought along slowly by Coach Littlefield, the big Texas eleven is about due to reach the zenith of its power this week, just as it did a year ago against the same Sooners. Up to the time they met and squashed Oklahoma last season, the Longhorns had shown nothing to speak of, beating St. Edward's only 13 to 0 and taking Centenary, 20 to 0, with the aid of some very fortunate breaks, but what a football club they were on October 12, 1929!

Last week the Steers beat Howard Payne, 36 to 0, in the rain and mud. The Yellowjackets, who had scored a touchdown on S. M. U. a fortnight before, made only one first down through the Longhorns' staunch defense.

Longhorns Heaviest Of Conference
Texas will send the Southwest's heaviest team against the invaders. Averaging 182 pounds to the man, the Steers will have an advantage of eight pounds over the Sooners. The Orange backfield averages 177 pounds. Roy, 180, and Shelly, 185, should lead the light Oklahoma forwards a world of misery.

Jennings Ready For Ponies
Satisfied that his line, from tackle to tackle, can spike any team's running attack, Coach Morley Jennings is drilling his Baylor Bears against Southern Methodist's line. He figures he will have an excellent chance to defeat the Mustangs Saturday at Waco if his secondary can check the aerial circus.

Almost exactly the same teams that meet Saturday represented the Bears and Mustangs in last year's battle here, which the Methodists won, 20 to 0.

With Gilbert still in there to peg passers, and Koonitz, Long and Kattman, to receive, it is little wonder Coach Jennings has something on his mind besides the weather this week.

The Rice Owls are favored to win a conference football game this week when they tackle the Arkansas Razorbacks high up in the Ozark hills. In view of this extraordinary circumstance, the writer has gone to some pains to find out if the Owls ever did win a conference tilt, and, if so, when.

Owls Won Two Games
The record discloses that in the last five years the Houston flock has been on the long end of the score twice, once in '25 and again in '27. In the same period the Owls have lost 30 conference bouts and tied one. For the last two seasons they have drawn a complete blank, losing each of 10 championship starts.

Southern Methodist, the archives show, has compiled the greatest record over a five-year period, winning 18 conference games, losing five and tying four. The Mustangs are the only team to go through an undefeated, untied conference schedule in the half-decade. They did it in '28, winning all their five starts.

Records of the other conference schools for the last five years follow:

Steers Next In Line
University of Texas, won 13, lost 4, tied 3; Baylor, won 12, lost 7, tied 2; Texas Christian, won 12, lost 7, tied 7; Texas Aggies, won 12, lost 9, tied 4; Baylor, won 8, lost 12, tied 4.

A discrepancy between games won and lost is explained by the fact that many of Arkansas' "conference" games were played against Louisiana State and Oklahoma Aggies and counted in their standing by special arrangement. There will be none of that this year, as the Razorbacks have games scheduled with four bona fide conference members.

Spur Bulldogs to Meet Whirlwinds

SPUR, Oct. 15. (Special).—The Spur Bulldogs returned Sunday from Cisco battered and bruised with Capt. Brode Puckett and Carr suffering knee injuries that will keep them out of the lineup for the next two or three games. Practice was begun Monday for the game with Florida at Florida next Friday afternoon.

The Bulldogs won their first conference game against Ralls, here, last Friday with their second string but are expecting harder opposition at Florida and will use what regulars that are in shape. This will be the last game away from home for the Spur team and a larger number of Spur people is expected to make this trip than any heretofore.

Check Reveals Big Upsets in Nearly All Grid Circles; Big Six Members in Topsy-Turvy Condition

NEW YORK, Oct. 15. (AP)—The football season still is young but a nationwide checkup today revealed that already some of the sectional champions of 1929 have gone down to defeat while ambitious rivals press forward to take their place in the van.

Nowhere is situation more topsy-turvy than in the "Big Six" where Nebraska, the champion of 1929 and 1928, was soundly beaten by Oklahoma last week, and Missouri, the runner-up last season, had bowed to both Colorado University and St. Louis outside the conference.

