

Mustangs Stomp Wildcats

The Olton Mustangs delighted the 1973 Homecoming crowd here Friday night by soundly defeating the Idalou Wildcats 44-14. The victory was Olton's fourth in a row and gave them a record of four wins and two losses as they enter district play next Friday night.

Idalou received the opening kickoff and started their first possession of the night at their own 33 yard line. However, on the second play, Rosenda Mojica of Idalou fumbled and Ray Rodriguez caught it in the air and returned it to the 30. In five plays Olton scored their first touchdown of the night on a seven yard run by Glen Johnson. Jimmy Parker ran the two point conversion and with 10:25 remaining in the first quarter, Olton led 8-0.

Olton scored again the first quarter on an 8 yard pass from Parker to Vic Allcorn. Try for 2 was good on a pass from Parker to Paul Almanza. The score climaxed a 56 yard drive by the Mustangs. Going into the second quarter, the score was Olton 16, Idalou 0.

Idalou got on the scoreboard in the second quarter on a 13 yard run by Rosenda Mojica. A pass from Rex Isom to Doug Marshall was good for two points but Olton still had a 16-8 lead with 10:58 remaining in the half.

The Mustangs scored two more touchdowns before intermission. Joe Alcorta scored both on runs of one and 25 yards. Alcorta also ran the two point conversion following his second touchdown. This gave Olton a

comfortable halftime lead of 30-8.

The third quarter proved to be a quarter filled with mistakes and penalties. One penalty called back a beautiful 87 yard touchdown run by Alcorta. Olton was able to score another TD late in the third quarter. The score came on a 33 yard pass from Parker to Bryan Allcorn. Try for two failed, making the score Olton 36, Idalou 8.

The Wildcats scored their final touchdown of the night with 10:35 remaining in the game. The score came on a 40 yard run by Mojica. He broke several tackles to get into the end zone. Try for two points was no good and Olton still had the lead, 36-14.

The final touchdown for the Mustangs was on a one-yard run by Clarence

Johnson. Parker ran the two point conversion to give Olton a win with a score of 44-14.

