ATTENDING SCHOOL FOR COACHES IN FORT WORTH

Abernathy School athletic department coaches are attending the Texas High School Coaches Association Coaches School in Fort Worth this week. They are Don Williams, Wendell Jones, Robert Higgins, botham and Gary Abercrombie. Earlier, Mitch LeMoine attended a meeting of high school girls basketball coaches in Duncanville.

The 59th Annual Field Day at the South Plains Research and Extension Center southeast of New Deal will begin at 1 p. m. Sept. 10.

Tours of field plots and an open house will continue throughout the afternoon, announced Dr. Arthur Onken, soil fertility scientist and field day chairman. The center is about 7 1/2 miles north of Lubbock, on U. S. 87.

General theme for the field day is "Service to West Texas Agriculture: Past-Present-Future."

Highlights will be discussions and tours of test plots on cotton varieties and diseases, weed control, soil fertility, irrigation flexibility and sorghum midge control, Onken said.

Planned For Farmer
"Each year this field day is planned and developed with the intent of providing the South Plains farmer with the latest information on the most important and most current agricultural production problems," he said. "Research results will be explained and information will be provided to assist the farmer in making management decisions about crops, water, fertilization, timing operations, agricultural chemicals, mechanization and water."

Other attractions will be a large machinery exhibit, a newly constructed ginning laboratory, greenhouse and laboratory tours and displays on home economics and 4-H Club programs on the South Plains.

More than 40 research scientists and extension specialists headquartered at the center will assist with the field day. County agricultural agents from throughout the South Plains will serve as tour guides.

MONTGOMERY IS AT SEMINAR



Three high school students from this county are attending the sixth annual Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar July 30-August 3 on the Campus of Baylor University in Waco, according to Owen Benn of Abernathy, president of the Hale County Farm Bureau.

The students are Jerry Ann Grimes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Grimes of Petersburg, representing Petersburg High School; Charlotte McCluskey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. McCluskey of Aiken, who attends and is representing Cotton Center High School; and Burt Montgomery of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Montgomery of Abernathy, representing Abernathy High School.

The annual training school for high school junior and senior students is an intensive course in citizenship, our American heritage and the proper role of government, according to Mr. Benn.

"It is designed to complement the formal education of these young folks and make their roles as citizens more meaningful," the local farm leader said.

The County Farm Bureau sponsors the local students by paying their tuition, room and board, and transportation to and from Waco. Travel is by chartered bus. A total of 425 students from 156 counties are enrolled for this year's seminar.

Four nationally-known lecturers will address the 1968 school. They are: Dr. Clifton L. Gaus, president of Harding College, Searcy, Arkansas; Dr. C. L. Kay, president of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, author of "I Was a Slave in Russia"; and W. Cleon Skousen, author, lawyer, and former FBI agent.

Emphasis will be placed on the economic, moral and social aspects of American society. Instruction will consist of lectures, films, and panel discussions.

PUBLIC NOTICE**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of any further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

PUBLIC NOTICE**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR24)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any real property or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR16)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

PUBLIC NOTICE**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PUBLIC NOTICE**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)**

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Section III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

PUBLIC NOTICE**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. 1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning.

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (.35%); On January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (.30%); On January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (.25%); On January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (.20%); On January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (.15%); On January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (.10%); On January 1, 1974, Five Cents (.05%); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (.2%) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and the trust fund is established by the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes, together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Capt. Prather Gets Silver Star

The Silver Star for his courageous performance and outstanding leadership during an attack on a numerically superior enemy position in Vietnam has been awarded a former Hale Center football and basketball star.

The decoration was presented to Captain Dan Prather, son of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Prather, for his role in a fierce skirmish in the village of LienLac on February 8.

The citation, authorized by the direction of the President of the United States, followed: "Awarded: Silver Star. Date action: 3 February 1968."

"Theatre: Republic of Vietnam."

"Reason: For gallantry in action against a hostile force on 8 February 1968 in the Republic of Vietnam. Captain Prather distinguished himself by intrepid action while serving as commanding officer of Company B 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry. On that date, he was maneuvering his company to the location of another company which was in heavy contact with a numerically superior enemy force. As they approached the village of LienLac (2), his company came under intense small arms, automatic weapons, and mortar fire from a battalion size force of North Vietnamese Army Regulars.

