Air Mail

Sources close to the administration predict the government will end up carrying its own air mail for keeps since the President's cancellation of existing contracts.

Mr. Roosevelt refuses to discuss the situation. He says it's too early.

But you can lay a bet that operations with Army planes in the next few months will be closely checked with an eye to setting up a permanent fleet of government mail planes.

It's also safe to bet that a terrific lobby will descend on Washington to balk the move. Commercial aviation will shed oceans of tears to prove that it can't get along without mail contracts.

Also every section of the country will be apprehensive as to how the air mails will be re-routed.

Congress and the White House will both feel the pressure.

Slayer Shot To Death Resisting Officers Later

AMARILLO, Texas, (AP)—Chester Grounds, 25, Amarillo policeman, was shot and killed Wednesday in line of duty. Clarence Hammonds, ex-convict, who fired the fatal shot, was slain a short time later by police as he resisted arrest while attempting to escape.

Grounds was killed when he made a call on Hammonds' home, the man firing three shots as he ran out the back door.

Two policemen found Hammonds in a garage an hour later and shot him down when he attempted to pull a gun and fire on the officers.

District Court Is Concluded Here Today

Much Civil And Criminal Activity Experienced In Term Just Ended

Work of finishing the present term of 10th district court went forward Wednesday to conclusion. Judge Charles L. Klapproth, district judge, attended to matters claiming his attention before preparing to leave for Midland.

He left behind the record of 19 dismissed civil cases, 24 cases passed by agreement of counsel, 20 cases continued, and judgments in 44 cases.

Criminal docket also experienced much change. Twenty-two cases were dismissed on motion of District Attorney Bob Hamilton when a change in the state liquor law made prosecution inadvisable. Four cases were continued, fifteen tried and bond forfeitures were ordered in one instance.

The past term of district court spent 38 days in active session, having convened January 1.

CLARKSVILLE, Texas (AP)—Bloodhounds and possums were close on the trail of Frank Clark, negro, who killed Dan Stiles and his wife, an Oklahoma farm couple Tuesday and fled toward the Red river thickets.

Officers concentrated their search at Rock Crossing, where the negro had been traced and reported the slayer at breakfast at a farm house near here early Wednesday.

Commissioners Court Settles For 2 More Tracts Of Roadway

County commissioners court has obtained an easement across the W. H. Abrams, deceased, section at Jatan tank and reached a settlement with the Furr Estate for two miles of right of way immediately west of Coahoma on re-routed highway No. 1.

Only two tracts between the Big Spring city limits and the eastern county line remain in private hands.

John Merrick, who holds a one mile strip of land through which the road must pass is ill with pneumonia and will be unable for some time to confer with the court.

A three-fourths mile tract next to the eastern county line must also be obtained.

Dr W. B. Hardy Is Named As Chamber Head

Nine Hundred And Fifty Million Appropriation Called For

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The senate Wednesday completed congressional action on the \$950,000,000 appropriation bill for the CWA. Distress relief.

It now goes to the White House. Previously fear had been expressed that the four million workers of CWA would not get their pay envelopes Saturday unless congress acted.

Possibility of employees also finding themselves out of jobs had existed before action Wednesday.

Meanwhile, Harry Hopkins, CWA administrator, said he believed the British system of unemployment insurance was far better than the American relief methods.

Long Time Resident Dies At Home Near Vincent Tuesday

Eliza Jefferson Roberts, 68, long time resident of Howard county, died at 9:45 p. m. Tuesday following an illness of more than a year.

He died at his home near Vincent, where he had lived since settling there in 1907. He was born in Louisiana.

Mr. Roberts is survived by his widow, Mrs. E. J. Roberts, and five sons, George of Amarillo, Joe and Jack of Las Cruces, New Mexico, and Jeff and Hoyt of Vincent. A daughter and two other sons are deceased. A son, Frank Roberts, died here in 1932.

Funeral services will be held from the Vincent Methodist church Thursday afternoon with Rev. J. D. Harvey of Colorado in charge. Mr. Roberts was a member of the Church of Christ, having joined in 1897. He had been married for 46 years.

Socialists Fall Before Gun Fire Of Government

VIENNA (AP)—Socialist strongholds crumbled before the heavy machine gun and artillery fire loosed in a sweeping government offensive Wednesday.