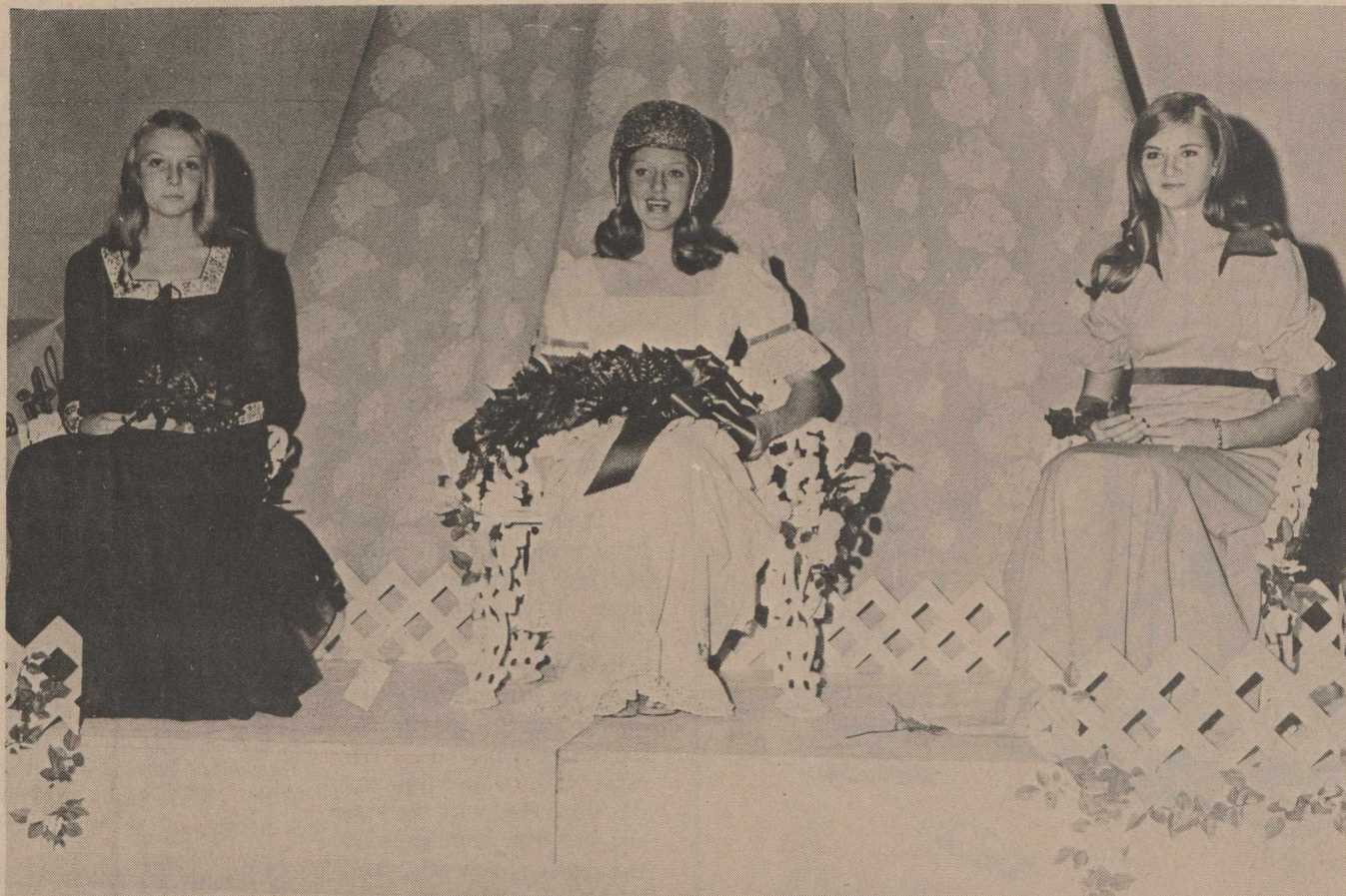
Adult Education Classes To Begin

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Ex-Convict To Speak On Life As Drug Addict

Jack Brown, prison mate of the infamous Bird Man of Alcatraz, Al Capone, Machine Gun Kelley, C. Chessman and many other notorious criminals, will speak at 7 p.m. tonight at the First Baptist Church. Brown was also acquainted with Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow before and during their reign of criminal activity.

A 30-year drug addict, Brown participated in drug addiction solitary confinement. He served in Leavenworth, San Quentin, Lexington and McAlester prisons.

Brown is devoting his life

to youth everywhere and has already spoken to thousands of churches across America and England and to hundreds of clubs, schools and colleges across the nation. He is sponsored in an area speaking tour by the Staked Plains Association of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Three of the 17 years he was imprisoned, Brown spent in experimental programs while in prison. He is completely rehabilitated and received a full pardon from former governor Pat Brown of California.

Everyone in the community is invited to hear Brown



tell of his former life and his new life which came through Jesus Christ.

"It will be an experience you will not forget," says John E. Lewis, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

The turnips are grown 1 mile south of Olton Feed Yard on a dirt road. Directions from town are 3 miles west, 3 1/2 miles south.

Farming Changes Are Noted By Owner Of Olton Farm Supply

Olton Farm Supply was organized on December 18, 1951, by Don Spain and Paul Edwards. The new business was located just north of the present Nixon Auto Parts. Spain laughingly said, "The building had served for everything from a freight depot to a dance hall."

In its infancy years, Olton Farm Supply handled seed, feed, fertilizer, insecticides, and irrigation supplies.

Over the years, the business has grown and expanded tremendously. The business specializes in selling DeKalb seeds, which includes grain sorghum, forage crops, corn, alfalfa, wheat, and winter forages; Olin and Nikap plant foods; Purina Chows; Forney

Welding supplies and welders; irrigation supplies, including everything from syphons to overshoes; Continental Belton, which is a line of sprayers, sprayer parts, and post hole diggers; General Electric garden tractors and equipment, from plug-in chain saws to snow blowers. The business also specializes in lawn and garden supplies, and has just about everything one needs, whether it be spray for the minute spider mite or a 20 hp G. E. tractor.