Nebraska Out For Revenge
Nebraska will attempt to retrieve some of its lost prestige this Saturday in a game with Iowa State, tall order of last year, while Kansas and the Kansas Aggies clash in a game that may stamp one or the other a favorite in the title race.

Oklahoma A. and M. coached by Lynn Waldorf, former Syracuse tackle, will have to be reckoned with in the championship race in the regular Missouri Valley conference. The Sooner Aggies have beaten Iowa and tied Indiana while Drake, the leader in 1929, has been bowing to Oregon and Marquette.

Purdue Loses Opener
Purdue, the Big Ten title holder, was defeated in its first conference game by Michigan last Saturday. Illinois, runner-up last year, and Northwestern, which tied for third, come to grips this Saturday in one of the most important games of the Big Ten race.

In the south, Tulane, winner of Southern conference honors last year, has bowed to Northwestern outside the conference. Tennessee, runner-up, is riddled with injuries and expects to be hard pressed by Alabama this Saturday. Georgia, conqueror of Yale, and Vanderbilt, which overwhelmed Minnesota, are rated among the best, with Georgia clashing Saturday in a "make or break" game with North Carolina, another contender.

T. C. U. Vs. Texas Aggies
Texas Christian, although tied for Simmons, another Arkansas tie last week in its conference opener, and now will tackle Texas A. and M. while Southern Methodist, runner-up last year, opposes Baylor.

Utah University, in its first game in defense of the Rocky Mountain conference crown, swamped Wyoming, 72-0.

Three Stars Out
Injuries and sickness have kept three of Coach Frnka's best players off the field this week. Moody Smith is out with a serious cold. McGhee has not been able to play since the Childress game because of a badly sprained ankle, and Brittain is out with an injured shoulder.

The Westerners will leave tonight or early tomorrow for Electra. After the game this week the locals will be idle until November 1 when the Amarillo Sandies come to Lubbock for one of the feature games of the season.

Jack Diamond Rallies from Three Wounds

Gangster Flings Traditional Defiance at Authorities in Search of His Assailants; Thought on Death Bed

NEW YORK, Oct. 15. (AP)—Jack (Legs) Diamond, the gangster, rallied sufficiently today from wounds that were expected to kill him, to fling traditional underworld defiance at authorities in search of his assailants.

District Attorney Crain visited him in the Polytechnic hospital and physicians said Diamond was on his death bed and asked the racketeer if he knew the men who shot him in a West Side hotel room Sunday morning.

In a voice of healthy timber which seemed to belie the physician's death sentence, Diamond replied:

All Strangers
"Judge, I don't know, and if I did I wouldn't tell you. They were all strangers to me. They came to my room in the hotel Monticello and shot me."

A hospital bulletin this afternoon said the gangster was "sinking" and a lung had collapsed. A surgeon said privately the gangster's wounds were three in number, not five, as was at first reported, and that only one was responsible for his grave condition. This bullet, lodged in a tubercular lung, was causing internal bleeding that was almost certain to prove fatal, he said.

Argument Blamed
After scrutinizing every scrap of information unwarmed by detectives in the 72 hours since the gunmen "got" Diamond, Police Commissioner Mulrooney announced he was convinced the shooting resulted from an argument over money.

Mulrooney said Diamond was in financial straits. J. M. Ginters, manager of the hotel Monticello, was subjected to further questioning today. The authorities also examined "Dutch" Schultz, reputed Bronx beer runner who police said had openly threatened to kill Diamond.

