Who is entitled to vote?
Are those, who registered after the board of revision certified to the registration list, entitled to vote? We say emphatically "No!" Unless the new registration law has been adopted for the purpose of swindling and making unlawful voters, it ought to be so understood as to exclude all persons from voting whose names have not passed the examination of the board of revision. Suppose this board had passed the names of several illegal

ly registered voters and suppose the District Clerk or his Deputy is an unscrupulous party man and scoundrel, who will prevent him from registering again the very persons whose names have been erased from the registration list? Who will prevent him from registering whomsoever he sees fit?

The Constitution requires that every citizen who offers to vote, shall be duly registered. Article III, Section 1.

The registration law defines what is to be considered a duly registered voter. His name must appear on the registration list of his Precinct and this registration list must be certified to by the board of revision. Registration may go on after the board of revision has closed its labors, but persons so registered can not claim to vote unless the board of revision has sat again and revised the list. Virtually the registration closes the very minute the board of revision adjourns.

We know what kind of material has been dragged to the office of the Registrar during the last few days. We know that even the crazy and the habitual beggar has not been spared. We know, that if all persons registered live in this County or City, Bexar County ought to have at least 25000 inhabitants and San Antonio at least 20,000. It is obvious that the most shameless swindling has been going on in this registration matter, especially during the last 10 days. We know that voters have been imported from other Counties, that some have come as far as Mexico, that some have registered doubly, and we hope to send some of the criminals to the Penitentiary. But in most cases these unfortunate men are mere tools in the hands of our professional el and paid wire-pullers, and it would be much more satisfactory to catch the seducer instead of the seduced. We advise all Republicans to use the utmost vigilance on election day. Our challengers ought to question doubtful voters very closely and not be satisfied with general denials. Put for instance these questions:

What is your name? Are you known by any other name? How often have you registered? Where is your home? How long are you in Bexar County? When did you come to Texas? Where did you live the last six months before the election?

And if any one of these questions are answered unsatisfactorily, let the would-be voter swear and sign his name to the affidavit, according to law. Then watch him and see what he is doing after he voted, and whenever he makes an attempt to vote again or whenever evidence can be obtained of his having perjured himself have him arrested at once. The time has come when Bexar County must be ruled by her citizens and not by a dozen men who used to tyrannize this County by their bought voters for a quarter of a century.

Is it Fair?

Is it fair for a Candidate for the highest office in the gift of the people to address the voters on the eve of an election when there is no time left to contradict any misstatements he may make, nor to prove his arguments poor and unworthy? Certainly not. And yet Coke proposes to harangue us on Monday next and will as a matter of course not permit any Republican to answer his speech. He may change his policy and tell what he dared not tell the people in other sections of the State, and yet we have no means to let the people know of the duplicity of this man! We say this because we have been informed that Coke intends to deliver a railroad communication, which is other portions of the State he omitted to say anything about railroads for of losing the votes of the Grangers and Antimonopolists. Let the people make a note of this. Listen quietly to him, and by his own words he shall be condemned.

DOMESTIC NEWS.

CHRYSTLER, Nov. 28.—Lieut. Vitenbeler committed suicide at Fort Russell. Supposed cause, mental depression resulting from illness. He leaves a wife and two children.

New York, Nov. 28.—It has transpired that on Saturday last Treadwell purchased a large amount of real estate.

A Mrs. Schmitt appeared at police headquarters yesterday, and stated that her husband, who had in his possession \$120,000, and her little daughter, aged 18, disappeared from the Boston hotel, at the wharf here, Friday last, and she believed they had been murdered. The party had just arrived from Rotterdam, and were going to Boston.

A large number of firms which were carried down by the force of the late panic, have perfected arrangements with their creditors, are getting in shape to announce a resumption of business.

It is said that detectives have gained reliable information relative to the movement to throw a large quantity of forged United States bonds on the market, and that important arrests may be made.

A meeting of the Clearing House was held today. The report of the Committee of Nine, recommending certain articles of association and rules governing deposits, was laid on the table, and the committee discharged, and a new committee, holding different views, appointed, who are to report in sixty days. The meeting then adjourned.

Two priests, claiming to be American citizens, who were expelled from Mexico, have engaged a New York lawyer to demand repatriation from Secretary Fish.

Nothing yet has been heard of the missing steamship Ismailia.

A letter from Havana, dated Nov. 20th, says there is much talk of war with the United States. The Captain General and his military chief have had several meetings, but the result of their deliberations is not known. One thing is certain, however, that preparations for defense are being actively made: guns are being mounted in all the forts around the city. Who they will get to man them is another matter, as they have no artillery-men. Powder is also being supplied, and a general bustle is noticed around the arsenal. People talk warlike, and express their determination to make no concessions.

They say they will fight to the last before they will give up the Virginis or any of the persons who took part in the execution of her crew.

The articles published in the journals have had no effect upon the people, and the Republican papers have to join with the people through fear of not being considered patriotic.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—War appears more imminent than ever. Orders from the Navy Department to day commands all vessels suitable for active service, belonging to the United States, to be reported at once for duty. Men are enlisting with alacrity and everything tends to a warlike attitude. Members of Congress here talk for reclamation and redress. Certain the outlook is warlike.

News has been received within the past twenty-four hours at the State Department, giving the details of political combinations in Spain against Gen. Castellar and the Republican Government, which it will not be able to withstand.

The present intention appears to be to make Marshal Serrano Regent, until young Duke Alphonso becomes of age, when ex-Queen Isabella will formally abdicate.

The ground for revolution is said to be the inability of Castellar to control his cabinet, put down the Carlists, and unite the nation.

The difficulties with the United States are believed to have precipitated the crisis.

This information has caused the administration to look upon the present unsettled relations between the United States and Spain with increased anxiety and apprehension.

The Spanish Republic will not probably last long enough to enable a peaceful adjustment of the Virginis question, and any government that may succeed it will be likely to repudiate any basis of settlement that would be satisfactory to the United States.

Judge Sherman, of Ohio, who was accused last year of being engaged in lobbying schemes in Congress, has resigned, to escape impeachment, and ex-Congressman Martin Wheeler, of the same State, was to-day appointed in his place.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

MADRID, Nov. 25.—At the Cabinet Council yesterday, whereas a note to be sent to the United States, was under consideration.

It is denied that the Spanish Government is disposed to submit the Virginis question to the Emperor of Germany for arbitration.