"Over the years it has taken all these things working together to make a good Farm Supply Store to better serve area farmers," Spain commented. "And it

took all this to make a living too," he laughed.

In 1954, Spain bought Edward's part of the business, making him the sole owner.

"One of the big changes I've seen over the years is going from bag to bulk on feeds and fertilizers," Spain reported.

"When we went into business, ammonia retailed for \$200 a ton--now it retails for \$100 a ton. This, I believe, has been brought about by an increase in production, and the volume of usage."

"All things the farmers have to buy haven't gone up in price. Luckily, several things have remained the

same and some have even decreased in cost."

Olton Farm Supply began the fertilizer business in Olton. Spain commented that he has seen it grow from zero to what it is today.

"A dry fertilizer, 16-20-0, sells for almost the same today as it did back in 1951, except back then the cost did not include application, as it does now.

In the early days, the farmer was responsible for applying his own fertilizer. This was done with old drag boxes or side dressing machines.

At the present time, the fertilizer is applied by the dealer or it is done by custom workers, or the farmer owns his own application equipment.

"It has been interesting to note the increase in acreage over the years. When I began farming, I farmed about 135 acres, now I farm 500 acres. The average farms "back then" were from a quarter to a half section. Now, most farmers have at least one section."

DeKalb came out with the first grain hybrid seed in 1956.

"Before hybrids and extensive fertilizer usage, 4,000 pounds per acre was a good yield. A good yield now averages around 8,000 pounds per acre. We have

Coach Miller, contacted immediately following the game said, "The only thing that I am concerned about right now is Johnson's knee. I don't know how bad it is. Last summer I told the kids that we had to be 4 and 2 when we started district. It didn't look like we were going to make it. We came back and we played pretty good ball here lately and got the thing at 4 and 2 and I think we have a good shot at Friona. It's anybody's district."

"We were able to keep the momentum that we had during the three game winning streak, now it's four. If we are able to maintain it, we will be alright."

Funeral services were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in the First United Methodist Church for Mrs. Mary Opal Miller, 68.

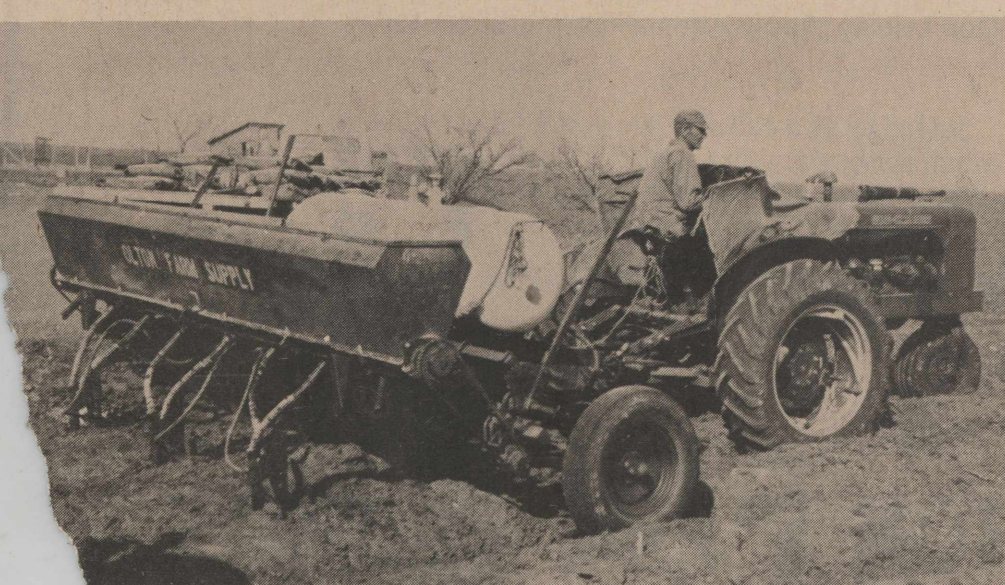

SCHOOL CAFETERIA STAFF

National School Lunchroom Week To Be Noted By Local Cafeteria

"Too many cooks spoil the broth" is not true when it comes to preparing food for some 900 hungry boys and girls plus a half-hundred adults. That's the daily task nine months of the year for our "Cooks of the Week", the staff of the school cafeteria.