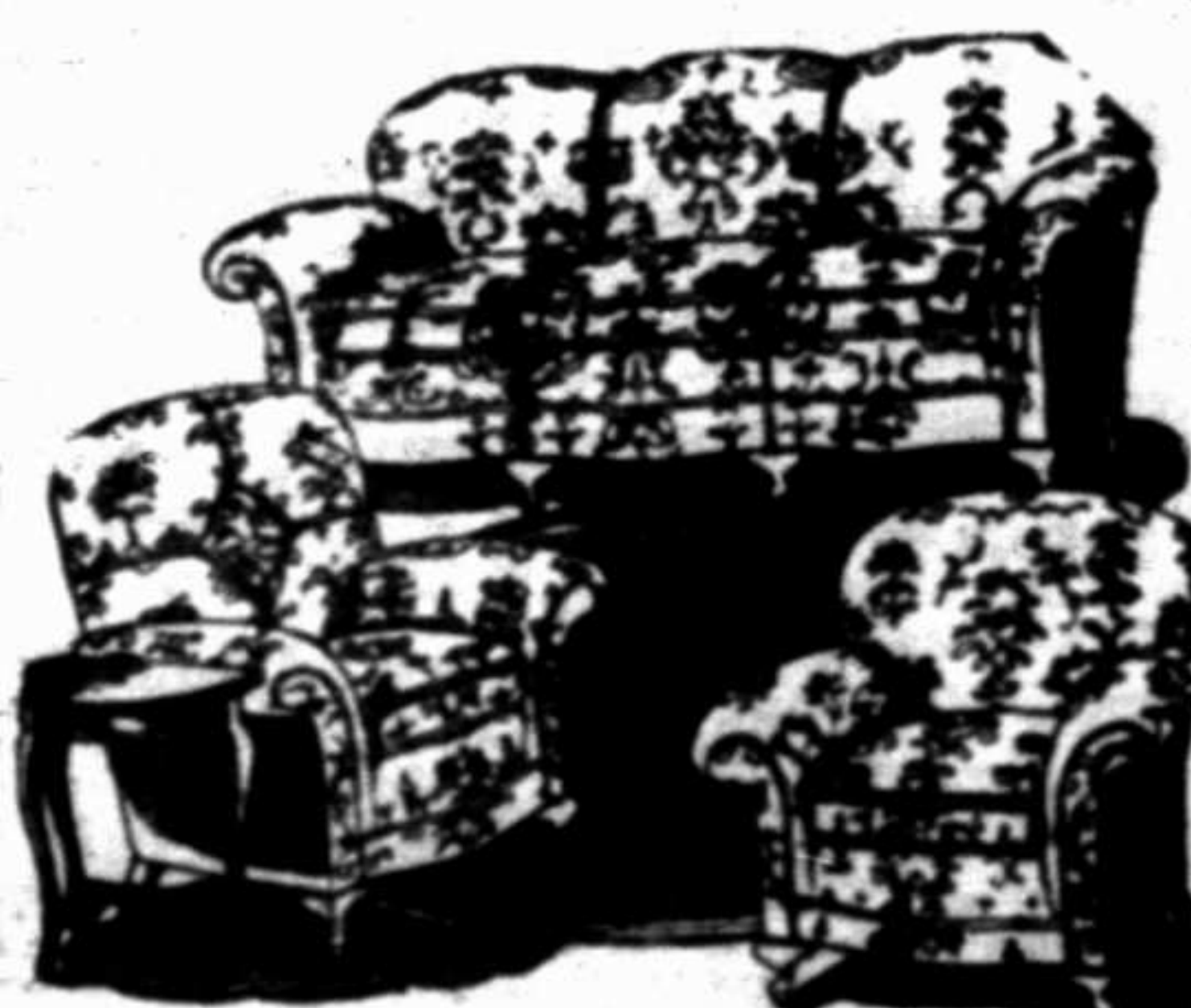

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No Action Is Taken on Plan To Aid Schools

Board of Education Fails to Act of Seven Proposals for Relief to Schools in West Texas Drought Counties

AUSTIN, Oct. 15. (AP)—The state board of education today declined to take any action on six of the seven proposals for relief of schools in the drought stricken areas. The board, however, expressed itself as being in sympathy with the problem of the schools in drought areas and adopted a resolution to give any aid possible within the statutory and constitutional limitations.

The only proposal that received favorable action was one asking the state department of education to send high school supervisors and inspectors into the drought areas immediately to ascertain the needs and to make a detailed report of probable relief measures.

Permission Needed
In turning down the other six proposals, the board decided three requests could not be complied with unless special permission was given by the legislature and that the other three were purely legislative functions.

Members of the board expressed the opinion that conditions in the drought area are no worse now than in 1916 and 1917 and stated the counties should be able to work out their problems satisfactorily without material detriment to the schools.