The government broadcast that the opposition had been vanquished at all points.

Socialist headquarters, where revolutionaries had taken their refuge, were captured after fierce fighting with a thousand estimated already dead.

Fighting broke out again in Vienna and the government summoned all available manpower into the capital.

Chancellor Dollfuss said the socialist's attempt to resist the government with armed force was "madness." He said "already this undertaking has failed and the position of the government is stronger than ever."

A run was started on the Vienna Municipal bank, a socialist enterprise. Soldiers with fixed bayonet kept the wild crowd in line.

Resignation Of Woodring Is Expected

White House Vexed Over Assistant War Secretary's Articles

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Washington Evening Star said Wednesday Harry Woodring, assistant secretary of war, "was expected to resign shortly." The paper said reports were "current in government circles."

It was said his resignation was looked for regardless of outcome of investigations being made of Woodring's handling of war department contracts.

The White House recently asked him for explanation of magazine articles he wrote describing the Civilian Conservation Corps as a potential military unit.

FDR Wants Ocean Mail Reorganized

Favors Outright Subsidy In Place Of Present Government Forms

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Roosevelt wants complete reorganization of the ocean mail contract system and favors an outright subsidy in place of the present form of government aid to shipping.

He said he favored a government subsidy to keep the American flag on the high seas and was convinced that wages for American sailors were higher than those of other countries.

It also became plain Wednesday the president was weighing a decision on future air mail service.

Postmaster General Farley sent a letter to Chairman Black of the senate air mail investigating committee, giving him administration's reasons for cancelling domestic air contracts.

Expect Executive Order Opening Tax Returns Shortly

WASHINGTON (AP)—An executive order opening income tax returns of manufacturers of naval airplanes to the house committee was predicted Wednesday by Representative McCarren of Texas after a call upon the president.

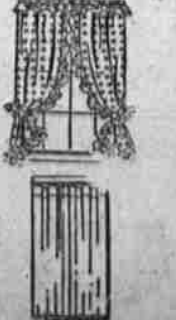

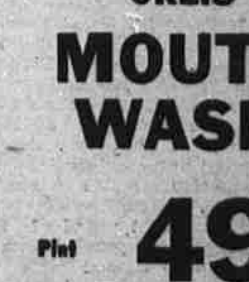

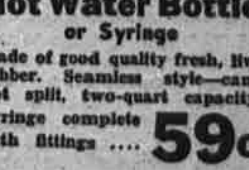

STEERS TEAMS CONSISTENT WINNERS AT TOURNAMENTS

Trophies Cases Filled With Awards Won At
Sectional Meets

Tournament play, which really tests the mettle of basketball teams, has been a deciding factor in Big Spring High School's supremacy over the western section of District 5 for the past three years.

Winning in tournament play consistently during that time, the Black and Gold clad basketballers have acquired a number of miniature gold and silver basketballs and medals for themselves. Also they have a trophy case near filled with cups and silver basketballs as further proof that they have dominated over the maple court teams of this sector.

Won Every Tournament

In this period the Longhorn loopers have won every invitational tournament in which they have participated, including the Big Spring Joust of 1932. The Steers have entered five tournaments in Colorado, counting the Western half championship matches. Each time they have returned with the highest trophy awards emblematic of ascendancy over all opponents. Lubback, McCamey, and Odessa have furnished numerous presentations to the local teams.

Basketball fever was at a high pitch in 1931. Bill Stevens, head mentor of that season, looked over his prospects and smiled a smile that forebode evil to all adversaries. Out of the 10 lettermen on hand, he selected a squad that is tradition. There was the ever-steady Hopper, with a keen eye for the basket. Pardue, at center, was one of the best pivot men to ever wear the colors of Big Spring. Lanky Tommy Hutto, a most capable offensive man, was a star in his own right, carrying off high point honors for the year. At the guard positions were Bill Flowers and Ted Phillips, two clever men at breaking up the opposition's attack.

That year found little stiff competition for the Steers at the titular tournament. Kent defaulted in the first round. The Snyder entry tangled with the Bovines in the semi-final fray only to lose by a 41-17 score. Stevens played his entire squad. Hutto tallied 12 points; Pardue was next high with ten.