Oct. 15 through 20 is National Schools Lunchroom Week. In connection with the nation-wide observance, the local school cafeteria will be joining other school lunchrooms across the U. S. in proclaiming "You are what you eat." Staff members will be wearing jumbo-lapel buttons with that message.

Wednesday has been earmarked for the "Universal Meal" and school children of America will dine on barbecue beef on a bun, buttered corn, "Popeye" (tossed greens) salad, milk and yellow cake with cherry sauce. Persons are invited to have lunch at school any day during the special observance and are always welcome at any time during the year. Visitors plates may be purchased for the very moderate cost of 75 cents.

Lunch tickets were increased this year because of the spiraling costs of food. Students in kindergarten through the fifth grade are charged 50 cents with junior high and high school paying 55 cents.

Norma Lively, supervisor,

is serving her second year in that capacity. She has worked with the lunchroom many years. Her husband, J. D. helps out in so many capacities that Norma describes him as her "left-handed right hand man."

Mmes. Weldon Priest works with salads; Mmes. Leon May, Rex Sherry and Loyd (Winnie) Sweatt prepare breads and desserts; Mmes. Merle Sharp, James (Margaret) Gallagher and Leroyce (Sandy) Kersh work with meats and Mmes. Pauline Jones and Florence Frazier cook the vegetables. Dish room employee and first substitute is Mrs. Ped (Lois) Hunt.

Other dish room employees or substitutes are Mmes. Roy Long, Miles Caudle, Charles Ratliff and Billy Austin.

Last month's diners average 850 although some 900 were eating each day at the month's end. In addition to that number of students, the cafeteria was also feeding about 56 adults each day.

Popular changes this year, the lunchroom can now serve chocolate milk if the student prefers plus iced tea for the adults. Both have met with approval.

Menus for each day are built around five food groups and provide the "pattern form" for the foundation of lunches. The five groups include milk (white or flavored), meat or meat substitute, vegetable and/or fruit, bread and butter

(served as pats with the meal or cooked into one of the foods).

Favorite meals at the lunchroom are those which feature hamburgers, brown beans, tacos and corn dogs. Dessert is "important" and Italian cream cake is one of the more popular desserts.

Meat has not proved to be the "problem" food to obtain this year. Fruits are the most difficult to buy with orange juice supplied as a government commodity having to fill that source.

Government commodities which help the lunchroom provide nutritious meals at a very nominal cost include flour, corn meal, beans, butter, shortening and peanut butter, in addition to orange juice. Mrs. Lively said they also expect to receive pineapple juice later.

In addition to their five-days-a-week tasks, the lunchroom personnel is often called on to prepare dinners and banquets, most especially in the spring time. Next week they will also be preparing two lunches-feeding the almost 1000 regular diners plus serving dinner to the visiting members of District XIV Parent-Teacher Association at the workshop slated here Thursday.

Few Enterprise cooks have need of the quantitative recipes used by the cafeteria staff so featured this week are some of their personal favorites.

MABEL'S CHICKEN SALAD

- 2 c. diced cook chicken
 - 1 c. diced celery
 - 1/2 c. diced cucumbers
 - 1 hard boiled egg, chopped
 - 1 T. finely chopped onion (more if desired)
 - 1 T. finely chopped pickles
 - Salt and pepper to taste
 - 1/2 c. mayonnaise
- Mix ingredients together. Chill and serve on lettuce leaf.

LOIS'S FLUFFY YELLOW CAKE

- 1 c. shortening
 - 2 c. sugar
 - 4 egg yolks
 - 1 t. vanilla
 - 2 c. flour
 - 1/4 t. salt
 - 3 t. baking powder
 - 1 c. milk
 - 4 stiffly beaten egg whites
- Cream shortening and sugar. Add egg yolks and vanilla. Beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk. Fold in egg whites. Bake in 3 waxed paper lined 8" cake pans in 350 degree oven 30 minutes. Frost with favorite icing.