The board refused to recommend that the legislature make a special appropriation for schools in drought areas on the ground this was a matter of public policy and should be handled by the legislature. Another proposal to request the legislature to establish a special loan fund from which the schools could borrow and secure the loans with delinquent taxes was refused as not feasible. S. M. N. Marra, state superintendent of education.

pointing out that counties now may issue warrants to pay salaries, the warrants to be paid out of delinquent tax collections.

Field Impractical

A third proposal, that the legislature be requested to increase rural aid funds to maintain the schools seven months, was declared impractical since the legislature would have to make the appropriation applicable to the entire state.

The fourth relief suggestion was held not practical. It asked the state department of education to permit the retention of classification and affiliation on an eight month school term. Marra stated the board had agreed with the colleges and universities on the minimum requirements for entrance to schools of higher education and that any change might affect this relationship.

The request that per capita apportionments for the entire scholastic year be paid to drought affected counties by February 1 was held to violate the statute providing the appropriation.

The board decided it did not have the power to waive the requirement of specific lengths of terms of rural schools receiving state aid in turning down the sixth proposal which asked that schools be permitted to shorten the terms without forfeiting state aid rights.

The drought relief program was submitted to the board by L. W. Johnson, superintendent of Stafford schools, following a survey made of 38 counties in the drought area.

Plainview Opens Up New Industry

Chinchilla Rabbit Fur Being Used To Make Coats And Other Articles; Several People Raising Animals

(Special To The Avalanche)

PLAINVIEW, Oct. 15. — Fur coats made from fur grown and produced at Plainview are being manufactured in Plainview and offered for sale here. This is an entirely new manufacturing industry for this section and it is expanding rapidly.

W. L. Hogue, for many years a tailor at Plainview, has entered the furrier and taxidermy business, devoting the major part of his time to making fur products from the furs produced in this area.

Mrs. Hogue, who assists her husband in the plant, has a new coat of chinchilla rabbit fur made in the new establishment. This coat was made from furs grown by Dr. N. B. Mayhugh of Plainview, and so far as is known, is the first coat of its kind to be manufactured in this city. The coat would retail for approximately \$250. Chinchillas are plentiful around Plainview, several people raising them, and Hogue expects to manufacture many more coats of this kind.

Princess Will Wed Boris in Gothic Church

Giovanna, Daughter of King and Queen of Italy, Will Marry Bachelor King of Bulgaria Probably Oct. 25

ROME, Oct. 15. (AP)—The Princess Giovanna, 23-year-old daughter of the king and queen of Italy, tonight appeared certain to become the bride of Boris, bachelor king of Bulgaria, in the oldest Gothic church in Italy where she has so often prayed over the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi.

There was still nothing official about the date or place of the wedding today. There was a little doubt, however, that the bride would fulfill her wish that the marriage be the great religious event of her life. She not only is devoted to the memory of the saint, but is a tertiary of the Franciscan order.

Not To Attend
So far as known, the wedding will take place Oct. 25, Premier Mussolini

From the Vatican's point of view, however, the Bulgarian ceremony will be construed as a recording in that country of the Italian Catholic marriage, since orthodox priests there serve as civil registrars of weddings.

From the Bulgarian people's standpoint the ceremony may be regarded as a marriage in their favor. This would make the Bulgarian ceremony, combined with the coronation, the more important. Such a combination would be acceptable since under the consti-

tution the king must be married in his own country.