Roby's Lions, however, offered plenty of competition for Big Spring in the final game. Through the yeoman service of Flowers and Phillips at the guard posts the Steers defeated Roby 22-12.

Pardue got the tip-off practically every time and aided the guards in covering the Lion sharpshooters. Roby was at a disadvantage in trailing behind from the opening minutes of the game and was not set for any of the breaks.

Taking no dangerous chances, Flowers and Phillips dribbled and passed the ball around in mid-court, feeding Hopper and Hutto with the ball at the right moment. Hopper looped 9 points to shade Hutto's 8.

Brown Wins Title In '33

1932 found George Brown serving his first year as head coach with a galaxy of material. Hopper, with the previous season's experience, was easily the Steers' most valuable man. The elongated Cy Reid held down the pivot slot. Again Big Spring was considered as a major contender for this division's royal purple.

In the first round of the 1932 championship joust, Brown's dribblers were blessed with a bye meeting Coahoma in the semi-final. Hopper, Morgan, and Reid scored 16, 14, and 12 points respectively to trample the other Howard county entry under a 46-12 avalanche.

Pitted against Dunn in the final game, Big Spring had an easy time of it during the first half, but the second session proved to be a tough one for the locals. Big Spring won with a 55-29 tally.

Dunn entered the last half playing an inspired game, featuring "Popeye" Eury and Johnson. These two men dropped shot after shot in the basket from far back on the floor, ringing one on nearly every occasion the ball fell into their hands.

Forrester and Hopper led the offensive attack perfectly. Hopper sank 20 points to edge out Morgan's 19 for goal honors.

No Six-footers in 1933

When 1933 rolled around Brown was a bit skeptical concerning his chances with the material. He had no array of six-footers who were so characteristic of the Steers. Instead he had the diminutive Freddie Townsend, with experience on the junior teams; Cy Reid, a seasoned veteran well over six feet; Jake Morgan, who despite his slight build, was tried and proved under fire; and Hare and Weldon Woods, stockily built at both under the fathom height.

Livian Harris, stellar performer of the 1932 team, was still handicapped with an ankle injury from football. This team fared well in the maple court battles, won their share of trophies and let it be generally known they were worthy of their predecessors albeit their odd stature when grouped together.

Reign As Favorites In Tourney

According to pre-tournament hype, the Big Spring and Colorado teams were favored to participate in the deciding tilt.

Trouncing Divide under a 64-24 score, the entire squad saw service in the Steers' play in the past three years and Woods were up to par on Western half tournaments.

For the third time since Big Spring high school made a successful bid for this section's court laurels, the critics are asking the question, "Will they repeat?" In the past they have disregarded the sport adage, "Champions do not repeat."

However, opposition has strengthened considerably while it can be said that the Black and Gold is somewhat weaker.

The Steers that used to be, never lost in tourney play; the present edition was eliminated in the only joust entered thus far, later defeating Colorado, the tournament champion.

Teams Similar

There is one characteristic possessed by the 1934 quintet that is similar to that of their forerunners. Even when they lose on an opponent's court, the Bovines always manage to come out on the long end of the score whenever they meet these rivals on the local maple-wood. Lamesa invariably falls in the class. Always have the Steers lost to the Tornado five of the Lamesa's stomping ground, and later handed them a defeat on the domestic floor.

Students Study Plan Of Thrift

The following observations on Thrift has been made by Big Spring high school girls taking foods II, taught by Mrs. Jack Bishop.

"Thrift is no longer considered with saving, but is interpreted as wise spending."

"The lower the income the higher is the percentage which goes for food. The interesting thing is that after a certain point, the extra money goes solely for luxury and not for food value. The wealthy woman has to be as thrifty as the one less well-to-do if she is to be certain that her family are supplied with the foods essential to health."

"It has been found that one-third of the family income must be spent for food if proper nutrition results. Every housewife should have some idea of what this money set aside for food, goes for. More of it should be spent for milk, fruits and vegetables than for meats, fats, and sugars. In Foods II, the girls kept account of the food bought and its costs for one week. The results were then grouped and the total cost averaged to find the amount spent. Below are the results:

Group I. Milk, butter, eggs \$41.27

Group II. Fruits and vegetables 89.25

Group III. Meats, cheese, fats 83.51

Group IV. Breads, cereals, sugars 81.00

Group V. Miscellaneous foods 12.95

This average is considered fairly good and the housewives are to be commended. The fact that more was spent for milk, fruits and vegetables than for meats and sweets, shows that the ones doing the marketing know the needs of the family and are fulfilling them. When it comes to feeding children, quality counts for more than quantity.