Knead on floured surface two or three minutes. Place in greased bowl, cover and let rise one hour. Divide into three loaves, let rise to top of pan. Bake in 350 degree oven 25 minutes. Remove from oven, butter top. Bake another 15-20 minutes at 325.

SANDY'S SPICY PUMPKIN CAKE

1/2 c. shortening
1 c. sugar
1 egg, beaten
1 c. hot mashed cooked pumpkin
1 t. soda
2 c. flour
1/4 t. salt
1 t. cinnamon
1/2 t. allspice
1/2 t. cloves
1/2 c. raisins
1/2 c. nuts, chopped

Cream shortening and sugar till fluffy. Add egg, blend well. Dissolve soda in warm pumpkin and stir into creamed mixture. Mix in dry ingredients. Add nuts and raisins with last cupful flour. Bake in greased 13x9x2 pan in 350 degree oven 1 hour.

TOPPING:

3/4 stick oleo
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/4 c. canned milk
Mix well and spread over warm cake. Put under broiler till bubbly.

MRS. PRIEST'S NEVER FAIL PIE CRUST

1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/4 cup powdered sugar
Mix Crisco into dry ingredients and add cold water to make dough. Roll out on floured board.

PAULINE'S RAGE OF WICHITA COOKIES

1 c. shortening
1/4 c. sugar
1 egg
1 c. cooked mashed carrots
2 c. flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 tsp. vanilla
2 tsp. orange-flavoring
2 tsp. baking powder
Cream together shortening and sugar. Beat in egg, flavoring and carrots. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt and add to creamed mixture. Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet and bake about 12 minutes in a 400 oven. (These cookies are better cool than when first baked.)

NORMA'S EASY FUDGE

1 1/2 c. sugar
2 cups evaporated milk
3 T. butter
3-6 oz. semi-sweet chocolate pieces
3 c. miniature marshmallows
1/2 c. nuts (chopped)
Combine sugar, milk, and butter in medium sized heavy saucepan- heat to boiling over medium heat stirring constantly, cook for 6 minutes or until candy thermometer reaches 227. Remove from heat and add chocolate and marshmallows and stir until melted and smooth. Stir in nuts and spoon into buttered 8 by 8 by 2 pan. Cool and cut. This is one family favorite.