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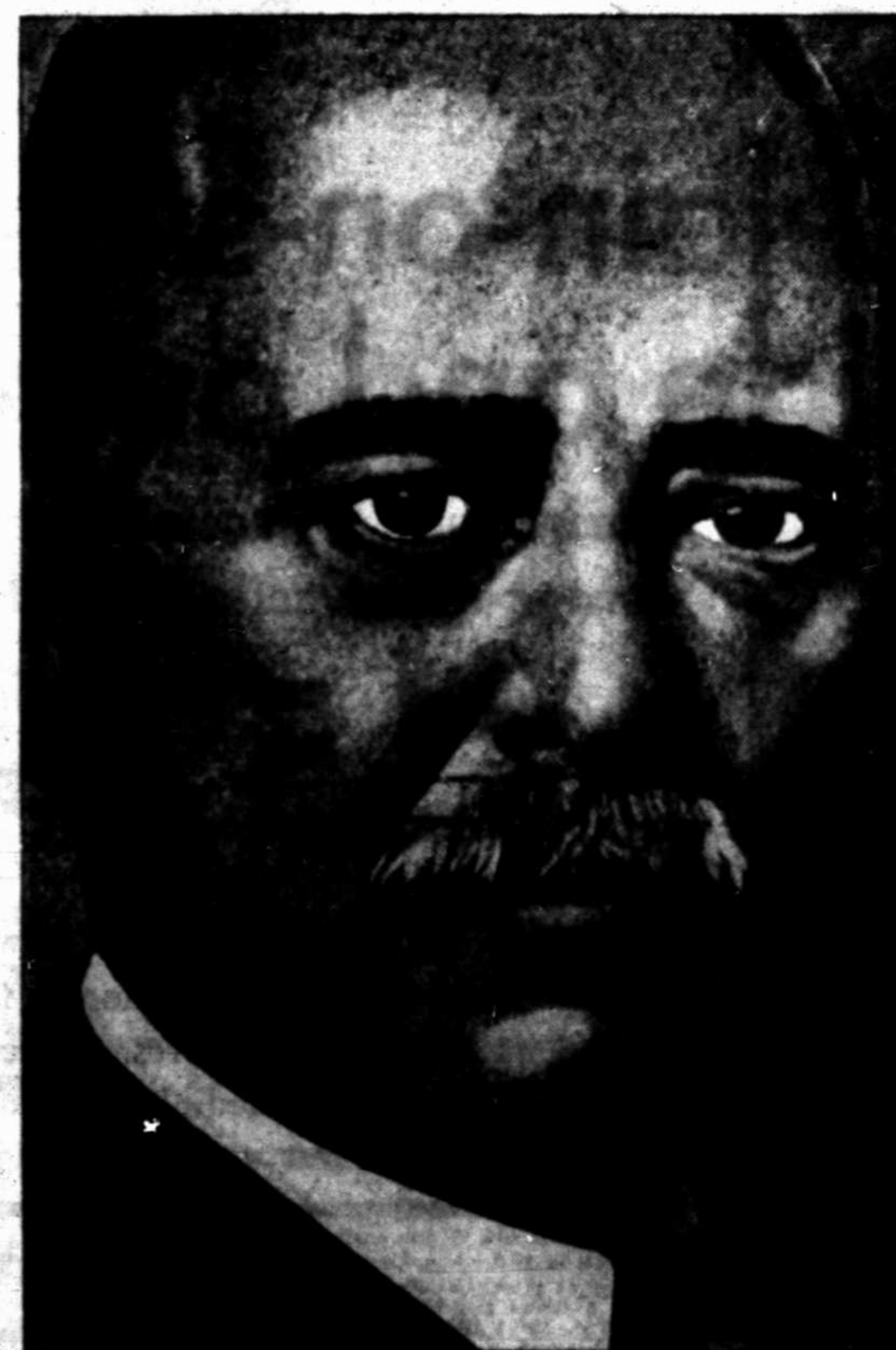

G.O.P. Heads Furnish Peep Behind Scenes

Dwight Morrow and William E. Borah, "Strong Men" of Republican Party Forecast Activity of 1932

BY BYRON PRICE
WASHINGTON, Oct. 5. (AP) — Two of the "strong men" of the republican party, Dwight Morrow of New Jersey and William E. Borah of Idaho, have given the country an illuminating peep behind the scenes of the big political show in 1932.

It was the wet Morrow who declared last night he hoped to vote again for Herbert Hoover in 1932. It was the dry Borah who challenged those who are trying to remove from the picture a figure already hailed by his friends as a possible candidate against Hoover—Clifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania.

