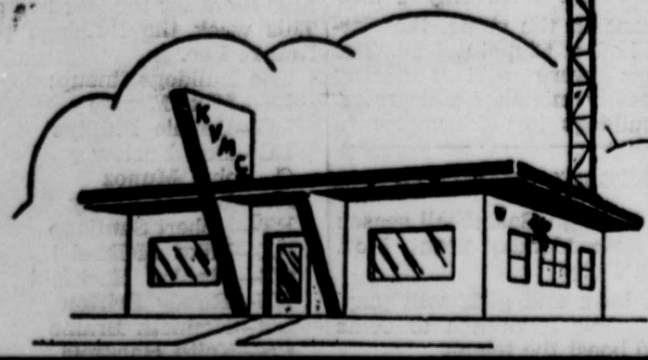

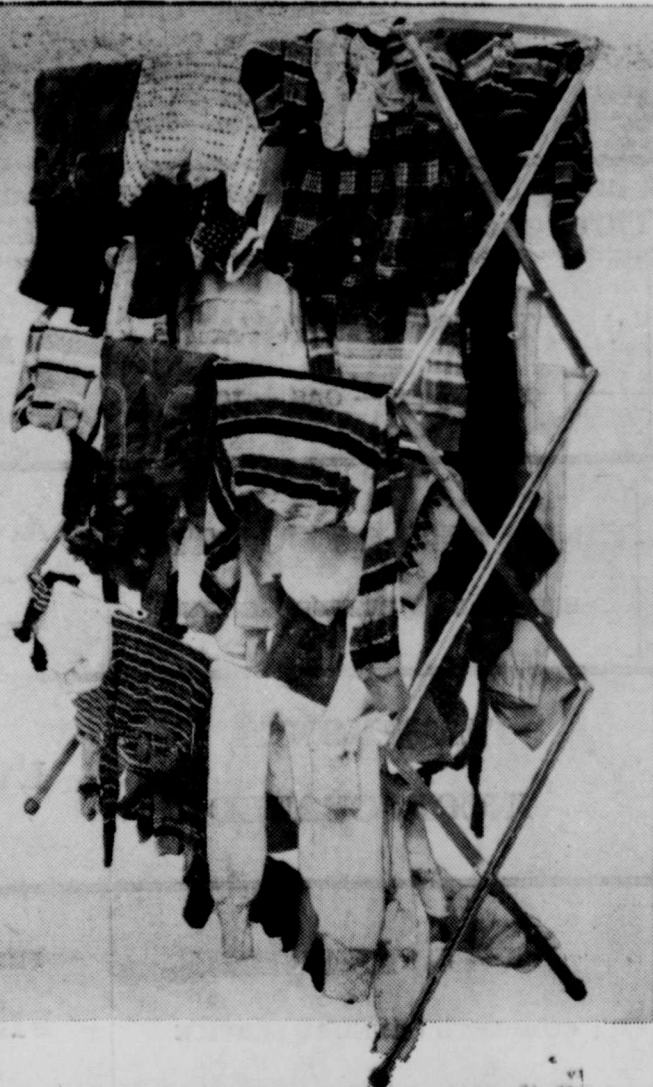
A drink of some kind will be served with the supper. Come and bring Someone with you.

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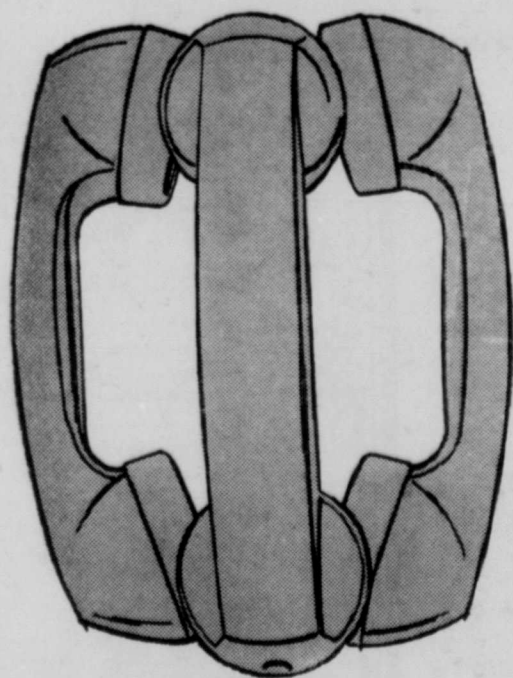
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REV. TURNER AND FAMILY HONORED AT RECEPTION

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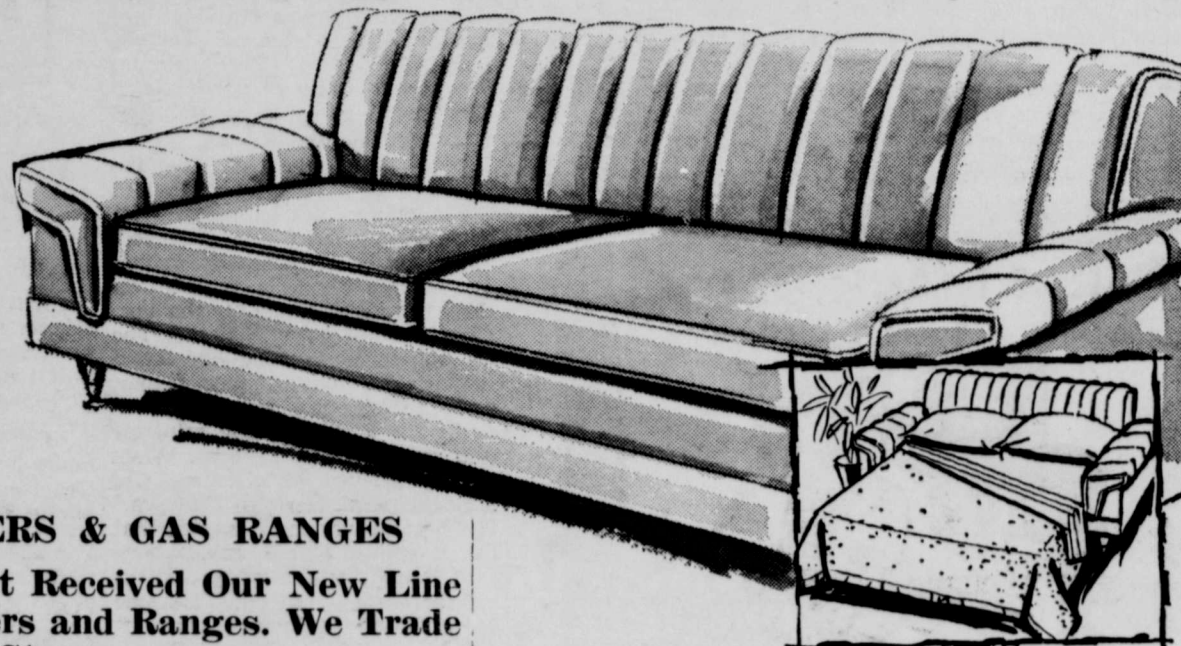
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MR. AND MRS. JOE BENNETT OBSERVE 50TH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

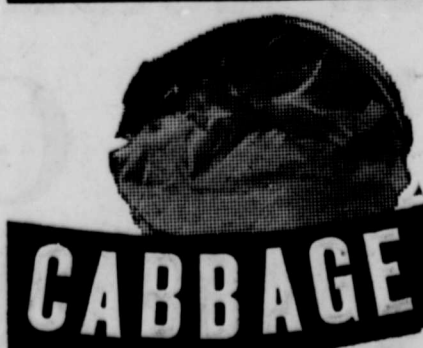