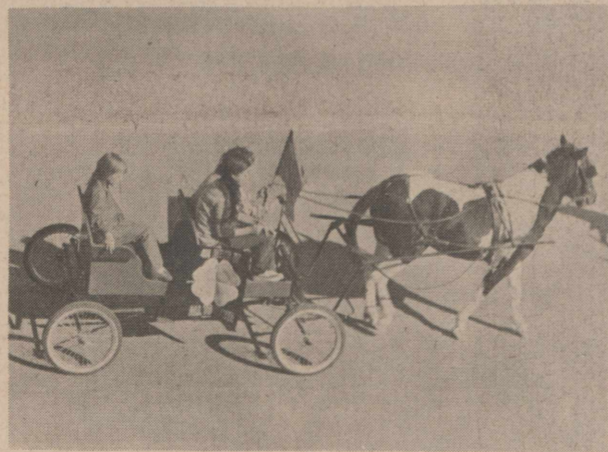

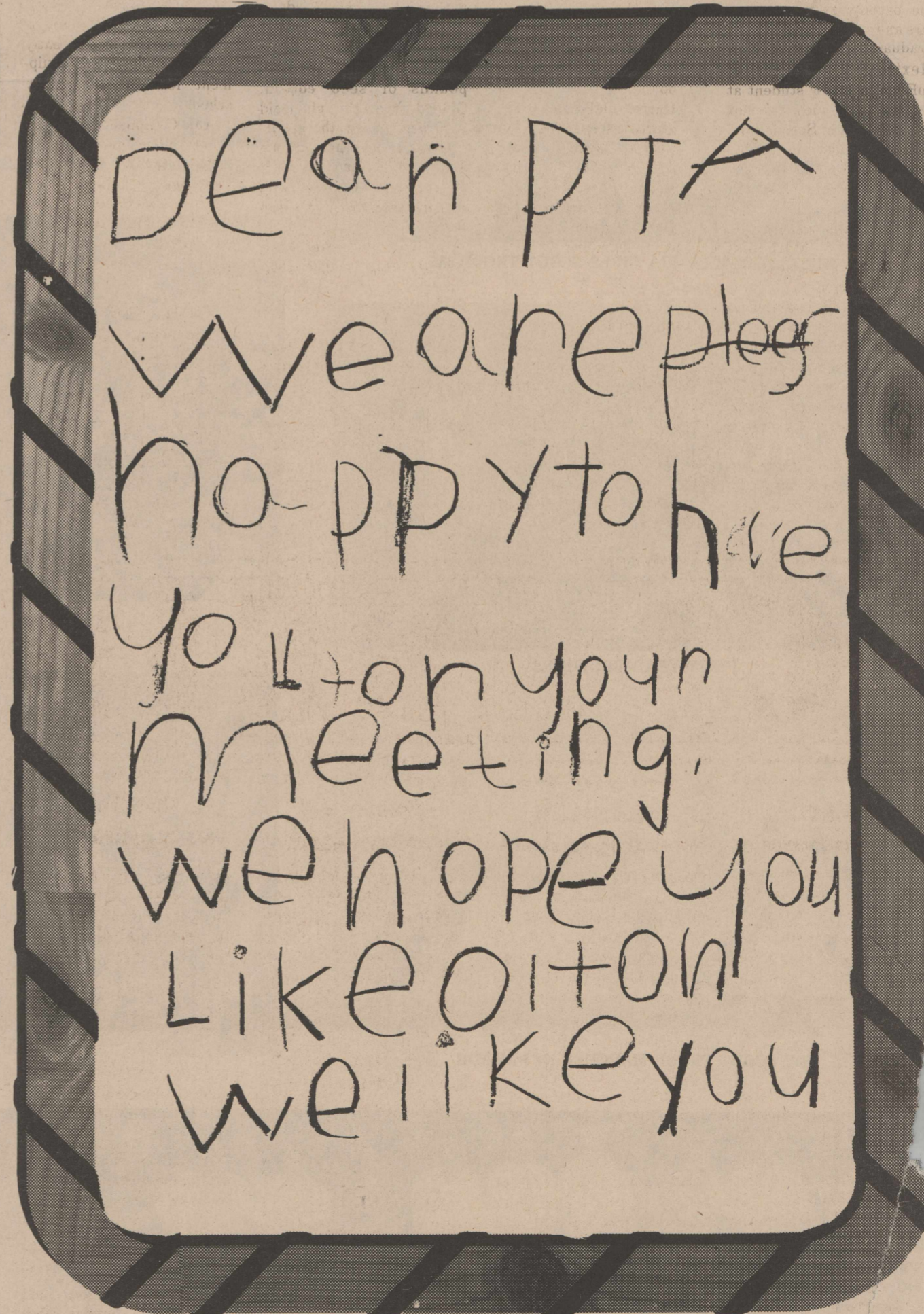

Continued from page 1 easily seen the yield doubled." The present Olton Farm Supply building was constructed in 1959. This building houses a bagged goods warehouse. A bulk fertilizer warehouse and a bulk feed warehouse were built to the north of the business.

"We used to sell approximately 15,000 chickens in one year. However, this year there has been more interest in baby chickens because of meat and egg prices."

"We have seen the disappearance of hand harvesting of cotton. In the late 1940's and early 1950's everyone "picked cotton." Now, of course, machines do the job."

"When we began our business, lots of people milked their own cows. Now, they buy milk at the grocery stores, or a milk man delivers it to their homes."

Olton Farm Supply has received various outstanding achievements from Olin, DeKalb, and Purina.

Don came to Olton in 1936 from Western Oklahoma with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Spain. He graduated from Olton High School in 1942.

He received a degree Agricultural Engineering from Oklahoma State University.