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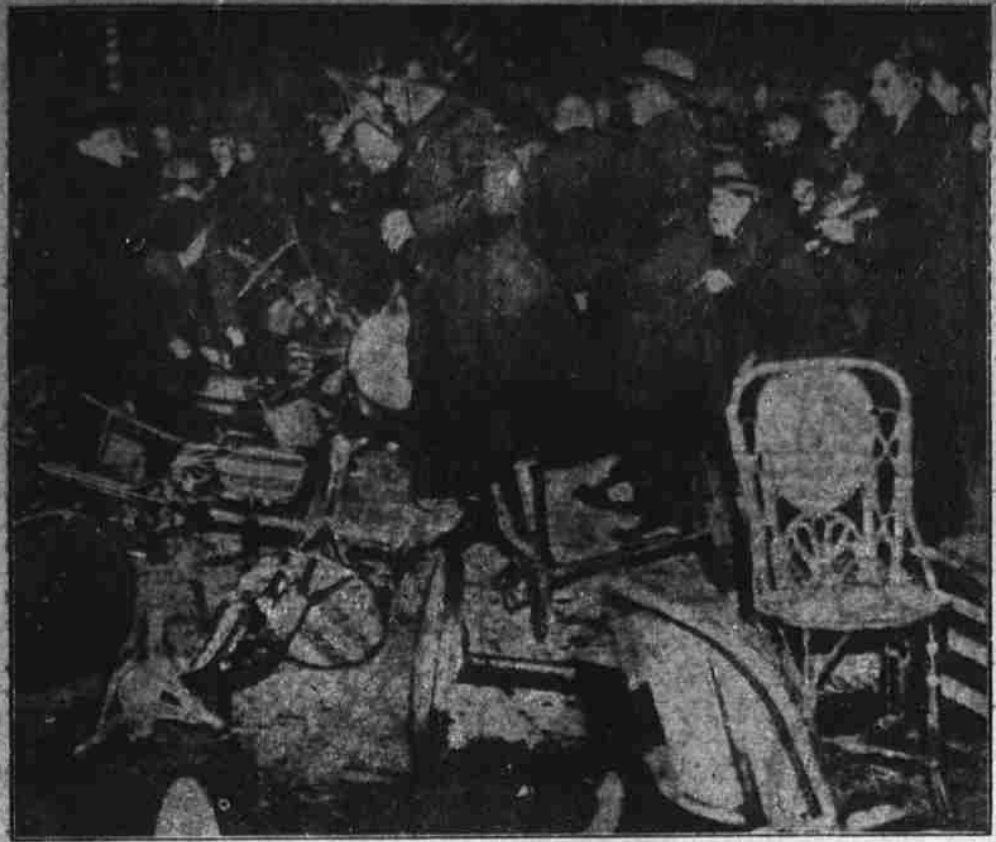