"While expertly directing the movement and fire of his men, Captain Prather with disregard for his own safety, continually maneuvered among his men in an effort to pinpoint the enemy positions. After quickly locating the insurgent's positions, he personally directed air and artillery support.

"With expert rifle fire and skilled maneuvering, Captain Prather and his command silenced the enemy within the area and continued to move forward in search of remaining enemy forces.

"Captain Prather's personal bravery, professional leadership and devotion to duty are in keeping with the highest traditions of the military services and reflect great credit upon himself, the American Division and the United States Army."

WITH NINE MONTHS of exhausting combat service behind him, Captain Prather took time out during the July 4th holiday season for a delayed rest and recuperation furlough which he spent with his pretty, dark-eyed wife, Jo, in Honolulu.

Jo, a second grade teacher in the Dimmitt school system, returned home last Thursday by jet aircraft following a week's reunion with her husband. They left Wednesday from the same airport, with Captain Prather departing at 8:30 a.m. and Jo leaving an hour and a half later.

After arriving at Honolulu, Captain Prather and Jo contacted an old friend Ray Ichimura, a native Hawaiian who served with Dan when both of them were second lieutenants at Fort Hood, Texas. Ray now working at a bank in Honolulu and his young wife of two years, also a school teacher, hosted them on a sight-seeing trip of the Island and treated them to a Don Ho show and a Chinese dinner.

CAPTAIN PRATHER is now assigned to the 11th Infantry Division in Vietnam. But it was with Company B 1st Battalion, 6th Infantry that he distinguished himself for bravery. He won recognition resulting from his ingenuity in

setting traps during night operations against enemy troops. His "Rat Patrol" turned the tables on the enemy by setting up their own ambushes catching the Viet Cong by surprise. His method of operations in the night sorties was written into combat manuals and he gained the nickname of "Grandfather Rat" from his troopers.

Captain Prather was so highly regarded by his officers and men that he received a handsome hand-polished plaque from his company when he was re-assigned. The plaque contained miniature flags of the U. S. and Vietnam, a map of Vietnam in inlaid silver, and an engraved inscription reading: "From the officers and NCO's of Company B to Captain Dan E. Prather, Ft. Hood, Texas, Texas and Vietnam."

SOCIAL SECURITY
Questions and Answers

By MANCIE KING -
Social Security Representative

Q. I will be 24 years old this month. My husband and I have two children. I have worked and earned \$3,600 in each year 1965, 1966 and 1967 under social security. If I should die, would my family be able to get social security checks on my earnings? If so, how much?

A. Yes. If you and your husband were living together, he could receive a lump sum death benefit in the amount of \$225 to help with burial expenses. Each of your children would be eligible for \$66.30 a month so long as they were not married and under age 18, or up to age 22 if in full time attendance at school. If either or both should become unable to work before they attained age 18, the monthly checks would continue as long as they were unable to work and not married.

Questions and Answers

Q. I will be 63 soon and I have arthritis so bad that I can work only about one-half the time. I will earn only about \$2000 this year and I need more money to pay my bills. Can social security help me?

A. Yes. You can apply for retirement benefits any time at age 62 or after. If you receive social security retirement checks before you reach age 65, a reduction of five-ninths of one per cent must be made in your monthly checks for each full month for which you receive the retirement checks. However, the reduced monthly checks may be the answer to your need.

You can earn as much as \$1680 in a year without any deductions from your benefits for the year. If you earn \$2000 the first \$160 of benefits could not be paid for the year because \$1 in benefits must be withheld for each \$2 earned over \$1680 up to \$2880.

There also is a disability program under social security. If you can earn \$2000 in a year, it is doubtful that you would qualify as a disabled worker. We will be glad to discuss it fully with you, however, and help you to apply for either retirement or disability benefits. Q. I will be 24 years old this month. My husband and I have two children. I have worked and earned \$3,600 in each year 1965, 1966 and 1967 under social security. If I should die, would my family be able to get social security checks on my earnings? If so, how much?

A. Yes. If you and your husband were living together, he could receive a lump sum death benefit in the amount of \$225 to help with burial expenses. Each of your children would be eligible for \$66.30 a month so long as they were not married and under age 18, or up to age 22 if in full time attendance at school. If either or both should become unable to work before they attained age 18, the monthly checks would continue as long as they were unable to work and not married.