Morrow mentioned. Morrow himself has been mentioned often as a presidential possibility two years hence. His overwhelming nomination for the senate on a platform calling for the repeal of prohibition put him into a position of conceded leadership among republican wets. His declaration for Hoover, however, in no way surprised the president's circle of political advisers. They had expected such a pronouncement at the proper time, and Mr. Morrow picked a time when, within a few days, several dry leaders had forecast his nomination over Hoover in the next republican national convention.

Morrow repeatedly has labeled himself a regular. Although he disagrees with the Hoover platform on prohibition, he praised the president's economic policies. By so much, he has weakened any threat that serious opposition to a renomination for the president will come from the wet eastern wing of the party.

Borah's statement mentioned neither President Hoover nor 1932, but it emphasized again the rift between the dry western insurgents and outstanding party leaders of the east.

Pinchot became the republican nominee for governor of Pennsylvania over the opposition of several of these leaders, and a considerable number have bolted the ticket. Among them is W. W. Atterbury, president of the Pennsylvania railroad, and until recently republican national committeeman. A defeat for the governorship might conceivably remove Pinchot as a presidential possibility, and a victory in the present circumstances would hasten his friends to offer him as a leader of the insurgents everywhere.

Water Supply Is Given Approval

Lubbock's water supply was giv-
ing unqualified approval by H. E.
Hargis, Austin, district sanitary en-
gineer for the state board of health,
on the occasion of his regular visit
here yesterday. Recently he made an
inspection of the water system here.
Mr. Hargis recommended to the
state that the water was of the
type that could be used satisfac-
torily in locomotives engaged in in-
terstate traffic as it met all re-
quirements for that kind of water.
City officials believe that the
recommendation will be accepted by
the state.

Moisture Will Insure Crops

Rainfall So Far Already Half
Inch Above Normal for Octo-
ber, According to Don L.
Jones of Experiment Farm

With 3.05 inches of rainfall regis-
tered at the state experiment sta-
tion here since October 1, or nearly
half an inch more than the normal
fall for October, there is enough
moisture on hand or rather in the
ground to insure wheat being car-
ried through until in February. Don
Jones, superintendent of the farm,
believes.

Rainfall so far in 1930 is slightly
more than half of normal fall for
the year up to October 15. Normal
is around 18 inches while the fall
has been 10.05 inches.
Ready for Picking
Half of the county's cotton crop
is ready for picking and work is
starting in good shape. There has
been some damage to cotton from
recent rains but the extent has not
been indicated. It depends a great
deal on the bolls that have opened
and dropped off. Mr. Jones said.
If cotton was down on the ground
before the rain was knocked
down it doubtless was stained con-
siderably," he added.

May Be Stained
"Cotton that is not open or is
just opening may be stained just
a little. Any cotton that was blown
down on the ground by the rain
of course is badly damaged."

The bulk of the cotton in Lub-
bock county is pretty well along.
In the event that a hard freeze
comes before the normal date of
first frost, about November 1, it is
expected that considerable damage
will be done to the cotton.

The earliest frost reported in 15
years in this county was October
19," Mr. Jones added. "The average
first frost is November 1.
Wheat planted last week before
the rains is up and showing good
and will be ready for pasture un-
der normal fall and winter condi-
tions, about the latter part of De-
cember or the first of January, Mr.
Jones declared.

Let It Stool
"It is a good thing to let the
wheat stool pretty well before put-
ting cattle on it," he added.
"Under ideal conditions, wheat
planted in September will be ready
for pasture about the first of De-
cember. It is best to keep cattle
off until wheat has had time to get
a good stand. Two to two and a half
months is best time for growing
before cattle are put on the wheat."

Farmers in Lubbock county prefer
wheat for winter pasture. "Barley
winter kills and farmers do not use
it much," Mr. Jones added. "They
have never taken to rye for some
reason."

If sweet clover is planted this fall
it will not be ready for pasture until
about August of next year.

GINNINGS DECREASE
LEVELLAND, Oct. 15. (Special.)
—The four gins in Levelland up to
October 10 had ginned 2,322 bales
of cotton. Last year the same gins
had ginned 3,840 bales. There are
six rural gins operating this year
that did not operate in 1929. No
figures are available for them.