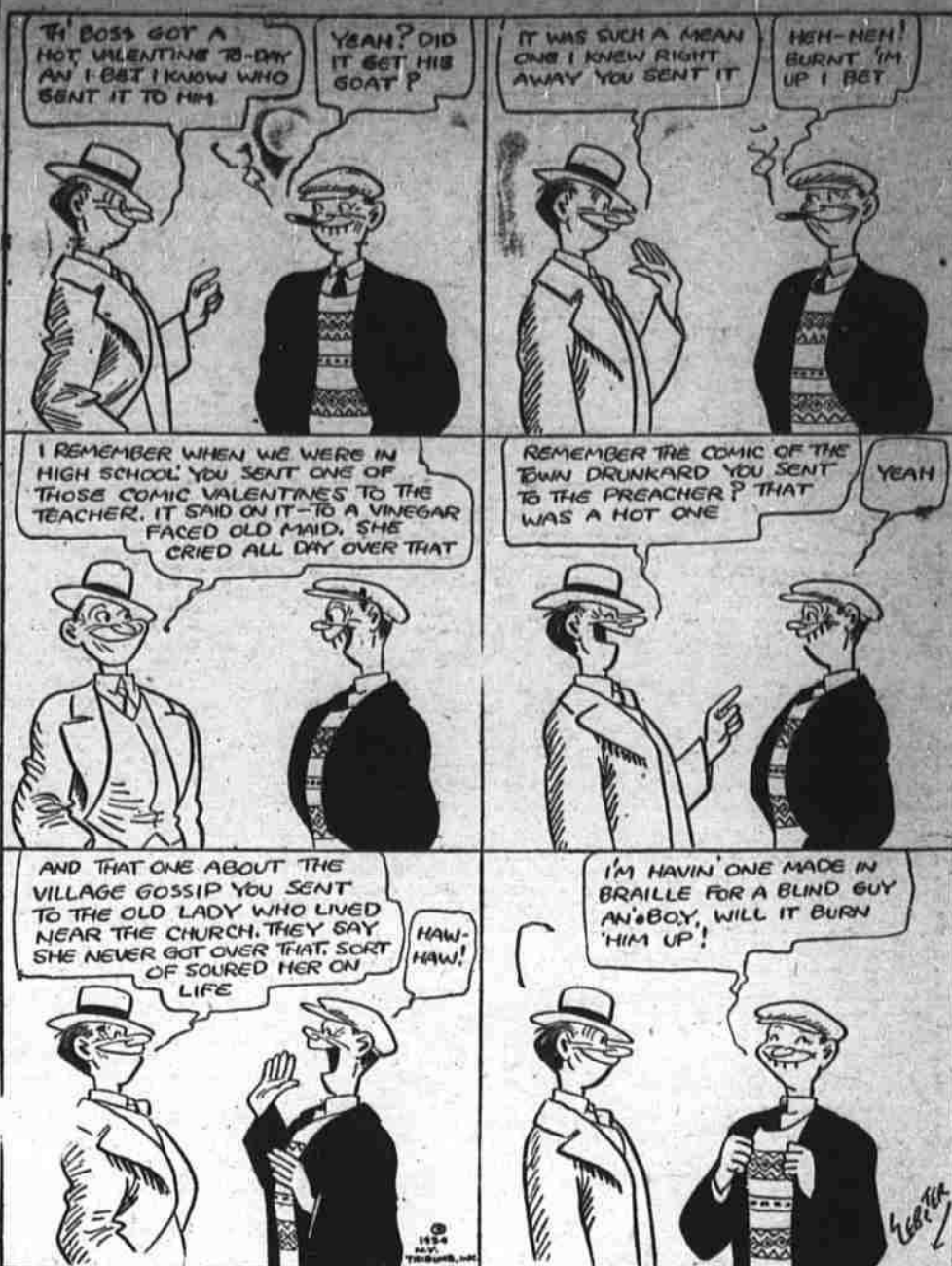

Here's Some Tips To Aid The Fans

BY EVERETT S. DEAN

Fans should have a fair knowledge of the rules in order to understand basketball.

Here are questions and answers on basketball rules:

Questions

1-What is the ten-second rule?

2-How many times may a player re-enter the game?

3-What is a personal foul? A technical foul?

4-What is blocking?

5-What is face guarding?

Answers

1-Courts over 75 feet in length have a division line drawn through the center ring parallel to the end line. Courts under 75 feet have two division lines each 40 feet from the end lines.

The ball must be advanced across the division line into the front court within ten seconds or go to the opponents out of bounds.

2-A player may re-enter the game twice.

3-A personal foul may consist of holding, tripping, charging, pushing, hacking, blocking, unnecessary roughness and face guarding.

A technical foul is touching the ball after it has been given to opponents out of bounds; interfering with player putting ball into play from out of bounds; taking time out when a team has used three time-out periods; delaying the game; leaving the circle on any jump ball until the ball has been tapped; unsportsmanlike conduct; going on the court before reporting to scores.

4-Blocking is personal contact which impedes progress of an opponent who doesn't have the ball.

5-Face guarding takes place when a player disregards the ball at the nearest spot. After the ball is once in the front court, it can be brought back across the line only by the first man who touches it after a shot at the basket, a jump ball, an out of bounds play and recovery of possession of the ball.
